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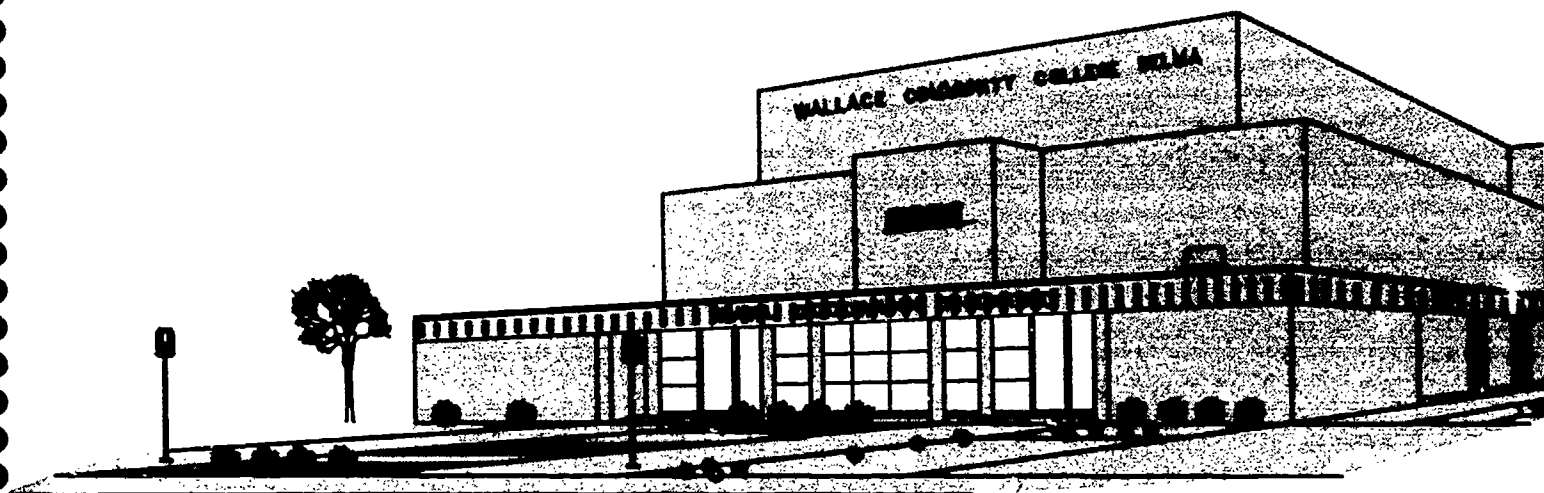
ABSTRACT

Focusing on data for fall 1991, this report provides information on students, faculty, staff, finances, facilities, and services at Wallace Community College Selma (WCCS), in Alabama. Following an introductory section providing a history of WCCS and reviewing the college's mission and goals, the report provides detailed student data on credit hour production from 1987 to 1992; credit enrollment for fall 1987 to 1991; credit enrollment by race, sex, and county; grade distribution in credit courses; feeder high school enrollment; enrollment by program from 1989 to 1991; awards conferred by program; grade distribution in developmental courses; student financial aid profile for 1987 to 1992; non-credit enrollment; and job placement statistics for 1987 to 1992. The next section provides data on WCCS's Educational Talent Search Program, an effort involving nine target high schools to promote college attendance through student services. Next, the report provides data on school personnel, including information on salaries, race, gender, employment status, and full- and part-time faculty characteristics. Following data on fall 1990 library resources, the report provides data on WCCS finances, including financial histories for 1987 through 1992, expenditures by function and object, revenues by source, and foundation revenues. Next, the report presents data on physical plant assets, and provides a WCCS building inventory. Finally, the report provides data on the Alabama Community College system, including data on credit hour production, student headcount by race and sex, and personnel classified by salary schedule. Data tables; campus, service area, and system maps; and a report evaluation form are included. (PAA)

HISTORY OF WALLACE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SELMA

On May 3, 1963, the Alabama State Legislature approved Acts No. 92, 93, and 94 which provided for the financing, development, and control of Alabama's 2 year colleges. These Acts paved the way for the eventual creation of Wallace Community College Selma and The Alabama College System's other junior and technical colleges.

Many individuals and organizations in the Selma and Dallas county area were active in obtaining Selma as a site for a technical institute. Mr. E.S. Watts donated 20 acres of land in north Selma, just inside the city limits, to be used for the location of the technical institute. The name of the institute was named William Rufus King State Vocational Technical School in honor of the famous Alabamain who served 29 years as a United States Senator and served as Vice President in 1852 under President Franklin Pierce. William Rufus King was responsible for giving Selma its name.

When the college opened for its first classes in 1966, the campus consisted of an administration building, cafeteria, seven shops and laboratory buildings, and a warehouse. All of the classrooms were provided with central air-conditioning and equipped with modern facilities. The initial enrollment was 32 students.

On February 16, 1970, under the advisement of Governor Albert P. Brewer, the Alabama Trade School and Junior College Authority approved a resolution establishing a junior college in Selma on the same or adjacent site of the William Rufus King State Technical Institute. The State Board of Education gave its approval the same day. Prior to the ground breaking ceremonies the name of the institution was changed to George C. Wallace State Junior College and Technical Institute in honor of the incoming governor. Mr. Charles L. Byrd, who had been the Director of the Technical Institute, was appointed president. The State Board of Education changed the institution's name to George Corley Wallace State Community College on October 1, 1973. Mr. Stan Frasier served as interim president from January until May 1989, at which time Dr. Julius R. Brown became president of the college.

- *Wallace Community College Selma is uniquely qualified to deliver excellent and equitable educational opportunities and services.

The mission of Wallace Community College Selma is to provide high-quality educational opportunities and services that are responsive to individual, community and State needs. To accomplish this mission, Wallace Community College Selma shall provide the following:

- *General Education and Collegiate Programs at the freshman and sophomore levels that prepare students for transfer to other colleges and universities.
- *Technical, Vocational, and Career Education that prepares students for immediate employment, retrain existing employees, and promotes local and state economic stability and competitiveness.
- *Business and Industry Development Training that meets employer needs.
- *Developmental Education that assists individuals in improving learning skills and overcoming educational deficiencies.
- *Student Services and Activities that assist individuals in formulating and achieving their educational goals.
- *Continuing Education and personal enrichment opportunities that support life-long learning and the civic, social, and cultural quality of life.
- *Operation of a quality, comprehensive community college.

- Goal 1:** To provide educational access to individuals with a desire and documented ability to benefit from the College's offerings.
- Goal 2:** To provide affordable tuition and fees and make available comprehensive financial aid programs.

Imperative V: Community Services

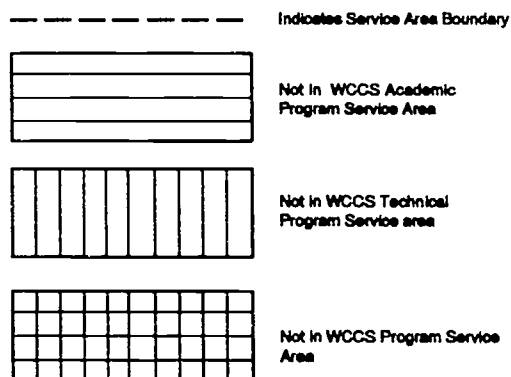
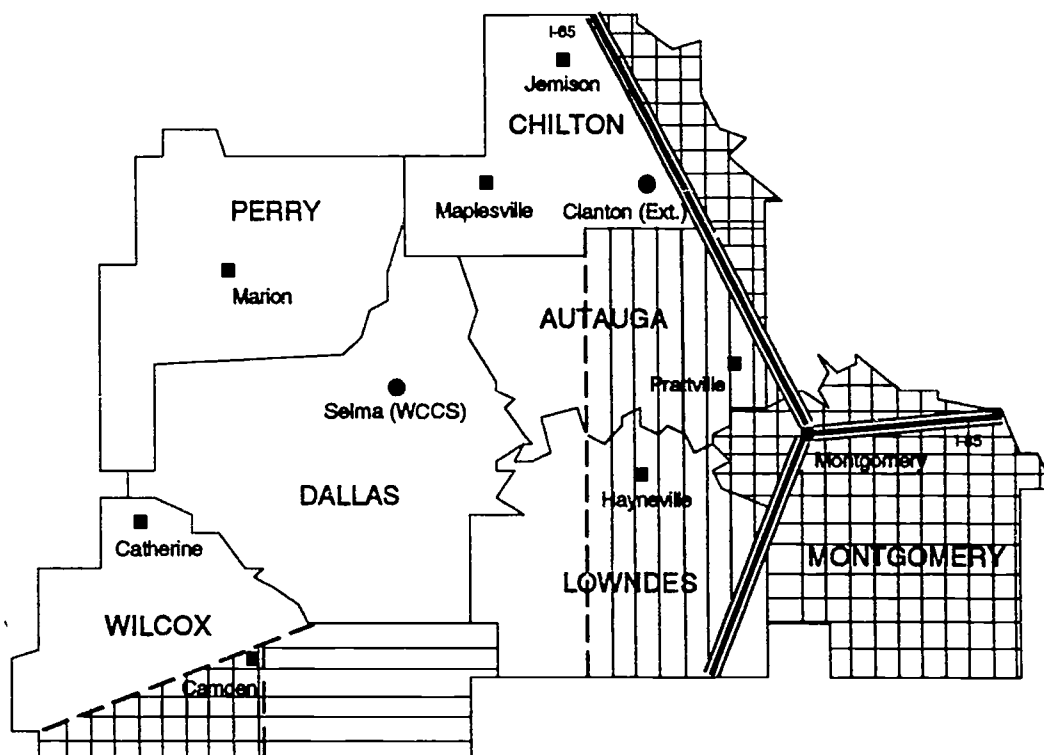
- Goal 1:** To provide community service activities and establish partnerships which support civic, economic, educational, and cultural needs within the College's service area.

