
ABSTRACT

This report provides statistical information on the characteristics of students who dropped out of North Carolina public schools during the 1992-93 academic year. Statistical data are provided for each of the state's local education agencies in the areas of number of dropouts and dropout rates, as well as demographic data and dropout comparisons between gender and race. Among the data it is shown that: (1) most dropout occurrences were in grades 9 and 10, constituting more than 60 percent of the total dropouts; (2) slightly more than 60 percent of dropouts in grades 1 through 12 were White, whereas Blacks accounted for 30.21 percent; (3) males across all races had higher dropout rates than females; (4) slightly more than 69 percent of dropouts had been enrolled in the general curriculum, whereas approximately 13 percent had been enrolled in an exceptional children's program; (5) the highest percentages of dropouts also possessed the lowest scores in achievement tests--nearly 75 percent scored lower than the 50th percentile; and (6) the most common reasons for dropping out, constituting nearly 54 percent of the total, were academic problems and choosing work over school. INTRODUCTION

The Department of Public Instruction continues it commitment to assist schools across the state in providing the best possible educational services to children at all grade levels, elementary, middle, and high school. The dropout rate is one of the measures of success in educating all of our children. The public schools continue to make progress in keeping students in school, even though higher enrollment is making the actual number of dropouts increase slightly.

Local school systems and the Department have focused on keeping students in the school as the state and the Southeast have historically high numbers of dropouts. The Basic Education Program, approved by legislators in 1985, provides approximately \$30 million each year for local school systems to spend on dropout prevention efforts. These efforts include counseling, additional school social workers, behavior improvement programs, academic enhancement, early identification and intervention, and pregnancy prevention programs.

While the dropout rate is a key indicator of school success, the numbers indicate that we are continuing to loose too many students. The future of our state and nation demands that all children be educated and prepared to become citizens who actively participate in our democracy. North Carolina can not afford to leave even one child behind or to give up hope on even one child.

The information which follows reflects the characteristics of the students who dropped out during 1992-93. The data are intended to provide a basis for designing and implementing programs that meet the needs of at-risk students. As in past years, the demographics are based on the duplicated count of dropouts.

RACE/GENDER CHARACTERISTICS OF DROPOUTS

Slightly more than 60% (60.17%) of dropouts in grades one through twelve were white while 66.13% of the total school population in the first through twelfth grades were white. Black students accounted for 30.21% of students in grades one through twelve, but 35.91% of dropouts in grades one through twelve. American Indian students comprised 1.82% of dropouts and 1.56% of students. Other races (Asian and Hispanic) comprised 2.10% of all dropouts and 2.10% of the students in grades one through twelve.






