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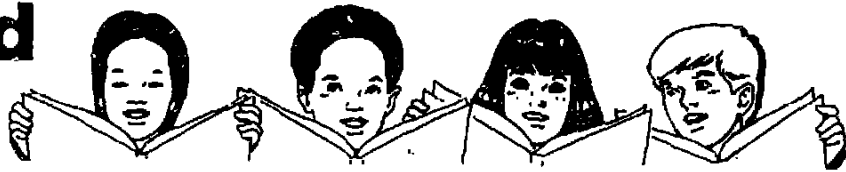
ABSTRACT

As part of the school improvement process, the Springfield Public School (Massachusetts) has involved all constituencies in the community in implementing the Schools of Choice plan. This guidebook was prepared to assist parents and students in determining the best program and schools for their needs and desires. Parents of elementary school students must select a school within their educational zone or a city-wide magnet school to qualify for transportation. They are responsible for transportation to schools outside the zone. The guide offers general discussion of the following topics: (1) special education programs; (2) transitional bilingual programs; (3) the controlled choice assignment plan; (4) the schools overall; (5) assignment policy and points in the plan; (6) kindergarten and preschool registration; and (7) elementary school options by zone. Descriptions of the facilities and programs of 16 kindergarten through grade 5 and kindergarten through grade 8 schools, 4 middle schools and kindergarten through grade 8 schools, and 3 high schools are provided. 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Making the Right Choice for Your Child: Three Steps

Choosing the right school for your child is one of the most important things a parent can do. This guidebook provides information about each school and its programs. But it is just one part of a 3-step process that will lead you to make the best possible school choice for your child.

1. Know your child's needs.

Every child has different needs from a school and no one knows those needs better than you. It may help to sit down and list what you would want in your child's school. These needs might be a school close to home or one with special programs in reading, math, or writing. You may need a full day kindergarten program or want your child to remain in the same school from kindergarten through eighth grade. Before you start looking at the schools, consider what you want.

2. Read this book.

Use this guide to see which schools in your district meet those needs. The list of schools on pages 2 and 4 gives location of the schools and the many options available. The major portion of this guide includes a one page description and information for each school to help you decide on which schools you want to visit.

3. Visit and ask questions!

Have you ever bought a car or a television without seeing it first and talking to a salesman? Picking the right school for your child is much more important and the best choices are made after a careful look at the school and the people who work there.

Schools will hold open houses through the next few weeks, and the more you visit, the more you will know whether a school is right for your child. Talk to the principal and teachers. Ask them about the school and the reasons they would give for choosing it. Do the reasons meet the needs you considered for your child? Do the people who work at the school seem to care about the children? If you have any question, be sure to ask it.

Once you've taken these steps, you're ready to make the right choice. While your child may be placed in your first choice school, there is some chance that he or she will not. That makes it very important you visit as many schools as you can to make second and third choices with which you would be happy. 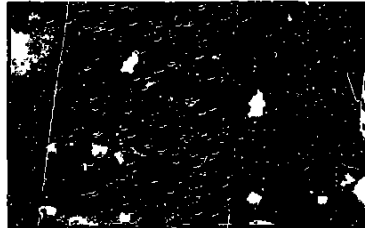


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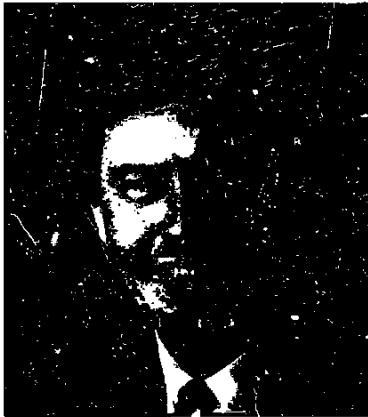

Special Education Programs

Special Education Philosophy

To the greatest extent possible, special education students are assigned to appropriate classes in the school nearest the home. If there is no appropriate class within the educational zone, students are assigned outside their educational zone.

Special Education Classrooms

All Springfield schools, at all levels, have Resource Room Programs within each building. Students with mild special education needs are assisted by special education teachers and clinicians in their school of choice. Parents of children requiring the Resource Room Program use the Assignment Process for Regular Education students.

Students who are in need of more intensive special education services, provided in a self-contained classroom, are assigned by the Special Education Department to specific special education classrooms, which are closest to their home. (See chart for location of special programs. Depending on needs, there may be some changes for September.)

Transition to Bilingual Education Programs

Bilingual Education Philosophy

The Bilingual Education Programs are built on the premise that all children learn best in the language that they understand. As a result, students are assigned to programs based on their language dominance as well as their academic proficiency. Students take English as a Second Language classes in addition to their other required subjects. The curriculum of each bilingual program is parallel to the curriculum in the monolingual program in mathematics, science, social studies, and language arts.

Bilingual Education Programs aim to prepare students to become competent learners, able to communicate successfully in English and in their first language in all aspects of school and academic life, and to be able to become successful, contributing members of our society. Students are expected to master the same skills and concepts as their English-proficient peers. As a result, Springfield offers basic, collegiate, commercial and vocational programs for eligible bilingual program students.

Controlled Choice Student Assignment Plan

All students in grades K-12 are assigned to the Springfield Public Schools based on the Controlled Choice Plan.

The Controlled Choice Plan involves six Educational Zones which provide many options for parents of elementary students within the zone of their residence as well as citywide or zone magnets and schools within walking distance of the residence in adjacent zones if space is available.

Parents and students may consider many schools rather than having eligibility for only one school due to residential address.

The schools have undergone a complete reorganization. Parents may now select a grade structure and program emphasis that best suits their child. Options on the elementary level include schools with grades K-5 and K-8. Middle grades are available at the Middle Schools, grades 6-8, and at the K-8 schools. The Middle Schools and the three K-8 schools are open citywide based on the Controlled Choice Plan. The high school grades are 9-12.

Special Education Assignments

For students enrolled in Special Education programs under Chapter 766, the following process applies:

1. Students requiring services of Resource Rooms (Learning Centers) select schools through the controlled choice assignment process. Every school, with the exception of Bridge Academy, has Resource Rooms to serve students in Prototypes 502.1 (Integrated)-502.3 - 1-3 hours per day away from the mainstream.

2. Students requiring Special Education programs with more intensive services outside the mainstream of regular education are assigned to selected schools throughout the System by the Special Education Department. The majority of such students may attend schools in their neighborhood zones.

Students in Elementary, Middle, or High School

Students will remain in their present school of assignment unless a transfer is requested during the application period.

Assignments are made based on the Factors for Consideration, including available space and racial/gender balance.

Students Entering

Elementary Grades K and Grade 1 (New Students), Middle School Grade 6, and High School Grade 9: These students will be assigned to a school according to the assignment policy outlined below:

The Application Period

Each school year the application period will begin in March. All applications received March 9-March 27 will be considered as equal, in terms of time of application, and will have priority over applications received in succeeding months. Notification of assignments will be made in May.

Students who apply for a school after the March Application Period, are assigned on a space available basis, which includes the Factors for Consideration in Assignment listed above.

Points in the Application Process

If more students apply to a school or grade during the March Application Period than there are seats available, priority in assignments with consideration for race and gender balance will be made according to an accumulation of points as indicated.

Lottery

If there are more students than seats available and these students have equal accumulations of points, students with the lowest random numbers as assigned by the computer will be selected first.

Waiting List

A parent whose child cannot be assigned to the first choice school may have the child's name placed on a waiting list for the first available vacancy.

Appeals Process

A parent whose child is not assigned to the first choice school and who is dissatisfied with the assignment received and a parent whose request for a transfer has been denied may file for an appeal. Grounds for appeal include verifiable health and safety issues. The appeals board is composed of parents, community representatives, administrative staff.

- *Racial/Gender Balance*
- *Available Space*
- *Special Needs of the Students*
- *Sibling Preference*
(Elementary and Middle Schools)
- *Education Zones (Elementary Schools)*
- *Place of Residence (Elementary Schools)*

Points in the Assignment Process

Parent Preference:

First choice = 4 points
Second choice = 3 points
Third choice = 2 points
Fourth choice = 1 point

Older Sibling Attending the school of application:

Yes = 2 points
No = 0 points

Residence is in the Educational Zone of the requested school (K-5 or K-8):

Yes = 1 point
No = 0 points

Requested elementary or middle school is within walking distance or is closest available school:

Yes = 1 point
No = 0 points

Applying to a magnet school in another educational zone:

Yes = 1 point
No = 0 points

Registration and Elementary School Options

Kindergarten Registration

The Springfield Public Schools, a national leader in education, first offered kindergarten classes in 1894, one of the first American cities to provide free public kindergarten education.

All elementary schools offer kindergarten classes. Some schools provide full day kindergartens, including some bilingual programs. In the half-day program, children attend morning sessions (8:55 to 11:25 a.m.) and afternoon sessions (12:35 to 3:05 p.m.)

School Committee Policy
A child must be 5 years of age as of September 1 to enter kindergarten.

Kindergarten registration for all Springfield public schools is done at the Parent Information Centers, located on the campus of Springfield Technical Community College (STCC), Garvey Hall, One Armory Square, and at Gerena Community School, 200 Birnie Avenue. For further information, contact the Center at 787-7276 or 787-7282.

Parents should bring the following records for registration and provide a copy for the child's record if possible:

- a copy of the child's birth certificate
- the child's immunization record
(The record must show immunizations against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio, measles, mumps, rubella.)
- proof of residency
(rent receipt, utility bill, real estate tax bill)
- social security number (optional if available)

Children may remain in the same school (K-5 or K-8) for elementary school under controlled choice.

Information on Kindergarten Screening will be given at the Parent Information Center. Kindergarten Screening is required by State Regulations and allows the Springfield School Department to provide the best in programming for the child. Screening of vision, hearing, language, motor skills, and educational growth will occur in the Fall.

Parents are invited to visit kindergartens throughout the city by contacting the principals. You will be notified of your child's kindergarten assignment by May.

Preschool Registration

The Springfield Public Schools offers integrated early childhood programs for 3 and 4 year old children in each zone. An integrated class is composed of children with and without special needs. The Early Childhood Programs offer a child centered, multicultural experience for young children and their families.

To be eligible for preschool, children must be screened. This screening identifies children who need further evaluation, those at risk and those who would be eligible as role models/peer partners. A city-wide screening team reviews children for needs in vision, hearing, language, motor skills, health and educational growth. Contact the Parent Information Center at 787-7276 to make a screening appointment.

Preschool assignment does not affect school choice. Kindergarten selection is independent since preschool is not offered to all children.

In 1991, the school was re-named in honor of Germán Gerena, a Springfield educator, former principal of the Ells School.

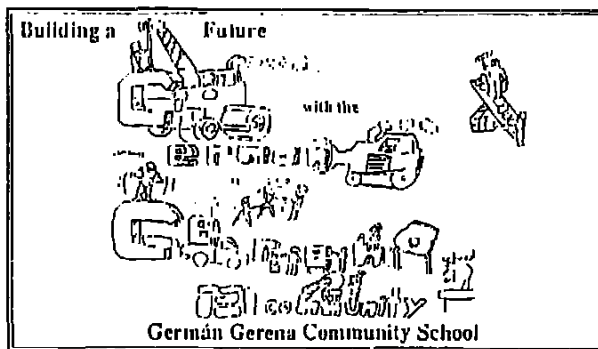
