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ABSTRACT

This publication presents the current approval status of the 45 colleges and universities in North Carolina that offer programs leading to initial and advanced-level teacher certification. It also includes information on the current status of the two teacher education consortia which offer teacher education programs in North Carolina. Included in the appendices are: (1) National Teacher Examinations regulations; 2) North Carolina reciprocity plans; (3) a lateral entry certification request; (4) certification classifications; and (5) the protocol agreement between the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education and the State of North Carolina. 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

INTRODUCTION

This publication presents the current approval status of the forty-five colleges and universities in North Carolina that offer programs leading to initial and advanced-level teacher certification. It also includes information on the current status of the two teacher education consortia which offer teacher education programs in North Carolina.

Programs leading to the certification of professional school personnel exist at the 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th year levels. Certification at the 4th year level requires a four-year planned program of study that culminates with the Bachelor's degree. The 5th year level requires the completion of an approved program, culminating with a Master's degree. The 6th year level equates to a 60 semester-hour planned graduate program for which the Master's degree is prerequisite and culminates with the Certificate of Advanced Studies. At the 7th year level, the Doctoral degree is required along with the completion of an approved program.

NCATE/STATE RECOGNITION

On May 7, 1988, the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction was awarded State recognition by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. For institutions of higher education in North Carolina, State recognition means that the State and NCATE will conduct concurrent and cooperative reviews of teacher education training programs. The NCATE team will review the eduction unit using NCATE standards and procedures; the state team will review specialty areas using State standards, competencies, guidelines and procedures. North Carolina and NCATE have developed a protocol agreement which will guide the joint visits. A copy of the protocol is contained in Appendix G.

MULTIPLE PROGRAM APPROVAL

In accordance with recommendations of the Task Force on Teacher Preparation, the State Board of Education has adopted multiple criteria for the approval of all teacher education programs. These criteria and the effective implementation dates(s) for each include:

- Unit accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) by 1990, with an option to request an extension, not to exceed 1992;
- State approval of all specialty areas currently in place;
- Maintenance of a seventy percent (70%) pass rate on Core Battery III and specialty area tests of the National Teacher Examination beginning 1988-89; and
- Acceptable performance by graduates during the two-year initial certification period beginning 1988-89.



PROGRAM APPROVAL PROCESS

There are three steps in the State program approval process. The first step calls for an on-site review of all specialty area programs at an institution by a State visitation team. The team is composed of professional educators representing various facets of the profession who have been trained in the State review process. Its task is to review the institution's self study, collect evidence to verify the self study, and determine the extent to which institutional programs comply with the State standards. A written report is prepared by the visitation team. It documents findings related to the standards in terms of MET or NOT MET. This report is transmitted by the Division of Teacher Education Services to the State Evaluation Committee on Teacher Education.

The second step in the approval process is a review of the report of the visitation team by the State Evaluation Committee. This State Committee studies the findings of the visitation team, reviews other pertinent information that may be presented by the institution, discusses and clarifies issues, and recommends approval action to the State Board of Education.

The final step in the approval process requires action by the State Board of Education with official notification to the institution regarding its approval status. The three-step process is designed to assure quality teacher education programs in North Carolina through systematic and sound program evaluation.

FULL APPROVAL

Institutions that are judged by the State Board of Education to be in compliance with the standards and criteria are granted FULL APPROVAL for a period of five years and thus may recommend graduates for certification. However, the State Board or the institution may call for an interim on-site review at any time during the five-year period if conditions warrant such action. Full approval is contigent upon compliance with both State and NCATE standards.

PROVISIONAL APPROVAL

If the State Board finds a deficiency in relation to one or more of the State/NCATE standards or criteria, it may place either the institution-at-large or a specific teacher education program on PROVISIONAL APPROVAL. This action means that in the judgment of the State Board, institutional or program deficiencies can be corrected within a given period of time ranging from one to three years. When PROVISIONAL APPROVAL is granted, an institution must satisfy the conditions specified in order to convert the PROVISIONAL APPROVAL to FULL APPROVAL. If no attempt is made to correct the identified deficiencies by the end of the first year, PROVISIONAL APPROVAL expires.



