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ABSTRACT

In February 1994, a study was conducted at Macomb Community College (MCC), in Warren, Michigan, to determine the reasons that students failed to return to MCC. A computer-generated random sample of 1,585 names was drawn from a population of more than 13,000 students identified as non-returning students (NRS's), i.e., who had not enrolled in any course in any term of the subsequent year and had not earned a formal award from MCC. Questionnaires were mailed to the last known address of the sample population and completed forms were received from 545 former students. Study findings, based on survey responses and comparisons to previous NRS studies, included the following: (1) respondents represented more than 100 programs from every academic division of MCC, a 10% increase over the previous year's sample; (2) objectives in attending MCC have indicated a steady shift from job-related to transfer over the past five years; (3) 18% of the respondents indicated that their objectives had been fully completed, while 67% indicated that they had been partially completed; (4) 68% of the respondents indicated that they planned to continue working toward their objectives; and (5) for the past 5 years' studies, the major reasons for not returning to MCC have been work/school hours conflict (19% of the responses), financial problems (16%), transfer to another college (14%), and personal/family reasons other than illness or injury (13%). During the month of February, 1994, the Department of Research and Evaluation at Macomb Community College conducted a survey among a sample of non-returning students. A non-returning student (NRS) is defined as one who enrolled in any course in any term of the base school year (1992-93 for this survey) who did not enroll at MCC in any course in any term of the subsequent year (1993-94) and who did not earn a formal award from MCC by the end of that year.

SUMMARY

NRS' objectives in attending Macomb continue to be job-related but that is declining somewhat in favor of the desire to earn transfer credits. Most respondents indicated their objectives had been partially fulfilled (67%) while another 18% indicated they had been fully completed. More than two-thirds of respondents indicated they intended to pursue their objectives further in the future.

The most common reasons given for not returning were a conflict between work and school hours (19%); transfer to another college (17%); financial problems (15%); and personal/family problems other than illness or injury (14%). Another 10% indicated "other" reasons.

Mean scores for course-related evaluations in the major, based on a 5 point Likert-type scale, continue to be "good" (4 on the scale) with a range of 3.70 (lab experience) to 3.99 (quality of instruction).

Usefulness of MCC training relative to the respondents' work was 3.54 (between neutral and somewhat useful), also on a 5-point scale.

METHODOLOGY

The sample excluded students who were identified as deceased, or who registered as guest students or early admits (before graduating from high school). The computer-generated random sample of 1,585 names was drawn from a population of more than 13,000 students identified as non-returning.

This process is changed from previous years, where the sample included 25 people from every program; all students from programs containing less than 25 students; 50 people from selected

technical programs; excluded undecideds; and excluded all students in DOA or MRC programs.

The surveys were sent by first-class mail to the student's last known address accompanied by a cover letter from the Project Director. A second mailing followed approximately 10 days later to those NRS who had not responded to the first letter. The survey instrument and cover letter are attached as Appendix A and B, respectively.

RESPONSE RATE

The number of respondents to this year's NRS survey was up slightly from last year's but the percentage remained the same. This year, 552 people responded to the survey for a 34.8% return rate. Last year, 545 NRS responded out of 1,565 (34.8%).

We received a number of calls from students who had "stopped out." Some of them indicated they were registered for this semester or had plans to register for Fall.

Response rates for the last five years have averaged about 34% with a range of 31.6% to 35.8%. The sample sizes have decreased because of changes in sampling procedures, but the response rate has remained essentially the same. Table 1 displays the longitudinal data for the NRS survey.

RESULTS

Shown below are 5-year responses for each question on the survey. Mean scores are indicated where appropriate. It is important to remember that respondents had not registered for a class during the year preceding the survey, i.e., those students responding in 1990 last attended during the 1988-89 academic year, etc.

Respondents represented more than one hundred programs which included every academic division of the College. This represents a 10% increase over last year, due in part to the change in methodology.

OBJECTIVE IN ATTENDING MACOMB

As Table 2 shows, objectives in attending Macomb have indicated a steady shift from job-related to transfer over the past five years among non-returning students. The combined percentages of "improve job skills" and "prepare for future job" have declined (although they are still the largest number) while "earn transfer credit" has steadily increased.

COMPLETION OF OBJECTIVE

An increasing number of respondents indicate their objective in attending MCC has been fully completed, while over five years there has been fluctuation in the number of respondents indicating their objective has been partially completed. Table 3 presents a historical perspective.

INTENT TO CONTINUE OBJECTIVE

More than two-thirds of respondents indicate they plan to continue their objectives. In fact there is only 1 point difference between those who indicated they had partially completed objectives and those who plan to continue their objective further.

REASON FOR NOT RETURNING

Five reasons for not returning to MCC have consistently been named over the years. In descending order of 5-year average response, they are:

1. Work/school hours conflict (19% over 5 years)
2. Financial problems (16% over five years)
3. Transfer to another college (14% over 5 years)
4. Personal/family reasons other than illness or injury (13% over 5 years)
5. Miscellaneous (11% over 5 years)

Actual percentages for all reasons named on the survey over the last five years are shown in Table 5.

INTEREST IN TAKING MORE COURSES AT MCC

Over five years, more than two-thirds of respondents and as high as 80% of respondents have expressed interest in taking

additional classes at Macomb. Percentages over the five years are:

1990 74% yes
 1991 80% yes
 1992 75% yes
 1993 76% yes
 1994 73% yes

Between five percent and six percent of respondents do not answer this question.

COURSE RATINGS

If respondents had completed more than one course in their chosen program, they were asked to rate five measures: quality of instruction, grading and testing, content of courses, class size, and laboratory experiences. (These are the same measures rated by graduates on follow-up surveys.)

This year, about 40% (range: 38%-53%) did not answer these questions. Exact figures for no answers in previous years are not available, although based on Graduate Follow-Up surveys, laboratory ratings always have a higher rate of no response because fewer students have lab experiences.

Summary information about this section is presented in Table 6. Mean scores were based on a five-point Likert-type scale (5=very good, 4=good, 3=average, 2=poor 1=very poor).

USEFULNESS OF MCC TRAINING

Those respondents who were employed were asked to rate the usefulness of their MCC training in their daily work . Ratings were based on a 5-point scale: very useful (5), somewhat useful (4), neutral (3), not too useful (2), or useless (1). This year's mean score is about half-way between neutral and somewhat useful, down a bit from last year's mean. Five-year data are presented in Table 7.

VERBATIM COMMENTS

A substantial number of respondents wrote comments on their surveys. Out of 200 comments, 15% related to faculty; 14% were kudos to Macomb; 14%, scheduling; 11%, student services--mostly relating to difficulties with registration and financial aid; 5%, programs. The largest category was miscellaneous at 19%. The remaining comments (all groups less than 5%) dealt with counseling, course offerings, transfer, multiple issues commented on by one respondent, course content, computers or computer soft/hardware, lab access, and jobs.
