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ABSTRACT

In 1990, the Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) conducted a study to determine ways in which the community college system could increase its participation in the preparation of elementary and secondary teachers. Drawing information from ICCB course files and unit cost data, as well as a survey of the colleges, the study investigated the employment outlook for teachers; the number of community college students planning to major in teacher education; courses available in teacher education at the colleges; the number of credit hours generated in teacher education courses; methods used to promote teacher education; and articulation agreements between community colleges and four-year institutions. Study findings included the following: (1) statewide employment outlook data anticipate teacher shortages in math, science, special education, and bilingual education through the year 2000; (2) during fall 1990, the 38 districts reporting data identified 9,439 students planning to major in teacher education; (3) during fall 1990, a total of 951 teacher education courses were approved in the Illinois community colleges; (4) credit hours produced in teacher education in 1990 decreased relative to the number of credit hours produced across all baccalaureate/transfer programs; (5) frequently mentioned promotional approaches included brochures and newsletters; and (6) 22 colleges reported teacher-education articulation agreements with four-year institutions. Data tables, references, and a list of promotional methods used at selected community colleges are included. (JMC)

TEACHER EDUCATION IN ILLINOIS PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES

BACKGROUND

During the spring 1990 legislative session, the Illinois General Assembly amended the Illinois Public Community College Act to require an examination of the role of community colleges in teacher preparation. The legislature directed the Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) to, "conduct a study of community college teacher education courses to determine how the community college system can increase its participation in the preparation of elementary and secondary teachers." This legislation grew out of public concerns about anticipated teacher shortages. Changing demographics such as the growing number of children from the baby boom echo beginning to enter school fuel these concerns. A tendency for university math and science graduates to pursue more lucrative offers from business and industry leads some to anticipate teacher shortages in these areas. Moreover, the literature suggests a lack of minority representation in the teaching profession.

Information for this report came from ICCB course files and unit cost data as well as a survey of the colleges. The ICCB course file lists approved credit-generating courses across the system's 50 colleges. The annual unit cost study provides basic information on course enrollments and the costs involved in providing educational services.

Topics covered in this report on teacher education in community colleges include: the employment outlook for teachers, the number of community college students planning to major in teacher education, courses available in teacher education at the colleges, the number of credit hours generated in teacher education courses at community colleges, methods used to promote teacher education, and articulation agreements between community colleges and four-year institutions.

EMPLOYMENT OUTLOOK FOR TEACHERS

Employment information for educators in the state and across the country are referenced in the following paragraphs. The Illinois Occupational Information Coordinating Committee's career information system Horizons provides employment outlook data for the State of Illinois. Horizons (1991) predicts good employment opportunities for elementary and secondary teachers in Illinois due to rising enrollments. Approximately 164,740 elementary and secondary teachers are employed statewide. Average annual openings for teachers in Illinois will be approximately 5,640 each year through the year 2000. Statewide teacher shortages are predicted in math, science, special education, and bilingual education.

Nationwide employment information is available through the Occupational Outlook Handbook (1990-91) which is produced by the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics. Across the country, the need for elementary and secondary teachers is expected to grow about as fast as the average for all

occupations through the year 2000. Rising enrollments are predicted through the mid-1990s along with declining class sizes. Vacancies are expected to remain at current levels through the mid-1990s followed by substantial increases through the year 2000 due to retirement of large numbers of teachers currently in their 40s. The Occupational Outlook Handbook indicates that while opportunities in the later half of the decade will increase, "the supply of teachers is likely to increase in response to reports of improved job opportunities, greater public interest in education and higher salaries. In fact, enrollment in teacher education programs has already increased, and it appears more former teachers have returned to teaching" (p. 133).

COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS PLANNING TO MAJOR IN TEACHER EDUCATION

This section focuses on community college students in Illinois who plan to pursue careers as teachers. The number of students planning to major in education was provided by 38 districts. In many instances the numbers provided were estimates. The use of estimates was necessitated by the fact that transfer-oriented associate degrees are not major specific. Since the mid-1980s, the colleges have moved toward general associate in arts (AA) and associate in science (AS) degrees. The colleges approximated the number of students interested in the field of education from enrollments in related coursework or other college records.

As depicted in Table 1, during fall 1990 the 38 districts reporting data identified 9,439 students planning to major in education. This represents between nine and ten percent of the fall 1990 baccalaureate/transfer degree-seeking students in these districts. Illinois Board of Higher Education's Databook on Illinois Higher Education (1990) indicates that the field of education accounted for 9.9 percent of the bachelor's degrees conferred by Illinois four-year universities in 1989. While all community colleges have teacher education courses, one district and one college from a multi-college district were unable to identify the number of students interested in majoring in teacher education. Districts which identified the largest number of teacher education majors included: Rock Valley (1,385), Chicago (1,296), DuPage (1,006), Black Hawk (817), and Harper (468). These five districts account for 52.7 percent of all teacher education majors identified in the survey.

