ABSTRACT

Compiled by the Commission on Small and/or Rural Colleges of the American Association of Community Colleges, this document provides over 100 tips for saving money and suggestions for fundraising activities for community college practitioners across the nation. Ideas cover such topics as reducing staff and operational costs, innovative fundraising events, and community participation in college operations. For each idea, the name, community college, address, and phone number of a contact person is provided. Sample tips include the following: (1) using chili cookoffs, golf and tennis tournaments, raffles, and auctions to raise money; (2) creating an investments committee composed of local bankers and financial advisors; (3) holding luncheons with the college president to raise funds with targeted professional groups; (4) energy conservation programs, including the use of energy management systems, natural gas-powered electricity generators, more efficient light bulbs, and weather stripping; (5) contracting with local businesses to provide food, maintenance, security, and bookstore services; (6) staggering student support services to expand hours while keeping payroll at the same level; and (7) developing partnerships with local businesses, hospitals, and public organizations to share program costs. 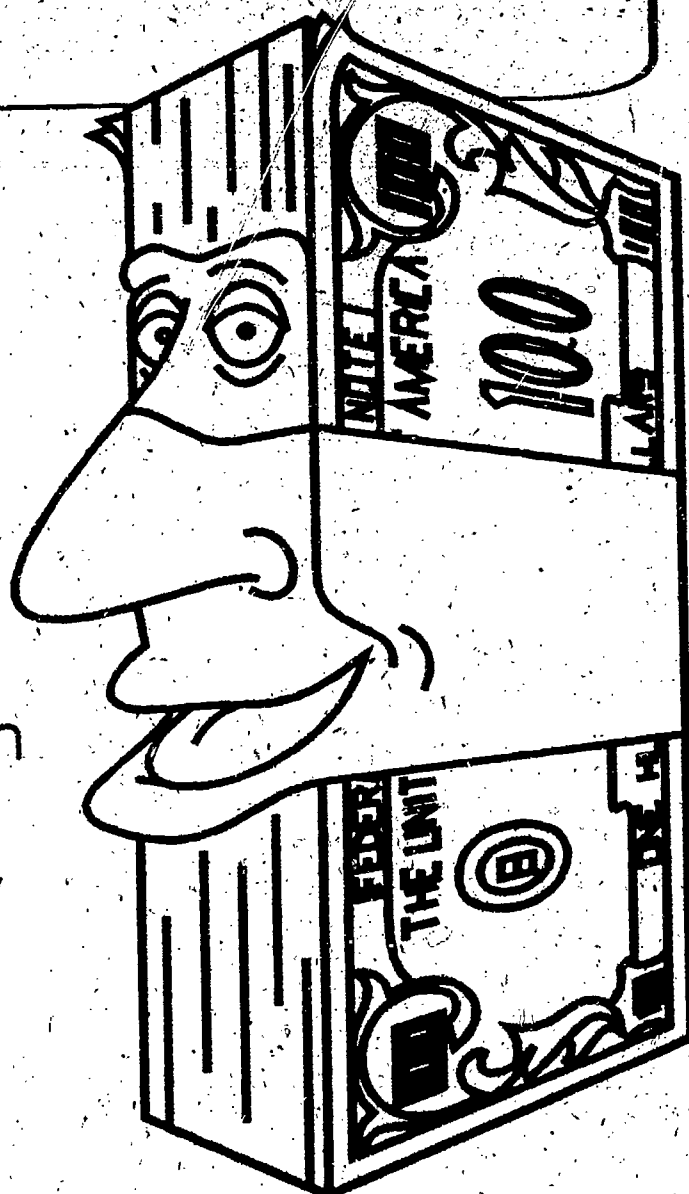

Employ attorneys only as the need arises. Keeping a law firm on retainer can be expensive. Without the retainer, the college has the flexibility to employ the best attorney for the particular case at hand. Law has become so complex that lawyers now tend to specialize. The best attorney in one field may be incompetent in another area.

Keep a clean, well-maintained campus. A clean, well-maintained campus not only improves the learning environment, campus morale, and image of the college but saves money in the long run. The cleaner the facilities, the better the staff and students will keep the premises clean. Keeping the campus well-maintained keeps other defects from arising and saves on "down" time.

Use large deductibles in Your risk management Plan. Large deductibles will sometimes save substantial insurance premiums and will free up funds for expanded coverage. Most colleges are under-insured for liability coverage. A large umbrella policy is a "Must" for all colleges.

Have a light-bulb replacement Plan. The cost of lights is small in comparison to labor replacement and energy costs. If you're replacing bulbs as they burn out you're spending too much money in labor. Save labor costs, keep premises secure, and operations flowing smoothly by replacing all bulbs of a particular type at one time. Also, the selection of the type of bulb is important in saving energy costs.

Periodically, host "Luncheons with the President." Courting the public is important to fund raising and luncheons with the president works very well. One-hour, small-group sessions on campus with guests having something in common works best, i.e. select guests by profession. Keep the program moving fast and allow 10-minutes for "feed-back" at the end. Cover mission and goals, how well the college is doing, and how much better the college would do with additional resources. With the RDO coordinating, these luncheons take very little of the president's time; little or no preparation by the president is necessary after the first or second luncheon.

If you analyze the task, it can be found that considerable funds could be saved by employing one contact person and one technician/paraprofessional to do the leg work associated with the project. This concept also can be used in many places on the college campus.
