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ABSTRACT

The Nassau (New York) Library System contracted with Literacy Volunteers of America to address the problem of adult literacy by increasing the number of trained volunteer tutors who can teach basic literacy skills. Specifically, the project's goals were to: (1) conduct 6 tutor training workshops at library locations; (2) recruit and train 180-200 community volunteers to work on a one-to-one basis with adults who read below the fifth-grade level; (3) provide training manuals and other materials for use by tutor trainees; (4) recruit a minimum of 180 adult students who read below the fifth-grade level; (5) provide orientation and training to identify, recruit, and refer students; and (6) provide high-low materials for use by matched pairs of tutors and students. The project trained only 157 tutors, due to a lack of minority volunteers. A tutor training packet was distributed at the workshops, and 128 adult students were matched with tutors. PART II: Narrative Report

General

The Nassau Library System had proposed to contract again with Literacy Volunteers of America, Nassau County, Inc., to provide six tutor training workshops to train at least 180 to 200 more community volunteers to work with adults who read below the fifth grade level.

The proposed project was successfully accomplished and the goals and objectives were mostly met. The report which follows will explain a slight deficiency in the expected number of tutors.

With the help of other Nassau Library System support, i.e., an LSCA Title I grant which helped to provide phones' service, printing, and miscellaneous supplies; the assistance of office space, light, heat, etc., in a local library building; and the additional support of a Nassau County grant to NLS which helps to pay salaries of director, assistant director, and clerical staff, this local affiliate of LVA has been doing an exemplary job of attacking the problem of illiteracy in Nassau County.

One deficiency was always the lack of money, to train more tutors. With this project it has been possible to train 157 more volunteer tutors, which, with a similar one for '87-'88, more than triples the number of trained tutors in

Nassau County. The original tutors had been trained over a long and painstaking number of years in which raising funds was always a problem. Thus, reaching the goal of providing six tutor training workshop series in one year is a real boon.

The project did not reach the objective of 180-200 community volunteers trained (only 157 trained) for a very good reason: there has been a serious lack of minority tutors, in spite of the fact that many students are African-American or Hispanic. In an effort to recruit and train more minority tutors, the site of three workshops was moved to Hempstead Public Library. The numbers here fell short of expectations. More people in poorer communities must work, sometimes two jobs, and do not have leisure to volunteer. There is never any problem in recruiting volunteers from the more affluent, but mostly Caucasian, communities. The workshops were conducted, but just with smaller numbers of participants in Hempstead.

The project also paid for the tutor training materials for the volunteers who attended the training classes. It also provided for a collection of reading materials, (high interest-low level) to be available for the new students.

Because Nassau Library System contracted for most of this service, the contractee, Literacy Volunteers of America, Nassau County, Inc., was asked to report. The following is that part of the narrative: (It follows the outline of the project proposal)

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES: The overall goal of this project was to address the problem of illiteracy among adults in Nassau County by increasing the number of trained volunteer tutors who can teach basic literacy skills to adults who need them, specifically by contracting with Literacy Volunteers of America - Nassau County, Inc., to:

- (a) conduct 6 Tutor Training Workshops at member Nassau County Library locations:

The format of the Tutor Training Workshop is to demonstrate various tutoring techniques through live demonstrations and video tapes and then to give tutor trainees the opportunity to practice in O-T-O (One-to-one) sessions supervised by the Tutor Training Workshop Leader and experienced Literacy Volunteers tutors.

Each Tutor Training Workshop is supplemented with a 3-hour follow-up session. Follow-ups for the 6 Tutor Training Workshops described above were: December 15, 1988, April 3 (2), May 8 and June 20, 1989.

(b) recruit and train 180-200 community volunteers to work on a one-to-one basis with adults who read below the fifth grade level.

During the project year October 1, 1988 through September 30, 1989, under the contract between the Nassau Library System and Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc., (LVA-NC) 6 general orientations to LVA-NC were conducted. These 3-hour sessions, open to the public, provided general information on the program, the training,

the responsibilities of becoming a tutor as well as general information about the adult low-level reader, his needs, learning styles, motivation, etc.