Figure 1 shows the percentage of community college students interested in each area within the field of education. Elementary education was the most often cited specialization. Nearly half (46.3 percent) of the students were identified as having an interest in elementary education. Survey results indicate that one-quarter of the students have been identified as education majors without an area of specialization. Either these students have not indicated a preference for elementary, secondary, or special education, or their preference is not reflected in college records. Sixteen percent of the aspiring teachers plan on pursuing opportunities at the secondary level. Special education was the area with the smallest percentage of students with 11.7 percent. The number of special educators employed statewide is, of course, smaller than regular classroom instructors.

in Specific Areas of Education

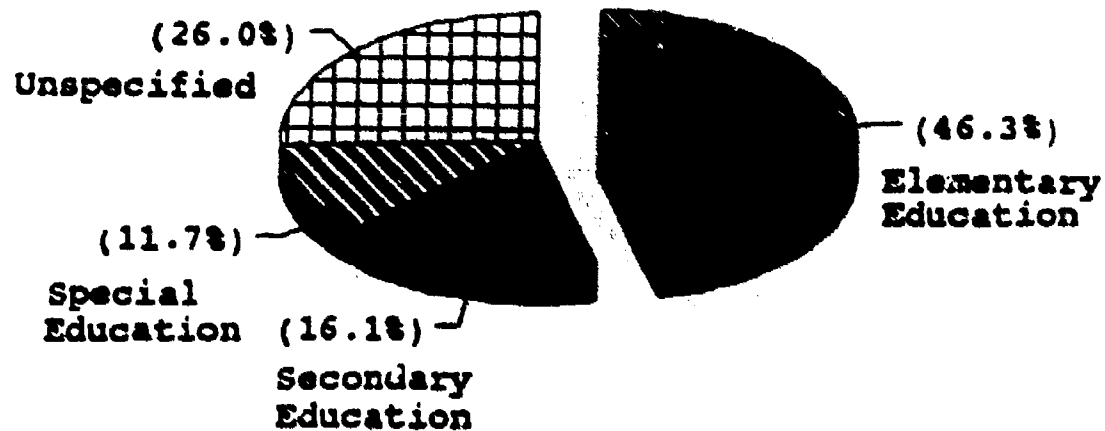


Table 2 shows the percentage teacher education majors represent of total fall 1990 baccalaureate/transfer degree-seeking students. Students classified as baccalaureate/transfer course enrollees are excluded. Course enrollees take specific courses but have expressed no intention of completing a specific program. These figures can be influenced by the manner in which the course enrollee designation is used at the colleges. Some colleges wait longer than others to move students into programs. The statewide average shows 9.4 percent of the degree-seeking baccalaureate/transfer enrollments are teacher education majors. Two of Chicago's City Colleges showed a disproportionately high degree of interest in teacher education. Nearly two-thirds of Wilbur Wright and approaching one-half of City-Wide's degree-seeking baccalaureate/transfer students were identified as teacher education majors. At both Rock Valley and McHenry approximately one-third of the baccalaureate/transfer students were teacher education majors. One-quarter of the degree-seeking transfer students at both Waubonsee and Black Hawk were characterized as teacher education majors.

NUMBER OF COURSES AVAILABLE IN TEACHER EDUCATION
AT COMMUNITY COLLEGES

As indicated in Table 3, during fiscal year 1990 a total of 951 teacher education courses were approved to be offered in Illinois community colleges. The ICCB course master file reveals that every community college has courses in teacher education. Three areas account for two-thirds of the approved education courses. One-third of the courses were in physical education (33.3 percent), 16.2 percent were categorized under elementary education, and 15.6 percent were in health education (Figure 2). Other areas with notable numbers of approved courses included general education (69), special education (65,) foundations of education (49), and reading education (46). Few colleges offer specific courses in secondary education. Secondary teachers are subject

