ABSTRACT

The report is an annual update of statistical information about the 42 member institutions of the United Negro College Fund, Inc. (UNCF). Information is provided on enrollment, admissions, faculty, degrees, financial aid, college costs, institutional finances, and endowment. Highlights identified include: the fall 1989 total enrollment was a 10% rise over 1987 and 13% over 1986; 42% of the total enrollment was male; 42% of the enrollment was classified as freshman; Georgia, Florida, and South Carolina were the leading states in regard to the home residence of UNCF students; 45% of the freshmen applicants admitted to UNCF colleges become enrolled students; almost 50% of full-time faculty possessed a doctoral degree; the average full professor at a UNCF college earned \$28,443; the total number of degrees awarded (5,728) was 2% more than in the previous year; and the value of endowment funds in June 1988 (\$13 million) more than doubled in the past 6 years. Thirteen tables or figures provide detailed statistics. Sample topics of the 29 appendices include full-time and part-time enrollment, enrollment by sex, faculty by race and degrees, faculty turnover and tenure, degrees conferred by major, institutional costs, revenues and expenditures, total endowment, and UNCF member colleges. 

Highlights From The 1989 UNCF Statistical Report

- * The fall, 1989, total enrollment of 48,233 was a 10 percent rise over 1987 and a 13 percent rise over 1986;
- * 42 percent of the total enrollment is male;
 91 percent attend as full-time students;
- * 42 percent of the enrollment is classified as "freshman";
- * Georgia, Florida, and South Carolina are the leading states in regard to the home residence of UNCF students; 70 percent of all UNCF students come from states in which UNCF colleges are located;
- * 45 percent of the freshmen applicants who are admitted to UNCF colleges become enrolled students;
- * almost 50 percent of full-time faculty possess a doctoral degree;
- * the average full professor at a UNCF college earned \$28,443; this was some \$7,747 less than the comparable figure at 4-year church related colleges and some \$16,327 less than 4-year colleges nationally;
- * the total number of degrees awarded (5,728) was some two percent more than in the previous year;
- * 22 of the 40 4-year UNCF colleges showed enrollment in which 70 percent or more of the students received Pell grants;
- * the average total cost of tuition and for room and board and books and supplies (\$7,008) showed a 7.5 increase over the previous year;
- * Stafford Loans (formerly GSL's) now account for 31 percent of the financial aid dollars; such loans accounted for only 22 percent of the aid dollars in 1983-84; and
- * the value of the endowment funds in June, 1988 (\$313 million) has more than doubled in the past six years.



INTRODUCTION

This 1989 <u>UNCF Statistical Report</u> is the annual update of statistical information about the member institutions of the United Negro College Fund, Inc. This edition on the contains information about the 42 institutions that were members of UNCF in fall, 1988. Since the merger (in July, 1989) Atlanta University and Clark College into a single institution (Clark-Atlanta University), there are now 41 institutions which comprise the membership of UNCF. All are private independent institutions and all are accredited by either the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools or the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Most of the colleges are located in the southeast: seven in Georgia, six in North Carolina, five each in Alabama and Texas, and four each in South Carolina and Tennessee, three in Florida, two each in Louisiana, Mississippi, and Virginia, and one each in Arkansas and Ohio.

Except for Wilberforce which was founded in 1856 and the I.T.C., formed in 1958 by merging a number of smaller theological schools, almost all the member institutions were founded during the 35 year period following the end of the Civil War. The 41 UNCF colleges are part of a larger group of 104 historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs). As of 1987 these institutions enrolled one out of six blacks in higher education; however, the HBCUs enrolled about one of three black students enrolled in four-year colleges. (About 43 percent of all black students are enrolled in two-year colleges; these institutions are not classified as historically black.)

of the data in the Report was supplied by the colleges in response to a detailed questionnaire. Enrollment figures for 1989 were supplied by the college registrars through a telephone survey; in some cases the data for 1989 is preliminary data and may change slightly when complete information is available.

