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ABSTRACT

The purpose of this report is to inform New Jersey legislators, the governor, and other public officials about the status of child care in the state and to make recommendations that include government and private sector activities. An introductory section describes the structure of the New Jersey Child Care Advisory Council (CCAC) and lists the council's members. A section on highlights of the CCAC's 1991 activities describes four special projects and provides lists of special events, presentations on special issues, project reports, guest speakers at meetings, the activities of the CCAC chairperson and coordinator, and documents developed and approved during the year. A section on recommendations lists six priority recommendations concerning child care issues for fiscal year 1993. Also listed are six second-level and five third-level recommendations, state legislative activities supported by the CCAC, and topics for CCAC discussion in 1992 and 1993. Appendixes include: (1) materials related to Child Care Unity Day, celebrated in April, 1991; (2) a factsheet on child care in New Jersey; (3) a list of acronyms commonly used in early childhood education; (4) descriptions of procedures for recruiting individual and organizational members for the CCAC; (5) guidelines for reporting to and about the CCAC; and (6) a list of former CCAC members. - B.5. ESTABLISH PROGRAMS AND PRACTICES THAT PROMOTE MULTI-ETHNIC SENSITIVITY**
- B.6. PROVIDE TRAINING FOR PERSONS WORKING WITH CHILDREN INVOLVED IN AIDS, HOMELESSNESS, SUBSTANCE ABUSE, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND OTHER SPECIAL NEEDS ISSUES**

C. THIRD-LEVEL PRIORITIES

While programs like those listed below exist or efforts have been initiated in various parts of the state, significant additional support is required to meet the growing needs of children and families for these programs and services:

- C.1. SUPPORT PROGRAMS AND SERVICES FOR TEEN PARENTS AND SINGLE-PARENT, AT-RISK FAMILIES.**
- C.2. ESTABLISH CRISIS CARE PROGRAMS FOR INFANTS AND CHILDREN WHERE NEEDED.**
- C.3. REQUIRE THE DYFS BUREAU OF LICENSING TO CONDUCT MORE FREQUENT LIFE-SAFETY AND PROGRAM INSPECTIONS AND PROVIDE THE NECESSARY RESOURCES TO SUPPORT THE REQUIREMENT.**
- C.4. REVIEW EXISTING NEW JERSEY STAFF COMPENSATION DATA AND DEVELOP A STRATEGY TO IMPROVE CHILD CARE CENTER STAFF SALARIES AND COMPENSATION FOR ALL CHILD CARE PROFESSIONALS.**
- C.5. IMPLEMENT A COMPREHENSIVE IMPACT STUDY TO DETERMINE SHORT- AND LONG TERM STATEWIDE CHILD CARE NEEDS.**

In its recommendations, the Council acknowledges the efforts made in recent years to improve and increase the delivery of child care and early education programs and services in our state. However, at the same time, the Council recognizes that the recommendations may never be fully implemented and, therefore, they must be addressed from year to year.

In order to address the recommendations in the coming year, the Council urges representatives from all branches and levels of government, together with parents and professionals in the early care and education field, to meet together in order:

- o to select issues from this list for closer analysis; and
- o to propose the appropriate action that will initiate and implement as many recommendations as possible.

S86 - (Lipman) - Would clarify the language in the Family Day Care Provider Registration Law (P.L. 1987, Chapter 27).

Current Status: Released from Women's Issues, Children and Family Services Committee, 3/5/92

S87 - (Lipman) - Would amend the Child Care Center Licensing Law (P.L. 1983, Chapter 492) to include school-age child care programs.

Current Status: Passed by Senate, 4/2/92

S110 - (Cardinale) /A1057 (Vandervalk) - Would repeal parts of the family day care zoning law regarding criminal history record investigations (CHRI) for family day care homes.

Current Status: Passed by Senate, 3/23/92; passed by Assembly, 4/30/92; awaits Governor Florio's signature.

S408 - (Cafiero) Would provide for a Emergency Medical Services for Children Program.

Current Status: Released from Women's Services, Children and Family Services Committee, 3/30/92.

In addition, the Council supports the intent of S210 (Bennett) which addresses the issue of criminal history record investigations (CHRIs) for child care workers. However, the Council has expressed the concern that such a bill should require CHRIs for all child care workers and that the State should pay for CHRIs.

INTRODUCTION

The New Jersey Child Care Advisory Council was established by the Child Care Center Licensing Act of 1983, Chapter 492, and is charged as follows:

- to review rules and recommendations governing the licensing of child care centers;
- to advise on the needs, priorities, programs, and policies relating to child care throughout the state;
- to study and recommend alternate resources of child care; and
- to facilitate employment-related child care through information and technical assistance.

The Council addresses issues pertaining to child care in New Jersey for children from birth through 12 years, without regard to race, religion or socio-economic status.

The purpose of this report is to inform New Jersey Legislators, the Governor, the Commissioners of the Departments of Human Services and Community Affairs, and the Directors of the Divisions of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) and Economic Assistance in DHS, and the Division on Women (DOW) in DCA about the current status of child care in the state and to make recommendations that include government and private sector activities.

COUNCIL STRUCTURE

The Council is comprised of voting members, non-voting liaisons from selected state departments, and designees and representatives from the departments cited in the enabling legislation for the Council. The 37 voting members represent statewide child care and early education organizations, child advocacy groups, and others committed to services for children and families. Liaisons are appointed by the Commissioners of the Departments of Education, Health and Labor. Designees are named by DFYS and DOW. Representatives of the DHS Office of Child Care Development and the Division of Economic Assistance also participate regularly in Council activities.

An Executive Committee, composed of the officers of the Council, the chairpersons of the standing committees, and two members elected from the Council membership, meets each month. The standing committees which meet regularly are Finance, Legislative-Government Action, Public Relations, and Research. The Council meets monthly on the third Wednesday of the

month, except for August and December. Although meetings are open to the public, persons wishing to address the Council on child care-related issues are required to contact the Chairperson or the Coordinator to schedule a presentation date.

ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS OF 1991

During 1991, legislation, regulations and other government or private activities have been initiated or more fully implemented that will assure children and parents of expanded and improved child care and early education programs in the coming years. In its advisory role, the Child Care Advisory Council received information from many sources throughout the state. The major concerns of 1991 are listed below.

PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS

1. **Develop a variety of ongoing child care programs and services** - The completion of the **Urban Prekindergarten Program (UPP)**, continuance of the **Head Start-State Collaboration Grant** project, implementation of the **GoodStarts** initiative, and the work of the **D.A.R.T. Program** (Dissemination/Advocacy/Research/Training) for infants and toddlers located at Kean College are among statewide efforts to fulfill this goal. Also, contributing significantly to the development of programs and services is the **New Jersey Cares for Kids Program**, funded by Federal Child Care and Development Block Grant and Title IV-A At-risk legislation.
2. **Establish a voucher payment system in addition to purchase of service contracts** - With the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) and the Title IV-A At-risk Child Care funds in place, New Jersey has completed the first phase of implementing a statewide child care certificate (voucher) program. The previous voucher programs in Hudson County, the southern Department of Human Services region, and in several other counties are being merged into the certificate program funded by the New Jersey Cares for Kids Program.
3. **Increase level of resources for child care resource and referral system** - As a result of concerns expressed during the public hearings held in 1991, the Department of Human Services established an Ad Hoc Child Care Resource and Referral Working Group to review the work and responsibilities of the CCR&R System. After meeting from October, 1991 to February, 1992, the Working Group submitted a Final Report outlining its recommendations for addressing CCR&R issues in New Jersey. Copies of the CCR&R Working Group Final Report are available from the Office of Child Care Development.
4. **Increase level of resources for family day care** - The Family Day Care Zoning bill was signed into law as P.L. 1991, Chapter 278, making it easier to establish family day care homes in many municipalities. The

law also included the requirement for criminal history record investigations (CHRIs) of providers and selected others in the family day care home.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SFY'93

A. PRIORITY RECOMMENDATIONS - SFY'93

- A.1. AMEND THE CHILD CARE CENTER LICENSING LAW TO INCLUDE SCHOOL-AGE CHILD CARE PROGRAMS AND AMEND THE VOLUNTARY FAMILY DAY CARE REGISTRATION LAW TO CLARIFY LANGUAGE** - Legislation to amend the Child Care Center Licensing Law (S87), prefiled for the current legislative session, has passed the Senate and is supported by the Council. S86, also prefiled, will clarify the language in the family day care registration law.
- A.2. EXPAND CHILD CARE TRAINING PROGRAMS OF ALL TYPES FOR ALL LEVELS OF ADMINISTRATION AND TEACHING** - Some Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) funds have been targeted for training. The Department of Human Services, with the advice of the Council and child care community, is developing the Child Care Research, Education, Development and Investment Trust (CCREDIT), a proposal to provide for a multi-faceted, long-range statewide training effort. An appointed Project Design Team advises the DHS staff in developing the proposal. Also proposed is a statewide training resource inventory that will identify all types of education and training programs available to early child care and education professionals.
- A.3. PROMOTE EFFORTS TO INCLUDE PARENT INVOLVEMENT IN THE PLANNING AND OPERATION OF THEIR CHILDREN'S CHILD CARE PROGRAMS** - Child care center licensing regulations require programs to provide ways in which parents can participate in the work of their child care program. Additional efforts are carried out within individual programs.
- A.4. CONTINUE ADDRESSING AND SUPPORTING THE ISSUE OF A SEPARATE EARLY CHILDHOOD TEACHER CERTIFICATE** - The Council continues to support a separate teaching certificate for teachers of young children within the Department of Education.
- A.5. INCREASE CENTER STAFF SALARIES AND OTHER FORMS OF COMPENSATION** - The recent nationwide attention being paid to staff compensation is expected to have an impact in New Jersey. Several professional organizations are reviewing the means by which compensation can be increased. Increases in Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) reimbursement could go for compensation costs.

