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ABSTRACT

In 1992, surveys of the educational and employment status of 1991-1992 Associate of Arts degree program graduates were conducted by the seven community colleges in the Twin Cities metro area of Minnesota: Anoka-Ramsey, Cambridge Center, Inver Hills, Lakewood, Minneapolis, North Hennepin, and Normandale. All the colleges used the same survey instrument and two follow-up efforts. Results of the studies included the following: (1) the overall response rate for the seven colleges was 81%, with a high of 92% for Lakewood, and a low of 59% for Minneapolis; (2) 65% of all the respondents were currently enrolled in a four-year college, while an additional 6% were continuing their education at two-year colleges; (3) Inver Hills had the highest percentage of respondents enrolled in four-year institutions (77%), while Anoka-Ramsey had the lowest percentage (57%); (4) 27% of the respondents reported employment and no continuing education, while only 3% reported being unemployed and not continuing their education; (5) 40% of Anoka-Ramsey respondents reported being employed, compared with 19% of Minneapolis' respondents; (6) nearly half of those graduates enrolled in four-year institutions had transferred to one of the seven colleges in the Minnesota State University (MSU) system, over one-fifth were enrolled at the University of Minnesota (UM), and 10% had transferred to four-year schools outside of the state; and (7) among students enrolled in spring 1992 who transferred without a degree, one-third transferred to an MSU school, while 30% had enrolled at UM. Summary and Conclusions

This report provides the results of placement studies on Associate in Arts (AA) graduates for 1991-92. All seven Twin Cities Metro area Community Colleges participated in the studies. The use of mailed surveys and phone follow-up, where graduates did not respond to the mailed survey, resulted in an 81% response rate. This response rate lends credibility to the results found in the study.

Sixty-five percent of the AA graduates transferred to a four-year college during Fall 1992. An additional six percent continued their education at a two-year college. Twenty-seven percent of the graduates reported employment. Only three percent reported neither employment nor enrollment.

Almost half of the transferring AA graduates transferred to one of the seven colleges in the Minnesota State University System. That percentage was considerably higher than the percentage of four-year transfers choosing the State Universities in the study of general "Leavers" from the colleges. About one-fifth of the graduates transferred to the University of Minnesota and another fifth transferred to the Private Colleges in Minnesota. The final ten percent transferred to four-year colleges outside Minnesota.

Introduction

This report is an accumulation of placement studies of Associate in Arts graduates from the seven Twin Cities Metro area Community Colleges. The survey used (Appendix A) covered the current educational and occupational status of the graduates. This report focuses primarily on educational status as the Associate in Arts (AA) degree is designed primarily for transfer to a four-year college.

Method and Response Rates

The surveys were first mailed to the graduates with a cover letter (Appendix B) from the appropriate College President. Non-respondents received, approximately three weeks later, a second mailing with a "Cartoon" reminder (Appendix C) and a second copy of the survey. Efforts were then made to contact non-respondents by phone. All AA graduates were surveyed.

Figure 1, at right, shows response rates for the seven colleges. Detailed information is presented in Table 1 in Appendix D. The total response rate was 81%. Lakewood (92%) and North Hennepin (87%) had the highest response rates. Minneapolis had the lowest response rate (59%), while Inver Hills (73%), Anoka-Ramsey (76%), Normandale (81%), and Cambridge Center (82%) had average response rates. Minneapolis' low response rate is consistent with the low response rate for that college in the "Leavers" study (see Metro Pilot Study Report #2).

