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ABSTRACT

This document examines the types of projects funded by the Library Literacy Program in fiscal year 1992. The variety of literacy activities supported under the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) Title VI reflect the diversity of literacy needs in states and communities across the nation. Many factors influence a library's choice of activities for a literacy project, including demographics of the target population, economic base of the community, availability of literacy services, and nature of existing literacy or adult education services. Section I discusses major developments taking place among the LSCA Title VI projects and includes selected examples; Section II discusses characteristics common to most of the LSCA Title VI projects; Section III presents several projects that are using unique approaches to provide literacy services; Section IV provides an exhaustive list of literacy activities culled from all of the projects; Section V lists project activities by state and library; and Section VI is an analysis of fiscal year 1992 applications and grantees and provides statistics on the applications received and funded. Foreword

The Library Literacy Program, Title VI of the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA), makes grants to state and local public libraries to support adult literacy projects. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis, with approximately 250 grants awarded each year, involving libraries in almost every state.

This booklet analyzes the fiscal year 1992 projects and discusses major developments in the Library Literacy Program. A description of the activities of each project is also included. The projects are keyed to a list of more than 90 literacy activities that could be offered by libraries, thus showing the scope of each project and enabling the reader to identify the libraries working in specific areas of interest. This list also can be used by the reader to generate ideas for starting or expanding a literacy project.

These projects demonstrate the important role the library community plays in helping to accomplish Goal five of the National Education Goals, which states that by the year 2000, every adult American will be literate and will possess the knowledge and skills necessary to compete in a global economy and exercise the rights and responsibilities of citizenship.

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Overview

The Library Literacy Program, Title VI of the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA), is a discretionary grant program providing support to state and local public libraries for adult literacy programs. State and local public libraries apply directly to the U.S. Department of Education for grants. State libraries may use grant funds to coordinate and plan library literacy programs for adults and to arrange for the training of librarians and volunteers to carry out such programs. Local public libraries may use grant funds to promote the use of the voluntary services of individuals, agencies, and organizations in providing adult literacy programs; to acquire library materials; and to use library facilities for local literacy programs.

The LSCA Title VI Library Literacy Program has been funded annually since 1986. It has funded 1,678 library literacy projects that have enriched the lives of adults and families by helping them discover the benefits of lifelong education.

In FY 1992, 512 state and local public libraries submitted proposals in competition for the \$8,163,000 grant funds. Of these, 256 libraries in 46 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico received funding. The grants were awarded to 10 state libraries and 246 local public libraries. Grants ranged in size from \$5,302 to the maximum amount of \$35,000.

The FY 92 applications were reviewed by a panel of 102 literacy experts representing local and state libraries, literacy councils, state departments of education, institutions of higher education, and private or other literacy efforts.

Library Literacy Program: Analysis of Funded Projects, 1992 examines the types of projects funded in FY 92. Section V presents descriptions of each project. The projects are listed alphabetically by state, giving the name of the library, its location, the director's name, the funded amount, and the activity codes. Each of the projects has been reviewed and assigned codes corresponding to the activities listed in Section IV. Activity codes were assigned to each project if those activities were clearly stated in the proposal as objectives or key activities of the project and if they were supported by LSCA Title VI funds. The coded projects give the reader an idea of the scope of each project. Conversely, if interested in a particular activity, such as providing a book discussion component (E7), the reader can identify the libraries that have incorporated that activity in their projects by scanning the chart, state by state, for that particular code.

Section VI is an analysis of FY 92 applications and grantees. It provides statistics on the applications received and funded.

Section I

Major Developments

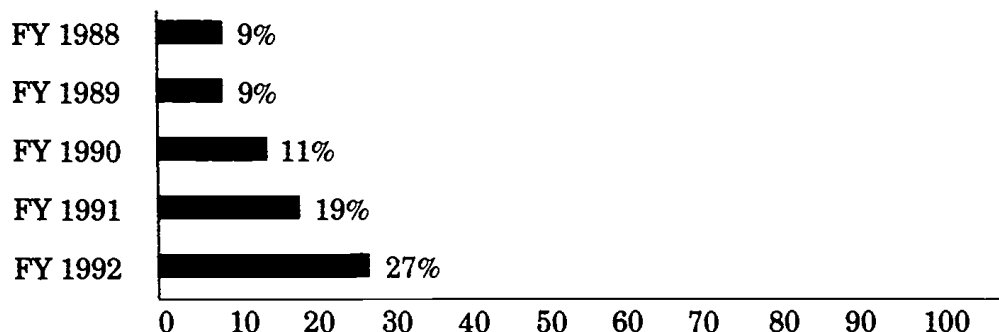
Libraries operating LSCA Title VI projects funded in fiscal year 1992 are providing more opportunities for adult literacy students to use library resources, increasing the use of computers for instruction, integrating family literacy into basic instruction programs, increasing coordination with vocational and adult basic education programs, providing workforce and workplace literacy services, and providing instruction to adults who speak English as a second language. Innovative programs in these areas are being tested and the number of libraries that are strengthening or incorporating these areas into their projects is increasing. These developments are discussed below.

Enabling Students to Use the Library

More LSCA Title VI programs are making an effort to educate adult literacy students about the resources available through their local libraries. Libraries are encouraging both students and tutors to increase their use of and involvement with their local libraries by orienting tutors to library services and library literacy resources, and students to the variety of information and reading opportunities available in the library. Adult students are gaining a basic understanding of the function and layout of the public library, learning how to find areas of interest such as the reference section, the adult and children's sections, the magazine section, or the job-related materials file. Also, tutors are participating in inservice workshops presented by library staff to learn how to guide their students in using the library. In this way, libraries are helping adult students use their improved literacy skills for practical and personal purposes.

Twenty-seven percent of the FY 92 grantees are enabling adult literacy students to make use of the library, compared to 11 percent in FY 90 and 9 percent in FY 89 and FY 88 (see figure 1).

Figure 1.—Percentage of LSCA Title VI grantees providing library orientation



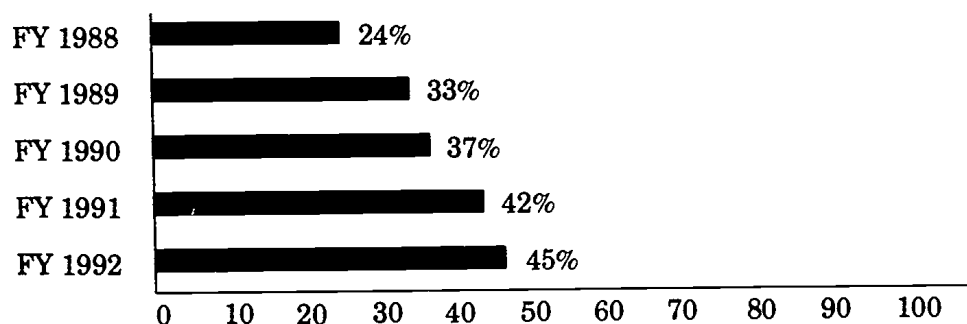
The Hillstown Library Cooperative, a consortium of 16 public libraries in southern New Hampshire, will provide literacy information and training to all librarians and library staff and will include library orientation and training for volunteer tutors as part of their basic training. The tutors in turn will educate literacy students about the resources available through their local libraries and how best to make use of them. This should encourage both students and tutors to increase their use of and involvement with their local libraries. In addition, a library-based reading and group discussion program for adult new readers and their tutors will be conducted at one of the libraries. The focus is on reading not merely as a skill but as a gateway to ideas and interaction with others.

The library staff of the Chandler Public Library in Arizona will meet with local ESL teachers to implement a plan for increasing the use of the library by the Hispanic students in adult education classes. To enhance the literacy services to the local Hispanic population, the library provides the services of a bi-lingual library staff member, informational brochures in Spanish, and a collection of audio and video tapes on English for Spanish speakers.

Computer-Assisted Instruction

Libraries continue to embrace computers as a tool for teaching and data management within their literacy projects. Forty-five percent of the FY 92 LSCA Title VI grantees are providing computer-assisted instruction, almost doubling the number of computerized literacy programs supported by libraries in FY 88, the first year that statistics were kept (see figure 2).

Menlo Park Public Library in Menlo Park, California, provides a computer lab staffed by a supervisor and a team of trained volunteers for students participating in the basic literacy, ESL, and family literacy programs. The library hosts a series of workshops to introduce students and tutors to the lab and instructional software. The lab is linked by modems to other California adult and family literacy programs. Students interact with computer "pen pals." These hookups give the adult learners practice in writing, telecommunications and experience in electronic mail.

The Central Florida Regional Library System in Ocala, Florida, offers a CD-ROM system to help immigrants who are trying to learn English as a second language. The CD-ROM system, voice cards, headphones and microphones are added to the existing microcomputer hardware used in the library's adult basic literacy classes. This system is used to teach adults whose native language is not English as well as giving functionally illiterate adults the opportunity to learn using visual, auditory and tactical methods.

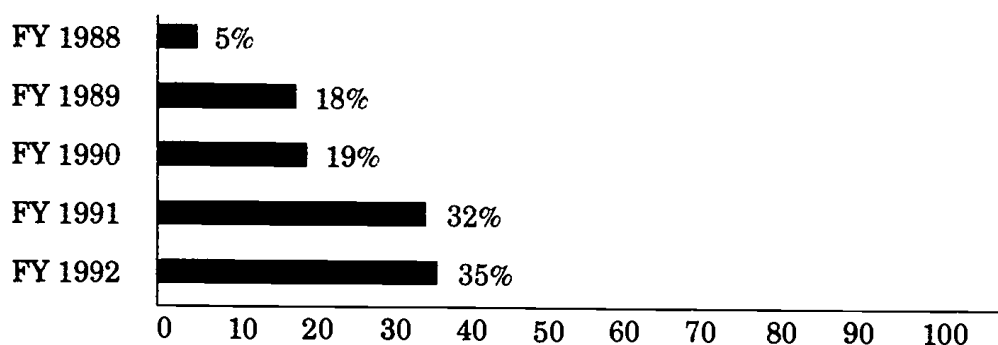
In its role as an educational support center, the Adult Learning Center of Queens Borough Public Library in Jamaica, New York, provides computer software that enables tutors to customize instructional materials for individual student needs; assesses students' learning styles; provides interactive language experience; provides diagnostic and prescriptive reading and language arts programs; and provides writing programs which use word processing techniques to develop competencies in everyday writing tasks.

Family Literacy

Intergenerational or family literacy projects that offer low-literate parents the opportunity to learn to read to their children have continued to increase

with the FY 92 LSCA Title VI projects. In FY 88 only 5 percent of the projects offered an intergenerational component. By FY 90 that figure almost quadrupled to 19 percent. It increased again in FY 92 where 35 percent of the projects provide family literacy services designed to improve the literacy skills of parents (see figure 3).

Redwood City Public Library in Redwood City, California, provides a home-based family literacy program to help adults improve their reading, writing, and critical thinking skills and to encourage them to read to their children on a regular basis. Parents are tutored twice weekly at the family's residence. In addition, families also attend monthly storytimes at the library.

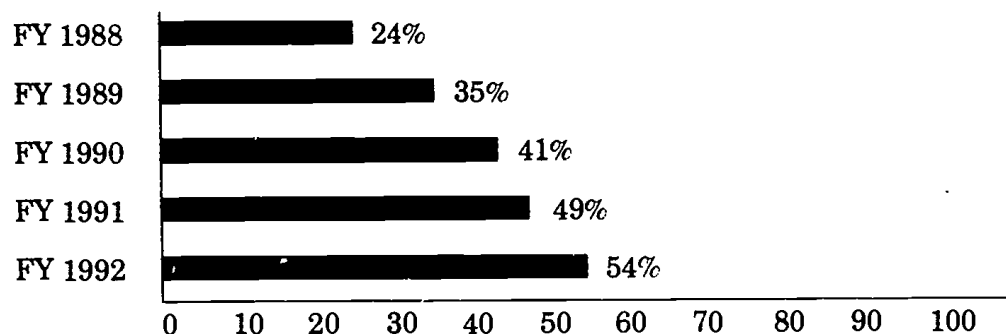
The Providence Public Library in Providence, Rhode Island, is piloting a family writing center project at its Rochambeau Branch Library. This evening program involves parents, grandparents, and their school-aged children in a 10-week program of interviewing, writing, editing and computer keyboarding activities. Each family will create a Family Book containing family anecdotes and family cultural reflections from the past and present. The library setting makes it possible for the participants to reference a wide variety of books and other resources to supplement topics of discussion.

