#### **ABSTRACT**

This report presents findings from the annual tuition and fee survey of public two- and four-year colleges and universities in the state of Colorado. It presents the survey findings in a comparative summary format. The report shows that all governing boards complied with all the policies set forth by the Colorado Commission on Higher Education. These policies include the following requirements: (1) that the average tuition rate for full-time student be between 25 percent and 30 percent of the cost of the academic program; (2) that the maximum percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition at a campus be twice the rate of increase in the Higher Education Pricing Index; (3) that the semester tuition charges to part-time resident undergraduates not exceed the tuition charges for full-time resident undergraduate students: (4) that the percentage increase in tuition for full-time non-resident students who pay less than 100 percent of the cost of the academic program be at least equal to the percentage increase for full-time resident undergraduate students; (5) that no student fees be used to support academic facility construction; and (6) that all campuses annually review and approve all mandatory campus-wide fees. Appendices, comprising over 60 percent of the report, provide tables giving comparative statistical data by institution. (GLR)

#### **PREFACE**

The 1993-94 Report on Tuition and Fees at Colorado Public Colleges and Universities is presented to the General Assembly as required by Colorado Commission on Higher Education (CCHE) policy. CCHE staff have compiled and reviewed information concerning the tuition and fee decisions made by all governing boards for Colorado publicly-supported institutions of higher education for the 1993-94 academic year. This report presents the findings of the annual tuition and fee survey and the compliance review with CCHE tuition and fee policy. The report also presents institutional tuition and fee information in a comparative summary format. The CCHE review indicates that overall, tuition decisions were made in compliance with the tuition and fee policies established by CCHE pursuant to C.R.S. 23-1-108 (12).

The 1993-94 survey and report includes information on *course specific fees* at all public twoand four-year colleges and universities. Per CCHE policy, governing boards are required to submit information on all course specific fees every three years, beginning in 1993-94.

The Commission recently directed CCHE staff to conduct a comprehensive review of the CCHE tuition and fee policy. The purpose of the review is to clarify the policy and ensure that the policy is consistent with new legislative and constitutional constraints. Working groups, involving student and governing board representatives will be meeting to discuss the tuition and fee policy and issues related to the policy. In addition, staff will meet with student leaders at as many campuses as possible. Staff will present the results of the review and possible policy changes to the Commission, no later than March 1994.

#### Footnote 33 of the 1993-94 Long Bill states:

It is the intent of the General Assembly that the average resident tuition rates by Governing Board be raised up to 2% and the average nonresident tuition rates by Governing Board be raised up to 7%.

The CCHE review found that the governing boards were in compliance with the intent of the General Assembly for 1993-94.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **INTRODUCTION**

Governing boards have the responsibility and authority for the financial management of their institutions. A major component of sound financial management is setting tuition and fee rates. The Commission has the responsibility to ensure that educational quality and access for students are maintained in a manner which is consistent with the role and mission of each institution.

#### **FINDINGS**

1. Full-time Undergraduate Tuition Rate

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy requires that the average tuition rate per full-time resident undergraduate student at all governing boards (except the Colorado School of Mines) be at least 25%, but not more than 30%, of the cost of the academic program.

Finding:

All governing boards complied with this policy in 1993-94.

2. <u>Increases in Undergraduate Tuition Rates</u>

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy requires that the maximum percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition at a campus be twice the rate of increase in the Higher Education Pricing Index (HEPI). The maximum increase in resident undergraduate tuition at the Colorado School of Mines shall be two percentage points above the rate of increase in HEPI.

Finding:

The HEPI rate for 1993-94 compliance purposes is 3.2%. All governing boards increased resident undergraduate tuition by approximately 2.0% for 1993-94 and all therefore complied with this policy in 1993-94.

3. Part-time Undergraduate Tuition Rates

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy requires that the semester tuition charges to part-time resident undergraduates not exceed the tuition charges for full-time resident undergraduate students.

Finding:

All governing boards complied with this policy in 1993-94.



