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## ABSTRACT

This annotated directory of existing databases, both online and print, is designed to assist in identifying available technology products for use in special education. The first section describes eight commercial software products with a special education focus, such as the "Closing the Gap Resource Directory" and "Software To Go." The second section lists five commercial software products with a regular education focus, such as "Only the Best" and the "Software Preview Guide." The third section lists five databases that contain public domain software and have a special education focus, including "Software for Special Populations" and "Tell'em Ware." The database descriptions in these three sections indicate the name and address of the producing organization, populations targeted by the database, cost for using the database, and access to the database, and include a paragraph-length description. The last section lists five newsletters and journals that contain evaluative reviews of software, such as "The Computing Teacher" and "Special Education Software Review." (JDD)

# Preface

The Center for Special Education Technology at The Council for Exceptional Children is a national information center funded by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs. The Center's broad goals are to influence the quality, availability, and use of technology in special education through information. To that end, the Center provides a range of information services and activities for educators, developers, and publishers.

In response to expressed information needs, the Center has compiled this annotated directory of existing databases, both on-line and print, to assist you in identifying available products. This directory contains a level of detail not currently found in other directories and frequently not described in general database descriptions from the database source. The purpose for attending to this level of detail is to assist you in locating the data source that best meets your information needs, making your search for software information more efficient and effective.

The software databases are organized with commercial software in the first and second sections. Those databases with a special education focus are listed first, followed by those used in regular education. Much of the software used in regular education can be used for special education if it is modified. For example, a structured worksheet might outline steps in working with the software. Section III lists software databases that contain public domain software and have a special education focus. The databases listed in this directory are not intended to be all inclusive, but should give a starting point for selecting appropriate instructional software.

The last section lists newsletters and journals that contain reviews of software. These reviews contain a rating or an evaluation of the software pieces, as well as having a special education orientation.

This annotated directory is one software information product that has been developed by the Center. Other products developed that are currently available from the Center are:
