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ABSTRACT

This survey of the current status of public school libraries in Maine was intended to provide statistical data as a basis for improving the school library media center program in these schools. Information was gathered that detailed how resources and delivery of services differed across grade level; across variation in size of school; between schools with and without a certified school library media specialist; and across the state's three library districts. Responses were received from less than 30 schools in each of 4 reporting divisions, including secondary and junior high/middle schools without certified librarians, and secondary schools and junior high/middle schools with part-time certified librarians. This report contains background information and the terminology used in the survey; highlights of the survey; a summary c 13 key findings; and 11 appendices, including charts comparing seven key characteristics (e.g., school size, student population, and staffing); a description of the study methodology; survey forms; survey results and details for each question; and the standard deviations and ranges for selected questions. Data tables make up the major part of this report. (MAB)



BACKGROUND

The survey's goal was to provide data on the status of public school libraries in Maine. Information was sought that detailed how resources and delivery of services differed:

- across grade level
- across variation in size of school
- between schools with and without a certified school library media specialist
- across the state's three library districts

The survey distributed in January 1990 was actually six different questionnaires and a check-off form for on-site visits. A mass survey was mailed to all 730 public schools serving grades K-12 (excluding regional vocational centers). A more in-depth study was done of 150 schools, 20% of Maine's public schools which were randomly selected after all schools were stratified by size, type, library district, and access to media specialist. Each of these randomly selected schools had questionnaires for the principal, two randomly selected teachers, the students of these teachers if they were 4th graders or older, the school librarian, and the town's public librarian. One hundred and thirty-eight schools were visited by 143 volunteers. (Nine of the 150 randomly selected schools reported having no school library and were not visited.) Each volunteer had check-off forms to record copyright dates for math and science books, to note school library ownership of specific book titles randomly selected from the American Library Association's notable book lists for 1970-1988, and data on the diversity and availability of resources about Maine. Return rates for the six different questionnaires and on-site check-off forms ranged from a high of 98% for the volunteer forms to a low of 85% for the principals' opinion survey forms.

Because of the massive amount of information from the six questionnaires and volunteer on-site check-off forms and because of limitations of staff and volunteer time, statistical analysis was limited to means. Ranges and standard deviations were reported for only a few number of key questions. Researchers and interested individuals are invited to do a more thorough statistical analysis of the many individual survey questions.

There were less than thirty schools in each of four reporting divisions. These included secondary and junior high/middle schools without certified librarians and secondary schools and jr. high/middle schools with part-time certified librarians. Smaller numbers tend to distort averages, and results may be subject to variability.

TERMINOLOGY AS USED IN THIS REPORT

Certified school library media specialist (cslms), certified librarian, media specialist, and school librarian are used interchangeably in this report. They all refer to a person certified by the Maine Department of Education to serve as a school library media specialist for grades K-12.

Part-time certified librarian refers to a certified school librarian who provides at least one hour and fewer than thirty hours of service per week to a school.

School library and media center are used interchangeably.

Combined school has both elementary and secondary students.

Middle school, in general, as used by the Maine Department of Education, is a school serving 5th-8th grade students.

The Maine Regional Library System has three districts:

Northeastern Maine Library District (NMLD) covers Aroostook, Hancock, Knox, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Waldo and Washington Counties.

Central Maine Library District (CMLD) covers Androscoggin, Franklin, Lincoln, Kennebec, Oxford, Sagadahoc, and Somerset Counties.

Southern Maine Library District (SMLD) covers Cumberland and York Counties.

HIGHLIGHTS


- Although most Maine public schools reported that they have a library media center, the extent of the resources varied greatly from school to school. Almost all senior and junior high/middle schools appeared to have some degree of an organized system. However, ten percent of Maine public schools surveyed reported having no school library. Almost all of these schools lacking a library media center were elementary.
- The majority of all schools surveyed (51%), though they reported having a library, had fewer than 35 staff hours per week; 45% were open fewer than 30 hours; 43% did not report having a planned year-to-year library skills curriculum; and 56% were not headed by a full or part-time certified librarian. Almost one-third (32%) of Maine public school children were in schools without any services from a certified library media specialist. In general, these were elementary students. Twenty-five percent of the elementary schools which reported having a library but no certified librarian had no card catalog, and therefore, there was no standard way to locate resources. One-third of the elementary school libraries shared a library staff person with one or more additional schools.
- One of the most difficult survey questions to answer and interpret was "Does the school have a physical space designated as a library media center?" Are unorganized bookshelves in an alcove off the principal's office a school library? Without required statewide definitions for school libraries, some schools with unstaffed bookshelves in renovated closets responded "yes". At the other end of the scale and not necessarily in the largest urban areas or in the wealthiest communities, school libraries incorporated a wide variety of media professionally managed in a curriculum coordinated program of services which included access to information through CD ROM, computerized catalogs, and interactive video.
- The average school reported spending \$20.06 per student for library resources (excluding salaries) from the local budget for 1988-1989, but nearly half (44%) spent less than \$10.00. Comparing elementary and junior high/middle schools without a certified librarian to those level schools with a certified librarian, the per pupil library expenditure was about half (52% and 56% respectively). The average senior high school spent almost twice per pupil as compared with the expenditure in the average elementary school, and the expenditures for the average junior high/middle school fell midway between these figures.
- Quality and currency of the collections varied. In schools surveyed, half (50%) of their circulating math and
 astronomy library books were more than 20 years old. At both senior high school and elementary levels with
 certified librarians, the number of books in the collections appearing on the notable and best books lists
 (American Library Association) were two to three times greater than in schools not served by certified
 librarians.
- Size of school was often indicative of level of library services. Schools with fewer than 300 students tended to provide fewer services. Although small schools appeared to have similar per pupil library expenditures (excluding staff salaries) as compared to larger schools, half of those schools serving fewer than 150 students had libraries open under 15 hours a week. Schools of this size averaged eight hours a week of paid library staff. The provision of library services tended to be evident in larger schools regardless of geographical location. In general, libraries in northern Maine in schools with over 300 students had more in common with southern and central libraries in schools of comparable size than it did with northern libraries in schools serving less than 300 students.
- Schools with certified librarians when compared to schools without certified librarians tended to provide more services to students and teachers. At the elementary level, schools with certified librarians when compared to schools without certified librarians on average:
 - routinely offered about 3 times the number of library services
 - owned 50% more cataloged titles per pupil
 - were 50% more likely to manage an AV collection
 - were almost twice as likely to offer interlibrary loan services to teachers
 - cooperated with the local public library at almost 4 times a greater rate
 - took advantage of regional and state library services 3 1/2 times more often
 - were 4 1/2 times more likely to have a computer station in the library
 - regularly used about 2 1/2 times more sources for book selection





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
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How many of Maine's public schools have school libraries?









Of the 639 Maine schools returning the survey form, 66 schools (10%) reported no library media center. Nationally, 7% of all public schools had no school library in 1985-86 as reported by the Center for Education Statistics, U.S. Department of Education.

Elementary schools were less likely to have a library, when compared to junior and senior high schools.

There do not appear to be significant differences between northeastern, central, and southern parts of the state.


Smaller schools with fewer than 300 students in all three geographical areas of the state were less likely to have a media center (17% to 20% reported no library) than larger schools in all three areas (in which 1% reported no library).


The size of collections averaged 15 book, magazine, and AV software cataloged titles per students. Elementary schools averaged 12 cataloged titles per student while junior high/middle schools averaged 15 and high schools averaged 18 per student. Elementary schools without certified librarians averaged 10 titles per student, the smallest average of any reporting group. Elementary schools with certified librarians averaged 15 titles per student.


In 131 randomly selected schools the square footage of the library ranged from eight square feet to 7,208 square feet, with an average of 1,458 square feet.



How many of Maine's public school children are served by full and part-time school library media specialists?







62,445 Maine public school children (32%, of all students in schools surveyed) were in schools without certified librarians.

53,261 elementary students (51% of all elementary students surveyed) were in schools without any certified librarians.

Senior high schools had a substantially larger average number of hours (34) per week of certified librarian time compared to junior high/middle schools (21 hours) and elementary schools (6 hours).

Large schools serving more than 300 students in all three geographic regions had an average of about 5 times more certified librarian hours per school than smaller schools in the state. Small schools averaged 4 or 5 hours per week of certified library staff, and larger schools averaged 23 hours per week.

The average school had 13 hours per week of certified librarian, 21 hours of other paid staff, and 4


hours of volunteer help. Fifty-one percent of school libraries had less than 35 hours per week of paid library staff; sixty-eight percent of elementary school libraries had less than 35 staff hours per week.


The average high school had greater number of support staff hours per week (34 hours) compared to junior high/middle schools (27 hours) and elementary (17 hours).


