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ABSTRACT

This document presents figures for the fall 1988 enrollment and finances for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1989 at Catholic Colleges and Universities in the United States. Data are based on responses by individual institutions to the Office of Education's National Center for Educational Statistics' annual Integrated Postsecondary Educational Data System survey. Institutions are classified as either Research/Doctoral, Comprehensive, Liberal Arts, or Two-Year. Data for the following enrollment categories are provided: by type of institution; by level; by gender and ethnicity; and by geographic distribution. Financial data in the following categories are provided: tuition and fees, federal grants, private grants, endowment, instruction expenses, research expenses, academic support, student services, institutional support, operation and maintenance, scholarships, and plant debt. Major conclusions are that, in comparison to other independent colleges and universities, Catholic institutions have a higher proportion of comprehensive universities, enroll higher percentages of part-time and women students, enroll lower percentages of Black, Asian and Pacific Islanders, and enroll more Hispanic students (though almost half of these are in three Puerto Rican institutions). Included is a statistical appendix with 24 tables and a list of institutions included in the report. (JB)

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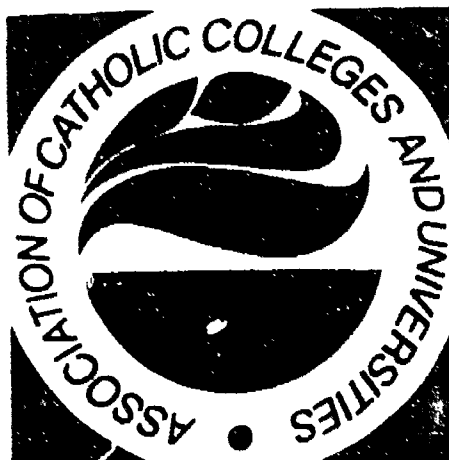

Acknowledgments

This is the fourth in a series of reports by the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities (ACCU) on the enrollments and finances of Catholic colleges and universities in the United States. Data presented in the report are based on responses by individual institutions to the U. S. Office of Education's National Center for Educational Statistics' (NCES) annual Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) survey. After processing the responses, NCES places the data on computer tapes and makes them available to interested organizations. The classification was completed by Merri Twiggs, and the programs were written by Stuart Rich and John Lewis, all of the Georgetown University Office of Planning and Institutional Research. Paul Gallagher coordinated the project for ACCU. Without the assistance of all of these people, this report simply would not have been possible.

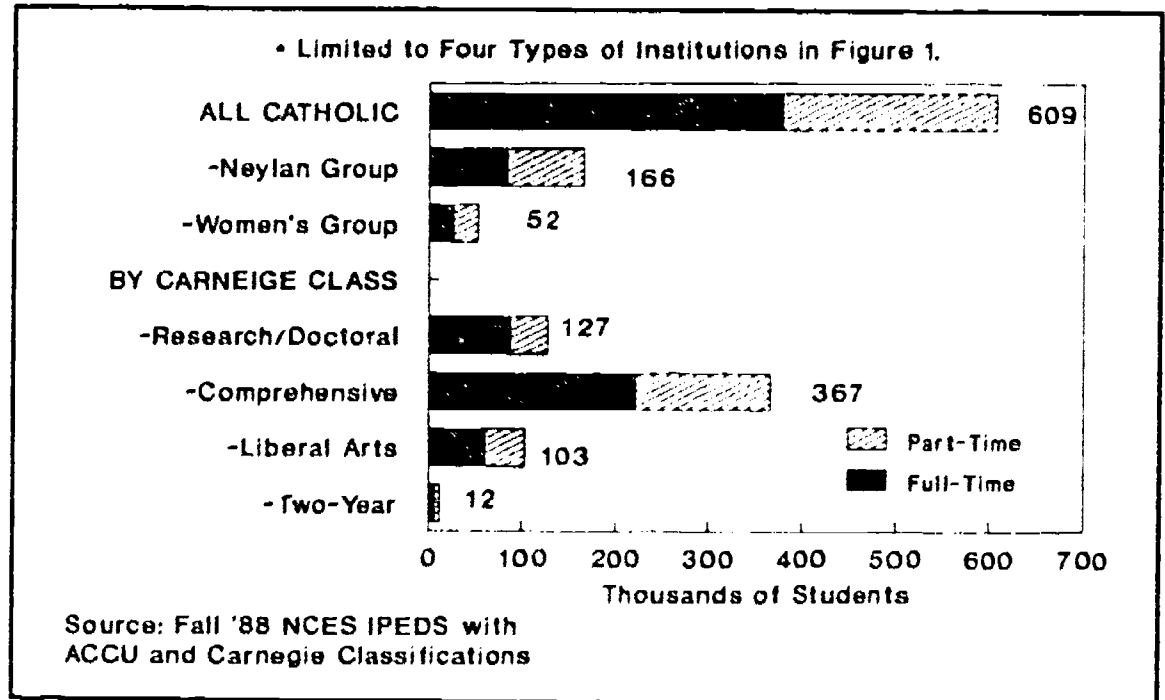
Introduction

This report focuses on the latest available NCES data: fall 1988 enrollment and finances for fiscal year ending June 30, 1989. The Carnegie classifications of Research I and II, Doctoral I and II, Comprehensive I and II, Liberal Arts I and II, and Two-Year, have been collapsed into four basic categories: Research/Doctoral, Comprehensive, Liberal Arts, and Two-Year. Institutions classified as Professional/ Specialized or Corporate (including seminaries) have been excluded. Among Catholic institutions, those founded by and maintaining a relationship with a religious women's order, are referred to as Neylan. The name Neylan was given the group in honor of two (lay) sisters with that family name who donated funds to the National Catholic Educational Association for the benefit of women religious in higher education. Women's colleges are defined as institutions whose fall 1988 enrollment was at least 85% women.

Composition of Enrollment in Catholic Higher Education

All 229 colleges and universities on the ACCU list completed the 1988 fall IPEDS enrollment report. The total enrollment of these institutions was 609,350. All but three (whose combined enrollment totaled 687) could be classified in one of the four basic Carnegie types. The number of institutions in each type was as follows: Research/ Doctoral, 11; Comprehensive, 100; Liberal Arts, 91, and Two-Year, 24. Over half of the institutions, or 120, are Neylan, with total enrollment representing 27% of all Catholic college and university enrollment. The enrollment of forty-three institutions was at least 85% women. Figure 1 compares the enrollment of these groups of institutions, both full and part-time. Specific statistics for this and other graphs are contained in an appendix to this report.

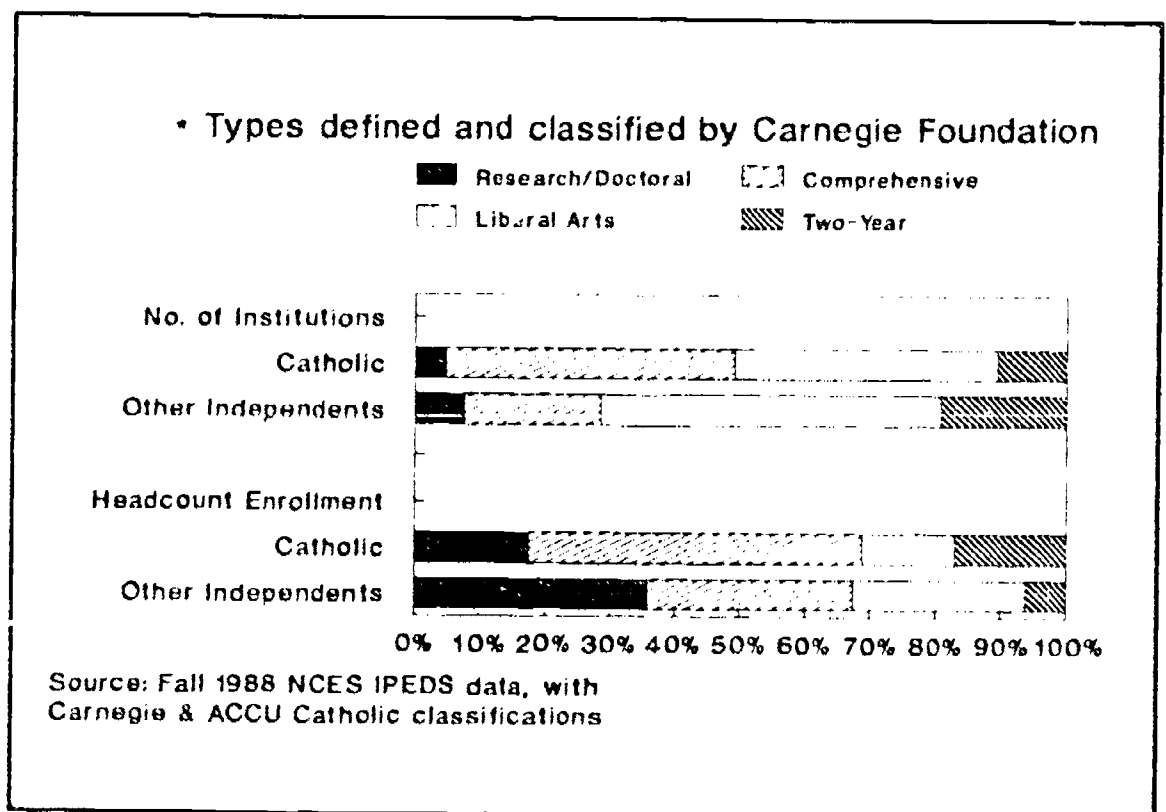
**Figure 1:

Comparisons of Carnegie Classified Institutions

The comparisons shown in Figure 2 reveal that Catholic institutions, in both number and headcount enrollment, are weighted more heavily toward Comprehensive institutions than other independent colleges and universities.

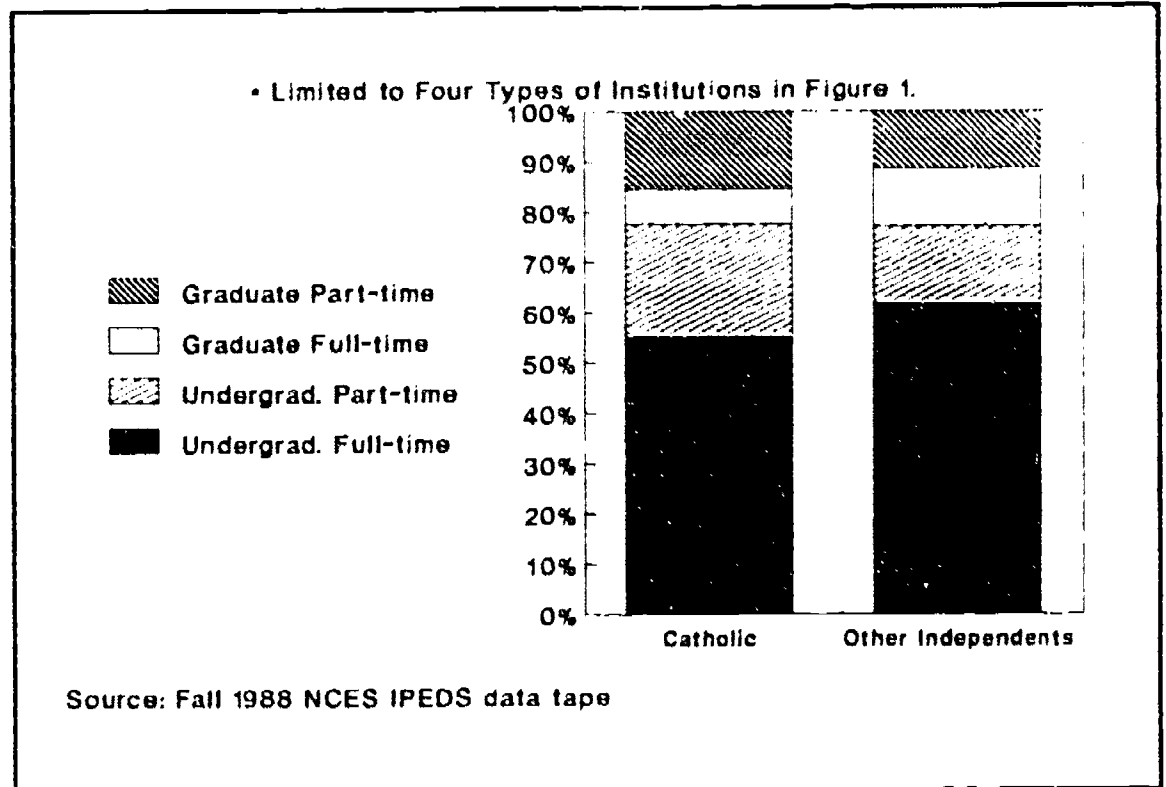
**Figure 2:

Other Independents, 1988***

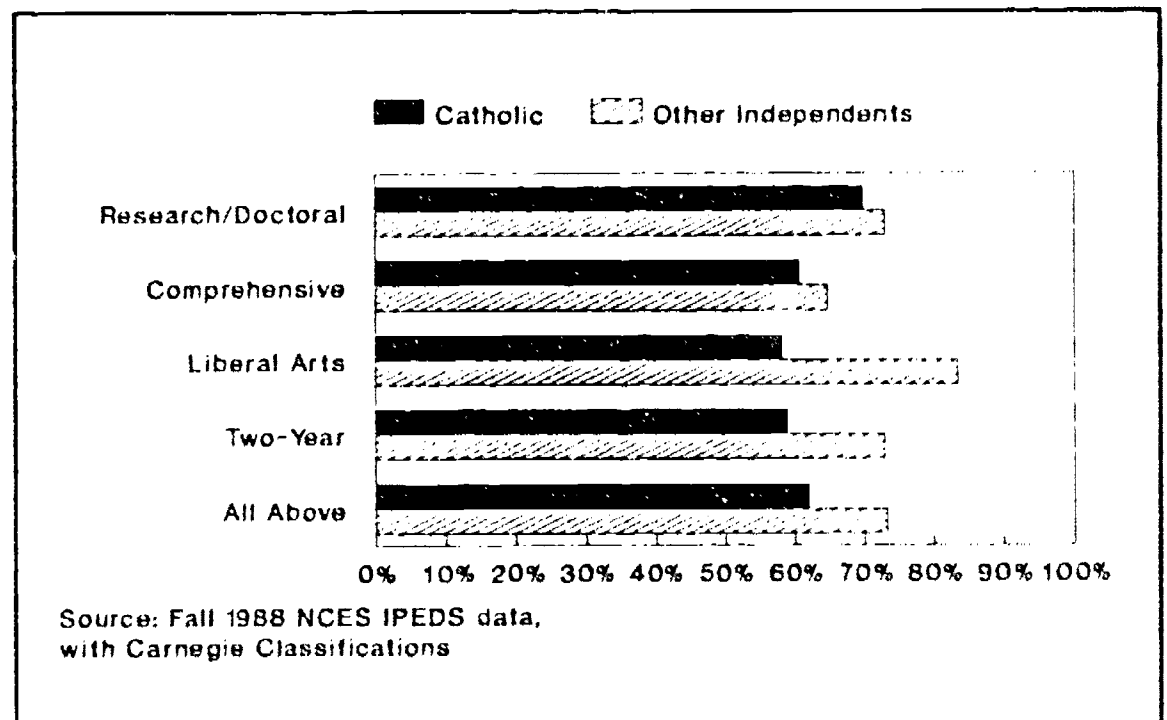
Figure 3 reveals that the total enrollment in Catholic colleges and universities includes slightly more undergraduates than graduates, and significantly more part-time than full-time students, when compared to other independent institutions.



Full-time Share by Carnegie Class:

Among Catholic Research/Doctoral universities, 70% of the students are full-time compared with 73% at other independent Research/ Doctoral universities. Likewise, the difference between the two groups of Comprehensive institutions is relatively small, with Catholic at 61% and Other Independents at 65%. However, only 58% of Catholic Liberal Arts college enrollment is full-time compared to 83% of Other Independent Liberal Arts institutions. The difference at the Two-Year level is also significant, with Catholic at 59% compared to Other Independents at 73%. Overall, there is an eleven percentage point difference between Catholic, 62% and Other Independents at 73%.

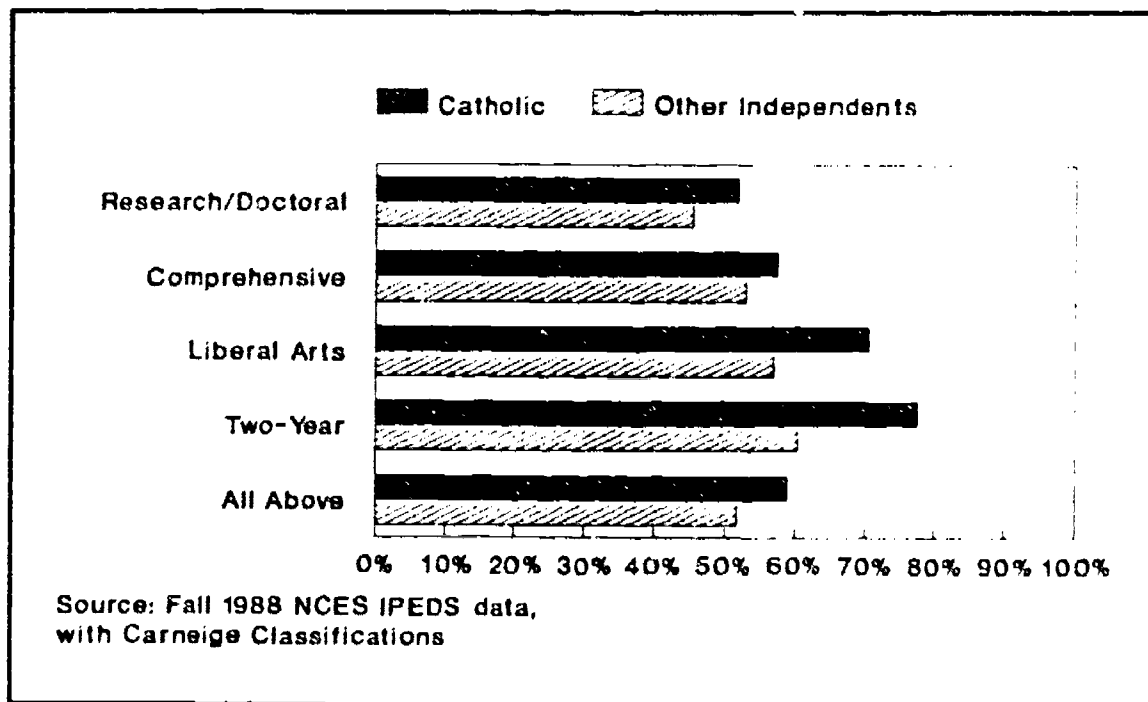
**Figure 4:

Women's Share of Enrollment

At both Catholic and Other Independent colleges and universities, women represent a greater proportion of enrollment than men. This phenomenon is more pronounced among Catholic institutions than at Other Independents. Overall, 59% of Catholic college and university students are women, while the corresponding share at Other Independents is 52%.

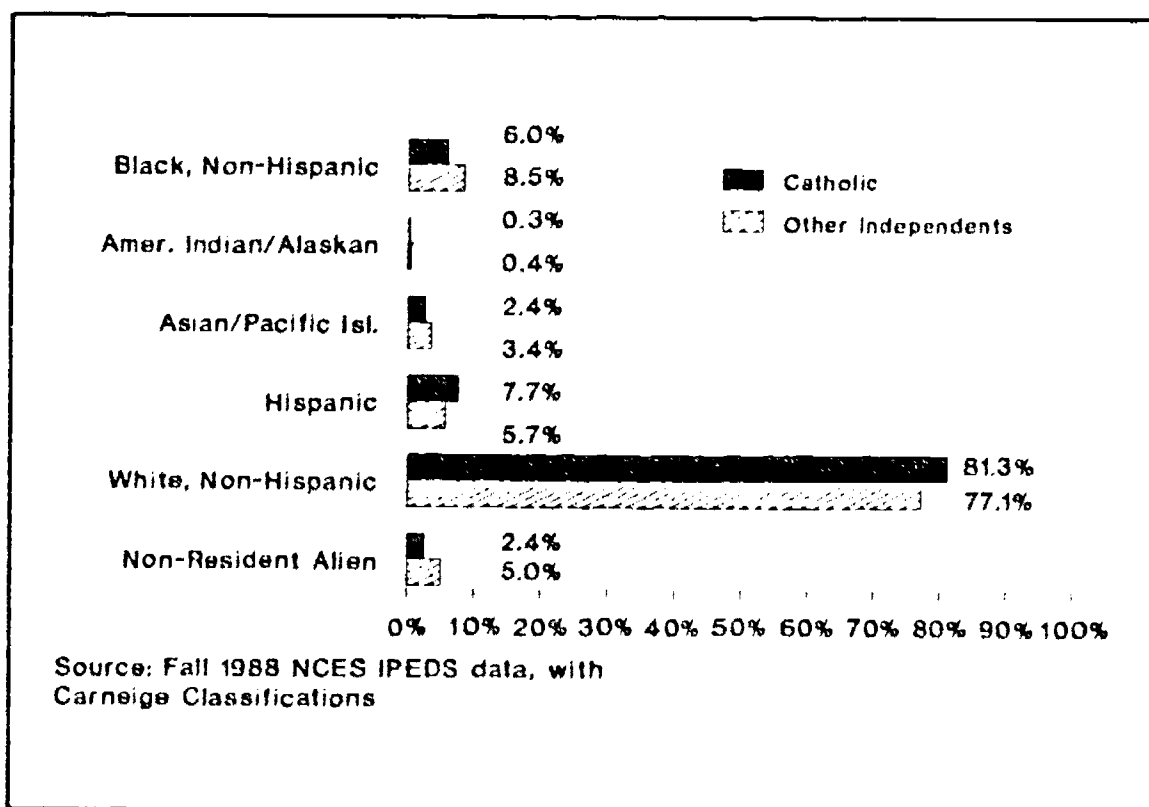

Race/Ethnicity and Citizenship

Catholic colleges and universities enroll comparatively fewer black (non-Hispanics), Asian and Pacific Islander, and American Indian and Alaskan Native than do Other Independents. Among U. S. citizens and resident aliens Catholic institutions enroll higher shares of Hispanics and whites, but their share of the non-resident aliens is only about half that of Other Independents. Almost half (48%) of the Hispanic enrollment in Catholic colleges and universities is at three Puerto Rican universities.

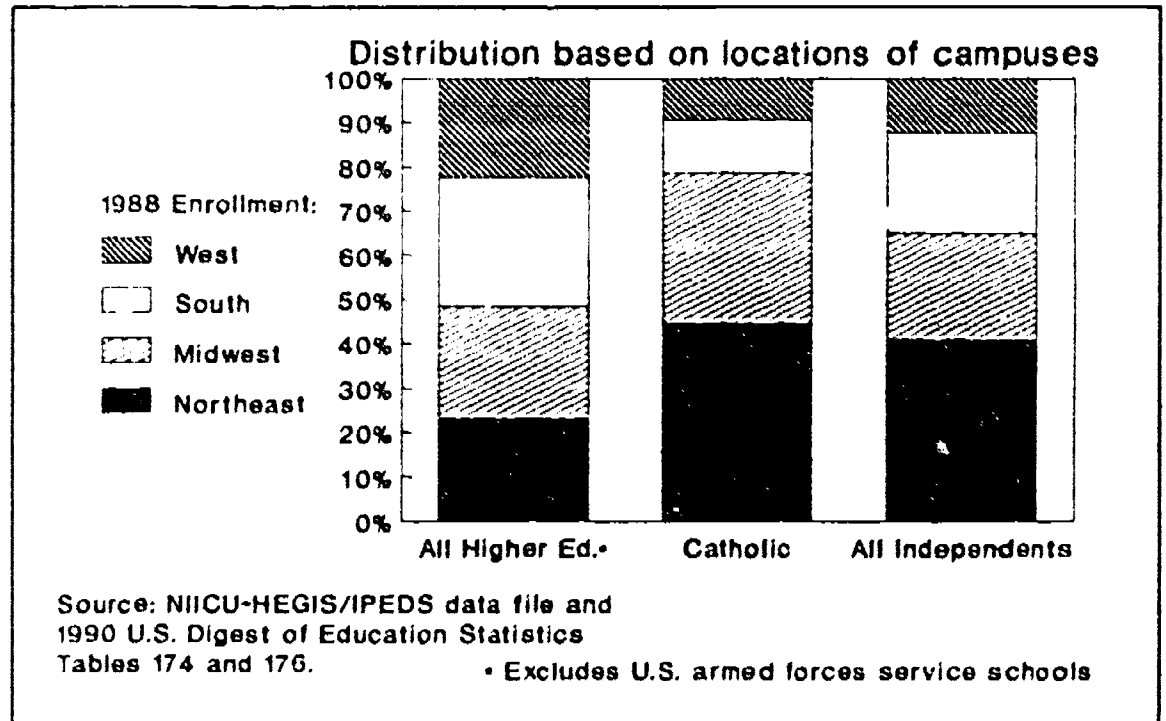
**Figure 6:

Geographic Distribution

The geographic distribution of colleges and universities undoubtedly influences the racial and ethnic composition of enrollment. Figure 7 reveals an almost equal split between the West, South, Midwest, and Northeast for all U.S. colleges and universities. Catholic and other independent institutions of higher education are much more heavily represented in the Northeast and Midwest, those regions with comparatively fewer minority residents.

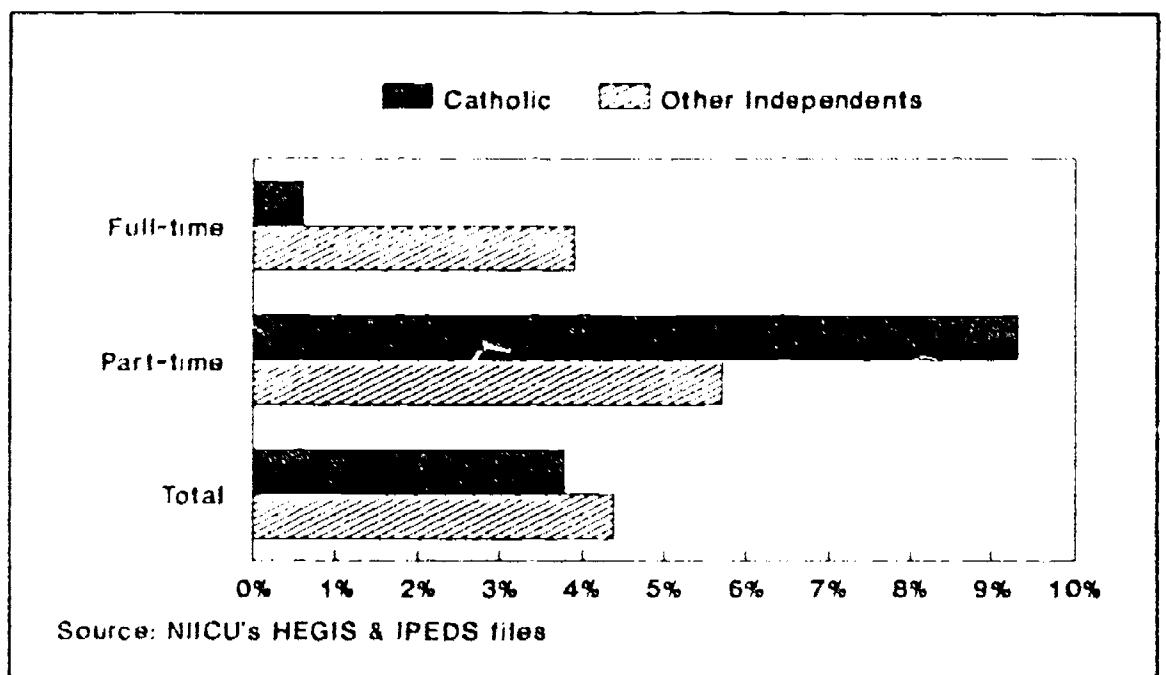
Figure 7:

Growth in Enrollment, 1982 to 1988

Since the fall of 1982, the growth in enrollment at Catholic colleges and universities has been almost entirely among part-time students while full-time enrollment at Other Independents climbed by almost four percent. Figure 8 compares the growth rates for the two groups of institutions for full- and part-time enrollment from 1982 to 1988. Unfortunately, the NIICU data-base does not include comparative data on full- and part-time enrollment prior to 1982. However, we know from earlier ACCU reports, that from 1970 to 1980, full-time enrollment grew by 16% at Catholic colleges and universities while part-time enrollment increased by 51%. From 1980 to 1988, comparable figures were 1% and 17%, respectively. Given the decline in the number of high-school graduates during this period, especially in the northeastern and midwestern regions of the country, these numbers reveal a measure of success.

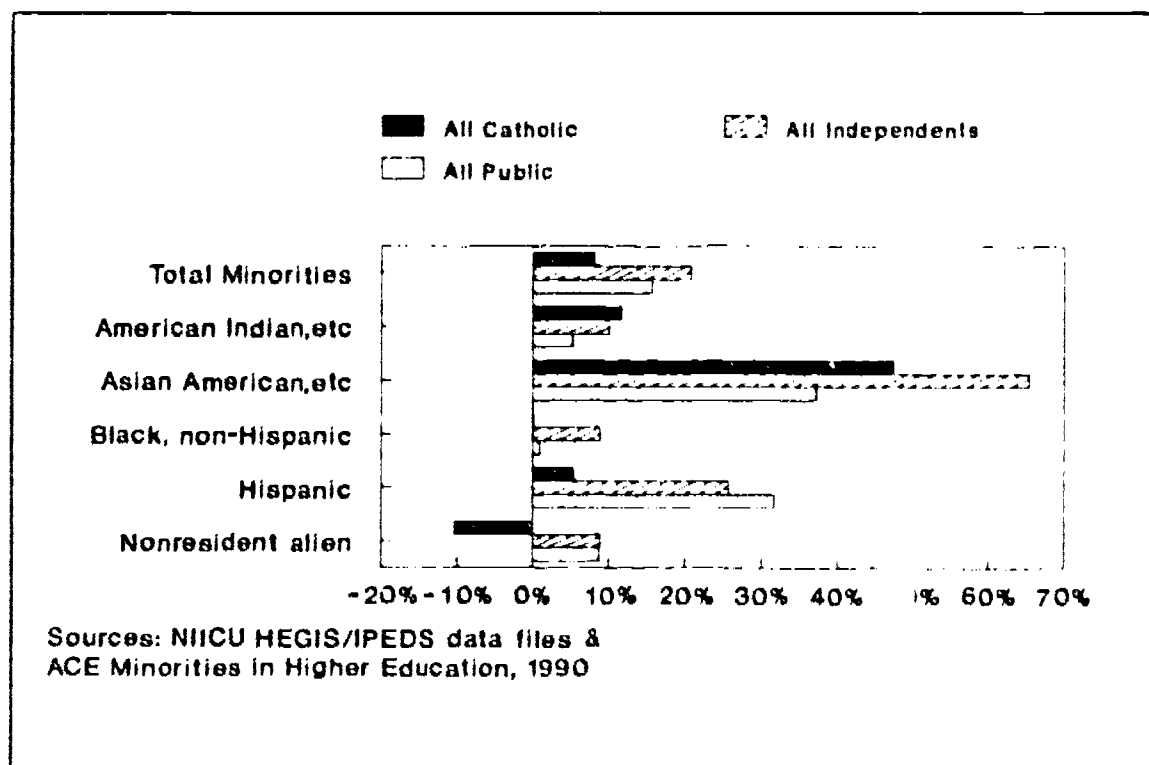

Change in Minority and Non-resident Alien Enrollment

The growth in minority student enrollment at Catholic colleges and universities from 1982 to 1988 was less than among either all independent or all public institutions. The only exception to this statement among individual groups was for American Indians and Alaskan natives, where the growth at Catholic institutions was slightly higher than for all independents. There was virtually no growth during the period among black, non-Hispanic students at Catholic colleges and universities. While Hispanic enrollment grew by 5% at Catholic institutions, it grew by 26% at all independents and 32% at all publics. In terms of citizenship, the enrollment of non-resident aliens declined by 10% at Catholic institutions.