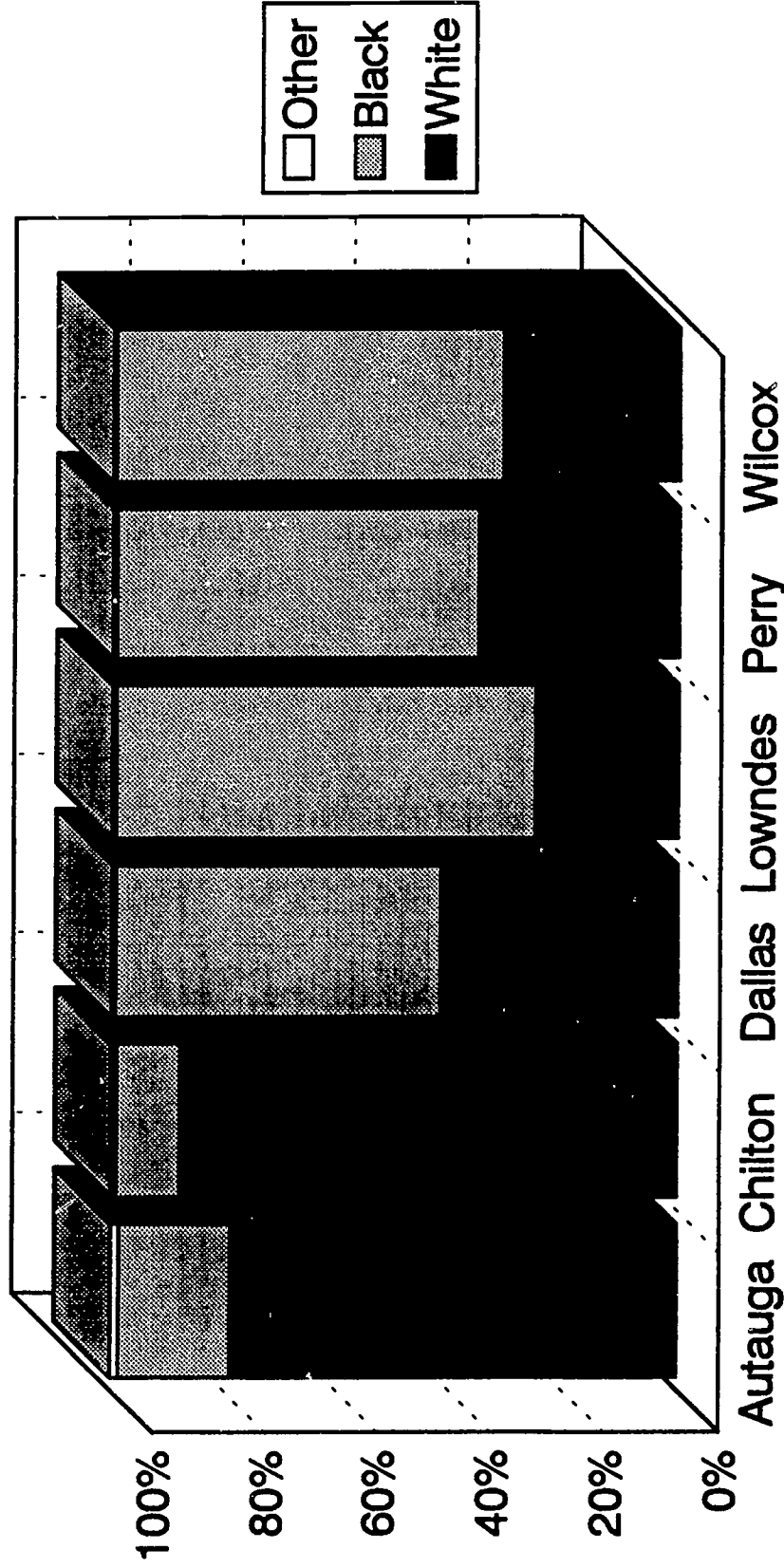

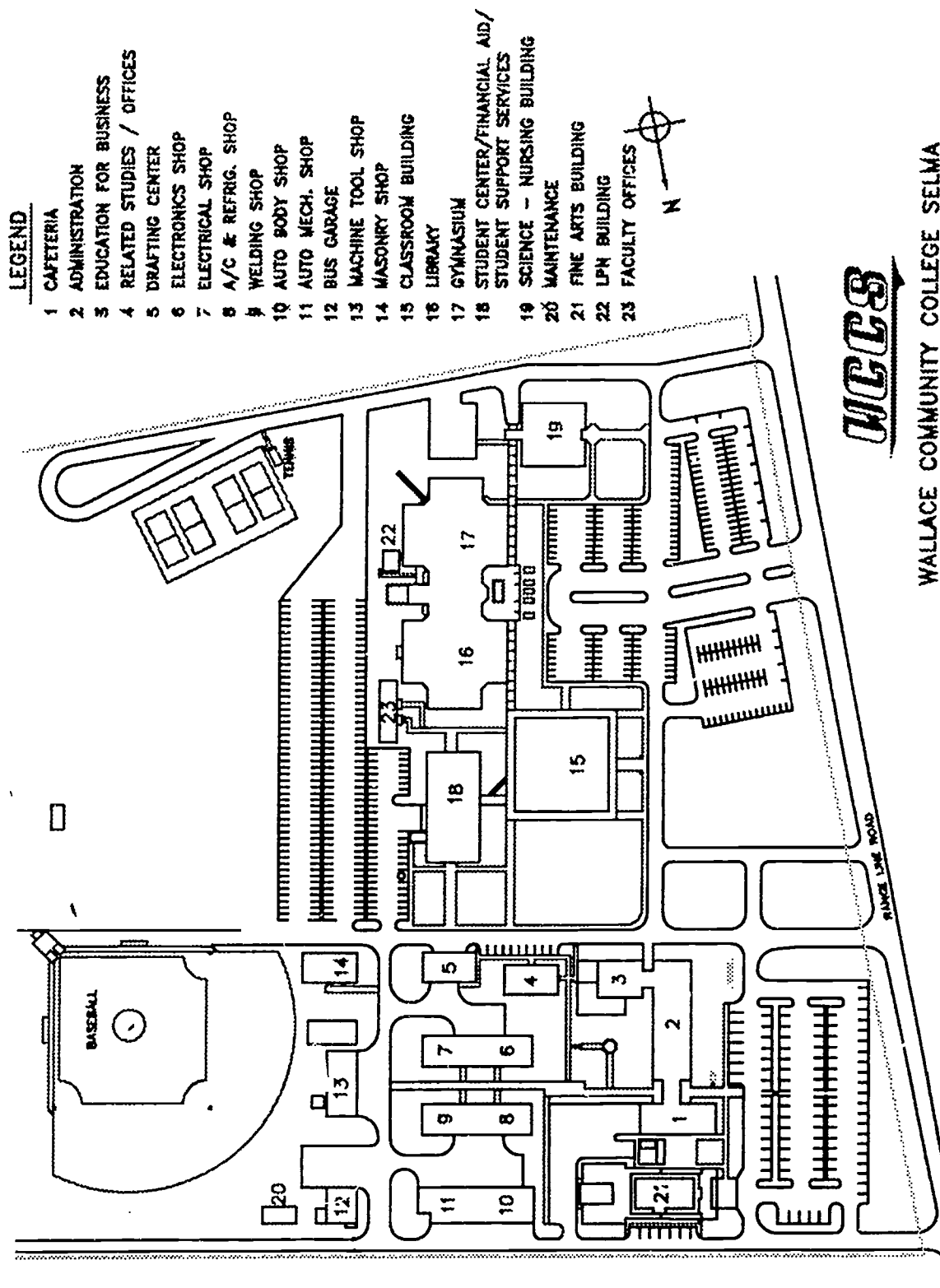

Program Service Area Race Percentages

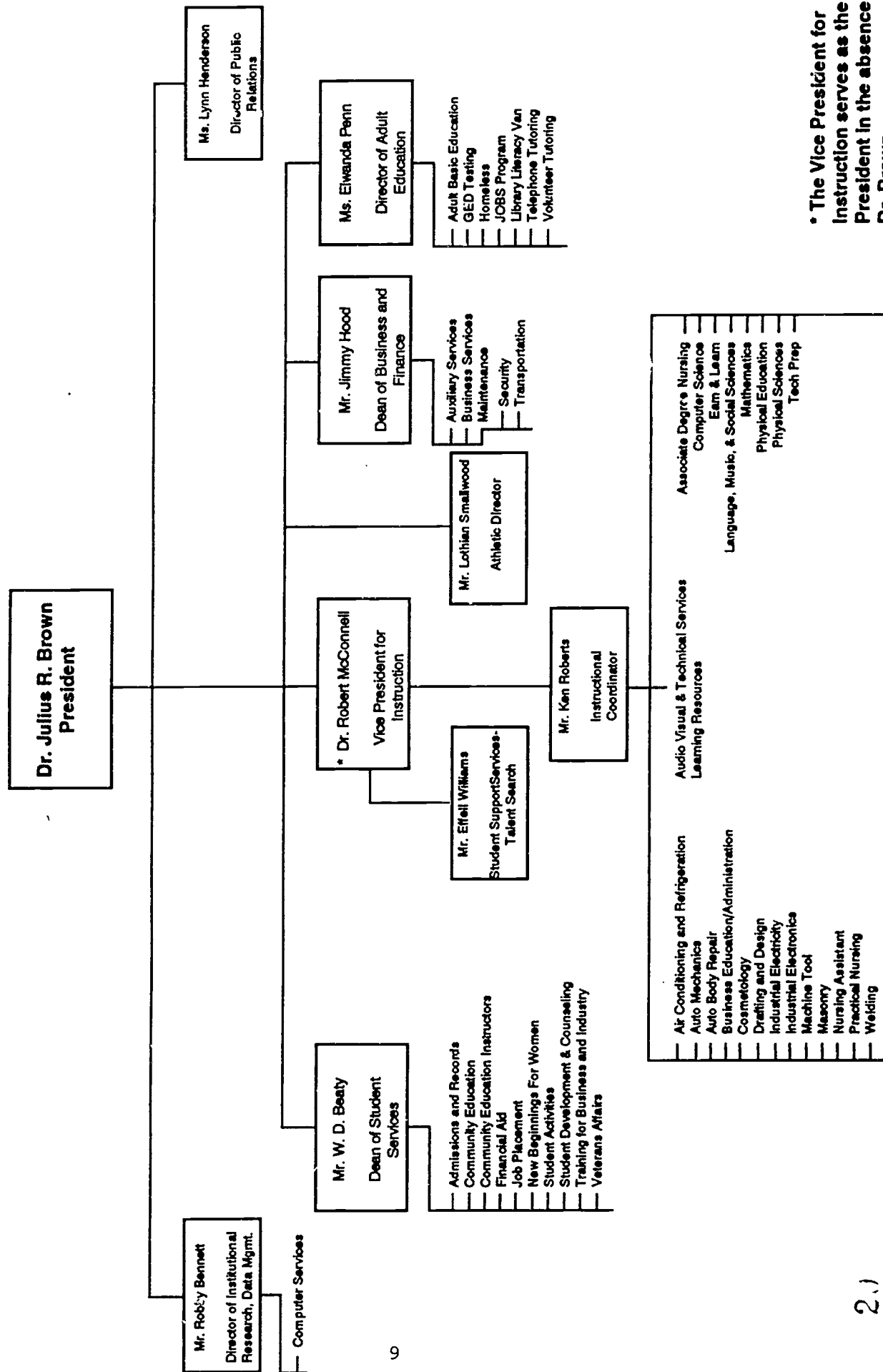

CAMPUS MAP

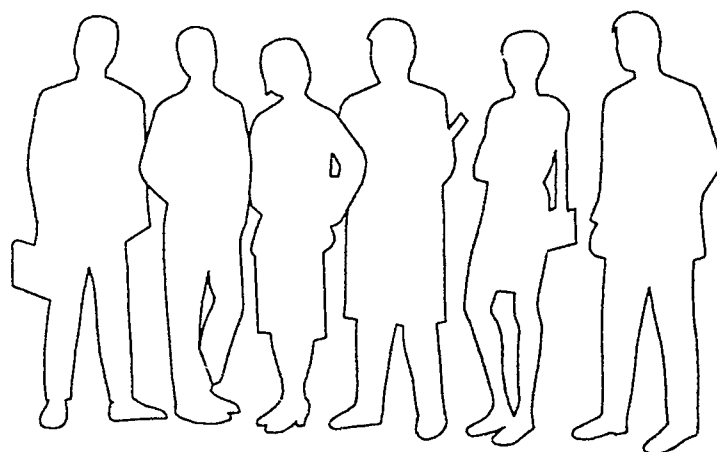


Wallace Community College Selma Organization Chart

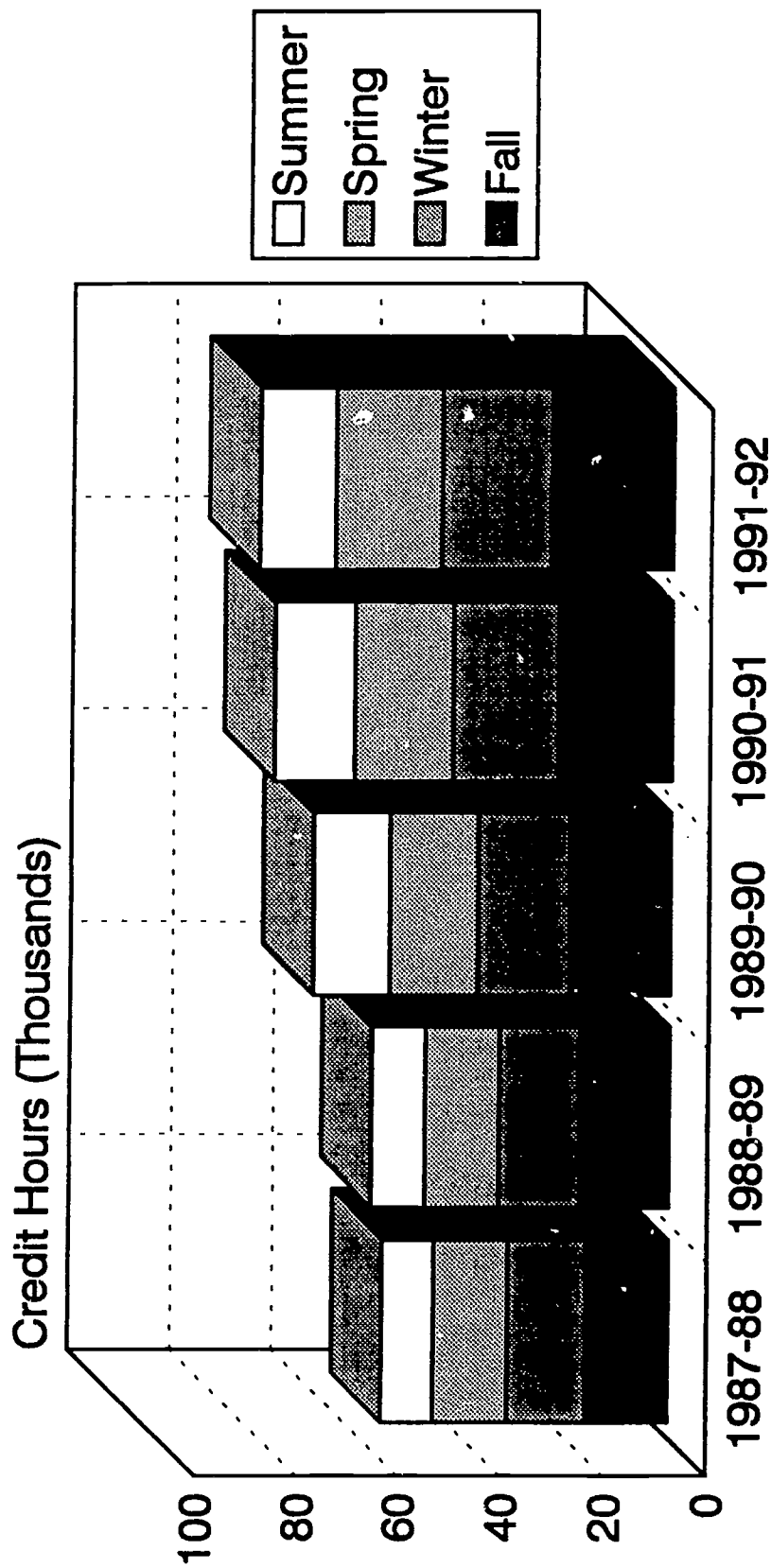

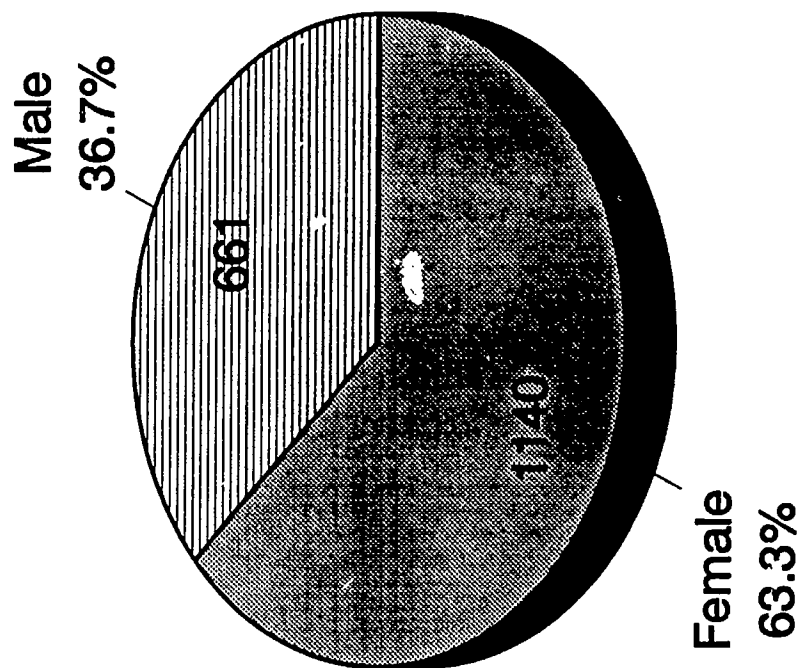