The person with the primary on-site responsibility for the day-to-day operation of the library was a certified librarian in 26% of the elementary schools, 60% of the junior high/middle schools and 91% of the senior high schools.




Staff hours at school libraries:










- A = Elementary with certified librarian

How do school libraries vary between those with certified librarians and those without certified librarians?



For the majority of survey questions, schools with certified librarians reported a higher service level than those without certified librarians. At the elementary level, schools with certified librarians routinely provided almost three times the number of services than schools without certified librarians did (14 vs. 5).

At randomly selected elementary schools, libraries with certified librarians when compared to libraries without certified librarians: on the average owned 50% more cataloged titles per pupil (15 vs. 10); averaged owning 3 times as many American Library Association recommended book titles per school (16 vs. 5 from a list of 50); were 4 1/2 times more likely to have a computer station in the library (45% vs. 10%): 1.7 times more likely to offer interlibrary loan services to teachers (73% vs. 44%); averaged using regularly 2.6 times more sources for book selections (7.6 vs. 2.9); reported 3.8 times higher rate of regularly done cooperative activities with the local public library (2.3 vs. .6 out of a possible 12 types of cooperative activities); over 50% more likely to manage an AV collection (95% vs. 61%).

A greater percentage of schools with certified librarians offered sequential libraries skills (76% of the elementary, 74% of the junior high/middle, and 56% of the secondary school libraries) when compared to schools without certified librarians (50% of the elementary, 35%, and 25% of the secondary school libraries). Differences were even greater when asked if the instruction was routinely provided.

Schools with certified librarians were more likely than schools without certified librarians to be open

before and after school for student use (72% vs. 44% at the elementary level, 95% vs. 65% at the junior high/middle school level, and 98% vs. 84% at the secondary school level).

Average non-salary library expenditures per pupil from local town budgets for schools with certified librarians were higher than those for schools without certified librarians. At the elementary level the average was \$20.77 with and \$11.67 without certified librarian; at the junior high/middle school level it was \$22.82 with and \$11.90 without; secondary schools averaged \$27.26 with and \$19.91 without.


Average weekly circulation was slightly higher in elementary and junior high/middle schools with certified librarians than in schools without certified librarians (1.1 vs. 1.0 book per student checked out at the elementary level, .5 vs. .4 at the junior high/middle school level and .3 vs. .5 at the secondary level).

Paid weekly staff hours were greater in school libraries with certified librarians than in schools without certified librarians: 55 hours compared to 16 hours at the elementary level; 62 hours compared to 30 hours at the junior high/middle school level; 71 hours compared to 25 at the secondary level.

Junior high/middle school and elementary school libraries with certified librarians were more likely to have had a written censorship challenge within the last 5 years than schools without certified librarians (16% vs. 8% at the elementary level and 27% vs. 0% at the junior high/middle school level, 10% vs. 8% at the secondary level).



How much do Maine schools spend on library resources (excluding gifts and federal funds) and how many resources does that money buy?



The average school spent \$20.06 for library books, periodicals, AV software, computer software, database fees and equipment from the local budget, per pupil in 1988-1989. (Staff salaries not included).

The U.S. Department of Education's Center for Education Statistics reported that the average per pupil non-salary public school library expenditure in 1985-1986 was \$17.58. (The Center for Education Statistics did not have a comparable figure for 1988-1989).

Forty-four percent of all Maine public schools reported spending less than \$10.00 per pupil for non-salary library resources; 25% spent between \$10 and \$20; 15% spent between \$20 and \$30; 9% spent between \$30 and \$40, and 7% spent over \$40.00 per pupil.

The non-mandatory state recommended per pupil non-salary library expenditure is 1% of the current average per pupil operating cost for each student in the building. In 1988-89 this 1% statewide average was \$34.63 per pupil.

The average high school library in '88-'89 spent almost twice as much per pupil as the average elementary school (\$27.36 compared to \$14.27). The average junior high/middle school library spent \$20.74 per pupil.

Smaller schools with fewer than 300 students averaged \$17.84 to \$18.19 per pupil library expenditures, while larger schools averaged \$20.73 per pupil. Small schools with fewer than 150 students averaged \$11.38 per pupil for books, while larger schools averaged \$8.70 to \$10.65 per pupil.

Southern Maine schools spent at a higher average per pupil ra: (\$22.33 to \$22.93) than central Maine schools (\$18.12 to \$22.15) and northeastern Maine schools (\$16.20 to \$16.80).

