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ABSTRACT

This directory contains the descriptions of a sample of approximately 150 summer programs offered to high school students by colleges and universities in various regions of the United States. Each entry provides: (1) a brief program description; (2) information regarding application procedures, costs, deadlines, and availability of financial assistance; and (3) the names and telephone numbers of contact people. The programs give migrant students an opportunity to experience college life while they develop their skills, interests, and talents, and to help them enroll in college. The directory is intended to encourage migrant students to take advantage of the many learning opportunities offered by colleges and universities in communities and states throughout the nation. The directory also includes a reprint of a list of program opportunities for "academically able" students, developed by the Center for Talented Youth at Johns Hopkins University. (TES)

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College Summer Programs for High School Students

For the great majority of migrant high school students, summer is a time to drop the books and pick up a pair of gloves, irrigation boots or a hoe. It is a time for many migrant students to assume additional responsibilities at home or a time to find a job to supplement the family income. Few migrant students take advantage of the many summer learning opportunities offered by college and universities in their community, state and throughout the nation.

This directory contains a list of summer programs offered to high school students by colleges and universities in various regions of the United States. Each entry provides a brief program description and includes information regarding application procedures, costs and availability of financial assistance. Also listed are the names and telephone numbers of contact persons for each program. It is recommended that colleges and universities be contacted early (fall semester) to obtain the necessary program information and application material for the following summer.

The programs listed in this directory are only a sample of the summer programs available to high school students. There are many other college and university summer learning opportunities offered throughout the country. This directory was developed to "whet" the appetite of school personnel as they begin their search for extended learning options for their students. The intent is to identify programs which give students the opportunity to experience college life while they develop their skills, interests, and talents. The goal ultimately is for more migrant students to enroll, attend and graduate from college.

Migrant students in Region IX are beginning to take advantage of precollege programs. Several students from San Diego County, have or will attend various programs in different parts of the country this summer. Silvia Collazo from Ramona was accepted to the LEAD Program this summer at Columbia University. She will attend the summer session from June 30 - July 8, 1991. All expenses will be paid by the university. Ramiro Aguirre from Orange County will attend the summer program for High School Juniors offered by the University of California at Santa Barbara. Last summer, Norma Mendoza of Escondido participated in the

Rocky Mountain Talent Search Summer Institute at the University of Denver. Norma indicated she had a wonderful experience at the program. This year Norma Mendoza hopes to attend the P.A.S.S. Program at Skidmore College in New York state. Veronica Olea and Blanca Hernandez of Escondido are applying to the Making of an Engineer Program at the University of Denver. This is a college level course in engineering for students in grades 10-12. All expenses for participation in the program will be paid by the university.

There are many other summer learning opportunities available for our migrant students. We hope this directory will be of assistance as you seek out those opportunities. The directory offers a glimpse of the many options available for migrant students to drop the gloves, irrigation boots and the hoe and again pick up the books. Not a bad way to spend the summer.
