ABSTRACT

The library at the University of Pittsburgh at Bradford has created a collection of curriculum materials and children's literature for use by education students. These materials are shelved with the education-related books in the L category of the Library of Congress classification scheme. Materials are arranged by subject area and subdivided by publisher so that series fall together. An LZ schedule has been developed with the following subdivisions: language arts, foreign languages, mathematics, fine arts, science, social studies, and non-textbooks. The call number identifies book classification, grade level, publisher, date of publication, and type of material (workbook, teacher's edition, etc.). The complete LZ schedule, the Cutter table for publishers, the grade level table, and a list of call number qualifiers for textbook call numbers are attached. (MSE)

An "LZ" Schedule for Curriculum Libraries Dennis J. Frank and Marietta A. Frank

Eanley Library recently created a curriculum materials collection for the use of The University of Pittsburgh at Bradford's education students.

These students actually take most of their education courses at St. Bonaventure University, some 20 miles away, through a cooperative arrangement. They have access to the St. Bonaventure library but expressed a desire for materials to use a little closer at hand. So we accommodated them.

The bulk of the present collection consists of textbooks and materials donated by the local Intermediate Unit, a cooperative agency of the area school districts. We continue to add textbooks donated by local schools and have added a small children's literature collection.

We had the good fortune to be planning a move into a new building at the same time we were contemplating the arrangement of the curriculum materials. Thus we knew we could put them anywhere we wanted, without having to move half of the other materials in the building to accommodate them. We decided to put them with the education-related books in the "L's" of the Library of Congress classification scheme. This permits our education students to satisfy their needs in one area of the library.

The next step was to decide how to arrange and circulate the materials. We determined that the most useful arrangement for our students was by subject area, subdivided by publisher, so that series fall together. We also wanted them easily identifiable for reshelving and circulation putposes. To this end, we created our "LZ" schedule. This schedule preserves the arrangement we wanted and maintains the same look and "feel" of the rest of our L.C. classified library.

We subdivided the LZ's by '000's, leaving ourselves lots of room for maneuver and future manipulation. The major subdivisions ended up locking "PERMISSION TO RE LIKE this:

The unified subject schedules follow similar patterns of subdivision, with enough variation to accommodate the differing curricular structures of the different disciplines. For instance, most of the schedules are divided into elementary and secondary level textbooks, then subdivided by the specific topics appropriate to each level. See Table 1 for the complete schedule.

The structure of the call number identifies the book classification, the grade level, the publisher, the date of publication, and the type of material, i.e. workbook, teacher's edition, etc.

We created a reserve cutter table for publishers (Table 2), to which we attach a two-character notation for the grade level. Table 3 is our list of qualifiers for textbook type. Note that we simply append a "T" to indicate teachers' editions. Thus, our sample is an elementary level (1st grade) reading workbook (teacher's edition), published in 1983 by Ginn.

In the year and a half we have been using this system, our cataloging assistant has found it very simple to use and comprehensive in its coverage of our collection. Our patrons have found it suits their needs very well. It allows them to browse effectively when they are examining publishers'

series or comparing materials of similar type produced by a number of publishers. Our circulation assistants are able to get materials back to the correct spot on the shelf with no more difficulty than they have anywhere else in the collection. Overall, we have found this to be a very useful approach to the development of a user- and library-friendly curriculum collection.