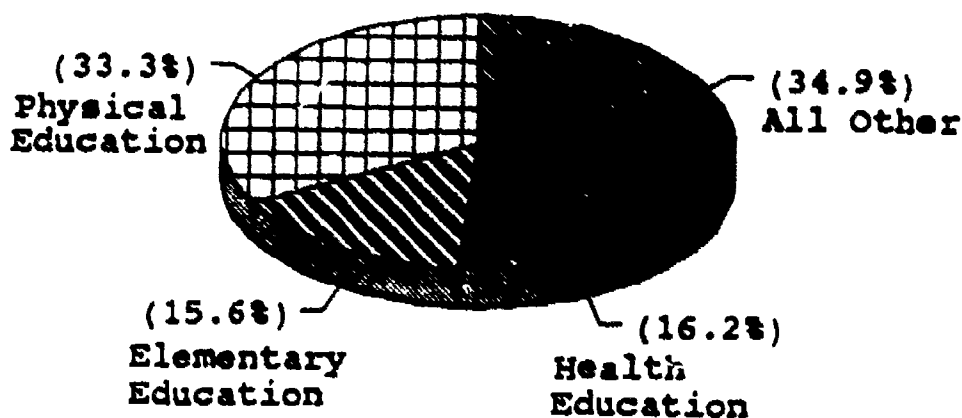

matter specialists. Hence, college students aspiring to teach junior or senior high school pursue additional coursework in their subject matter specialty (e.g., math, science, English, etc.). Suggested courses of study for secondary teacher education in college catalogs typically recommend educational foundations coursework (e.g., educational psychology, child and adolescent/human development, school and society/American public education, etc.) clinical observation in education, and as many electives in the student's academic major as possible.

The number of teacher education courses varied between seven and 36 per college. Colleges with 30 or more approved teacher education courses in fiscal year 1990 are included in the following list: Joliet (36), Illinois Eastern--Olney Central (35), Illinois Eastern--Wabash Valley (35), DuPage (34), John Wood (34), Rock Valley (33), Illinois Eastern--Lincoln Trail (32), and Elgin (30). These seven colleges account for 28.3 percent of the approved teacher education courses in fiscal year 1990.

CREDIT HOUR PRODUCTION IN TEACHER EDUCATION COURSES

Another measure of community college involvement in the production of future teachers is the number of credit hours generated in teacher education courses. A summary of the credit hours generated in education courses from ICCB unit cost data for fiscal years 1988 through 1990 appears in Table 4. Information pertaining to specific education course enrollments is included in Appendix A. Students enrolling in education courses do not necessarily plan to teach. For example, a course in health education is commonly selected by students pursuing AA and AS degrees.

Unit cost data indicate that the number of credits generated during the past three years in teacher education fluctuated slightly between 1988 and 1990. Between fiscal years 1988 and 1989, the number of credit hours in education decreased 1.1 percent followed by a 4.6 percent increase from fiscal year 1989 to 1990. Proportionately, the percent education credits constitute of all baccalaureate/transfer oriented credits declined slightly between 1988 and 1990 from 3.1 to 2.9 percent. While the number of education credit hours produced in 1990 increased, the increase was not as great as the overall increase in baccalaureate/transfer credit hours.

Another way to analyze the data is by examining which specific components within education account for the largest portions of teacher education's overall credit hour production. According to data in Appendix A, health education courses dominated teacher education credit production during the three-year period. Slight growth was evident as health education accounted for 46.6 percent of the teacher education credits in fiscal 1988, 48.9 percent in 1989, and 50.4 percent in fiscal year 1990. Elementary education was second highest in teacher education credit generation. In 1988 elementary education produced 13.0 percent of all teacher education credit, 12.6 percent in 1989, and 12.7 percent in 1990. Special education was consistently third. Special education credits declined from 12.1 percent in 1988 to 9.4 percent in 1989 and 8.9 percent in 1990.

Some districts produce more credits in teacher education than others. Generally, as depicted in Appendix A, the same districts accounted for the largest number of credit hours generated in teacher education during each of the last three fiscal years. DuPage was always first. Triton was in second position each year. Though their relative positions shifted somewhat, Logan, Harper, Illinois Eastern, Joliet, Illinois Central, and Lake Land were consistently among the top nine districts. The only noteworthy shift was Chicago's rapid descent from third position in fiscal year 1988. Between fiscal years 1988 and 1990, Chicago cut its credit hour production in teacher education courses in half. In 1988 Belleville produced the tenth largest number of credit hours and remained among the top nine districts in subsequent years. The top nine teacher education credit producing districts tend to be either large or those located in close geographic proximity to a four-year university. The top nine districts contributed 52.1 percent of the credit hours produced in teacher education in fiscal year 1988, 49.0 percent in fiscal year 1989, and 49.3 percent in fiscal year 1990.

METHODS USED TO PROMOTE TEACHER EDUCATION TRANSFER PROGRAMS

Community college districts use a variety of techniques to spread the word about learning opportunities available to students. A large portion of district promotional efforts are aimed at conveying the diverse educational programs available to the community: transfer, occupational/vocational, adult basic and secondary, remedial, and personal development. In the transfer area, colleges routinely use their college catalogs to describe the suggested sequence of courses students should take if they plan on majoring in a given subject after transferring.