Coordination with Adult Education Programs

The Library Literacy Program encourages cooperation among all the literacy providers in a community. Although most FY 92 LSCA Title VI projects include some type of collaboration or coordination with other literacy providers in the community (see figure 7), 54 percent of these grantees describe a close working relationship with local adult education traditional

classroom programs (see figure 4). This ranges from reciprocal referral of students to the appropriate program to providing trained tutors in classrooms to assist students enrolled in adult secondary education or General Educational Development (GED) classes.

In West Jefferson, North Carolina, the Ashe County Public Library works with the Adult Literacy League and the local community college to teach citizens with low-level literacy skills to read, to write in print and cursive, and to do basic arithmetic. The library literacy program offers one-to-one tutoring in basic literacy skills. Its tutors are trained by the Adult Literacy League. The community college provides a classroom program for adult education. The library coordinates its tutoring services with the community college program. Both programs provide reciprocal student referrals. The library program enables the student to make the transition to the community college a logical and natural step in the student's education. Tutors discuss the services and programs of the community college and assist their students in visiting the community college and becoming familiar with the staff, teachers, facility, and programs. The library literacy program director serves on the community college literacy training advisory committee, and the community college literacy recruiter is a member of the Adult Literacy League.

In collaboration with the local school system, the Southern Prairie Library System literacy coordinator in Altus, Oklahoma, is developing a high school equivalency certificate program for adult literacy students who have experienced difficulty in the traditional adult education classroom setting. This gives students the option of individual tutoring or classroom instruction or both at all levels of instruction, from basic literacy through GED. The library is also expanding a literacy program at the area vocational-technical

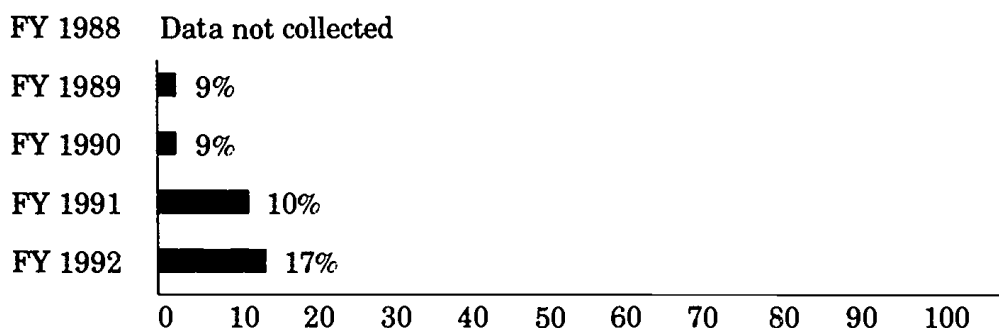
center to help students enrolled there brush up on their basic reading and writing skills by providing one-on-one tutoring at the center.

Workplace and Workforce Literacy

Literacy services geared for adults who want to improve their basic literacy skills to meet the challenges of the workplace are integrated in a significant number of LSCA Title VI projects for FY 1992. In previous years the number of LSCA Title VI projects offering employment-related literacy services has hovered around 9 or 10 percent; in FY 92 that number increased to 17 percent of the funded projects (see figure 5).

Library literacy staff are making a concerted effort to educate business leaders about the ramifications a low literate workforce has on productivity. They are developing special collections of basic reading materials of interest to employees and job seekers and they are collaborating with businesses to offer tutoring both on and off the job site.

Figure 5.—Percentage of LSCA Title VI grantees providing workforce and workplace literacy service



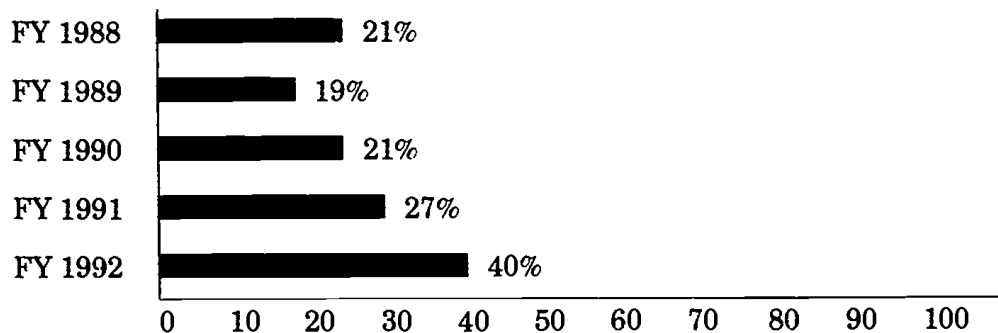
Unemployed adults with reading and writing skills below 4th grade level are targeted by the library literacy program at the Fall River Public Library in Fall River, Massachusetts. Tutors are trained to teach job related skills on a one-to-one basis. The library works with various social and employment agencies to recruit students. The literacy resource collection at the library contains career related materials including high interest, low reading level books and career and job hunting videos. Workshops are offered for students on how to obtain a job and the kinds of jobs that are available. Tutors develop reading lessons based on these workshops.

Three manufacturing industries in Columbus, Nebraska, that have been closely involved with the literacy program at the Columbus Public Library, are now hosting literacy services at the workplace. Students are recruited from the workplace, classroom space is available on site, and students are assigned classroom time. The personnel managers at each workplace submit a narrative evaluation of the program at the end of the project.

English as a Second Language

More libraries are enhancing their basic literacy services with services designed to accommodate adults who speak English as a second language (ESL). Figure 6 demonstrates a dramatic increase in the number of LSCA Title VI projects that are also serving ESL adult students.

Four agencies in Tyler, Texas, have teamed to provide literacy services to the community's Hispanic residents. The Tyler Public Library is working cooperatively with the Hispanic Service Center, the Literacy Council of Tyler, and the Tyler Adult Learning Center. The library staff is setting up an information and referral program and bookmobile site at the Hispanic Service Center; the library is also providing reading materials and print and nonprint instructional materials for participants in the Literacy Council's tutoring program and those in the Adult Learning Center's classroom program. Staff from agencies involved in the project promote the project to the community in both Spanish and English. Promotional activities include canvassing the neighborhoods from door-to-door to provide booklists, handouts, literacy enrollment instructions, and library card applications; using free radio and television public service announcements; and maintaining contact with all churches, school organizations, and social service agencies in the Hispanic community.

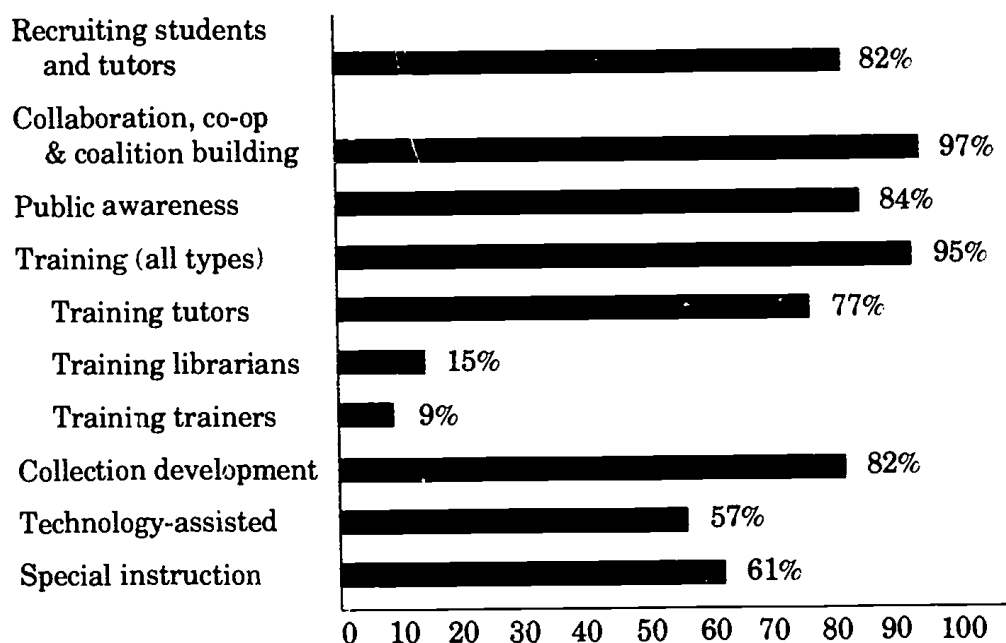
The New Britain Public Library in New Britain, Connecticut, is joining with the school district adult education department and local literacy volunteers to offer a three-tiered ESL program for Hispanic and Polish populations. Beginning, intermediate, and advanced class instruction is supplemented by individual and small group tutorial components. The program is conducted three nights a week at the library, making full use of its facilities and resources, including computers and software, adult learner materials, large print books, foreign language books, the children's collection, reference materials, periodicals and newspapers, and tutorial support materials.