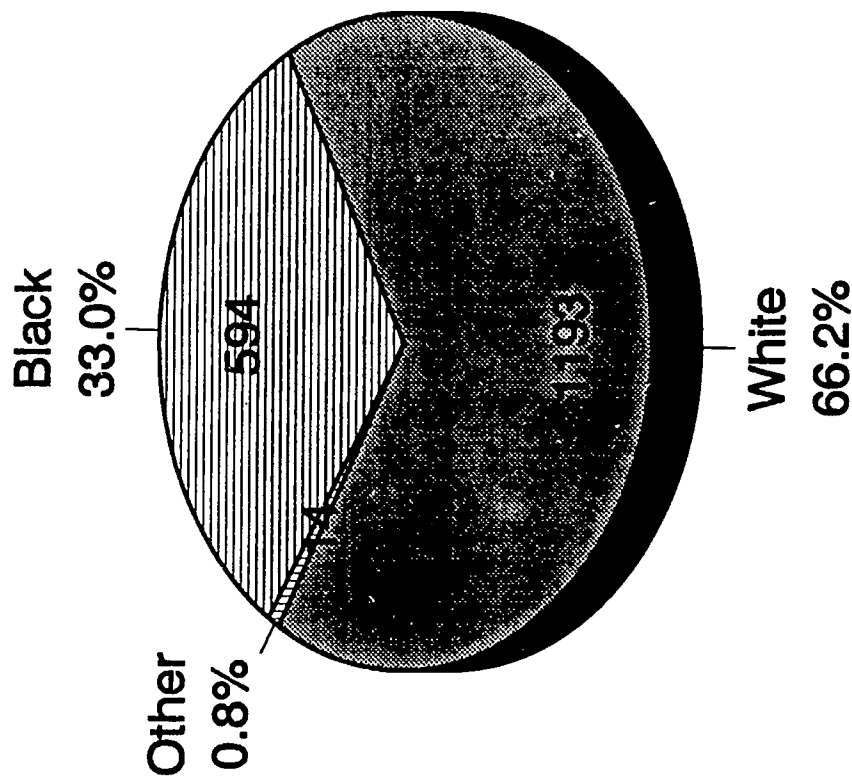

Sex

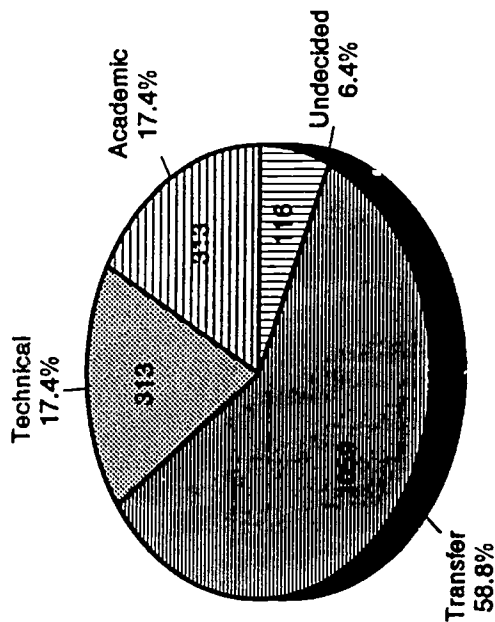
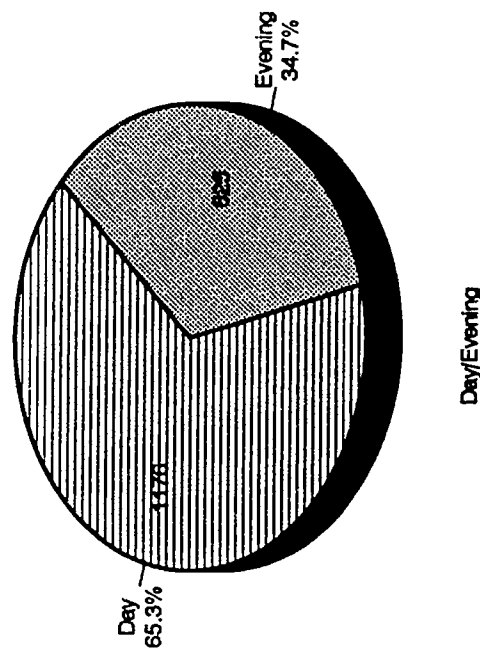
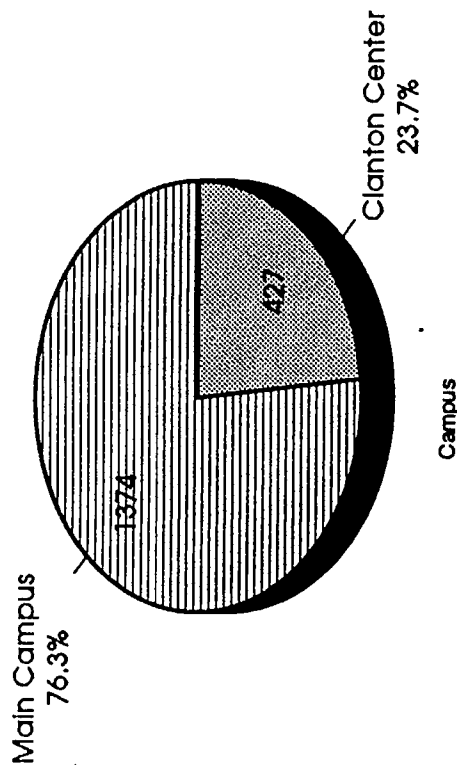
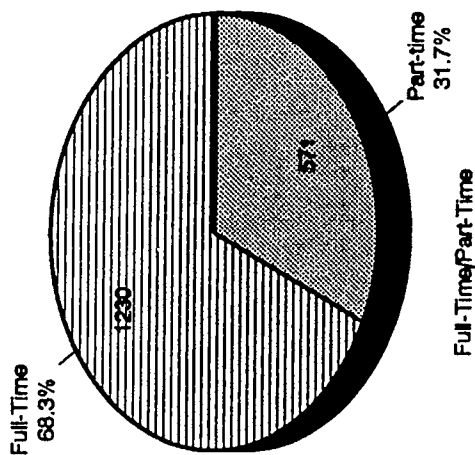

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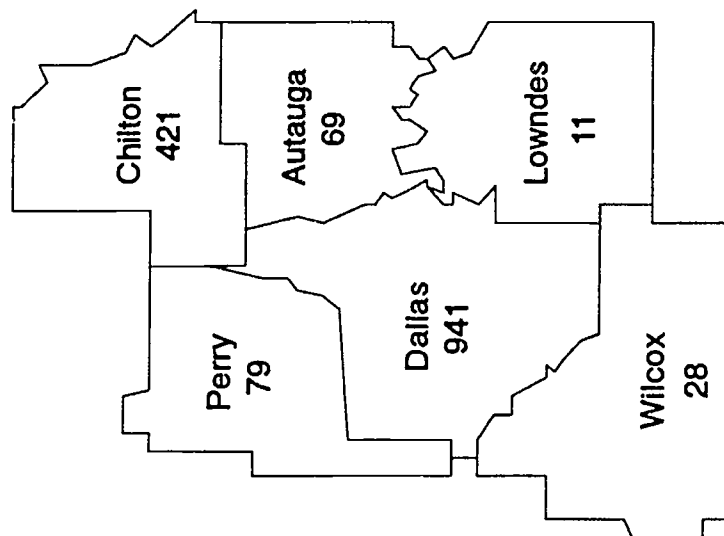
Credit Enrollment Characteristics

