ABSTRACT

In 1989, a survey was mailed to graduates of Labette Community College (LCC), in Kansas, to gather information on their educational experiences, employment status, and satisfaction with the college's programs and services. Questionnaires were sent to 150 of the 216 1989 graduates. Study findings, based on a 67.6% response rate, included the following: (1) the majority of the respondents were female (71.6%), Caucasian (94.7%), and married (55.2%), with a median age of 35 years; (2) 64.9% entered LCC several years after high school; (3) respondents attended LCC for an average of 2.73 years; (4) 93.8% of the graduates attended LCC to pursue an associate degree, either as a full-time student (62.5%) or a part-time student (31.3%); (5) the three major reasons given for choosing LCC were availability of a particular program or course, convenien+ location, and low cost; (6) 18.8% of the respondents transferred to another college after completing their degree; (7) 81.3% attended LCC to acquire job-readiness skills; (8) respondents were "satisfied" to "very satisfied" with the faculty, the quality of instruction, and the college in general; and (9) 67% of the respondents were employed full time, and 28% reported that they had been prepared "very well" for their occupation. PURPOSE

Labette Community College is proud of its graduates. The graduates have entered directly into professional employment, transferred to four year colleges and universities, or have made career changes with a high rate of success. Their accomplishments and success have been a testimony to the college's mission and commitment to helping individuals actualize their full potential.

The purpose of the Alumni Survey is to provide input and documentation from its graduates to determine if LCC has met the graduates' expectations. The information from this report will help the institution assess itself and provide support material for making recommendations to appropriate college departments and committees interested in implementing change or expressing commendation.

The Alumni Survey is only one of many assessment tools used to evaluate the institution. The information is valuable in providing a broad base of data for making decisions that will help to assure a quality and caring institution.

PROCEDURE

In the fall of 1989 the Alumni Survey was mailed to a sample of 1989 graduates of Labette Community College. The original sample comprised of 150 graduates who after graduation had mailing addresses out of a population of 216 graduates. Six (6) surveys were returned with no forwarding address and 96 surveys were returned with valid information. The response rate was 67.6%. Table I shows the composition of the population from which the sample was taken.

GENERAL INFORMATION

There were 68 female respondents (71.6%) and 27 male respondents (28.4%) from the sample of 95 graduates. The majority of the respondents was Caucasian (94.7%) with the minority comprising of Hispanics (2.1%), Blacks (2.1%), and an Asian (1.1%). The largest age group represented was female and between the ages of 30 and 34 years (16.8% of the grand total). The largest male age group was between the age of 35 and 39 years (7.4% of the grand total). The average age of the respondents was 33.4 years old with a standard deviation of 9.6. The median age was 35 years old with a range between 19 and 72 years old. Thirty-three to thirty-four year old graduates had the largest single age representation (14.8%). Tables II and III present the crosstabulation results among age, gender and race.

While at Labette Community College, 55.2% of the graduates were married and 19.8% were single. The largest single age group was between 19 and 24 years of age (13.5% of the grand total). The largest married age group was between 30 and 34 years of age (15.6% of the grand total). The largest divorced age group was between 35 and 39 years of age (6.3% of the total for each age group). Table IV shows a crosstabulation between the age groupings and marital status.

Table V shows a crosstabulation between gender and marital status. Most of the respondents were married females (N=40 42.1%) with widowed females comprising the smallest group (N=1, 1.1%).

EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE

The majority of the students (64.9%) entered Labette

Community College several years after high school. Sixteen of
the respondents (17.0%) entered LCC directly after completing
high school. Some respondents stated that they entered LCC for
"self-improvement in education" (8.5%).

The respondents attended Labette Community College for an average of 2.73 years (S.D. = 1.07). The median was two years, which was the amount of time 46.8% of respondents had attended LCC. Eleven (11.7%) of the respondents had attended LCC for more than four years before getting a degree. Sixty-three (65.6%) of the respondents attended college full-time (12 or more credit hours per semester). While 34.4% of the graduates attended LCC part-time (11 or less credit hours per semester).