#### Increases in Full-time Non-Resident Undergraduate Tuition 4.

CCHE policy requires that the percentage increase in tuition for **CCHE Policy:** 

full-time non-resident students who pay less than 100% of the cost of the academic program be at least equal to the percentage

increase for full-time resident undergraduate students.

Finding: All governing boards complied with this policy in 1993-94.

#### 5. Student Fees

CCHE policy prohibits the use of student fees to support academic **CCHE Policy:** 

> facility construction, and also prohibits the use of special academic fees to minimize tuition rate proposals by shifting tuition increases

to special fee increases.

All governing boards reported in the survey that no student fees are being Finding:

used to support academic facilities construction for 1993-94. All boards, therefore, appear to comply with this policy in 1993-94. An issue was raised regarding the University Technology Fee at the University of Northern Colorado, however, the issue remains unresolved at the time this

report went to printing.

#### 6. Approval of Student Fees

**CCHE Policy:** CCHE policy requires all governing boards to annually review and

> approve all mandatory campus-wide fees, college specific fees, and program specific fees. Such fees will be charged to students only

after the review and approval of the governing board.

Finding: All mandatory student fees have been approved by the respective

governing boards for 1993-94. All governing boards, therefore, complied

with this policy in 1993-94.

#### 7. Changes in Mandatory Student Fees

**CCHE Policy:** CCHE policy requires governing boards to report any changes in

> current mandatory student fee rates and all new mandatory student fees. Reporting requirements for new and increased mandatory fees shall include why the additional cost was covered by a fee increase or a new fee, rather than by tuition. The date of

governing board review and approval must also be reported.

Finding: All governing boards complied with this policy in 1993-94.



#### 8. <u>Course Specific Fees</u>

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy requires governing boards to report all course specific fees to CCHE every three years, beginning with the 1993-94 academic year. The report must include a summary of the governing boards review of such course fees.

Finding:

All governing boards complied with this policy in 1993-94.

#### 9. Increased Tuition Revenue to Support Student Financial Aid

CCHE Policy:

CCHE policy requires that, in order to continue to assure access, any campus that has a percentage increase in the total amount of resident undergraduate tuition and mandatory campus-wide student fees which is in excess of the percentage increase of HEPI shall be required to utilize 16.5% of the revenue generated by the amount of the percentage increase in tuition, less either HEPI or the percentage increase in state general fund support of need-based student financial aid (whichever is greater), to increase need-based resident undergraduate student financial aid.

Finding:

If tuition and student fees at a campus increases by a rate greater than both HEPI (3.2%) and the state general fund support of student need-based financial aid (28.9%), sixteen and one-half percent (16.5%) of the amount of marginal revenue generated must be used for institutional need-based financial aid. This requirement applied to all campuses which had combined tuition and fee increases of more than 28.9% in 1993-94. For 1993-94, no institutions had combined increases more than 28.9%. Therefore, all boards complied with this policy in 1993-94.



#### GOVERNING BOARD COMPLIANCE WITH CCHE TUITION AND FEE POLICY

Governing boards annually submit the following data for CCHE analysis:

- Resident, full-time, undergraduate tuition as a percentage of total academic cost per student;
- Tuition and fee rates;
- Evidence that the charges to a part-time resident undergraduate do not exceed the tuition charged to a full-time resident undergraduate;
- Evidence that the tuition increase for full-time, non-residents at a four-year campus or the community college system who pay less than 100% of cost, was at least equal to the percentage increase for full-time, resident, undergraduate students;
- Evidence that student fees are not being used to support academic facility construction or to minimize tuition rate increases;
- Evidence that all mandatory student fees have been reviewed and approved by the respective governing boards;
- Changes in current mandatory student fee rates and all new mandatory student fees; and
- Information on course specific fees (every three years).

This information is summarized in table format for comparative purposes and is presented in Appendix B. The tuition and fee decisions for each institution and governing board were analyzed for compliance with CCHE Tuition and Fee Policy. Any exceptions to the policy were noted and further reviewed by staff to determine compliance or non-compliance with policy. The staff analysis of the governing board compliance with CCHE Tuition and Fee policy follows:

#### 1. Full-time Undergraduate Tuition Rate

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy requires that the average tuition rate per full-time resident undergraduate student at a governing board be at least 25% of the cost of the academic program, but not more than 30% of the cost. This policy does not apply to the Colorado School of Mines.




#### Discussion:

All governing boards subject to this policy requirement are within the policy range of 25% to 30% for the 1993-94 academic year. Table 2, Appendix B, provides the 1993-94 percentage of cost per student that is paid at the general campuses, by governing board, by full-time, undergraduate student tuition.

#### Five-Year Trend

The following graph presents the tuition as a percentage of cost over the last five years. In 1993-94, four of the five governing boards subject to this policy are near the 30% upper limit of the policy.





#### 2. <u>Increases in Undergraduate Tuition Rates</u>

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy requires that the maximum percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition at a campus be limited to twice the rate of increase in the Higher Education Pricing Index (HEPI). The maximum increase in resident undergraduate tuition at the Colorado School of Mines (CSM) is limited to two percentage points above the rate of the HEPI increase.

Discussion:

For purposes of this report, the 1993-94 Higher Education Pricing Index is established at 3.2%. The maximum percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition for all campuses, except the CSM, therefore is 6.4%. The maximum percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition for CSM is 5.2%. The following table provides the percentage increases in full-time, resident, undergraduate tuition, by campus and the maximum allowable tuition increase as provided by CCHE policy.

#### 3. Part-time Undergraduate Tuition Rates

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy requires that the semester tuition charges to a parttime resident undergraduate student, as defined by the institution, not exceed the tuition charges to a full-time resident undergraduate student.

Discussion:

All semester charges to part-time resident undergraduates were less than the tuition charges for full-time resident undergraduate students. Therefore, all governing boards were in compliance. Tables 4 and 5, Appendix B, provide additional information about part-time undergraduate and graduate tuition rates.

#### 4. Increases in Full-time Non-Resident Undergraduate Tuition

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy requires that the percentage increase in tuition for full-time non-resident students, who pay less than 100% of the cost of the academic program, shall be at least equal to the percentage increase for full-time resident undergraduate students.

Discussion:

The following institutions have non-resident tuition rates at less than 100% of the cost of the academic program for 1993-94:

All governing boards were in compliance. Table 2, Appendix B, provides more information on non-resident undergraduate tuition as a percentage of academic cost.

Table 2, in Attachment 2, also compares, by governing board, the 1993-94 full-time non-resident undergraduate tuition for the general campuses as a percentage of cost per student. The following table shows that non-resident students are paying less than 100% of the cost of education at schools from two of the six governing boards. The range for each governing board is shown below:

#### 5. Student Fees

**CCHE Policy:** 

CCHE policy prohibits the use of student fees to support academic facility construction. Policy further prohibits the use of special academic fees to minimize tuition rate proposals by shifting tuition increases to special fee increases.

Discussion:

All governing boards reported that no student fees are being used to support academic facility construction for 1993-94. Table 6, in Appendix B, provides a summary of mandatory student fees for the 1993-94 academic year. Table 7A, in Appendix B, presents a comparison of the fee rates with those charged in 1992-93 and the percentage increase in fees by institution. Issues concerning the use of student fees and tuition for academic facilities construction have been raised at recent Commission meetings.

At the September 2, 1993 Commission meeting, there was discussion on the following issues:

- Ouse of tuition for capital construction. Questions had been raised regarding the interpretation of the current CCHE policy concerning the use of tuition funds for construction of an academic facility. The policy states that student fees cannot be used to fund academic facilities, but the policy is silent with regard to the use of tuition.
- Ouniversity Technology Fee at UNC. The UNC Student Trustee testified before the Commission and stated the students concern that the University Technology Fee violates the CCHE fee policy regarding the use of fees for academic facility construction. This issue is still pending.



#### 6. Approval of Student Fees

**CCHE Policy:** 

All governing boards shall annually review and approve all mandatory campus-wide fees, college specific fees, and program specific fees. Such fees will be charged to students only after the review and approval of the governing board.

Discussion:

Review of mandatory student fee surveys for 1993-94 indicate that all new mandatory student fees and all fee increases have been approved by the respective governing boards for 1993-94.

#### 7. Changes in Mandatory Student Fees

**CCHE Policy:** 

Each governing board is required to report any changes in current mandatory student fee rates and all new mandatory student fees. Reporting requirements for new and increased mandatory fees shall include why the additional cost was covered by a fee increase or a new fee, rather than by tuition. The date of governing board review and approval must also be reported.

Discussion:

All governing boards are in compliance with this policy for 1993-94. Table 9, Appendix B, presents the mandatory student fee increases for the 1993-94 academic year. Mandatory student fee increases occurred at eighteen of the twenty-four colleges and universities. In addition, fee increases occurred at all four local district colleges. Table 7a, Appendix B, presents total mandatory campuswide student fees for 1992-93 and 1993-94, by institution. Detailed student fee information for 1993-94 is contained in Table 6 of Appendix B. Many institutions had decreases in mandatory student fees which may have offset some mandatory student fee increases. These are presented in Table 9b, Appendix B.

#### New Student Fees - 1993-94

Table 10, Appendix B, provides information on institutions with new fees in 1993-94. New fees in 1993-94 included:

#### University of Northern Colorado Technology Fee

UNC has approved a new University Technology Fee of \$3.00 per credit hour (\$72.00 per year based on 12 credit hours) to provide the university with resources dedicated to delivering technological advances across the campus, and increasing student access to those new technologies in the classroom, library, and residence halls.



#### Registration Fee at the Community Colleges

The Community College System has initiated a common systemwide registration fee. The fee was new at the colleges which had no previous registration fee:

Community College of Denver Morgan Community College Otero Junior College Trinidad State Junior College

The registration fee was an increased fee at those colleges who previously had a registration fee, but was less than \$16.00 per year. For those colleges which had a registration fee of more than \$16.00 per year, there was no change in the fee amount.

Table 10 provides information on all new mandatory student fees for 1993-94.

#### 8. <u>Course Specific Fees</u>

**CCHE Policy**:

All course specific fees must be reported to CCHE every three years, at the time the requirements of section 2.06 and 2.07 are submitted. This requirement will commence in the 1993-94 academic year. The report must include a summary of the governing boards review of such course fees with CCHE policy.

Discussion:

All boards have submitted 1993-94 course specific fee data as required, and are therefore in compliance. CCHE staff gathered data on course specific fees for the June 1991 Commission discussion on mandatory student fees. A summary of this data on course specific fees is contained in Table 11a, Appendix B. Table 11b, Appendix B, lists information on the course specific fees for 1993-94. The tables show a significant increase in the number of course specific fees at some colleges that had course specific fees in the 1991 review. In addition, some schools decreased the number of course specific fees charged. While the tables indicate a trend toward an increased number of course specific fees systemwide, it is important to note that this is the first year of the official submittal of course fees on the tuition and fee survey.

#### 9. <u>Increased Tuition Revenue to Support Student Financial Aid</u>

CCHE Policy:

CCHE policy requires that, in order to continue to assure access, any campus that has a percentage increase in the total amount of resident undergraduate tuition and mandatory campus-wide student fees which is in excess of the HEPI increase, must use 16.5% of the increased tuition revenue, less either HEPI or the percentage



increase in state general fund support of student financial aid (whichever is greater), to increase need-based resident undergraduate student financial aid.

Discussion:

If tuition and fees at a campus increased by a rate greater than both HEPI (3.2%) and the state general fund support of student need-based financial aid (28.9%), sixteen and one-half percent (16.5%) of the amount of marginal revenue generated would have to be used for institutional need-based financial aid. This requirement applies to all campuses in 1993-94 which had increases in tuition and fees greater than 28.9%.

