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ABSTRACT

This report is a summary of the 1993 Virginia General Assembly Session and its actions regarding higher education. The 1993 session considered a record number of bills and resolutions with more than 1,500 passed and signed by the governor. Approximately 150 of the items pertain directly or indirectly to higher education in Virginia and include a number of requests for studies in which the Council Higher Education will either participate or coordinate. The first section offers a summary of House and Senate Bills that were approved and pertain to higher education. The second section lists and describes a number of House and Senate study resolutions that the Council is involved in or has an interest in following. Finally the report contains a section that presents a summary of the budgetary issues and funding levels as a result of the 1993 session. 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## The 1993 General Assembly

### A SUMMARY OF HIGHER EDUCATION RELATED LEGISLATION AND APPROPRIATIONS

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## INTRODUCTION

The 1993 session of the General Assembly considered a record 2,904 bills and resolutions, with more than 1,500 being passed by both houses and approved and signed by the Governor.

Approximately 150 of the items pertained directly or indirectly to higher education in Virginia. The measures included a number of requests for studies in which the Council of Higher Education will either participate or coordinate.

This was an important legislative session for higher education as the Delegates and Senators wrestled with how to accommodate an additional 65,000 students in the next few years with little or no additional funding and how to combat double-digit tuition increases that have made Virginia's colleges and universities some of the most expensive in the country.

As directed by the 1992 Appropriations Act, the Council presented the General Assembly with a restructuring report suggesting ways to begin handling the expected influx of students. The report also discussed such topics as ways to streamline administration, putting more emphasis on teaching, and finding more and better uses for technology, both in and out of the classroom.

The 1993 General Assembly approved a number of pieces of legislation related to academic issues, technology, budget issues, workforce and literacy

issues, and others. In addition, the General Assembly considered bills related to licensure requirements and preservation of historic areas. The General Assembly also will continue its efforts to increase the number of health care workers by approving several measures related to health care that are relevant to higher education.

Halfway through the 1992-94 biennium, the Governor and the General Assembly amended the budget to reflect what they felt were funding priorities for higher education in the Commonwealth. Included in the amendments were faculty salary increases, additional student financial aid appropriations, additional funds for the community colleges to handle enrollment growth, and the authority for institutions to raise tuition and fees to pay for initiatives related to the report from the Commission on the University of the 21st Century.

What follows is a summary of the 1993 General Assembly Session. The first section offers a summary of House and Senate Bills that were approved and pertain to higher education.

The second section lists and describes a number of House and Senate study resolutions that the Council is involved in or has an interest in following. Finally, this report contains a section that presents a summary of the budgetary issues and funding levels as a result of the 1993 session.

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## HIGHER EDUCATION RELATED LEGISLATION

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### ACADEMIC ISSUES

*Requirements for Certified Public Accountants*  
(House Bill 1273)  
Patron - Cranwell

Requires the Board of Accountancy to admit for examination anyone holding a bachelor's degree in accounting from any institution, college, or university that at the time was accredited by an accrediting organization recognized by the United States Secretary of Education.

*License to Practice Clinical Psychology*  
(House Bill 1912)  
Patron - Cunningham

This bill delineates the educational and clinical prerequisites needed to acquire a license to practice clinical psychology. Also, the Board of Psychology is given the authority to grant temporary licenses to residents in clinical psychology.

*Preservation of Historic Areas*  
(House Bill 2081)  
Patron - Bloxom

Provides that archaeological sites are historic, should be considered in the comprehensive plan when such plan is reviewed every five years, and are included in local governments' authority to preserve historic areas.

### STUDENT ISSUES

*Sale of Grain Alcohol*  
(House Bill 1639)  
Patron - Connally

This bill prohibits the sale of grain alcohol by government stores except for industrial, commercial,

or medical use. This was one of the recommendations made by the Governor's Task Force on Substance Abuse and Sexual Assault on College Campuses and was designed to help to decrease availability of this product to students on the college and university campuses across the Commonwealth.

*Amounts of Public Assistance*  
(House Bill 1502)  
Patron - Melvin

This bill will allow recipients of public assistance to establish one savings account of up to \$5,000 for educational expenses and purchase a primary home without a penalty in the calculation of the amount a family is able to contribute to a child's educational expenses.

*Virginia Guaranteed Assistance Program*  
(House Bill 1790)  
Patron - Diamonstein

This bill requires that students seeking renewal of grants from the Virginia Guaranteed Assistance Program maintain at least a 2.0 grade point average on 4.0 scale. The bill also clarifies that eligible students must be enrolled in or accepted for enrollment in any public institution of higher education.

*Participation in Higher Education Programs*  
(House Bill 2173)  
Patron - Wagner

This bill, designed to promote greater racial diversity in Virginia's public colleges and universities, prohibits restricting participation in state-supported financial aid or other higher education programs based on race or ethnic background. This bill will affect several programs that currently include only African-Americans.

***Eligibility for In-State Tuition***  
**(Senate Bill 782)**  
**Patron - Walker**

This bill repeals the sunset clause that would have ended the eligibility of military dependents for in-state tuition.

**HEALTH CARE ISSUES**

***Scholarship for Nursing Students***  
**(House Bill 2281)**  
**Patron - Connally**

This bill establishes a nurse practitioner/nurse midwife scholarship program. The awards are offered to certain students who agree to repay the Commonwealth by practicing in Virginia's medically underserved areas.

***Professional Counseling***  
**(Senate Bill 611)**  
**Patron - Schewel**

This bill revises certain definitions related to professional counseling in the Commonwealth. These new definitions modernize the scope of the practice of professional counselors to reflect the current trends and practices.

***Licensure of Acupuncturists***  
**(Senate Bill 1003)**  
**Patron - Saslaw**

This bill removes the expiration date of June 30, 1993, from the provisions which require the Board of Medicine to license those who are not doctors of medicine, osteopathy or podiatry as "acupuncturists." In addition, the definition of acupuncture is struck and replaced by a definition of the practice of acupuncture.

***Continuing Education for Hygienists***  
**(Senate Bill 1005)**  
**Patron - Early**

This bill directs the Board of Dentistry to promulgate regulations that will require the completion of a minimum of 15 credit hours of continuing education each year for the renewal or reinstatement of a dental hygienist license after March 1, 1995.

