#### ABSTRACT

This statistical factbook provides information on student demographics, employees, budget, organization, graduates, programs, enrollments, grants, and the foundation on Catorsville Community College (CCC) in Maryland. An additional section provides parallel information on Carroll Community College (Maryland) where available. The first section focuses on college data, including an operating calendar, an employee profile, and information on the physical plant, library holdings, and budgetary concerns. The second section provides data on the characteristics of fall and winter credit students, graduates, financial aid recipients and awards, and credit-free students. The third section offers data on selected discipline/departmental enrollment by number of sections, headcount enrollment, full-time equivalency, and non-credit enrollment patterns. The fourth section presents information on resource development and external connections, lists the CCC foundation's board of directors, foundation assets, and numbers of scholarships and grants awarded. This section also contains information on external environmental factors, such as estimates of the Baltimore County (Maryland) population by race, occupation, income, age, and sex. The final section describes Carroll Community College, following the same general outline as the CCC information. (JMC)






Catonsville Community College


## Age of Full-time Employees by Occupational Category








# Age of Full-time Employees by Occupational Category








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# Average Salary by Gender Catonsville Community College



Percentage of Revenue







## Budget Expenditure by Category - FY 91 Catonsville Community College







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


## Budget Expenditures by Function - 91 Catonsville Community College






### Budget History — Cost Per FTE Catenaville Community College

#### CATONSVILLE COMMUNITY COLLEGE CREDIT STUDENT PROFILE FALL 1990

Enrollment is 10,476 -- a 2.3% increase from last fall's 10,236 students. FTE is 2454, which is an 5.2% increase over the fall of 1989.

#### STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS

Women students comprise 53% of the student body. Minority students increased in percentage to 24.4% from 23 1% of the student body last year with the percent of black students increasing to 17.3%.

Baltimore County residents comprise 68.6% of the students while the percent of students from Carroll and Anne Arundel declined and from Howard increased.

The average age remained the same at 29.9. About one-third (34.9%) of the students are over 30 -- 37.8% of the women and 31.5% of the men. The number of seniors increased from 528 last year to 601 this fall and comprises 6.0% of the students.

More than half (57.8%) of our new students (new to college) who responded indicate their educational goal is an A.A. degree, 14.4% are pursuing a certificate, and 27.3% plan to take courses without working toward a degree or certificate.

Almost half of the new students indicated their reason for attending CCC was to prepare for transfer (43.6%), and 16.6% were preparing for immediate entry into a career.

#### ENROLLMENT CHARACTERISTICS

Numbers of new and transfer students decreased slightly -- to 32.7% of the student body.

Average credit hours rose slightly to 7.1 per student. Full-time students average 13.3 and part-time students average 4.9.

The number of full-time enrollments rose from 2492 to 2721 - a 9.2% increase.

Students taking only day classes outnumber students taking only night classes -- 41% to 40%; 19% of our students take classes both day and evening. The number of day student enrollments increased while evening student enrollments decreased slightly.

#### PROGRAM CHARACTERISTICS

Enrollment in career programs is 42% of the student body; students majoring in General Studies comprise 44% of the total population; and 15% are enrolled in the other five state authorized transfer programs (Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Business Administration, Teacher Education, Computer Science).








Overall Average Credit Hours Carried - Fall Catonsville Community College










## Enrollment Status - Fall Catonsville Community College




## Mean Age of Students - Fall Catonsville Community College





#### CCC Share of 1990 High School Graduates from Major Feeder Schools

In the spring of 1990, 2017 seniors graduated from the eight schools which are the College's major feeder schools. Of those 2017 students, 363 attended CCC as new students in the fall of 1990, down from 406 in Fall, 1989. This represents 18.0% of these schools' graduates.

Since 1980, the College's share of the graduates has varied from a high of 18.3% to Fall 85's low of 12.4%. Interestingly, these share rates vary widely from year to year. This year showed a big increase in yield from Catonsville, Pikesville, Randallstown, and Woodlawn.

# Degrees Awarded Catonsville Community College








Cumulative QPA Earned at Community College








### Where CCC Graduates Transferred






#### Credits Lost in Transfer



### Satisfaction With Transfer Preparation





### Total Dollars of Financial Aid - FY90 Catonsville Community College








# Ten Year Enrollment Estimates Baltimore County Public Schools Grades 9-12







### CREDIT STUDENT PROFILE FALL 1990

Enrollment is 2369, an increase of 335 students (16.5%) from last fall's 2034 students. FTE's are 526, up 101 (23.8%) from last fall.

### STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS

The proportion of women students remained 63% this fall. The average age of students fell to 28.7. There are 41 senior citizens attending the college.

About 92% of the students live in Carroll County; 6.3% live in Baltimore County; and almost 2% come from other counties or out of state. Most (68%) of the new students attended either Westminster, South Carroll, North Carroll, Liberty, or Francis Scott Key High schools; 56% of all students attended one of these schools.

### ENROLLMENT CHARACTERISTICS

Full-time enrollment (12 or more credits) increased by 169 students to 24% of the student body.

New and transfer students comprise 31% of the student body.

The proportion of evening students decreased from 43% to 41%, continuing the trend of previous years, while the proportion of day. students increased to 37%; and the proportion of students taking both day and evening classes decreased to 22%.

The average credit load increased to 6.7 hours; full-time students take an average of 13.4 credits, and part-time students take 4.6 credits.

### PROGRAM CHARACTERISTICS

The career program enrollments increased slightly from Fall 1989; this fall, 31% of the students are majoring in career programs while 51% are in General Studies, and 19% are in the other five state authorized transfer programs (Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Business Administration, Teacher Education, Computer Science).

Over half (62%) of the new students want to "obtain the AA degree," 12% of them hope to "obtain a certificate," and about one-fourth (27%) plan to "take courses without working toward a degree or certificate."












Overall Average Credit Hours Carried - Fall Carroll Community College




## Continuing Education/Community Services Approved FTE's - Carroll Community College






# Continuing Education / Community Services FIE by Program FY90 Carroll Community College


