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ABSTRACT

In order to document the economic, social, educational, and emotional status and physical well-being of children in West Virginia, this databook provides national and state profiles, a separate minority profile, and 55 county profiles. For the state and each county, 10-year (1980-90) trend data are presented for 12 indicators: child abuse/neglect rate, infant mortality rate, child death rate, juvenile arrest rate, juvenile delinquency case rate, teen birth rate, percent of births to unmarried teens, percent of high school dropouts, teen injury death rate, percent of births to low-educated mothers, percent of children in single-parent families, and percent of children in poverty. In addition, 17 background facts are presented, including data on total population, population under 18, minority population, population density, children living in households headed by other than parents, households with children, high school and college graduates, educational expenditures per pupil, Aid to Families with Dependent Children recipients, early prenatal care, jobs in high- and low-paying industries, median family income, and unemployment rate. Between 1980 and 1990, positive trends in most counties included a decline in infant mortality, an increase in mothers' education, and declines in dropout and teen pregnancy rates. However, in most counties more children were living in poverty and more children were living in single-parent families. (AC)

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

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Foreword

In 1989, the Annie E. Casey Foundation and the Center for the Study of Social Policy launched KIDS COUNT. This initiative is premised on the belief that the more the public and policy makers know about the status and needs of children, the greater the likelihood those needs will be addressed.

WV KIDS COUNT, funded in 1991, is one of 37 current state projects. It represents a collaboration between the West Virginia Task Force on Children, Youth and Families and the West Virginia Human Resources Association. In addition, representatives from numerous state agencies and non-profit organizations have volunteered their time and expertise to the identification, collection and documentation of the data that appear in this book.

The publication of this book marks the first county-by-county trend analysis of the status of children in West Virginia. Included for each

county are 12 indicators of child well-being and 17 background facts. The information that appears here is the most accurate and complete available. During the next three years, WV KIDS COUNT will publish additional reports that provide updated information and analysis.

Measuring the well-being of children will be of little consequence if we are not prepared to work for improvements. This requires the active involvement of individuals and groups at the local and community level.

WV KIDS COUNT is building on existing community networks of leaders to disseminate WV KIDS COUNT information and to encourage and support action at the community level. But we all need to do more. To join a constituency for children and become part of the solution, call 1-800-834-8323.

How To Use This Book

The 1992 WV KIDS COUNT Data Book consists of a national profile, a state profile, a minority profile and 55 county profiles, all of which document the status of children in West Virginia. Most of the indicators and background facts are expressed as percentages or rates. All the actual numbers behind the percentages and rates appear in the Appendices.

Most of the trend analyses are based on the change between 1980 and 1990. In a few cases, notably the infant mortality rate, child death rate and teen injury death rate, the 1980 value is the average of data for 1978, 1979 and 1980 and the 1990 value is the average of data for 1988, 1989 and 1990.

A composite county rank appears in the upper right corner of each county profile. It was derived by combining z scores for each indicator, giving each indicator equal weight. The composite z scores were then ranked, 1=best, 55=worst.

Each of the 12 indicators is also ranked in sequential order from best (1) to worst (55). This ranking was obtained by simply ranking the rate or percentage from best to worst. These individual indicator rankings appear on each of the county pages under the county rank column and are based on the most recent available data.

Whenever there was a tie of two or more counties, they were all assigned the same rank, e.g., if four counties tied at ranking position 1, they were all assigned a ranking position of 1, then the next county was ranked 5.

Caution should be used in interpreting the results of the rankings. Some indicators — the child death rate, for example — document relatively rare events. For example, the county that is ranked 3rd for a particular indicator may have a value of 2 percent, while the county that is ranked 25th may have a value of 4 percent.

Each county profile includes a bar graph that displays the percentage change between 1980 and 1990 for each indicator. The state profile contains national comparison data, while the county profiles compare the counties to the state average.

"NA" indicates that data were not available; "NM" is used when the 1980 data is zero and the 1990 data is any value above zero because a percent change from zero cannot be calculated. When the 1980 data is any value above zero and the 1990 data is zero, the percent change shown is always 100 percent.