- A.6. ESTABLISH A UNIFORM INCENTIVE SYSTEM WHICH RECOGNIZES PROGRAMS THAT EXCEED MINIMUM QUALITY STANDARDS -** Acknowledgement of accreditation of center- and home-based programs has increased in recent years. Private funding has assisted some centers to become accredited by National Association for the Education of Young Children. The Department of Human Services honored accredited centers and family day care providers accredited by National Association for Family Day Care at a reception during the Week of the Young Child.

B. SECOND-LEVEL PRIORITIES

In addition to the priority recommendations A.1 through A.6, the Child Care Advisory Council also requests consideration of and appropriate action on the following six recommendations:

- B.1. INCREASE INFANT/TODDLER CARE IN CENTER- AND HOME-BASED PROGRAMS -** Interest in care for very young children continues and needs to be targeted to assist providers in all settings to increase where possible the enrollment of infants and toddlers. The recently-established D.A.R.T. Program (Dissemination/Advocacy/Research/Training), affiliated with Kean College of New Jersey and the Coalition of Infant/Toddler Educators (CITE), is expected to support this recommendation.
- B.2. IMPLEMENT A SERIES OF PUBLIC RELATIONS CAMPAIGNS TO EDUCATE PARENTS AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC ABOUT THE VALUE OF EARLY CHILD CARE AND EDUCATION -** Several local promotions and at least one statewide public awareness campaign to address family day care issues have been held in recent years. The news media have published increasing numbers of articles and editorials on early care and education.
- B.3. PROVIDE FOR "WRAP-AROUND" SERVICES FOR HEAD START AND CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS -** Funds for enabling Head Start to extend its service day and year have been available from the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) for several years. The Urban Prekindergarten Program, a joint effort among the Departments of Education and Human Services, several school districts, and Head Start programs, is completing its three-year pilot phase. GoodStarts, Governor Florio's early childhood initiative, will begin June 1. In addition, the Federal Dependent Care Grant provides funding for planning services for special needs children.

- B.4. INCREASE LEVEL OF RESOURCES FOR FAMILY DAY CARE -** A zoning bill that became law in 1990 has raised concerns about support for obtaining criminal history record investigations for providers and other adults in the home when children are being cared for. Support for the voluntary registration process is also under review and the potential impact of mandatory registration is being explored. Some funds are expected to be available for registering the providers who are presently on waiting lists.
- B.5. ESTABLISH PROGRAMS AND PRACTICES THAT PROMOTE MULTI-ETHNIC SENSITIVITY -** Increased availability of curriculum materials addressing the need for multi-ethnic sensitivity should increase their usage throughout the state. Training efforts for implementing such practices are needed.
- B.6. PROVIDE TRAINING FOR PERSONS WORKING WITH CHILDREN INVOLVED IN AIDS, HOMELESSNESS, SUBSTANCE ABUSE, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND OTHER SPECIAL NEEDS ISSUES -** Efforts already underway in parts of the state are being identified and recognized so that replication and expansion can take place. The Special Needs portion of the Federal Dependent Care Grant is addressing this issue, as is the Office of Prevention/DHS, the Office of Education/DHS, and other collaborative programs established by the Departments of Health, Human Services and Education.

