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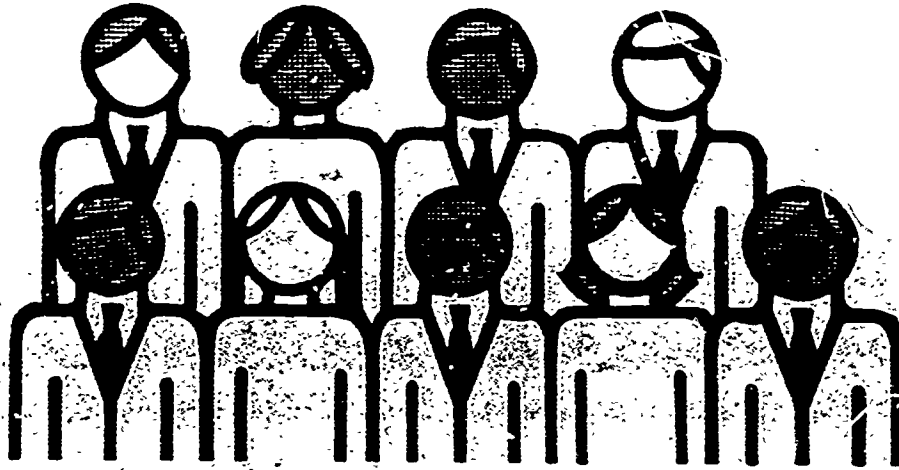
## ABSTRACT

Each year, Piedmont Virginia Community College (PVCC) examines longitudinal data on fall term minority enrollment to identify trends which may be of interest to those involved in planning student recruitment and retention activities. The findings of the 1990 study indicated that: (1) 552 minority students enrolled at PVCC during fall semester 1990, surpassing the fall 1989 record of 484; (2) 12.7% of the of the total student population were minorities, the highest percentage in the college's history; (3) blacks represented and 10.6% of the total student population and 83.2% of the minority student population, representing the largest number of black students to attend PVCC in any single term; (4) from fall 1989 to fall 1990, the number of minority students has increased 20%, the number of black students has increased 21%, and the percentage of the student body which is minority has risen from 11.1% to 12.7%; (5) between fall 1989 and fall 1990, both white student and total student enrollments decreased while minority enrollment increased; (6) a slightly higher percentage of black students resided within the PVCC service region than did white students; (7) the number of new black students increased by 4.2% and the number of returning black students rose 16.6%; (8) the percentage of non-black minority students new to PVCC was 40%; and (9) just over 33% of all PVCC students were enrolled in transfer programs in fall 1990. 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### MINORITY ENROLLMENT AT PVCC FALL SEMESTER 1990

Each year the Office of Institutional Research and Planning at Piedmont Virginia Community College (PVCC) publishes a report on fall term minority enrollment. The purpose of the report is to display longitudinal minority enrollment data and examine trends which might prove of interest to those involved in planning student recruitment and retention activities. This brief highlights the eleventh of these reports, *Minority Enrollment Report: Fall Semester 1990* (PVCC Institutional Research Report No. 1-91, February 1991).

As can be seen in Table 1, 552 minority students enrolled at PVCC during Fall Semester 1990. This is the largest number of minority students ever enrolled at the college during any single term, exceeding the previous record of 484, set in fall 1989, by 44. The percentage of minority students within the student body as a whole was also a record. Twelve and seven-tenth percent of the fall 1990 student body was minority.

Four-hundred fifty-nine, or 83.2%, of all minority students were black. This is the largest number of black students to ever attend PVCC during any single term, exceeding the previous record, set in Fall Semester 1989, by 50. Black students accounted for 10.6% of the entire student body.

In terms of enrollment, several trends are noteworthy. First, the number of black students who had studied at PVCC previously increased at a faster rate than the number of black students new to the college. This suggests that overall retention of black students may have improved. Secondly, both the number and percentage of black full-time students at PVCC rose dramatically between fall 1989 and fall 1990. So, too, did the number and percentage of curricular black students. However, the percentage of minority sophomores declined, and when this is taken in conjunction with the fact that approximately the same percentage of white and black students are new to PVCC each year; it is possible that more minority students than ever are enrolling in degree programs at the college, but not all are successful in completing these programs. However, any conclusions may be premature, as many new minority students at PVCC have not had enough time to complete their courses of study.

Although the percentage of minority students within the PVCC student body has always been lower than the percentage of minority citizens within the PVCC service region, the gap between the two narrowed considerably between Fall Semester 1989 and Fall Semester 1990. The minority population of the service region was slightly lower than in previous years, and the minority student population was much higher. While during previous fall terms the difference between minority service region and minority student populations has been seven percentage points, the difference in fall 1990 was five. A two percentage point gain is a notable achievement and suggests that the work of the college-wide Task Force on Minority Recruitment and Retention and a group of black community leaders, both established in 1989-90, has been remarkably successful.

