Introduction

This list of resources is intended for all who want to learn more about the Middle East—the land, the people and the communities of ancient and modern times. Though intended as an introduction, many of these suggestions will enrich religion and social studies programs in elementary and secondary schools. For all who are involved in peacemaking, this bibliography may lead to a greater appreciation of diversity.

The history and present reality of religion profoundly affect the lives of people everywhere, but perhaps more visibly in the Holy Land, where Judaism, Christianity and Islam developed. The presence of Eastern Christian churches in the Middle East for two thousand years is valued by all who treasure the roots of their faith. Involvement with these churches has been an important aspect of the work of Catholic Near East Welfare Association for over—sixty-five years. While often omitted in bibliographies on the Middle East, books, periodicals and videocassettes relating to the churches of the Middle East are included here.

Individuals and organizations interested in additional information about the Middle East can avail themselves of Middle East studies programs in neighboring universities. Many extend their educational programs through outreach or community resource centers that provide lectures, symposia, workshops and materials for teachers, students, scholars and the general public. Information regarding locations of university outreach centers is available from the Middle East Studies Association.