**TECHNOLOGY ISSUES**

***Biotechnology Research Park***  
**(House Bill 1988)**  
**Patron - Hall**

This bill creates a state authority, in Richmond, whose purpose is to advance scientific and technological research and development among public and private entities. The Authority is to be governed by a nine member board including the president of Virginia Commonwealth University, mayor of Richmond, and the Secretary of Economic Development. The Authority's powers are to include the issuance of bonds.

***Center For Innovative Technology***  
**(Senate Bill 532)**  
**Patron - Andrews**

The 1992 Appropriations Act mandated a special review of the Center for Innovative Technology and this bill incorporates the recommendations made as a result of that review. In addition, the Committee that did the review is directed to develop a plan that will provide guidance for maximizing the Center's potential.

**WORKFORCE/LITERACY ISSUES**

***Adult Education, Literacy, & Training***  
**(House Bill 2169)**  
**Patron - Diamonstein**

(Same as SB 994) This bill establishes the Virginia Advisory Council for Adult Education, Literacy, and Training. The Council is designed to provide for an

integrated, multi-agency approach to delivering quality adult education, literacy, and training services; maximum diversity of such programs, services, and philosophies; and coordination and monitoring of these programs throughout Virginia.

***Workforce 2000 Advocacy Council***  
**(Senate Bill 989)**  
**Patron - Schewel**

(Same as HB2214) This bill codifies the Workforce 2000 Advisory Council, originally appointed in 1991, as a temporary collegial body within the executive branch. The Council is charged with promoting and implementing the recommendations for strengthening the Commonwealth's 21st Century Workforce contained in the 1992 report issued by the Governor's Advisory Committee on Workforce 2000.

***Business-Education Partnership Program***  
**(Senate Bill 990)**  
**Patron - Schewel**

(Same as HB 2213) This bill establishes the Virginia Business-Education Partnership Program within the Office of the Secretary of Education. The program is designed to expand business involvement in public education and workforce training and to promote strategic education reform partnerships in support of world class education.

**BUDGET ISSUES**

***Higher Education Institutional Bond Act***  
**(House Bill 1251)**  
**Patron - Smith**

(Same as SB 551) This bill authorizes the issuance of revenue bonds in the amount of \$110,375,000, plus the cost of issuance, for capital projects at certain institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth.

***Biennial Budget Estimates***  
**(House Bill 2163)**  
**Patron - Miller**

This bill requires that all state agencies submit an estimate of the amount that will be needed for the two succeeding biennial periods.

**OTHERS**

***World Trade Alliance of the Blue Ridge***  
**(House Bill 1397)**  
**Patron - Cranwell**

This bill establishes the World Trade Alliance of the Blue Ridge to focus on the strengths and needs of the region through a number of different trade programs, including international trade conferences, trade missions, mentor programs, student work placement, and a trade data base.

***Blue Ridge Regional Education & Training***  
**(House Bill 1799)**  
**Patron - Finney**

This expands the duties of the Blue Ridge Regional Educational and Training Council to include development of incentive programs for school systems, promotion and expansion of apprenticeship training, and the formulation of a model student volunteer program.

***Virginia Retirement System***  
**(House Bill 1987)**  
**Patron - Hall**

This bill increases from two to four years the number of years of service which may be purchased by Virginia Retirement System members for a leave of absence for educational purposes or for temporary employment with the General Assembly.



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## HIGHER EDUCATION RELATED STUDIES

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### Items From the Amended 1992-94 Appropriations Act

#### *Higher Education Restructuring: Staffing Productivity & Curricular Change* (Appropriations Act - Item 151)

The State Council of Higher Education and the colleges and universities shall continue to discuss staffing productivity and curricular changes in Virginia's public colleges and universities. After full consultation between the colleges and universities and the State Council, the colleges and universities and the State Council shall submit recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly. **Due:** Unspecified.

#### *Medical Education* (Appropriations Act - Item 166 & Item 586)

The State Council of Higher Education shall report to the Governor and the Secretary of Education on possible fiscal policies and other forms of incentives to stimulate the production of additional primary care physicians, and to increase the utilization of primary care physicians and residents in the delivery of services by the two university hospitals and the Medical College of Hampton Roads. The report shall be prepared in cooperation with the three medical schools, two teaching hospitals, and the Joint Commission on Health Care. The report should include recommendations for funding of undergraduate and graduate medical education programs, and recommendations on graduate medical education costs to be paid by the hospitals and changes in the composition of residencies to implement the primary care initiatives identified by the three medical schools. **Due:** October 1, 1992.

#### *Graduate Education* (Appropriations Act - Item 151)

The State Council of Higher Education shall report on current policies, objectives and support for gradu-

ate education in the Commonwealth, and make recommendations for support and improvement of graduate education in the future. The report should discuss such issues as the funding of graduate education as well as incentives for attracting graduate students, especially minorities and women, into and preparing them for the teaching profession. The report should address issues such as financial stability, graduate assistant benefits, costs of research hours, residency requirements, graduate student inclusion in institutional governance, graduate program review, the delivery of graduate instruction, and other matters deemed relevant by the Council. Students, faculty, and others interested in graduate education should be involved in compiling this report. The Council should make budget recommendations for improving graduate education as appropriate. **Due:** to the Governor and Secretary of Education, by October 1, 1993.

#### *Research and Public Service Centers* (Appropriations Act - Item 151)

It is the intent of the General Assembly that direct general fund support of special purpose research centers and projects in higher education not be continued indefinitely, and that institutions of higher education move as quickly as possible to secure sponsored support of such activities. The State Council of Higher Education shall identify all instances where general fund support is provided for such center and projects, shall evaluate the effectiveness and productivity of such centers in furthering state interests and objectives, and shall recommend to the Governor and the General Assembly such modifications in appropriations and funding policies as it deems appropriate. **Due:** October 1, each year.

#### *Funds for Excellence* (Appropriations Act - Item 155)

*Beginning with the 1994-95 biennium:*

1. No more than 10 percent of the annual amount available for distribution shall be awarded to any one

four-year institution, any one two-year college, or any one community college.

2. To be eligible for an award, an institution must provide an appropriate cash or in-kind match.

3. Awards shall be made only to carry out innovative approaches to undergraduate education. Studies or projects designed to carry out central policies for higher education should be funded from the State Council's operating budget.

4. Requests to fund computer equipment shall document why current equipment cannot be used for the proposed project and document that no other source, public or private, is available to supply or finance computer equipment.

The State Council of Higher Education shall submit a report listing each project funded in the prior biennium, the source of funds, and the extent to which each project has been replicated among the institutions or has otherwise contributed to innovation in undergraduate higher education. The October 1993 report would cover projects funded in the 1990-92 biennium. **Due:** Chairman of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees, beginning October 1993, and every two years thereafter.

#### *Instructional Equipment* (Appropriations Act)

Since 1987, funding has been provided through the Higher Education Equipment Trust Fund to Virginia's colleges and universities to address deficiencies in eleven academic disciplines, including obsolete equipment. These disciplines, for which deficiency studies have been completed, use approximately 80 percent of the equipment. In preparation for additional equipment allocations during the 1994-96 biennium, the State Council of Higher Education shall identify those academic disciplines with obsolete equipment and other instructional equipment needs. **Due:** Secretary of Education.

#### *Clinch Valley College* (Appropriations Act-Item 163)

The University of Virginia shall review the academic support, student services and institutional support service needs and resources of Clinch Valley College to identify how those needs can be efficiently and effectively met. The review shall include consideration of the greater use of telecommunications and resource sharing between the university and the college. In preparing its report, the university may draw upon the expertise of appropriate state agencies, including the State Council of Higher Education, and those agencies shall cooperate as requested.

. . . .

The University of Virginia shall update the Campus Master Plan for Clinch Valley College, evaluate all utilities and conduct an environmental impact study. **Due:** University of Virginia's Board of Visitors, the Governor, and the chairmen of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees by November 15, 1993.

#### *Veterinary Medicine - Equine Medical Center* (Appropriations Act-Item 175)

The Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine is directed to study and develop recommendations regarding the activities and financial resources of the Equine Medical Center. The study shall be developed in conjunction with the State of Maryland, and other parties involved with the future of the center. **Due:** State Council of Higher Education shall make recommendations to the chairmen of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees by August 1, 1993.

#### *Norfolk State University* (Appropriations Act-Item 228)

It is the intention of the General Assembly that Norfolk State University continue to plan to offer doctoral degrees in disciplines that are in high demand

and do not unnecessarily duplicate programs already offered in Virginia. Included in this appropriation is \$52,059 from the general fund and \$59,393 from the nongeneral fund in 1993-94 to support this planning. The State Council of Higher Education is directed to assist Norfolk State University in its planning to strengthen the university. **Due:** Unspecified.

***Community College Campus in Norfolk***  
**(Appropriations Act - Item 157)**

The Virginia Community College System is authorized to plan for a Tidewater Community College campus in Norfolk. The campus shall be developed in space leased from the city. The Virginia Community College System, Old Dominion University and Norfolk State University shall develop plans for:

1. Curricula to be offered at the new campus;
2. The sharing of facilities and faculty;
3. Administrative systems, including registration that minimize cost and complexity for students; and
4. Provisions for convenient student transfer from the community college to either of the senior institutions.

These plans shall be submitted to the State Council of Higher Education for review and approval, and the Council shall make recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly prior to the 1994 session regarding program planning and financing.

This item includes \$100,000 from the general fund in the second year to be paid to the City of Norfolk to support planning by the City of Norfolk for a Tidewater Community College campus in downtown Norfolk. **Due:** to the State Council of Higher Education, December 1, 1993

**Items Assigned Solely or  
Predominantly to the Council**

***Campus Security***  
**(HJR 513)**  
**Patron: Purkey**

The State Council of Higher Education shall examine the need to enhance security policies and procedures at the Commonwealth's public institutions of higher education. In conducting its study, the State Council shall review among other things campus security and information disclosure policies, and working arrangements with local law-enforcement agencies; the need for any additional campus security personnel; institutional compliance with state and federal crime statistic disclosure requirements; and other issues and considerations it deems appropriate. **Due:** to the State Council of Higher Education, December 1, 1993.

***Case Management***  
**(HJR 577)**  
**Patron: Diamonstein**

The Secretary of Education is requested to direct the State Council of Higher Education to conduct a feasibility study to explore development and expansion of programs for case management skills. Curricula are to be developed for varied postsecondary levels, including the community college system, and should be accessible statewide. **Due:** the feasibility study - July 1, 1994 and recommendations to the 1995 General Assembly.

***Commemoration of Martin Luther King, Jr.***  
**(HJR 634)**  
**Patron: Robinson**

The State Council of Higher Education is requested to assist the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission in determining the type and extent of the commemoration of the life and accomplishments of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. at public and private institutions of higher education. The Council is re-

requested to survey the institutions to solicit such information. **Due:** November 1, 1993 to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission.

*Discretionary Aid*  
(HJR 639)

**Patron:** Van Landingham

The State Council of Higher Education is requested to review the use of discretionary aid funds for undergraduate and graduate study and the placement of the Equal Education Opportunity Unit. **Due:** 1994 Session of the General Assembly. **Note:** See HJR 638 for related legislation.

*Financial Aid for Youth in Foster Care*  
(SJR 322)

**Patron:** Lucas

The State Council of Higher Education is requested to study the feasibility of establishing a college financial aid program for youth in foster care. The study shall include development of an implementation plan and cost estimates. **Due:** November 1993 to the Senate Committee on Education and Health.

**Items with Limited Council Involvement**

*Strategic Plan for Science and Technology*  
(HJR 390)

**Patron:** Ball

A science and technology task force is to be established to report on the status of the 1983 task force recommendations and to coordinate the development of a statewide strategic plan for science and technology. The task force shall be composed of twenty-three members representing the Virginia General Assembly and state and local government, research, university and business leaders in the fields of technology and science.