The teacher education survey contained an open-ended question inquiring about promotional activities targeting teacher education. A summary of promotional activities at the colleges targeted toward teacher education appears in Appendix B. Frequently mentioned answers are highlighted below. Survey responses indicate that brochures (13) constitute the most common way districts promote teacher education. Featuring teacher education during the advisement/counseling/registration process (11) was second. Newsletters/articles/targeted letters (9) and equal treatment with all other transfer programs (9) tied for third. Several promotional activities were listed by four districts: education clubs, special scholarships for education majors, presentations/booths at community events, and displays focusing on careers in education.

ARTICULATION AGREEMENTS

Many community colleges rely on the general provisions of the "compact" for program articulation. The "compact" refers to a December 1970 Illinois Board of Higher Education resolution in which Illinois' community colleges were named as equal partners in the delivery of the first two years of baccalaureate degree education. Community college students completing AA or AS degrees meet senior college lower-division general education requirements for a bachelor's degree at senior institutions that accept the "compact." Most public universities in Illinois have adopted the "compact." To facilitate community college student transfer, many colleges work with individual departments at senior institutions to limit the possibility that students will encounter unanticipated difficulties upon transfer. Teacher education is one area where some community colleges have worked out articulation agreements with public and private four-year institutions. Twenty-two community college districts have developed such agreements.

Table 5 lists four-year institutions that have teacher education articulation agreements with Illinois public community colleges. Public Illinois senior institutions were identified 51 times by community colleges as having articulation agreements in teacher education. The most often mentioned public universities with articulated education programs included: Western (13), Southern (9), Eastern (8), Illinois State (7), and Northern (6). Sixteen private institutions were identified as engaging in teacher education articulation agreements with community colleges. National/Lewis (4), Concordia (2), and St. Xavier (2) were the only private universities named more than once. Southeast Missouri State University was the single public out-of-state institution mentioned. Private colleges and universities were usually cited by community colleges located in close geographic proximity to them, while public institutions had agreements from a broader, statewide range.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

Statewide employment outlook data anticipate teacher shortages in math, science, special education, and bilingual education through the year 2000. National data point toward a substantially increased need for teachers from the mid-1990s through the year 2000.

During fall 1990 the 38 districts reporting data identified 9,439 students planning to major in teacher education. Since transfer-oriented associate degrees are not major-specific and the certification process for new teachers requires the completion of a four-year degree, the actual number of persons who become teachers can be expected to vary.

During fiscal year 1990, a total of 951 teacher education courses were approved for offering in Illinois community colleges. Physical education, elementary education, and health education account for two-thirds of the education courses. Every community college had active courses in teacher education. The number of teacher education courses varied between seven and 36 per college. Seven colleges account for 28.3 percent of the teacher education courses available in fiscal year 1990.

Credit hour production in teacher education was examined for fiscal years 1988 through 1990. The number of credit hours generated increased slightly in absolute terms over the three-year period but decreased somewhat relative to the number of credits produced across all baccalaureate/transfer programs. Specific programs responsible for most teacher education credits included health education, elementary education, and special education. DuPage and Triton were the districts that generated the largest number of teacher education credit hours during all three years. Though their relative positions shifted somewhat, Logan, Harper, Illinois Eastern, Joliet, Illinois Central, and Lake Land were consistently among the top districts. The top nine districts generated approximately 50 percent of the credits in teacher education during each of the three years studied.

The colleges use a wide variety of techniques to promote teacher education. Frequently mentioned approaches include brochures, the registration and advisement process, and the use of periodic newsletters.

While some colleges rely on the articulation "compact" for all articulation, others work with individual departments at senior institutions to articulate teacher education. Twenty-two community college districts reported articulation agreements in teacher education with four-year institutions. Community colleges cited public in-state universities 51 times, private Illinois senior institutions 16 times, and one out-of-state public institution as having articulation agreements with them in teacher education.

It is worth reiterating that all community colleges offer teacher education courses indicating that they are active participants in teacher preparation. It appears from the information contained in this report that many colleges are actively promoting teaching as a career. However, the community college

system can increase participation in elementary and secondary teacher preparation by additional promotion of teacher education overall with special emphasis being placed on areas where teacher shortages are predicted in Illinois (math, science, special and bilingual education). The colleges could also increase efforts to encourage minority and underrepresented group member participation in teacher education by increasing outreach to area high schools and enhancing or creating mentoring programs in teacher education. Additionally, the colleges could increase efforts to reach articulation agreements with four-year universities in teacher education with those universities where substantial numbers of their students transfer.

Providing an adequate number of properly prepared teachers is a responsibility shared by all sectors of the higher education community. The community college system embraces its role in that process. Community colleges have built their reputations by affirming the paramount importance of delivering quality instruction.
