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ABSTRACT

This directory promotes better coordination among agencies and organizations that serve migrant and seasonal farmworkers (MSFWs) and their families. The U.S. Department of Agriculture, the U.S. Department of Education, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the U.S. Department of Justice, and the U.S. Department of Labor all provide services to MSFWs. Descriptions of federal programs within these agencies include the following entries: (1) services provided; (2) statutory authority and regulations; (3) contact person and address; (4) total federal funds for fiscal year 1990 and 1991; (5) total estimated federal funds; (6) agencies administering the program; (7) definition of eligible migrants; and (8) program publications and directories. LABOR STANDARDS FOR MIGRANT AND SEASONAL AGRICULTURAL WORKERS

The Migrant and Seasonal Agricultural Workers Protection Act (MSPA) requires agricultural employers, agricultural associations, and farm labor contractors to observe certain labor standards when employing migrant and seasonal agricultural workers, unless exemptions apply. Certain persons and organizations, such as family businesses, small businesses, some seed and tobacco operations, labor unions, and their employees, are exempt. MSPA requires farm labor contractors to register with the U.S. Department of Labor.

What is the difference between migrant and seasonal agricultural workers?

As defined by MSPA, <u>migrant agricultural workers</u> are those employed in agricultural work of a seasonal or temporary nature who are required to be absent overnight from their permanent residence.

Seasonal agricultural workers also are employed in agricultural work of a seasonal or temporary nature, but return to their permanent residence at night. There are two classes of seasonal agricultural workers: field workers; and workers employed in canning, packing, ginning, seed conditioning, and other processing operations who are transported to or from their place of employment by means of a day-haul operation. Day-haul workers assemble at a pick-up point each day waiting to be hired and employed, are transported to the job site, and later the same day are transported to a drop-off point.

Rights of migrant and seasonal agricultural workers

When <u>migrant agricultural workers</u> are recruited by firm labor contractors, agricultural employers, and agricultural associations, accurate information about the prospective employment must be disclosed to them. The information must be presented in writing in English, Spanish, or other languages, as appropriate, and must include: where they will work and whether there is a strike, work stoppage, slowdown, or interruption of operations by employees at the work site; the crops and kinds of activities on which they may be employed; how long they will be employed; how much they will be paid; whether transportation, housing, and other benefits will be provided, and any charges for the benefits; whether the employer will receive commissions or other benefits for sales made to the workers by any establishment in the area of the job'site; and any terms and conditions for occupancy of migrant housing.

The above information must be disclosed in writing to <u>day-haul seasonal workers</u> when they are being recruited. <u>Other seasonal agricultural workers</u> have a right to the information in writing <u>upon request</u> when they are offered work. When presented in writing, the information must be in English, Spanish, or other languages, as appropriate.

Thereafter, migrant and seasonal agricultural workers have a right to receive upon <u>request</u> information described above at any other time during their employment.

This is one of a series of fact sheets highlighting U.S. Department of Labor programs. It is intended as a general description only and does not carry the force of legal opinion.

Migrant and seasonal agricultural workers have the following rights, regardless of whether their employers are farm labor contractors, agricultural employers or agricultural associations:

-- to have the terms of their working arrangements met;

-- when being recruited, to have farm labor contractors show proof that they have registered with the Department of Labor;

-- to be paid wages when due;

-- to receive itemized, written statements of earnings for each pay period, amounts deducted, and reasons for the deductions;

-- to purchase goods and services from the source of their choice;

- --- when provided transportation, to be transported in vehicles which are properly insured, are operated by licensed drivers, and meet federal and state safety standards;
- -- to have a poster setting forth their rights displayed in a conspicuous place at the job site; and

-- for migrant workers who are provided housing:

- * to be housed in a facility which meets substantive federal and state safety and health standards; and
- * to have a statement of the terms and conditions of occupancy posted conspicuously at the housing site or presented to them.

Enforcement

Migrant and seasonal agricultural workers have a right to receive the wages their employers agreed to pay them. Under the Fair Labor Standards Act, that amount is generally not less than \$3.35 an hour (the federal minimum wage). Federal law does not require overtime pay for most agricultural workers.

Violations of MSPA may result in administrative sanctions, civil or criminal prosecution, civil money penalties of up to \$1,000 per violation, fines of up to \$10,000, and prison terms of up to three years.

The Wage and Hour Division of the U.S. Labor Department's Employment Standards Administration enforces MSPA. Inquiries are treated in a confidential manner. MSPA prohibits retaliation or discrimination against workers who file complaints, testify, or in any way exercise their rights on their own behalf or on behalf of others.

H-2A FACT SHEET

The Department of Labor's (the Department) H-2A enforcement program has been implemented in strict accordance with the requirements of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), as amended by the Immigration Reform and Control Act (IRCA) of 1986. IRCA established a substantially revised H-2A program to improve the prior H-2 program's responsiveness to agricultural employers' needs while at the same time ensuring basic labor standards protections to H-2A workers.

