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## ABSTRACT

In fall 1992, a survey was sent to students who graduated from Westchester Community College (WCC) in late summer 1991, fall 1991, or spring 1992. The survey sought to collect information on graduates' demographic, educational, and work-related characteristics. This document contains the executive summary and the results of the survey. Of the 883 graduates, 485 returned completed, usable surveys. Survey responses, compared to responses from graduates in previous years, indicate the following: (1) demographic changes were slight from the previous year, with the percentage of females remaining a few percentage points ahead of males; the percentage of Blacks decreasing slightly and the percentage of Hispanics increasing slightly; (2) 35% of the 1992 graduates were under 22 years of age, and 36.7 were between 22 and 29 years old; (3) graduates continued to give WCC high ratings with respect to their overall college experience, the quality of instruction, and the courses in their major; (4) for the first time in 5 years, the average salary for those employed full-time decreased, dropping from \$27,440 in 1991 to \$25,037 in 1992; (5) the percentage of graduates employed full-time increased from 41.2% in 1991 to 46.2% in 1992; (6) the percentage of transfers students remained nearly constant in 1991 (63.6%) and 1992 (63.5%), though the percentage of full-time students in this group dropped; (7) student services receiving the righest rankings were library services, reading and math skill facilities, and computer services; and (8) 78.8% of the respondents indicated that their goals had been met by their college degree. Data on demographics, residence patterns, college major, salaries, transfer status, employers, and transfer institutions: and the survey instrument are appended. (KP)

#### Dear Reader:

We are pleased to present this report on our 1992 graduating class. The 883 students who received a degree were drawn from virtually all of the 44 municipalities in Westchester County and reflect rather closely the demographic characteristics for Westchester County in terms of gender and ethnic background.

Over three-fifths (63.5%) of those who responded to the survey reported that they were attending a four-year college, and of these students almost three-fourths (73.1%) reported attending full-time.

Almost seventy percent (67.8%) of the respondents are employed, either full-time or part-time. Those working full-time, are employed at 123 different companies in Westchester County; another 34 companies in New York State, but outside the county; and 13 firms located in other states. The mean salary for full-time jobs taken within a year of graduation was \$25,037.

It is gratifying to know that their evaluation of the College and the services it provides continues to remain remarkably high. In evaluating "WCC's Overall Quality of Instruction," 97% were either "very satisfied" (65.1%) or "satisfied" (31.7%). With regard to their "Overall WCC Experience," 98% were either "very satisfied" (73.4%) or "satisfied" (24.3%).

The accomplishments of our graduates are a great source of pride to us. We believe you will share these feelings as you read this report.

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## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION

The 1992 WCC graduates and the respondents to the "1992 Study of the Graduates" share much in common with previous graduating classes. Several trends are underway, however, that distinguish this class from last year's graduates and the graduating classes in the last four years.

Demographically, the changes are slight from the previous year. The percentage of female graduates remains a few points ahead of the males. A gradual trend of increasing female graduates is leveling off, going from 53.7% in 1989 to 54.9% in 1990 to 55.5% in 1991 and then to 55.4% in 1992.

The percentage graduating by ethnic background decreased slightly for Blacks and increased slightly for Hispanics. Almost nine percent (8.7%) of the 1992 graduates were Black compared to 11.8% for the 1991 class, and 7.4% of the 1992 graduates were Hispanic compared to 6.0% of the 1991 class.

What is different from the previous graduating class, is the decrease in the percentage of graduates in the age bracket under 22. The percentage under 22 decreased from 39.1% for the 1991 graduates to 34.5% for the 1992 graduates. This lower percentage is much closer to the 1989 class (35.8%) and, therefore, does not represent a trend at this point.

The respondents to the 1992 survey continued to give unusually high marks to WCC on several broad questions concerning the college and the experience they had while attending. As with the five previous graduating classes (1987 through 1991), at least 96% of the 1992 graduates gave a "very satisfied" or "satisfied" rating when asked about their "Overall WCC Experience." With regard to the "Overall Quality of Instruction", 97% of the 1992 graduates were either "very satisfied" or "satisfied," a rating very similar to that given by the graduating classes of the five previous years.

In evaluating "Courses in their Major," at least 92% in any of the last five graduating classes were "very satisfied" or "satisfied." In the case of the 1992 graduates, specifically, 98% were satisfied or better.

One area where the graduates have been expressing increased dissatisfaction is, "The Availability of Courses of Interest to You." Since 1987 the percentage of respondents giving a "very satisfied" or "satisfied" rating has dropped from 94% to 85%.

Employment: With regard to those employed, the responses by the Class of 1992 show that for the first time in the last five years the average salary for those employed full-time decreased going from a mean of \$27,440 in 1991 to 25,037 in 1992.



