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ABSTRACT

In 1986, the Utah State Board of Education approved a policy of subject specific certification for all secondary and most middle level teachers in the expectation they will hold an endorsement in any subject they are assigned to teach. To assure quality teaching and at the same time provide for a variety of certification options, the Board approved the following routes through which the underprepared teacher could receive the appropriate endorsement: (1) completion of a major, minor, or composite in the subject area corresponding to their assignment, (2) completion of a State Board approved inservice program; or (3) demonstration of competency in the subject matter area. This report lists the procedures required to obtain a subject matter endorsement and includes: a policy statement on appropriate assignment of teachers; a memo to teachers outlining demonstrated competencies and lines of evidence; curriculum certification information; a list of necessarily existent small rural schools in Utah; and subject specific check lists and guidelines for business/marketing, dance, drama, English, foreign language, health, information technology, journalism, mathematics, music, physical education, reading, science, social studies, speech, and visual arts. RULE ON APPROPRIATE ASSIGNMENT OF TEACHERS
(R300-520)

STATEMENT OF PHILOSOPHY

On March 7, 1986, the State Board approved new certification requirements for early childhood, elementary, middle, and secondary teachers. Subject-specific certification was included for secondary and for most middle level teachers. In other words, these teachers are now certificated in English, mathematics, physical education, etc., and the expectation is that they will hold a subject endorsement in any subject field they are assigned to teach.

AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

1. This rule is authorized by Article X, Section 3, of the Utah State Constitution which entrusts the State Board of Education with power to supervise public education, Section 53A-1-401(3), U.C.A., 1953, which gives the Board authority to adopt rules in accordance with its responsibilities, and Section 53A-6-101(3), U.C.A. 1953, which authorizes the Board to rank, endorse, or classify certificates.
2. The purpose of this rule is to provide for teachers to receive appropriate teaching endorsements from the Board.

DEFINITION OF TERMS

1. Board - The Utah State Board of Education
2. Endorsement - A specialty field or area listed on the teaching certificate which indicates the specific qualification(s) of the holder.
3. Basic Certificate - Initial certificate issued for four years by the Board which permits the holder to be employed in the public school system as an educator.
4. Standard Certificate - A certificate issued by the Board after a holder has demonstrated competence under the Basic Certificate.
5. USOE - The Utah State Office of Education.

RULES ON APPROPRIATE ASSIGNMENT

1. The following are Standards for the appropriate assignment of certificated personnel:
 - a. Early Childhood teachers (kindergarten through third) shall hold Basic or Standard Early Childhood Certificates.
 - b. Elementary teachers (one through eight) shall hold Basic or Standard Elementary Certificates. Those teachers teaching in grades 7 and 8 must be subject-specific endorsed in the subject(s) they are teaching.
 - c. Secondary school teachers (six through twelve), including middle level and junior high school, shall hold appropriate Basic or Standard Certificates with endorsements in the subject field(s) in which they teach.
 - (1) Secondary teachers assigned to integrated subject, block, or core programs where two or more subjects are included, such as combinations of English-social studies or math-science, must hold an endorsement in at least one of the subjects. Included in this policy are technology, life and career programs (TLC).
 - (2) A secondary or middle-level teacher may be assigned in a subject area for which he/she is not endorsed if the school district requests and receives a Letter of Authorization from the Board.
 - d. Other professional staff must hold certificates appropriate to their assignments.
2. The Board has approved the following routes through which the underprepared teacher may receive the appropriate endorsement:
 - a. Teachers may be endorsed if they complete a major, minor, or composite in the subject area corresponding to their assignment, or
 - b. Teachers may choose to complete a State Board of Education approved inservice program in the subject matter area, or
 - c. Teachers may demonstrate competency in the subject matter area. To be an applicant, an educator must have taught the course during two of the past five years and submit information/verification through the demonstrated competency lines of evidence.

Educators employed at Utah area vocational centers shall be allowed to demonstrate competence for certification and/or endorsements. Administrators, counselors, and instructors may request a competency evaluation if they have been employed in the respective area(s) for two of the past five years. If

certification and/or endorsements are issued, they will be valid for use at area vocational centers only. Educators holding "AVC Only" certification and/or endorsements may not transfer to positions outside of the area vocational center.