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# MINORITY ENROLLMENT REPORT FALL SEMESTER 1990

## INTRODUCTION

This is the eleventh in a continuing series of reports concerning minority enrollment at Piedmont Virginia Community College (PVCC). Each report is designed to display longitudinal minority enrollment data and examine trends which should prove of interest to those involved in planning student recruitment and retention activities.

All data in this series of reports were obtained from the Student Enrollment Booklets compiled each term by the Virginia Community College System (VCCS) and printed electronically by computer. These booklets consist of numerous tables of data relating to many different aspects of student enrollment within the VCCS. Each table within the Student Enrollment Booklet from which data were obtained is noted within this report.

## MINORITY ENROLLMENT

Five-hundred fifty-two minority students enrolled at PVCC during Fall Semester 1990. This is the largest number of minority students ever enrolled at the college during any single term, exceeding the previous record of 484, set in fall 1989, by 44. The percentage of minority students within the student body as a whole was also a record. Twelve and seven-tenth percent of the fall 1990 student body was minority.



Four-hundred fifty-nine, or 83.2%, of all minority students were black. This is the largest number of black students to ever attend PVCC during any single term, exceeding the previous record, set in Fall Semester 1989, by 50. Black students accounted for 10.6% of the entire student body.

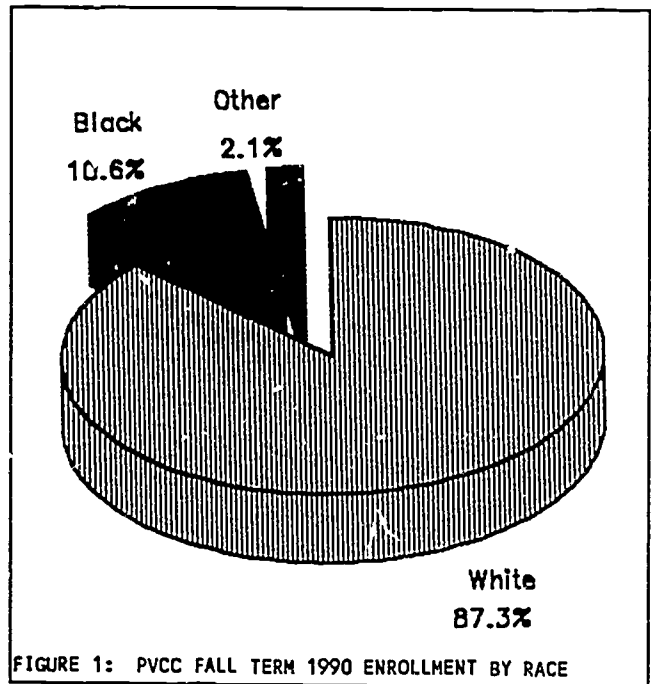


FIGURE 1: PVCC FALL TERM 1990 ENROLLMENT BY RACE

Of the remaining minority students, 52 were Oriental (Asians or Pacific Islanders), 22 were Hispanic, 4 were American Indians or Alaskan natives, and 15 classified themselves as "other."

PVCC fall 1990 enrollment by race (white, black, and minority other than black) is shown in Figure 1. As can be clearly seen in Table 1, an increase in minority enrollment has occurred during the past two fall terms. During this period, the number of minority students has risen from 468 to 552, a 20% increase, and the percentage of minority students within the student body has risen from 11.1% to 12.7%. During this same

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<sup>1</sup>As noted in previous reports, a student's racial classification is determined by what he or she indicates on the initial admission form. There are six boxes which the student may check: (1) White; (2) Black; (3) American Indian or Alaskan Native; (4) Asian or Pacific Islander; (5) Hispanic; and (6) Other. After the "other" box, space is provided for comment. Typically, an "other" student is a foreign student, uncertain which box to check. Occasionally, an "other" student is one with a sense of whimsy. On the admission form, students have written such comments as "human" or "Indiana Irish" to justify their "other" classification.

period, the number of black students has risen from 380 to 459, a 21% increase, and the percentage of black students within the student body has risen from 9.1% to 10.6%.

Minority enrollment patterns typically differ from overall student enrollment patterns. Between fall 1984 and fall 1985, minority student enrollment increased at a faster rate than either white student enrollment or enrollment in general. The opposite was true between fall 1985 and fall 1986 and between fall 1986 and fall 1987. Between fall 1987 and fall 1988 the enrollment patterns were approximately the same, but between fall 1988 and fall 1989 minority student enrollment once again increased at a slightly higher rate than either

white student enrollment or enrollment in general. Between fall 1989 and fall 1990, both white student enrollment and total student enrollment decreased while minority enrollment increased.