Schools with certified librarians averaged spending more for non-salary library resources per pupil than schools without certified librarians. Elementary schools averaged \$20.77 with and \$1.67 without certified librarians. Junior high schools and middle schools averaged \$22.82 with and \$11.90 without certified librarian. Secondary schools averaged \$27.26 with and \$19.91 without certified librarian.


The average public school library added to their collection in '88-'89 1.1 cataloged items per pupil. While senior high school libraries spent more than elementary schools in '88-'89 they did not acquire more titles (cataloged book, audiovisual, computer, and magazine titles) per pupil. Elementary schools acquired 1.1 cataloged titles per pupil. Junior high/middle schools acquired 1.3 titles per pupil and senior high schools acquired 1.1 titles per student.

Small schools with less than 300 students in all areas of the state reported acquiring on average more cataloged titles per pupil (1.3 to 1.7) than larger schools across the state which acquired .9 to 1.1 cataloged titles per pupil.


In addition to local funding, the average public school library in Maine in 1988-89 received \$1.35 per public from gifts. Public and private schools in Maine in 1988-89 received an average of \$1.79 per pupil from Chapter II federal funds for library materials and equipment.






Teachers in schools by levels and access to certified librarian

Thirty-nine percent of all teachers surveyed in schools with libraries strongly agreed (and 46% agreed) that there were library materials available to support their classroom curricula. The larger the school, the greater the rate of agreement was. Teachers in schools with more than 300 students were almost twice as likely to agree than teachers in smaller schools. Teachers in schools with certified librarians were 2 to 3 times more likely to strongly agree than teachers in schools without certified librarians.

Seventy-five percent of the surveyed teachers agreed or strongly agreed that the library staff provided adequate and appropriate library instruction; teachers in the larger schools had the greatest rate of agreement. Teachers in elementary and secondary schools without certified librarians (39% and 58% agreement respectively) and teachers in junior high schools with part-time certified librarians (40% agreement) were least likely to agree.


The majority of surveyed teachers agreed or strongly agreed that their school libraries' book and magazine collections were appropriate and met the needs

and interests of students. 94% to 96% teachers in schools with certified librarians agreed, while 64% to 76% of teachers in schools without certified librarians agreed. Teachers in schools with 300 or more students were more likely to agree than teachers working in smaller schools. (90% to 93% agreement compared to 63% to 74% agreement)

The majority of teachers agreed that the school library staff provided students guidance in reading, listening, and viewing; this was especially true of teachers in schools with over 300 students who agreed 89% to 95% of the time compared to teachers in smaller schools who had an agreement rate of 76% to 77%. Teachers in elementary and junior high/middle schools with certified librarians had an agreement rate of 92% to 97% while those in elementary and junior high/middle schools without certified librarians agreed 61% to 78% of the time. There was almost no distinction among teachers at the secondary level with or without certified librarians, with a 88% and 86% agreement rate respectively.



How do 3,761 students and 120 principals who were randomly selected feel about their school library collections?

When asked what they used most for independent reading, students ranked school libraries first, followed by bookstore and books from home. The public library was the fourth most used source for leisure reading. However, it was the second most used source for school assignments; students reported using school libraries most often for school assignments, twice as much as they reported using the public library for school assignments.

Nearly a quarter (24%) of the students reported almost daily use of the school library. This percentage was 33% in both elementary and secondary schools with certified librarians, compared to 7% and 26% respectively of students at those levels of schools without certified librarians.

Eighty-four percent of elementary and 73% of secondary students with access to certified librarians reported using a card catalog to find library resources, compared to 66% and 50% respectively of students at those levels without access to certified librarians. Yet, there was no apparent difference in junior high/middle school student use of card catalog in schools with and without a certified librarian.

Students reported that they would most like to have more books they liked in the library when presented a list of ten potential library changes. This list included having more AV, magazines, and computer services. The preference for more books they like occurred regardless of gender, school size, level, or access to certified librarian.

Elementary students in schools with certified librarians reported a greater likelihood than students without access to a librarian that they studied using library material, watched a filmstrip or videotape, and used reference books and library computer during their last library visit. Students in elementary schools without access to certified librarians were more likely than students with access to report having listened to a story read aloud and to have browsed during their last library visit. Both groups, however, reported a high percentage of leisure reading in the library.