This year's report is presented at a time when there is growing national concern about educational outcomes--particularly for Consider the following facts drawn from the U.S. Department of Education's 1988 Digest of Education Statistics. Although blacks comprised 16 percent of the enrollment in public elementary and secondary schools in 1984, the black proportion at various other points in the educational pipeline was:

- 9 percent of the enrollment in college; 6 percent of the bachelor's degrees; 5 percent of the master's degrees and

- 4 percent of the doctoral and first professional degrees.

Such facts clearly point to the need for increased attention and funding for all aspects of education which impinge on young Black-Americans. It is hoped that this edition of the UNCF <u>Statistical Report</u> will provide educators, legislators, philanthropists with up-to-date information about the efforts of the UNCF colleges--colleges that continue to provide outstanding educational opportunities to thousands of these young persons.



ENROLLMENT

The fall total enrollment figures at the UNCF colleges and universities have shown impressive five percent gains in each of the past two years. The total enrollment at all member colleges stood at 48,233 in fall, 1989; this total is 10 percent higher than that recorded in fall, 1987, and 13 percent higher that the figures for fall, 1986. Figure 1 shows the dramatic rise in enrollment at the UNCF member institutions in recent years.

In contrast with the fine enrollment gains shown by the UNCF colleges, national enrollment gains have been rather sluggish. Figures provided by the U.S. Department of Education show that between 1986 and 1988 overall enrollment at U.S. colleges and universities increased by 539,000 to a total of 13.04 million, a 4.3 percent increase. During the same two-year period, the overall national enrollment of black students increased from 1.082 million to 1.111 million, a gain of 29,000 students or 2.7 All the enrollment increase at the national level for percent. black students was attributable to the increase in black female enrollment--up to 675,000 in 1988 from 646,000 in 1986; black male enrollment was constant at /436,000. The enrollment increase for black females during this two-year period was 4.5 percent.

At UNCF colleges, black male enrollment increased by five percent during the 1986 to 1988 period while black female enrollment increased by ten percent. In contrast to the national figures cited above, overall enrollment at UNCF colleges rose by nearly eight percent during the same two-year time period.

Clearly, in recent years, UNCF colleges are experiencing enrollment gains which are larger than those seen at U.S. colleges generally. The Chronicle of Higher Education featured an article (October 26, 1988) about the rise of enrollment at many black colleges. In the article three reasons were cited for the rise:

- . <u>More aggressive recruiting</u>. Many colleges have improved their brochures and catalogs; others have used alumni to help with the recruiting effort.
- . Significantly lower tuition cost. Tuition charges at UNCF colleges are only about half as expensive as at other four-year colleges.
- Reaction to racial incidents on predominantly white campuses. Many black students are choosing to attend UNCF colleges because of the more supportive environment—one that lets them develop their full potential without the threat of racial harassment.

Appendix A shows that enrollments range from about 500 students to 3500 students at the member colleges; the average enrollment is about 1,100.


Enrollment by Part-time/Full-time Status & by Graduate/Undergraduate Status

Appendix B shows the division of the enrollment by full-time/part-time status while Appendix C shows the enrollment by undergraduate/graduate status. The total figures show that 91 percent of the enrollment at UNCF institutions is full-time and that 96 percent of all UNCF students are undergraduates. Seven of the colleges--Atlanta University, Fisk, the Interdenominational Theological Center (I.T.C.), Livingstone, Tuskegee, Virginia Union, and Xavier--offer graduate and/or professional programs. (The I.T.C. offers programs only at the professional level, while Atlanta University offered work only at the graduate level; Atlanta University has now merged with Clark College to become Clark-Atlanta University.)

By Gender

The relatively low college attendance rate of black males major concern of many educators, not only at UNCF colleges, but at other colleges throughout the country. During the twelve year period between 1976 and 1988, the overall nate enrollment of black women increased by nearly 20 overall national percent (from 563,000 to 675,000 while the enrollment of black men decreased by seven percent (from 470,000 to 436,000). As shown graphically in Figure 2, the male/female make-up of the total enrollment at UNCF colleges shows a consistent female majority. Although male/female proportion remained unchanged in 1988-89 percent male and 58 percent female, the male portion of enrollment has been slowly declining over the past few years. In contrast to national figures which showed no increase in black male enrollment, UNCF colleges have registered a five percent gain in male enrollment during the past two years.

