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ABSTRACT

Intended to serve as a model for those wishing to assist librarians in conducting research, this guide describes the funding sources and computing, consulting, writing, and other resources available to University of Colorado Boulder librarians who want to engage in research. Sources of funding to support research are listed first, including the university and the university library, the state (Colorado Endowment for Humanities), and national sources (American Library Association, Council on Library Resources, OCLC, Special Libraries Association, National Endowment for Humanities, and Association for Library and Information Science Education). On-campus computing services that provide statistical analysis and word processing are described, together with workshops for training in computer use. Three sources of consultants for library research are also noted, as well as sources for editorial assistance, assistance in getting release time for research, and rules and regulations affecting research at Colorado University. A bibliography that lists eight books on the research-related issues of grants, research methods, statistics, and publishing concludes the guide. (KRN)

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Creating an Academic Librarians' Research Resources Guide:
Process Description and Sample Document

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This document can serve as a model for those wishing to assist librarians in conducting research. One of the simplest ways to do so is to compile a list of the resources available. *Resources for Research...* was created during my first six months in a tenure track position at the University of Colorado at Boulder. As an entry-level librarian I wanted to actively engage in research, and I was also interested in obtaining whatever assistance was available. The process of learning what that assistance might be took a great deal of effort on my part. Had such a document already existed I could have immediately begun the research process. This type of document could also be more efficiently compiled by someone who had been with the particular institution long enough to have familiarity with local offices and services.

I began the process with particular questions I wanted answered, and with no intention of creating a final document. As I learned the answers to those questions, other questions surfaced. I kept a record of the answers, and I collected brochures and flyers from offices and organizations that provided them. Only later did I recognize the value of this compiled information--that by sharing my findings with my colleagues I could prevent them from laboriously retracing my steps.

Such a document can be modeled after *Resources for Research*, or can take any other straightforward approach to organization. Certainly there are basic topics that should be covered.

Funding for research is always an issue, and there are often institution-specific grants available. Most universities have an office entirely dedicated to administering grants and/or contracts, and the staff are often willing to assist in grant preparation. State, regional and national grant sources should also be included.

Computing services should cover, at minimum, access and tutorials for statistical packages and word processing equipment on campus.

Information on consulting assistance will be eagerly welcomed by novice researchers. That assistance can be as close as an experienced researcher at your library, or as remote as an electronic research listserv.

Local rules and regulations should certainly be included--any guidelines or clearance required for particular types of research. If the library provides release time for research that information should be given.

Where possible, the name, title, phone number, campus mail and electronic mail address for the contacts should be given. National sources of information and assistance may be taken directly from this document. Compilers will, of course, wish to verify the currency of the information before publishing their own guide.

For organizational purposes it is useful to provide an outline. A selected bibliography with locations and call numbers of relevant materials can be valuable to researchers as well.

This type of document serves an important role in helping librarians with the process of research. Once created, it should be distributed to all librarians and given to new librarians as they arrive. It could also be given to job applicants as part of an informational packet.

I. Funding

A. University Libraries

1. Faculty Support Committee

Provides assistance with funding as well as other support. Contact person: **Martha Jo Sani, Chair 1991-92, 492-8834.**

Eligibility

- * Any Libraries faculty member.

Application

- * Prior to September 15 each year, submit an estimate for professional activities for the year.
- * Submit requests for support on "Application for Faculty Scholarly Activity Support" form.
- * Requests must be submitted prior to the faculty member's activity.

2. Computing workshop fees: covered by the Libraries. Contact person: **Joan McConkey, Associate Director for Administrative Services, 492-6262.**
3. Resource person and consultant on grants and grant seeking for the University Libraries: **Charlotta Hensley, Associate Director for Planning and Development, 492-7092.**
4. Grants and grant seeking sources: available in the Reference Department (see bibliography).
5. Bulletin board outside of Administrative Services: includes flyers on research grants, continuing education, and professional development.

B. University

1. Office of Contracts and Grants. Contact person: **Karen Springfield, 492-2697.**

- a. Small collection of books on grant seeking and sources of funding. Also videos on grant seeking.
- b. Sponsored Programs Information Network (SPIN) Computer search: locates possible funding sources using keywords relevant to each project; available free of charge.
- c. Newsletter published monthly with current grants information.
- d. Assistance with proposal preparation, including budget preparation, editing, typing, illustration, copying, and mailing.