In the case of PROVISIONAL APPROVAL an institution must submit (1) an annual report of action(s) taken to correct deficiencies and (2) be monitored by a representative of the Division of Teacher Education Services. Prior to expiration of the provisional term, the institution must be visited by an on-site review team. Team findings are again transmitted to the State Evaluation Committee and on to the State Board of Education for action. Institutions placed on PROVISIONAL APPROVAL can recommend graduates for certification.

DENIAL OF APPROVAL

The State Board of Education may issue DENIAL OF APPROVAL when an institution or program fails to comply with major requirements called for in the State/NCATE standards or criteria. This action means that conditions are judged to seriously impede the capacity of students to acquire essential competencies and meet certification requirements. Students formally admitted to a teacher education program prior to notification of DENIAL OF APPROVAL by the State Board of Education will be certified upon passing the National Teacher Examination and recommendation by the institution. However, no students admitted to the teacher education program after notification of DENIAL OF APPROVAL will be eligible for certification. An institution may resubmit a program or programs for reevaluation after all deficiencies have been removed.

RELATED POLICIES

A number of program approval policies, procedures and terms are directly related to the certification process. Many of these terms and procedures such as "add-on certification", "endorsement", "lateral entry", etc. are defined in the glossary of the Certification Manual on pages 199-201.

In addition to the glossary, two other program approval policies of special significance are:

1. Approval of a program(s) expires when there is zero enrollment for a period of five years.



2. To establish a new program or to reactivate an inactive program, institutions must request TEMPORARY AUTHORIZATION from the Division of Teacher Education Services. The request : ust be accompanied by the following: (a) documentation of approval to establish the program from the appropriate governing body, (b) description of the proposed curriculum design and course of study in accordance with State Standards, and (c) verification of program alignment with the State Standards by a content specialist identified by the Division of Teacher Education Services. Once TEMPORARY AUTHORIZATION is granted, students enrolled in the new program are protected and, upon successful completion, regardless of subsequent approval action, may be recommended for certification by the institution. Full approval of a new program does not occur until such time as students have been enrolled and have progressed through one-half of the professional course of study.

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

APPENDIX C CERTIFICATION SECTION STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION RALEIGH, N.C. 27603-1712 NATIONAL TEACHER EXAMINATION REGULATIONS

Pursuant to G.S. 115C-284(c), 115C-296, and 115C-315(d), the State Board of Education has designated the National Teachers Examination (NTE) as the standard examinations required as prerequisite to certification (North Carolina Administrative Procedures Code 2H.1707).

NTE requirements are in addition to all other requirements for any certificate. The following are minimum score requirements for certification in North Carolina effective 7/1/89.

Professional Knowledge (PK) Exemination Score. All applicants for initial certification in North Carolina will be required to present a minimum score of 644 on the Professional Knowledge Examination.

Specialty Area Scores. A minimum of one satisfactory specialty area score, as shown in the table below, is required of all applicants for initial certification in North Carolina. If you qualify for make than one area of certification, only one specialty area exam (if one is offered) is required. Effective July 1, 1989, the State Board of Education adopted an NTE regulation requiring a satisfactory specialty area score for each new area of certification added to existing certification(s). This requirement does not apply if a specialty area examination is not available for the area(s) to be added.

APPENDIX D NORTH CAROLINA RECIPROCITY PLANS STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION CERTIFICATION SECTION RALEIGH, N.C. 27603-1712

Programs of teacher education in out-of-state institutions are recognized to the extent that they are equivalent to North Carolina's standards and guidelines. The reciprocal arrangement means that an area of certification can be established based on the area qualified for on the out-of-state certificate or on Form IHE-02. Other requirements for certification not included with reciprocity must also be met in order to qualify, i.e. NTE regulations, current credit requirements, Initial Certification program requirements. North Carolina recognizes four teacher education and certification reciprocity approaches as outlined.