These Orientation sessions conducted at Nassau County member library locations were held on October 13, 1988, January 10, January 19, (2), February 27, and May 2, 1989.

Orientation sessions were scheduled at locations which tend to be central to Nassau County and with a proximity to student populations within geographic areas of greatest need.

In total 157 potential community volunteers completed one of the Tutor Training Workshops described in (a) above. Of these 132 were matched to work on a one-to-one basis with an adult who reads below the fifth grade level, at mutually convenient times and locations, usually at a Nassau County member library location.

(c) provide training manuals and other materials for use by tutor trainees:

Each of the 157 tutor trainees who registered for Tutor Training Workshops received a tutor packet which contained: Tutor (Techniques Used in the Teaching of

Reading), A Handbook for Teaching Basic Reading to Adults and Teenagers, 6th Edition, by Ruth J. Colvin and Jane H. Root, Ph.D., published by Literacy Volunteers of America, Inc., 5795 Widewaters Parkway, Syracuse, N.Y.; Read (Reading Evaluation - Adult Diagnosis), A Test for Assessing Adult Student Reading Needs and Progress, by Ruth J. Colvin and Jane H. Root, Ph.D., published by Literacy Volunteers of America, Inc., 5795 Widewaters Parkways, Syracuse, NY 13214; various handouts, outlines, and suggestions for materials for use in preparing lessons for adult low-level readers.

(d) recruit a minimum of 180 adult students who read below the fifth grade level.

During the course of this program year, more than 200 students were recruited through a variety of publicity activities conducted by Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc. Publicity efforts through Nassau County member library locations included the distribution of posters, flyers, fact sheets, Tutor Training Workshop schedules, applications and student referral forms. 128 adults who read below the fifth grade level were matched with a volunteer trained in

one of the Tutor Training Workshops described above. Others will be matched as a "second" student to one of the trained tutors or as a "rematch" when instruction is completed.

(e) provide orientation and training to identify, recruit and refer students:

Packets of recruitment materials including the items listed in 1 (d) above were printed and distributed by the Nassau Library System to each of its 54 member libraries in October 1988 and February, 1989. While no formal specific orientations for Nassau County member library staffs were held, a number of libraries were in contact with the Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc., office for advice on the best distribution within the local community.

Approximately one-third of the 132 students matched with the tutors trained in the Workshops described in 1 (1) above were referred by one of the 54 Nassau County member libraries.

(f) provide high-low materials for use by matched pairs of tutors and students:

Approximately \$1000 in high/low materials were purchased for use by Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc.'s tutors and students including books, workbooks, and other assorted materials. For a specific list of these materials see paid invoices attached.

Tutor Tips

What do you do if your student reverses letters, words, and/or words within sentences? Here are some tips taken from Eldon E. Ekwall's *Locating and Correcting Reading Difficulties*.

A. Emphasize Left To Right Movement In Everything:

1. Cover word(s) or sentence(s). Read the word or sentence as it is uncovered.
2. Underline the word or sentence, sounding out the word as it is underlined or reading the sentence as it is underlined.
3. Draw arrows pointing from left to right under troublesome words.
4. Have your student use a typewriter to practice troublesome words.

B. Other:

1. Write word(s) on word cards. Have your student trace the words with the index and middle fingers together as he/she sounds out the word. Then write the word from memory.
2. If your student reads rapidly, have him/her read more slowly.
3. Write words sometimes reversed in pairs. Use one of the words in a sentence. Ask your student to point to and write the correct word.
4. Use a colored letter at the beginning of words commonly confused.