Among the issues to be examined shall be the creation of a permanent council on science and technology and its role in the strategic planning process for

the economic development of the Commonwealth. The Center for Innovative Technology, the Department of Economic Development, and the State Council of Higher Education shall provide such technical assistance as the task force deems necessary. **Due:** A preliminary report to the 1994 General Assembly and a final report to the 1995 General Assembly.

*Child Support After the Age of Majority*  
(HJR 485)

**Patron:** Crouch

The Division of Legislative Services is directed to study child support after the age of majority. The Division shall compile and review existing laws on the issue, including those of other states; identify and analyze constitutional and jurisdictional issues, and public policy considerations; determine the number of children who potentially would be affected over the next four years; and review any other related issues necessary for a complete consideration of the concept.

The Department of Social Services and Youth and Family Services, the Bureau of Insurance, the Commission on Youth and the State Council of Higher Education shall provide such technical assistance upon request in the manner deemed appropriate by the Division. All other agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance as may be necessary upon request by the Division.

Implementation of this resolution is subject to the subsequent approval and certification by the Joint Rules Committee. The committee may withhold expenditures or delay the period for the conduct of the study. **Due:** House and Senate Rules Committee prior to the 1994 General Assembly session.

*Learning in Retirement*  
(HJR 568)

**Patron:** Plum

The State Council of Higher Education, the Virginia Community College System, and the Commonwealth's institutions of higher education are encouraged to support the establishment of "Learning in Retirement" institutes and organizations.



The governing boards of the Commonwealth's institutions of higher education are encouraged to provide lists of qualified personnel, consistent with statutory provisions and institutional policies, on their respective campuses who may be contacted by interested parties to initiate discussions on the possibility of establishing these membership-driven learning organizations. **Due:** Not Applicable.

***Promote Research and Technology in the Area of  
Physical and Sensory Disability***  
**(HJR 643)**

**Patron:** Van Landingham

The Department of Rehabilitative Services is requested to create a Consortium on Disability Training and Research to identify collaborative solutions to system barriers in training and research among colleges and universities, service agencies, and consumer groups. Membership on the consortium should include academic and research administrators of doctoral degree-granting universities; state agency administrators from the Departments of Rehabilitative Services, of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services, of Education, for the Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing, and for the Visually Handicapped, and from the State Council of Higher Education, Virginia Community College System, and Board for People with Disabilities; and a representative of the Virginia Interagency Coordinating Council and the Virginia Association of School Counselors, and Consumer representatives from the Disability Service Council and the Virginia Family Advocacy Network, and other similar councils and networks, and Virginia's University Affiliated Program (VIDD).

The Consortium on Disability Training and Research should seek input from working coalitions on training and research that include consumers, college and university faculty and researchers, agency service providers, and representatives of appropriate training and research institutes and centers.

The Consortium is requested to develop criteria for and advise the administering agency on priority state funding initiatives, use of student loans and tuition incentives, across-system solutions to training and

research, leveraging of internal and external resources, the extent of personnel shortages in occupations serving the physically and sensory disabled and creative ways to address such shortages, particularly in public sector employment, ways to ensure that culturally competent services are available, and evaluation of innovative across-agency/across-department approaches to training and research.

The Department will provide staff support to the Consortium on Disability Training and Research. The Consortium shall be convened by July 1, 1993. **Due:** 1995 General Assembly Session.

***Training in Identification & Treatment of  
Sexual Abuse***  
**(SJR 339)**

**Patron:** Howell

Certain state agencies are requested to develop a certification plan for providers of treatment to sexual offenders and to study the need for training in the identification and treatment of sexual abuse. The agencies shall be requested to perform the following:

1. The State Council of Higher Education and the Virginia Community College System are requested to study the need for the identification, causes, consequences, and treatment of sexual assault in professional education programs for currently licensed and certified, and future practitioners of psychiatry, psychology, professional and other counseling, social work, and psychiatric mental health specialty nursing. The Council and the VCCS are requested to consult with all relevant public and private agencies in documenting and meeting the need for such programs.

2. The Department of Health Professions is requested to develop a plan for the certification of providers of mental health and counseling services to sexual assault victims and offenders. The plan for certification shall include: (i) appropriate statutory changes required to accommodate the certification process; (ii) proposed regulations for the implementation of the certification program, including all requirements for certification; (iii) a mechanism for the phased implementation of the certification program; and (iv)

a system to evaluate the effectiveness and utilization of the certification program at the end of five years to determine the need for its continuation. The Department is requested to develop the plan in consultation with the relevant regulatory boards and other appropriate public and private agencies. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

*Education of Primary Care Physicians*

**SJR 122**

**Patron:** Holland, C.A.

The Medical College of Virginia, the Medical College of Hampton Roads, and the School of Medicine of the University of Virginia in cooperation with the State Council of Higher Education, are requested to emphasize the education of primary care physicians. **Due:** to the Commission on Health Care for All Virginians, Dec. 1, 1992. A report on the progress is to be made by Dec. 1, 1993 - 1995.

**Items of Interest That Do Not  
Involve the Council Directly**

*Strategic Plan for Economic Development*

**(HJR 389)**

**Patron:** Ball

The Secretary of Economic Development, in collaboration with key government, industry, business, education, and community leaders, is requested to establish a strategic planning process and prepare a strategic plan for economic development in the Commonwealth. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

*A.L. Philpott Southside Economic Development  
Commission*

**(HJR 412)**

**Patron:** Bennett

The A.L. Philpott Southside Economic Development Commission shall be continued for one additional year, to meet no more than twice to monitor the implementation of its recommendations and to serve

as a resource for the Southside Business and Education Commission, the Southside Virginia Marketing Council, and the Southside Virginia Development Authority.

The Commission shall be assisted by the Center for Public Service at the University of Virginia and the Division of Legislative Services. **Due:** Any additional findings by the 1994 General Assembly Session.

*Racism and Cultural Insensitivity*

**[HJR 463 (same as SJR 228)]**

**Patron:** Almand

The Council on Human Rights, assisted by Norfolk State University and Virginia Commonwealth University, shall study the impact of racial and cultural insensitivity on violent crime. The study shall include, but not be limited to, the determination of (i) the extent of the impact of race and its effect on violent crime such as hate crime, (ii) differences in the criminal justice response to victims and offenders based on race or ethnic origin, and (iii) the impact of racism on housing, job opportunities, economic development, health, and education and the resulting impact on violent crime. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

*Reading Recovery Program*

**(HJR 470)**

**Patron:** Diamonstein

The Department of Education is requested to study the feasibility and appropriateness of implementing a reading a Reading Recovery Program as a statewide prevention effort to reduce illiteracy in the commonwealth.

