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ABSTRACT

Each year, a follow-up study is conducted to gather data on the activities and perceptions of students approximately six months after their graduation from Wisconsin's Technical Colleges (WTC). Specifically, the survey seeks to identify the current activities of WTC graduates, determine the extent to which current activities are related to the graduates' educational programs, and provide data to inform career awareness and planning efforts. In 1993, the 16 districts in the WTC system surveyed 15,835 graduates from 1992-93. Responses were received from 13,298 (84%) graduates and were compiled into a statewide report. Results of the study included the following: (1) 60.2% of the graduates were female, while minorities represented 7.3% of the respondents; (2) of the respondents in the labor force, 92% were employed and 80% of these graduates were in jobs related to their training; (3) graduates of the home economics program had the highest percent employed rate at 89%, followed by agribusiness at 87% and health programs at 85%; (4) the median monthly salary for all 1993-93 graduates was \$1,473; and (5) graduates from the service instructional division had the highest median salary at \$1,733, followed by those from technical division at \$1,732 and those from health at \$1,642. 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

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OVERVIEW

Introduction

The Graduate Follow-Up Survey is conducted annually to gather data regarding the activities and perceptions of students approximately six months after their graduation from Wisconsin's Technical Colleges.

The primary objectives of the survey are to identify the current activities of technical college program graduates, to determine the extent to which current activities are related to the graduates' educational programs, to provide information to be used as tools in career awareness and planning efforts for those making or assisting in career decisions, and to provide data to facilitate program planning, evaluation and development.

Methodology

The 16 districts in the Wisconsin Technical College System surveyed graduates of programs in their respective districts. The survey was conducted between October and December, 1993. A total of 15,835 graduates were surveyed statewide with 13,298 responding, resulting in a response rate of 84 percent. These responses were submitted to the Wisconsin Technical College System Board for compilation of this statewide report. A copy of the survey instrument is included as Appendix A. Basic concepts and measures used throughout the report are defined below.

The *labor force* includes all employed and unemployed individuals except those who are unemployed and not seeking employment. A person is considered *employed* if he or she worked for pay or profit at the time of the survey. Individuals in any of these groups may be employed full-time or part-time. Full-time employment is defined as 35 or more hours per week; part-time employment is less than 35 hours per week. A person is considered unemployed if he or she performed no work for pay or profit at the time of the survey but was looking for work.

Survey respondents who are employed classify their jobs as related or not related to the training they received. In the follow-up data tables beginning on page 9, respondents who indicate their job is related are counted in the *employed related* category. Thus, the employed related category is a subset of the employed category.

Monthly salary figures are reported for respondents who indicate they are employed full-time in jobs related to their training. The salary range is based on the lowest and the highest reported figures. The *median salary* is the mid-point of salaries reported with half of the salaries below and half above the mid-point.



DEMOGRAPHIC COMPOSITION OF 1992-93 GRADUATES

The following table shows the sex and ethnicity of all of the $15,835\ 1992-93$ graduates by type of degree granted and by instructional division. There are 3,309 more females than males. Minorities represented 7.3 percent of all graduates, while 1.8 percent of the graduates did not report their ethnicity. (Please note N/R means Not Reported.)

AGE GROUPS OF GRADUATES


The largest number of graduates (5,836) is in the 20-24 year age group, which represents 36.8 percent of the total.

SATISFACTION WITH TRAINING


Graduates rated the training they received. Of the graduates responding, 96 percent indicated that they were satisfied or very satisfied with their training, and 4 percent stated that they were unsatisfied or very unsatisfied.





EMPLOYMENT STATUS

Of the respondents who are in the labor force, 92 percent are employed and 8 percent are unemployed. Within the group who are employed, 80 percent indicated that their jobs are related to the training received, and 20 percent reported that their jobs are not related to the training received.




20% Unrelated

EMPLOYMENT LOCATION

As indicated below, 92 percent of the graduates who responded to the survey are employed in Wisconsin, 5 percent are employed out—of—state, and 4 percent did not indicate where they are employed. Of those employed in Wisconsin, 79 percent are employed in the technical college district where they received their training, and 21 percent are employed in another district.

Not in Technical College District of Their Attendance, but in Wisconsin 21%




EMPLOYMENT RELATED TO TRAINING BY INSTRUCTIONAL DIVISION

As shown in the chart on the following page, the majority of graduates who responded to the survey obtained employment in occupations related to their training. Graduates of Home Economics and Agribusiness programs had the highest percent employed related rate of 89 percent and 87 percent respectively, but had the second and third lowest number of employed graduates, 571 and 319. Health program graduates had the next highest percent employed related rate of 85 percent, and had the highest number of employed graduates with 3,932. Technical program graduates ranked next with 80 percent of the 935 employed graduates obtaining employment in a related occupation. Industrial program graduates had an employed related rate of 78 percent with 1,426 graduates employed. Business program graduates had an employed related rate of 76 percent of the 2,236 graduates employed. The Marketing division had an employed related rate of 75 percent for its 776 employed marketing graduates. Graphics and Service program graduates had the lowest employed related rate (70 percent) of their employed graduates, 197 and 757 respectively.



EMPLOYMENT RELATED TO TRAINING BY INSTRUCTIONAL DIVISION








MEDIAN MONTHLY SALARIES FOR INSTRUCTIONAL DIVISIONS