Change in Minority & Non-Resident Alien Headcount Enrollment, Fall Terms 1982-88**



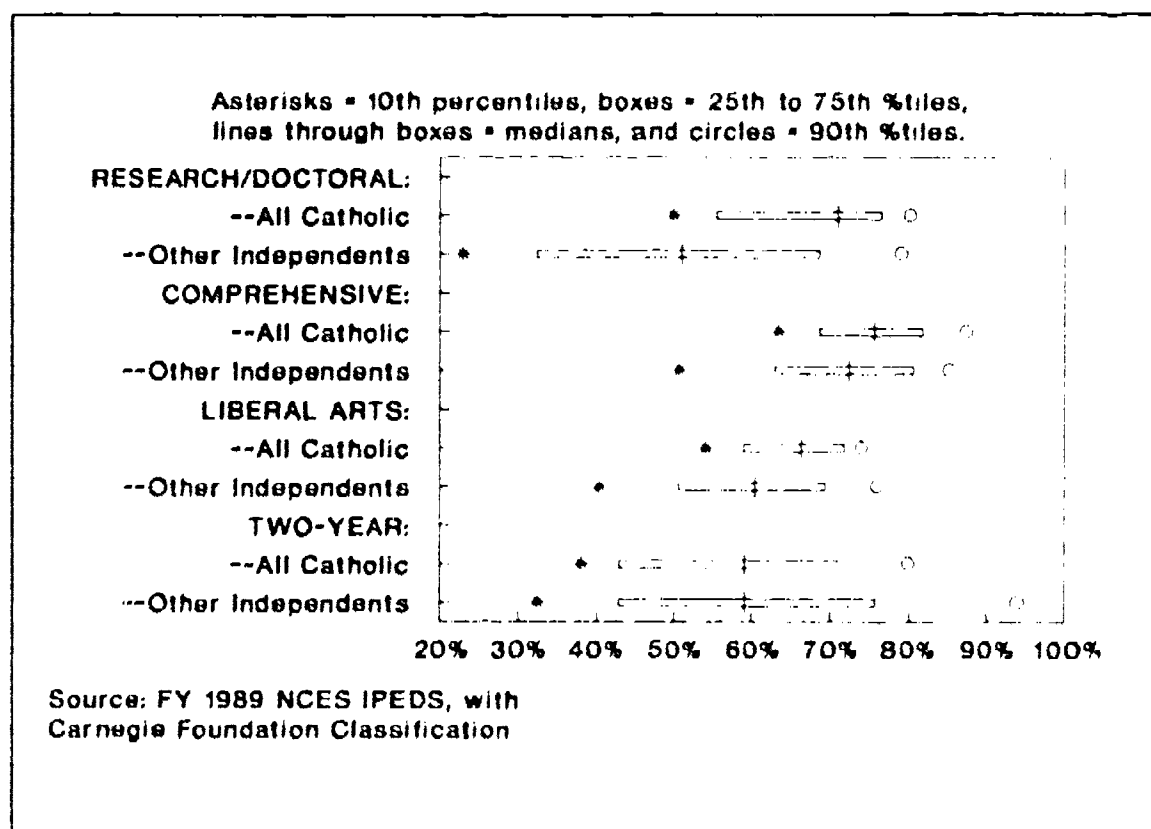
Finances at Catholic & Other Independent Colleges & Universities

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1988, 206 Catholic and 717 other independent colleges and universities in the four Carnegie classes responded to the IPEDS survey. This report examines various ratios calculated from these responses for the two groups of institutions, each sub-divided by Carnegie classifications. In the several graphs contained on the following pages, the ratios for each group have been described by five percentile numbers: 10th, 25th, the median, 75th, and 90th. The 10th percentiles are represented by asterisks, the 25th to the 75th by narrow horizontal boxes with the 25th percentile value at the left-end of the boxes and the 75th at the right-end. Medians are shown as vertical lines through the boxes, and the 90th percentiles are circles. The ratios themselves are contained in the statistical appendix to the report. One of the reasons for providing the percentiles is to facilitate use of the information by administrators and faculty at individual colleges and universities, using institutional responses to the IPEDS survey.

Dependence on Tuition and Fees

Catholic colleges and universities are more dependent on tuition and fees than are other independents, with the exception of two-year colleges.

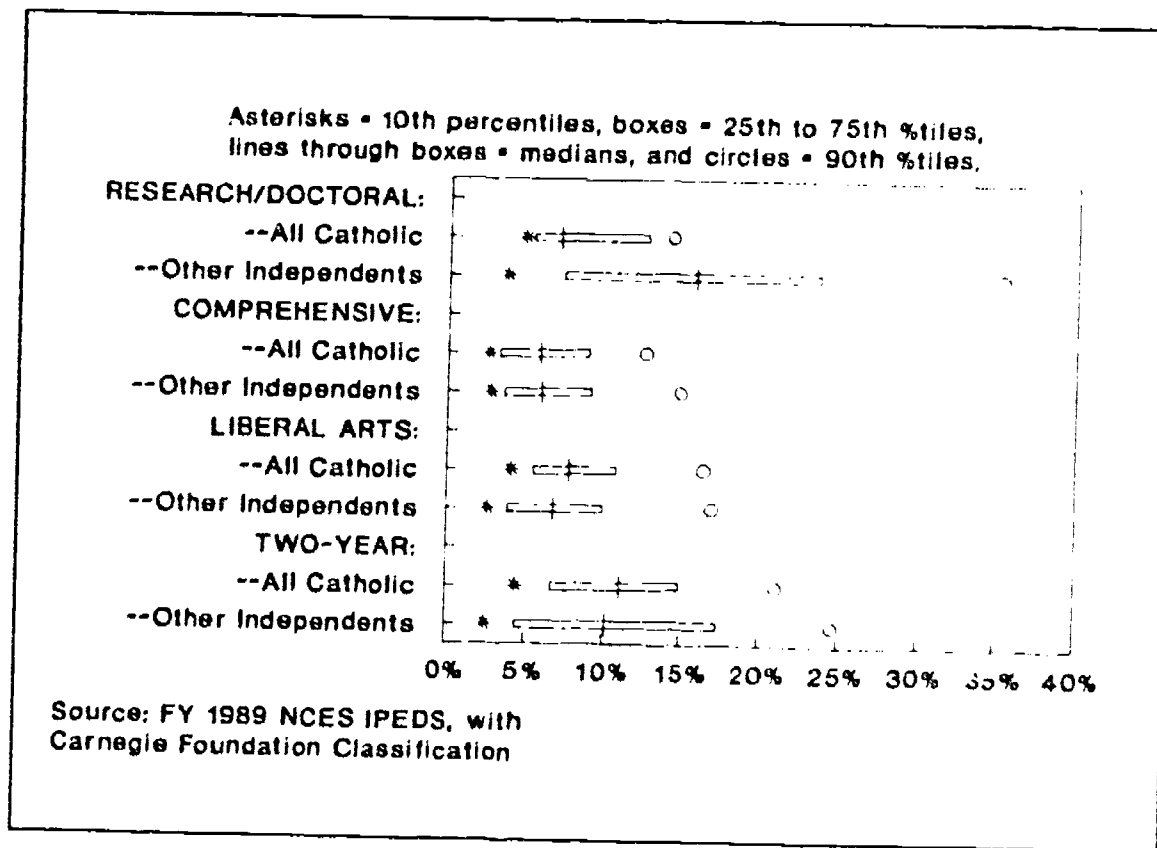
**Figure 10:

Federal Grants and Contracts

The major difference between Catholic and other independents in the level of federal grants and contracts is among Research/Doctoral universities. This difference is reflected in the fact that no Catholic universities are classified as Research I by Carnegie, only one is classified Research II, and the rest are either Doctoral I or II. The bulk of federal grants for other types of colleges and universities is for scholarships and work-study funds.

