EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

MISSOURI

According to the 1990 Census:

- The largest percentage of women (21%) were between the ages of 25 to 34.
- 88% of the women were White, 10% were Black, and 1% were American Indian, Asian, or other nationality.
- Women made up 46.6% of the labor force.
- Of the 245,930 children living with one parent, 210,340 lived with a single mother.
- 20% of the male children under 5 years old and 21% of the female children under 5 lived below the poverty level; 18% of all children 6 to 11 years old lived in poverty.
- 63.6% of all female-headed households both with children under age 5 and with children 6 to 11 years old had incomes which fell below the poverty level. 52.3% of the female households with children only under age 5 had incomes below the poverty level.
- Some of the nontraditional occupations for women included police and detectives, telephone installers, geologists, veterinarians, physicians, and lawyers.
(Nontraditional occupations are those in which women comprise 25% or less of the total employed).

In 1992:

- 50% of all high school graduates were women.
- 56% of the total headcount enrollment at the institutions of higher education were women.

- The five occupational categories with the most degrees conferred to women were: business, education, humanities/general education, health, and social science.
- Women received 13,330 bachelors degrees, 4,603 masters, and 290 doctorates.
- At the public institutions, there were 1,170 male professors and 198 female professors. The average salary was \$52,000 for male professors and \$47,000 for female professors.
- At the private institutions, there were 489 male professors and 107 female professors. The average salary was \$58,000 for male professors and \$49,000 for female professors
- 56.7% of the women in Missouri were employed, and the total unemployment rate for females was 5.5%. (40% were not in the civilian labor force).
- 76% of the employed females worked full-time and 24% worked part-time.
- 43% of the women were employed in technical or sales occupations, and 26% were employed in managerial and professional occupations.
- Nursing aides and orderlies, registered nurses, and cashiers are the occupations projected to have the largest rate of growth.

State and national data have been included in this book. In most cases, U.S. information precedes Missouri information.