Section II

Common Characteristics

LSCA Title VI projects are designed to initiate, continue, expand, or improve adult literacy services. These projects engage in many activities, which are grouped by common characteristics, as shown in Figure 7.

Most libraries funded in FY 92 (82 percent) recruit adults who wish to improve their basic reading, writing, and computing skills and enable them to participate in literacy programs to meet their needs. They also actively seek volunteers to be trained as tutors.

Virtually all FY 92 LSCA Title VI projects (97 percent) coordinate their services with literacy organizations and community-based organizations that provide similar or related literacy services. Activities include keeping other literacy organizations in the community apprised of the project, referring students to other instructional programs suitable to their needs, serving as a member of a literacy coalition, or conducting the project as a joint

venture with another organization. Many agencies—public schools, community colleges and other institutions of higher education, businesses, civic organizations, social welfare agencies, and individuals—are becoming involved with efforts to provide adults with basic literacy skills. Libraries help facilitate involvement with and coordination of literacy activities among these various entities.

Projects funded under FY 92 LSCA Title VI indicate that libraries commonly provide public awareness activities (84 percent) to inform the public of the availability of literacy services or materials, to recruit students and tutors, or to promote awareness of the nature of illiteracy and its effects on the individual and society.

Ninety-five percent of the FY 92 library literacy projects use their funds to establish or increase the number of training workshops during the year. Workshops may consist of training volunteers to provide instruction to adult new learners, training individuals to teach others to be tutors, or training librarians to provide services to adult new learners. It also includes inservice training and professional development opportunities to expand and improve existing skills.

The demand for more and better library literacy materials increases as community members become more involved in providing and receiving literacy services. As more students are recruited, more materials have to be added to library collections; with increased use of literacy materials, more materials have to be replaced; as innovative methods of adult instruction are introduced, new materials have to be evaluated and selected. Eighty-two percent of the FY 92 grantees are using LSCA Title VI funds to acquire literacy collections for their libraries, to expand and improve existing collections, or to develop their own noncommercial materials. /

Many libraries are providing technology-assisted approaches for literacy programs. Fifty-seven percent of all FY 92 LSCA Title VI grantees will use some kind of electronic media in their instructional program, such as audio and video cassettes, films, and computer software. The use of audiovisual materials offers another means by which adults can improve their reading, writing, and computational skills.

Sixty-one percent of the FY 92 projects provide special instruction or learning opportunities. Although most of the literacy instruction offered by the projects is one-to-one instruction using volunteer tutors, and many of the literacy projects are making use of the teaching methods and materials

developed by several nationally recognized nonprofit organizations, some projects are combining a variety of methods to tailor teaching to the needs of their students or to enrich the tutoring of basic skills. For example, some projects are publishing and disseminating the written work of students, conducting book discussion groups, or providing special instruction for persons with learning disabilities.

Section III

Selected Projects

The following examples have been selected to illustrate the breadth and diversity of adult literacy activities conducted by projects funded under the FY 1992 Library Literacy Program.