All agencies of the Commonwealth shall, upon request, assist the Department in the conduct of its study. In conducting its study, the Department shall consider, among other things, recent studies assessing the effectiveness of the Reading Recovery Program; the identification of particular institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth as possible teacher training sites; and the potential fiscal impact of implementing this program in Virginia, including methods of

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funding tuition for instructional training and the establishment of training centers at designated colleges and universities. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

***Biotechnology Research Act***

**(HJR 516)**

**Patron: Hall**

The Secretary of Economic Development is requested to initiate a study to determine the feasibility and operational components of a biotechnology regulatory framework and model legislation for a biotechnology research act in Virginia.

The University of Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth University and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University shall provide necessary support staff for the purposes of this study.

All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide reasonable assistance at the request of the Secretary for the furtherance of this study. The Secretary may include participation by other interested individuals during the study. **Due:** to the Governor, General Assembly, and the Chairmen of the House Appropriations Committee and the Senate Finance Committee by the 1994 General Assembly Session.

***Workforce Leadership Council***

**(HJR 563)**

**Patron: Harris**

The Secretaries of Education, Economic Development, and Health and Human Resources are requested to establish a Workforce Leadership Council to produce a coordinated program of workforce development. The Workforce Leadership Council shall oversee the implementation and evaluation of training programs designed to increase skill and competency levels of students and current members of the workforce and shall implement a public information campaign to inform students, parents, educators, and employers of the urgency for critical workforce preparation for the 21st Century. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

***"Family Friendly" Workplace***

**(HJR 581)**

**Patron: Mims**

The Joint Commission on Management of the Commonwealth's Work Force, established pursuant to SJR 279 (1993), be directed to examine and recommend in its study "family friendly" workplace policies which could be adopted by state agencies and recommended to the private sector, as well as recommend incentives which the Commonwealth could provide to private businesses to encourage these businesses to adopt similar policies.

In the course of its study, the Commission shall address each of the following issues: (i) telecommuting or flexplace, which allows individuals to work at home, often with the assistance of a personal computer and modem or a telecopier; (ii) job sharing, whereby two part-time employees share one full-time job; (iii) leave sharing, which benefits employees who incur emergencies, illnesses and similar crisis situations by allowing coworkers to donate their leave time to assist the employee; (iv) dependent assistance, including elder law; (v) flextime, which allows employees flexibility in arrival and departure times, length of lunch breaks, and workweeks of four ten-hour days instead of the traditional five eight-hour days; and (vi) alternate career paths. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

***Patient Outcomes***

**(HJR 598)**

**Patron: Melvin**

The Joint Commission on Health Care is requested to study and develop, in cooperation with representatives from the physician and hospital communities, the Medical College of Hampton Roads, the University of Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth University, and the Virginia Health Services Cost Review Council, a plan for measuring and assessing patient outcomes in institutional settings.

The study should examine the appropriate role of the Commonwealth in outcomes research to include but not be limited to preparing (i) a collaborative mechanism between public and private research ef-

forts which complement efforts already underway at the federal level, (ii) an oversight structure for the conduct and coordination of such research, and (iii) funding sources for the research. The study should also examine the appropriate role of the Commonwealth in the establishment of clinical practice guidelines or cost-effective treatment protocols, based on such outcomes. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

### ***Workforce Training***

**(HJR 600)**

**Patron:** Council

The Secretaries of Education and Economic Development are requested to study the feasibility and cost of implementing their recommendations made in response to HJR 86 (1992, workforce training in community colleges) and to develop an implementation plan for the 1994-96 biennium which will include specific steps to achieve continuous quality improvement and enhance workforce development. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

### ***Indigent Care and Medical Education***

**(HJR 623)**

**Patron:** Ball

The Joint Commission on Health Care, in cooperation with the Governor, is requested to develop a long-term policy for the role of the state teaching hospitals and the Medical College of Hampton Roads in the provision of indigent care and medical education.

Each institution is requested to complete a study and develop long-term policy options for its role in the delivery of indigent care and medical education.

The Joint Commission, in conjunction with the Secretary of Education, the Secretary of Health and Human Resources, the Director of the State Council of Higher Education, and the three institutions, shall review the studies and consider comprehensive state policy alternatives. **Due:** July 1, 1993, and report on long-term role of institutions is to be included in the Joint Commission on Health Care's annual report.

### ***World Class Education*** **(HJR 637)**

**Patron:** Van Landingham

The Board of Education is requested to support the inclusion of the arts in the Common Core of Learning and Plan for World Class Education. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

### ***Postsecondary Education & Training for Minorities***

**(HJR 638)**

**Patron:** Van Landingham

A joint subcommittee is to be established to study the status and the need for academic preparation, financial aid and incentive programs to encourage minorities to pursue postsecondary education and training. The subcommittee will:

1. Determine the number of minority students in the public and private schools (K-12) and in public and private institutions of higher education in the state;
2. Inventory the academic, intervention, mentorship, and remedial programs and financial aid incentives to increase access and affordability of postsecondary education and training for minorities, including unfunded scholarships at state institutions;
3. Evaluate the success of such programs to increase the rate of minorities who are admitted, enroll, and graduate from institutions of higher education in Virginia;
4. Assess the role and impact of the family and community support systems on the academic achievement and success of minority students;
5. Assess the academic preparation, college entrance examination scores, and other college admissions and postsecondary training requirements of minority students;
6. Assess the impact of such related issues as poverty, low expectations, lack of motivation, hopelessness, guidance and counseling, tracking, and racism on the college application, admission, retention, graduation, and graduate education admission rates of minority student;
7. Determine the number of such students who require remediation, and in what subject areas, as first



time entering freshmen;

8. Evaluate the need to continue and increase the programs and funding which are designed to address the needs of Virginia's historically black institutions, including an analysis of the impact of privatization, the Mississippi decision, and other federal, state, and case law pertaining to desegregation on these institutions;

9. Develop specific, feasible, and appropriate alternatives to preserve access and affordability of higher education to minorities, and ways to improve diversity and race relationships among college populations;

10. Assess the immediate and long-term policy implications of the World Class Education System and the State Council of Higher Education's recommendations regarding the strengthening of admissions requirements and the reduction and elimination of college level remedial programs on the access of minority students to higher education; and

11. Consider such other related issues and offer recommendations as the joint subcommittee may deem appropriate.

The joint subcommittee shall provide an appropriate opportunity for the participation of all interested parties to express their concerns on these issues. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

*Strategy for Sustainable Development*  
(HJR 653)

**Patron:** Brickley

The Governor, state and local officials, and the leaders of education institutions and civic organizations are encouraged to work together to prepare a Virginia strategy for sustainable development, to serve as a national model.