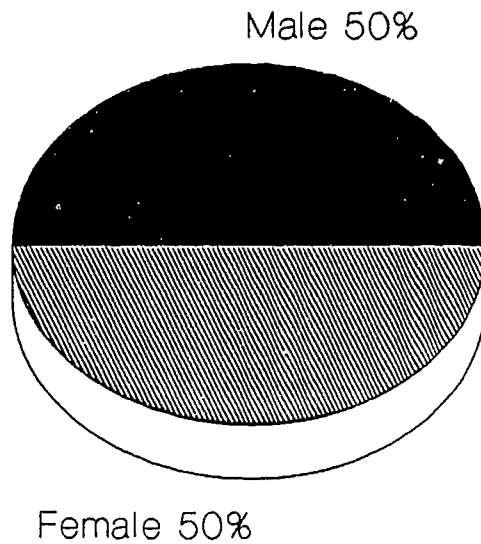

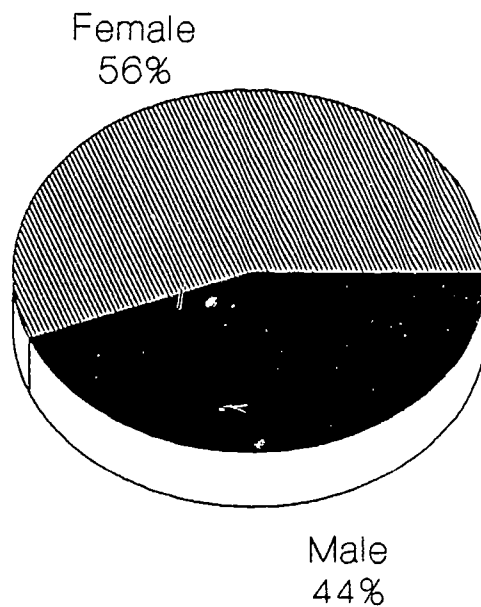

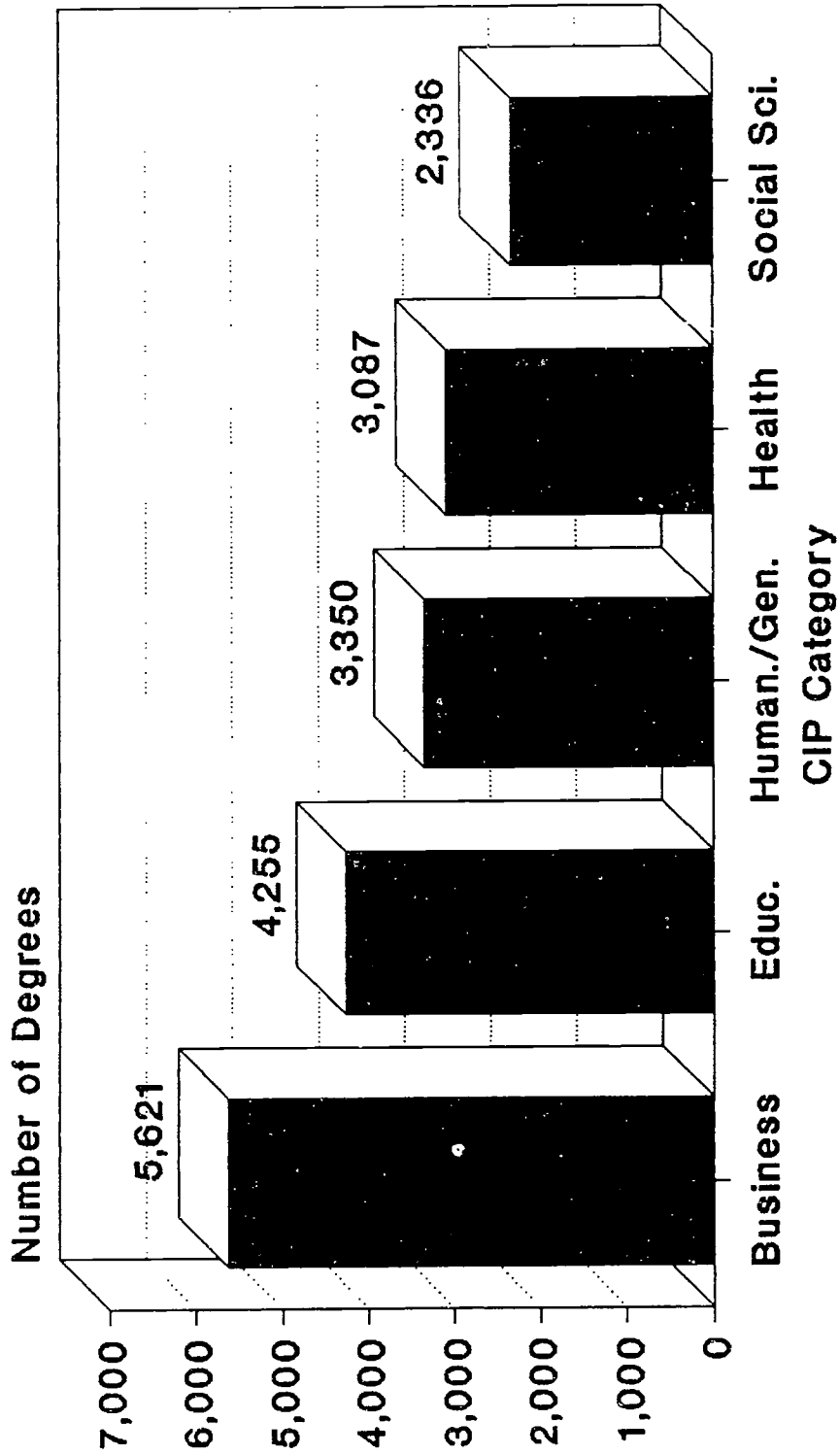

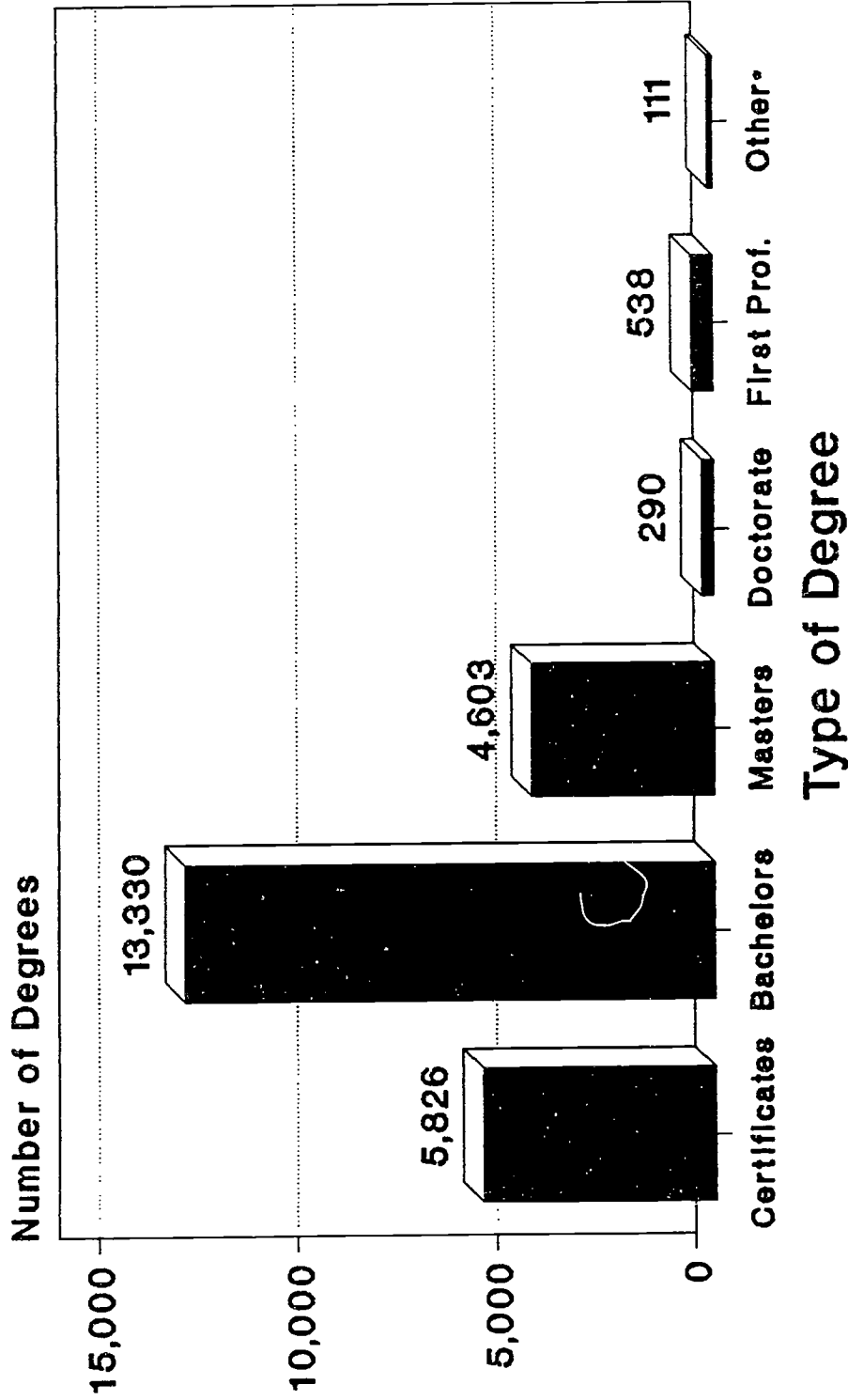

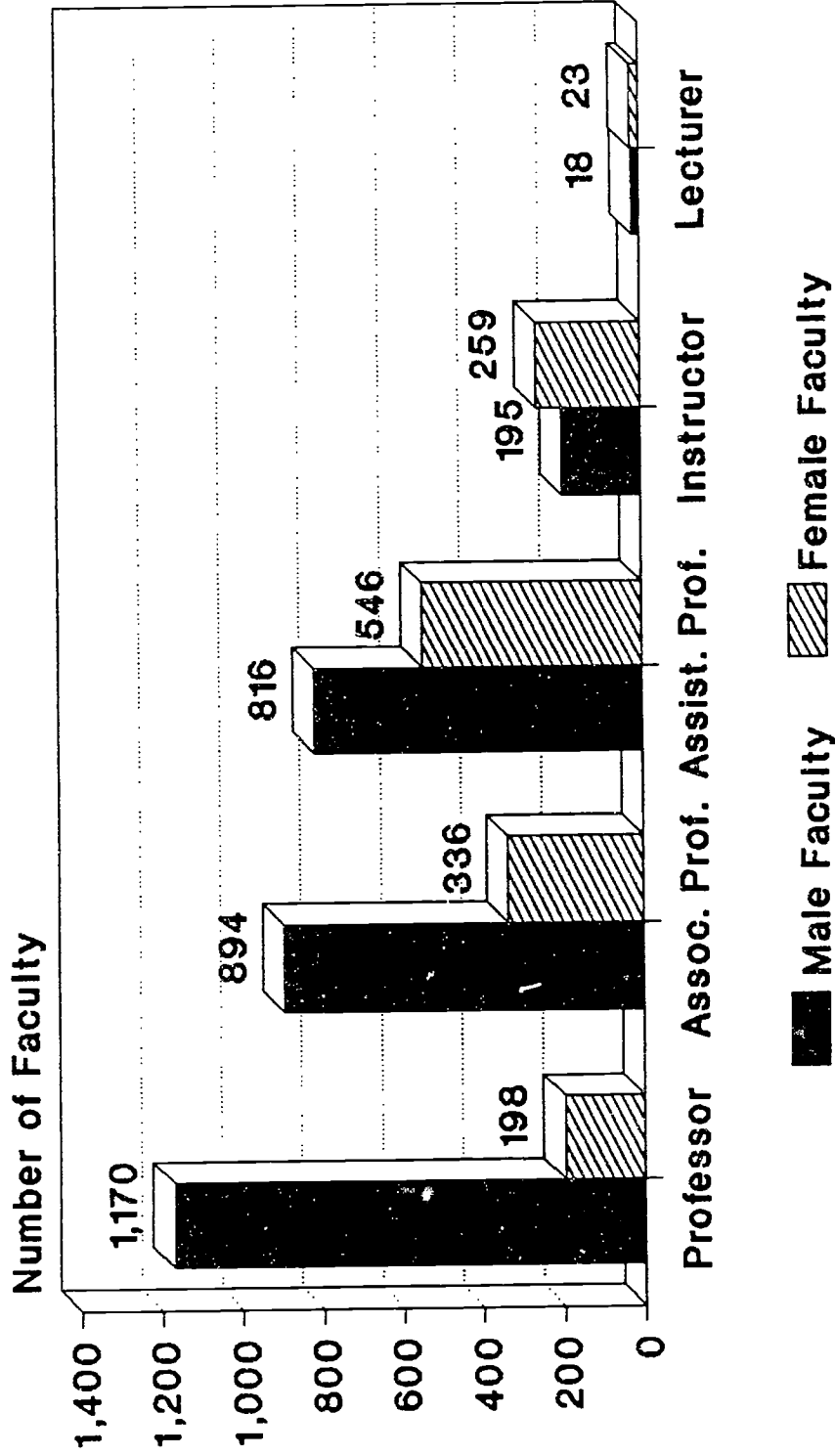

