ABSTRACT

This paper describes the development from 1963 to 1986 of the Clark County (Nevada) Library District, which includes the rapidly growing urban area of Las Vegas. It notes that, besides responding successfully to a population growth of 330% over two decades, the system was also able to fulfill its original goal of developing local libraries that would become cultural centers for the communities they served. Today system libraries are also home to the symphony orchestra, three professional theater companies, an art museum, and a children's museum. This paper is based on interviews with Jean Ford, who instigated the campaign to found the district, and with district librarians. It also draws on documents describing the system's growth, including a description of the initial petition drive begun in 1963; statistics detailing the growth of the library and the area it serves; the development of cooperative relationships with existing libraries; the institution of a county-wide automated catalog system in 1974; outreach to unserved areas via bookmobile and on-site services; building projects; a discussion of staffing and staff contributions; establishment of a volunteer program; and response to revenue needs and fundraising strategies. Several maps of the service area, documents used in the original petition drive, circulation statistics, annual budget statistics, number of patrons, and total holdings are appended. THE FOUNDING

The decade of the 1960's found the native Nevadans in Las Vegas wondering at the continued influx of new residents to the Las Vegas (the meadows) valley. How would the area's public services cope with so very many new citizens?

While some people worried about existing services, others felt that it was important to bring new ones into existence if growth was to continue to bolster the region's economy. One necessary service was a good library.

When Dr. and Mrs. Ford moved to Paradise, Nevada (located approximately 1½ miles south of Las Vegas) with their two children in 1963, they expected to be able to continue their family's routine visits to a local library. But when they visited the library in nearby Las Vegas they found that, along with their application and five dollars, they would also need a letter from a resident of the city attesting to the Fords' good character. The family left the library that day without a card.

The Fords were "appalled that in a relatively urban suburb there was no library service...in 1963!"¹ Jean Ford mentioned their startling discovery later at Church. And as a result the Social Concerns Committee of the Unitarian Fellowship Church of Las Vegas decided to find out what had to be done to establish a library. Jean joined this committee. After a few fruitless forays locally, the

Committee invited the State Librarian, Mildred Heyer, to come down from Carson City to speak to them about starting a library for Paradise Valley.

Mrs. Heyer did come down and in a series of meetings and conferences explained Nevada's Library law and the mechanism that permitted the establishment of library districts.

By the Fall of 1964 the Librarian was helping to "establish a framework leading to the formation of a library district for the area of Clark County (the county in which Las Vegas is located) not receiving library service [It was] from these meetings that the idea of taking a survey (in the form of petitions) of the taxpayers in this district to ascertain whether they were willing to be taxed for library service."²

At the end of 1964, on the evening of December 16, an informational and organizational meeting was held to launch a campaign to establish a library in Paradise Township and other small unincorporated towns in Clark County, Nevada. Interest had already spread beyond the confines of the original Social Concerns Committee and so the meeting was held in the Ruby Thomas Elementary School in Paradise Township.

"...The citizens attending the meeting that night, heard Jean Ford outline the steps that had already been taken to get a necessary petition of the taxpayers and property owners of the affected areas in circulation (see map in

Appendix A). These included the receipt of an opinion from Attorney General, Harvey Dickerson stating that there could be no library for the county itself, but a separate district would have to be established to cover a specific portion of the county - incorporated cities excepted..."³

As a result of this ruling the proposed new library district would include Paradise Valley, East Las Vegas, Searchlight, Goodsprings, Indian Springs, Blue Diamond, Nelson, Sloan and other unincorporated areas of Clark County. ⁴ Mrs. Ford further explained that the law required that any petition submitted to the board of county commissioners to establish a library district would have to have the signatures of 51 percent of the taxpayers in the given area or property owners representing 51 percent of the assessed property valuation.

The land area covered by this new library district covered more than 7,000 square miles and 70,000 people. Despite these daunting figures a steering committee was chosen and the meeting adjourned after agreeing that the committee should plan how to circulate effectively the petition to reach the greatest number of property owners in the unincorporated portions of Clark County.

The members of the steering committee, all of whom were all middle and upper middle class housewives and mothers married to professionals or businessmen; some having set aside their own careers. They were Jean Ford-physical therapist, Mr. L.B. Holder, Jackie

Stormsen-teacher, Lydia Malcolm, Jean Rambo-nurse, Gisela Titman and Mrs. Nelson Williams. On December 18, 1964 they met and organize themselves into three committees.

Jean Ford was elected to chair the steering committee. It was charged with addressing the various Parent Teacher Associations and other service organizations. A certification sub-committee was appointed to attend to the mechanics of circulating the petition and the area committees were established which would canvass all of the townships and housing developments that had sprung up within the proposed district.

News of the proposed library district was not well received by Robbins Cahill, the county administrator. He felt that a library could wait until it was possible to tax all property owners in a single unified district. ⁵ Mrs. Ford later recalled that Robbins felt it was bad government to create an independent taxing district and I have to agree, now." But the fact that there were no plans for any kind of library to serve the unincorporated Clark County, the idea of unifying the five existing town libraries (Boulder City, Clark County District 1, Henderson, Las Vegas and North Las Vegas) seemed remote at best.⁶

Another source of opposition was from North Las Vegas City Manager, Clay Lynch, who thought that another taxing entity would make it impossible to increase taxes for other future services.⁷ At the time, the combined general tax rate for the county was \$3.251 and the highest rate in the

area affected by the proposed library district was \$4.799. The constitutional limit was \$5. 8

But the residents, mostly new, who had decided to join the petitioning campaign were not persuaded by such arguments. They felt they needed a readily available library for the people as soon as possible. The President of the United States, Lyndon Johnson seems to have anticipated their desires earlier that year when signing the amendment to the Library Services And Construction Act. He said

"...Good public libraries must be placed within the reach of all of our people. Libraries are not just for the young and the curious....[they] are for everyone and therein lies their real value". 9.

The members of the Committee To Create A Library were oblivious to the President's words, however. They were simply a citizens action group, a "grass roots" movement that, faced with the inaction of local government, were determined to act on their own behalf. 10

By mid-February of 1965 they would become aware of the Nevada Library Association's statewide plan for library development which was presented to the 1965 Legislative session. The Nevada State Plan, as it was called, clearly stated that:

"...An area will be considered to be without library service

if there is no free, public library, branch,...or bookmobile service within the boundaries of the area, or if there is no local tax levied in support of free, public library service."¹¹

This definition not only confirmed the belief of the leadership but also justified their effort.

February 5, 1965 was the deadline for inclusion in the county budget for fiscal year 1965 and the steering committee ambitiously set this date to obtain the signatures of taxpayers all over the county as its primary goal.