Leaders in business, trade unions, educational institutions, youth groups, engineering, science and technology, faith communities, Native American organizations, philanthropy, and supportive civic organizations as the Global Tomorrow Coalition, be urged to participate in this endeavor, which is manifestly in keeping with Virginia's acknowledged role as a national leader in philosophy and action for effective governance, enhancement of individual liberty and

well being, promotion of economic productivity, prudent management of natural resources, and encouragement of youth leadership.

The Secretary of Education is requested to send a copy of this resolution to the presidents of the public and private institutions of higher education. **Due:** Not indicated.

*Research Initiatives in the Blue Ridge Region*  
(SJR 92)

**Patron:** Nolen

The College of Agricultural and Life Sciences of Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University is requested to expand its research initiatives to establish new programs and innovative applications of environmental science, biotechnology and information technology for the Blue Ridge region. **Due:** October of each year.

*School-to-Work Transition Programs*  
(SJR 183)

**Patron:** Miller, Y.B.

The Department of Education, in conjunction with the Virginia Community College System and the Departments of Labor and Industry, and Rehabilitative Services, is requested to examine the development and establishment of school-to-work transition programs in the Commonwealth. The study shall include, among other things, a determination of appropriate means for the early identification and training of non-college bound students, consideration of current initiatives in Virginia and other states, "tech-prep" and "two-plus-two" programs, community college worker training programs, apprenticeships, and employment of persons with disabilities programs. **Due:** 1994 General Assembly Session.

*Use of State-owned Buildings and Lands*  
(SJR 239)

**Patron:** Cross

Joint Legislative Audit Review Committee (JLARC) shall formulate a strategic plan for the

development and use all viable state-owned lands and buildings and the disposal of unnecessary properties. As part of its study, JLARC shall (i) determine the current market value of all property owned by the Commonwealth which is either underutilized or not utilized at all and (ii) recommend methods for disposal of such property so that proceeds from such disposals may revert to the general fund. In the course of its work, the Commission shall confer and accept recommendations from the departments of General Services, Economic Development and Forestry. Due: 1994 General Assembly Session.

***Privatization***  
**(SJR 241)**

**Patron: Stosch**

A joint subcommittee shall be established to examine the functions of state government to determine which can be successfully privatized. Such examination shall specifically include the following: (i) infrastructure projects, (ii) state motor vehicle fleet, (iii) highway maintenance, (iv) welfare job placement, (v) solid waste facilities, (vi) parking facilities, (vii) social services case management, and others. Due: 1994 General Assembly Session.

***Tech Prep***  
**(SJR 257)**

**Patron: Wampler**

The Virginia Community College System, the Department of Education, and the local school divisions shall identify and use all available resources to implement Technical Preparation programs across the Commonwealth and that Technical Preparation projects receive high priority in future funding decisions. Due: Not indicated.

***Americans With Disabilities Act***  
**(SJR 259)**

**Patron: Waddell**

The Department for Rights of Virginians with Disabilities is requested to conduct a study to determine compliance with the administrative requirements

of Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 by state agencies and institutions, including hospitals, mental health facilities and institutions of higher education; and to study and develop appropriate strategies for state agencies to determine compliance with Title II of the ADA by entities that receive or benefit from state financial assistance. Due: 1994 General Assembly Session.

**Items Continued from the 1992 Session**

***Tuition and Fees, 1992-94***  
**(Appropriations Act - Section 4-2.01)**

The State Council of Higher Education shall report to the Governor and the chairmen of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees each year on the tuition and fee charges at each public institution of higher education and on how each institution plans to utilize the additional nongeneral fund authority included in Part 1 of this act. Due: June 30, each year.

***Student Aid Expenditures***  
**(Appropriations Act - Section 4-5.01)**

The appropriations made in this act to state institutions of higher education, including the Virginia Community College System, within the items for student financial assistance, may be expended for any one, all, or any combination of the following purposes: grants to undergraduate students enrolled at least one-half time in a degree, certificate or diploma program; grants to full-time graduate students; institutional contributions to federal or private student aid programs requiring matching funds by the institution, except for programs requiring work. Not more than 50 percent of an institution's general fund appropriation under such items shall be used to provide grants to graduate students. The State Council of Higher Education for Virginia shall annually approve each institution's proposed plan for the expenditures of its appropriation for student financial assistance. Due: June 30, each year.

***Guaranteed Assistance Program***  
**(Appropriations Act - Item 133 & Item 154)**

**Department of Education**

Out of the amount for Financial Assistance for Dropout Prevention shall be paid \$1,000,000 in the second year to establish at least three pilot programs to implement recommendations of the Workforce 2000 Advisory Committee and the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia Guaranteed Assistance Program related to increasing the success of disadvantaged students in completing a high school degree and providing opportunities to encourage further education and training.

The Department of Education shall select pilot program sites from eligible proposals submitted to the Department. For local school systems interested in participating in such plans, the proposals shall be submitted through the school superintendent. Eligible proposals must contain the following:

1. A focus on early intervention, dropout prevention, and college-preparation as recommended in the reports on Workforce 2000 and the Guaranteed Assistance Program.
2. Evidence of cooperation among local schools, colleges, universities, and community groups;
3. Evidence of coordination of programs and funding available through Project Discovery, Dropout Prevention, the Virginia Plan for Equal Opportunity in State-Supported Institutions of Higher Education, or similar sources.
4. Evidence of private sector cooperation & support.