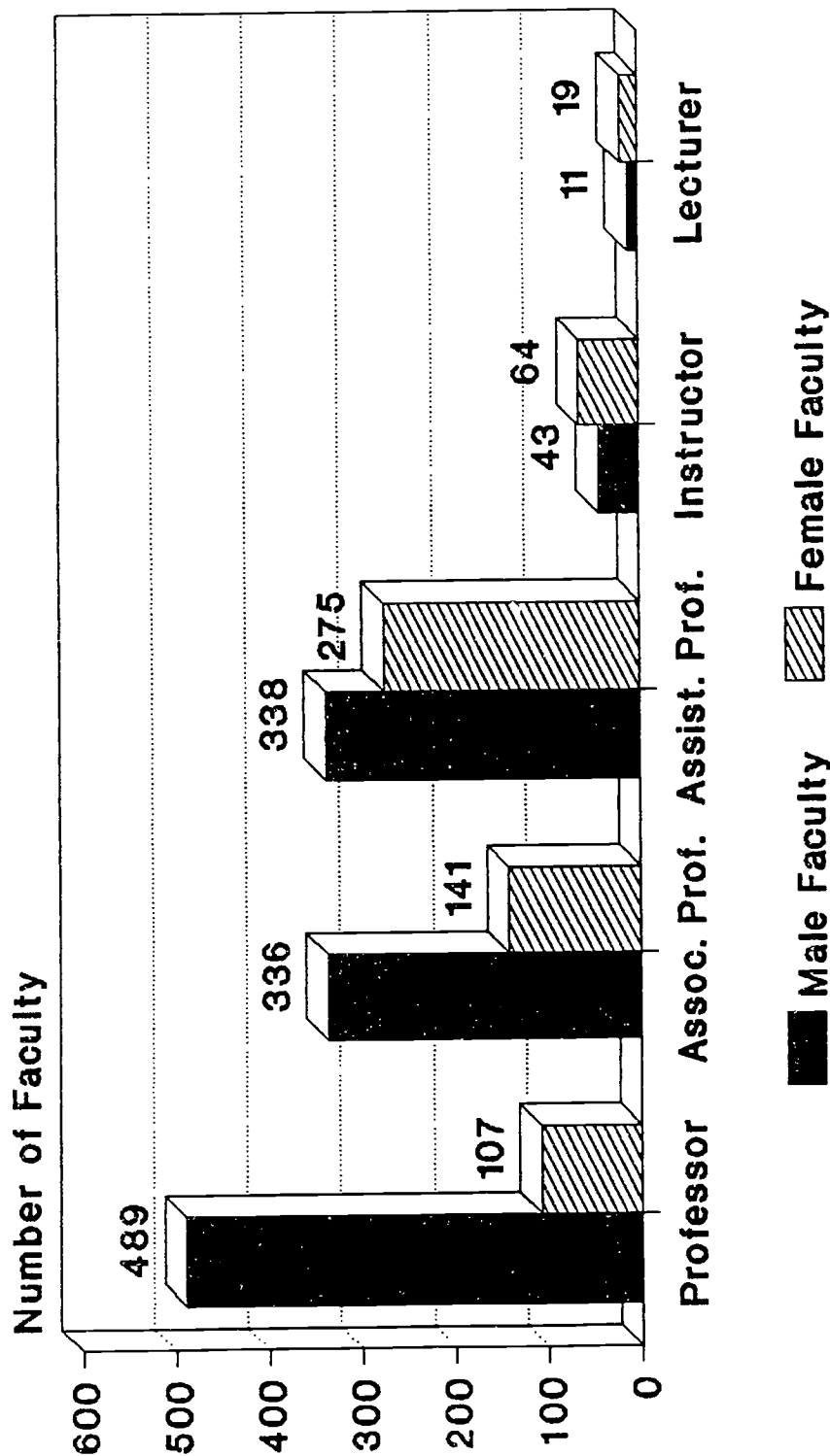

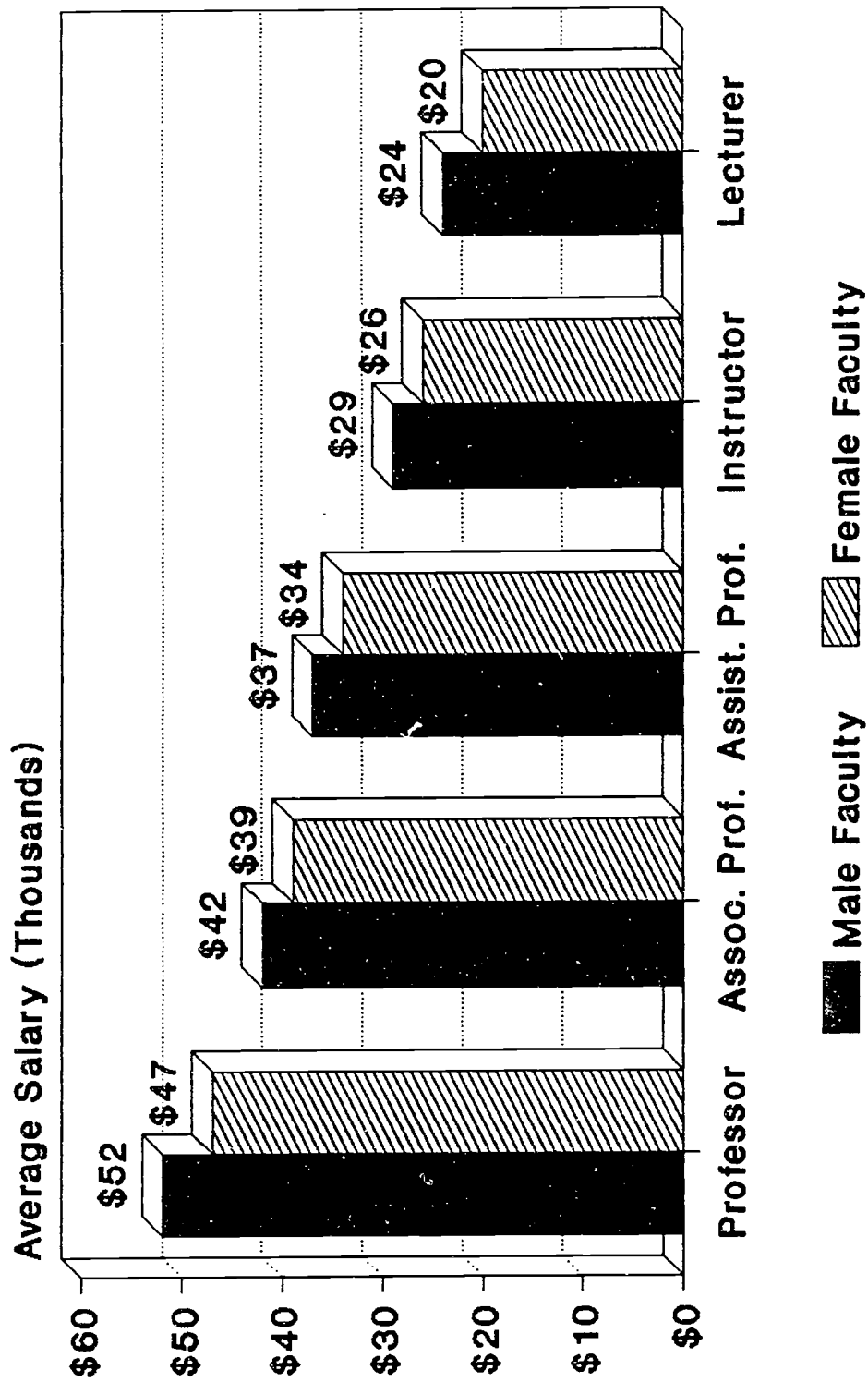

AVERAGE FACULTY SALARIES PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS, FALL 1992