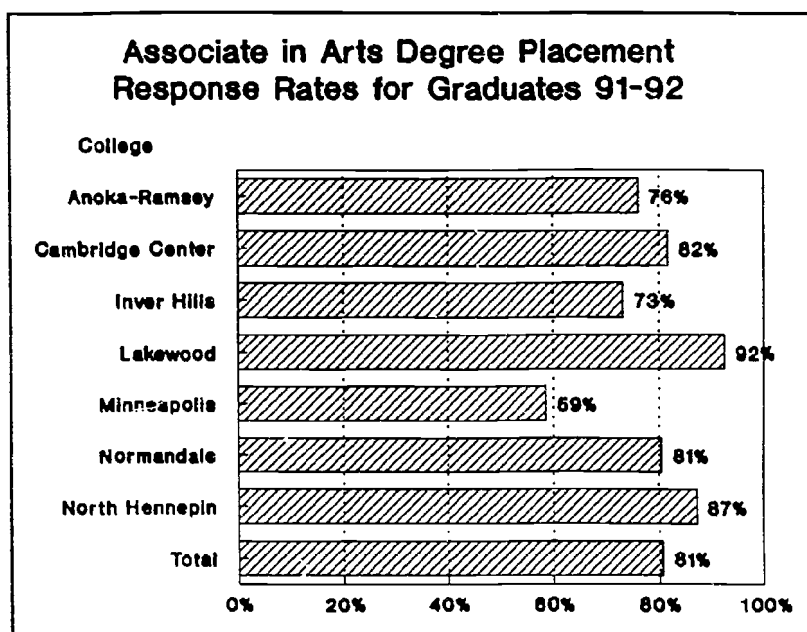

Current Status

Figure 2, at right, shows the current status of the graduates in Fall 1992. Details are given in Table 1 in Appendix D. Sixty-five percent of all respondents were currently enrolled in a four-year college. Inver Hills had the highest percentage (77%), with Minneapolis second (71%). Anoka-Ramsey had the lowest percentage (57%). The other four colleges were very close to the Metro area total.

An additional six percent of the students were continuing their education at two-year colleges, with most continuing at Community and Technical

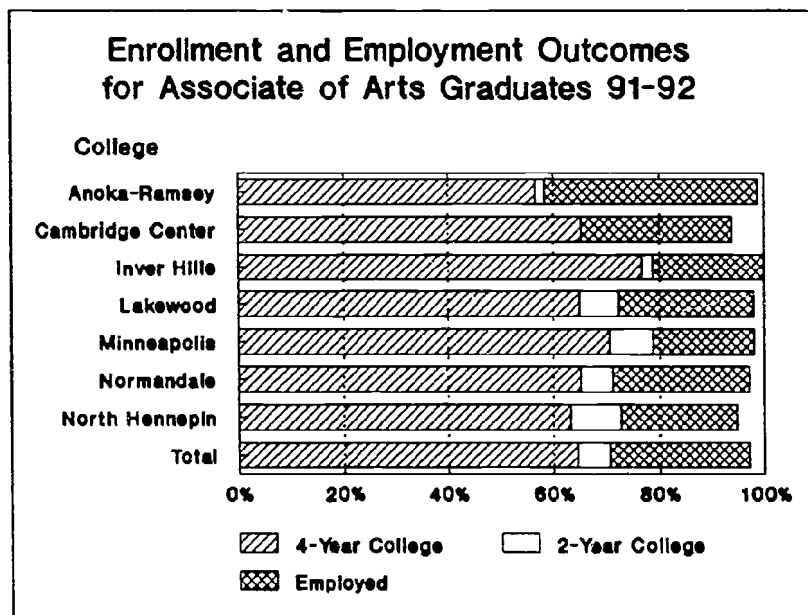

Colleges in Minnesota. Very few Anoka-Ramsey (2%) and Inver Hills (2%) graduates were continuing their education at two-year colleges and none of the Cambridge Center graduates were continuing their education at two-year colleges. North Hennepin had the highest percentage of continuing education at two-year colleges (10%).

Twenty-seven percent of the respondents reported employment and no continuing education. Only three percent were unemployed and not continuing their education. Anoka-Ramsey (40%) had the highest percentage employed, while Minneapolis (19%), Inver Hills (21%), and North Hennepin (22%) had the lowest.

Four-Year College Transfer Destinations

Figure 3, at right, shows the types of four-year institutions graduates chose to attend. In addition, data are included from the "Leavers" study of students who enrolled in Spring 1992 but did not return for Fall 1992 (see Metro Pilot Study Report #2). Detailed information supporting this figure is in Table 2 in Appendix D.

Almost half of the AA graduates transferred to one of the seven colleges in the Minnesota State University System. Over one-fifth of the transferring graduates transferred to the University of Minnesota, and slightly fewer transferred to Minnesota's Private Colleges. Ten percent transferred to four-year colleges outside Minnesota.