I. RECIPROCITY BASED ON ACCREDITATION BY THE NATIONAL COUNCIL FOR ACCREDITATION OF TEACHER EDUCATION (NCATE)

A graduate of an institution outside of North Carolina accredited by NCATE at the time of graduation is eligible for a North Carolina certificate.

II. RECIPROCITY BASED ON INTERSTATE AGREEMENTS

A plan has been developed whereby states with similar standards for teachers have contracted to issue certificates on a reciprocity basis. North Carolina now has a reciprocal contract with 28 state; as follows.

IV. RECIPROCITY BASED ON PROGRAMS NOT ACCREDITED BY NCATE OR APPROVED THROUGH THE INTERSTATE AGREEMENT OR THE NASDTEC PLAN

Records of applicants prepared by out-of-state institutions that are accredited by their state hoard of education or a regional accrediting agency, but not by NCATE or recognized through any other reciprocity procedure, will be issued a Provisional Class A Certificate provided the following conditions have been met.

- A. The applicant shall be a graduate of an accredited senior college.
- B. Reciprocal relations shall be concerned only with certification of classroom teachers at the bachelor's degree level.
- C. The reciprocity certificate shall be restricted to the areas and levels in which the arclicant holds, or is qualified to hold, an out-of-state certificate.
- D. The reciprocity certificate (Provisional) shall be valid for one year. After the completion of a year of successful teaching experience in North Carolina, the provisional limitation will be removed.
- E. The reciprocity certificate shall be subject to the renewal requirements of North Carolina.
- F. The applicant must hold, or be qualified to hold, the highest grade current certificate in the state in which the teacher education program at the bachelor's level was completed.

NORTH CAROLINA CERTIFICATION PROCEDURES

- 1. Secure and complete an application for North Carolina certification.
- 2. Have preparing institution(s) complete recommendation form(s).
- 3. File copy of out-of-state certificate if issued. If out-of-state certificate has not been issued, the application will be processed using transcripts and recommendations only.
- 4. Secure complete documentation of all college transcripts and verification of all teaching experience outside of the North Carolina public schools.
- 5. File the completed application and documentation as a package with the Division of Certification, State Department of Public Instruction, 116 W. Edenton Street, Raleigh, North Carolina 27603-1712.

Terms and Conditions of Lateral Entry Certification

- 1. The Lateral Entry Certificate legally entitles me to be employed and to serve in the North Carolina Public Schools as a teacher.
- 2. The issuance of the Lateral Entry Certificate imposes on me the necessity to meet the testing and progressive credit requirements within the time limits specified without regard to my continued employment in a North Carolina school system if such certification is to remain valid.
- 3. The National Teacher Examination (NTE) Specialty Area Exam must be successfully completed on the next available test date. The Professional Knowledge Exam (PK) must be successfully completed prior to a certification recommendation by the Institution of Higher Education (IHE) after completion of the professional education and/or other certification requirements.
- 4. Lateral Entry Certification requires me to complete professional education and/or other requirements for clear certification through an approved teacher education program at a participating IHE. This work must be completed at a minimum rate of six semester hours per year with all requirements completed within five years. The IHE will file a recommendation for certification upon completion of the teacher education program.
- 5. Certification through the Lateral Entry program is subject to all regulations which apply to other beginning teachers in North Carolina. The Lateral Entry Certificate is issued for one year, renewable upon completion of credit requirements as specified in #4 above. Two years of successful experience and successful completion of the Initial Certification Program (ICP) are required of all Lateral Entry certified teachers to convert to a Continuing Certificate. Participation in the ICP must continue during the total time period while employed with Lateral Entry Certification.