Fifty-seven (59.4%) of the respondents obtained most of their education on the main campus in Parsons taking day classes.

Twelve of the graduates (12.5%) obtained their degrees by attending the main campus evening classes (Table VII).

The majority of graduates attended LCC to pursue an associate degree as a full time student (62.5%) or as part time student (31.3%) (Table VIII). This is consistent with the major reasons given for attending LCC in Table IX. The three major reasons for attending LCC given by the respondents were availability of a particular program or courses, convenient location, and low cost.

Eighteen of the respondents (18.8%) transferred to another college after completing their degree at LCC. Most of the respondents (76.2%) did not experience any difficulty in transferring to another college. Those who did experience any difficulty mentioned articulation of certain courses because of poor advisement or the university's transfer policy. Transfer students were not aware of the university's ability to the accept or reject courses taken at a community college. A large percentage of the students (50.0%) transferred to Pittsburg State University, Kansas State Kansas (11.1%) and Missouri Southern State College (11.1%).

While at Labette Community College 29.5% of the respondents majored in Nursing, 12.5% majored in business administration and 9.1% majored in business industrial supervision. The academic majors had the smallest number of graduates with fine arts and English each having 1.1% of the sample (Table X).

INSTITUTIONAL ASSESSMENT

The respondents were asked to rate twenty areas within the college using a literal Likert Scale from A to F. In order to perform numerical analysis of the ratings an "A" was given a value of 5 and "F" a value of 0. If the respondent was very satisfied with the service or area address then the person circled an "A" and that item received a numerical value of 5. If the respondent was very dissatisfied with the area under

consideration, then the person circled the letter "E" and that item received a numerical value of 1. The letter "F" was circled if the item did not apply. Table XI shows that descriptive statistics for each item and Table XII shows the percent distribution for each response.

The respondents were satisfied to very satisfied with the faculty, the quality of instruction and the college in general. The highest rating was given to the attitude of faculty toward students (4.19), enrollment procedures (4.03), followed by availability of instructors (4.00) and variety of courses at LCC (3.93). The respondents were dissatisfied with student housing (1.03). The remainder of the items were rated between neutral to satisfied. The overall average rating for services and areas of concern was 3.36, a satisfactory rating.

EMPLOYMENT

A major reasons for pursuing an associate degree at Labette Community College was to acquire a job ready professional skill (81.3%). The second major reason given for attending LCC was to complete a sequence of courses or a program so as to transfer to a four year college (18.8%).

The majority of the respondents were employed full time (67.0%). This was consistent with the general reason given for attending LCC. The remainder of the graduates were employed part time (11.7%), self-employed (5.3%) or at home (1.1%).

When asked how well did LCC prepare you for your chosen occupation, 28.0% of the respondents replied "very well" and 48.4% replied "adequately". Only 11.8% of the respondents thought that the college had not done an adequately job.

Appendix B lists a variety of reasons for either adequate preparation or inadequate preparation for a particular job or educational career goal.

Table XIII shows the salaries graduates are receiving at the present time. The respondents (12.1%) that were making less than \$5,000 per year were employed part time or were enrolled full time at a four year college. The median salary for the respondents was \$18,500. The median salary for the 1987-88 graduates was \$12,300, a reported 50.4% salary increase within a three year period.

PECOMMENDING LCC

The respondents were very positive about Labette Community College and what it had done for them. An overwhelming majority (85.9%) would take another class at LCC and 92.6% would recommend LCC to their friends and family. Eighty-eight percent of the respondents would take another class from LCC and would recommend LCC to a friend and relative. Only 7.6% said they would not recommend LCC nor take another class. Forty-four percent of the respondents would take another class to update present skills, while 30.1% would enroll for professional development. Recreation and career change accounted for 7.2% of the respondents' reason for taking another class at LCC.