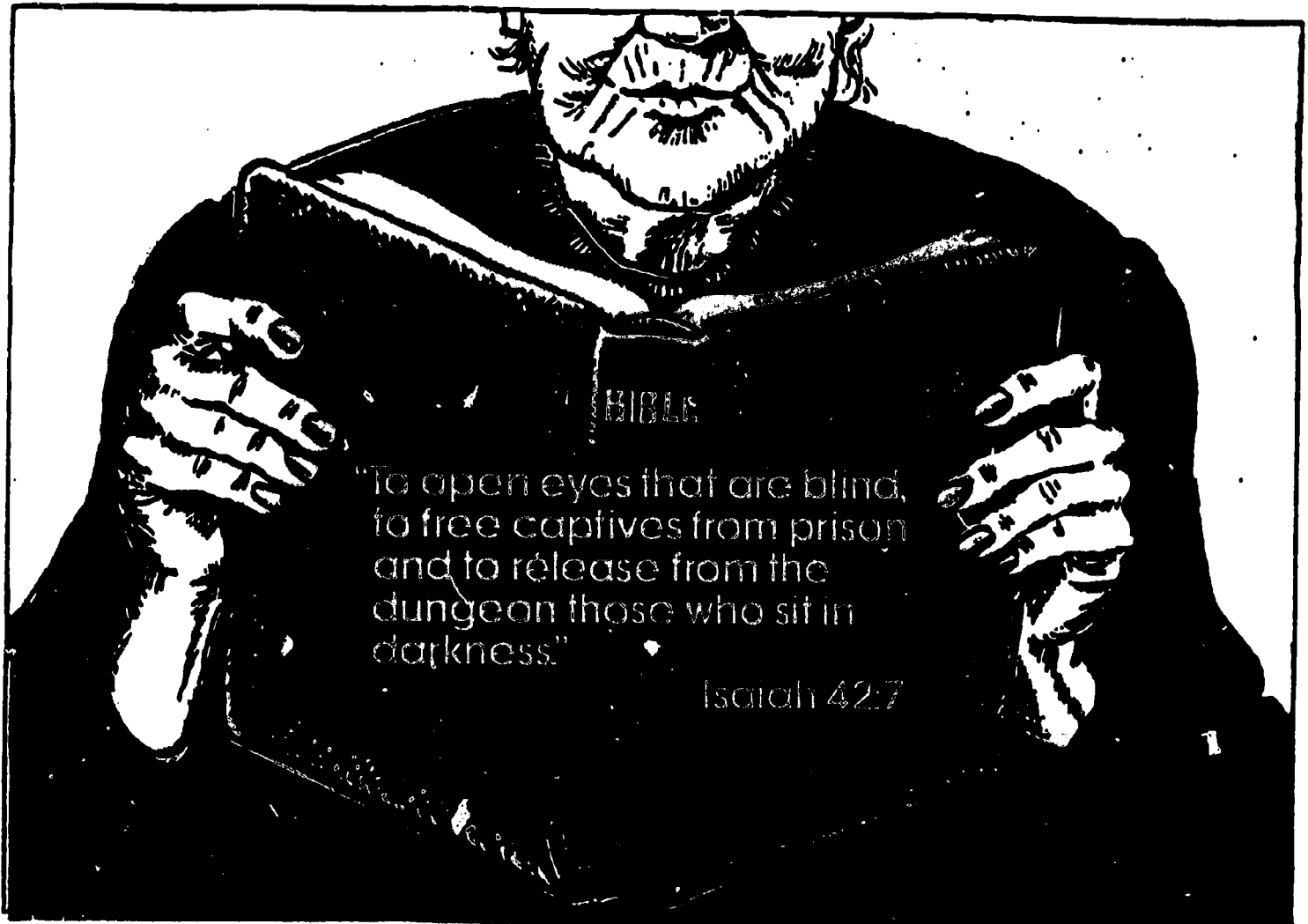

This agreement entered into on October 1, 1988, by the Nassau Library System, 900 Jerusalem Avenue, Uniondale, NY 11553, and the Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc., 115 Nichols Court, Hempstead, NY 11550, is for participation in a U.S. Department of Education Library Literacy Grant.

The Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc., agrees to provide the coordination of volunteer literacy training and one-to-one tutoring in Nassau County for the period October 1, 1988, through September 30, 1989, under the following conditions:

1. Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc., will:
 - a. conducts six 24-hour Tutor Training Workshops in Nassau County public library locations.
 - b. recruit, train and supervise approximately 180 to 200 community volunteers to work on a one-to-one basis with adults who read below the fifth grade level.
 - c. recruit the Nassau County public libraries, social service agencies and other appropriate sources for a minimum of 180-200 adults in need of help in reading.
 - d. provide orientation, upon request, including recruitment strategies to the staffs of Nassau County public libraries.
 - e. provide In-Service Training and other appropriate tutor support services to trained volunteers.
2. Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc., will select, employ, train and supervise any paid or unpaid personnel required to provide services.
3. Paid or unpaid staff will be subject to the policies of the Literacy Volunteers.
4. Payment shall total \$21,000 on the following schedule:

1st payment	on signing of contract	\$7000
2nd payment	on completion of three tutor workshops	7000
final payment	upon completion of contract	7000

All payments will be made within 10 days of receipt of invoices.


In the event that Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc., should fail to complete three tutor training workshops by the end of nine months from the signing of the contract, the terms of the remainder of the contract would be declared null and void. No additional payments to LVA-NC, Inc., would be made.

The balance of the grant funds would be returned to the U.S. Department of Education, OERI/Library Program (i.e., all but the original \$7000 paid on signing the contract).


In the event LVA-NC, Inc., should fail to complete all six (i.e., complete only 4 workshops), the balance of the terms of the contract would be null and void, and the final payment to LVA-NC, Inc., would not be paid. At that point, the remaining grant funds would be returned to the U.S. Department of Education, OERI/Library Programs.

The Need

According to the 1980 census, over 95,000 adults in Nassau County over the age of 25 have less than eight years of schooling. Another 95,000 adults over the age of 25 have only one to three years of high school. Many thousands of these individuals can be classified as functionally illiterate. In addition, more and more foreign born adults who have recently joined our community are in need of instruction, and 50% of the adults registered with LVA-NC who speak English as a second language (ESL) are not literate in their native language.

Both groups have difficulty functioning effectively in our complex society. Coping with everyday requirements for living--reading newspapers, signs, grocery labels, and instructions, as well as conversing in English to accommodate basic survival needs--can be impossible.

The Service

Literacy Volunteers of America-Nassau County, Inc. is a not-for-profit, independent affiliate of Literacy Volunteers of America, Inc. LVA-NC recruits, trains and supports community volunteers to work with adults who are functionally illiterate or adults for whom English is a second language. From its inception in 1968, the organization has had one goal: providing free instruction on a one-to-one basis.

The Tutor Training Workshop

Volunteer tutors develop their skills by attending one of the many workshops, in either Basic Reading or ESL, held throughout Nassau County.

Techniques and materials are prepared by university reading specialists and the LVA national staff. The workshops, which begin with an orientation session followed by seven three-hour classes, incorporate lectures, demonstrations, audio-visual aids and small practice sessions.

In addition, trained tutors must attend one of the many In-Service Training Sessions which feature different techniques and topics.

The Tutor

Who are the dedicated volunteers who form the heart of this program? They are adults who live in every corner of Nassau County. They are an active, committed group, often volunteering for other programs too. Many are employed, but quite a few are retired. Any adult who has a high school diploma and who has successfully completed a Tutor Training Workshop will be matched with a student.

The Service

Literacy Volunteers of America - Nassau County, Inc. is a non-profit, independent affiliate of Literacy Volunteers of America, Inc. LVA-NC recruits, trains and supports community volunteers to work with adults who are functionally illiterate or adults for whom English is a second language. From its inception in 1968, the organization has had one goal: providing free instruction on a one-to-one basis.

The Tutor Training Workshop

Volunteer tutors develop their skills by attending a workshop in either Basic Reading or English as a second language held at various sites throughout Nassau County. The workshops begin with an orientation session followed by classes that incorporate lecture and discussion, demonstrations by a workshop team and audio-visual aids. Time at each session is set aside for small group practice of the teaching techniques.

The Tutor

Any adult living in Nassau County who has a high school diploma and who is interested in volunteering may register for a workshop. By successfully completing all sessions a tutor will be matched with a student with whom he will two hours a week for at least 75 hours per year at a location mutually convenient to both. In addition, trained tutors are asked to attend one of the many In-Service Training Workshops offered throughout the year.