Overview And Key Findings

Children are West Virginia's future. Given love, nourishment, care and education, our children succeed and develop into healthy and productive adults. The investment made in children today determines their future and the future of West Virginia.

West Virginians are proud of their heritage, their children, their communities and families. Our strength comes from our strong family ties, an involvement with our children, a low crime rate, lots of natural beauty and a willingness to work hard. West Virginians go to work eagerly when they have the tools to tackle the problem. It is time to put that resolve to work for children.

The data presented in this report reflects the status of children and their families in each West Virginia county. There is good news and bad news. The good news is that in most of our counties fewer babies are dying before their first birthday, West Virginia mothers have more education today than before, fewer children are dropping out of high school and fewer teens are having babies. The bad news is that these improvements have not been achieved in all 55 counties and that in most of our counties, more children are poor and more children are living in single-parent families.

More than one-fourth of West Virginia's children live in poverty. Our goal is to reduce this percentage. To do this requires an investment in our children's future; their health, their education, their welfare. This investment is important to everyone today and tomorrow. Parents, educators, civic, religious and business leaders need to focus on improving the well-being of children in their homes, neighborhoods, towns and the state. West Virginia's children need all of us to care and to act.

Overview And Key Findings, continued

Income

When adjusted for inflation, median family income in West Virginia declined between 1980 and 1990. The state lost 23 percent of its higher-paying jobs primarily in manufacturing, heavy industry and mining. Among the counties, the change in median family income ranged from a 29 percent increase in Jefferson to a 27.5 percent decrease in McDowell. At \$25,602, West Virginia's median family income was \$9,623 below the national figure of \$35,225.

Poverty

Between 1980 and 1990, West Virginia saw an increase in the number and percentage of children living in poverty. In 1990, West Virginia had the highest percentage of white children in poverty of all states at 25.4 percent and ranked 46th in the number of African-American children in poverty at 50.2 percent. There was an increase in the number of families eligible for Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC). Statewide, there were 53.1 percent more families receiving AFDC in 1990 than in 1980.

The eastern panhandle counties have the lower numbers relating to children in poverty, with Morgan at 10.3 percent children in poverty and Jefferson at 13.7 percent, ranking 1 and 2 respectively in the state. Children in southern West Virginia were not as fortunate. More than half of the children in McDowell County, 50.3 percent, live below the poverty level and other southern counties are not faring much better.

Number of Children

Between 1980 and 1990, West Virginia lost a larger portion of its children than any other state. While the population of West Virginia declined by 8 percent in that decade, the number of children declined by 20.7 percent. Nationally, the decline in the number of children was only 0.1 percent. Since the reduction in the number of children does not lower all educational costs, the cost per pupil has increased. Counties with declining enrollments spend a larger portion of their education dollars on fixed costs such as maintenance and less on educational services.

The economic implications of a declining population of children are clear. The future work force will shrink and state tax revenues with it. Competition for state dollars will increase as the proportion of the population which is elderly increases. Barring improvements in our economy, more and more families with children will depend on public support programs such as Food Stamps and Medicaid.

Families

Between 1980 and 1990, the percentage of West Virginia children living in single-parent families increased from 12.0 percent in 1980 to 17.4 percent in 1990, an increase of 45 percent over the decade. The eastern mountain counties have the highest percentage of children living in two-parent families. Tucker, with only 11.3 percent of children in single-parent families, ranks number 1, followed by Pendleton at 11.4 percent and Morgan at 12.7 percent. More urban counties had the highest percentages of children in single-parent families: Ohio County had 21.2 percent and Kanawha and Cabell each had 21 percent. While single-parent families are not necessarily in distress, they do face greater challenges than two-parent families, where the burdens of health or income crises are usually shared by spouses.

According to the 1990 Census, West Virginia had the lowest growth in the number of working mothers, a 55 percent increase. West Virginia also had the highest percentage, 34 percent, of children living in the traditional family setting, two parents with only one employed outside the home.