Principals in elementary and secondary schools with certified librarians and principals in schools with 300 or more students expressed the greatest satisfaction with school library collections. Sixty-five percent of elementary principals in school without certified librarians and 91% of those in a school with a certified librarian expressed agreement that the school library book collection met student interest and curriculum needs. Thirty nine percent of elementary principals without and 81% with a certified school librarian reported confidence in their schools AV collection. Differences also occurred at the secondary level where 50% of principals without and 97% of principals with a certified librarian reported satisfaction with the library's book and magazine collection. Principal satisfaction in the secondary AV collection was 63% without and 80% with a school librarian.

Fifty-nine percent of surveyed principals felt the school library was adequately funded. This represented 45% agreement rate among elementary principals, 70% among junior high/middle school principals and 71% agreement rate among senior high school principals.



How old are Maine's public school library math and astronomy books in randomly selected schools?

Fifty percent of the circulating math and astronomy library books were more than 20 years old in 138 randomly selected and visited schools.



Schools of all sizes in the randomly selected group of 138 schools had about the same average percentage of circulating math and astronomy books copyright 1969 and older (48% to 52%).

Elementary schools with certified librarians and junior high schools and elementary schools with part-time certified librarians had the largest percentage of their math and astronomy collection copyright 1970 to 1989 (64%, 64%, and 60% respectively). Junior high schools without certified librarians and secondary schools with, without, and with part-time

certified librarians had the smallest percentage of 1970-1989 books (42%, 42%, 40%, and 30% respectively).


Twenty-seven percent of the circulating health and medicine books in the 138 visited schools were copyright 1969 or older; 30% were copyright 1970 through 1979, and 41% were copyright 1980 through 1989.

Thirty-seven percent of the noncirculating, reference books on science and technology were copyright 1969 or older; 27% were copyright 1970-1979, and 34% were copyright 1980-1989.



Are randomly selected Maine schools providing books listed on the American Library Association's "best books" lists?

The average schools in 138 randomly selected and visited had cataloged 10 out of 50 titles listed on the American Library Association's "best books" and "notable" lists.



Schools by level and access to certified librarian

Elementary schools with certified librarians averaged having cataloged almost three times as many recommended books as elementary schools without certified librarians (15.8 compared to 5.4 titles).

Secondary schools with certified librarians averaged having cataloged over twice as many recommended titles as did secondary schools without certified librarians (15.1 compared to 6.9).


Junior high/middle schools with and without certified librarians averaged the same number of titles (11.5).

Ten percent of the elementary schools visited had no card catalog, and 26% of the elementary schools without certified librarians did not have a card catalog.

The larger the schools, the more likely it would have cataloged one of the recommended titles. Small schools with under 150 students averaged 4.4 titles, and larger schools with 500 and more students averaged 15.7 titles.



How do Maine school libraries vary among elementary, junior high and secondary schools?



For almost every key measure, Maine elementary school libraries were substantially less developed than junior high/middle school libraries. Junior high libraries were in turn less developed than senior high school libraries.

Ninety-one percent of Maine's high school libraries, 60% of junior high/middle school libraries, and 26% of elementary school libraries were headed by a certified school librarian.

Fifteen percent of Maine elementary schools, 2% of junior high/middle schools, and 0% of senior high schools had no school library. Of those that did have libraries 54% of elementary, 17% of junior high/middle schools and 3% of senior high schools were not open before or after school. Thirty-two percent of elementary, 8% of junior high/middle, and 1% of senior high school libraries were open less than 20 hours a week.

Elementary school libraries in '88-'89 averaged having slightly less than half the amount from local funding per pupil than senior high school libraries (\$14.27 compared to \$27.36) for library resources not including salaries, and junior high schools per pupil library funding average was \$20.74. Yet this bought about the same number of cataloged print and nonprint titles per pupil at all three levels, an average of 1.1 items per student.

Collection size varied with senior high schools having 50% more cataloged titles per pupil than elementary schools (18 cataloged titles compared to 12), and junior high schools had an average of 15. [However, circulation on average was four times greater per

pupil per week at the elementary school compared to the high school and twice that of junior high schools.]

Nineteen percent of elementary school library staff reported they seldom gave library skills instruction, compared to 7% at the junior high/middle school level and 2% at the senior high level. However, a little over half of the school library staffs surveyed at each grade level reported that they used a sequential library skills curriculum (51% at the senior high, 56% at the junior high, and 58% at the elementary).

