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ABSTRACT

This directory summarizes the main features of federal programs that provide money or other economic assistance for child care or the child care profession. For each program, the following information is provided: (1) the program title; (2) a contact person; (3) purposes and restrictions of the program; (4) the legislation that authorized the program; (5) the title or part of the U.S. Code of Federal Regulations that is devoted to the program's governing regulations; (6) the amount of funding appropriated; (7) the percentage of funding that must be supplied from state or local sources; and (8) the number of children served by the program. The first part of the directory lists 23 programs that reduce family expenses for child care services. The second part describes 27 special-purpose support programs (numbered 24-50) relating to specific expenses, such as administrative overhead, training costs, and food costs. This part is divided into four sections, covering resource and referral, provider training, nutrition, and miscellaneous programs. The third part of the directory lists 10 programs (numbered 51-60) that provide in-kind benefits, expanded entitlements, and tax relief. (BC)

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# DIRECTORY OF FEDERAL PROGRAMS HELPING CHILD CARE

"Direct funding for early child care and education has had a categorical approach, rather than a policy approach. There is a plethora of programs. As a result, turf issues use much of the energy of the non-system, and specialized administrators seldom have an overview of the whole, usually overestimating demand for their programs. It is difficult to combine funds or to provide continuity for families as their eligibility changes."<sup>2</sup>

This table is an attempt to summarize briefly the main features of each of the Federal programs that provides money or other economic assistance for child care or to the child care profession. The first part relates to the reduction of family expenses for child care services themselves, the second part relates to specific expenses such as administrative overhead, training, food, etc., and the third part relates to in-kind benefits, expanded entitlements, and tax relief. Many of the programs listed do not have funding for additional grantees in the current year. If you want information about a program involving grants to States, consult the appropriate agency of your State government.