But thirty days was far too short a time to accomplish such a difficult task. The campaign began on January 2, 1965 with more than 60 volunteers. The certification committee went everyday to the county court house to verify that each signature was indeed a property owner, to find the property on the plat maps to make certain that it was within the unincorporated county area and to obtain the assessed value of the property. Values were totaled for each petition page on an adding machine and the tape attached.¹²

Mrs. Ford recalled the arduous task of signature verification, "...of course none of the records were computerized. Sometimes we were surprised to find that an individual owned several properties but there were also those who owned none at all...it was really slow going and we realized after two weeks that it would take 10 years to verify the required \$100,000,000 in properties.

So I went to talk to John Porter, Deputy District Attorney of Clark County. He searched the California law (Nevada models much of its law after its neighbor) and suggested that we seek to have the law amended since the Legislature was then in session by contacting Vernon Bunker, chairman of the Clark County Legislative Delegation". 13

The campaign closed on January 31, 1965 with far too few signatures. However, defeat under one statute was turned into victory under another. Mrs. Ford did contact Mr Bunker and she had to testify before the legislature. There was some resistance among the Clark County representatives due to the tax rate limitation but none of the other counties in the state were near the \$5 limit and Clark was the only remaining county that had no rural library service.

As a result of Mrs. Ford's testimony the rest of the legislators voted in favor of the bill to amend the existing library laws that had been introduced in the state legislature to reduce the number of signatures of taxpayers and property required downward to 10 percent. Governor, Grant Sawyer signed the bill into law on April, 1965.¹⁴

Jean Ford returned to Clark County and continued to collect signatures, alone, following a refined strategy of approaching only the owners of the very largest properties business and industrial properties. 15

Jean's drive stalled at 16 million dollars for weeks. She found that few businessmen and utility companies, wanted

their taxes raised, although Nevada Power was the exception. Finally, A.A. Collum signed for the Sahara hotel, with an assessed value of \$5 million, putting the drive over the top, on August 3, 1965. Mr. Collum stated at the signing ceremony that "...a [free] library is a sign of a maturity in a community". 16

On August 20, 1965 "...Mrs. Ford presented signed petitions representing 10% or more of the valuation of property on the 1964-1965 tax roll located in the area involved in the proposed Clark County Library District...and certification...that there has been compliance with Chapter 442, 1965 Statutes of Nevada..."17 to the Board of County Commissioners.

The resolution proposing the formation of a county library district was adopted unanimously and when after thirty days there was no challenge to its resolution, the Commission approved the formation of the library district and appointed its first board of trustees on October 5, 1965.18

THE FIRST DECADE

1965-1975

The first board was composed of: Clarence Boyd and Lou Oloff, two businessmen; Gisela Titman, a housewife; Louella Schiller, a nurse and housewife, and Edward Austin, a retired businessman who resigned after the second meeting

and was replaced by attorney, Earl Monsey. On December 1, 1965 the board held their first meeting in Mrs. Schiller's kitchen to develop a budget and service plan for the new library.

Perhaps the most important result of that night was the adoption of the idea of a library that would also be a cultural center. This became policy. It was never recanted by that or any future board; thus the first building, which was briefly discussed at this meeting, was designed with an exhibit space and an auditorium as integral parts. All of the buildings thereafter used the original concept as a matrix. Each having a gallery and an auditorium or meeting room(s) for use by the public free of charge.

The minutes of the third meeting show that the board voted to request the long term assistance of the State Library's Field Representative, B.J. (Barbara J.) Mauseth until the board hired a professional librarian. The request was granted without delay. (B.J. Mauseth had been a guest at the first two meetings providing advice to the fledgling board, in accordance with the statutory obligations of the State Library.)

Six months later, the board secured its first budget of \$44,312 from the county. Public Library Service: A Guide To Evaluation With Minimum Standards, developed by the American Library Association, as criteria for libraries were formally adopted by the trustees as policy.

SERVICE BEGINS

The first library director was a graduate of the University of Minnesota's Library School. Charles Atkins, assumed his post on September 1, 1966. Prior to accepting the Clark County position had been the Yolo County Librarian in Woodland, California and had spent 11 years as Assistant County Librarian in Sacramento, California. 19 His appointment was reported in the NLA's Newsletter, Nevada Libraries with the observation that:

...for the first time in library history, all Clark County residents have access to library services--theoretically. Actually, the new District is operating out of leased quarters, and at this time cannot offer actual public service...(October 1966, p.80).

This was in reference to the offices the Board had rented in the Airport Office Building at 5441 Paradise Road. Where, despite a lack of publicity, some of the public managed to discover the library's work and storage space in two cramped rooms.

At the September 20th, 1966 Board meeting Mr. Atkins presented a "public service expansion proposal" to start in 1966 to 1970. It included general figures on the necessary size of the central building the Board was planning; a collection development plan; a plan to distribute the

growing collection between leased quarters and bookmobiles until the permanent building was completed; a list of necessary positions for the remainder of the 1966-67 fiscal year with recommended classifications and a salary scale. (A professional cataloger was first on the list of the positions needing to filled immediately). Mr. Atkins' master plan was adopted.

During the October 19, 1966 meeting of the Board, Mr. Atkins explained book catalogs to the trustees and requested permission to start the process of finding a company that would compile Clark County's catalog.

THE INITIAL COLLECTION

In an interview with a local newspaper, Director Atkins told the press of the library's intent to acquire 100,000 volumes within three years, as a first stage goal. He had made certain that the leased quarters the library would operate from had sufficient storage space for this purpose.²⁰

Atkins was spending an average of \$10,000.00 each month for books and non-book materials, in preparation for the opening of the first service location. Applying the ALA standard for acquisitions of one book for every five people served, he hoped to have a total collection of 70,000 volumes by 1969. This total would not, as it turned out, meet the minimum one volume per capita due to the rise in population to 89,667 in 1970.

On April 11, 1967, in keeping with its long-range plans, the Library Boards minutes show that an application was made to the Max C. Fleischman Foundation of Nevada requesting a grant of \$125,000 to be used to construct a 50,000 square foot library building. (The Foundation was a trust fund created by Fleischman, chairman of the board of Standard Brands Incorporated and resident of Nevada from 1935 until his death in 1951. The fund totaled \$192 million which was to be completely distributed within twenty years of his wife Sarah's death. The fund went out of existence on July 4, 1980. But during the twenty years of its operation it granted about \$7 million to communities for professionally planned and constructed public library buildings in Nevada.)²¹

Requests for proposals were approved for mailing to all Nevada Registered Architects at this meeting. ²² Negotiations on terms of the lease for 3,200 sq. ft. of space in a Paradise Valley shopping center were approved for chairman Boyds signature. This space would be the temporary home of the new library. ²³

The First Location

The newly formed Friends of The Clark County Library hosted the reception for the library board's open house held to advertise the move into quarters at the University Plaza, in the township of Paradise Valley, on June 11, 1967.²⁴

The library officially opened for public service on the same day at 1131 East Tropicana, suite "J".

The library had a staff of nine, which included one professional, Chester K. Davis in technical services, a collection of 25,000 books and one bookmobile. Library of Congress classification was used to organize the collection because it was used by "most universities and will be more computer oriented".²⁵ Service hours were Monday through Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and Wednesdays until 9:00 p.m.

Bookmobile service was first extended to the communities of Indian Springs, Winterwood and Parkdale from 10:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, respectively. Four thousand books were housed in this 35 foot library. (Eventually the District would acquire 3 more to extend services into Lincoln and Nye counties under the terms of an LSCA program.) A clerk-driver and a librarian staffed the "book trailers" and ventured into the desert with a set of keys to the McCanles repair yard and the telephone number for the Ewing Brother's Towing service, to bring the library to the most rural part of southern Nevada.

The Rural Branches

In the spring of 1968, the Clark County Library District merged with the Educational Library District No.1, which included libraries in Overton, Logandale, Mesquite and

Bunkerville (see map, appendix A). All were northeast of Las Vegas. This merger made all of District No.1's libraries branches of CCLD and was the first move toward a unified library system in Southern Nevada, a long term goal of the Board of Trustees.²⁶

In the southern part of the county two more branches were brought into service in April and September, 1968 respectively. Goodsprings first library was established in the front room of an old mining house that was being used for storage. Mr. William Russell and his wife, Ceciela ("Tiny"), agreed to allow Mr. Atkins to use their house when the towns civic club could not offer a facility. The Russell's daughter, Peggy, became that library's first and only manager.²⁷ Further south, the Searchlight Civic Club provided space for a branch library in the Searchlight Town Hall.

In April 1968, the Fleischmann Foundation awarded \$1,380,000 to build a 50,000 square foot building. This building was to be the "Central Library of the Library District...and so constructed [as] to allow for future expansion to a maximum 80,000 square feet."²⁸ In their original proposal for a central building the trustees had projected the population growth from 1966 through 1985. According to their calculations after 1985 additional growth would be accommodated by using expansion features (appendix B). The groundbreaking ceremonies took place on January 17, 1969.

Director Atkins accepted a position as Librarian for the Santa Cruz Public Library in California, in May 1969. It was left to his successor to guide the young library system into the next decade.

Hardin E. Smith became the second director of the District. The new director was well known to the library community of Nevada through his regular contributions to the Library Journal and ALA Bulletin. Mr. Smith came to Clark County from East Chicago, Indiana where he was "...first adult services librarian, then director of that program. He has had practical experience in the field of extension service also, having been a bookmobile librarian, as well as supervisor of branches and bookmobiles, in ...Missouri. 29

After two years of operation the library's holdings had risen to 46,487 volumes, 32,695 titles, 1428 phonorecords and 100 pieces of framed art. The total circulation for 1968 was 126,379 and in 1969 it was 140,400.³⁰ The staff rose from 9 to 12 by the end of 1969. Population had reached 89,667, an increase of approximately 19,000 in the first two years of the library's operation.³¹

The Seventies

As 1970 began, work progressed on the new building and after many construction delays the new Clark County District Library Central building opened to the public on January 15, 1971.

The Central Library immediately became the cultural center the trustees had envisioned and discussed at their very first meeting. It offered exhibits, concerts, movies, classes and programs all without charge and open to the public. Cultural programming was in addition to the service which had been offered at the old location; to these were added a separate reference department, microfilm facilities, and a Young Peoples department and in March of 1971, CCLD became a depository for Talking Books - with a retrospective collection - only until such time as availability of staff made it feasible for the District to acquire current copies which would be for state wide distribution.³²

In June of 1971 Hardin Smith tendered his resignation in order to accept a position in Oregon. Clarence K. Davis, head of technical services, became Acting Director while the Board of Trustees began a national search for a permanent director.³³

The search ended when on October 11, 1971 the Board voted to appoint Charles W. Hunsberger to become the third director of the Clark County Library District. Mr. Hunsberger, a Case Western Library School graduate, joined the Library District in December, leaving his position as Director of the Monroe County Public Library in Bloomington, Indiana.³⁴

The new Director's first Annual Report for 1971-1972 reflected his intent to increase immediately the levels and

quality of service by adding personnel, extending service to more rural communities and increasing the hours of operation at the central building. These improvements resulted in a \$96,000 increase in operating funds (this increase brought the budget for the 1972-73 fiscal year to \$496,332.00).³⁵

STAFFING

The increases in staff were qualitative. Each additional position was in the highly visible public area or critical to the service delivered there and provided the necessary experience to afford increased service. A MLS librarian and two assistants increased the staff in Reference from one professional and a library assistant. Two librarians joined the clerk/driver in the formally organized Extension Department. (In the past librarians were assigned on a rotating basis to the bookmobile) This department became responsible for training the rural library managers in monthly group meetings.

A Library Coordinator, who was to supervise and coordinate the work of the various departments, develop the staff and develop the materials collection, was also added.

The other department staffs, Circulation, Young People and Technical Services, remained at their 1970 levels of 12, 7 and 6 respectively.³⁷

COLLECTION GROWTH AND CIRCULATION

The collection was evaluated during the 1971-72 fiscal year and the professional staff assigned to do materials selection. From 87,909 by June 30, 1971 to June 30, 1972 the total volumes had reached 98,816, a rise of 12.40% and total titles represented were up from 48,337 to 53,936, an increase of 11.58%. Phonorecords holdings rose 10.77%, numbering 3,934 in 1971 and increasing to 4,358. Circulation rose by 45.72% from 214,979 to 313,278 at the central library. The branches and booktrailer reporting their annual circulation for the first time in 1971 rose from 62,920 to 68,157, an increase of 8.32%. 38

Interlibrary Cooperation

The library administrators of the five other libraries in the county, Boulder, Henderson, Las Vegas City and North Las Vegas during 1972 worked to establish a regular policy of exchanging materials and signed cooperative agreements to aid each library to reach its service goals.

In December of the same year, CCLD entered into an agreement with the city of Las Vegas to manage its two libraries. The agreement, concluded without legal council, made the Clark County Library District responsible for the day to day operation of the cities libraries, transferred personnel to the District's staff and in fiscal year 1974 the library budgets were combined. But it was stipulated that the city was to retained ownership of the collection

purchased for its two locations and the building that housed Las Vegas Public would "...revert to the city after 2 years with the city providing library land sites for branches on the East and West sides of the city. In the central city area, a site will be provided...for the relocation of present library services...". 39

Although a full merger did not occur, a coordinated plan for library service was developed by the Clark County Library District administration. "All citizens living in the [combined service areas] shall receive equal library services under a single policy...with the needs of all library users considered and the present services shall be upgraded to meet minimum American Library Association standard...area wide provide bookmobile, branch and main library services operations...Where these are below standards or unavailable the new district shall establish operation priorities that will meet the community service need..."(ibid)

The city's libraries, Las Vegas Public (founded in 1909) and Decatur, its only branch, were located downtown at 400 East Mesquite in a twenty year old building, constructed with contributed funds and labor and at 720 Decatur Blvd in a storefront. These two operations served the largest concentration of citizens (70,318) in Clark County, those within the city limits of Las Vegas. As a result of the management agreement they immediately began operating under the District's membership and circulation rules. (Its

former membership requirements having been so restrictive that access was severely limited even to citizens.) 40.

In keeping with the Districts stated policies, a second Las Vegas city branch was opened one year after the "merger" to serve the city's ghetto, euphemistically called the "West side". This predominantly black neighborhood lay slightly to the north and west of downtown. Under an agreement with the city and a local bank, Operation Life (a non-profit organization) became the landlords of the West Las Vegas branch at 1402 "D" Street, a second storefront location.⁴¹

COPING WITH GROWTH

The operations budget soared to \$537,071 in the last half year of FY 73-74 and to \$1,060,443 for fiscal year 74-75, after the second full year of inclusion of the Las Vegas Public Library organization. (Appendix C)

Rising personnel⁴² costs precipitated by an average 12 percent growth in circulation at headquarters alone, 1971 - 313,278; 1972 - 365,00; 1973 - 403,720. (see Appendix B) led the Board to seek a technological solution by automating the District's circulation systems.

An RFP (request for proposals) was distributed for: "a turnkey system ...that could serve all libraries of the Clark County Library District and be open to expand as needed to include other libraries...and each library shall be able to inquire as to the status of any item or user in

the system...compile service charges incurred by patrons and print the necessary statements of charges and receipts..." for bids.⁴³

On May 20, 1974 the trustees awarded the contract to Computer Library Services, Inc. (CLSI) of Newton Massachusetts for \$286,212.00. Clark County became the third library in the far West to automate.

As Library Coordinator, Nancy Hudson lead the District into the new world of high technology, interfacing with CLSI, planning the conversion and training the staff. Conversion was the nightmare many libraries have suffered since; but CCLD's was eased considerably because their entire catalog was in books rather than on cards.⁴⁴

More than 175,000 titles were entered into the LIBS 100 system which began operating in February, 1975. The University of Nevada, Las Vegas joined the system, with the aid of LSCA funds, after it began operating; thereby creating the first joint public-academic circulation system in the nation.⁴⁵ (Two years later the Community College also joined the budding network.) With the addition of the UNLV collection and the completion of the Las Vegas Public reclassification project, users had access to more than 500,000 titles.

Additional Rural Services

While preparations for automation proceeded, in 1974, the Nevada State Library designated Clark County Library to deliver library services to the unserved population in the region, outside of the library district. (see Appendix A-1) A combination of state and federal grants were given to extend services to these populations.

A new bookmobile, the old one had been retired from travel to become a stationary location first at Indian Springs and then at Blue Diamond in 1970 (see Appendix E), brought services to the neighboring counties of Esmeralde, Lincoln and Nye. Biweekly the bookmobile visited Lathrop Wells, Round Mountain, Manhattan and Esmeralde. The alternate weeks were spent in Alamo, Ash Springs, Hiko, Caliente, Panaca, Pinoche and Castleton. (see Appendix A-1) As a collateral service "books by mail" was initiated in the three county region.

Eventually there were four bookmobiles which bisected southern Nevada traveling up to 75,000 miles annually to more than 60 locations in Clark and its neighboring counties. The librarians and clerks who manned the cumbersome vehicles can relate some interesting, often hilarious tales. Many of the librarians were Easterners with no experience of the great Mojave expanses; but to their credit most remained with the District, making valuable contributions to the development of the system over the years.⁴⁶

In Las Vegas the unserved populations in hospitals, rest homes, the county jail and detention center were not forgotten. A second mobile library, purchased with federal funds, visited these shut-ins on a regular schedule, starting shortly after the regional services in 1974. 47

Volunteer Services

Trustee Angelo Codello instigated the revitalization of the Friends of the Clark County Library, in 1975. They had formed to help in the Tropicana location but after the move to the new building became inactive.48 In October, 1975 the Friends' used book sale raised more than \$2,000.

A volunteer program was begun to improve service at the headquarters building in 1980. They were used to relieve staff members of non-professional duties in Circulation, Community Relations, Periodicals, Technical Services and Young Peoples Library.49

The Library District was firmly established by the tenth anniversary of its founding. Services were extended to 80 percent of the county. Further region development would require a new library laws, since as written they did were silent regarding the joining of city and county libraries. Legislation would have to be drafted and submitted to the state legislature addressing this omission.

THE SECOND DECADE

1976-1986

Ten years after the Board of Trustees began planning to deliver library service to the citizens of Clark County, Nevada, a small system of urban and rural libraries was firmly established, connected by a computer network that allowed them to track and share their collections among themselves and with the state university.

The new computer reported, that at the end of fiscal year 1976 total patrons on file was 67,736. This represented the first complete count of borrowers on file. Total titles on file was 146,490, a 172% increase in the four years since the 1972 totals of 53,936 titles. The total volumes was 240,345, compared to 98,818 volumes to the 1972 figure this was an increase of 143% (see Appendix D). The staff had reached 73 (professional 18, clerical 55) with salaries of \$840,500 a substantial 223% increase over 1972 staff total of 40 (no professional numbers available) and salaries of \$260,076.50 Circulation for the year reached 1,055,739, a 278% increase over the 1972 figure of 381,435. The Extension department's portion of the 1976 circulation was no doubt particularly gratifying, having risen by 129%, from 68,157 in 1972 to 155,919 in 1976. (see Appendix B)

Despite budget cuts for some libraries in neighboring states, Clark County's remained uncut and even rose continually through FY 80/81. (see Appendix C) This was due,

undoubtedly, to the rise in population which was causing the tax base to grow constantly. Additionally many of the new residents came from communities with strong library service and were immediate supporters by making a trip to the library one of their first priorities.

As 1979 ended the libraries were struggling to keep abreast of the booming population. There now were 149,354 patrons on file and new cards were being issued at the rate of 300 plus each month.

Titles were being entered into the system at the rate of about 900 a month; with a total of 315,592 on file as of December 26, 1979 and 524,087 items. In 1976 146,490 titles were cataloged and volumes totaled 240,345 (see Appendix D). The percent of increase was 115% and 118% respectively.

The 1980 census reported 385,279 people. The decade had begun with only 89,667. Although these figures represented a 330% increase, population growth was only two years ahead of the Board's original projection.

Four urban branches were in operation, in addition to Headquarters and eight rural extension branches in 1979, as compared to a single urban library and six rural branches in 1970.

Only one new building had been erected since the headquarters facility in 1971. The Charleston Heights library and arts center had been completed in 1978. All of the other facilities were in temporary quarters. It was time to seek funds for capital expenditures.

Although the Heights building used federal public works funds 51, that source of funding did not exist after

1980. It was time to seek help from the State. This would prove to be an up-hill battle.

Fiscal Conservatism Slows Growth

The Nevada Legislature joined the rest of the nation's state legislatures in a conservative swing in 1979. The legislature adopted a tax cut measure which had the effect of cutting the Library's budget by \$250,000 (10%) for fiscal year 1981-82. This despite the vocal efforts of Director Hunsberger and the other members of the Board and the Friends.⁵²

And then in fear of an emulation of Proposition 13 in California, Question 6 was stripped of the 1½ cents property tax levy to increase the libraries operating budget in the final hours of the 1983 legislative session.⁵³

In response, in 1981, to the tax limitation the Board approved a hiring freeze and raised copying fees from 5 to 10 cents, and fines from 10 to 20 cents per day per book. A campaign to raise money to increase the book fund was begun in 1982.

The Bucks for Books campaign (primarily a direct mail solicitation) became an annual effort following the success of the first year (\$55,000). The appeal averaged \$70,500 through the rest of the decade.⁵⁴ Although this and other fund raisers helped, they could not resolve the basic problems of too few books and inadequate space.

The District's service population was nearly 500,000 by 1980 with only one book per person owned by the library, while the national average was two. A survey of the 35 Western library districts showed that CCLD was spending the least per person, \$7.68 annually, placing it last.⁵⁵

In light of the population growth in Southern Nevada the Library was being asked to do more and more with less. A two-pronged effort was mounted by the District. First it fully supported the Friends when they decided to lobby the 1983 session of the Legislature to alleviate the library's dependence on local property tax by providing state funding. In addition, a state wide bond issue was proposed that would benefit all of the states's libraries. Librarians took to the road to speak to local meetings of taxpayers all over the state.

The end result was failure of both efforts. While the bond issue passed in Clark County there were not sufficient votes cast to override the negative votes of the state's other counties.

There was a second revenue short fall in FY 82/83 which was eased by the receipts from Bucks for Books and the newly instituted Chili Cook-Off. The volunteers helped to avoid service cut backs, but no overtime was permitted and all materials, even paper clips were rationed strictly and free copying was eliminated except when needed information could only be found in reference materials and then there was a limit of 10 copies per question. These measures prevented

loss of the gains made over the years. But, inevitably, growth of the collection was hampered by the lack of adequate funding.

All the while more and more new library cards were being issued. In May of 1983, the total number of patrons reached 221,667 with average weekly input near 300; At the close of 1980 there were 163,794 patrons on file.

In the Spring of 1984 the Board of Trustees again put the state wide bond issue on the Spring ballot and in addition decided to ask its own county to pass a second 10 million dollar bond issue for the exclusive use of Clark County library buildings. New sophistication in lobbying and campaigning, learned from past failures, was applied right up to the day that ballots were casts.

The population growth that was so problematical to serve proved of benefit after all. Southern votes outnumbered the North's and netted the state's libraries 10 million dollars in bond monies.

Proposed library legislation for 1985 included a housekeeping bill amendment to state library laws that permitted the conversion of city of county libraries to library districts". Its passage permitted the long desired consolidation of Las Vegas Public with Clark County Library District. The newly formed union became the Las Vegas-Clark County Library District and received \$7,156,151 of the state bond funds.

In addition the Clark County electorate also passed a

local 15 million dollar initiative in the spring of 1985; thereby launching a building program unmatched by in the history of Nevada.

Permanent Buildings

The board planned nine building projects totaling 193,450 square feet for urban facilities and 14,050 square feet for extension branches. For the next five years one or two new or renovated building(s) opened for service each year. (Figure 1)

The first was the original central building, expanded by 7,000 square feet to 60,640, in November of 1986. It was replaced as the District's headquarters when the new building for the Las Vegas Library opened in 1990.

During the interim, a permanent building replaced most of the branches which had opened in rented storefronts or book trailers over the years. (Figure 1) However, only three of rural libraries was built and owned by the District. The rest were in buildings completed by the individual towns.⁵⁶

Twenty Years of Growth

After twenty years of service to an ever growing community, the Clark County Library District experienced remarkable development. At the end of its 1986-87 fiscal year it was serving a population of 458,687 as opposed to 385,278 in FY79/80. (Figure 3)

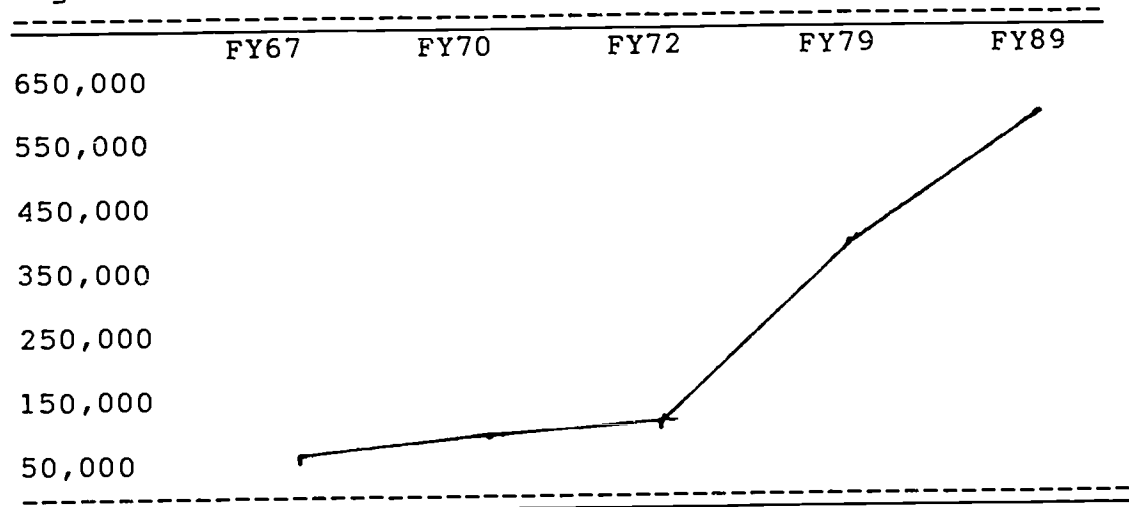


Figure 4. **CIRCULATION PER CAPITA**

The system's titles had reached 550,743, representing 1,128,277 volumes. In 1979 these figures were 315,592 and 524,087 respectively. Circulation was 1,897,091 compared to the 1979 total of 1,402,720. And the 1979 total patrons (149,354) had increased to 241,466 in six years. (Figure 2&4)