Thirty-three percent of the high school library staff said the library was used as an overflow from study halls, compared to 22% at the junior high/middle school level, and 5% at the elementary.

On the average more classes visited the school library each week at the elementary level than at the senior high level (11 classes compared to 7, and junior high schools averaged 8 classes per week). Sixty-two percent of the elementary, 39% of the junior high/middle, and 42% of senior high school library staffs reported that they were not able to help other students when a class was in the library.

Thirty-seven percent of elementary teachers, 10% of junior high/middle teachers, and 2% of senior high school teachers were reported to seldom or never remain in the school library when their classes were there


Average weekly per pupil attendance was highest at the senior high school level (1.2 visits per student compared to 1.0 at the elementary and 1.1 at the junior high school).

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How do Maine school libraries vary by size of school?

Smaller schools were less likely to have a school library, less likely to have a certified school librarian, and averaged fewer hours open to students per week than libraries in larger schools.



Key areas in which varying sizes of schools showed. major differences among school libraries included likelihood of having a school library. Twenty-eight percent of the smallest schools with fewer than 150 students and 1% of the largest schools with 500 and over students did not have school libraries.

Of those schools with libraries over half (57%) of schools with under 150 students were open fewer than 20 school hours per week, compared to 98% of schools with more than 500 students.

Libraries in schools with over 500 students averaged almost 8 times as many paid and adult volunteer library staff hours as schools with fewer than 150 students, approximately 2 1/2 times as many hours as schools with 150 to 299 students and about 1 1/2 times as many as schools with 300 to 499 students (an average of 78 hours for library employees and volunteers at the largest schools compared to an average of 10 hours at the smallest schools with under 150 students).

Forty-seven percent of the schools with fewer than 150 pupils and 9% of the schools with more than 500 students noted that the person with the primary on-

site responsibility for the school library served more than one school.

Sixteen percent of the schools with less than 150 students and 83% of the schools with 500 and more students reported that the person with the primary day-to-day on-site responsibility for the school library was a certified librarian.

School library characteristics among schools of various size which did <u>not</u> appear to differ greatly included non-staff average expenditures per pupil (\$17.84 for the smallest school with fewer than 150 students and \$20.73 for the largest schools with 500 and more students).

Another similarity among school libraries serving different student body sizes included average number of cataloged book, magazine, and software titles owned per pupil (17 per pupil for the smallest schools, 15 per pupil for the largest).

For all groupings of schools by size, an average of 48% to 52% of the circulating math and astronomy books in randomly selected schools were over 20 years old.



How do school libraries vary among the three geographical areas of the state?

For the majority of survey questions, size of school rather than geographical location appeared to be a more common factor among libitaries. In general, libraries in northeastern Maine in schools with over 300 students had more in common with libraries in schools of comparable size in southern and central Maine than it did with northeastern libraries in schools serving fewer than 300 students.

While small libraries serving schools with fewer than 300 students in the southern part of the state were more likely than small northeastern schools to be headed by a certified librarian, they also were more likely to be headed by someone who served more than one school. Forty-one percent of southern small school, 44% of central small school, and 32% of northeastern small school libraries serving fewer than 300 students were headed by someone who served more than one school. The same was true in a less dramatic way of large school libraries; 12% of northeastern large school, 18% of central large school, and 15% of southern large school libraries were headed by someone who served more than one school.

Eighteen percent to 20% of small schools in all three geographical library districts reported having no school library compared to 2% to 4% of larger schools in all three areas. Fifty-four percent to 63% of smaller school libraries in all three districts were open 20 hours or more a week compared to 91% to 98% of larger schools in all 3 areas. Smaller libraries in the three areas averaged a greater number of cataloged titles acquired per year (1.3 to 1.7 per student) compared to larger schools which averaged .9 to 1.1 titles per student.

Smaller school libraries serving fewer than 300 students in the 3 areas averaged 15 to 20 hours a week of paid staff while larger school libraries in the 3 areas averaged 45 to 60 hours. While the largest difference in staff hours was by size of school in all three areas, northeastern schools averaged both fewer library staff hours and smaller average student body size than small southern schools. The average small (serving fewer than 300 students) northeastern Maine school library served 147 students with 15 paid staff hours a week; the average small central Maine library served 159 students with 19 staff hours; the average small southern library served 184 students with 20 staff hours. The average large central Maine school library served 448 students with 48 staff hours a week; the average large central Maine school library served 508 students with 55 staff hours a week; the average large central Maine school library served 508 students with 55 staff hours a week; the average large southern library served 517 students with 60 staff hours a week.

