ABSTRACT

Information on the implementation of services for preschool children with special needs and their families, acquired from a survey of 60 states and jurisdictions is presented. The information is organized into nine sections reflecting major state activities related to the Part B--Section 619 portion of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. These sections cover the following topics: administration/funding, interagency coordination, personnel, transition, least restrictive environment/programming, public awareness, parent involvement, eligibility (prepared by Joan Danaher), and legislation/special education mandates. 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Introduction

This third Profile of Part B - Section 619 Services was developed by NEC*TAS in collaboration with past and present members of the steering committee of the Consortium of Section 619 Coordinators: Karen Sanders, (OH), Mary Kay McKinney (AR), Debbie Ziegler (DE), John Killoran (UT), Sara Gill (GA), Dan McCarthy (MT), Kay Halverson (CT) and Lynn Busenbark (AZ). Each year the Profile is assembled using information from past Profiles, previous NASDSE - NEC*TAS surveys, and information submitted by current state preschool coordinators. Fifty-three states and jurisdictions submitted information for this 1992 edition; this information is current through May, 1992. Not all respondents answered every question, and some information has been obtained from previous surveys. In all, the data represents information from 60 states and jurisdictions. Throughout the Profile, the term "state" is used for all types of contributing jurisdictions. The Appendix contains a complete listing of these jurisdictions: the list is presented alphabetically by "state" and indicates the state abbreviations which are used throughout this document.

At the January, 1992, 619 Coordinators' meeting in Baltimore, Maryland, state coordinators were asked to review, edit and add to their data from the 1991 Profile. At this meeting, the coordinators added three new items regarding the Child Care Block Grant, Even Start, and the use of IFSPs.

The current Profile is organized into nine sections reflecting major state activities related to the Part B - Section 619 portion of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA):

> Administration/Funding **Interagency Coordination** Personnel Transition Least Restrictive Environment/Programming Public Awareness Parent Involvement Eligibility Legislation/Special Education Mandates

Where appropriate, states have indicated their willingness to share information with other states. A contact list with names, telephone numbers, and FAX numbers is included at the end of this document to facilitate communication and sharing among states. We hope these materials will assist states in the implementation of services for preschool children with special needs and their families.

I. Administration / Funding







(2C) The preschool-specific category is used freely and all Part B categories have modified evaluation procedures for preschoolers.
