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Finding specific statistics can be a time-consuming and frustrating experience. Although the ERIC database includes information about education statistics, it is not a good source of specific statistical information. This ERIC DIGEST suggests alternative sources for obtaining various types of education and literacy statistics and information.



EDUCATION STATISTICS

The National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), part of the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Educational Research and Improvement (OERI), is the best single source for statistics regarding all aspects of education and literacy. NCES provides free products and services to educational researchers and state and local education agencies, including use of questionnaires developed for national surveys and information or tabulations using NCES data sets (OERI 1993b).

OERI materials and information are meant to be used by students, parents, teachers, administrators, librarians, and policymakers at all educational levels. Free and inexpensive products range from publications for parents to help their children learn to comprehensive statistical reports. Statistical databases are available on tape, diskette, and CD-ROM. The OERI toll-free telephone line--1-800-424-1616--is staffed by trained information specialists who can respond to requests for information (OERI 1993a).

THE CONDITION OF EDUCATION, NCES's compilation of statistics, includes "data that measure the health of education, monitor important developments, and show trends in major aspects of education." It also "provides a means to report where progress is being made...and where it is not, to draw attention to emerging issues, and to inform the ongoing policy debate" ("Condition of Education 1993").

In addition, NCES publishes reports on specific aspects of education such as teachers, vocational education, adult education, public schools, private schools, and expenditures. Information that can be obtained from NCES publications, such as the DIGEST OF EDUCATION STATISTICS, and from their information office includes data on program participation, student outcomes, enrollment rates, educational attainment, regulations, and expenditures as they relate to public and private elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education. Information about teacher education, teacher-pupil ratios, teacher salaries, and selected characteristics of teachers in all educational settings is also available. The following items in the bibliography are examples of NCES reports: Choy (1993), Gerald et al. (1989), and Snyder (1993).

Vocational education information is included in several NCES publications. Hoachlander et al.'s (1992) review of vocational education from 1969 to 1990 discusses such topics as program participation, student outcomes, labor market participation, Carnegie units, and demographic information about vocational education teachers.

In addition to calling the information office at NCES for the statistical information that you need, you will find their reports and newsletters at most state, university, and large-city public libraries. State departments of education and local boards of education will have information about their programs.

LITERACY STATISTICS

During 1992, the National Center for Education Statistics, in cooperation with the Educational Testing Service (ETS), conducted a National Adult Literacy Survey (NALS) to "profile the English literacy of adults in the United States based on their performance across a wide array of tasks that reflect the types of materials and demands they encounter in their daily lives" (Kirsch et al. 1993, p. xiii). The study resulted in information on types and levels of literacy skills and the variation in skills across major subgroups in the population. The report explores and analyzes connections between literacy skills and variables such as voting, economic status, weeks worked, and earnings. In addition, the survey characterizes literacy skills in terms of demographics and personal background; characterizes the work force with respect to literacy skills by various occupational categories; compares results with those from other literacy surveys; interprets findings related to information processing skills; and provides increased understanding of the skills and knowledge associated with functioning in a



technological society (NCES 1993).

Each state has--or soon will have--a State Literacy Resource Center (SLRC) that will become part of a network of centers to stimulate the coordination of literacy services, enhance the capacity of state and local organizations to provide literacy services, and serve as a link between the National Institute for Literacy and service providers (Office of Vocational and Adult Education 1993). The Center for Literacy Studies at the University of Tennessee is one of the newly formed SLRCs. They have information and statistics about programs in Tennessee including a profile of each county. Each of the SLRCs will have similar types of information. Call your state governor's office or the U.S. Department of Education's Adult Education and Literacy Clearinghouse for the location of the SLRC in your state.

Many agencies and organizations focus on some aspects of literacy. Information and/or statistics can be obtained from those listed here.