By Class Level

Appendix D shows enrollment by class level and/or Comparing this 1988 data with that of the two previous reveals that much of the enrollment gain experienced by the UNCF member institutions has occurred at the freshman and sophomore levels. Since the fall of 1986, the number of students classified as freshmen men has risen by nearly 19 percent (from This data shows that the UNCF colleges are 16,304 to 19,337). becoming increasingly attractive to new students.

By Race

Throughout their history, UNCF colleges have always been open to non-black students. Appendix E shows that in fall 1988, some 1,160 (about three percent) of all UNCF students were non-black. These non-black students included 624 whites and 536 persons from Hispanic backgrounds.


By Geographical Origin

The geographical origin of UNCF students is shown in Appendices I and J. The twelve states in which UNCF colleges are located are also the same states which produce the great majority of UNCF students; about 71 percent of UNCF students come from these states. Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, North Carolina, and Alabama are the leading five states in the production of UNCF students. Four states without UNCF colleges--Illinois, New York, Michigan, and California--each produce over 1,000 UNCF students.

A number of UNCF colleges draw a large portion of their enrollment from out-of-state. Institutions that draw at least two-thirds of their students from out-of-state include: Oakwood, 84 percent; Knoxville, 83 percent; Fisk, 82 percent; Spelman, 78 percent; Tuskegee, 76 percent, and Morehouse, 68 percent. Tuskegee, with 245 students from other countries, has the largest enrollment of foreign students.

Figure 3 shows the enrollment by regions of the country. (Texas is included in the midwest region.)

Percent of Total Enrollment




ADMISSIONS

New Freshmen

As shown in Figure 4, the enrollment of new freshmen in fall 1988, reached a six-year high of 13,617, a four percent increase over the previous year. Combined with 2,231 transfer students (who accounted for 14 percent of the total), the total number of new students reached 15,848 at all UNCF institutions in fall, 1988.

Appendix K shows some of the details of the new freshman admissions process at the member colleges. Overall figures show that 44,783 completed applications were received from prospective freshmen; this was an increase of 5,810 (15 percent) over the previous year. Since 1984, the number of applications has increased by a remarkable 42 percent. For fall, 1988, some 30,376 of these applicants (68 percent) were granted admission. Of those who were admitted, about 45 percent later enrolled as new freshmen.

Transfers

The number of new transfer students in fall, 1988, increased by some 13 percent over the previous year--up to 2,231 from 1,968. About 60 percent of these students transferring to UNCF institutions had previously attended predominantly white colleges. See Appendix F for details concerning the origin of these transfer students.



FACULTY

As shown graphically in Figure 5, almost half (49.4 percent) of all faculty members at UNCF institutions held a doctoral degree in fall, 1988. One of the contributing factors which has led to the improvement in faculty academic preparation has been the widespread participation of younger faculty members in the various UNCF scholarship and fellowship programs.

Appendix M shows that about two-thirds (65 percent) of the faculty members are black. The total number of faculty members increased by three percent over the previous year.

The stability of the faculty personnel is shown in Appendix N. Overall figures show that separations amounted to about twelve percent of the total faculty while new additions to the faculty amounted to about 14 percent. This appendix also shows that slightly over one-quarter of faculty members at UNCF institutions have attained tenure status.


The breakdown of faculty members by major division is shown in Appendix P. The areas employing the largest numbers are the humanities and languages followed closely by science and mathematics. Such large percentages in these areas are understandable because most of the colleges have lower division academic requirements in English, a foreign language, mathematics, and a laboratory science.

Figure 6 shows the average salaries of UNCF faculty members compared with the average salaries of faculty at church related colleges and at private, independent colleges. (Data for the church-related and the private, independent colleges was obtained by the AAUP and was published in The Chronicle of Higher Education on September 6, 1989.)