Fall Quarter 1991

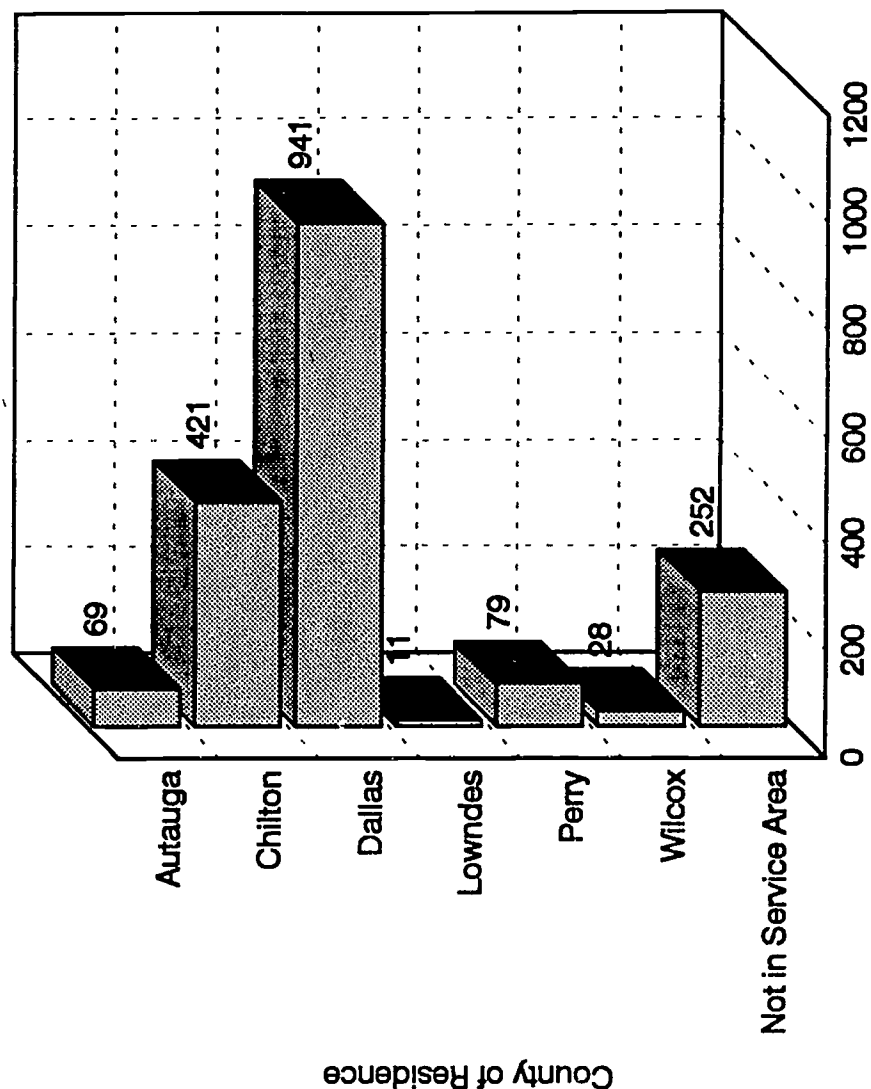


Credit Enrollment By County

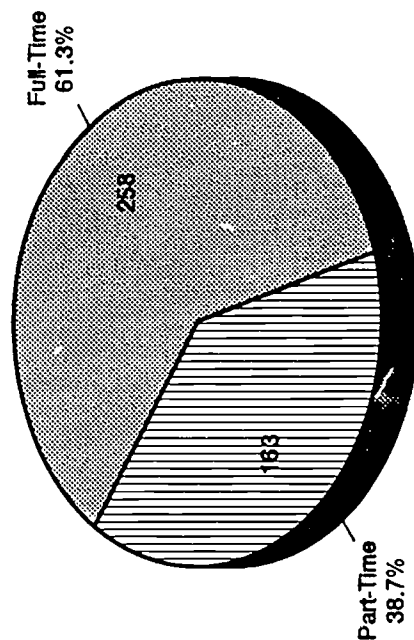
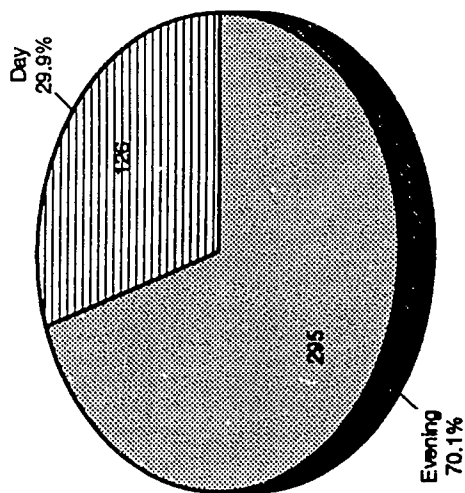
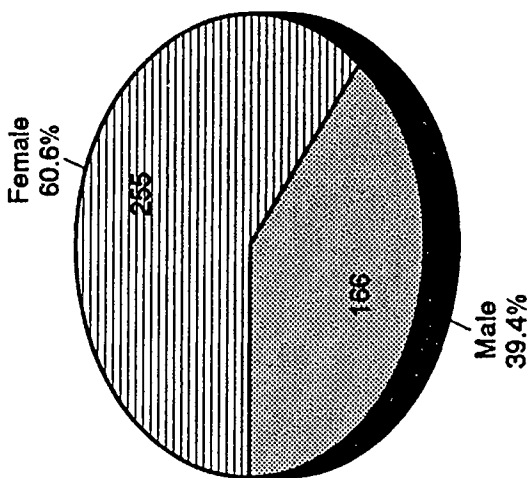
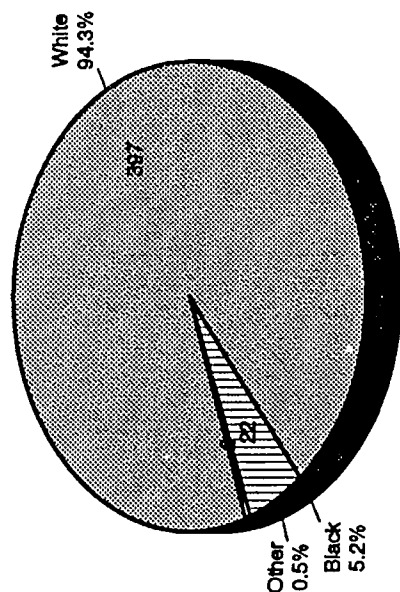
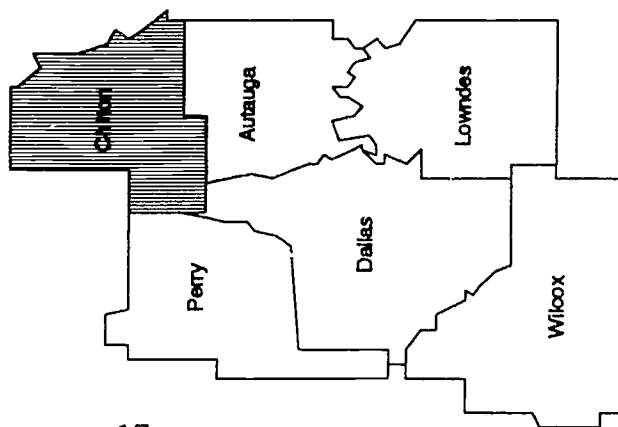


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Chilton County: Student Demographics

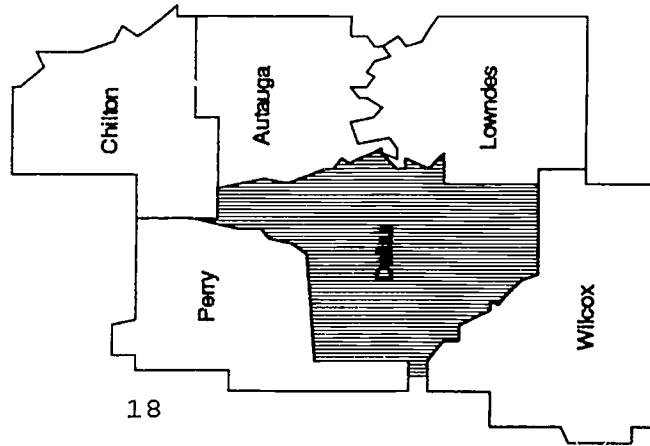

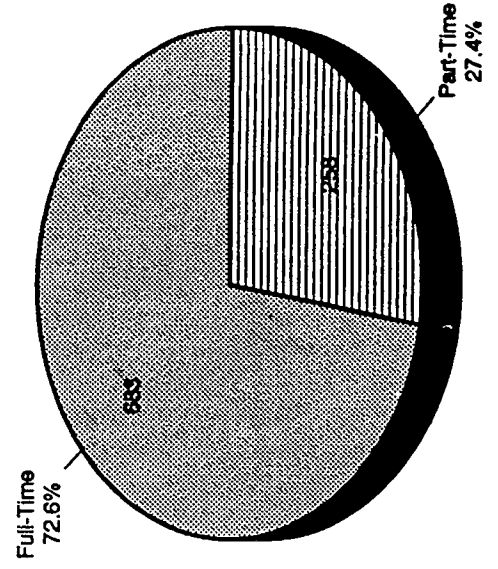
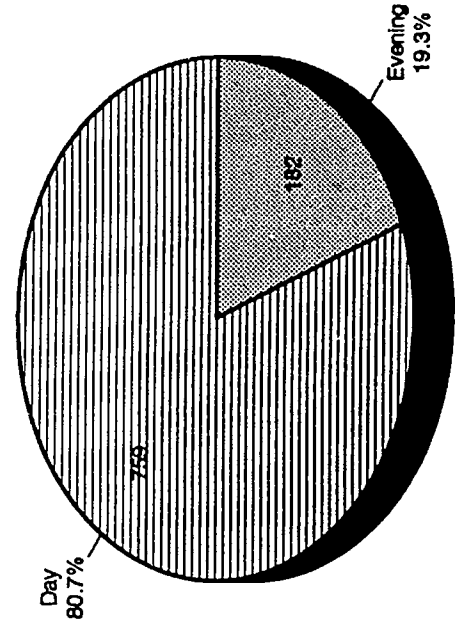
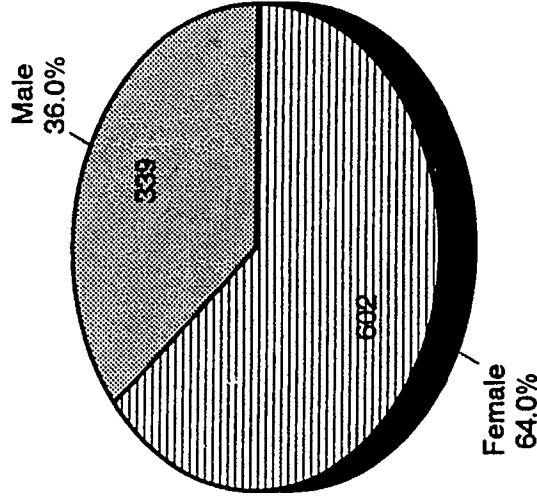
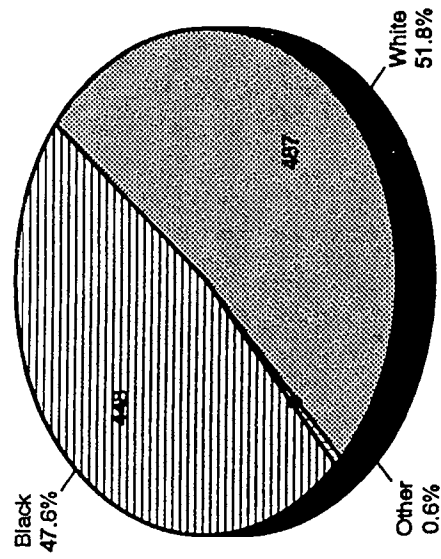
Dallas County: Student

Fall Quarter 1991



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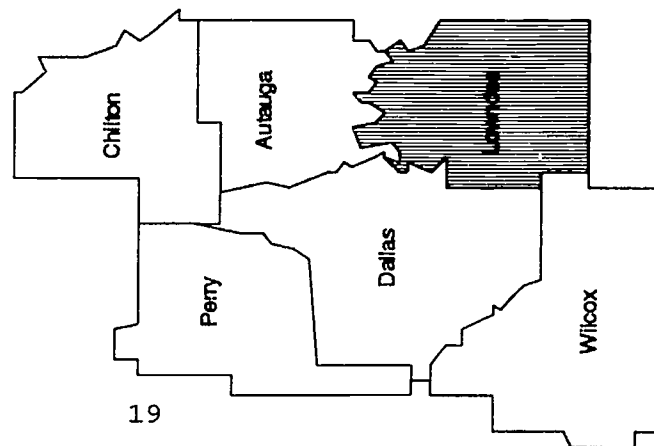
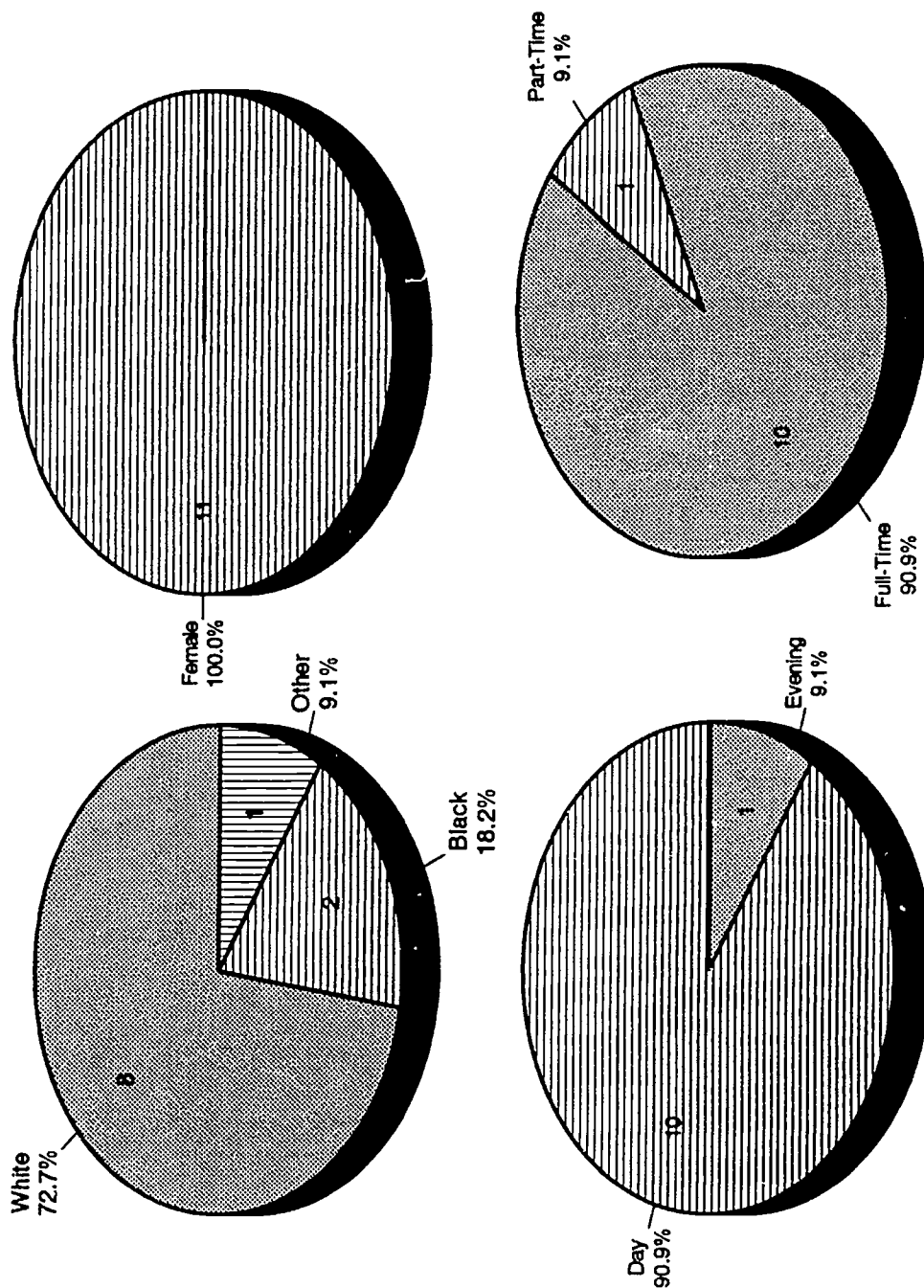

