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ABSTRACT

This resource guide contains listings and descriptions of 12 experimental visual arts programs, 29 audiovisual materials, and almost 200 printed materials on many aspects of visual arts. An index of the printed materials is provided alphabetically by disabling condition, covering behavioral disorders, communication disorders, general, gifted and talented hearing impaired, learning disabilities, mental retardation, multiple and severe handicaps, physical handicaps, and visual impairments. Annotations and sources for acquiring the materials are provided for most items. (JDD)

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INTRODUCTION

About this Guide

The visual arts and interdisciplinary resources listed in this guide come from a combination of sources: ERIC database searches, requests for program and publication information from art consultants at each state Department of Public Instruction, references sent in by interested parties, and a search of library references for art for the Exceptional Educational Needs (EEN) student. The entries for visual arts were originally used in the "Educators Workshop: Arts and the Special Needs Child" — July/August, 1987, and have been expanded for wider use. Future editions will include music and, eventually, the other art forms.

Separate listings are provided in this guide for current experimental visual arts programs, audiovisual materials, and printed materials. In addition an index of printed material is provided alphabetically by EEN. While the timespan for listings covers 1968-1988, the emphasis is on the more recent information. Many earlier items are included because of historical significance and major contributions made to writing about the arts and the EEN child. Sources for the material and an annotated description are provided wherever feasible. Many programs are listed under printed material because they could not be verified as being current projects. Many of the unpublished items may be purchased from the ERIC Document Reproduction Service in paper copy or microfiche.

References may be available sorted in other formats such as programs by state, references by year, or by author; or by more specific key phrases, such as photography, drawing, visual arts and music, etc. The data is also available on disk, as Apple Macintosh-compatible Text, BASIC, SYLK, or FileMaker (c) Plus files. Contact the Young Artist Workshops for additional information.

ERIC is the database of educational materials collected by the Educational Resources Information Center of the U.S. Department of Education. It consists of two subfiles: Resources in Education (RIE), covering unpublished education research reports and projects, and Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE), covering approximately 750 journals and serial publications. Most records in ERIC contain informative abstracts. Most college, university, and public libraries can provide access to items or assist in getting additional information.

About the Young Artist Workshops

The Young Artist Workshops was founded in 1985 and is an art and education program of St. Norbert College, De Pere, WI 54115-2099. It provides visual and performing arts programs for young people with exceptional educational needs. It is a demonstration site project providing an integrated arts program for EEN youth and an opportunity for teachers to develop skills for enriching the curriculum with the visual and performing arts.

The Young Artist Workshops provide a year-round program of continuing education workshops, programs, publications, and video resources to assist the arts and special education staff in effectively integrating the arts into the education of the EEN child. In collaboration with the St. Norbert College Teacher Education Program and the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, programs in Adaptive Education—Art, and also in Adaptive Education—Music, provide an additional certification for visual arts and music subject area specialists.

The Young Artist Workshops includes a three-week summer program designed for young artists (ages 7-22) who have learning disabilities, physical handicaps, hearing impairment, communication disorders, or mental retardation. The program's purpose is to provide opportunities for young people with EEN to experience the arts. Visual arts, dance/creative movement and physical activities, theatre, music, storytelling, and creative writing comprise the curriculum. An Educators Workshop is offered in conjunction with the program.

Chapter I

Program List, Alphabetical by Title

The programs identified here are generally of several years duration and should be ongoing sources of information. Identification and verification of experimental visual arts and exceptional educational needs programs were obtained through a variety of sources. The identification process included a survey sent to the art consultants at each of the 50 state Departments of Public Instruction, and a review of current periodical literature. Numerous experimental programs were identified at the National Art Education Association conferences.

Programs that were of a short duration or only one-time events were not included because they had limited value as an ongoing resource. Persons interested in festivals and short-term events are encouraged to contact the National Very Special Arts Program: Education Office, John F. Kennedy Center, Washington, D.C. 20566. Each of the 50 states has an active Very Special Arts program and conducts annual events and workshops. Please contact VSA for that information.

Chapter III

Printed Materials Resource List, Alphabetical by Title

The printed materials listed include books, articles in serial publications, curriculum guides, published research, program descriptions, and unpublished research and presentations.

Printed materials were identified through several research techniques including bibliographies used to support undergraduate and graduate programs in art education and adaptive art education. Additional resources were identified at National Art Education Association conference presentations and also during preparation of a Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction *Arts for the Handicapped Curriculum Guide*. Direct database searches were conducted for additional information -- particularly in the area of recent published and unpublished research.

It is a selected bibliography since it was necessary to limit this guide to a reasonable size yet provide depth in terms of disabilities addressed and some depth in the description of individual resources. In the general section will be found notations to assist the reader in identifying relevant resources. Chapter IV provides a more streamlined listing of resources for specific exceptional educational needs, which may then be perused in this chapter.
