INTRODUCTION

This first edition of A Bibliography of Seigcted Resources on Cultural Diversity for Parents and Professionals Working with Young Children Who Have, or Are at Risk for, Disabilities has been compiled to facilitate networking and collaboration among parents and professionals at the state and local levels in working with culturally diverse populations. We hope you, the reader, will utilize this information to increase your knowledge, awareness, sensitivity, and skills in working with culturally diverse people.

The resources listed in this bibliography cover a range from "classics" to current entries, and include printed and audiovisual materials and selected organizations. We plan to add more information in later editions about nonprint/audiovisual materials as these become available. Selections for this first edition were solicited from a variety of sources, including the NEC*TAS Expert Team on Cultural Diversity, parent centers, Regional Resource Centers, and all NEC*TAS collaborators.

The bibliography is divided into two general categories of information: 1) General Information on Cultural Diversity, and 2) Resource Information on Selected Cultural/Ethnic Populations (Asian/Pacific Islander, Black, Hispanic, and Native American/Alaska Native). Resources for each of these categories are listed alphabetically under two subheadings: Printed Materials and Selected Organizations/Resources. While we strove for uniformity in organizing these entries, some variations were unavoidable due to the variety of information we received.