Demographics

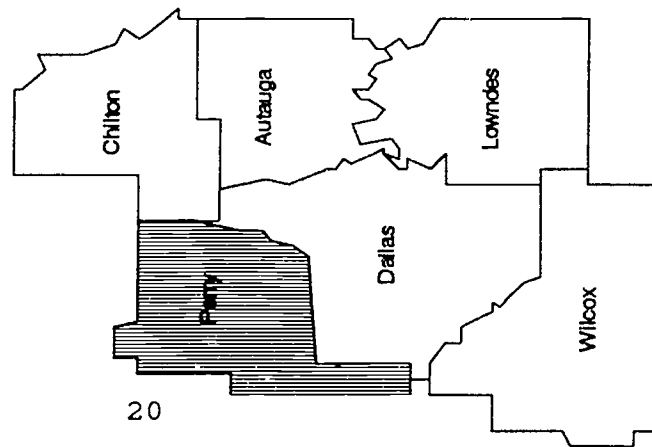

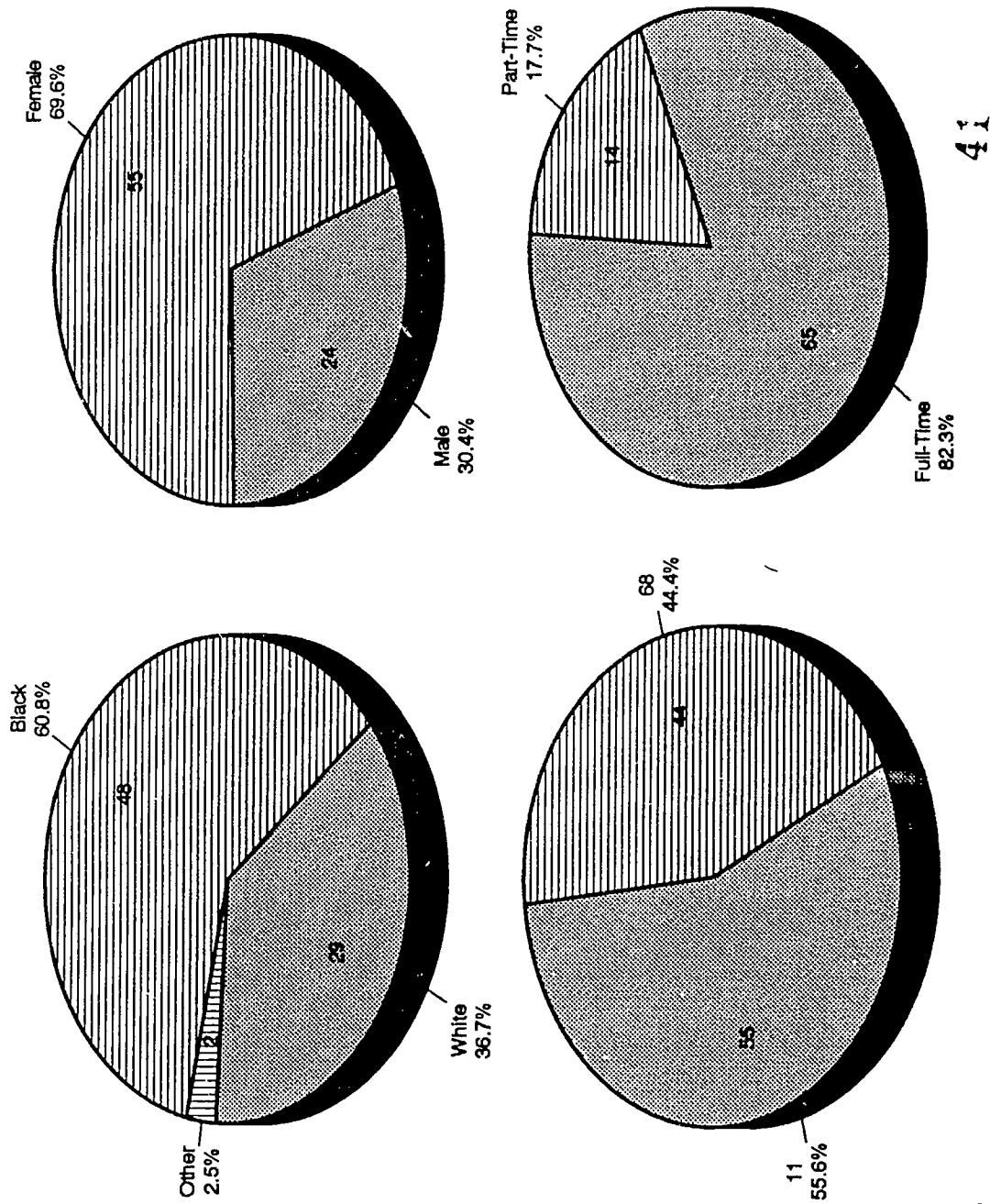

Fall Quarter 1991



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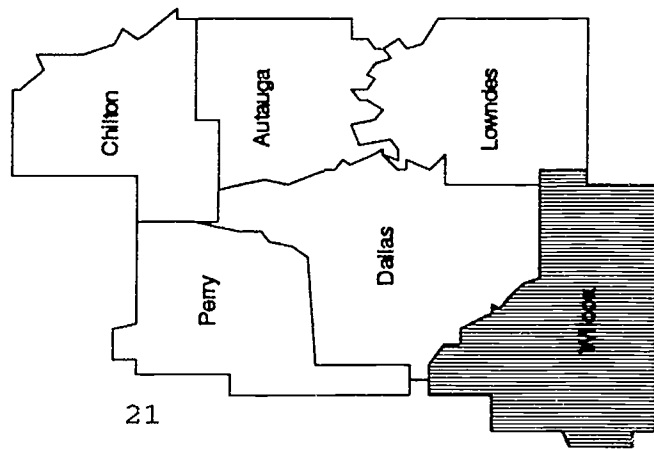

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Wilcox County: Student Demographics

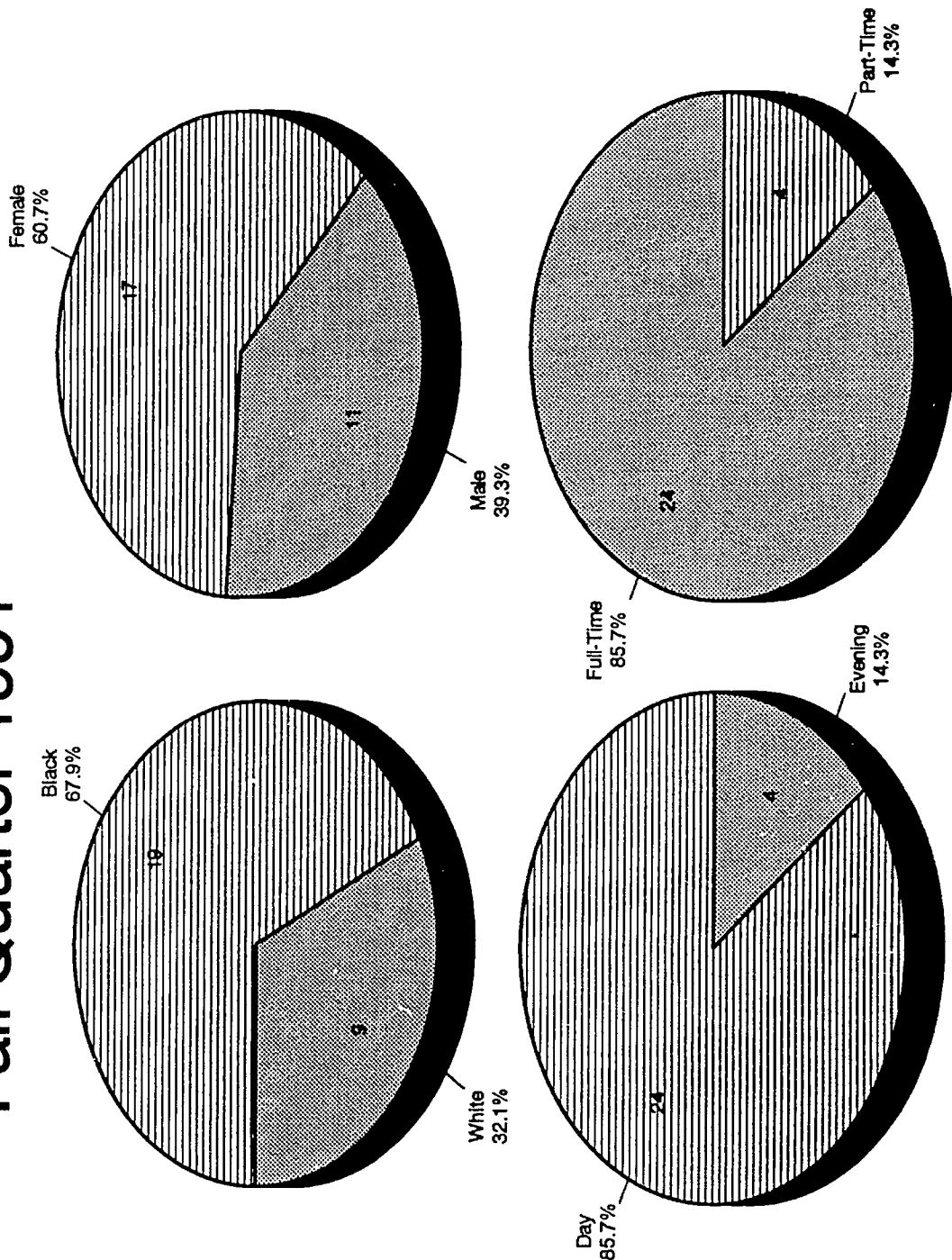

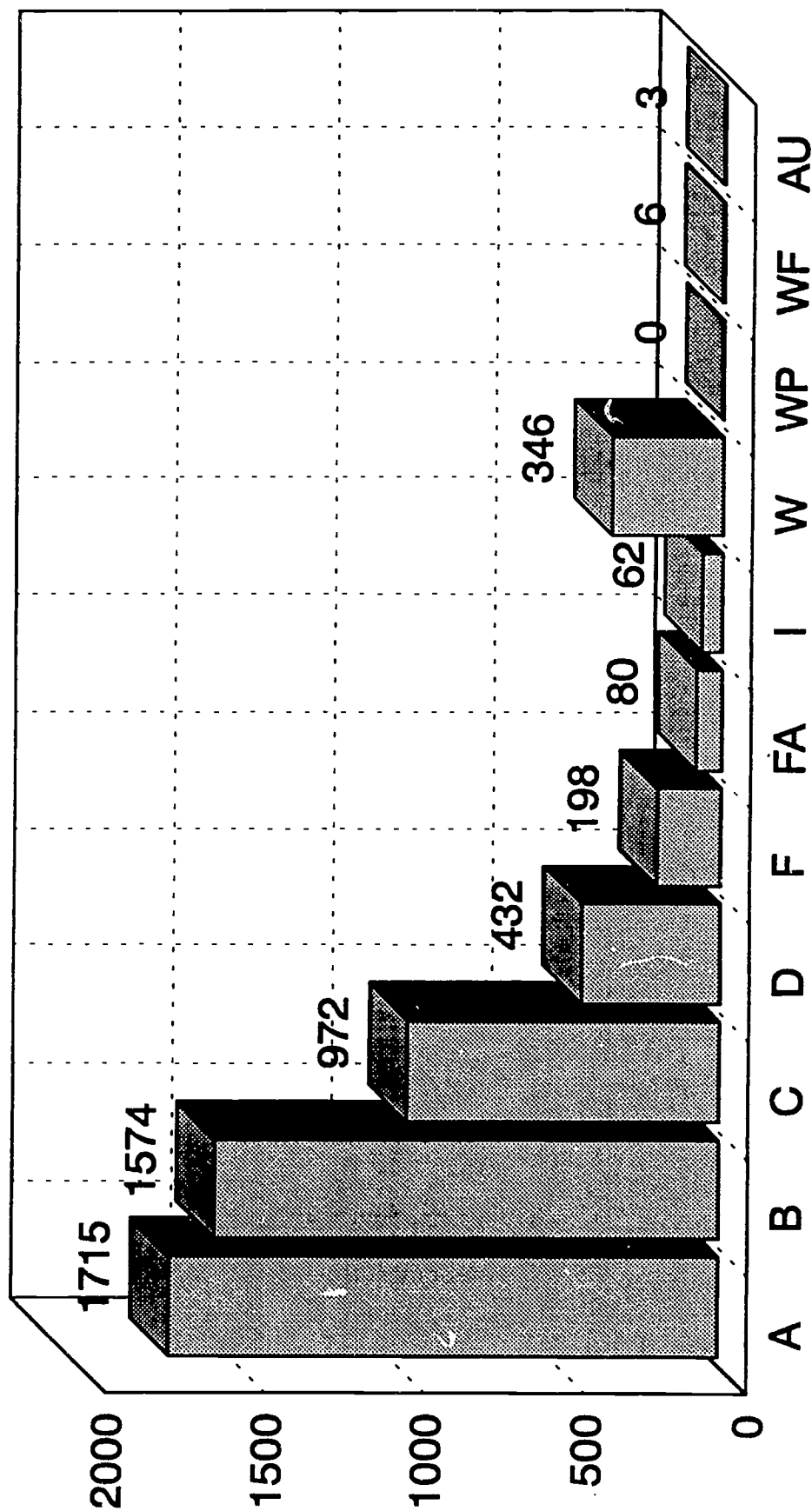
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Grade Distribution - Credit Courses