Status Of Children By Indicators

A. Health and Safety

- 30% decrease in infant mortality rate
- 22% decrease in child death rate
- 8% decrease in teen injury death rate

West Virginia has made significant strides in child health, as reflected above. The infant mortality rate in the state dropped from 13.6 deaths per 1,000 live births in 1980 to 9.4 deaths per 1,000 in 1990. There was a 27.0 percent decrease in infant mortality for African-American infants. However, the infant mortality rate for African-Americans, at 17.3, is almost double the rate for white infants, at 9.6. The child death rate dropped from 40.8 per 100,000 in 1980 to 31.8 per 100,000 in 1990. These trends must continue if we are to meet the national goals of 7 infant deaths per 1,000 live births and 28 child deaths per 100,000 children set for the year 2000.

B. Economic Status

- 40% increase in percentage of children living in poverty
- 45% increase in percentage of children in single-parent families

West Virginia's percentage of children living below the poverty level is among the highest in the nation at 26.2 percent. The poverty rate for African-American children increased by 47.0 percent. Over half of the state's African-American children live in poverty. The poverty rate for children in female-headed households

is more than twice that of children in general. The poverty rate for children less than 6 years of age in female-headed households is more than three times that of young children generally.

C. Social Aspects

- 22% decrease in teen birth rate
- 14% increase in juvenile arrest rate
- 0% change in percentage of births that are to unmarried teens
- 29.6 cases of juvenile delinquency per 1,000 youths ages 10-20 in 1990

The significant decrease in the teen birth rate parallels the national trend and is good news since teen mothers are more likely to have low birth-weight babies and babies with health problems.

Any number of factors contribute to the increase in juvenile arrests, from increased poverty to new laws and variations in enforcement and reporting techniques. Whatever the causes, we must support community efforts which encourage our youth to become productive citizens.

1980 data were not available for the juvenile delinquency case rate, but the 1990 rate was 29.6 per 100,000 youths. Juvenile crime rates in West Virginia continue to be among the lowest in the nation.

D. Education

- 34% decrease in percentage of high school dropouts
- 18% decrease in percentage of births to low-educated mothers

The high school dropout rate of only 16.9 percent in 1990 was markedly better than the 25.6 percent rate in 1980. The decrease of 18% in the percentage of births to low-educated mothers is a significant improvement. Low-educated mothers are less likely to continue with their education and the children of low-educated mothers experience greater developmental difficulties.

E. Emotional Well Being

- 458.1 cases of child abuse/neglect per 100,000 children in the state in 1990

The data concerning child abuse/neglect are unavailable for 1980, therefore the trend is not measurable. However, there were 458.1 cases of child abuse/neglect per 100,000 children reported in 1990. These were substantiated cases "open" for further servicing by a case worker and do not include the number of cases that go unreported every year. The national rate is 1,493.7 cases per 100,000 children.

Things We Can Do Together To Make Kids Count

THINGS WE CAN DO TOGETHER TO MAKE KIDS COUNT IN WEST VIRGINIA.

Children are the future of West Virginia. If children are to grow up to be responsible parents, competitive workers and secure individuals, then all of us need to do our part. West Virginia's children need you to care and to act. Here are some things that you can do to make WV KIDS COUNT.

1. Change your focus. Make children a priority.

- Talk to children.
- Listen to what they have to say.
- Keep an eye out for children. If you see a child in trouble, try to help or find someone who can.

2. Change your routine. It begins at home.

- Show interest in your child's education. Encourage your child's enthusiasm for learning. Help with homework.
- Read stories to your child.

3. Change a child's life. Give your time.

- Offer to assist a family. Many families could use an extra hand, advice and support.
- Call your local information and referral agency or library and ask for the names of youth and family service organizations that may need assistance.

- Volunteer to be a mentor, a tutor or an after-school helper.

4. Change your neighborhood. Make it a positive place for children.

- Donate materials to your local schools, such as books, audio and video equipment, records, cassettes, videotapes or art supplies.
- Start a Watch project to keep your neighborhood safe for children.