The major area in which there appeared to be a difference among the three geographical areas was the non-staff library expenditures per pupil. Northeastern school libraries both small and large averaged \$16.20 to \$16.80 per pupil from local town budgets in '88-'89. Southern school libraries both large and small averaged \$22.33 to \$22.93 per pupil. The central Maine school libraries were in-between these figures with an average of \$18.12 per pupil in smaller schools and \$22.15 per pupil in larger schools.



Percentage of schools reporting that certified librarian had primary on-site responsibility of school library:







How many of Maine's schools use a sequential library skills curriculum?



School levels by access to certified librarian

Fifty-seven percent of all surveyed school library staffs reported using a sequential library skills curriculum.

Elementary and junior high/middle school libraries with certified librarians reported the greatest use (76% and 74% respectively) of the planned year-to-year library skills curriculum. Secondary school libraries without certified librarians and junior high/middle schools with part-time certified librarians reported the lowest use (25% and 29% respectively).


For each school level, schools with certified librarians provided a greater average number of students with library instruction than schools at that level without certified librarians.

The larger the size of the student body, the greater likelihood that the school would use a sequential library skills curriculum. Forty-three percent of the schools with fewer than 150 students used it, and 69% of the schools serving more than 500 students did.

On the average, libraries in smaller schools in all three geographic areas provided less library instruction than those in larger schools in each area. Smaller schools with libraries in the three geographic areas estimated that between 51% and 65% of their students received library instruction at least once a year form the library staff, while larger schools throughout the three areas estimated that between 72% and 82% of their students did.



How do Maine's public libraries and school libraries cooperate?



Of the 131 randomly selected school libraries, over. 25% reported cooperating with their local public library at least once a year in four different ways: meeting to discuss common needs and strengths; sharing resources through interlibrary loan or cooperative purchase; having classrooms come to visit the public library; utilizing special public library loan policies to local schools.

Of the 84 public libraries which served the 131 randomly selected school libraries, over 25% reported cooperating with the schools in their communities (not necessarily just with the school randomly selected) at least once a year in 5 different ways: meeting to discuss common needs and strengths; sharing resources through interlibrary loan or cooperative purchase; having public librarian visit students in school; providing special public library loan policies to local schools; having classrooms come to visit the public library.

On the average, schools borrowed more materials through interlibrary loan than they loaned to other libraries. Of 639 schools surveyed the average school borrowed per pupil per year .04 items from their local public library and loaned per pupil per year 1/4 that amount (.01) to their local public library. These same libraries borrowed per pupil per year .09 items from other libraries outside their communities and loaned per pupil per year 1/18 that amount (.005 items) to libraries outside their communities.

The average public library surveyed reported cooperating 3.5 different ways with local schools at least once a year. The average school library surveyed reported cooperating 1.7 different ways with local public library at least once a year.

Seventy-eight percent of 125 randomly selected schools reported that they provided interlibrary loan services to students.

Fifty-nine percent of 131 randomly selected schools reported that their school library was open to the general public. Of those school libraries which were open to the public, this policy was not formally written down in 71% of the schools. However, 80% of these schools with libraries open to the public reported that some of the public did use them in the previous year.

Schools with over 300 students were twice as likely to cooperate with their local public library as schools with under 300 students.

Public libraries in larger communities reported a slightly higher rate of school and public library cooperation than public libraries in communities of less than 5,000. Public libraries in small towns averaged 2.8 to 3.2 cooperative activities regularly done each year while public libraries in towns of 5,000 or more averaged 3.7 to 4.3 cooperative yearly activities with local schools.

Methodology



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Methodology

Problem Identification and Survey Goals

A survey of elementary school libraries in greater Portland conducted by the League of Women Voters of the Portland Area in 1988 revealed per pupil school library book expenditures to range from \$1.92 to \$25.00. Area staffing patterns for elementary school libraries were also highly varied. At the state level, the Maine Department of Education and the Maine State Library recognized that there was a general lack of data regarding school libraries at both the local and statewide levels.

The survey's goals was to provide data on the status of public school libraries in Maine. Information was sought that detailed how resources and delivery of services differed:

- across grade level

- across variation in size of school

- between schools with and without a certified school library media specialist

- across the state's three library districts

Literature Survey

The survey coordinator studied media center questionnaires received from twenty-one states' education departments. Also examined were seven books and nineteen journal and ERIC documents. State and American Library Associations' recommended standards and guidelines were reviewed.