3. In addition to the endorsement routes described above, the following provisions allow educators to meet the subject-specific regulations:
 - a. SB166--Grandfather provision - Teachers assigned to teach classes for more than the previous three years, during which time they were not endorsed, may be exempted from the endorsement requirement by applying on forms available through the USOE Certification Office. An EXEMPTION is made to the requirement for the misassigned class(es) only and is valid only in Utah. (Effective 1988.)
 - b. Eminence or Special Qualification Authorization - "Eminently qualified" individuals may teach no more than two periods a day in accordance with the policy passed by the State Board of Education in 1975. This authorization must be renewed annually.
 - c. Special Authorization - Individuals in any educational program who are assigned to teach out of their area(s) of preparation may be given special authorization to teach no more than two classes per day in any one subject if they have at least 9 quarter hours of state approved course work in the assigned subject area. Authorization may be extended for two additional years provided that the teacher complete 9 quarter hours of approved course work each year. At the end of the three year period, the teacher must be eligible for an endorsement in the subject area or shall no longer be permitted to teach the subject.
 - d. Restricted Endorsement - Individuals assigned to teach several subjects in small necessarily existent or rural secondary schools, alternative high schools, homebound teaching programs, special education/resource teachers who teach academic subjects, adult education high school completion programs, or other similar circumstances must hold a Basic or Standard Certificate with endorsement(s) in one or more core subjects plus not fewer than nine (9) quarter hours of state-approved college or inservice course work in each of the subject areas in which they are assigned. Teachers in the categories described above will receive a Restricted Endorsement valid for the specific assignment only.
 - e. Letter of Authorization - By the beginning of the 1988-89 school year and thereafter, if a secondary or middle level teacher is assigned in a subject area for which he/she is not endorsed, and cannot qualify under the above mentioned endorsement routes, it will be necessary for the school district to request a Letter of Authorization to continue the assignment.

PENALTY FOR NON-COMPLIANCE

If the individuals do not meet any of the requirements for certification, endorsement, exemption, or authorization, state funds may be withheld. If the recommendation of the Certification Committee of the Utah State Board of Education is for reduction of state funding, the information will be transmitted, after approval by the Board, to the School Finance Section of the Utah State Office of Education.

SUBJECT: DEMONSTRATED COMPETENCY AND LINES OF EVIDENCE

In response to your inquiry, listed below are the procedures to assist you in obtaining additional subject matter endorsement(s). These procedures require that you submit evidence demonstrating subject matter competency. Please be aware that in order to be eligible to apply for demonstrated competency, you must have taught (under contract) for two years in the subject within the previous five-year period. This experience must have taken place in UTAH. Lines of evidence may include any or all of the following:

1. Any college courses in the subject matter area (official or legible copy of transcript).
2. Any inservices courses in the subject matter area.
3. Special Methods Courses.
4. The recommendation of your principals and others, which must be specific to the subject.
5. A passing score from a standardized test in the subject in which endorsement is sought.
6. Other lines of evidence such as:
 - a. Student test scores on achievement tests in the subject.
 - b. Supportive letters from students, specific to the subject.
 - c. Supportive letters from parents, specific to the subject.
 - d. Peer review by colleagues, specific to the subject.
 - e. Course outlines.

CURRICULUM CERTIFICATION INFORMATION

On January 6, 1984, the State Board of Education approved a policy which requires that beginning with the 1988-89 school year, teachers will be required to hold subject specific endorsements for the required courses to which they have been assigned. In order to assure quality teaching and at the same time provide for a variety of certification options, the Board has approved the following routes through which the underprepared teacher may receive the appropriate endorsement:

1. Teachers may be endorsed if they complete a major, minor, or composite in the subject area corresponding to their assignment, or
2. Teachers may choose to complete a State Board of Education approved inservice program in the subject matter area, or
3. Teachers may demonstrate competency in the subject matter area if they have taught two of the past five years in that subject and submit information/verification through the demonstrated competency lines of evidence.

Any one of the above options may be selected by underprepared teachers to meet the requirements of the State Board policy.

Any class not having an approved assignment code can be assigned to the most applicable subject and assignment area by the district. Many elective subjects fall into this category; i.e., American Problems, Man and His Environment, Creative Writing, etc.

A teacher need only have one of the required certificates and only one of the required endorsements if more than one is listed.

- [] 6. Understand developmental reading skills in relation to students' different reading levels and needs.
- [] 7. Recognize the different levels of maturity with special understanding of the interests and tastes of young people.
- [] 8. Motivate a variety of language-related experiences such as observing, listening, speaking and recording to reinforce content area reading.
- [] 9. Teach the special language of the subject matter and vocabulary essential to concept developments.
- [] 10. Facilitate students' awareness of the relationship of reading to future educational or occupational choices.

Coursework taken prior to 1978 will need to be evaluated because of the important research completed since then. Such validated practices should be incorporated into classroom instruction.

2. A minimum of 12 quarter hours shall be required in geography (including physical and cultural).
3. A minimum of 24 quarter hours shall be distributed over the remaining five areas with at least 6 quarter hours in each including an introductory or overview course in the following areas:
 - *economics
 - *political science
 - *psychology
 - *sociology or anthropology
4. Additional hours shall be acquired in any of the social sciences; i.e., anthropology, economics, geography, history, political science, psychology, and sociology, to reach the minimum requirement of 69 quarter hours.
5. At least one course in social studies methodology must be completed which may be from the school of education, in any of the cognate areas, but may not be applied toward the minimum 69 quarter hours.

An endorsement in any of the social sciences without a composite requires a minimum of 24 college quarter hours (16 semester hours) or approved inservice courses for secondary and middle school endorsements.
