ABSTRACT

Interest in the rural context of education is growing, and connections between education and the wider rural community are increasingly acknowledged to be important. Hundreds of organizations were contacted to update this directory, which provides recent information on programs, organizations, and resources useful to practitioners, policymakers, and researchers in rural education. Each entry includes address, phone number, and contact person; some contain a short description. Sections contain entries for 13 national associations and networks; 9 regional educational laboratories; 8 national information centers and clearinghouses; 38 statewide and regional associations, programs, and center; 26 federal government agencies and hotlines; 15 rural journals; and state contacts for the National Diffusion Network (NDN), state education agencies with defined rural programs, state data centers, and offices of the Cooperative Extension System. NDN facilitators can be especially helpful in rural areas, as they can help select proven programs to match local needs. A final section lists 63 organizations that may have an interest in rural education but that were unable to reply with current information. An index lists entries by state. (SY)

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

INTRODUCTION

The entries in this <u>Directory</u> update the rural education resource directory published jointly by the National Rural Education Association (NREA) and the ERIC Clearinghouse on Rural Education and Small Schools (ERIC/CRESS) in March 1986. This edition—a greatly expanded version of the earlier publication—is again co-published by both organizations, with help from many programs and organizations around the nation.

The substantial increase in the size of this <u>Directory</u> attests to two things. First, interest in the rural context of education is growing. Second, connections between education and the wider rural community are increasingly acknowledged to be important. Hence, a variety of programs and resources that should prove useful to praotitioners, policymakers, and researchers in rural education have been included in this edition.

Such resources include contacts in the federal government, state data centers, cooperative extension programs, and state NDN Facilitators. NDN facilitators can be especially helpful in rural areas: they have a kit of successful programs that rural school districts could replicate, and they can help staff select programs that match local needs. The Regional Educational Laboratories can also provide services to policymakers, educators, and citizens in the states served by particular laboratories.

So take a careful look at the programs and organizations presented here. It's important for those of us in rural areas to develop "networks," expand our horizons, and learn what makes sense to beg, borrow, or steal. How else can we make the creative leaps that nurture the development of our students and our own sense of place as rural educators? To help users locate resources more efficiently, this <u>Directory</u> contains a state-by-state index of organizations and programs.

We have made every effort to list all organizations and programs that rural educators and community members might find useful to know about. ERIC/CRESS staff contacted hundreds of organizations to update the <u>Directory</u>. Many respondents were able to provide descriptive abstracts of their programs, products, and services. Others from whom we heard were not, but all the information presented here has been obtained from the original sources within the last several months.



The exception to this rule is the final section. This section lists contacted organizations that were unable to supply updated information. It provides three kinds of services: (1) NCREL works with rural schools and districts, service agencies, and institutions of higher education to develop and identify successful rural education practices and policies. This work emphasizes school improvement and restructuring, curriculum and instruction, staff development, and technology and telecommunications. (2) NCREL keeps track of changes in rural schools and communities throughout the North Central Region and of changes in local, state, and federal policy that affect those schools and communities. Activities include computer database searches and monitoring state and federal legislative activity. (3) NCREL operates a dissemination network to collect information on rural education success stories and the state of rural education. The Rural Education unit of Research for Better Schools (RBS), the mid-Atlantic regional educational laboratory, features five major lines of activity, as follows: (1) Having established innovative organizational structures in Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, and New Jersey called "Rural Assistance Councils" (RACs), RBS works with the RACs to complete the development of rural school improvement plans for each state. (2) Direct assistance is provided to rural schools in two ways: (a) through rural demonstration sites to help institutionalize Computer Managed Instruction (CMI) Centers and provide financial support for them; (b) through a rural school improvement process featuring the use of promising practices, implemented in cooperation with the Maryland Rural Assistance Council. (3) A rura! database is maintained. Data analyses are conducted, and descriptive and analytical information is generated and disseminated to rural schools. (4) Regional dissemination activities are conducted. These activities include the organization of a Governor's Conference showcasing promising practices, distribution of a rural information packet, and development of a source book of recognized rural educational programs. (5) RBS is also conducting an evaluation of the effectiveness of the project and participating in the overall impact of the entire rural education initiative. All activities focus on a central theme of improving rural schools through the effective use of promising practices and programs.

THE NATIONAL DIFFUSION NETWORK

The National Diffusion Network (NDN) is a federally funded dissemination system that helps public and private schools, colleges, and other educational institutions improve by sharing successful education programs, products, and processes. To support and encourage this dissemination system, the U. S. Department of Education awards dissemination grants to four types of projects: (1) Developer Demonstrator Projects, (2) Dissemination Process Projects, (3) State Facilitators, and (4) Private School Facilitators. Projects disseminated by the NDN are developed locally, and tried and field tested with students and teachers. Every project has demonstrated its effectiveness to the Department of Education's Program Effectiveness Panel. This means that the projects were effective at their development sites and, also, that they can be used successfully at other sites. After starting within the local education institution, these enterprises are scheduled to "graduate" with the students who founded them, after which time they will operate as regular commercial businesses. Students learn about entrepreneurship and develop businesses, while the school serves as an incubator. The program is currently functioning in Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina, with an interest in expanding nationally.
