ABSTRACT

This report summarizes data on fall (1984) enrollments based on a survey by the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grand Colleges of its member institutions (n=124). These institutions include both individual universities, which may or may not be comprised of a central campus and smaller branch campuses, and university systems of several major campuses. Study highlights note that member institutions generally showed steady enrollment as compared to the previous year, that first-time freshmen enrollments were down by .31 percent though the previous year showed a decline of .1 percent, that growing institutions cited increases in transfer and adult students, and that shrinking institutions cited drops in the number of high school graduates and increasing tuition as factors. Data presented in the tables report total head count by enrollment category; 2-year comparisons by enrollment category; full-time and part-time enrollments by enrollment category; total enrollment at the 10 largest campuses; undergraduate enrollment at the 10 largest campuses; graduate enrollment at the 10 largest campuses; first professional enrollment at the 10 largest campuses; first-time freshmen enrollment at the 10 largest campuses; and institutions reporting increasing or decreasing enrollments with reasons cited for the change. A final table shows fall enrollments for specific member institutions. (JB)

The NASULGC Survey & Fall Enrollments: 1984-85

Highlights

- 1. Stable Overall Enrollments: In the fall of 1984-85 academic year, total head count enrollments at NASULGC member institutions closely approximated that previous fall's enrollments, increasing by .6 percent.
- 2. First-time Freshmen Enrollments Down: Head count enrollment varied by less than 1 percent in all categories this academic year. In the first-time freshmen category, enrollments declined .31 percent as opposed to 1 percent from fall 1983-84.
- 3. More Than Nine Out of Every First-Time Freshmen or First Professional

 Students Attend Full-time: Full-time students accounted for 93.7 percent
 of all first-time freshmen students and 97 percent of all first
 professional students. Overall, 84 percent of all undergraduate students
 were enrolled full-time, compared to 53.3 percent of all graduate students.
- 4. Institutions Cite Increases in Transfer and Adult Students: Of responding institutions with fall 1984-85 enrollment increases, increased numbers of transfers from other colleges and universities and increase in adult students were cited as the cause of enrollment growth. Most frequently, institutions cited individual reasons for increase in enrollments.
- 5. Drops in High School Graduates and Higher Tuitions Bases For Decreases:
 Among the institutions reporting enrollment declines, the most cited reason was a drop in high school graduates, and the second, increase in college tuition. The third most frequent reason for decreased enrollment was given individually by the responding institutions.

The 1984-85 National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges (NASULGC) survey of fall enrollments summarizes information provided by 124 of 145 members of the Association. These 124 member institutions include both individual universities, which may or may not comprise a central campus and smaller branch campuses, and university systems comprising several universities, only some of which may in turn be NASULGC members. Enrollments for system members are only available if all individual universities making up the system responded to the survey. The total number of institutions participating in the survey is 135 which includes branch campuses at several member universities.

Data presented in the accompanying tables report full-time and part-time head count enrollments during academic years 1983-84 and 1984-85. These data also closely approximate information submitted by each institution to the National Center for Education Statistics and its Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS). Table 11, at the conclusion of the report, shows 1984-85 fall enrollments for all four-year colleges and universities belonging to NASULGC or existing as branch campuses of NASULGC member institutions.

Table 1 shows total head count enrollment in five enrollment categories for the 135 NASULGC institutions responding to the fall 1984 survey.

Two-Year Comparisons Show Stable Enrollments

Between fall 1983 and fall 1984, total head count enrollment remained stable, increasing by .6 percent. Table 2 shows that at the 135 responding NASULGC institutions, undergraduate enrollment dropped .65 percent, first-time



freshmen enrollment dropped .31 percent, and first professional enrollment dropped .15 percent.

These declines were offset by increases in graduate and unclassified students. Table 2 shows that in 1984 graduate enrollment increased by .4 percent. No separate category was provided for unclassified students because of varying institutional definitions of this category.

Full-Time/Part-Time Enrollments Vary by Category

Full-time and part-time enrollments varied by level. At the undergraduate level, 84.1 percent of the enrollment was full-time, with 1,486,376 students attending full-time and 280,130 attending part-time. Almost all first professional students were full-time students. There were 67,706 full-time students, or 97 percent of the total, in this category and 2,071 part-time students.

Graduate enrollment was divided almost equally between full-time and part-time students. There were 211,753 full-time graduate students, accounting for 53.3 percent of the total, and 185,316 part-time students.

First-time freshmen enrollments were overwhelmingly full-time, with full-time students, or 93.7 percent of the total, and 19,467 part-time students.

Eight campuses with the largest undergraduate enrollments, in a varying rank order, are among the ten campuses with the largest total enrollments. The top ten campuses in this category all had undergraduate enrollments of more than 25,500 students.

Enrollments among the top ten campuses in first-time freshmen students ranged wider than all other categories except undergraduate enrollments. The largest enrollment in this category was 7,058, and the 10th ranked campus had an enrollment of 4623. Six of the campuses with the largest first-time freshmen enrollment also appeared on the list of the ten largest campuses overall.

Reasons for Growth or Decline Include Cost and Composition of Student Pool

All institutions responding to the survey (NASULGC member institutions and their branch campuses, as well as member university systems) were asked to provide explanations for why total enrollments either increased or decreased in 1984. Of the institutions providing data, 104 provided one or more responses explaining reasons for enrollment changes. Among these, 42 institutions reported enrollment increases and 62 reported decreases. Of those who reported increases the most commonly cited reasons were: one, individual reasons why enrollment had increased (25), two, more transfers from other colleges and universities (12), and three, increases in adult students enrolling (11).

The most commonly cited reasons for decreases in enrollment were: one, decrease in high school graduates (34), two, increase in college tuition (26), three, individual reasons why enrollment had decreased (21), and four, fewer transfers from other colleges and universities (20).