2. Council on Research and Creative Work (CRCW), Graduate School. Contact person: **Pat Peterson, 492-7393.**

- a. Junior Faculty Development Award. Grant of not less than \$5000 awarded to provide an opportunity for persons recently entering professional academic life to start programs of research and creative work.

Eligibility

- * Faculty member holding at least half-time tenure track appointment at the professorial rank.
- * Faculty member throughout the semester immediately preceding the award in a rank not higher than assistant professor.
- * Ph.D. or equivalent (M.L.S.) received in the last four years.
- * Ph.D. or equivalent held at the time of application.

Application

- * Deadline January 17, 1992.

- b. Grants-in-Aid. Grant of not more than \$7000 to support the research and creative work of faculty members.

Application

- * Applications are considered once per month during the academic year (Spring 1992: January 20, February 14, March 20, April 13).

- c. Small grants. Up to \$600 to support the research and creative work of faculty members.

Application

- * Applications are considered once per month during the academic year.

- d. Faculty Fellowships. Provide leave (one semester or a full academic year) for full-time research and creative work.

Eligibility

- * Faculty member holding at least half-time tenured or tenure-track appointment in a professorial rank.
- * Member of the faculty for three academic years.
- * At least four academic years in regular University duties since last holding a Faculty Fellowship or being on sabbatical leave.
- * Demonstrated substantial accomplishments in scholarship, research or creative work.

Application

- * Applications considered once per year (October 12, 1990 for 1991-92).

3. Graduate Committee on the Art & Humanities, Graduate School. Contact person: Pat Peterson, 492-7393.

- a. Research and Creative Work Grants. The Committee offers two grants. Individual grants will not exceed \$2000, small grants will not exceed \$600.

Eligibility

- * Faculty member holding at least half-time tenure track or tenured appointment.

Application

- * Submit application any time during the academic year.

4. IMPART Program (Implementation of Multicultural Perspectives and Approaches in Research and Testing) Contact person: Al Ramirez, 492-5491.

Provides funds up to \$6000 per award for a number of general activities related to gender, ethnic and cultural diversity, including multiethnic/multicultural research projects.

Application

- * Full-time faculty members teaching on the Boulder Campus (per Al Ramirez, 3-1-91, Libraries faculty are eligible).
- * Solicitation for proposals takes place in the fall and spring semesters of each year. Contact the Office of Faculty Affairs for current deadlines.

C. State

1. Colorado Endowment for the Humanities. Phone 292-4458.

- a. Research and Publication Grants. Grants of up to \$2500 for qualified scholars for research. Limited to Colorado or western regional studies; primary interest in interpretative work in the humanities; work should lead to publication.

D. National

- a. (Carroll Preston) Baber Research Grant. Staff liaison, Mary Jo Lynch. An annual cash award of up to \$7,500 for innovative research that could lead to an improvement in services to any specified group(s) of people.

- b. (Samuel) Lazerow Fellowship for Research in Acquisitions or Technical Services. An annual award of \$1000.

- a. CLR Fellow Program. Offers support to individuals who wish to undertake research or conduct analytical studies pertinent to library operations and services or to pursue other professional projects of importance.

- b. CLR Research Grant. Aimed primarily at research that explores the issues and questions raised by the changing information structure; how information is generated, distributed, organized, and used.
 - c. Cooperative Research Grants. Supports research projects proposed jointly by librarians and members of faculties in library science or, when appropriate, other pertinent disciplines. Limited to \$3000. Proposals should be in the form of a letter. Sponsor contact is advised.

- Grant program offered to Library School Faculty; they encourage collaborative work by a practicing librarian and a library school faculty member. All topics considered; program was formed to encourage technical research.
4. Special Libraries Association. Contact person: Tobi Brimsek, 202-265-9317.
- a. Research Grant, sponsored by SLA's research committee. For 1991 funding up to \$15,000 for research. This grant may be offered in upcoming years, although it is not an ongoing, yearly grant.
 - b. Special Programs Fund Grant. The primary purpose of this grant is not research, but research may be funded through it.