For 1993-94, there were no campuses where the percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition approached the increase in HEPI or the state general fund support of student need-based financial aid. Therefore, all boards are in compliance for 1993-94.



#### OTHER TUITION AND FEE ISSUES

#### **CCHE** Tuition and Fee Policy Review

The Commission recently directed CCHE staff to conduct a comprehensive review of its tuition and fee policy. The purpose of the review is to clarify the policy and ensure that the policy is consistent with new legislative and constitutional constraints. Working groups, involving student and governing board representatives have met to discuss the tuition and fee policy and specific issues relating to the policy. In addition, staff will continue to meet with student leaders at a number of catapuses. Staff will present the results of the review and possible policy changes to the Commission, no later than March 1994. Possible issues which may be reviewed include:

- Use of tuition and fees for academic facilities construction;
- Clarity of the current policy;
- Student involvement in fee process; and
- Course specific fees.

#### **Legislative Tuition Limits**

Footnote 33 of the 1993-94 Long Bill states:

It is the intent of the General Assembly that the average resident tuition rates by Governing Board be raised up to 2% and the average nonresident tuition rates by Governing Board be raised up to 7%.

Overall the average resident tuition rate increases, by board, were at 2.0%. Table 1, in Appendix B, lists the tuition increases by institution. Some individual increases were slightly above the 2.0% limit, however, these occurred as a result of rounding of the tuition amounts. For example, an institution would apply the 2% increase to the previous years tuition rate and then round the amount to the nearest whole dollar. This rounding would then make the increase slightly above the 2.0% amount. The CCHE review found that the governing boards were in compliance with the intent of the General Assembly for 1993-94.



#### APPENDIX A - CCHE POLICY

#### **CCHE Policy**

SECTION VI

PART C

TUITION, FEES, AND STUDENT AID

#### 1.00 General Description

Governing boards have the responsibility and authority for the financial management of their institutions. A major component of sound financial management is the setting of tuition and fees. Since institutions have different roles and missions, governing boards must consider a number of factors when setting tuition and fees. The CCHE has responsibility to exercise oversight to ensure that educational quality and access for students are maintained consistent with the role and mission of each institution.

#### 2.00 Policy

The following guidelines will be followed by the governing boards in establishing tuition rates.

- 2.01 The average tuition rate per full-time resident undergraduate student in a governing board shall be at least 25% of the cost of the academic program but not more than 30.0% of the cost. This policy shall not apply to the Colorado School of Mines.
  - 2.01.01 The rate shall be established based upon the fiscal year general fund appropriation that is known, or estimated, at the time tuition is set by the respective board. Subsequent changes in the general fund appropriation for the fiscal year shall not require changes in the tuition rate.
  - 2.01.02 Notwithstanding the provisions of this paragraph, for the 1992-93 state fiscal year, the University of Northern Colorado is exempted from the above stated 30% limit and is permitted to increase their resident undergraduate tuition by not more than 6.3%.
- 2.02 Except as noted below, the maximum percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition at a campus shall be twice the rate of increase in the Higher Education Pricing Index (HEPI). The maximum increase in resident undergraduate tuition at the Colorado School of Mines shall be two percentage points above the rate of increase in HEPI.
- 2.03 The semester tuition charges to a part-time resident undergraduate student, as defined by the institution, shall not exceed the tuition charges to a full-time resident undergraduate student.



