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ABSTRACT

This publication for students in Washington State is a guide to locating and applying for postsecondary scholarships and a bibliography of scholarship resources. A section, "How to Search for Scholarships," describes in eight steps the process of locating scholarships that fit a student's talents and abilities. The section, "How to Make a Successful Scholarship Application," gives tips on how to construct a competitive application. This section contains a sample format for a scholarship information request addressed to an institution. The last section, "The Scholarship Bibliography," cites over 150 resource books which list actual scholarship opportunities. Most of the publications included in this bibliography are available in public libraries. These resources are listed under the following categories: general, academic disciplines and athletics, foreign study, foundations, graduate and postgraduate fellowships, labor and business, military, Native Americans, other ethnic minorities, special populations, and scholarship programs administered by the Washington State Higher Education Coordinating Board. Each reference gives an address where the publication can be obtained and a brief description of the contents. (JB)

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INTRODUCTION

The "Scholarship Guide and Bibliography" is arranged in three main sections:

1. How to Search for Scholarships;
2. How to Make a Successful Scholarship Application; and
3. The Scholarship Bibliography.

The section on **How to Search for Scholarships** describes the process of locating scholarships that fit your talents and abilities. When you have located a scholarship in which you are interested, the section on **How to Make a Successful Scholarship Application** gives tips on how to construct a competitive application.

The last section, **The Scholarship Bibliography**, cites resource books which in turn list actual scholarship opportunities. Most of the publications included in this bibliography are available in your public library. If you find they are not available, ask your librarian to request the publication be loaned to the library from another library. The high school or college you attend may also have copies of the publications listed in the bibliography. Because some of these publications are quite costly, we encourage you to try locating a copy you can borrow before you consider purchasing a copy. The bibliography is not an exhaustive list. And, while it contains the most current information available at the time of printing, we cannot ensure the accuracy of listings between printings. When you are working in your local library, look for other good publications and ask the librarian for more suggestions. The Higher Education Coordinating Board has created the "Scholarship Guide and Bibliography" as a starting point for your scholarship search.

HOW TO SEARCH FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

A scholarship search is research that you can do by following the easy steps below. To be successful in your scholarship search, you should use every reference source available.

- Remember, a scholarship search like any research, takes time. The earlier you start, the more information you will be able to gather and the better your chances of winning a scholarship.
- Computerized scholarship searches are available, usually for a fee. You can generally obtain the same information by doing research yourself.
- Begin by asking your family and friends if they know of any scholarships for which you might be eligible. Employers, community groups, unions, businesses, alumni organizations, credit unions, and churches often offer scholarships.
- Check with your high school guidance counselor, college financial aid administrator, or other educational organizations for more suggestions. They may have directories of scholarship opportunities.
- Contact your local Chamber of Commerce. Local businesses frequently offer scholarships to area residents or people who plan to enter specific career fields.
- Read the newspaper; often local papers publish articles about residents who receive scholarships. You can then investigate the scholarship source to determine your eligibility.
- Visit your local library with this bibliography. When you arrive at the library, be sure to locate the most recent editions of these scholarship guides. Use references you find at the back of each publication to extend your search. Talk with the reference librarian; he or she may have additional suggestions about locating scholarship information.
- When you locate a scholarship that fits your talents and abilities, write a letter to the address listed requesting a scholarship application.

HOW TO MAKE A SUCCESSFUL APPLICATION

The "Scholarship Guide and Bibliography" will help you locate the scholarship opportunities that are available to you. The following tips are good to keep in mind when you find a scholarship in which you are interested:

- When writing for application forms and information, remember that your letter is your introduction. The letter should be clear, concise, and neat. A sample letter is provided on the next page.
- Many scholarships have early application deadlines. Be sure to note the deadlines and requirements for each scholarship.
- Fill out the application completely and do not expect the reader to make assumptions; explain your situation and ideas clearly.
- Type your applications, essays, and letters; remember to check for spelling, grammar, and punctuation.
- If you use a word processor, make sure the print and font are clear and easy to read.
- Many scholarships require a letter of reference; the organization may send you a form or ask for a confidential letter.
- Follow instructions explicitly and provide only what is asked of you.
- Have your work proofread by a second party.
- Choose your words carefully; your space and the readers' time are limited.
- Sell yourself; present yourself in the best light, but be honest.
- Do not send transcripts, applications, and letters of recommendations separately; if possible, send a complete packet.
- Remember to sign your letters and application and provide the necessary postage.
- Most scholarships are highly competitive; do your best and do not hesitate to ask your teachers or parents for advice.
- Allow for mail delays in meeting deadlines.

THE SCHOLARSHIP BIBLIOGRAPHY

Every year thousands of college students receive financial assistance in the form of scholarships. Many of these awards are offered by private foundations or businesses. They target people with specific interests or qualifications. There are scholarships for veterans, women, ethnic minorities, athletes, certain academic disciplines, and many other categories. In addition to the other scholarship sources listed in this bibliography, the Higher Education Coordinating Board directly administers the following scholarship programs. For more information, write to the agency at the address on the front of this publication indicating the scholarship program in which you are interested.

Washington Scholars Program. The purpose of the program is to recognize and honor the accomplishments of three high school seniors from each legislative district, encourage and facilitate privately-funded scholarship awards, and stimulate recruitment of outstanding students to Washington public and private colleges and universities. Eligible students representing the top one percent of the senior class are nominated by the high school principals based upon academic accomplishment, leadership, and community service. Scholars attending a Washington public college or university receive a full tuition and fee waiver for undergraduate studies. Scholars attending a Washington private college or university receive a grant that is matched by the school on a dollar-for-dollar basis. The program recognizes outstanding graduating seniors, stimulates recruitment to Washington public and private colleges and universities, stresses the importance of educational excellence, recognizes leadership and community service activities in addition to academic achievement, and provides financial assistance for undergraduate studies. **High school seniors should contact their counselor or principal to learn if they are eligible for nomination.**

Paul Douglas Teachers Scholarship Program. This program was created by the federal government in 1984 to enable and encourage outstanding high school graduates to pursue teaching careers at the pre-school, elementary, or secondary level. An eligible student may receive an award up to \$5,000 for each academic year, not to exceed four years. Washington residents who graduated in the top ten percent of their high school class or received a comparable score on their GED examination, and who are enrolled full-time at an accredited college may qualify. An excellent academic record, a statement of commitment, and a recommendation all play a part in the selection process. Students must teach at least two years for each year's scholarship or repay the scholarship plus interest (now set at 8 percent). Interest is capitalized. The annual minimum repayment amount is \$1,200 or the unpaid balance, whichever is less, over a ten-year period. This is a non-need-based program. **Applications are available from the financial aid office or high school counselor in January prior to the year of enrollment.**

Future Teachers Conditional Scholarship Program. This program was established to recruit; as future teachers, students who have distinguished themselves through outstanding academic achievement and students who can serve as role models for children, including those from targeted ethnic minorities. The \$3,000 scholarship is renewable for up to five years and requires a ten year Washington public school teaching commitment or repayment of the scholarship plus interest. This is a non-need-based program and requires a separate application. **Applications are available at high schools and participating colleges in January prior to the academic year for which the student wishes to be considered.**

Nurses Conditional Scholarship Program. This program encourages qualified individuals to serve in nursing shortage areas. Recipients agree to nurse in a state-defined shortage area for five years or repay the scholarship plus interest. The renewable scholarship pays the cost of attending the nursing program, up to \$3,000 per year. This is a non-need-based program. A separate application available from participating institutions with nursing programs is required. **Applications are available at the nursing departments of participating colleges in January prior to the academic year for which the student wishes to be considered.**