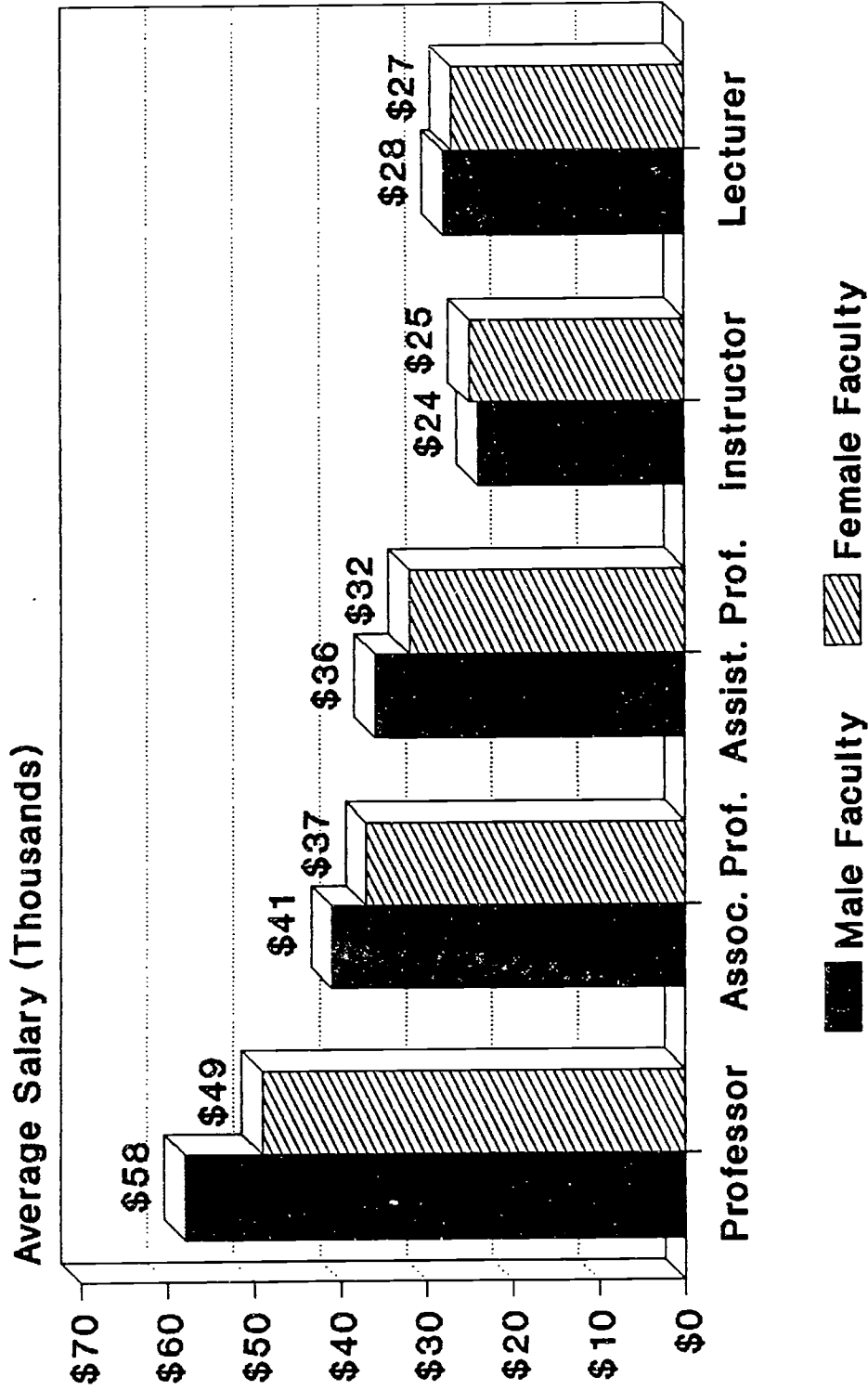

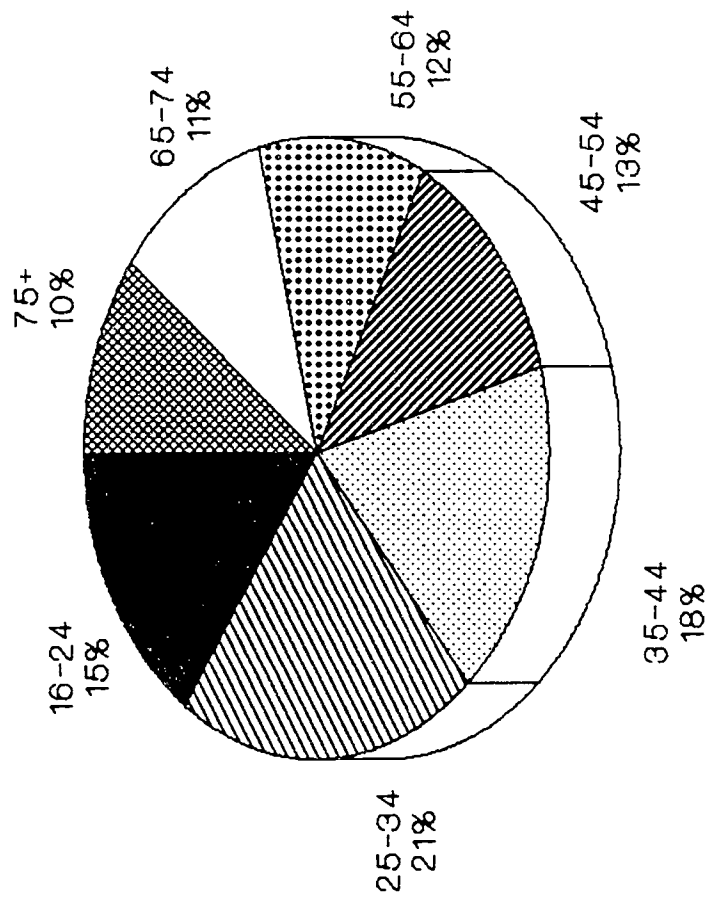

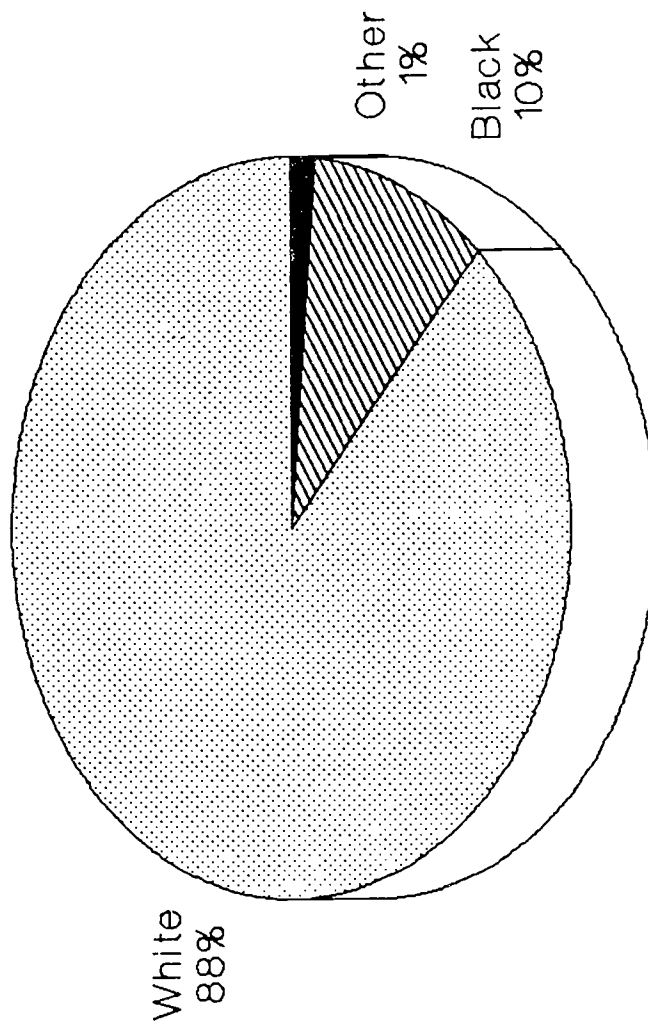
1990 Missouri Census Population

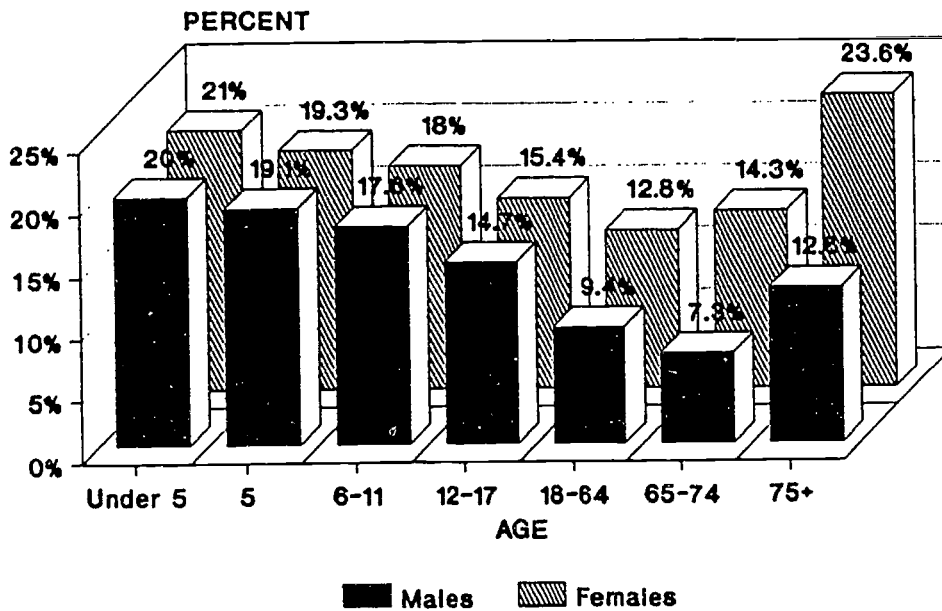

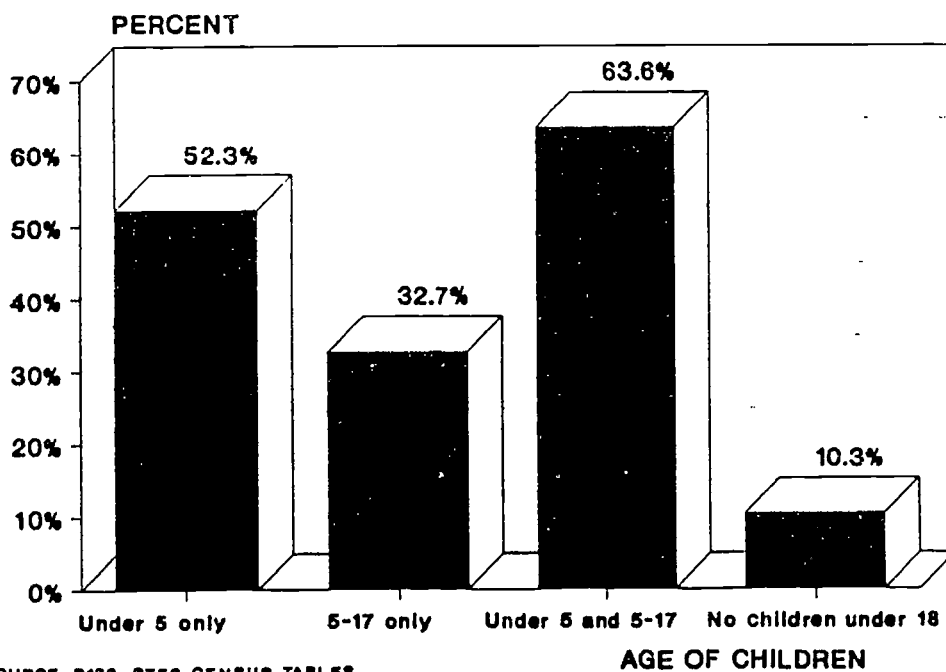

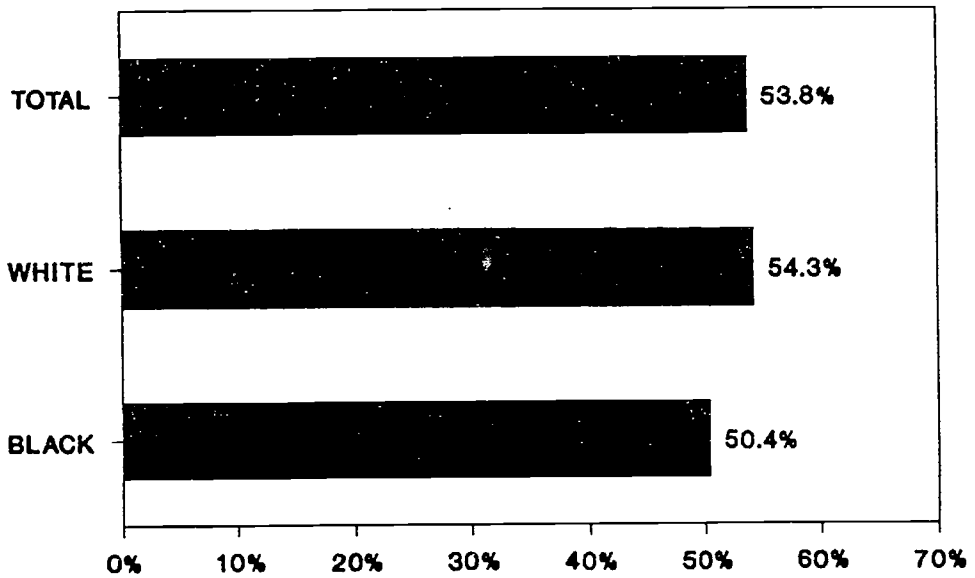

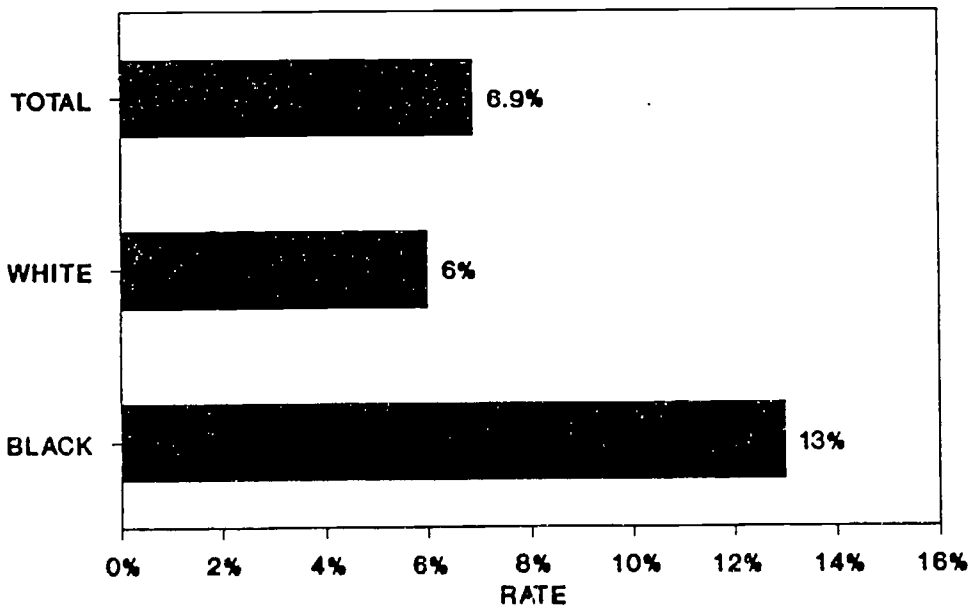

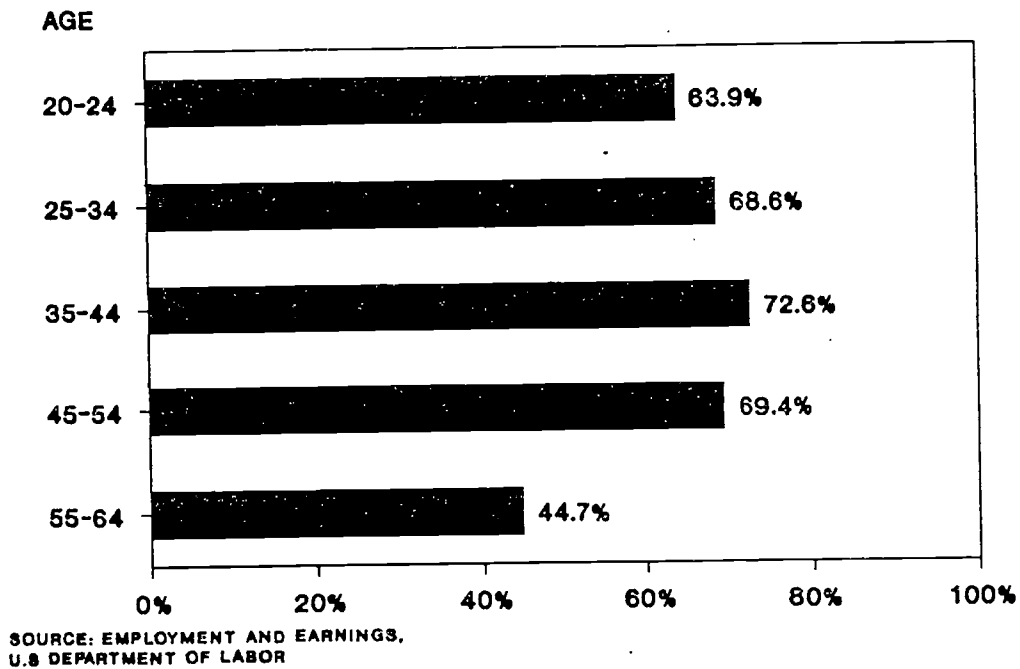
UNEMPLOYMENT RATE FOR U.S. WOMEN BY RACE, 1992