- (f) Classification of Teachers Who Have Not Completed a Teacher Education Program Criteria for Lateral Entry into the Teaching Profession:
 - (1) Application for Lateral Entry Certification is limited to thos individuals who have been selected for employment by a North Carolin school system. The application for certification must be a join application by the individual and the employing school system with complete documentation of all supporting credits, experience, testing schools and other pertinent information.
 - (2) Lateral Entry Certification on a provisional basis is authorized is major areas of academic study for which the State has established Certification. Only degrees and credits from regionally accredite, institutions will be acceptable. The class of such Certification will be the same as that issued to regular teacher education program program graduates based on the degree(s) held and the appropriate major area of study completed. Lateral Entry Certificates will be subject to the Initial Certification procedures and to the provisional certification requirements.
 - (3) Evaluations for clear certification for Lateral Entry teachers should be completed by a North Carolina institution with an "approved" teacher education program in the Certification area. Such evaluations should reflect appropriate knowledge and skill from previous training and experience as it relates to the competencies specified for the various areas of certification. Successful teaching experience in the program for initially certified personnel will be accepted for the student teaching requirement. Other appropriate professional training activities in this program must be reflected in the evaluation for full Certification. The Division of Certification will resolve any difference which can not be resolved by the other parties involved.
 - Lateral Entry Certificates are subject to the standard requirements of GS 115 - 296 (a) and the policies adopted by the State Board of Education. The National Teacher Examinations (NTE) are required with the option open to an individual to substitute the Graduate Record Examination (GRE). Minimum scores have been established. The NTE teaching area specialty examination must be taken at the next available administration of the (NTE) if the certification is to remain valid. The Professional Knowledge examination may be delayed until the completion of the designated professional teacher education program. A temporary permit will be issued upon application which will be valid for employment until the NTE scores are available from the next administration of the teaching area specialty examination. Once the teaching area specialty examination requirement has been met, a temporary - initial certification will be issued for the remainder of the fiscal year. Extension of such Certification for the following fiscal year will require the individual to meet whatever progress is specified toward meeting the requirements for a clear certification.
 - (5) Application for Lateral Entry Certification may be filed for an individual who has satisfied all major degree requirements but who may still have some minor deficiency or technical requirement to be satisfied. Such shortages may not exceed six semester hours and must be satisfied prior to the beginning of the following fiscal year. Such individuals will be eligible for Certification as specified in these Regulations.
 - (6) These policies shall become effective for Certification issued "effective July 1, 1985 and thereafter."



APPENDIX F PROGRAM CODES

IDENTIFICATION OF CERTIFICATION CODES

Certification codes are used on certificates in four columns: Program, Certificate Areas, Class and Experience. The following information is the interpretation of these codes.

COLUMN 1 - PROGRAM CODE: A two-digit program code is established for all certificate areas. The first digit indicates the following limitations.

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- Continuing Certification. All limitations have been removed. Renewal required by expiration date.

 Provisional Certification. Requires completion of regulations specified for codes 4. 5, and 7.

 Provisional Certification. Valid only for the fiscal year following "date effective."

 Provisional Conditioned Certification. Temporary deficiencies must be satisfied with required credit prior to the beginning of the following school year.

 Temporary Permit. Valid for one year only as specified by State Board of Education regulations 7/22/88. Completion of NTE regulation required to continue beyond the certification date.

 Provisional Certification. Requires completion of renewal requirements; 10 semester hours/15 renewal credits. A minimum of 6 semester hours or 9 renewal credits during the current year is required to extend. The remaining credits must be completed during the second school year.

 Initial Certification (Active Employment Area). Valid for initial employment in North Carolina. Will convert to continuing certification upon successful completion of the North Carolina initial Certification. Requires completion of regulations specified for code 7 and initial Certification Program. Initial Provisional Lateral Entry Certification. Valid for one year and renewable under provisional regulations. Will convert to continuing certification upon completion of an approved teacher education program and successful completion of the North Carolina Initial Certification Program.

 Initial Provisional Conditioned Certification. Valid for current school year and renewable under provisional regulations. Will convert to continuing certification program.