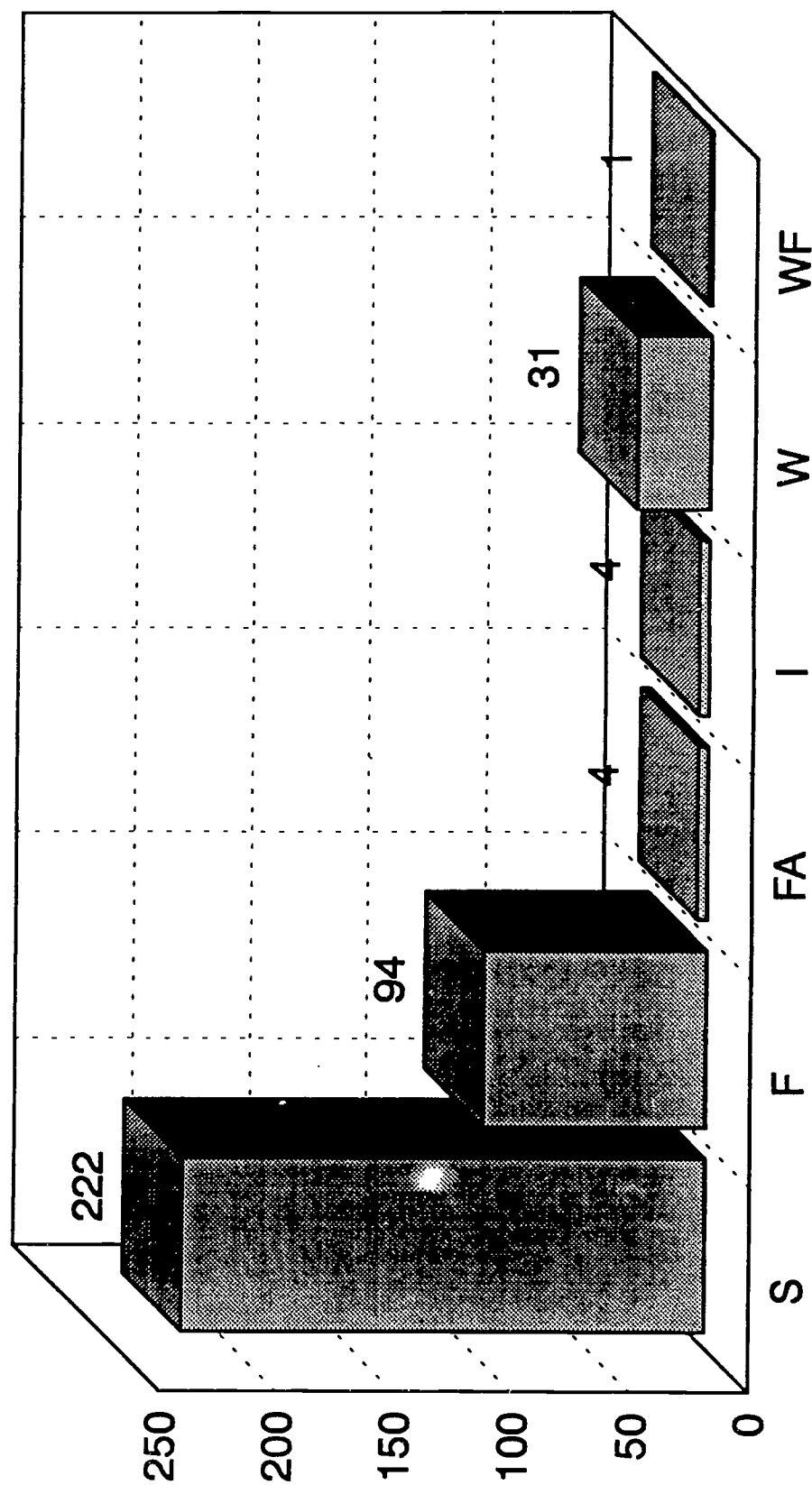

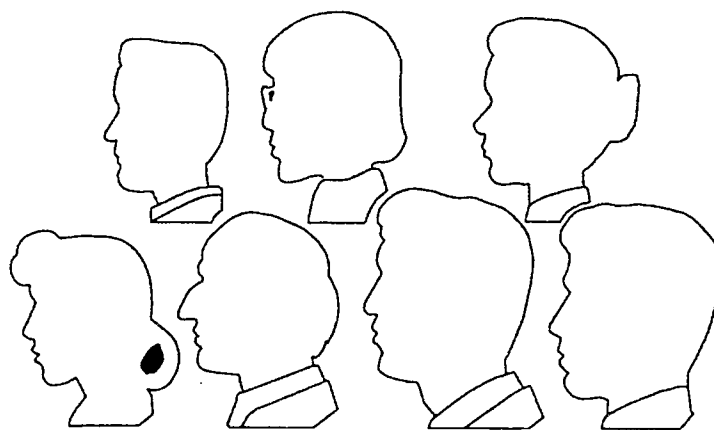

Educational Talent Search

The 1991-92 school year was truly an exciting one for the new Talent Search Program at Wallace Community College Selma (WCCS). The hiring of new staff members, the assistance and support of the WCCS family, and the excellent cooperation of the nine target schools allowed the project to far exceed each of its stated objectives for 1991-92. The program was funded to serve 750 students; however, through the hard work of the Talent Search staff, 814 students were served during the year. More than 90% of the seniors enrolled in postsecondary education, and over 50% of the 7th and 8th graders enrolled in college preparatory programs. Each student served had at least a "C" average for the year. Also, several of the top ranked students at the target schools were Talent Search participants.

The students were provided counseling, academic advising, tutorial assistance, campus visits to postsecondary institutions, and cultural enrichment activities and programs.

After examining the overall success of the program during its first year of operation, the Talent Search staff, President Brown, and the entire WCCS family looks forward to even greater success in 1992-1993.