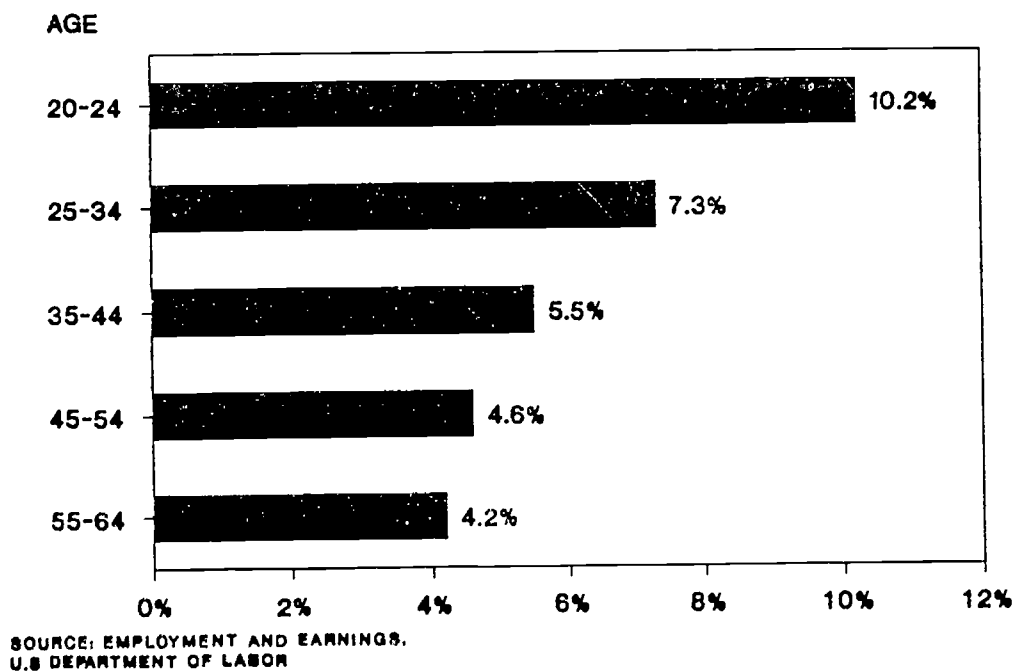

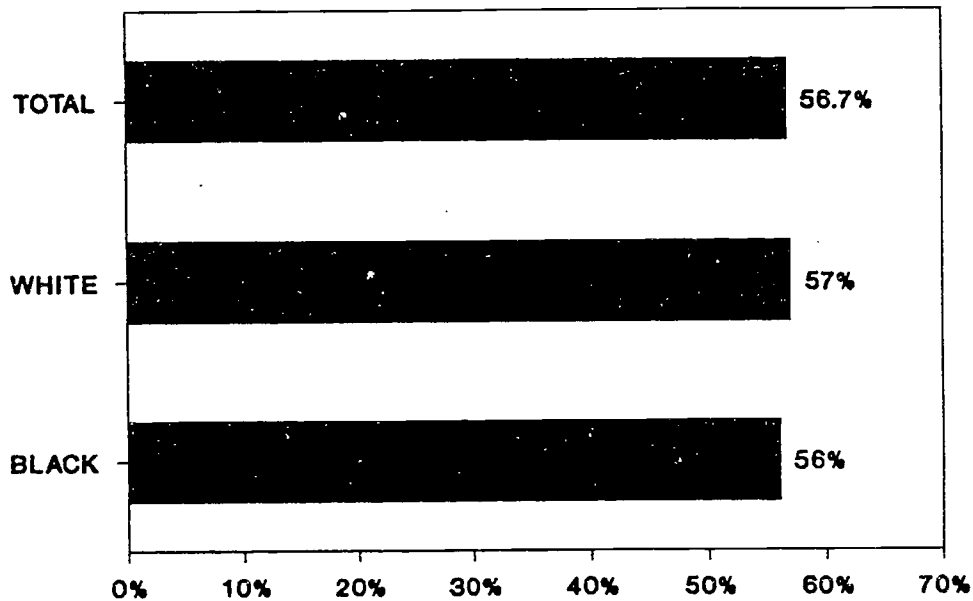

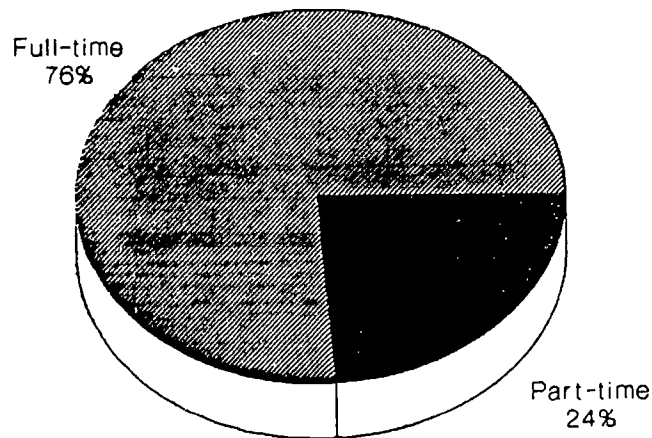

PERCENT OF WOMEN EMPLOYED IN MISSOURI BY RACE, 1992



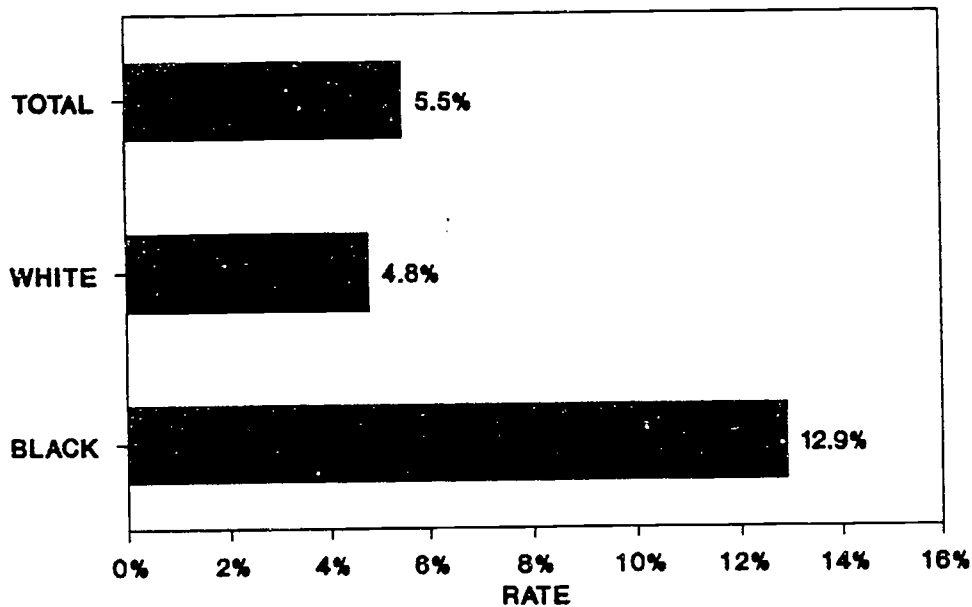

EMPLOYED WOMEN IN MISSOURI BY FULL- AND PART-TIME STATUS, 1992



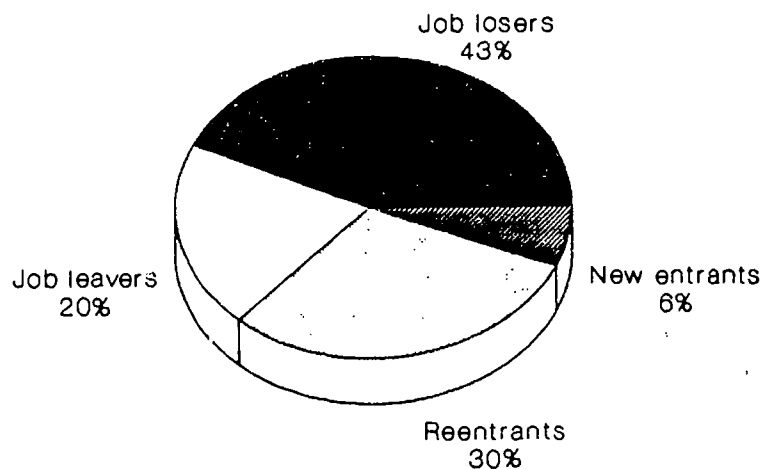

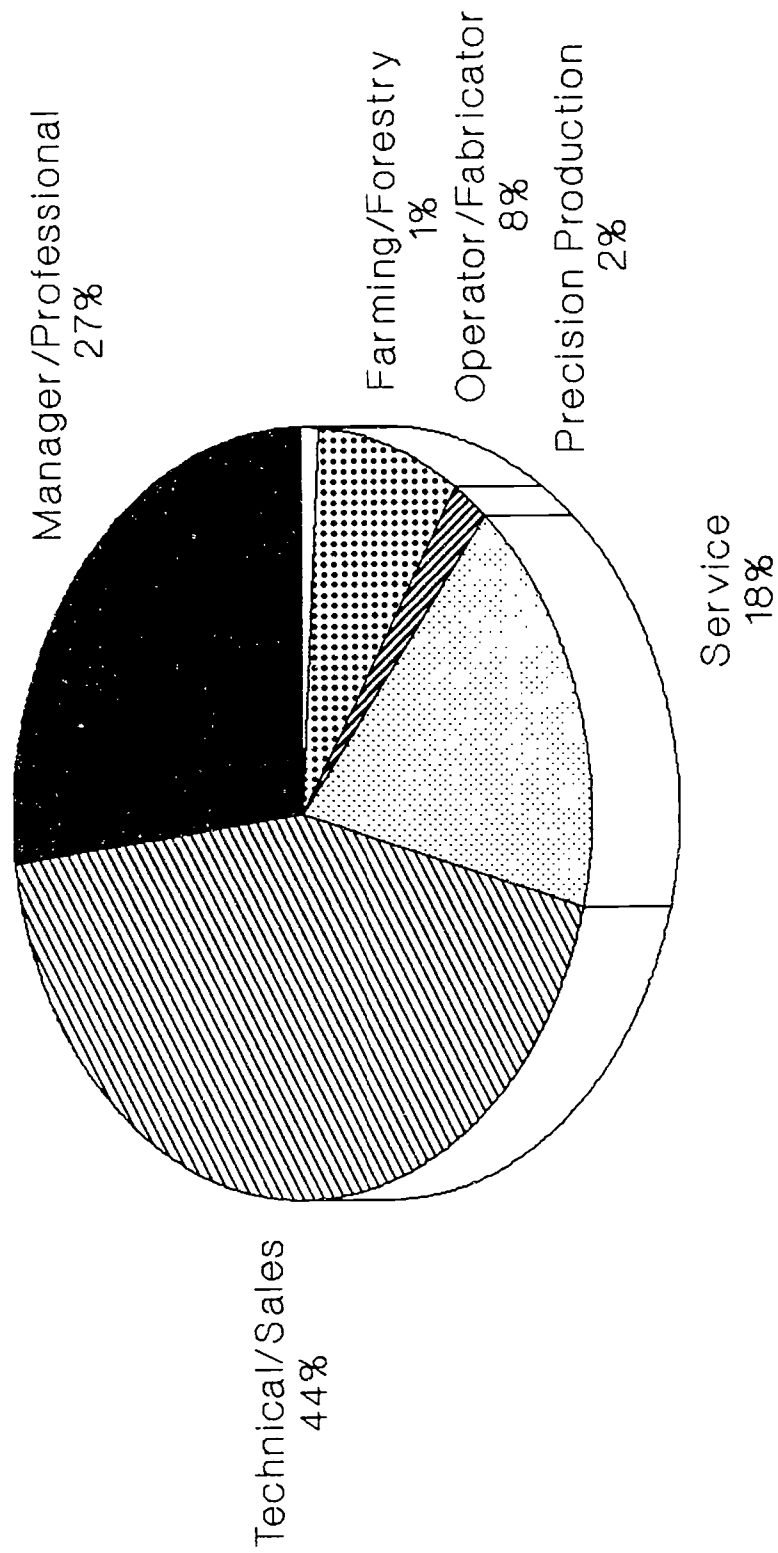

DISTRIBUTION OF EMPLOYED WOMEN IN THE U.S. BY OCCUPATION, 1992