APPENDIX G NCATE/STATE PROTOCOL AGREEMENT

PROTOCOL FOR NCATE/STATE VISITS

NORTH CAROLINA

The following protocol will be observed for State Program Approval and NCATE Unit Accreditation for Professional Education Units in the State of North Carolina.

On May 7, 1988, NCATE's State Recognition Board recognized the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction under Option #1 to work jointly with NCATE to conduct state program approval and national unit accreditation. The State's next recognition review will occur in 1993. Thus, the following conditions are in effect as of May 7, 1988.

NCATE	Requirements

DATES OF VISIT:

Semester and year are negotiated with the State to move NCATE-accredited institutions into the same five-year cycle with the scheduled State visits.

Visits are scheduled from Sunday afternoon through Wednesday noon.

TIMELINES:

NCATE's timeline by semester/year is sent to each institution three years prior to the visit.

The specific calendar days for a visit agreed upon by the institution and the State Department of Public Instruction will be accepted by NCATE.

PRECONDITIONS:

Institution responds to Preconditions #1-7 and 9-10. One copy of these preconditions is sent to the NCATE office.

State Requirements

All institutions must seek NCATE accreditation by 1990 with the option to petition the State Board of Education for extension through June 30, 1992. The semester and year already set for the next NCATE visit will also be the institution's next State visit.

Joint visits are scheduled from Sunday afternoon throu Wednesday noon.

State visits are conducted concurrently with NCATE visits. The timeline established and accepted by NCATE is followed by the State.

Specific preferred dates for site visits should be confirmed by the State Department of Public Instruction tion before submission to NCATE.

One copy of Preconditions #1-7 and #9-10 are submitted to the State by each institution for information.



PROGRAM FOLIOS:

NCATE coordinates folio reviews by national specialty organizations for all public institutions.

Non-public institutions may choose to seek an NCATE-coordinated folio review by the national associations. For any program for which this review is requested, five copies of curriculum folios must be submitted to NCATE with the required preconditions package.

The State Board of Education does not require any institution to submit NCATE Program folios; however, the UNC-Board of Governors requires all public institutions to prepare curriculum folios in response to NCATE precondition #8.

PRECONDITIONS REPORT:

A copy of the Preconditions Report is mailed to both the institution and the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction. The Preconditions Report is reviewed and filed by the State Department of Public Instruction.

INSTITUTIONAL REPORT:

The institution responds to Sections I, II, and IV of the required NCATE institutional report as outlined in the "Guide to the Preparation of the Institutional Report". Section III on program descriptions is prepared according to the guidelines of the state.

The institution sends one copy of the full institutional report to the NCATE team chair, one copy to the State Department of Public Instruction and two copies to NCATE. One copy of Sections I, II, and IV is mailed to each NCATE team member 60 days in advance of the visit by the institution.

The standards for Section III (Program Descriptions) of the Institutional Report, are those required by the State for program approval. Institutions must provide written documentation of compliance with each standard in each teaching specialty area.

The institution submits two copies of Section III (Program Descriptions) to the State Department of Public Instruction and one copy to each member on the State team 60 days in advance of the visit.



PREVISIT:

The NCATE team chair meets with the chair of the State team, North Carolina Department of Public Instruction personnel, and the institution's unit head and/or designee to make plans for the visit. This previsit occurs at the institution to be visited within 60 days of the visit.

The State chair and personnel from the State
Department of Public Instruction meet with the
NCATE chair and the institution's unit head and/
or designee to plan the
visit.

STANDARDS:

NCATE standards apply to the professional education unit. State standards apply to the individual teaching specialty areas. Additionally, the State process will include consideration of the "70% pass rule" on the NTE (Professional Knowledge and Specialty Area Tests), certification of methods faculty as well as performance data on graduates in the Initial Certification Program.

TEAM MEMBERS:

A team is selected from NCATE's Board of Examiners (BOE). The NCATE team determines whether unit standards are met.