The Department of Education, with assistance from the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia, shall develop guidelines for submitting pilot program proposals, as well as for implementation and assessment of these programs. These guidelines shall include a plan for the colleges and universities to use available resources to meet the financial aid of students participating in these programs. Private colleges and universities shall be encouraged to make similar commitments.

**Council of Higher Education**

Out of this appropriation, \$250,000 in general funds and \$250,000 in nongeneral funds comprised of

private contributions shall be allocated in the second year to begin the capitalization of the "Virginia Guaranteed Assistance Fund." The fund shall be separately accounted for by the Department of Accounts. Balances in the fund shall automatically carry forward to succeeding fiscal years, and interest earned on fund balances shall remain in the fund. Due: June 30, 1993.

***Televised Graduate Engineering***  
**Appropriations Act - Items 163, 175, 192 & 196**

**UVA**

Out of this appropriation shall be expended an amount estimated at \$1,366,481 each year for the educational telecommunications project to provide graduate engineering education, subject to a plan approved by the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia. From these funds, the institution shall pay the Department of Information Technology for transporter and telecommunications services.

**VPI**

Out of this appropriation shall be expended an amount estimated at \$1,306,239 each year for the educational telecommunications project to provide graduate engineering education, subject to a plan approved by the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia. From these funds, the institution shall pay the Department of Information Technology for transporter and telecommunications services.

**ODU**

Out of this appropriation shall be expended an amount estimated at \$629,257 each year for the educational telecommunications project to provide graduate engineering education, subject to a plan approved by the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia. From these funds, the institution shall pay the Department of Information Technology for transporter and telecommunications services.

**GMU**

Out of this appropriation shall be expended an amount estimated at \$413,734 each year for the educational telecommunications project to provide graduate engineering education, subject to a plan approved by the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia. Due: June 30, each year.

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## HIGHER EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS FROM THE 1993 GENERAL ASSEMBLY SESSION

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The General Assembly adopted amendments to the 1992-94 state budget that provide higher salaries for state classified employees, college faculty, and public school teachers. In addition, the General Assembly and the Governor endorsed the following major increases for higher education included in the Governor's original 1993 amendments:

Additional student aid appropriations of \$3.7 million (general fund) to help institutions meet 45 percent of student financial need.

An additional \$3.4 million (general fund) for the Virginia Community College System to meet anticipated enrollment demands in 1994-95.

Additional tuition and fee authority for 21st century initiatives and for institutions to address safety and security issues and environmental and federal mandates.

What follows is a summary of the major General Assembly actions regarding higher education.

### Salary Increases

College and university faculty will receive an average 3.55 percent salary increase, effective December 1, 1993. This increase — the largest since 1989-90 — will track estimated 1993-94 national salary increases. The General Assembly also added \$200,000 to the Eminent Scholars Program, which will allow institutions, in total, to meet about 68 percent of the 1993-94 eligible endowment earnings.

State classified employees will receive a 2 percent across-the-board increase on December 1, 1993. In addition, the General Assembly provided funds for

performance increases ranging from 2.25 percent to 6.9 percent. Including the 2 percent across-the-board increase, the statewide average salary increase for classified employees will be about 6.8 percent.

### New Instructional Equipment

Colleges and universities will be able to purchase an additional \$20 million in instructional and research equipment thanks to a new lease-purchase program similar to the existing Equipment Trust Fund program. The dept-service cost of the program in 1993-94 will be paid from a general fund appropriation of \$600,000. The \$20 million allocation will be used to purchase equipment in computer science, replace obsolete equipment, and buy equipment for several instructional technology initiatives.

### New Entities and Sites

The General Assembly added language and additional state funds to plan and expand new higher education sites, including the College of Integrated Science and Technology at James Madison University and the College of Global Studies at Radford University. Also, the General Assembly included funds for the Virginia Community College System and the City of Norfolk to plan a Norfolk campus of Tidewater Community College. Other amendments provide funds for the VCCS to lease instructional space in Midlothian and Newport News, for support of the Southwest Virginia Higher Education Center, and for Clinch Valley College to expand into Abingdon.

### Instructional Technology and Curricular Change

The General Assembly provided state funds to support change in the ways instruction is provided to students. Included are funds and positions for a nursing program at Clinch Valley College and the expansion of



Old Dominion University's televised engineering technology program to community college locations across Southside Virginia. Virginia Tech will receive funds and positions to develop alternative instructional techniques in undergraduate writing courses. The community colleges will receive funds to plan for an allied health distance learning program. The General Assembly provided planning funds at Old Dominion University for a statewide televised instruction network and for faculty and administrative costs associated with designing an entirely new curriculum at George Mason University. Norfolk State will receive funds to continue to plan for doctoral programs, and a related language amendment signifies the General Assembly's intent that Norfolk State University offer doctoral degrees, as agreed by the Council of Higher Education. Both Norfolk State University and Virginia State University will receive additional money for academic enhancements.

### **Library Technology and Administrative Computing**

The Virginia Community College System will receive additional funds to link its libraries to one another and to the libraries of four-year colleges in the state. Christopher Newport University and Longwood College will receive money for a computer network and a mainframe computer, respectively, and the College of William and Mary will receive funds for computing technical support. Also, the General Assembly added money to replace the automated library system at Radford University.

### **Health Education**

Other General Assembly additions to the budget emphasize family practice and other primary health care services. Additional support is provided for the Virginia Center for the Advancement of Generalist Medicine at the University of Virginia. A language amendment asks the Council of Higher Education to report on ways to increase the number of primary care physicians and residents by the two university hospitals and the Medical College of Hampton Roads. The three medical schools receive a total of \$300,000 to support family practice residencies.

### **Other Funding Increase**

In addition to the above amendments, the General Assembly included general fund support for nonresident cadets in the Unique Military Activities Program at Virginia Military Institute. The General Assembly provided \$3.4 million to restore most of the budget reductions for Cooperative Extension programs at Virginia Tech. The General Assembly also appropriated \$900,000 to provide one-quarter of the difference in resident and nonresident tuition levels for spouses and dependents of nonresident military personnel stationed in Virginia for 1993-94. This compares to one-half of the difference, which is provided for 1992-93.