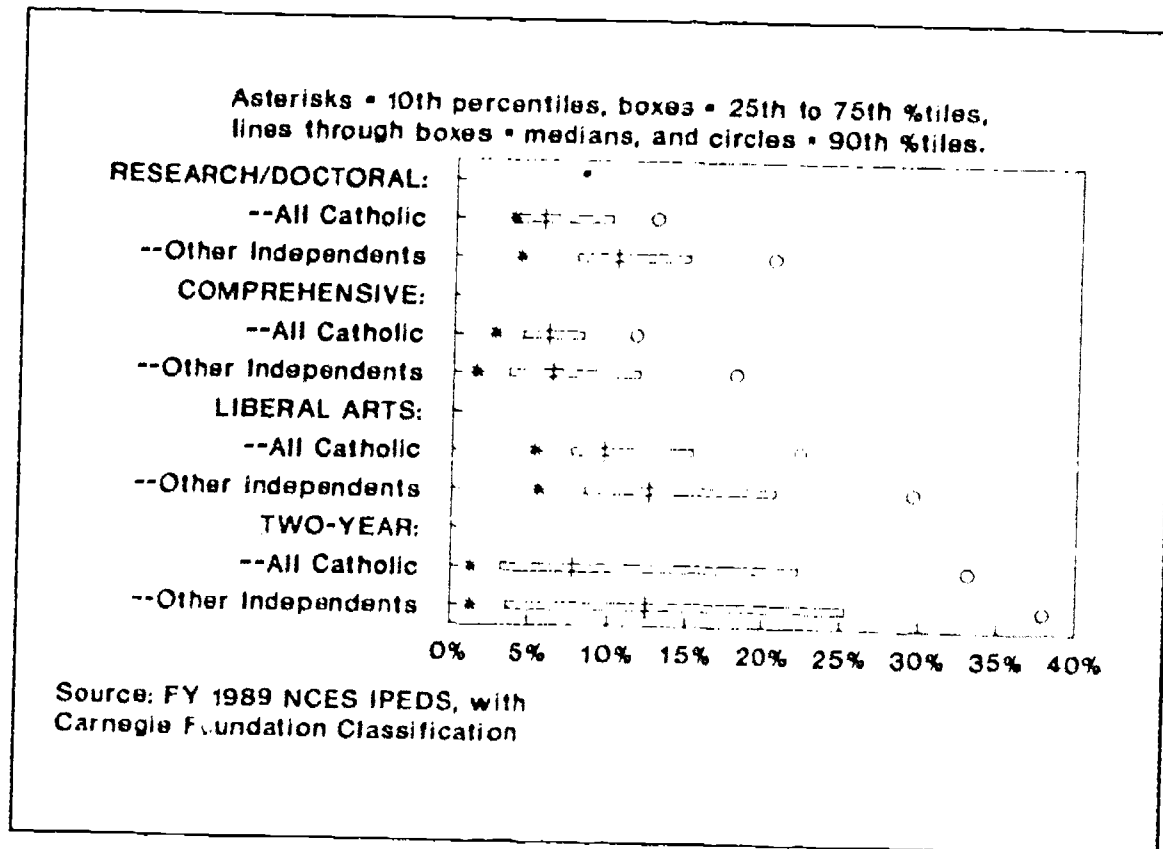

Private Gifts and Grants

Figure 12 underscores that Catholic colleges and universities receive comparatively less in private gifts and grants than other independents. It also shows how much variation there is among the various groups of institutions.

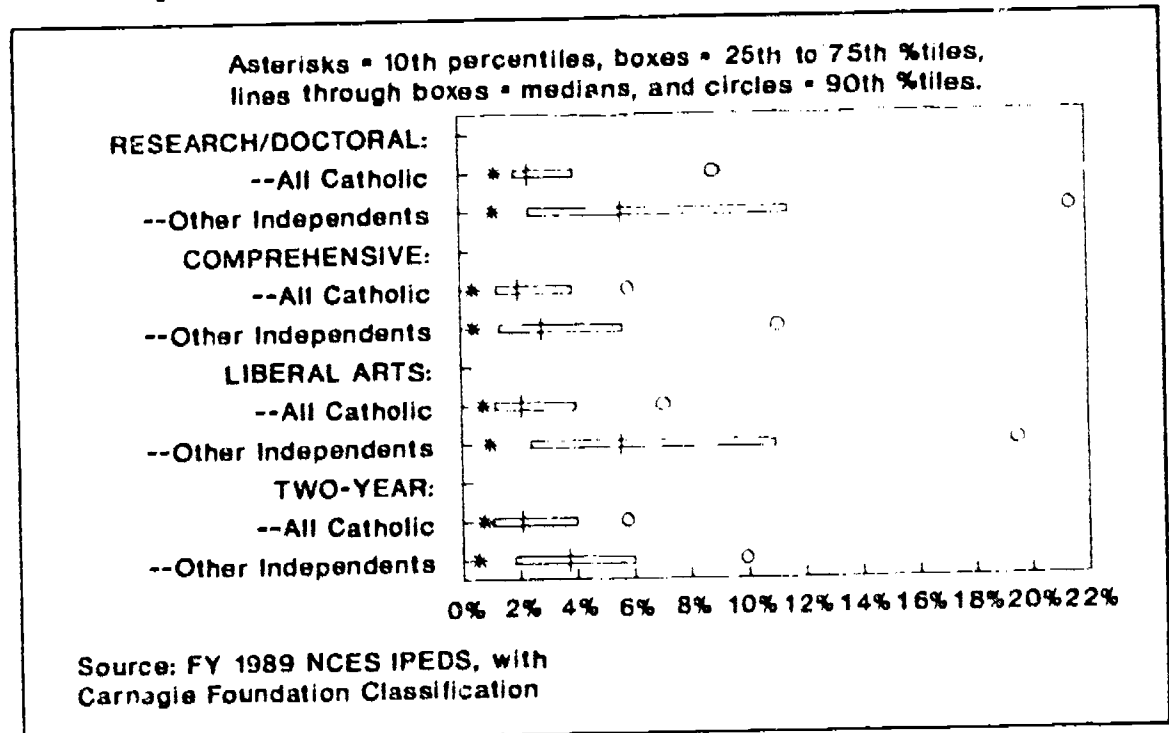
Figure 12:

Endowment Income

As would be expected, the lower levels of current gifts to Catholic higher education are compounded by lower levels of endowment income. The lower levels of current gifts and endowment income are a major cause for the higher dependence on tuition and fee income noted earlier and the low levels of scholarships which will be shown in two later graphs.

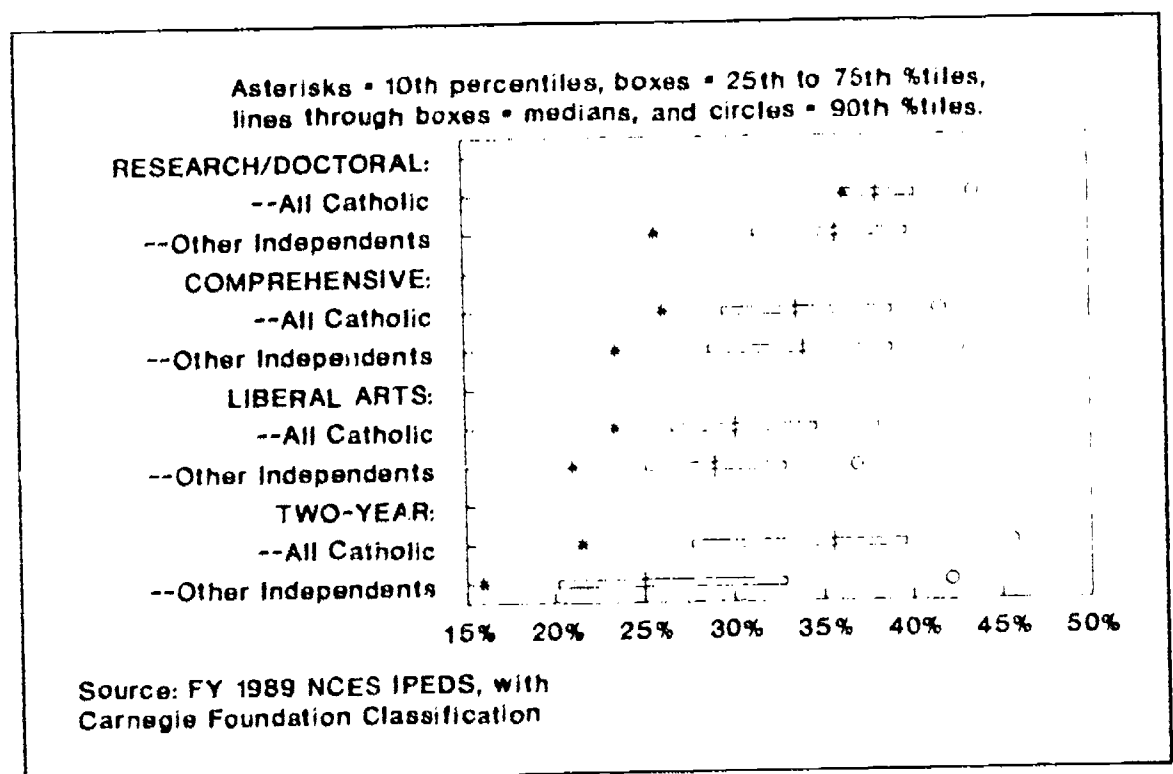

Instruction Expenses

Ratios of most categories of expenditures should be reviewed with a degree of skepticism. Previous studies and discussions with higher education auditors have shown that expenditures are not always correctly and consistently classified. While greater reliance can be placed on total educational and general expenditures and transfers (Part B, line 12 in the IPEDS survey) and scholarship expenditures (Part B, line 9 and Part E), the same cannot be said for other categories of expenses. However, given the interest in these categories, the following graphs are provided. Figure 14 shows that Catholic Research and Doctoral universities and Liberal Arts and Two-Year colleges spend a greater portion of their total educational and general expenditures and transfers on instruction than do other independents. The ratios for the two groups of comprehensive universities are fairly similar.

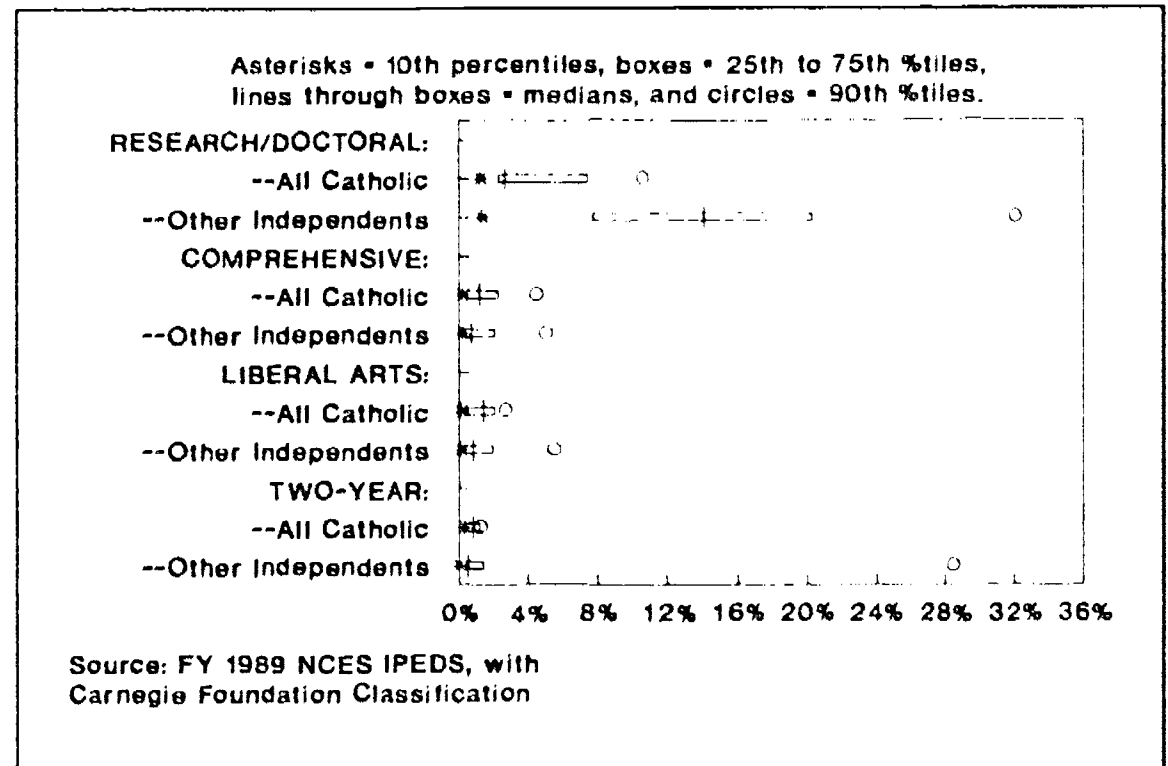
Figure 14:

Research Expenses

Figure 15 reflects the lower level of federal funding for Catholic, Research and Doctoral universities outlined in Figure 11. The unusually high 90th percentile number for Two-Year other independents may well reflect incorrectly classified expenses.