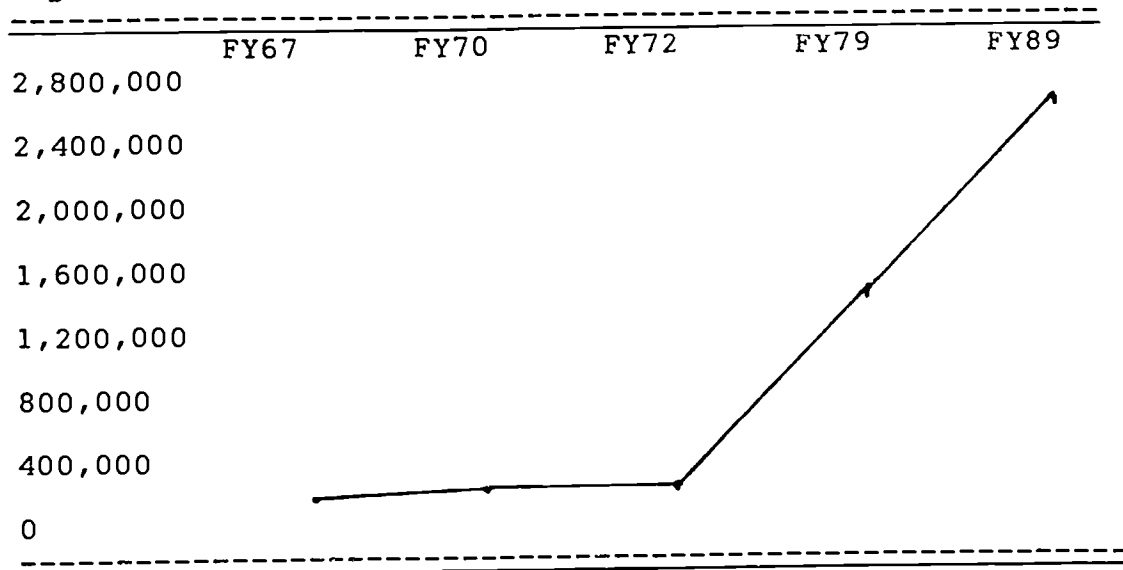
Collection Development in the Eighties

Although the first \$1 million book budget was approved in 1986, books per capita continued to be unsatisfactory. In addition, state of the art technology was expected by users, consequently the District made its catalog accessible by telephone with a help line for novice users. CD ROMs products, such as Info Trac, online data bases like DIALOG and microcomputers were available, by 1989, at all urban branches.

Numbers of books was not the sole criteria in stocking the shelves of the libraries, quality was also a critical factor. To this end the professional staff each was assigned a subject area for which they were selectors. They were charged with keeping their areas current in all of the libraries in the District, making quarterly book orders. Their selections were for the core collections that each location should have.

Figure 3. FY = fiscal year

Staff Development

Training for staff in the new technologies was implemented to enable them to better assist users and for the self-improvement of the employee. Compulsory classes were given periodically in customer service and conflict resolution to all staff members.

The board adopted a continuing education policy in 1986 which encourages all employees to take academic classes at the university that are work related with full reimbursement when classes are completed successfully. Each year a stipend was awarded to two employees, if they are admitted to an MLS program along with a guaranteed professional position if they return to the District after one year with a Master of Library Science degree from an American Library Association accredited program. 57

PREPARING FOR THE YEAR 2000

The Board of Trustees renewed the vow of the first board to meet the desired goal of two books per capita while meeting the information needs of all citizens of its service population, in 1990.

As the 1985 building campaign neared completion in the spring of 1990, the board determined that the 2.5 mile radius area that each building was to serve would not cover the new neighborhoods being created to house the new residents that continued to enter the county.

Speaking for the entire board in an open letter in 1990 Past Chairman, C. Danny Lee wrote "...the future is remarkably clear...The growth rate of our sun-belt community indicates that the population will be over one million by the year 2000...We also know where the growth in our valley is going to take place and we plan to be there with library buildings, books and staff..." 58

The Board announced to the public that eight more buildings would be needed to meet their needs. An 80 million dollar bond issue, 70 million for new construction and 10 million for books, was passed by the concerned citizens of Clark County, Nevada in May of 1991.

CONCLUSION

Contrary to the state's "boom and bust" history, Clark County's population growth continued from 1942 through 1990. In 1964 a fortunate confluence of industrious volunteers, professional vision, supportive legislators and businessmen and eager patrons made the founding of the first "free" public library in Clark County, Nevada possible. The county's ever-growing tax base has funded the library well, allowing it to meet the information needs of its citizens with increasingly larger collections, state of the art technology and most importantly professional management at all levels.

As we have seen, the members of the Committee to Create A Library came to the valley expecting free library service but unlike their predecessors, there was not simply a desire to provide for their personal use in an unsettled territory.⁵⁹ The aspiration to provide library service for all of their neighbors, near and far, dove tailed with those of the State Librarian was in the process of developing a state wide plan to deliver library service to unserved populations.⁶⁰

The Committee, and later the first library board, sought the Librarian's professional guidance, thus establishing the only library in Clark County founded on the American Library Association's basic philosophy, principles and a determinations to meet its standards as a matter of policy.

Although a mission statement, policy, goals and objective were not formally written or published until 1986, ⁶¹ the actions of the various boards and directors clearly show an adherence to ALA policies mentioned in minutes of the board meetings and special reports (e.g. the 1972 merger report) to it. Long-range planning and responsiveness to community needs has been their hallmark.

Planning expedited the opening of library locations in areas experiencing growth, first in rented space. In this way service was extended promptly, gaining the allegiance of newly arrived citizens. After demonstrated use, a professionally designed and constructed library a building near the old location. (Figure 5)

The new buildings provide proper facilities to house collections that reflect diverse community profiles, while meeting the intellectual, educational and recreational needs and desires of the individual communities.

In addition, the initial desire to become the cultural center of Las Vegas is materializing. LV-CCLD's urban system is home to a symphony orchestra and three professional theatre companies. There are galleries in every building showing the work of local professional and amateur artists, all year, on a constantly rotating basis, so that all branches display all shows before they close. And in 1990, the long awaited children's museum (the Lied) opened to the public in the newly completed, Las Vegas Library building, delighting the children of Clark County, Nevada.

Since there has long been a hope for an art gallery that could host shows as prestigious as the Tut exhibition, within the community, the library has decided to realize it. Construction will soon begin on the West Sahara branch which will have just such an exhibition space.

The future looks very promising for this vigorous young system, because the library's board of trustees, administration, staff and the community they serve show every sign of continuing to work together for the best library service possible.

APPENDIX A

INFORMATION ON A PROPOSED DISTRICT LIBRARY

Objective

To establish a county district library which will provide free, public library services in all areas of the county not served by existing libraries.

Service and taxing area

All areas of the county excluding those served by the Las Vegas Public Library, the North Las Vegas Municipal Library, the Henderson District Public Library, the Boulder City Public Library, or the Clark County Educational District #1 Libraries.

Included in the service area of the county district library will be the metropolitan areas adjacent to Las Vegas and North Las Vegas, Paradise Valley, Blue Diamond, Sloan, Goodsprings, Indian Springs, Nelson, Searchlight, and other unincorporated areas of the county.