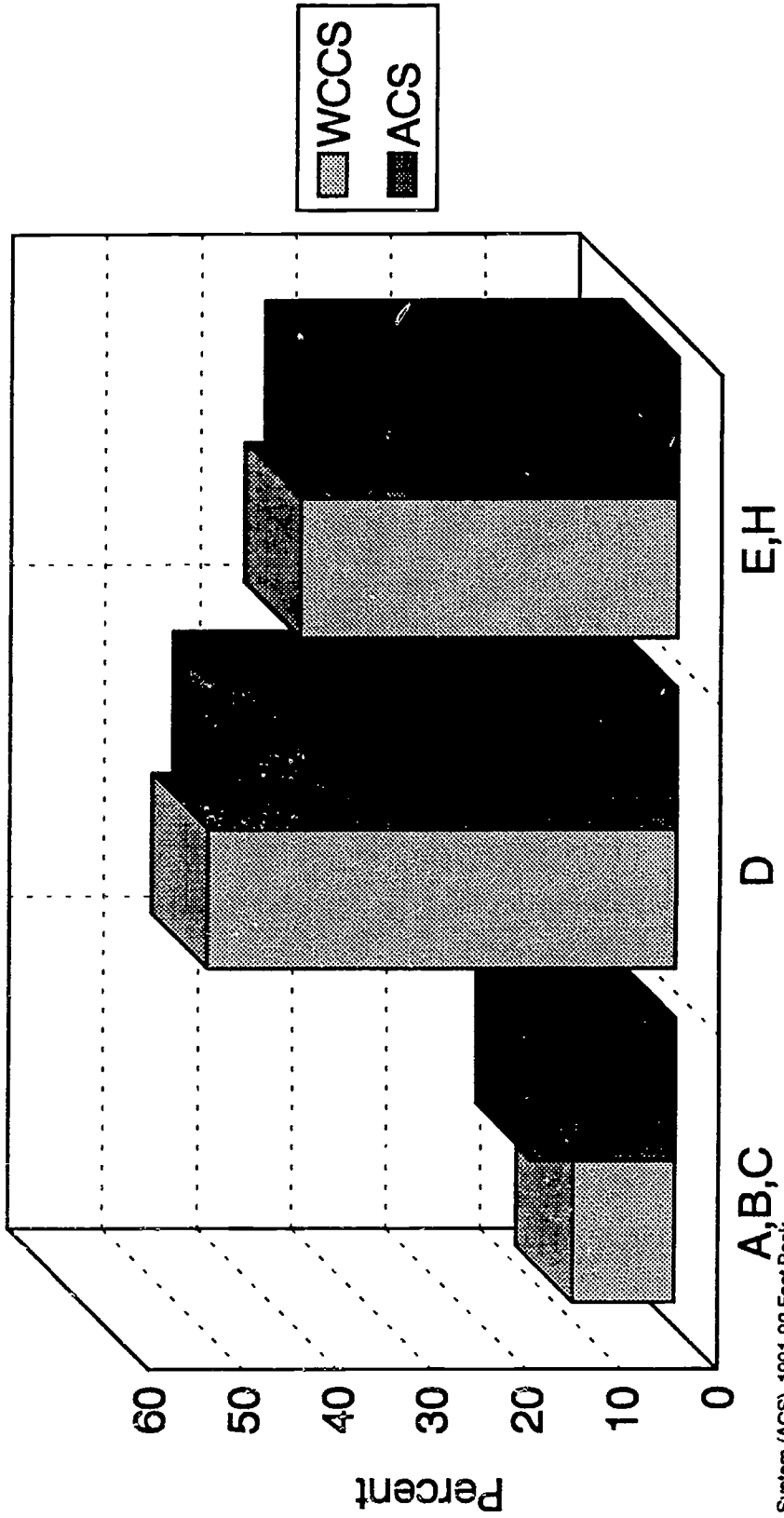

Fall Quarter 1991



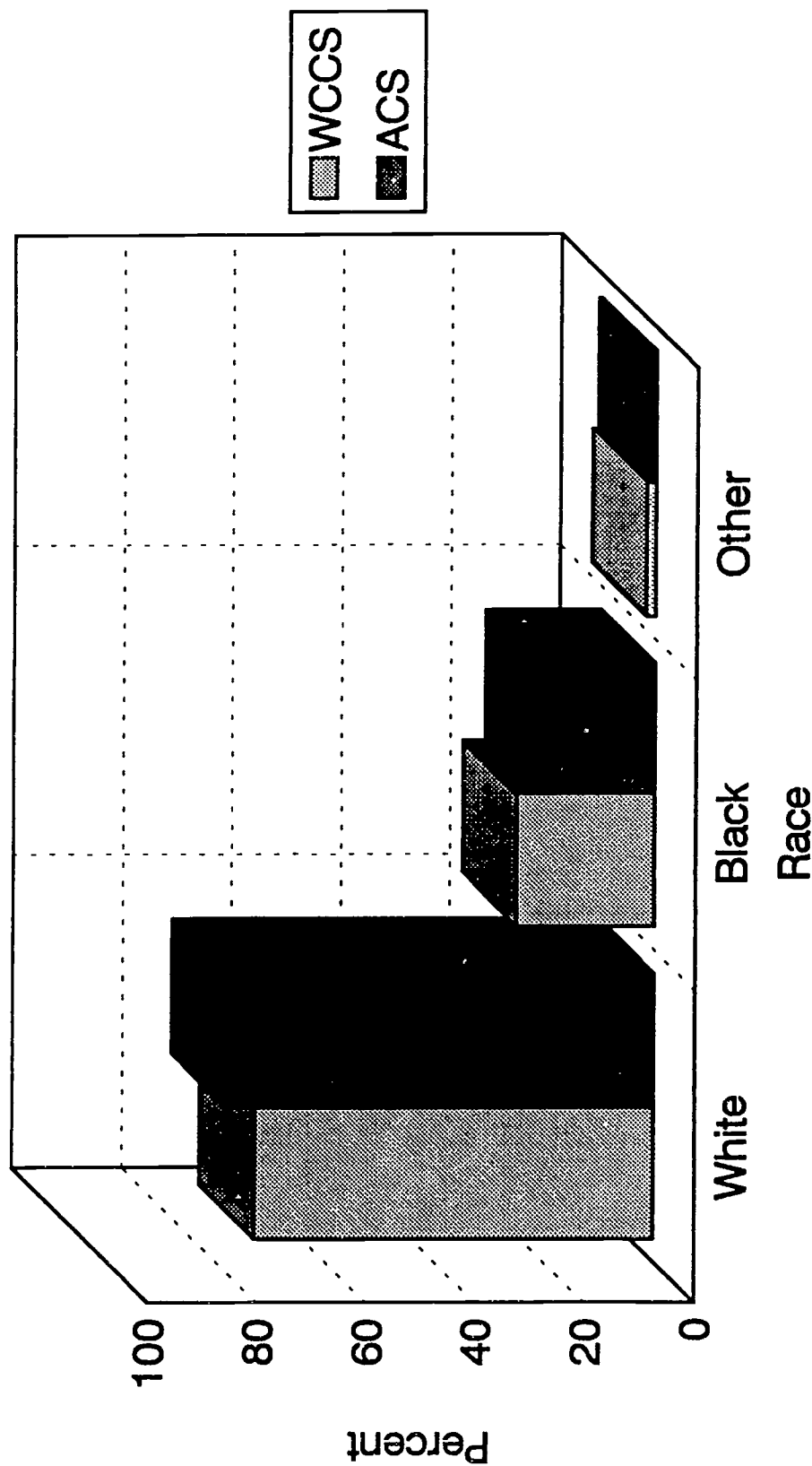

Fall Quarter 1991

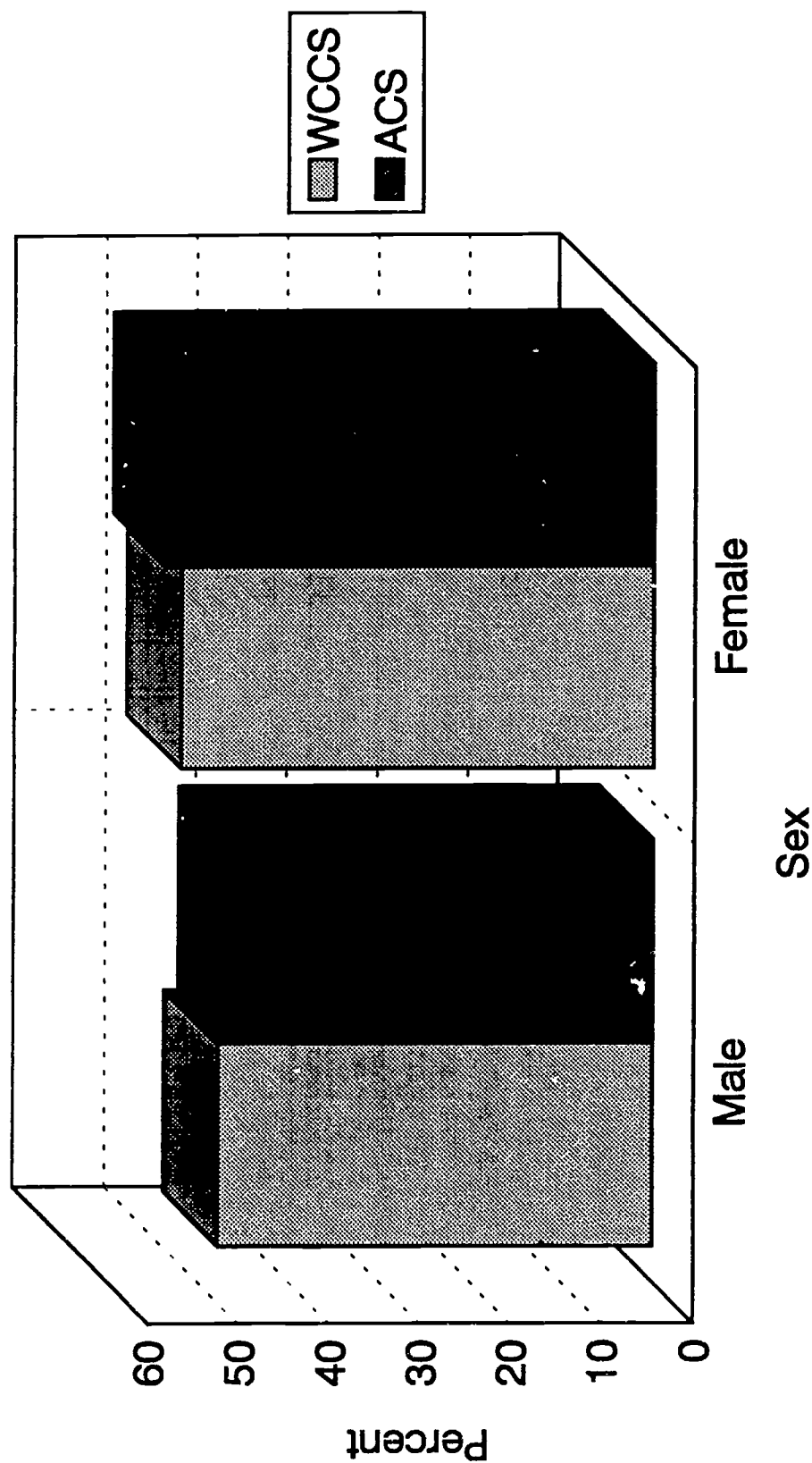

Fall Quarter 1991



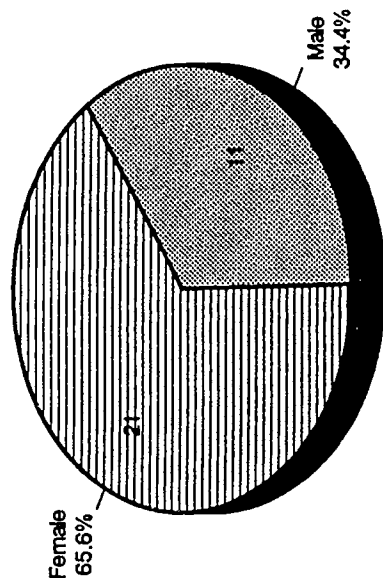
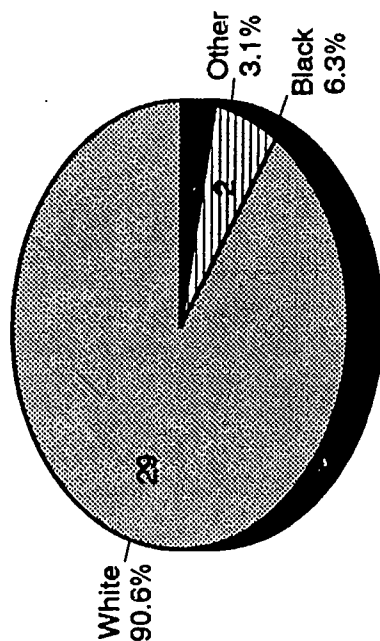