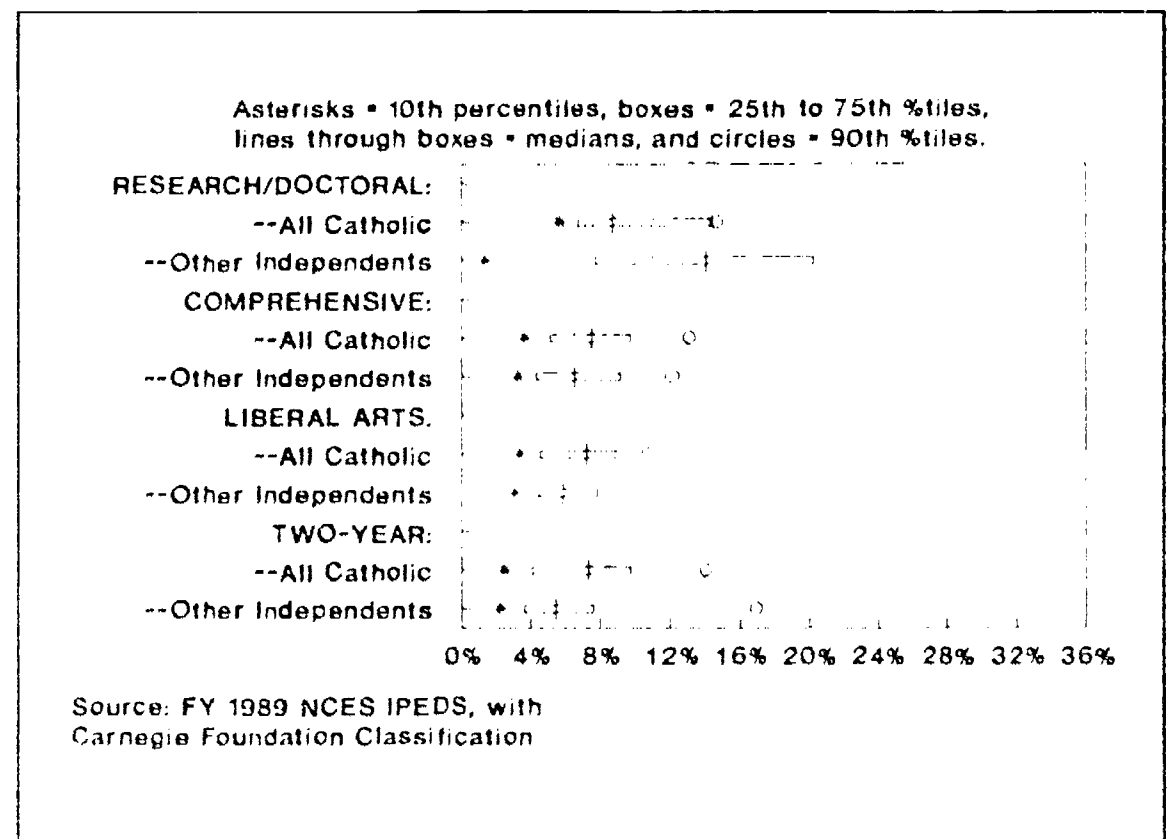
**Figure 15:

Academic Support Expenses

The higher levels of academic support expenditures at other Research/Doctoral independents is probably caused by higher library expenditures and other academic support for research conducted at these institutions. The reverse relationship with higher proportions spent on academic support at Catholic institutions may be caused, at least in part, by the smaller size of these institutions. (See further comments and data on page 12, under Institutional Support section.)

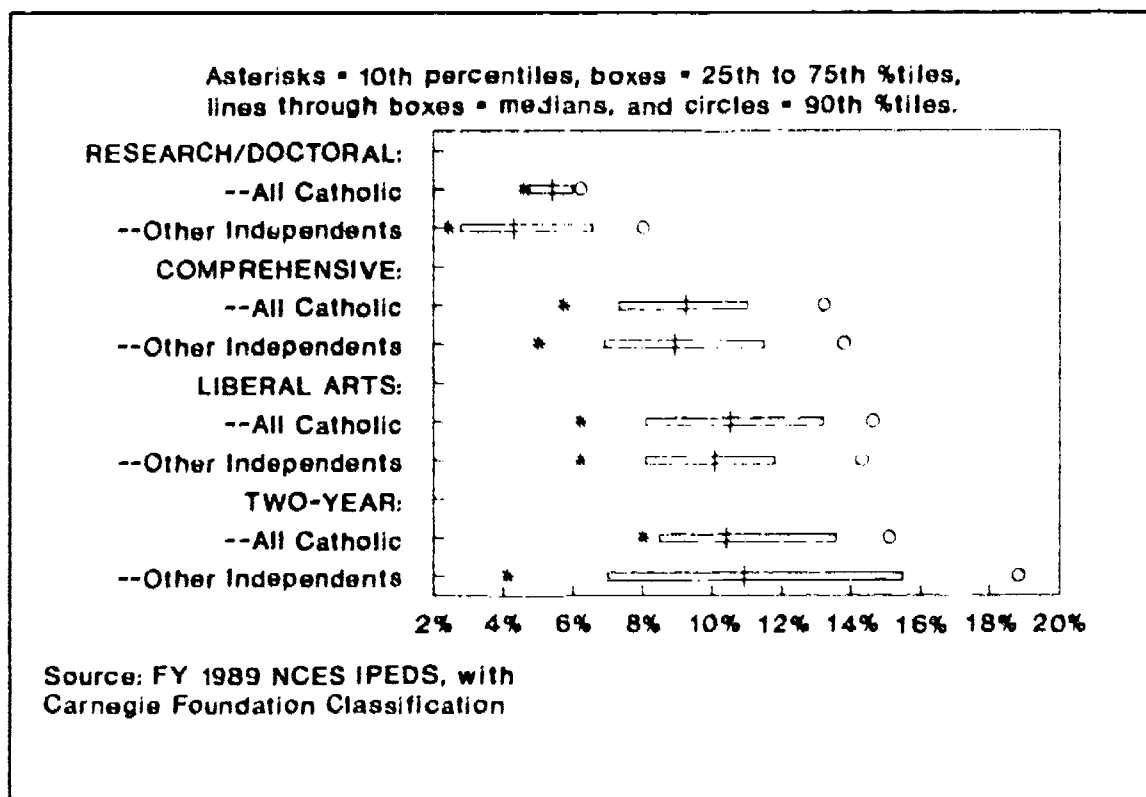
**Figure 16:

Student Services Expenses

The median shares of total Educational and General expenditures and Transfers spent on student services appear to be fairly similar within the different groups. However, as with all expense categories, the ranges within the different groups are quite large.

Student Services Expenses as Percentage of Education and General Expenditures

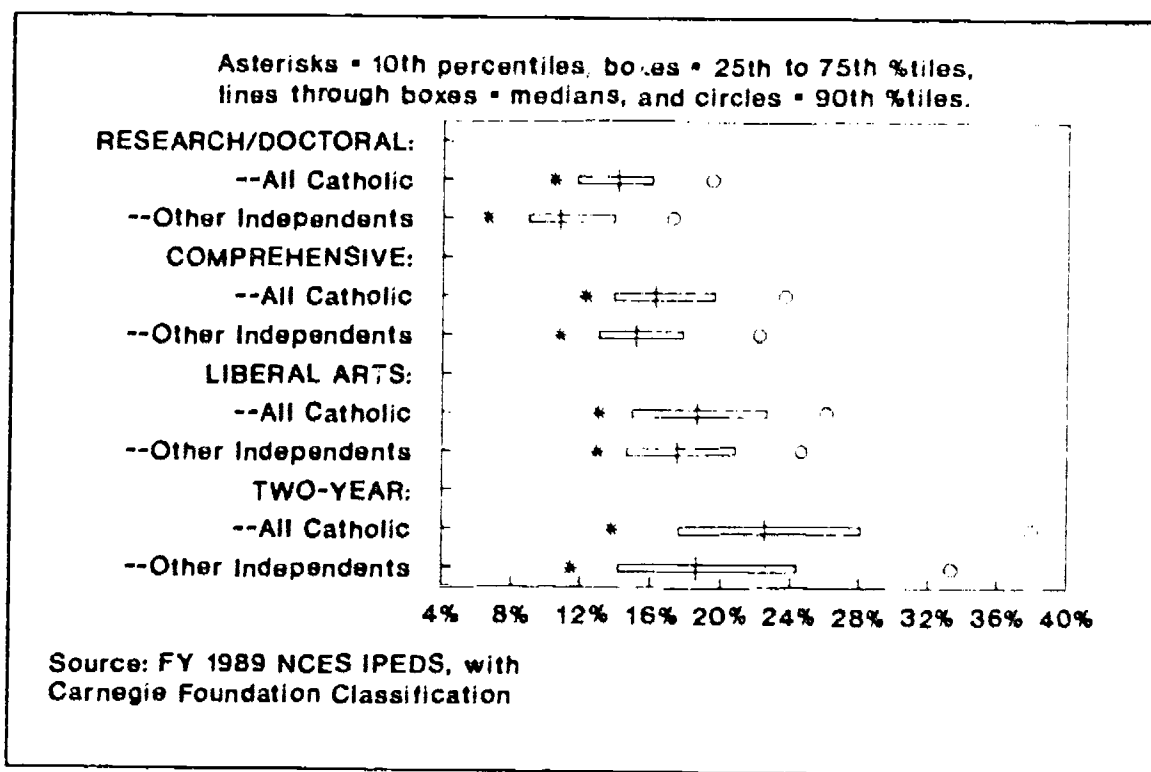


Institutional Support Expenses

Figure 18 reveals that the portion of budgets spent on institutional support expenses is higher at Catholic colleges and universities. As least a partial explanation for these differences, and those for academic support and student services, may be the smaller size of the Catholic institutions. The table below shows the different median total educational and general expenditures and transfers:

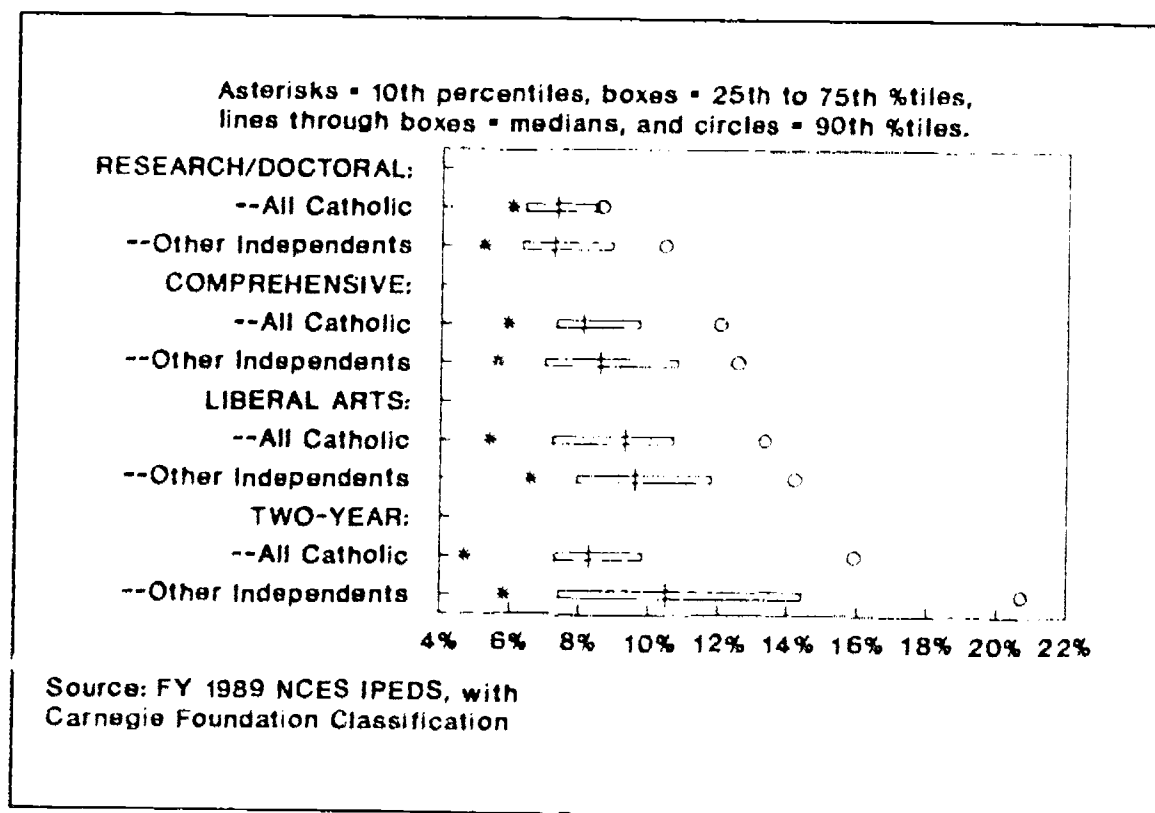

**Operation and
Maintenance of Plant**

The comparison of Catholic and Other Independents regarding expenditures for operation and maintenance of physical plant does not reveal significant differences between the various groups. The small sizes of the Two-Year institutions may account for the wide variation at the top end of the percentiles.

Expenditures**

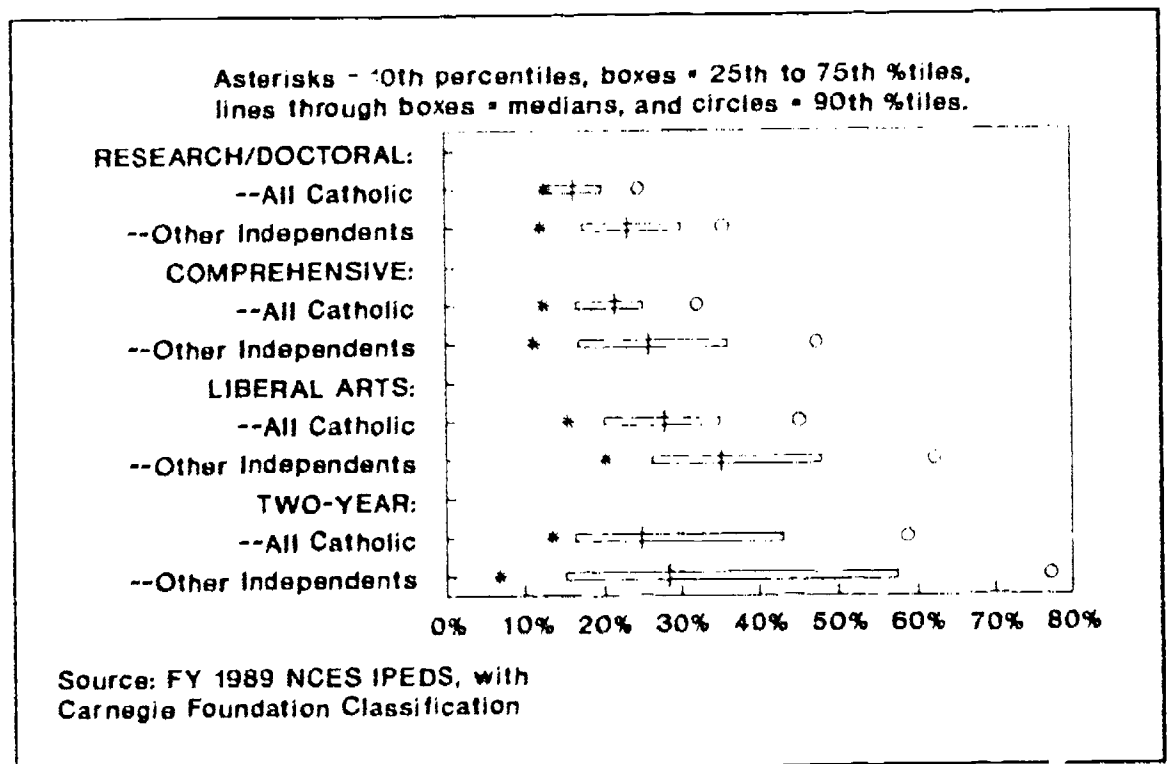


All Scholarships as a Percentage of Total Tuition and Fee Income

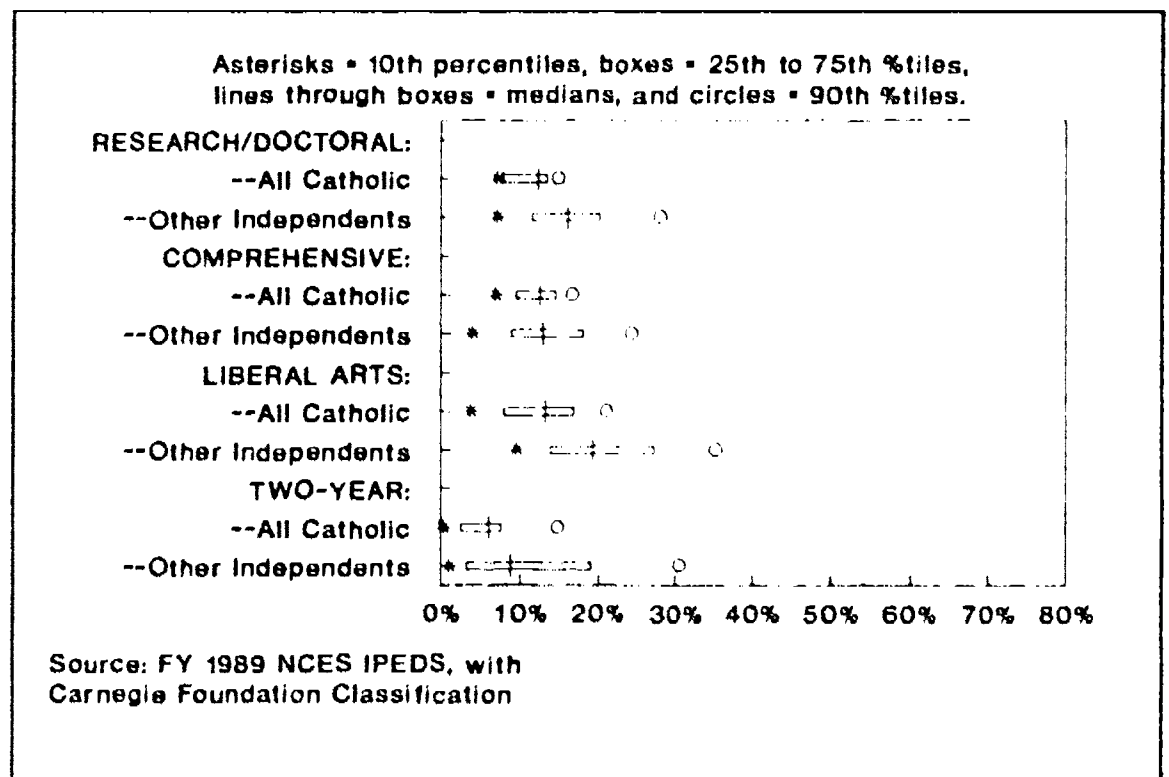
Scholarships to colleges and universities are either funded by sources outside institutions or from gifts to, or endowment income of, the institution. Figures 20 and 21 have been drawn according to the same scale to underscore the differences between all scholarships and those awarded from institutional accounts. It is important to note that colleges and universities award both funded and unfunded institutional scholarships. The former are funded by gifts and endowment income, while the latter are essentially "discounts" to the institution's tuition rate. In the table below, the first figure in each category is the total of institutional scholarships as a percentage of total tuition and fee income at the median institution. The numbers within the parentheses are the portions of tuition and fee income awarded from unrestricted institutional sources. The differences in the two numbers represent institutional funds restricted to scholarships. Except for unrestricted gifts and endowment income allocated to scholarships, the numbers within the parentheses represent tuition "discounts."