Need for another library

Each of the five existing libraries provides service in a legally defined area for which the residents are taxed. In order to provide support for library service to the remainder of the county, it is necessary to establish a taxing district. A county library would necessitate double taxation on the residents of the service areas of existing libraries.

Tax rate

No part of the county to be included in the county library district has reached the \$5 constitutional limit on property taxes. The combined general tax rate for the county is \$3.251 and the highest rate in the area affected is \$4.799.

NRS 379.080 stipulates that the library tax levied in a county library district shall be not less than 5¢ nor more than 15¢ for the initial year of establishment.

Method of providing service

Services would be provided from a central library located in the most populous areas, from library deposit stations (rotating collection) in smaller population centers, and by bookmobile in the rural areas.

Supplementary funds

The Library Services and Construction Act provides \$130,954 to Nevada in fiscal 1965 for library services in areas without library services or where facilities and resources are inadequate to provide service. Procedure

Petitions signed by a majority of the taxpayers, or taxpayers representing a majority of the taxable property in the district must be presented to the Board of County Commissioners. When properly certified and affidavits are presented, the Board of County Commissioners will order the creation of the library district, levy a tax in its support, and appoint a library board of trustees to proceed with the establishment of the library.

Timing

In order to establish a library during fiscal 1966, it will be necessary to accomplish the above in time to have a library budget for the district included in the official budget document of the county. Such a budget and its justification must be presented to the Board of County Commissioners by February 5, 1965.

APPENDIX A

To the Board of County Commissioners of Clark County, Nevada:

We, the undersigned, consisting of property owners or taxpayers in the proposed library district as stated below, hereby petition that a county library district be formulated to include that part of the aforesaid county which does not lie within the boundaries of the following library taxing areas: (1) The Las Vegas Library, (2) North Las Vegas Municipal Library, (3) Henderson District Library, (4) Boulder City Library, and (5) Clark County Educational District No. 1 Library, and that a free public library be established therein.

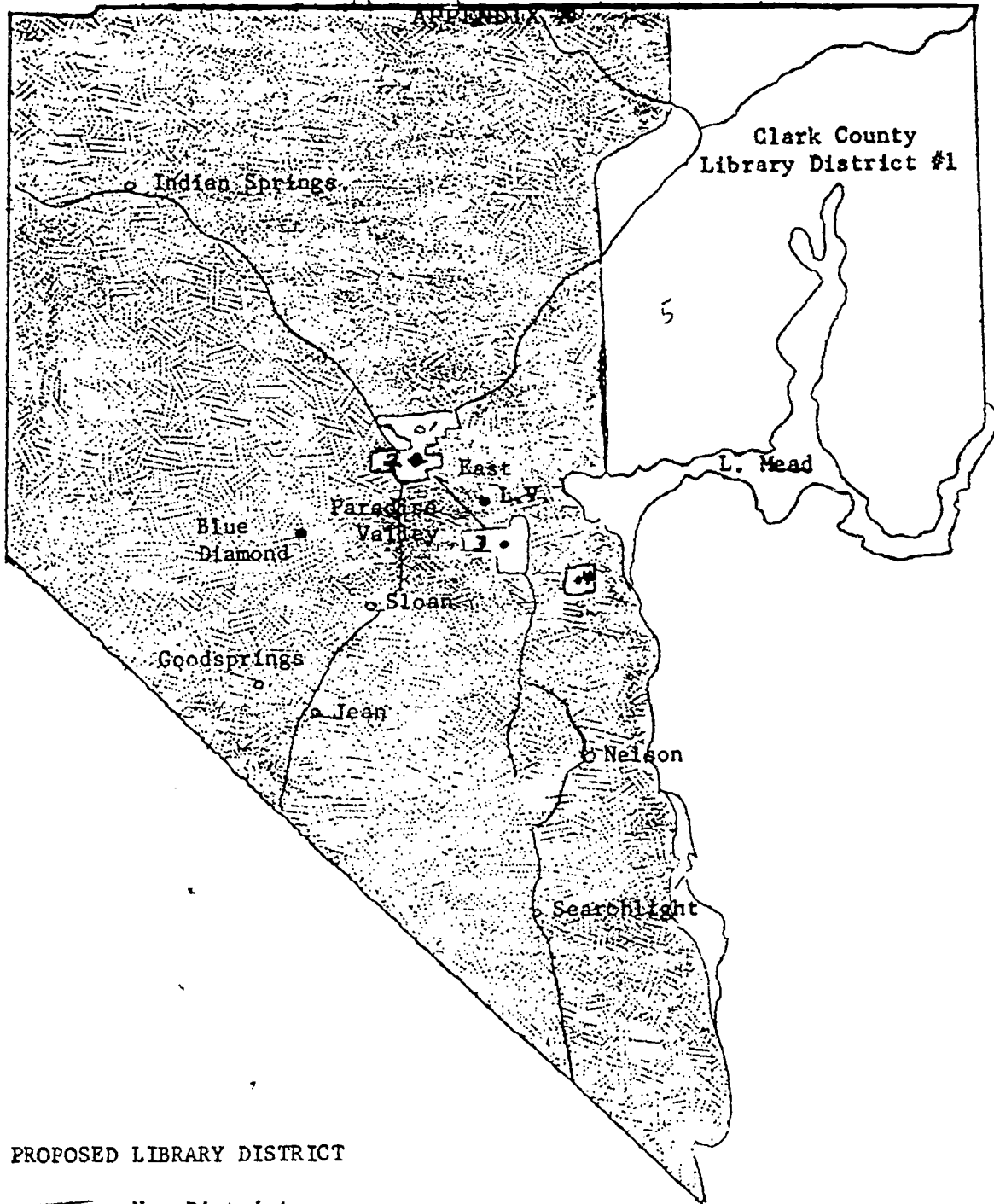

(Presently unserved areas)