5. Change your community. Make your town child friendly.

- Use this data book to identify indicators which need improvement in your community and mobilize individuals to improve one of the KIDS COUNT indicators.
- Identify community leaders and let us know who they are so that they may receive a KIDS COUNT book. Educate them about the conditions for children.
- Find out what children's issues are being debated in your community and join in those debates.
- Get informed about the needs of children in your community and your county and about what is already working and share this information through the news media.
- Convene a group of business, religious, labor and civic leaders and ask them to identify

programs or strategies that can help increase family income in your community.

6. Change your work place. Make it family friendly.

- Encourage your employer to teach young people job skills and provide job opportunities.
- Offer internships.
- Encourage your company to co-sponsor children's team sports, day care scholarships.

7. Change the system. Vote for children.

- Ask your elected officials what they are doing to help children.
- Identify those programs in your community that are making a difference for children and make sure your state legislator visits them when he/she is home.
- Vote.

8. Make a financial contribution.

- Contribute to groups working for children.
- Support the groups that are doing the work you believe is most important.




West Virginia Profile





Percent Change 1980 - 1990






Boone County

Legend: Solid bars indicate county percent change Hatched bars indicate state percent change






Braxton County











Appendices

Definitions in alphabetical order

Child Abuse/Neglect Rate (per 100,000 children) - the number of substantiated abuse and neglect cases "open" for further servicing by a social worker per 100,000 children.

Child Death Rate (ages 1-14 per 100,000 children) - the number of deaths from all causes, of children between the ages of 1-14 years, per 100,000 children.

Education Expenditures Per Pupil (1990 dollars) - current expenditures for public school programs pre-kindergarten through 12th grade expressed on a per pupil basis in 1989-90 constant dollars.

Infant Mortality Rate (per 1,000 live births) - the number of deaths of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births.

Juvenile Arrest Rate (per 1,000 teens) - the number of arrests per 1,000 youths under age 18.

Juvenile Delinquency Case Rate (ages 10-20 per 1,000 youths) - the number of delinquency cases reported per 1,000 youths ages 10 - 20 years. These cases include children accused of status offenses, misdemeanors and felonies.

Median Family Income (1990 dollars) - that family income at which fifty percent of all families have a higher income and fifty percent of all families have a lower income. Both 1980 and 1990 median family incomes are expressed in constant 1990 dollars.

Percent Adults Who Are College Graduates - the percentage of persons 25 years and over with at least a college degree.

Percent Adults Who Are High School Graduates - the percentage of persons 25 years and over with at least a high school degree (GED included).

Percent All Families With Related Children Who Are AFDC Recipients - the percentage of families with related children who receive public assistance under the Aid to Families with Dependent Children or Aid to Families with Dependent Children - Unemployed program. Eligibility for this program is income based.

Percent All Households That Are Families With Children - Family households with at least one person under age 18 as reported in the 1980 Census and the 1990 Census.

Percent Births To Low-Educated Mothers - the percentage of all births to mothers with less than a 12th grade education.

Percent Births To Unmarried Teens (age 19 and under) - the percentage of live births which are to unmarried women under the age of 20 years.

Percent Births With Early Prenatal Care - the percentage of births that are to women who began

prenatal care in the first three months of their pregnancy. Births to women who did not report the month in which prenatal care was started are excluded from the computation.

Percent Children In Poverty - the percentage of children under 18 years of age who live in poverty as defined by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. The poverty threshold for a family of four persons was \$13,360 in 1990.

Percent Children In Single-Parent Families - the percentage of "own" children under age 18 who live in families headed by a person without a spouse present in the home. "Own" children include the family head's children by birth, marriage or adoption.

Percent Children Living In Households Headed By Relatives Other Than Parents - the percentage of children under 18 years living in a household headed by a relative other than a parent.

Percent High School Dropouts - the percentage of all students who leave a public school, before graduation without transferring to another school.

Percent Low Birth-Weight Babies - the percentage of live births recorded as low birth-weight. Babies of low birth-weight are those who weigh under 2,500 grams (5.5 pounds) at birth.

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
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