The new H-2A program was implemented on June 1, 1987, under regulations issued by the Department's Employment and Training Administration (ETA), which administers the H-2A application, recruitment and certification processes, and the Employment Standards Administration (ESA), which enforces the labor standards protections afforded H-2A workers through its Wage and Hour Division (WHD).

The INA provides that the employment of temporary nonimmigrant agricultural workers under the H-2A program will not adversely affect the wages and working conditions of U.S. workers similarly employed, and provides certain labor standards protections to all workers employed under the program. The specific labor standards protections afforded H-2A workers (and domestic workers similarly employed) are established by statute and regulation, and are required to be incorporated in employer-proposed job offers and "work contracts" established between participating employers and their workers.

The Department's H-2A enforcement program targets proportionally more H-2A employers than the proportion of non-H-2A agricultural employers subject to inspection under other labor standards protection laws we enforce. However, our H-2A enforcement is not achieved by the exclusion of all other agricultural employers from compliance inspection under the other labor standards laws.

The Department's enforcement program still includes vigorous efforts by both ETA and ESA to educate employers with respect to their responsibilities under the program. One of IRCA's key changes in establishing the new H-2A program was a statutory requirement for increased enforcement of its labor standards protections. H-2A enforcement resources were allocated among the regions based upon both the number of applications filed by employers who wish to participate in the H-2A program and the number of employers certified under the prior H-2 program.

The WHD provides information and expert speakers on the H-2A program for appearances before employer groups. The provision of such information to employers has proven to be a very important tool in promoting voluntary compliance.

ESA 88-20 Fact Sheet No. REPORTING AND RECORDKEEPING REQUIREMENTS AND LABOR STANDARDS FOR SPECIAL AGRICULTURAL WORKERS

The Immigration Reform and Control Act (IRCA) of 1986 requires all employers of "special agricultural workers" engaged in seasonal agricultural work to provide certain information to the Federal government.

A reportable worker is one who:

-- Has an Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) Alien Registration Number in the A90000000 series (that is, "A-9" followed by any seven digits), and

--Is employed in seasonal agricultural services for one or more work days of at least four hours after October 1, 1988.


The A90000000 Alien Registration Number series includes legal, work-authorized residents admitted to the U.S. under Sections 245A, 210, and 210A of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA).

Reporting Requirements:

Beginning October 1, 1988, agricultural employers must identify their reportable workers from the Alien Registration Number contained on INS Form I-9. The I-9 is completed at the time of hiring in order to verify the worker's employment eligibility. If the worker's eligibility for employment has been certified by the State Employment Service Agency (SESA), that agency must furnish the worker's Alien Registration Number on its certification of employment eligibility.

From October 1, 1988, through September 30, 1992, agricultural employers must file a signed, certified copy of Form ESA-92 (Work-day Report) each quarter if they have employed any reportable workers. This form must be used to report the number of work-days of at least 4 hours for each reportable worker employed in seasonal agricultural services. This form must be completed and submitted even if a reportable worker is so employed for only one day during a quarter. The Secretaries of Agriculture and Labor will use this information to help determine the need for admitting any additional, or replenishment, agricultural workers to the U.S.

Form ESA-92 is available at the U.S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division Area Offices, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) county extension service offices, county offices of the USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, and the Immigration and Naturalization Service's Border Patrol offices.

Also, from October 1, 1989, through September 30, 1992, agricultural employers must furnish to all replenishment agricultural workers (identified by an INS Alien Registration Number within a A90000000 sub-series) on each payday a record of each day employed in seasonal agricultural services. Optional Form WH-501R may be used for this purpose. These forms may also be obtained from the offices listed above.

Recordkeeping:

From October 1, 1988, through September 30, 1992, employers of reportable workers must create and maintain records containing each worker's name, INS Alien Registration Number, Social Security Number, local and permanent addresses (including Zip Code), crops worked and tasks performed, and hours worked each day. Records may be in any recordkeeping format.

Employers must also retain a copy of each dated and signed Work-Day Report (ESA-92) submitted to the Federal Government and each report provided to any replenishment agricultural worker of the number of work-days employed in seasonal agricultural services. Records must be available for inspection by Department of Labor officials and must be retained for at least three years, except that records pertaining to replenishment agricultural workers must be kept at least five years.

Enforcement:

The Wage and Hour Division of the U.S. Labor Department's Employment Standards Administration enforces the provisions of 29 CFR Part 502, Reporting and Employment Requirements for Employers of Certain Workers Employed in Seasonal Agricultural Services. Civil money penalties of up to \$1,000 may be assessed for each violation. In addition, any individual who interferes with the conduct of an investigation by a Department of Labor official may be subject to civil money penalties, injunctive action and/or criminal sanctions, as appropriate.