- 2.04 The percentage increase in tuition at a four-year campus or the Community College System for full-time non-resident students who pay less than 100% of the cost of the academic program shall be at least equal to the percentage increase for full-time resident undergraduate students.
- 2.05 Governing boards are required to provide an analysis of their tuition and fee rate decisions to CCHE, based upon the following policies.
  - 2.05.01 Governing boards should consider the relationship of proposed resident tuition rates to total cost per student.
  - 2.05.02 Board approved institutional tuition proposals should consider financial aid available from all sources for needy students.
  - 2.05.03 Student fees should not be used to support academic facility construction; nor should increased special academic fees be used to minimize tuition rate proposals by shifting tuition increases to special fee increases.
  - 2.05.04 All governing boards shall annually review and approve all mandatory campus-wide fees, college specific fees, and program specific fees. Such fees will be charged to students only after the review and approval of the governing board. For the 1991-92 academic year, the deadline for fee approval will be November 1, 1991.
- 2.06 By September 1 of each year, each governing board is required to submit institutional tuition and fee rates to the Commission, along with evidence of their consistency with the above listed policies on forms provided by CCHE. A report summarizing tuition and fee decisions and analyzing their consistency with Commission policy will be prepared by the CCHE staff for approval by the Commission and distribution to the General Assembly no later than December 15 of each year.
- 2.07 In addition to the standard Tuition and Fees Report (2.06), each governing board is required to report any changes in current mandatory student fee rates and all new mandatory student fees.
  - 2.07.01 Reporting Requirements For New and Increased Mandatory Fees Only
    - Why the additional cost was covered by a fee increase or a new fee and not by tuition.
    - Date of governing board review and approval.
- 2.08 Mandatory student fees and all changes in mandatory student fees will be reported annually. All Course specific fees must be reported to CCHE every three years, at the time the requirements of section 2.06 and 2.07 are submitted. This requirement will commence in the 1993-94 academic year. The report must include a summary of the governing boards review of such course fees with CCHE policy.



#### 3.00 Student Fees Categories

Definitions for the required student fee categories are listed below.

#### 3.01 Health Service

Mandatory fees allocated for either clinics or contract health services. Report insurance fees in section 2.

3.01.01 Program

Fees allocated to the direct operating costs of the health clinic and/or service program.

3.01.02 Bonds

Fees which are allocated for principal and/or interest payments on the long-term debt of the health clinic.

#### 3.02 Student Center/Union

3.02.01 Program

Fees which support the activities housed in the student center/union or the operation of the center itself.

3.02.02 Bonds

Fees which are allocated for principal and/or interest payments on the long-term debt of the student center/union.

#### 3.03 Student Government Operations

Fees allocated for the direct operating expenses of the student government for the executive, legislative and judicial branches.

#### 3.04 Student Activities

Fees allocated to student programs, such as cultural or social events, legal services, off-campus housing assistance, student clubs, newspapers, etc.



#### 3.05 Physical Recreation

Physical recreation activities supported through student fees, including intramural and club sports.

3.05.01 Program

Fees which support the operating budgets for all recreation programs, including fees allocated to the operating budget of a student recreation center.

3.05.02 Bonds

Fees which are allocated for principal and/or interest payments on the long-term debt of a student recreation center.

#### 3.06 Intercollegiate Athletics

Any mandatory fee allocated to support intercollegiate athletics.

3.06.01 Men

Fees allocated to the operating expenses of the men's program.

3.06.02 Women

Fees allocated to the operating expenses of the women's program.

3.06.03 Bonds

Fees which are allocated for principal and/or interest payments on the long-term debt of any facility used for intercollegiate athletics.

#### 3.07 Facility Construction/Capital Fee

Mandatory fees collected for the purpose of constructing, altering, or maintaining facilities or purchasing equipment which are not utilized for the purpose of retiring debt. List the names of the facilities where funds are expected to be used during the coming fiscal year. Commission policy is that student fees should not be used to support academic facilities.

#### 3.08 Other Programs

Mandatory fees for other programs such as scholarship funds, campus development, etc.



#### 4.00 Student Aid Policy

In order to continue to assure access, any campus that has a percentage increase in the total amount of resident undergraduate tuition and mandatory campus-wide student fees which is in excess of the percentage increase of HEPI, shall be required to utilize 16.5% of the revenue generated by the amount of the percentage increase in resident undergraduate tuition and mandatory student fees less either HEPI or the percentage increase in state general fund support of needbased student financial aid (whichever is greater) to increase need-based resident undergraduate student financial aid.