A State team is selected from a pool of individuals who have been trained by the State to apply its program standards. The State team verifies compliance with State program standards and submits its findings to the State Evaluation Committee which, in turn, reviews and makes approval recommendations to the State Board of Education.

TEAM SIZE:

An institution is assigned a five-member team if it has no programs beyond the master's degree level; a six-member team is selected for an institution with post-master's degree level programs. The size of the State team varies, based on the number and levels of programs offered.

For continuing accreditation visits, the team size is three or four members.

For continuing five-year visits, the State takes a team.

For interim partial visits

TEAM CHAIRS:

BOE team members will be appointed chair and assistant chair of the NCATE team to coordinate the application of unit standards.

A State team member is appointed chair of the State team. An Assistant chair also named.

TEAM VOTING:

NCATE team members vote on whether unit standards are met.

State team members derive consensus regarding compliance with State standards for each teaching specialty area and for ward a report to the State Evaluation Committee.

TEAM OBSERVERS:

NCATE invites the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction and 'he North Carolina Association of Educators to appoint non-voting observers for the on-site visit. All expenses for these observers are covered by their respective agencies.

An observer for the State Department of Public Instruction is appointed as a non-voting member of the NCATE team. Expenses for this observer are covered by the Department.

TEAM EXPENSES:

The institution covers all travel and maintenance expenses for the five or sixperson BOE team from NCATE.

The State covers all travel and maintenance expenses for State team members and the State observer on the NCATE team. Additionally, the State will help to support the costs associated with institutional NCATE accreditation, using an approved formula based or available funds. The State will also bear the cos of its share of the NCATE/State pre-visit.

TEAM TRAINING:

BOE team members participate in a week-long training session conducted by NCATE. State team members participate in a 2-3 day training session conducted by the Division of Teacher Education, State Department of Public Instruction.

ON-SITE VISIT:

A jointly developed template is used to guide the conduct of the visit by the two teams. A template jointly developed with NCATE and the Department of Public Instruction is use to guide the conduct of the NCATE/State visit.

The NCATE assistant chair completes the assistant chair's checklist and returns it to NCATE.

An exit interview is conducted with the unit head by the chair and assistant chair to provide feedback on what standards, if any, were found unmet.

An exit conference is held with representatives o the institution to report t findings on teaching special areas.

TEAM REPORTS:

The BOE report includes the team's responses to 18 unit standards at the basic and advanced levels, as appropriate. The BOE chair mails eight (8) copies to NCATE and a copy to each member of the NCATE team within thirty days following the visit.

NCATE mails two copies of the report to the institution and two copies to the State Department of Public Instruction.

The State report includes the team's responses to the State's program standards. A draft of the report is left onsite at the conclusion of the team's visit. An edited copy of the team report is mailed to the institution and to NCATE approximately six weeks following the State program approval visit.

INSTITUTIONAL REJOINDER:

The institution submits its rejoinder to the BOE report on unit standards 21-30 days after receipt of the BOE report. Six copies are mailed to NCATE and two copies to the Department of Public Instruction.

to the State Evaluation Committee, two copies to the
Division of Teacher Education
and one copy to NCATE within
30 days following the receipt
of the edited team report.

FINAL ACTION REPORT:

Within a month after NCATE's Unit Accreditation Board takes action on the accreditation of the institution, NCATE sends the chief executive officer and head of the professional education unit a letter that indicates the official action. It also lists standards not met and all weaknesses that must be addressed annually by the institution in its report to NCATE.

One copy of the action report are mailed to the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction.

In making its recommendation to the State Board of Education regarding an institution approval status, the State Evaluation Committee reviews data from the four following sources: 1) NCATE's recommenda tion on unit accreditation; 2 the State team's report on teaching specialty areas; 3) maintenance of a 70% pass rate by the institution on Core Battery III (Professional Knowledge) and specialty area tests of the National Teacher Examination; and 4) rarformanc results of graduates in the Initial Certification Program.

The State Superintendent communicates State Board of Education actions by letter to the institution. A copy of the letter is also forwarded to NCATE.