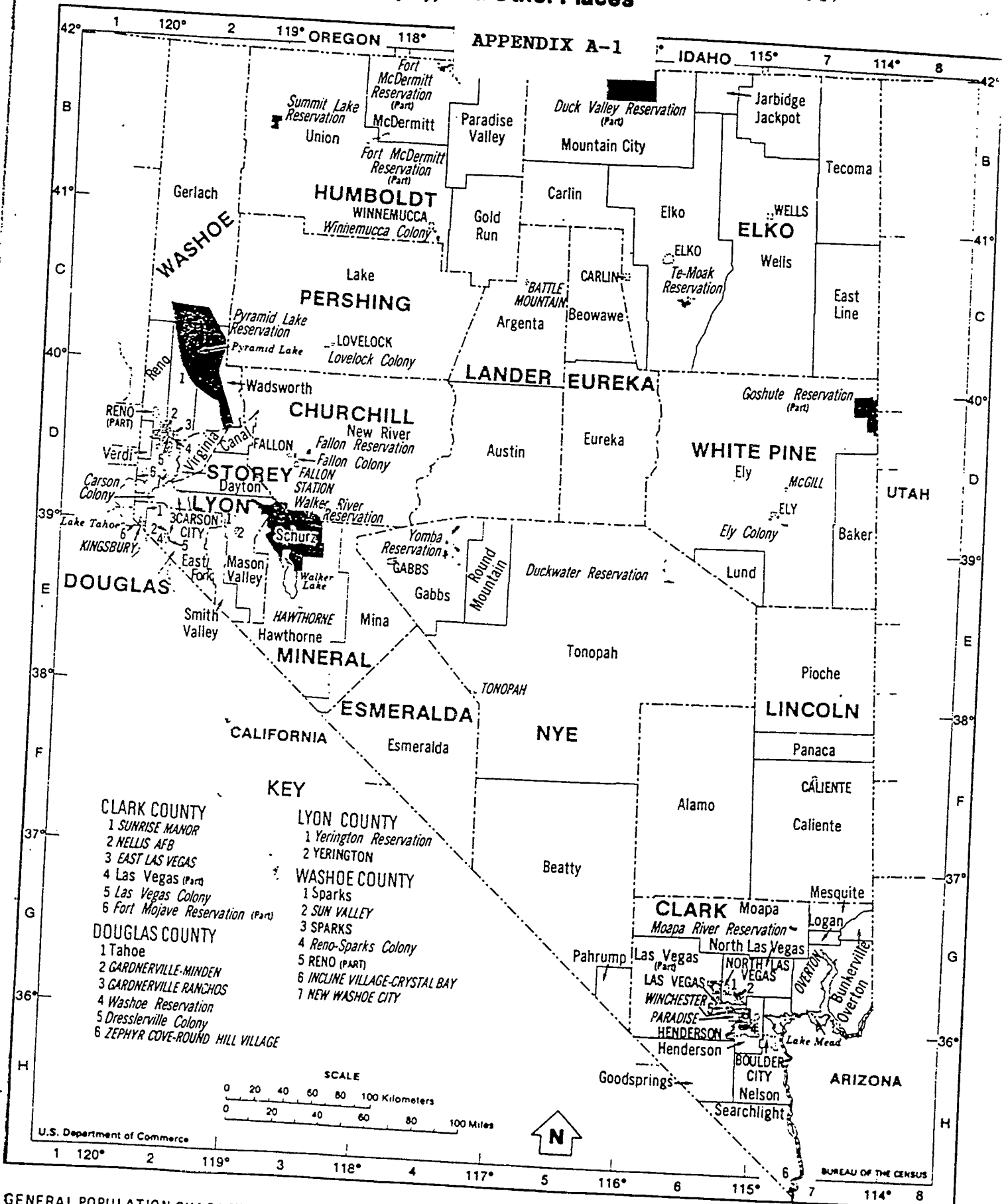
EXISTING LIBRARY SERVICE AND TAXING AREAS

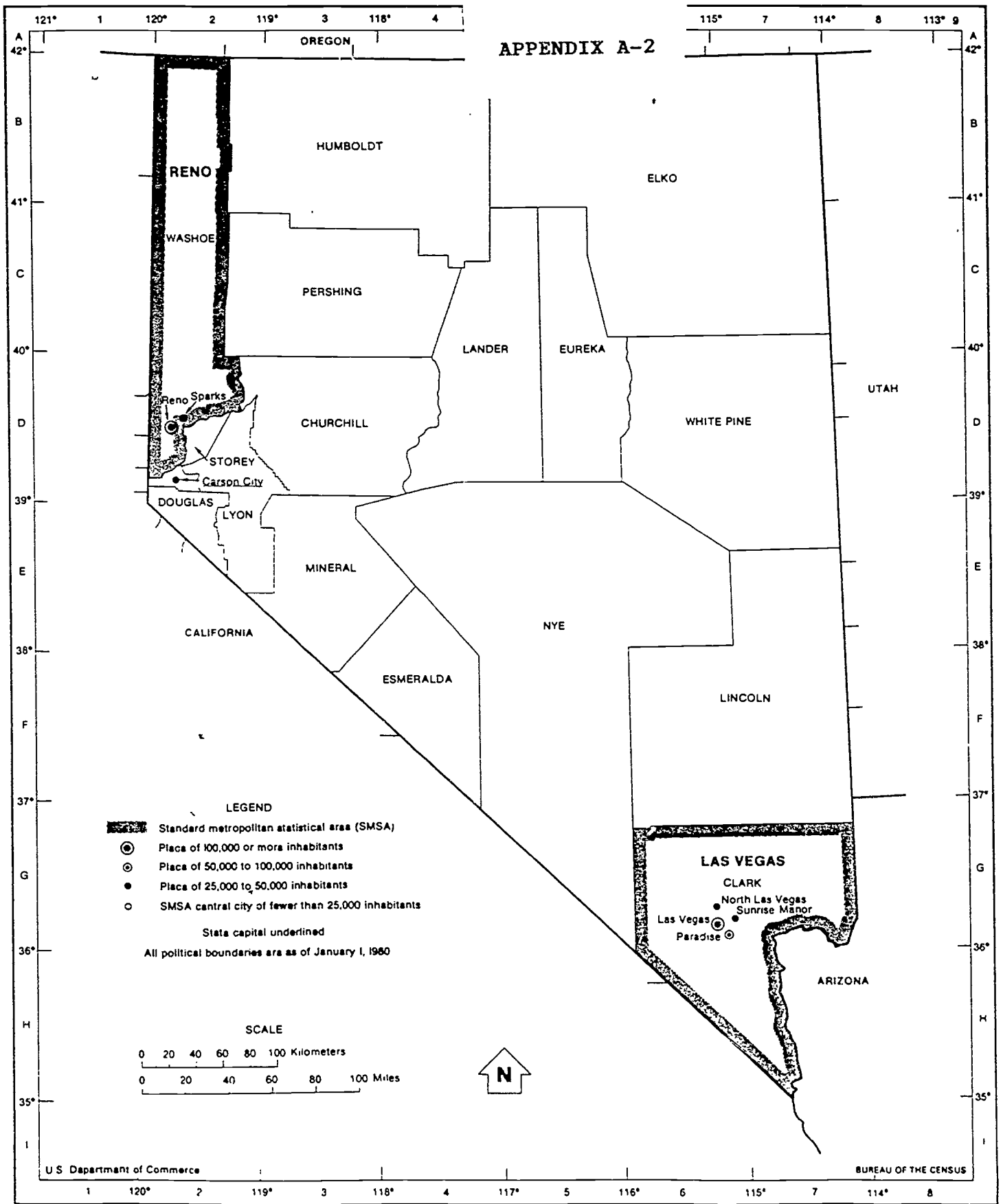