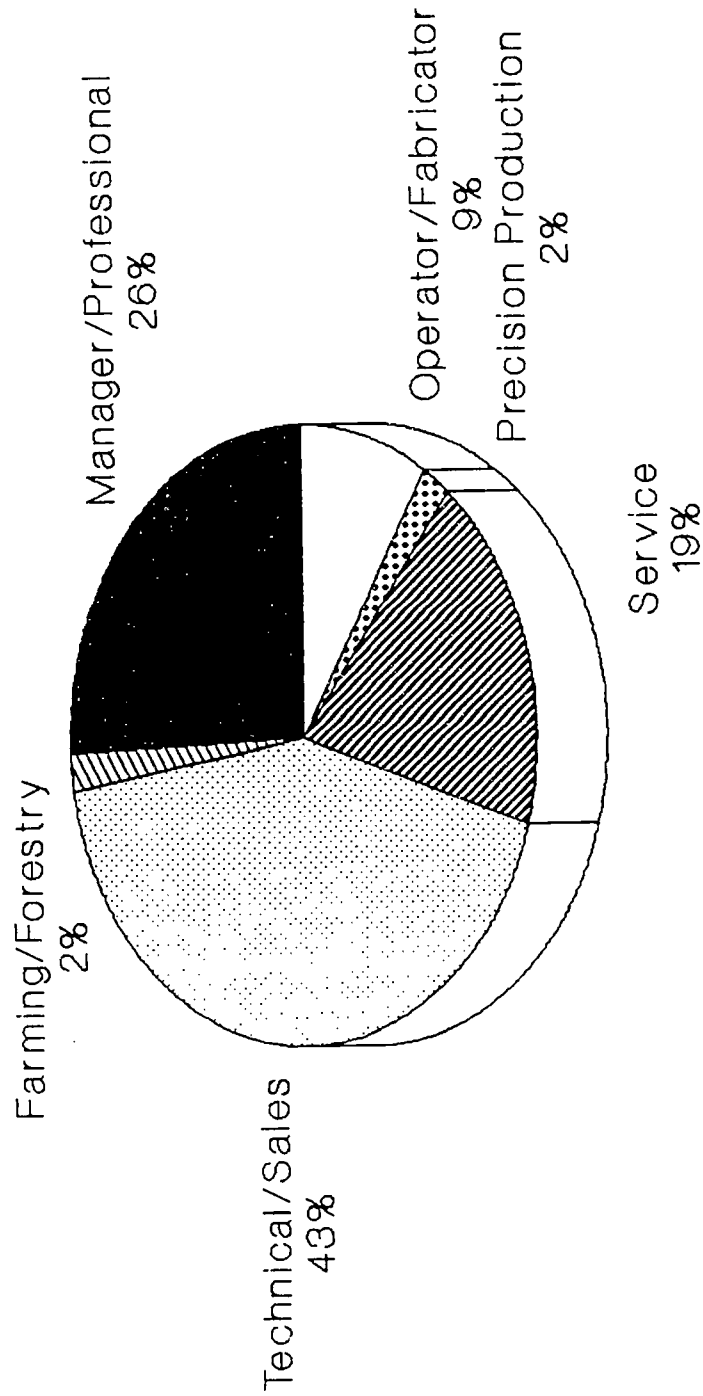

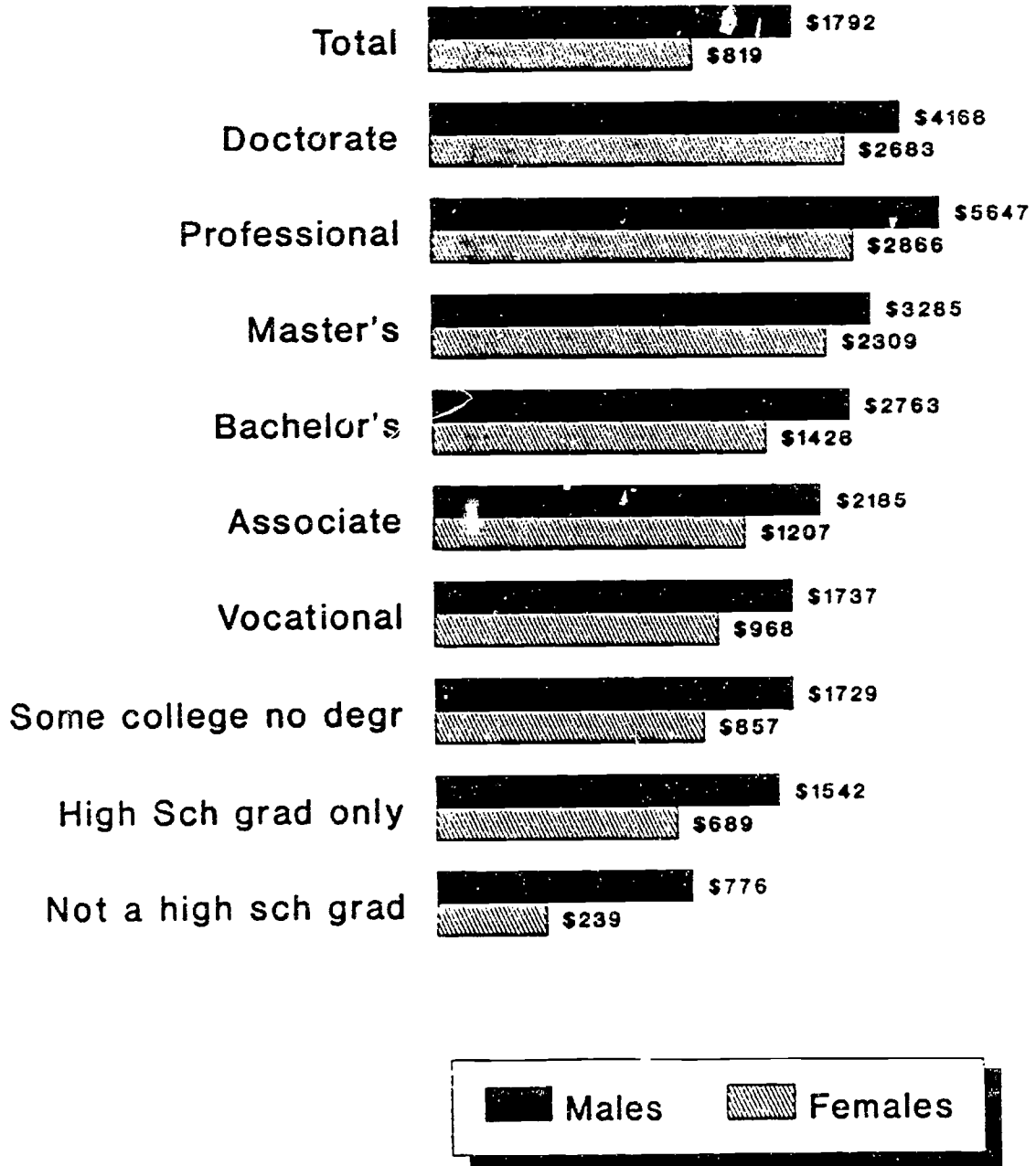

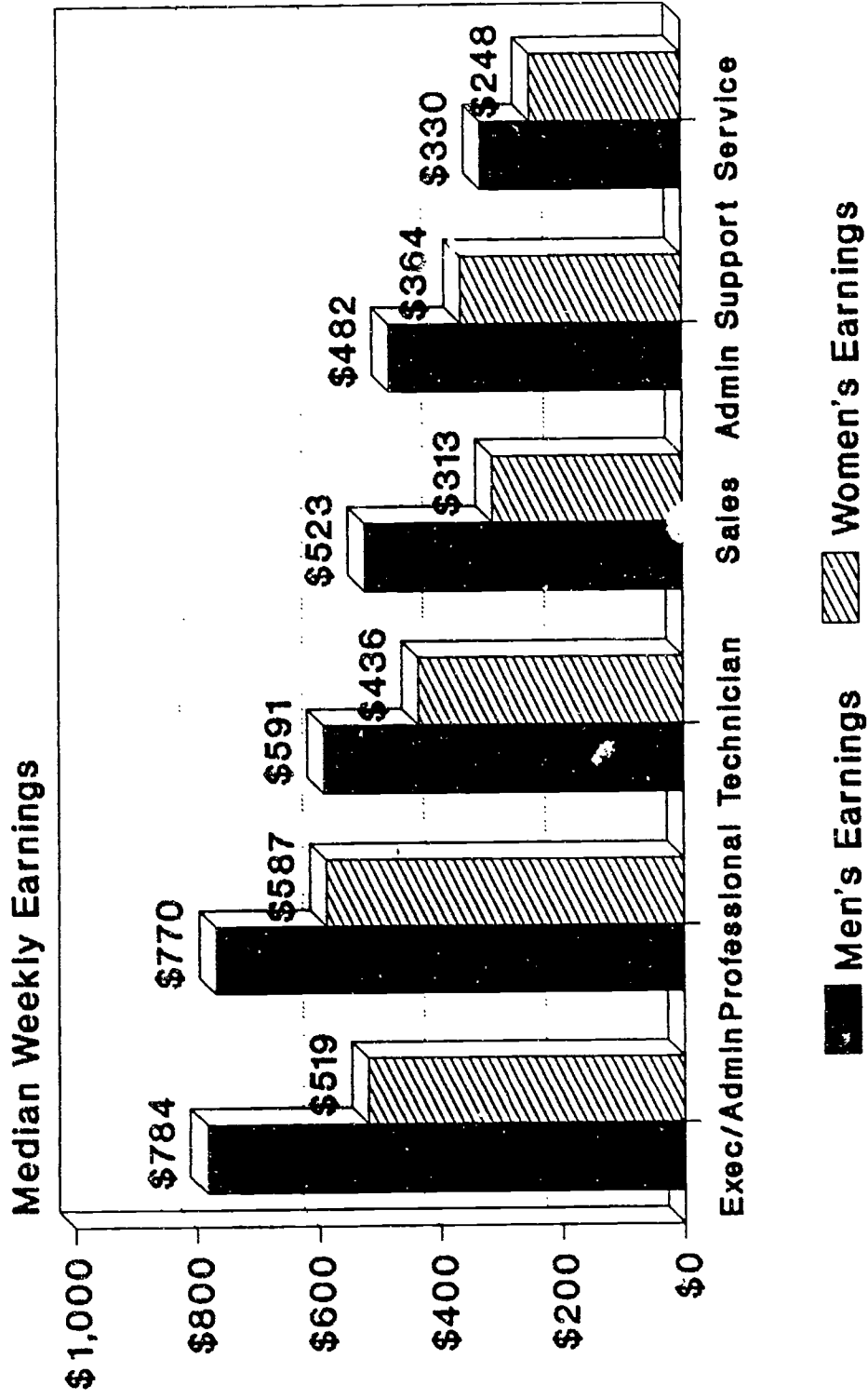

MEAN MONTHLY EARNINGS FOR ADULTS 18 AND OVER IN THE U.S., BY DEGREE LEVEL: 1990

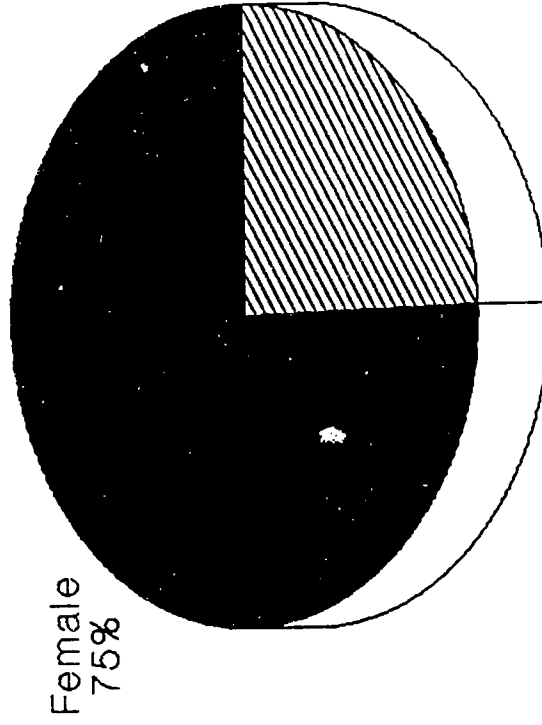

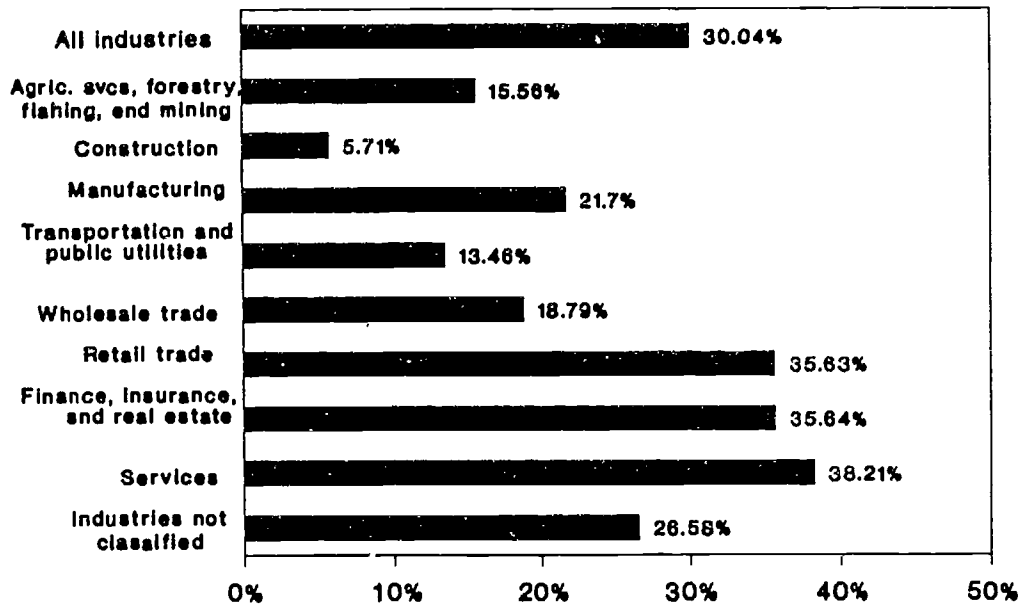

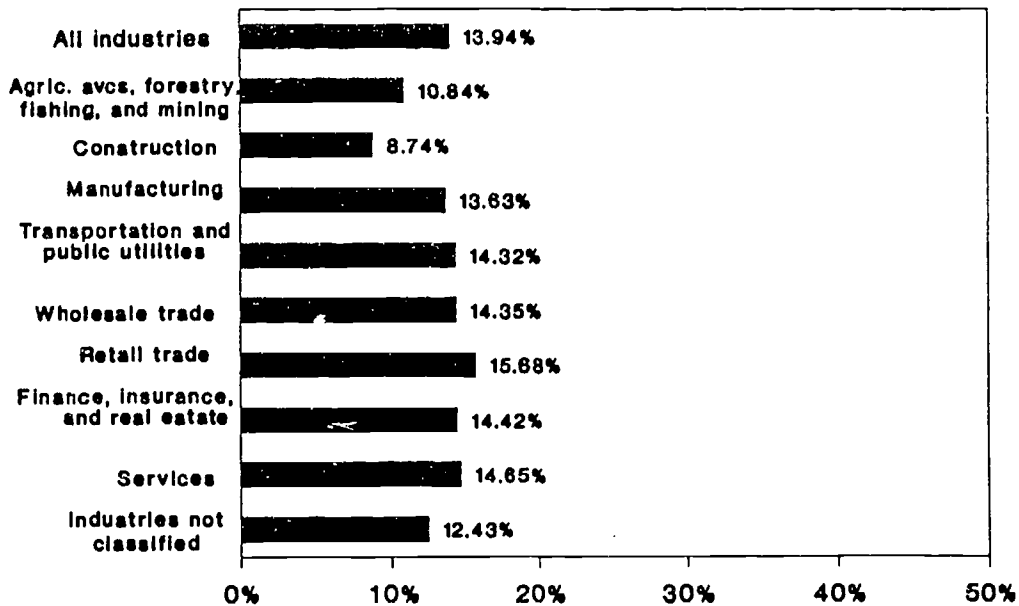

WOMEN-OWNED FIRMS AS A PERCENT OF ALL U.S. FIRMS



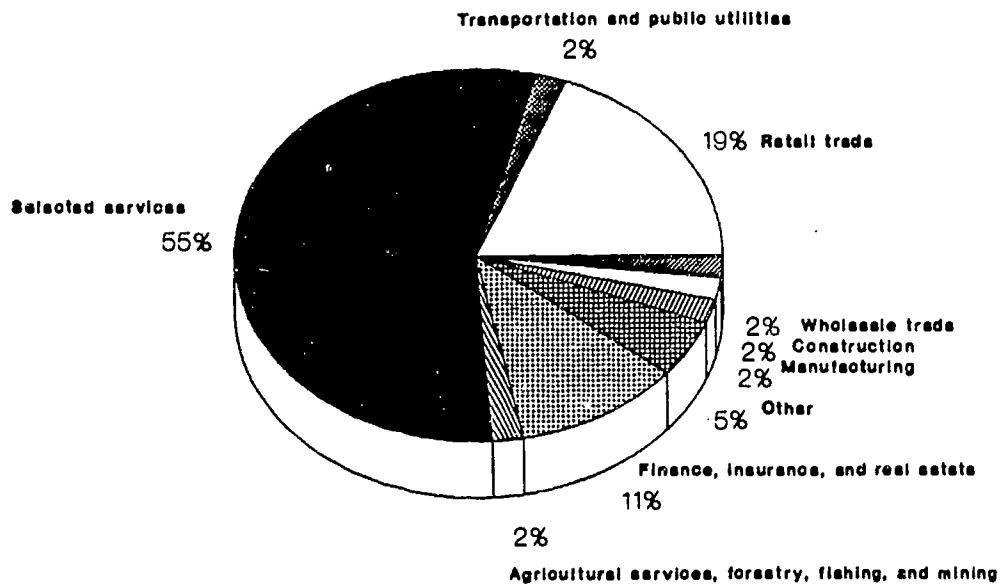