Strategy and Instruments

The survey committee was composed of eight members representing the four cosponsoring groups (Janice Carpenter and Jane Root from the League of Women Voters of Maine, Jeanne Pernice and Beth Osmer from the Maine Educational Media Association, Richard Speer from the Maine Library Association, Dorothy Gregory from the Maine State Library, Walter Taranko from the Maine Department of Education, and Coordinator Margaret Soule). In preparing the six different questionnaires and checkoff forms, the committee met seven times during the summer and fall of 1989 to decide the survey's objectives, methodology, and questions. The questionnaires went through eight drafts.

Phone conversations regarding methodology were held with June Lester, Mary Jo Lynch and Ann Weeks from the American Library Association, Larry La Moure from the U.S. Department of Education Center for Education Statistics, and Dr. Libby Cohen from the University of Southern Maine. Dr. Horace Maxcy from the Maine Department of Education was consulted frequently.



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The survey distributed in January 1990 was actually six different questionnaires and a check-off form for on-site visits. A mass survey was mailed to all 730 public schools serving grades K-12 (excluding regional vocational centers). A more in-depth study was done of 150 schools. 20% of Maine's public schools which were randomly selected after all schools were stratified by size, type, library district, and access to media specialist. Each of these randomly selected schools had questionnaires for the principal, two randomly selected teachers, the students of these teachers if they were 4th graders or older, the school librarian, and the town's public librarian. One hundred and thirty-eight schools were visited by 143 volunteers. (Nine of the 150 randomly selected schools reported having no school library and were not visited.) Each volunteer had check-off forms to record copyright dates for math, astronomy, and health books, to note school library ownership of specific book titles randomly selected from the American Library Association's notable and best book lists for 1970-1988, and data on the diversity and availability of resources about Maine. Cover letters were sent to every superintendent, principal, and school librarian in the state.

Volunteers

The 143 volunteers were recruited from the co-sponsoring organizations. Five informational training sessions were offered across the state before the surveys were mailed, and no professional or personal comments or judgments were requested from the volunteers. The volunteers hand delivered and picked up the surveys to principals, students, teachers, and librariens in the 138 randomly selected schools.

Response Rete

The follow-up to non-responses included letters and duplicate questionnaires sent to all school librarians, principals, and public librarians who had not returned the survey forms. Follow-up phone calls were made to volunteers and to many schools which did not respond to the second letter. Return rates were:

With a response rate of 88% for the mass survey, there was no sampling error for those schools which responded. Thus, excluding the 12% that did not respond, the mass survey results reflected Maine public school library characteristics.

With return rates ranging from 85% to 98% for the six questionnaires distributed to 150 randomly selected schools, sampling error was approximately 8%.



Compiling Data

All returned surveys were skimmed by the coordinator to check for potential misinterpretations of questions. Over 100 phone calls were made to schools to verify responses. Data entry was made more difficult with a statewide governmental hiring freeze, and the Maine State Library had the inputting and programming done primarily on a parttime, temporary basis and by full-time staff as their already full schedules allowed.

The survey committee met five times during the winter and spring of 1990-1991 to design and edit the final report. It was decided that responses to the random sample survey distributed to teachers, students, and librarians would be analyzed by 13 rather than the full 23 reporting divisions since the random sample process over-sampled elementary schools with certified librarians and high schools without certified librarians and under-sampled small elementary schools without certified librarians. This sampling method was done in an effort to have at least 30 sample schools in as many grouping divisions as possible.

Because of the massive amount of information from the six questionnaires and volunteer on-site check-off forms and because of limitations of staff and volunteer time, statistical analysis was limited to means. Ranges and standard deviations were reported for only key questions to measure variability. The resulting large standard deviations indicated heterogeneity; schools within the same groupings had a large number of unlike or dissimilar elements. It appeared that a few schools were so atypical that they weighted the means. Future analysis should be made using median scores and variability measures such as semi-interquartile range. Researchers and interested individuals are invited to do a more thorough statistical analysis of the many individual survey questions.

There were less than thirty schools in each of four reporting divisions. These included secondary and junior high/middle schools without certified librarians and secondary schools and jr. high/middle schools with part-time certified librarians. Smaller numbers tend to distort averages, and results may be subject to variability.