## STUDENT DEMOGRAPHIC CHARACTERISTICS BY RACE

In previous minority enrollment studies, demographic characteristics of minority students have been similar to those of white students.<sup>2</sup> The one exception, noted in the last two reports, concerned sex. In fall 1988 and fall 1989, fewer black male students

than white male students attended PVCC. Again, in fall 1990, fewer black male students than white male students were enrolled at PVCC, but the gap between the two had narrowed considerably. As can be seen in Table 2, in fall 1988, only 28.9% of all black students were male; the

figure rose nearly one percentage point to 30.8% in fall 1989; in fall 1990, the figure rose sharply to 34.4%.

Both black male students and black female students have increased in terms of numbers during the past four years. The number of black male students has risen from 131 in fall 1987 to 158 in fall 1990, a 20.6% increase. The number of black female students has risen from 261 in fall 1987 to 301 in fall 1990, a 15.3% increase. The number of minority males and females other than black has remained fairly stable during the past four years.

With respect to age, the mean age of black students was lower by one year than the mean age of white students, but the median age was the same. The mean age of white students was 30, and the mean age of black students was 29. The median age of both white and black students was 28. The mean age of minority students other than black was the same as that of black students (28), while the median age was one year lower (27). The mean age of minority students other than black was 27, and the median age was 25.

While students at PVCC of all races tended to be younger in fall 1990 than in previous fall terms, the distribution by age categories mirrored that of previous years. As can be seen in Table 3, approximately 25% of all students were between the ages of 18 and 21, 30% were between the ages of 25 and 34, and 20% were between the ages of 35 and 44. Few differences existed with respect to race and age distribution, though minority students other than black tended for the most part to be older than either white or black students.

The PVCC fall semester headcount by race and residence is shown in Table 4. A slightly higher percentage of black students resided within the PVCC service region than did white students. The percentage of minority students other than black residing within the service region was lower than that of either white or black students. The

percentage of students residing outside the service region but within the Commonwealth of Virginia was highest for whites and lowest for minorities other than black. However, a much larger percentage of minority students other than black were classified as out-of-state students than were white or black students.

The fall semester headcount by race and residence for all PVCC service region localities is shown in Table 5.

Most minority students residing within PVCC's service region lived within the City of Charlottesville or in Albemarle County. Seventy percent of all black students from the service region, and nearly 90% of minority students other than black, were residents of one of these two jurisdictions. As in previous years, the largest number of blacks resided in the city of Charlottesville, and the second largest number resided in Albemarle County.

As has been noted in previous minority enrollment reports, PVCC has never enrolled as high a percentage of non-whites as reside within the service region as a

whole. As can be seen in Table 6, approximately 18% of the service region population during any recent year is non-white, while typically less than 12% of the PVCC student population is non-white. It is quite clear, however, that the gap between minority service



region and minority student enrollment narrowed considerably between Fall Semester 1989 and Fall Semester 1990. The minority population of the service region was slightly lower than in previous years, and the minority student population was much higher. While during previous fall terms the difference between minority service region and minority student populations has been seven percentage points, the difference in fall 1990 was five. A two percentage point gain is a notable achievement and suggests that the work of the Task Force on Minority Recruitment and Retention and a group of black community leaders, both formed in 1989-90, has been remarkably successful.

### **STUDENT ENROLLMENT CHARACTERISTICS BY RACE**

Differences in white and minority enrollment characteristics often provide indications as to what minority students find attractive about PVCC. Enrollment characteristics examined in this study are attendance (new or returning), status (full-time or part-time), class (freshmen, sophomores, developmental, or unclassified), program (college transfer, occupational/technical, developmental, or unclassified), degree sought (Associate of Arts [A.A.], Associate of Science [A.S.], Associate of Applied Science [A.A.S.], diploma, certificate, developmental, or unclassified), and curriculum (Business Administration, Education, Fine Arts, and so forth).

As can be seen in Table 7, approximately one-third of all white and black students were new to PVCC.<sup>3</sup> While a decrease occurred in the number of both new and return-

ing white students, the number of black new students and the number of black returning students increased. The number of black new students rose by 4.2%, and the number of black returning students rose by 16.6%. The larger increase in returning black students suggests that the college has

maintained its minority recruitment efforts, while improving its minority retention efforts.

The percentage of minority students other than black who are new to PVCC has always been higher than that of either black or white students, and this was true in Fall Semester 1990. Nearly 40% of other minority students were new.