C. THIRD-LEVEL PRIORITIES

While programs like those listed below exist or efforts have been initiated in various parts of the state, significant additional support is required to meet the growing needs of children and families for these programs and services:

- C.1. SUPPORT PROGRAMS AND SERVICES FOR TEEN PARENTS AND SINGLE-PARENT, AT-RISK FAMILIES.**
- C.2. ESTABLISH CRISIS CARE PROGRAMS FOR INFANTS AND CHILDREN WHERE NEEDED.**
- C.3. REQUIRE THE DYFS BUREAU OF LICENSING TO CONDUCT MORE FREQUENT LIFE-SAFETY AND PROGRAM INSPECTIONS AND PROVIDE THE NECESSARY RESOURCES TO SUPPORT THE REQUIREMENT.**

- C.4. REVIEW EXISTING NEW JERSEY STAFF COMPENSATION DATA AND DEVELOP A STRATEGY TO IMPROVE CHILD CARE CENTER STAFF SALARIES AND COMPENSATION FOR ALL CHILD CARE PROFESSIONALS.**
- C.5. IMPLEMENT A COMPREHENSIVE IMPACT STUDY TO DETERMINE SHORT- AND LONG TERM STATEWIDE CHILD CARE NEEDS.**

In its recommendations, the Council acknowledges the efforts made in recent years to improve and increase the delivery of child care and early education programs and services in our state. However, at the same time, the Council recognizes that the recommendations may never be fully implemented and, therefore, they must be addressed from year to year.

In order to address the recommendations in the coming year, the Council urges representatives from all branches and levels of government, together with parents and professionals in the early care and education field, to meet together in order:

- o to select issues from this list for closer analysis; and
- o to propose the appropriate action that will initiate and implement as many recommendations as possible.

**D. STATE LEGISLATION SUPPORTED BY THE
NEW JERSEY CHILD CARE ADVISORY COUNCIL**

As of April 1992

S86 - (Lipman) - Would clarify the language in the Family Day Care Provider Registration Law (P.L. 1987, Chapter 27).

Current Status: Released from Women's Issues, Children and Family Services Committee, 3/5/92

S87 - (Lipman) - Would amend the Child Care Center Licensing Law (P.L. 1983, Chapter 492) to include school-age child care programs.

Current Status: Passed by Senate, 4/2/92

S110 - (Cardinale) /A1057 (Vandervalk) - Would repeal parts of the family day care zoning law regarding criminal history record investigations (CHRI) for family day care homes.

Current Status: Passed by Senate, 3/23/92; passed by Assembly, 4/30/92; awaits Governor Florio's signature.

S408 - (Cafiero) Would provide for a Emergency Medical Services for Children Program.

Current Status: Released from Women's Services, Children and Family Services Committee, 3/30/92.

In addition, the Council supports the intent of **S210** (Bennett) which addresses the issue of criminal history record investigations (CHRIs) for child care workers. However, the Council has expressed the concern that such a bill should require CHRIs for all child care workers and that the State should pay for CHRIs.

E. TOPICS FOR COUNCIL DISCUSSION IN 1992-1993

The Council has identified the following topics for continued discussion and research in the coming year:

1. Develop a checklist on quality child care for statewide distribution.
2. Help parents become advocates for their children and themselves.
3. Address Head Start and other part-time program wrap-around issues.
4. Use *Child Find* in developing specialized services.
5. Develop collaborations between and among the child care community and the public schools to continue building a quality integrated system of early care and education.
6. Issue a position paper on quality child care and early education.

"CHILD CARE UNITY DAY" DESIGNED TO HELP MAKE LIFE BETTER FOR CHILDREN

New Brunswick, NJ - Almost 500 people from across the state met at the Hyatt Regency Hotel yesterday to discuss the needs of children. Sponsored by the New Jersey Child Care Advisory Council, the event was designed so that members of the child care community could share ideas on how to make children's lives better.

"We want to lead the way in providing better opportunities for children," said David Harris, chairman of the council. "By bringing the child care community together, we can plan for the whole state."

The day was dubbed "Child Care Unity Day" and included speeches by Gov. Jim Florio and wife, Lucinda.

Aletha R. Wright, director of the Office of Child Care Development in the state Department of Human Services, told the crowd that New Jersey must focus more on the needs of working families, parents and child care providers to insure better child care.

Every family, wealthy or not, should have the choice of a day care provider, said Wright. Too often, poor families have no choice but to send their children to the local Head Start program or to a family member, Wright said. And child care providers must be better trained and better paid, she said.

"We train doctors, lawyer, bus drivers," said Wright, adding that child care providers must be trained too.

Also, because New Jersey's Hispanic population is growing rapidly, the state must find ways of reaching that group, whose members often are neglected because they do not speak English, Wright said.

"The future - this year and the next five years - belongs to you and I, who hear the thunder and the patter of little feet," Wright told a cheering crowd.

During the daylong sessions, members of the audience were given the chance to speak out on child care issues, many of which Wright addressed in her speech. Other issues raised during the day included teenage pregnancy, fathers providing child care, the need for labels on children's toys, and affordable housing. Also, the group discussed the 1990 federal child care legislation, which will bring more money to the state for child care and early education.