### **Budget Reductions**

The General Assembly's amendments to the 1992-94 budget reduce general fund support for indigent care at the Medical College of Virginia and the University of Virginia Hospital by \$5.5 million. Part of the reduction is related to changes in Medicaid funding, and part is a result of prohibiting the use of state indigent care funding for non-Virginians.

### **Language Amendments**

A number of language amendments on policy and special studies are included in the General Assembly's amendments. One amendment directs the Council of Higher Education and the colleges and universities to continue discussions concerning curricular change and staffing productivity and to submit recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly. Language gives additional guidance for the Council's Funds for Excellence program and requests biennial reports on the program. Other language amendments authorize the Virginia Community College System to plan for a Tidewater Community College campus in Norfolk, and for the University of Virginia to identify staffing and resource needs at Clinch Valley College.

The General Assembly also agreed to language amendments offered by the Governor. These include Council of Higher Education studies of graduate education and instructional equipment needs in higher education.

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The specific language amendments are offered in the studies section of this document.

### **Capital Outlay**

As a result of General Assembly amendments, the University of Virginia and Virginia Tech are authorized to pursue new, alternative financing mechanisms for educational and general facilities. At the University of Virginia, the Darden School Foundation will design and construct an academic facility for use by the Darden Graduate School of Business Administration and will support expansion of the school's executive conference center. The university will issue up to \$40 million in revenue bonds for this project, and the foundation will make debt service payments for the life of the issue. Further, the university will lease the executive program facilities to the foundation at a rate that will cover debt service expenses plus operating and maintenance costs.

At Virginia Tech, the Virginia Tech Foundation will design, construct, and finance a new educational and general office building. Virginia Tech will lease this new space for no more than 20 years, at which time the

facility will become state-owned. The lease costs for the new facility will be paid through the elimination of existing lease payments when certain administrative functions are moved out of rented space to the new building.

In addition to these projects, the General Assembly has authorized James Madison University and George Mason University to use nongeneral funds to continue planning for their new educational entities. James Madison will plan a housing facility at the new College of Integrated Science and Technology and George Mason will pay for design services for its new Arlington Metro Campus.

Other institutions received general fund appropriations for emergency capital projects, to plan for new academic or library space, or to acquire land. The General Assembly also authorized several institutions to use nongeneral funds to construct or renovate dormitories, bookstores, parking space, and research space, and to purchase land. Details of the capital outlay projects are included in Table 6.

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## SUMMARY OF THE 1992 - 1994 APPROPRIATIONS

For budgetary purposes, the operations of an institution of higher education are normally separated into four categories: Educational and General Programs, Financial Assistance for General Services, Student Financial Assistance, and Auxiliary Enterprises.

*Educational and General Programs* include the instructional, research, and public service programs of an institution as well as the necessary academic support, institutional support, student services, and physical plant maintenance and operation

*Financial Assistance to Educational and General Services* include those aspects of the Educational and General programs which usually are funded from non-state sources, primarily the federal government and private foundations. Sponsored research is a major activity within this group.

*Student Financial Assistance* funds are appropriated for scholarships and fellowships.

*Auxiliary Enterprises* are operated by an institution to provide non-educational services to the students, faculty, staff, or the general public. Typical self-supporting enterprises are residence halls and food services.

The total appropriations for all higher education activities include funds appropriated to non-higher education agencies that are earmarked for higher education purposes. This broad definition includes, for instance, appropriations to the Department of Health and to the Department of Military Affairs for financial aid to students attending institutions of higher education. The funding amounts below reflect the total appropriations for the 1992-94 biennium.

### 1992-94 APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FOUR HIGHER EDUCATION CATEGORIES

#### **EDUCATION AND GENERAL**

\$4,433,254,563 of which \$1,684,182,398 (37.9%) is from the general fund. The total 1992-94 appropriation for Educational and General Programs is 13.9% greater than the final, adjusted 1990-92 appropriation. The general fund portion represents a decrease of 9.7%.

#### **Financial Assistance for Educational and General Services**

\$789,720,777, of which \$61,865,041 (7.8%) is from the general fund. The total 1992-94 appro-

priation for Financial Assistance for Educational and General Services is 9.8% greater than the 1990-92 appropriation. The general fund portion represents a decrease of 20.7%.

#### **Student Financial Assistance**

\$155,754,420, of which \$137,807,240 (88.5%) is from the general fund. The total 1992-94 appropriation for Student Financial Assistance is 43.2% greater than the 1990-92 appropriation. The general fund portion represents an increase of 39.2%.

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## **Auxilliary Enterprises**

\$812,548,103, all from the higher education operating fund. The total 1992-94 appropriation for Auxilliary Enterprises is 13.1% greater than the 1990-92 appropriation.

In summary, total appropriations for the operating expenses of all institutions, affiliated agencies, and other activities related to higher education are \$6,191,277,863 for the 1992-94 biennium. General fund support for higher education decreased 7.3% since the 1990-92 biennium. Higher education's total general fund appropriations decreased from \$2,031,390,648 in the 1990-92 biennium to \$1,883,854,679 in the current biennium. Higher education has become increasingly dependent on nongeneral fund sources, predominantly tuition and fees.

The total appropriation average per full-time-equivalent student will increase from \$6,470 in

1992-93 to \$6,780 in 1993-94. The general fund contribution will increase from \$3,493 in the first year of the biennium to \$3,515 the second year.

Table 1 shows higher education appropriations for 1992-93. Table 2 shows higher education appropriations for 1993-94. Table 3 shows higher education appropriations for the 1992-94 biennium. Table 4 shows the changes in general fund appropriations from 1986-88 through 1992-94. Table 5 reflects the total Educational and General appropriations per full-time-equivalent student for each year of the biennium at each of the state-supported institutions of higher education. Table 6 shows the 1993 Capital Outlay Budget Amendments.

Finally, Appendix 1 is a copy of the final edition of the 1993 Legislative Summary. This publication tracks all of the higher education related legislation during the General Assembly.