The Broward County Library in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, emphasizes student empowerment in its literacy project. An adult new reader, hired after a nationwide search conducted by the library, serves as Student Services Coordinator. This person advocates for and represents the needs and viewpoints of students of the library's READ campaign both within the program and to the public sector. Under the Student Services Coordinator's supervision, the project operates five student organizations: a new readers support group; a student advisory committee; a student field trip club; a student speakers bureau; and a National Issues Forum. The student advisory committee oversees and assesses the learning programs, intake process, student support activities, tutor training, and reading materials of the READ campaign, giving input as to how to make them more conducive to students. The field trip club applies reading and writing to learning about government, arts, science, and points of interest in the community. Students will participate in and help plan the annual statewide library literacy conference. Surveys and evaluations provide programmatic feedback.

The Onondaga County Public Library in Syracuse, New York, in cooperation with the local volunteer literacy organization, provides a program of basic reading instruction for deaf adults in the county. A consultant provides an adapted version of the curriculum used by a nationally recognized volunteer organization and conducts a two-day workshop to train trainers and the initial group of tutors. Tutors integrate the use of microcomputers in their sessions with deaf students. Students and tutors meet in public libraries twice weekly with frequent evaluation of progress.

The Reader Development Program (RDP) of the Free Library of Philadelphia in Pennsylvania identifies, reviews, and purchases literacy materials in quantity for adults learning to read. Because the staff members of the library have specific expertise in book selection and because there are already hundreds of organizations in Philadelphia that provide basic literacy services, RDP has chosen to support these organizations by providing instructional and leisure reading materials, primarily those written for

adults who read on or below an 8th grade level. RDP helps tutors and teachers become more familiar with the collection and to use both the books and RDP's advisory service to their greater advantage. RDP provides a 30-minute tutor orientation session that helps tutors to integrate the wide range of materials from the library's collection into their tutoring sessions or curricula. Tutors are taught how to introduce their students to reading and using the library as lifelong habits. Weekend and evening workshops will enable tutors to examine the materials.

The East Providence Public Library in East Providence, Rhode Island, in collaboration with three other local libraries, will write a Literacy Collection Development Handbook. In the process of developing literacy collections at three of the libraries, the project coordinator keeps a log of strategies for selecting, ordering, and processing materials. The librarians meet frequently to develop the chapter drafts. The handbooks will be distributed to all Rhode Island public libraries.

The Loudoun County Public Library in Leesburg, Virginia, is extending the library's literacy program to a transitional housing center that serves individuals who have been unable to obtain permanent housing due to unfortunate personal circumstances. The center provides safe and supportive temporary housing and a variety of intensive services to help clients attain social and economic self-sufficiency. The library will establish a staffed on-site learning center and provide one-on-one tutoring, literacy materials, and computer-assisted instruction. The participants will be introduced to the local branch library and will participate in its monthly programs of family storytelling, holiday activities and craft and puppet shows.

Joint Projects

Joint projects involve a state or local public library that brings together at least one other state or local public library in a combined endeavor to provide adult literacy services. This enables individual libraries to pool their resources and reach more people by joining forces to achieve a common goal. Eight of the FY 1992 LSCA Title VI projects are joint projects in which eight public libraries are working jointly with a total of 37 other public libraries. None of the participating libraries in a joint project may receive more than the maximum award of \$35,000 individually, but the total amount of a joint project may equal the number of participants times \$35,000. The joint projects supported in FY 92 received amounts that range from \$28,998 to \$210,000.

For example, the Calhoun County Public Library in Blountstown, Florida, has joined with five other libraries to form a library literacy consortium among the six counties of Florida's rural panhandle region. The project combines the resources available within the six small libraries to create a more stable and efficient administrative mechanism that supports the placement of qualified library literacy personnel and volunteer workers; draws upon their varied experiences with literacy programs; develops a comprehensive public awareness campaign; and directs overall provision of services and materials.

- New Applicants: Of the 512 applications received, 116 applications (23 percent) were from libraries that had not applied in any previous year.

III. FY 1992 Grantees

- **New Grantees:** Of the 256 grants made in FY 92, 22 percent were awarded to libraries that had not received an LSCA Title VI grant before.
- **Repeat Applicants:** Forty-seven percent of the libraries that were unsuccessful last year who reapplied this year were awarded grants.
- **Repeat Grantees:** Over half (57 percent) of the libraries that received grants this year were also funded last year.
- **Seven-Year Grantees:** Thirteen libraries have received grants in all seven years of the LSCA Title VI program.