RECEIPTS FROM WOMEN-OWNED FIRMS AS A PERCENT OF RECEIPTS FROM ALL U.S. FIRMS



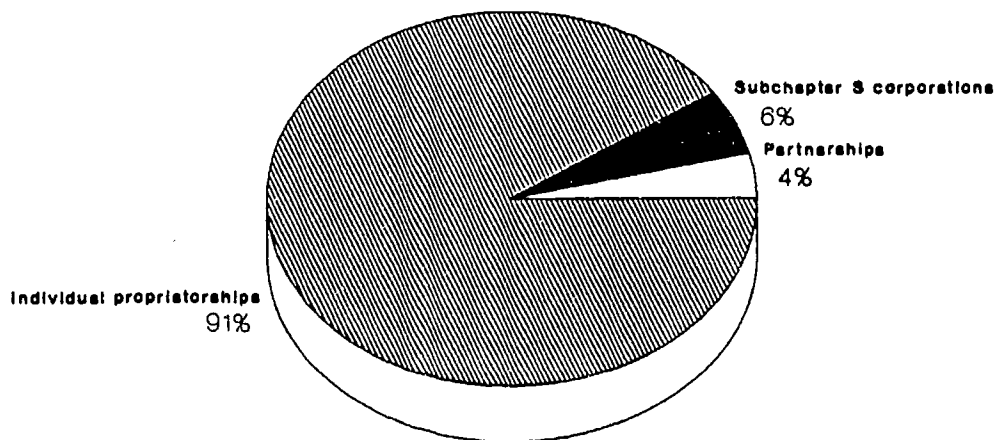

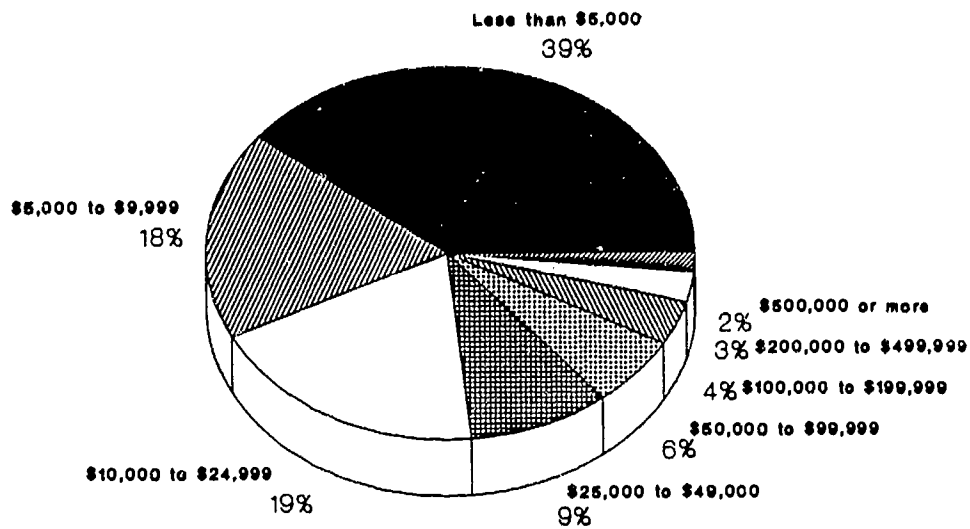
WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESSES IN THE U.S. BY LEGAL FORM OF ORGANIZATION

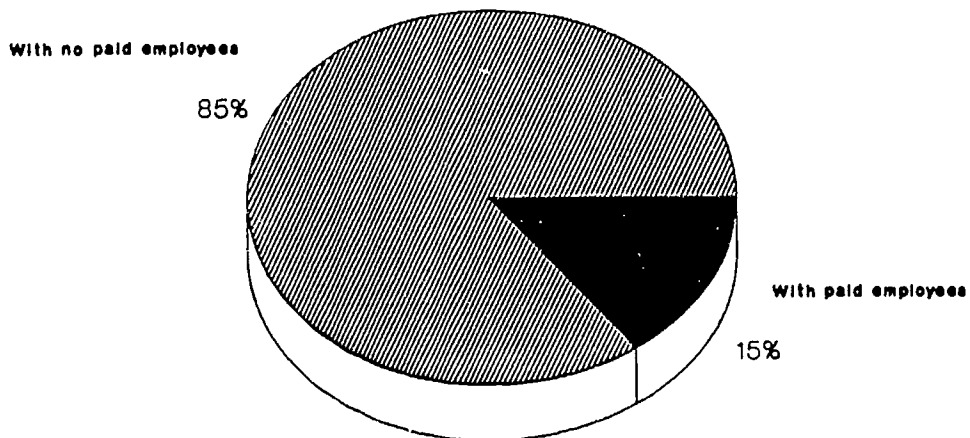

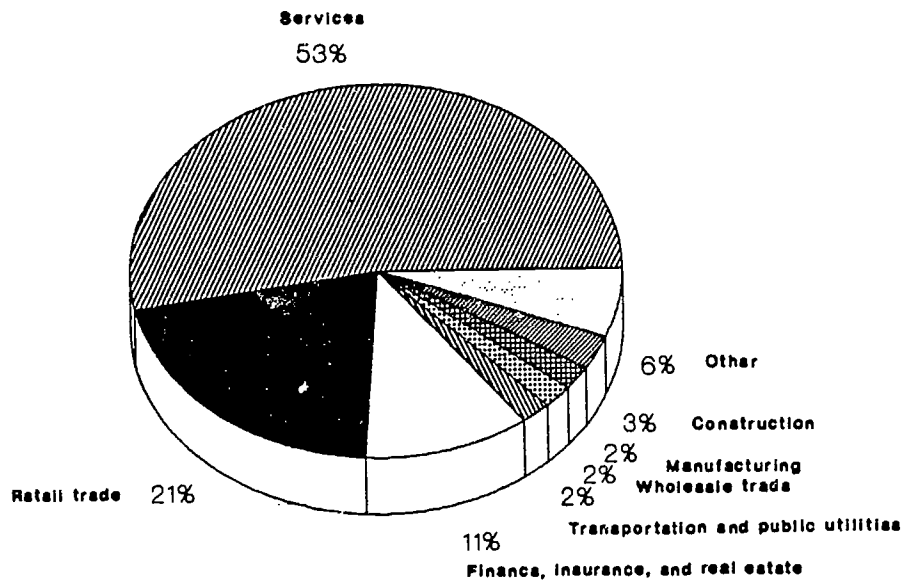

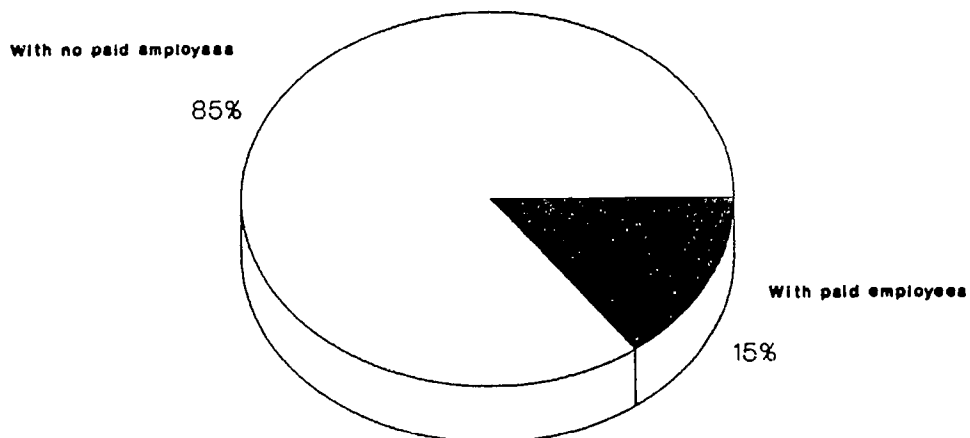

MISSOURI WOMEN IN PUBLIC OFFICE

- * In the 1992 elections, the Missouri House gained seven women for a total of 36.
- * The number of women in the state Senate has declined from two to one; state Senator Pat Danner of Smithville was elected to Congress. She is the state's only congresswoman.
- * In the Missouri House, of the 68 women who filed, 36 won (53%).
- * Of the statewide offices, women hold two--Secretary of State (Judith Moriarty) and State Auditor (Margaret Kelly).