All Scholarships as a Percentage of Total Tuition and Fee Income



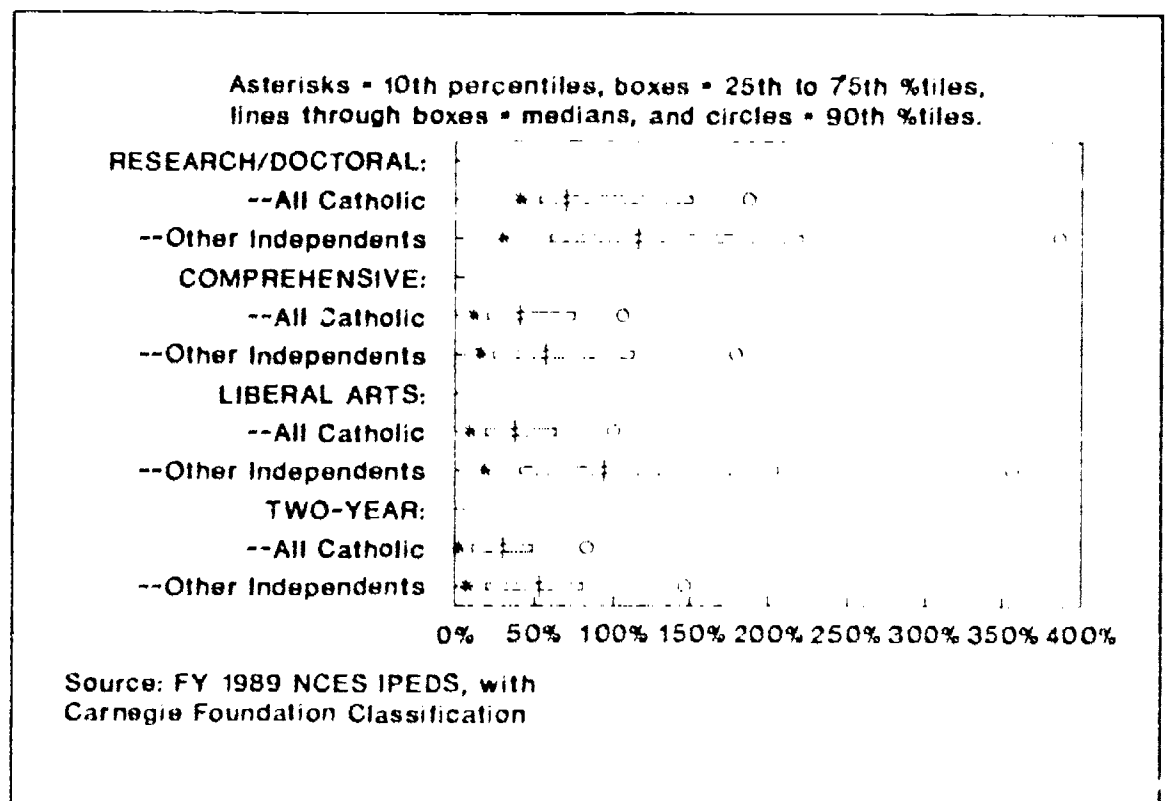

As would be expected from the earlier discussion of endowment income, the market values of endowments as a percentage of educational and general expenses at Catholic colleges and universities are below those of other independents. Perhaps the most notable point in Figure 22 is the wide difference in ranges between the "haves" and "have-nots" in the various categories.

Plant Debt as a Percentage of Endowment

There are also great differences in the range of relationships between plant debt and endowment. Most of the higher-end variation, especially for the comprehensive universities, liberal arts and two-year colleges, can be accounted for by low endowment levels. Figure 23 clearly shows that the debt of most Catholic four-year colleges and universities is supported by less endowment than that of comparable independent colleges. Data in Figure 24, on the following page, confirms this conclusion by revealing that for both categories of universities and for liberal arts colleges debt as a percentage of the current replacement value of physical plant, the middle two quartiles and medians (the boxes and vertical lines) of the Catholic and other independent institutions, is remarkably similar.

Physical Plant Debt as Percentage of End-of-Year Endowment at Market Value

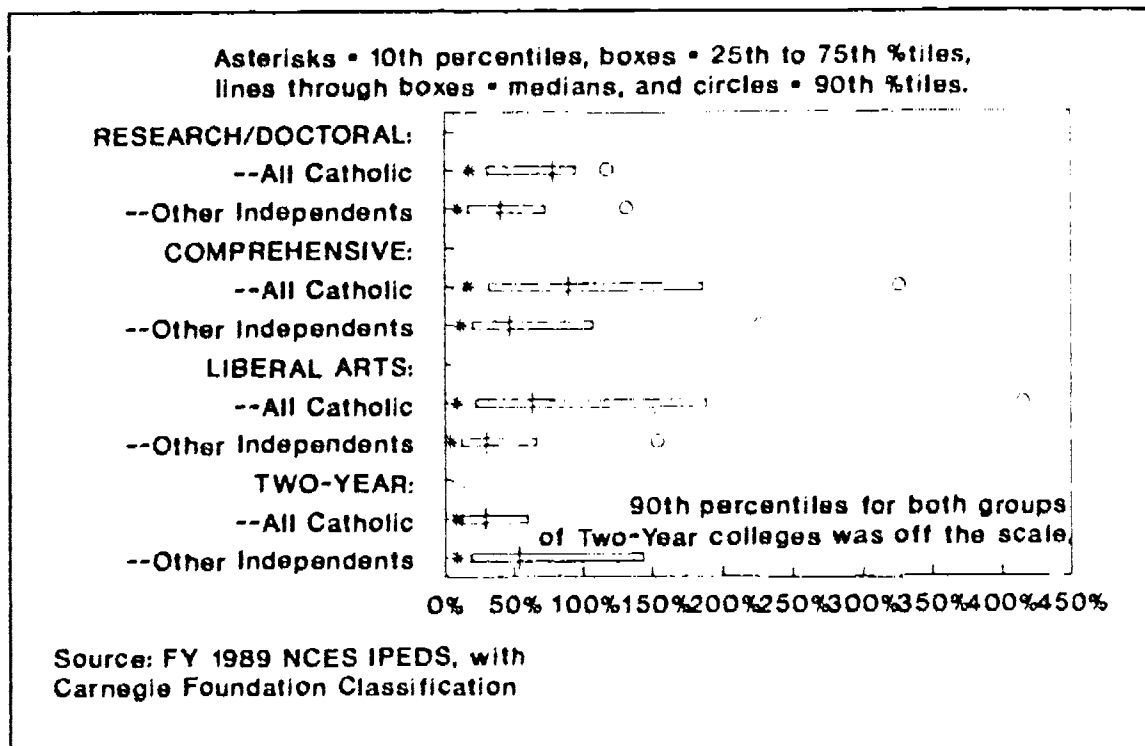
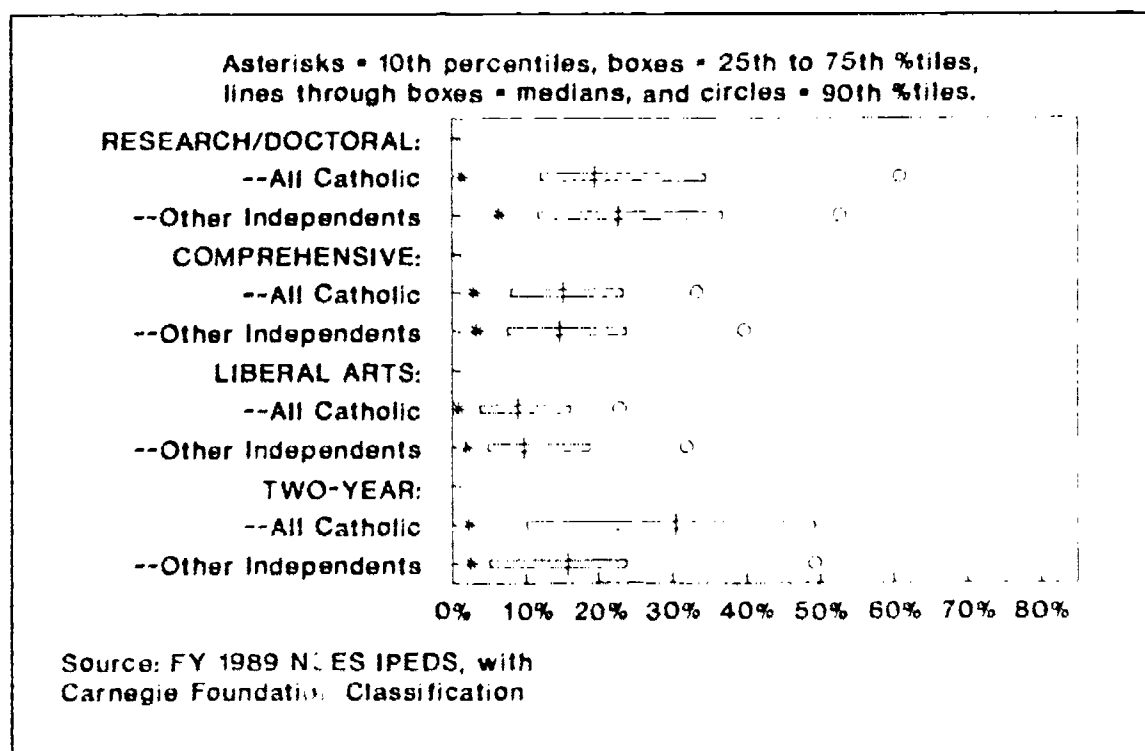


Figure 24:

Conclusions

The data examined in this report reveal that compared to other independent colleges and universities, Catholic colleges and universities generally:

- Are made up of a higher proportion of comprehensive universities, both in number and enrollment.
- Enroll higher percentages of part-time and women students.
- Enroll lower percentages of black, Asian and Pacific Islanders, and non-resident alien students.
- Enroll more Hispanic students, but almost half of these are in three Puerto Rican universities.
- Are located predominantly in the northeast and mid-west regions of the country.
- Had stable full-time enrollment, with growth concentrated among part-time students.
- Had no growth in black students and suffered a decline among non-resident alien students.
- Depend more heavily on tuition and fee income and physical plant debt.
- Covered a lower portion of expenses with federal grants and contracts, current private gifts, and endowment income.
- Award less scholarship money as a percentage of tuition and fee income than do other independent colleges and universities, including scholarships from unrestricted accounts.
- Incur the same level of plant debt as a share of plant replacement value as other independents, but support this debt with less endowment.

Responses of individual colleges and universities can be compared to the detailed statistics provided in the appendix.