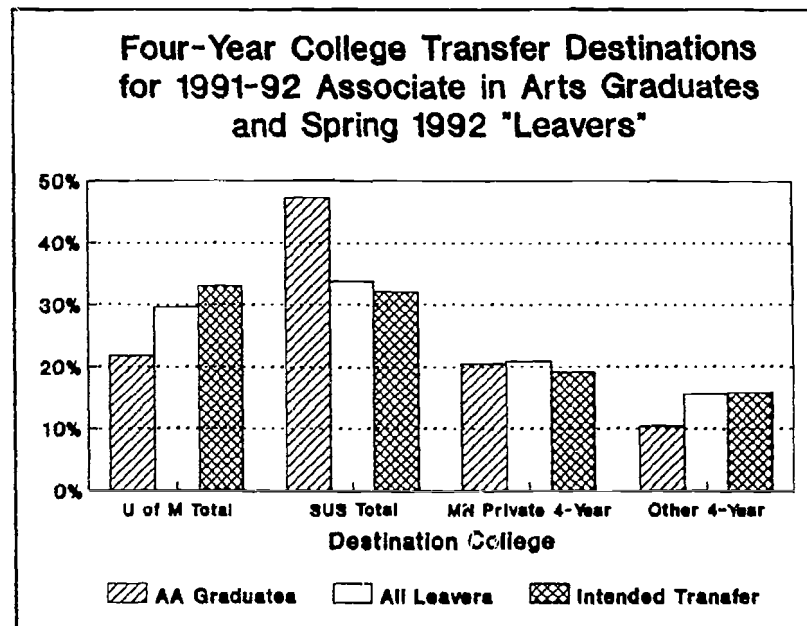

Figure 3 also includes data on "Leavers". "Leavers" are students enrolled Spring 1992 who did not return Fall 1992 (See Metro Pilot Study Report #3). The figure shows the percentage of "Leavers" transferring to each of the four types of colleges. Comparable data for the subgroup "Leavers" intending to transfer are also shown. It might be thought the intended transfer "Leavers" would be more similar to the Associate in Arts graduates than the total group as an AA degree might be most appropriate for them. That hypothesis was not supported, as the percentages for the intended transfer "Leavers" were closer to the total "Leavers" group than to the AA Graduates.

Transferring "Leavers" were considerably less likely to transfer to the State University System. Only one-third of the "Leavers" transferred to the State University System. Most of the difference was accounted for by the University of Minnesota, which attracted 30% of the "Leavers", compared to 22% of the AA graduates. Minnesota's Private Colleges had a slightly higher

percentage of "Leavers" than AA graduates. The percentage of "Leavers" transferring out of state (16%) was considerably higher than for AA graduates (10%).

The State University System's greater draw from graduates probably relates to their acceptance of the AA degree as fulfilling their lower division requirements. The University of Minnesota does not accept the AA as fulfilling lower division requirements. Rather, the University evaluates individual courses for transfer. This provides an incentive for those with an AA degree to transfer to the State University System. In addition, the University of Minnesota's approach is a disincentive to completing the AA degree as in most cases the AA degree will require some courses that the University will not accept.

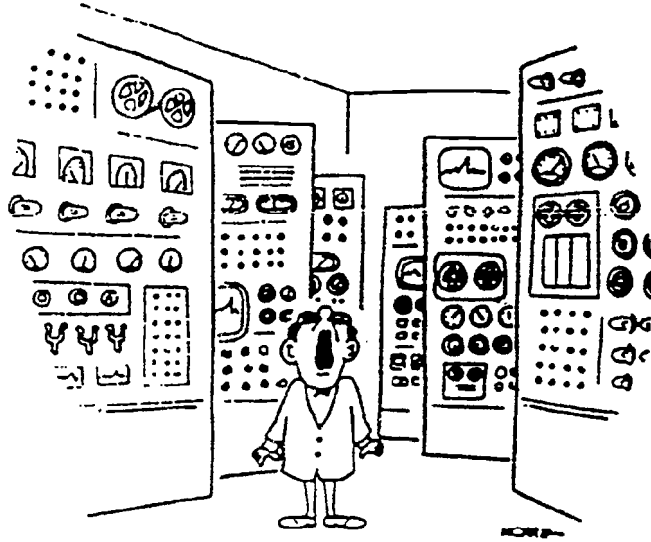