Both the number and percentage of black full-time students at PVCC rose dramatically between fall 1989 and fall 1990. As can be seen in Table 8, the number rose from 66 to 102, a 54.5% gain, and for the first time ever over 20% of all black students studied full-time at the college.

Just as a higher percentage of minority students other than black than either black or white students are typically new to PVCC, so too is a higher percentage classified as full-time. Nearly 27% of all other minority students studied full-time at PVCC in fall 1990, as compared to 22.2% of all black students and 19.9% of all white students.

While overall minority student retention may have improved, curricular minority student retention may not have. On the one hand, the percentage of curricular minority students rose from 55.3% in fall 1989 to 58.7% in fall 1990; on the other hand, the

percentage of minority sophomores dropped from 12.2% to 10.7%. When coupled with the fact that approximately the same percentage of white and black students are new each year, this suggests that more minority students are enrolling in degree programs at the college, but fewer are completing them.

All of this seems borne out by the latest retention study, which found that the retention rate for full-time white students was higher than that for full-time black students, but that the retention rate for full-time black students was much higher than during previous years.<sup>4</sup> Perhaps an area for further investigation is the completion rates of curricular students by racial classification.

PVCC fall term

enrollment by race and program is shown in Table 10. Slightly over one-third of all PVCC students were enrolled in college transfer programs in fall 1990. A lower percentage of black students, and a higher percentage of other minority students, were enrolled in college transfer programs than white students. The figures for fall 1990 were quite similar to those for fall 1989.

Twice the percent-

age of black students were enrolled in occupational/technical programs as were other minority students or white students. Between fall 1989 and fall 1990, the percentage of white students enrolled in occupational/technical programs declined slightly, the percent-

age of black students rose by over five percentage points, and the percentage of other minority students dropped by over five percentage points.

As noted earlier, a higher percentage of minority students were classified as curricular in Fall Semester 1990 than in Fall Semester 1989. Slightly less than one-half of all white students were curricular in fall 1990, an increase of 1.6% from fall 1989; nearly 60% of all black students were curricular, an increase of 5.3%; and nearly 55% of all other minority students were curricular, a *decrease* of 4.7%.

Enrollment patterns by race and degree sought are shown in Table 11. College transfer programs are those leading toward either the A.A. or A.S. degrees; occupational/technical programs are those leading toward the A.A.S. degree, a certificate, or a diploma. PVCC fall term headcount by race and curricular programs is shown in Table 12 and Table 13. These tables are presented to assist academic administrators and faculty in assessing minority enrollments within their divisions and programs. However, considerable caution should be exercised when examining these data. In any particular year, very few minority students may be enrolled in a particular curriculum. Because of such small numbers, the statistical reliability of the data is questionable.

## CONCLUSIONS

As noted in last year's minority enrollment report, PVCC has begun the process of re-examining its recruiting and retention strategies and intensifying efforts to draw and retain minority students. Already, these efforts seem to have accomplished a great deal. Perhaps the most visible accomplishment has been the number of minority students enrolling at the college. Record minority enrollment figures were recorded during both Fall Semester 1989 and Fall Semester 1990.

Five-hundred fifty-two minority students enrolled at PVCC during fall 1990. This is the largest number of minority students ever enrolled at the college during any single term, exceeding the previous record of 508, set last fall, by 44. Four-hundred fifty-nine, or 83.2%, of all minority students were black. This is the largest number of black students to ever attend PVCC during any single term, exceeding the previous record of 509, set last fall, by 50.

In terms of enrollment, several trends are noteworthy. First, the number of black students who had studied at PVCC previously increased at a faster rate than the number of black students new to the college. This suggests that overall retention of black students may have improved. Secondly, both the number and percentage of black full-time students at PVCC rose dramatically between fall 1989 and fall 1990. So, too, did the number and percentage of curricular black students. However, the percentage of minority sophomores declined, and when this is taken in conjunction with the fact that approximately the same percentage of white and black students are new to PVCC each year, it is possible that more minority students than ever are

enrolling in degree programs at the college, but not all are successful in completing these programs. However, any conclusions may be premature, as many new minority students at PVCC have not had enough time to complete their courses of study.

Although the percentage of minority students within the PVCC student body has always been lower than the percentage of minority citizens within the PVCC service region, the gap between the two narrowed considerably between Fall Semester 1989 and Fall Semester 1990. The minority population of the service region was slightly lower than in previous years, and the minority student population was much higher. While during previous fall terms the difference between minority service region and minority student populations has been seven percentage points, the difference in fall 1990 was five. A two percentage point gain is a notable achievement and suggests that the work of the college-wide Task Force on Minority Recruitment and Retention and a group of black community leaders, both established in 1989-90, has been remarkably successful.