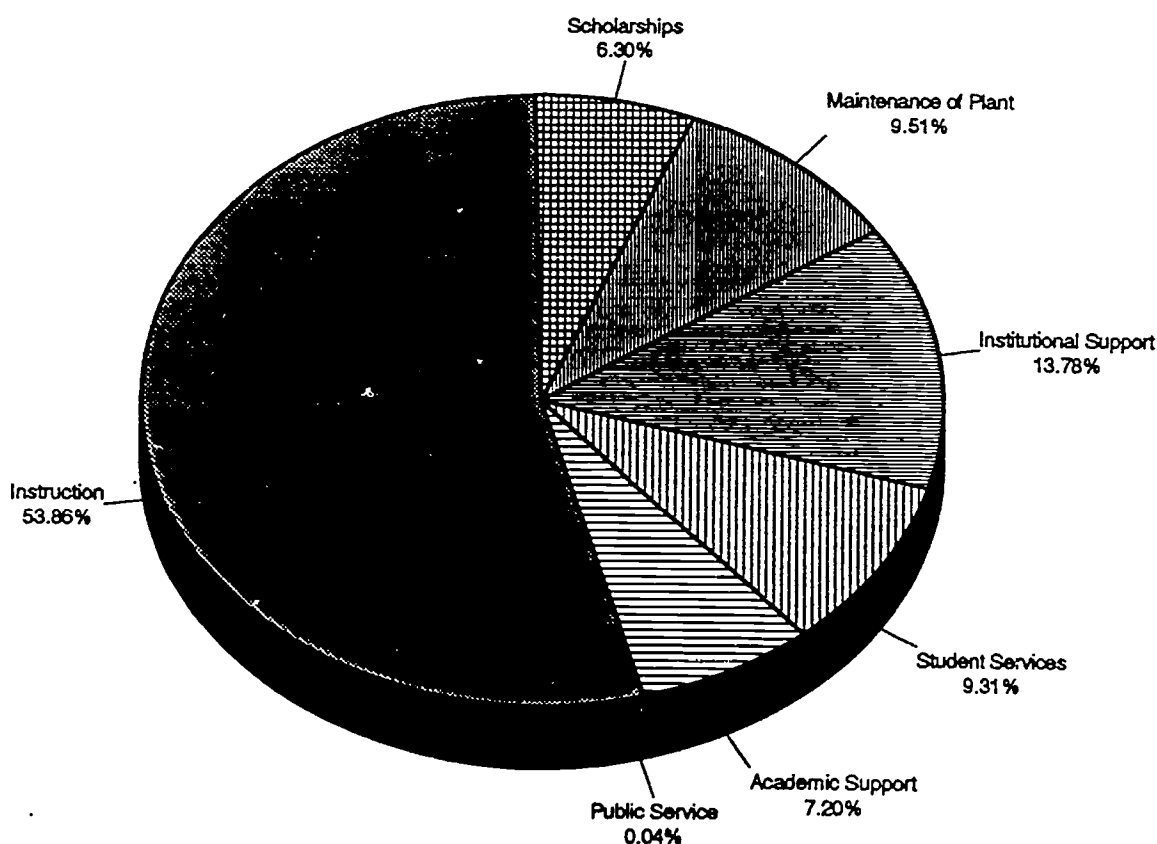

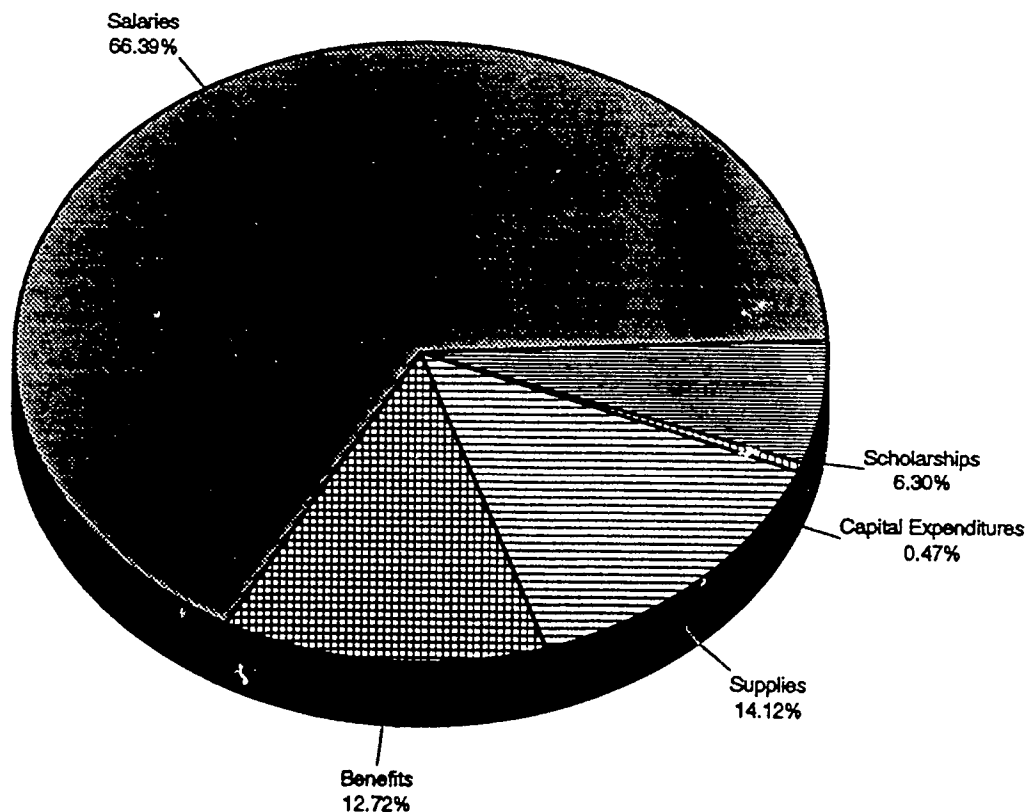

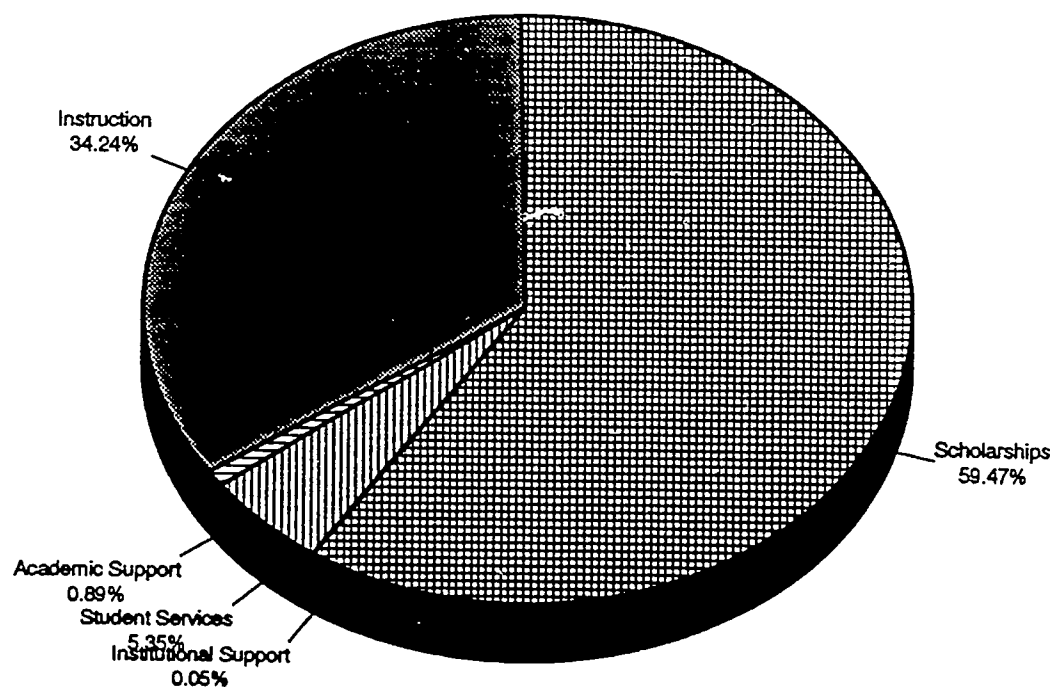

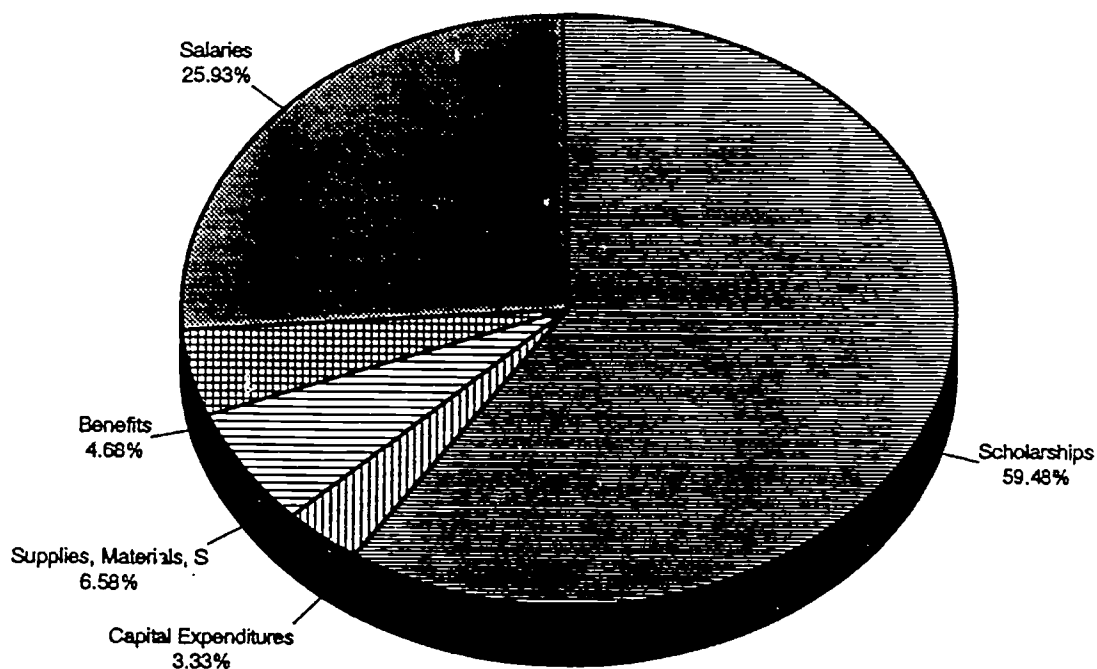

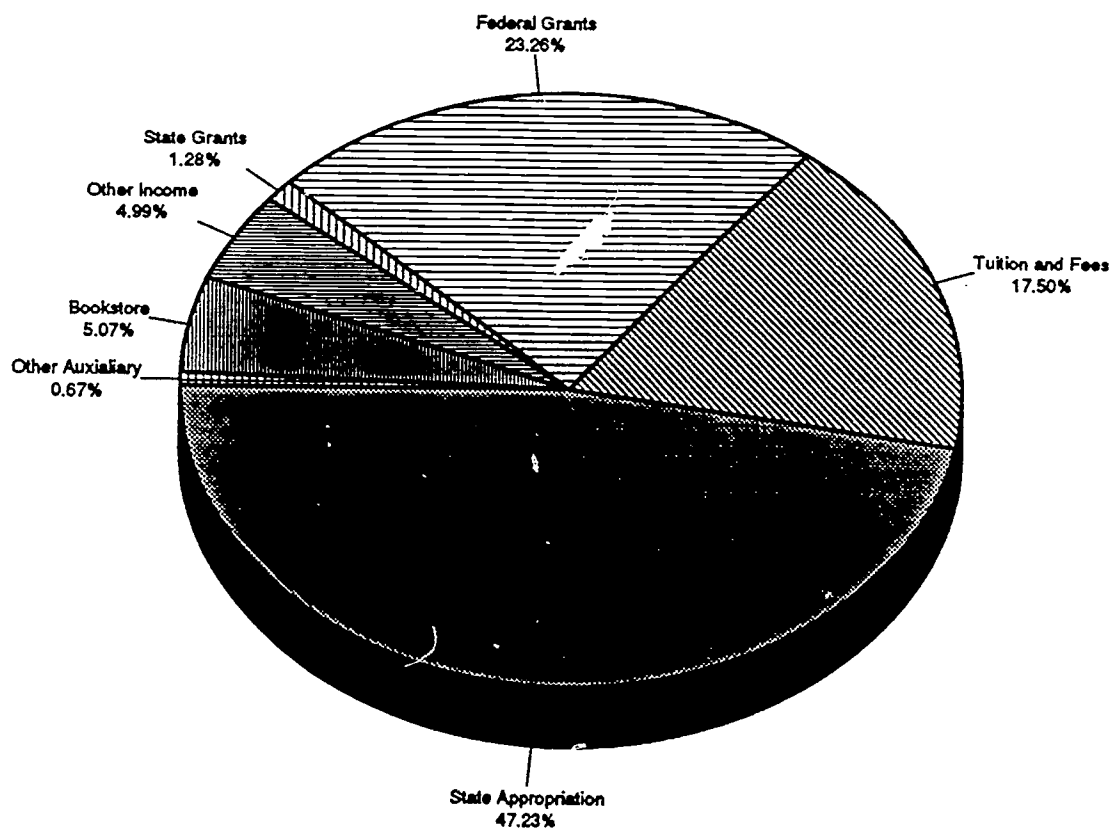

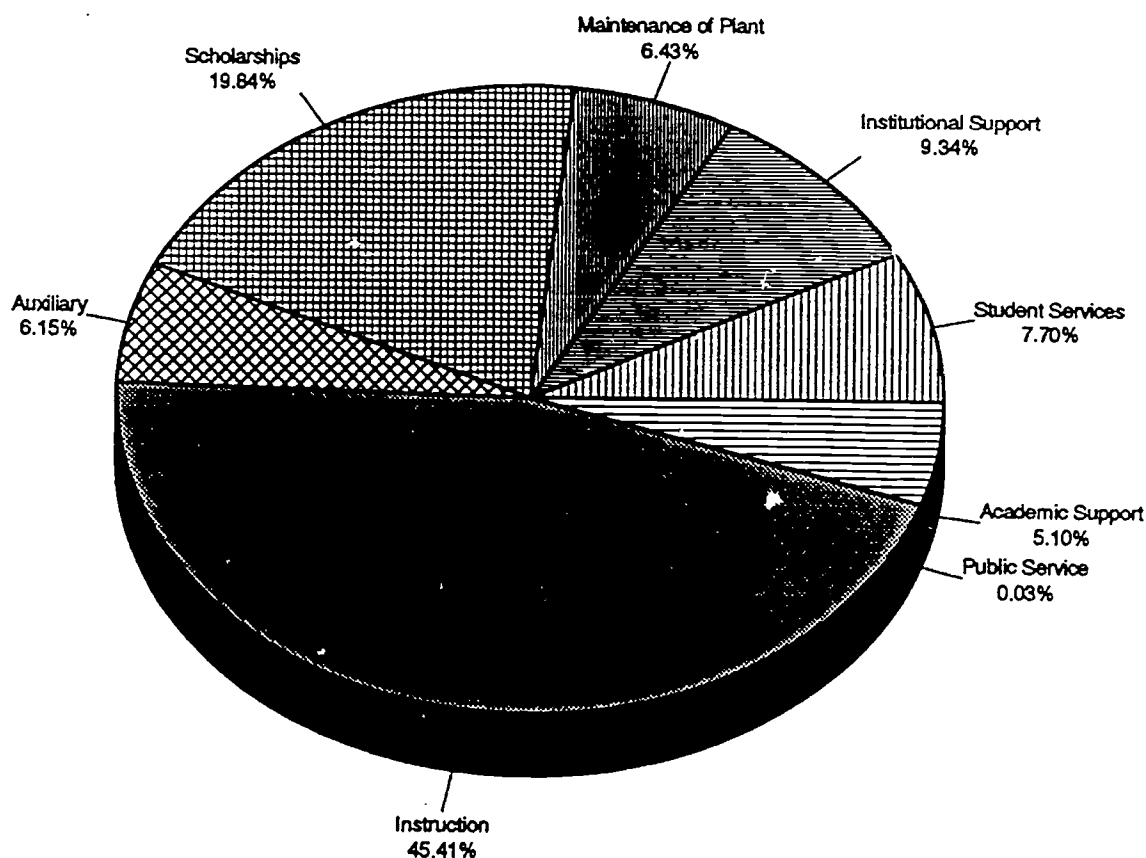

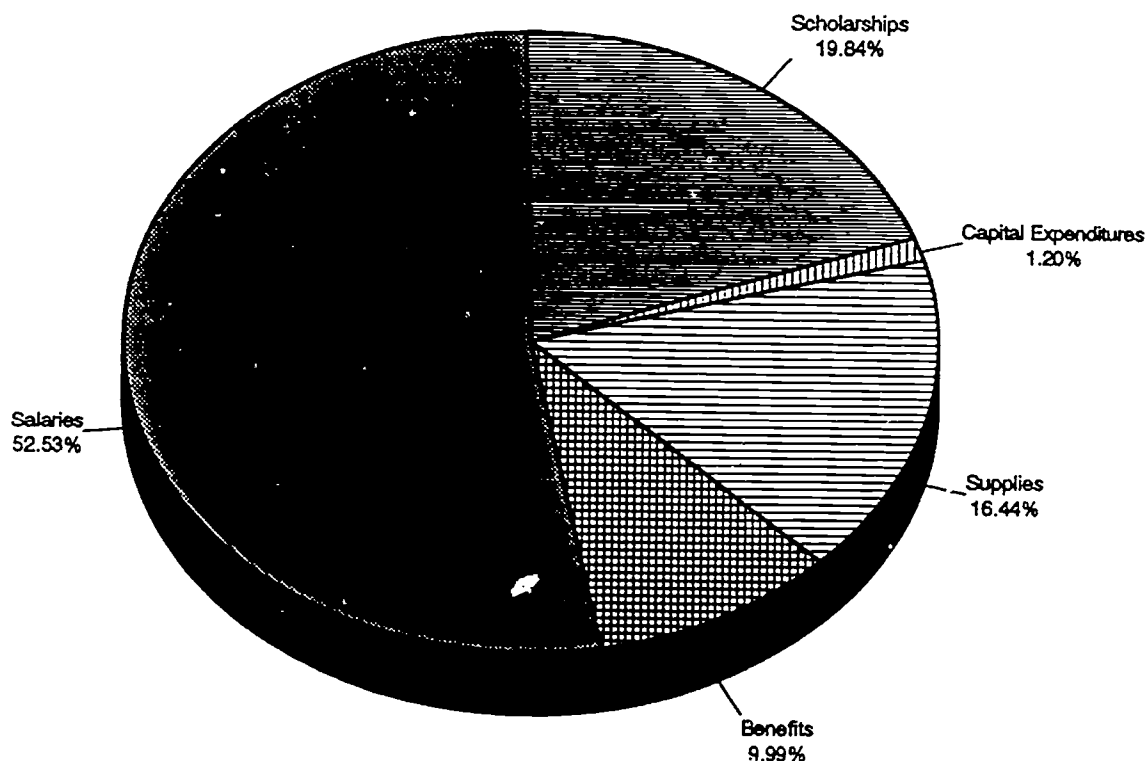

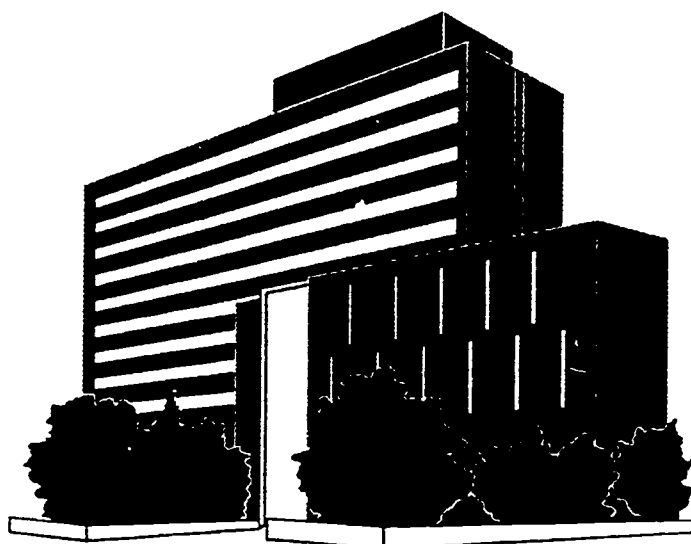