Although it is true that salaries at UNCF institutions trail at all ranks and that the greatest discrepancy occurs at the full professor level, it is also true that the UNCF member colleges have made considerable strides in recent years to bring faculty salaries more in line with those received by their colleagues elsewhere. While the \$28,443 average salary of UNCF full professors is some 36 percent below the national four-year college figure of \$44,770, salaries at UNCF colleges have risen sharply in the past two years. During this period the salaries of full professors at UNCF colleges have gone up by some 13 percent. The comparable percentage increase for all full professors at private independent colleges was eleven percent.

Appendix Q shows the average salaries at each faculty level at each of the UNCF institutions. Appendix R shows the overall composition of the employees at each UNCF institution; faculty constitute about 38 percent of the total number of employees.


DEGREES

After a slight decline in 1986-87, the number of degrees awarded by UNCF institutions in 1987-88 increased by about two percent to a total of 5,727. The vast majority (88 percent) of the degrees awarded were at the bachelor's level; 554 were at the master's level; 63 at the professional level; and 41 at the doctoral level. Of the 42 institutions, 22 showed an increase in the number of degrees awarded in 1987-88 as compared to the previous year.

Table 1 shows the degrees awarded by subject areas in 1987-88 while Appendix S gives the detailed breakdown of the degrees awarded by the member institutions. As in recent years, business continues to be the most popular field of study--29 percent of the total. Within the field of business, the most popular area is business administration.

Figure 7 shows the dramatic changes in degrees awarded by broad fields of study from 1981-82 to the current year.

Although business, the humanities, and the physical sciences/mathematics have remained rather steady, the field of education has seen its numbers drop markedly--from 19 percent of all graduates in 1979-80 to only 10 percent in the current year. The social sciences have also suffered a drop in the percentage of graduates during this period--from 22 percent down to 16 percent. Conversely, computer science has made a remarkable jump--from less than one percent of the total in 1979-80 to six percent currently.

Of all these changes in degree output, the drop in the field of education is potentially the most alarming since this trend, unless reversed, would mean that in future years there will be considerably fewer black teachers in our elementary and secondary classrooms. At the same time, demographers also point out that a larger portion of the young persons in our schools will be composed of blacks and other minorities.

Details concerning the enrollment and the degree output in dual degree engineering programs are shown in Appendix T. These programs enable qualified students to earn two undergraduate degrees—a degree in a field such as chemistry, mathematics, or physics at the UNCF college and a professional degree in engineering at a cooperating university; typically students spend five or six years in these programs. Of interest is the growing percentage of women who are enrolled in these dual-degree programs. In 1987–88, only 28 percent of the participants were women; in the current reporting year the percentage of women has increased to 36 percent. During the past year, the number of men participating in the dual-degree engineering programs decreased from 892 to 785 (a 12 percent loss), while the number of women increased from 349 to 444 (a 27 percent gain).

Appendix U lists the 24 UNCF member institutions that are currently participating in dual-degree programs. Also shown are the 29 cooperating universities.



FINANCIAL AID

Some 90 percent of all UNCF students received some form of financial aid in 1987-88. At 28 of the 42 UNCF institutions over 90 percent of the students received aid. The total amount of aid awarded in 1987-88 was slightly over \$172 million, up some five percent from the previous year. But considering that the enrollments increased by five percent, the amount of the increase in aid funds was insufficient to keep pace with cost rises and inflation. Table 2 provides details of the financial aid funds received by the member colleges for 1987-88.

Figure 8 presents the summary data concerning the various student participation rates in five financial aid programs. Although the Pell Grant program continues to be the most frequently used—over half of all UNCF students participated in this program in 1987-88—it is not as important as it was in 1981-82 when nearly 80 percent participated. Figure 8 also shows that as Pell Grant participation has dropped, participation in the GSL (Stafford Loan) program has increased—from a little over 20 percent in 1981-82 to well over 40 percent in 1987-88. Other financial aid programs have remained fairly stable in their participation rates.