Harris said he will hold another Child Care Unity Day soon, this time on a Saturday so that working parents can come to share their views. But he said, the fact that so many people came yesterday should show people "how close to the surface this issue is."

FACT SHEET ON CHILD CARE IN NEW JERSEY

(As of March 1992)

1. **Licensed Child Care Centers.** New Jersey has 2,167 licensed centers serving 131,000 children from birth through five years. For information, call (609) 292-1021.
2. **Government-funded Child Care.** In New Jersey, 225 community-based non-profit agencies received federal Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) and State funds to provide year-around and parttime care as needed for infants, toddlers, preschoolers, before- and/or after kindergarten children, and school-age children. For information, call (609) 984-0459. In 1991, New Jersey's first statewide child care certificate program started as part of the New Jersey Cares for Kids Program. Initial statistics on the number of certificates issued will be released in 1992. For information, call (609) 292-6138.
3. **Registered Family Child Care Providers.** New Jersey has 3,940 registered family child care providers serving an average of three children each (approximately 11,800 children). For information, call 1-800-3-DAY CARE.
4. **Employer-supported Family Initiatives.** New Jersey has 125 employer-supported child care centers. No current data are available on the number of employers supporting other types of child care services, such as resource and referral, parent seminars, staff training, vouchers, family day care networks, flextime, family leave policies, and flexible spending accounts. For information, call (609) 633-6663.
5. **School-age Child Care.** New Jersey has an estimated 900 school-age child care (SACC) programs and has SACC coalitions in all 21 counties. For information, call (609) 292-1946.
6. **Accreditation.** New Jersey has 37 center-based programs accredited by the National Academy of Early Childhood Programs, part of the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). Over 100 centers are engaged in the initial self-study phase of the process. For information, call (609) 951-2249. PROCEDURES FOR RECRUITING NEW JERSEY RESIDENTS INTERESTED IN BEING APPOINTED TO THE CHILD CARE ADVISORY COUNCIL

1. According to the Child Care Advisory Council Bylaws, 19 members are appointed by various New Jersey child care and child care-related organizations. Eighteen Council members (nine each) are appointed by the directors of the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) in the Department of Human Services and the Division on Women in the Department of Community Affairs. Traditionally, each director has informed the other director of the person or persons under consideration for membership.

2. To be considered for appointment to the Council, persons should have experience in and/or knowledge about the fields of child care and early education, child advocacy, and family-related issues in New Jersey and the United States. Persons interested in being appointed to the Council are encouraged to visit one or more full Council meetings and to request copies of Council documents from the coordinator's office.

3. Names of persons eligible for appointment to the Council may be submitted by any Council member or by the interested person to one of the following: the coordinator, the chairperson, the designee from DYFS or DOW or the director of DYFS or DOW. Information about the person should include address, telephone number, and current employment or community involvement. A copy of the person's resume may be included.

A listing of eligible persons to be forwarded to the directors of DYFS and DOW will be developed from the names submitted for consideration for appointment. The Executive Committee will review the listing of eligible names from time to time. The directors of DYFS and DOW make the final decision on appointments to the Council.

4. Selection criteria include but are not limited to the following: resident of the State of New Jersey, geographical location within the state, urban/suburban/rural residence or employment, program experience, and diversity of interest in child care issues.

5. Persons interested in Council membership should expect to attend the 10 regular Full Council meetings per year and to participate on at least one of the Standing Committees. Appointments to the Council are for three years and members may be re-appointed at the discretion of the directors of DYFS and DOW.

PROCEDURES FOR RECRUITING AND SELECTING ORGANIZATIONS TO BE REPRESENTED ON THE NEW JERSEY CHILD CARE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The following procedures apply to organizations that are to be considered for Council membership after the date on which the procedures are approved by the Council. The procedures do not apply to current organizations who appoint representatives to the Council.

1. Organizations with representatives on the Council shall be statewide in scope and membership.
2. Organizations shall be incorporated in the State of New Jersey, or be a public entity, or have been in continuous and regular operation for at least five years with a set of approved bylaws.
3. Organizations shall have as one of their primary ongoing purposes the development and support of programs and services for the care, education and advocacy of all children in New Jersey.
4. Requests from organizations to become Council members shall be screened by the Executive Committee and recommended organizations shall be submitted for final approval to the directors of the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) and the Division on Women (DOW).
5. An application for membership shall consist of a letter of intent on organization letterhead, a copy of the bylaws, and a list of voting members.
6. A letter inviting an organization to send a representative to the Council shall go to the organization chairperson over the name of the Council chairperson, together with relevant Council documents.