Figure 8. Student Financial Aid Participation by Program, 1981 & 1987







Figure 9 shows the dramatic change in student aid funding over the past five years in three important federal aid programs. Although Pell Grants have stayed around the \$40 million figure and SEOGs have remained at a level around \$14 million during this period, the amount and proportion of student aid funds coming from GSLs (Stafford Loans) has increased steadily. In 1983-84, GSLs accounted for less than a quarter (22 percent) of the student aid funds; in 1987-88, (just four years later), GSLs constituted nearly one-third (31 percent) of these funds. This change in policy regarding student aid funds has undoubtedly been a factor in discouraging many students to remain in college.

Figure 9. Financial Aid Awards Three Fed. Programs——Pell, GSL, & SEOG






COLLEGE COSTS

The cost of attending a UNCF college is much less than at other private colleges in the United States. Figure 10 shows that the average total cost for tuition and fees, room and board, and books and supplies at UNCF colleges was slightly over \$7,000 in 1988-89. This figure was 30 percent less than the \$10,050 charged by private four-year colleges in the South; the UNCF figure was 40 percent less than the \$11,760 charged by private college nationally in 1988-89.

The major factor in keeping the cost of attending a UNCF institution low is relatively low amount charged for tuition and fees. Although these charges increased by nine percent in 1988-89, the UNCF \$4,049 average figure for tuition and fees was still 38 percent less than the \$6,535 charged by private colleges in the South; it was only about half as much as the \$7,693 charged by four-year private colleges nationally. (Cost figures for private colleges found in the The College Board's 1988-89 College Cost Book.)

Although the cost difference for room and board charges were not as great as for tuition and fee charges, they were still substantial—about 20 percent less than the comparable figure at private four—year colleges in the South and about 30 percent less than the cost at four—year colleges nationally. The cost for books and supplies was approximately the same at all types of four—year colleges—\$\frac{5}{4}30\$ per year. Although those figures do not include the costs of personal expenses and transportation, it is clear that the cost of attending a UNCF institution is substantially less than at most other private four—year colleges.

INSTITUTIONAL FINANCES

In comparison with the data for 1986-87, revenues and expenditures both rose by some nine percent at UNCF institutions in 1987-88. Revenues reached nearly \$448 million, while expenditures totaled about \$441 million. The average revenue per student was \$9,738; the average expenditure per student was \$9,589. The average revenue per institution reached \$10,663,113, while the average expenditure per institution was \$10,499,596. (See Appendix Y).

As Figure 11 and Appendix Z show, tuition and fees--at 36 percent of the total--provides the primary source of income for UNCF institutions. Next in percentage contribution to overall revenues come the federal government (21 percent), private gifts (19 percent), and auxiliary enterprises (16 percent). Altogether those four categories provide 92 percent of all revenues at UNCF institutions.

Figure 11. Revenues, 1987-88 Source by Category






Figure 12 and Appendix AA show that instructional costs (23 percent) are the largest single category of expense. Next come institutional support (19 percent), scholarships and fellowships (15 percent) and auxiliary enterprises (12 percent).

By Category of Expense




Table 3 shows that expenditures for instruction and institutional support at the UNCF member institutions have remained fairly constant over the past four years, while costs for scholarships and fellowships have increased from nine percent in 1984-85 to 15 percent in 1987-88. Such a shift suggests that the colleges themselves are having to meet more and more of the student aid costs and that student aid continues to be a critical need for the UNCF member institutions.

Endowment

The overall size of endowment funds at UNCF institutions increased by over six percent from the previous year; the total value of the combined endowment at the end of 1987-88 stood at \$313 million. The average endowment per student was \$6,810.

Figure 13. Total Endowment UNCF Member Institutions




Figure 13 shows that since 1981-82, the overall endowment at UNCF member institutions has risen dramatically--from \$146 million to the present \$313 million. This \$167 million gain in the worth of the overall value of the endowment--an increase of 114 percent-has been accomplished in the relatively short time period of six years.