On the positive side, the percentage employed full-time has started to rise from a downward previous trend 56.4% in 1989 to 46.5% in 1990 to 41.2% in 1991 to 46.2 in 1992. The percentage employed part-time decreased going on 30.2% in 1991 and down to 21.7 in 1992. This phenomenon, no doubt, reflects the slowdown in the Westchester economy over the last several years and an unemployment rate of 5.8% in August, 1992 from a low of 2.9% in 1988.

An unusually high percentage of graduates, however, continue to report being "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with their jobs (79.5%) and more than two-thirds (67.6%) were either "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with their opportunity to advance. Just over three-fourths (72.1%) felt that their WCC education prepared them for their current job either to a "great degree" or "to a slight degree."

Over three-fourths (77.5%) of the graduates who are working continue to find employment in Westchester County; this percentage is up slightly from last year (75.5% for the 1991 class). Another 15.2% of the 1992 graduates were employed outside of Westchester, but inside New York. This means that 92.7% of the 1992 graduates who are working are employed in New York, a percentage a little higher than the previous graduating class (90.5%). Only 5.8% were employed outside the state.

Education: The percentage transferring to a four-year college remained almost constant over last year's figures with 63.5% reporting they had transferred to a four-year college compared to 63.6% in 1991.

For the 1992 graduates, however, the percentage who reported attending full-time (73.1%) has dropped 5% compared to the previous year (78.1%). Those attending full-time are to be noted for two characteristics in particular: (1) the unusually high percentage of those who are under 22 (92.3%) attending full-time, and (2) the drop of the percent of those who are males attending full-time (75.4%) compared to 90.0% in 1991.

Responses to a set of questions exploring factors important in facilitating transfers showed that the social environment of the four-year college was considered to be the least important factor of seven possible factors by the respondents. Only 14.8% identified social environment as "very important." The factors that were considered "very important" by the largest percentage of respondents were: (1) availability of program desired (72.2%), (2) location and cost (65.1%), and (3) reputation of college (64.0%).

Also to be noted is that a large percentage of the respondents continuing their education intend to obtain a Bachelor's degree. The percentage for the 1992 graduates was 82.8%, compared to the previous year (78.1%) but still less than 1990 at 86.3 and 86.0 in 1989.



Evaluation of Student Services: Respondents were asked to evaluate nineteen student services. The services which received the highest percentage of "very satisfied" or "somewhat satisfied" responses were Library Services (96.3%), Reading and Math Skill Facilities (94.2%), Computer Services (90.5%), Recreational and Athletic Facilities (88.2%) and Tutorial Services (86.1%). The services with the lowest percentage of "very satisfied" or "somewhat satisfied" responses were Registration (63.4%), Counseling Services (72.4%) and Access to Advisors (72.6%).

Effectiveness of WCC in Helping to Achieve Goals of Respondents: Almost eighty percent (78.8%) of the respondents indicated that their goals had been met by their college degree. This is down from the percentage given by the 1991 graduates (84.1%). When asked what they were, 41.4% said their prime goal was to transfer to a four-year college. Another 37.1% responded that their prime goal was to increase their chances of getting a specific job. Only 16.5% indicated it was to reach other goals such as self-fulfillment.

The graduates who transferred also were asked to evaluate how effective WCC had been in helping them to achieve their transfer goals. Almost ninety-five percent (94.3%) indicated WCC had been "very effective" or "somewhat effective" in helping them to transfer to a four-year college. A smaller percentage, 86.3% indicated WCC had been either "very effective" of "somewhat effective" in helping them to attain skills useful on a job.

Over ninety-five percent (99.4%) felt WCC had been "very effective" or "somewhat effective" in achieving their goal of increased knowledge, and 96.8% felt WCC also had been "very effective" or "somewhat effective" in increasing their desire and ability to learn.

A final word of caution about this survey. Just as those who attend class reunions are usually the ones who feel successful, it is very probable that those who return graduate surveys are disproportionately the ones who feel successful. To the extent this has occurred, a bias is built into the results and should be kept in mind. On the other hand, it is clear from the results of those who did respond, that a very high percentage have an unusually high opinion of the college and the benefits they received from having attended.

## INTRODUCTION

The 1992 "Study of the Graduates" of Westchester Community College provides information about three main facets of the 1992 graduating class. First, it profiles the demographic, educational and work-related characteristics of these graduates. Secondly, it compares these graduates to the graduates in previous years. Such a comparison seeks to identify trends existing among our recent graduates.

Third, it provides the results of an evaluation by the graduates themselves of the services and resources offered at WCC, along with an evaluation by graduates of how effective WCC has been in helping them to achieve their goals. These evaluations are designed to provide feedback to the faculty and administrators of the College for planning and assessment purposes.

# Methodology

In Fall, 1992, a survey (see Appendix 15) was sent to students who graduated from Westchester Community College either in the late summer of 1991, the fall of 1991 or the spring of 1992, otherwise considered the graduating class of 1992.

The initial mailing was followed with a reminder letter by the curriculum chairperson several months later. This, in turn, was followed by a third mailing to all of the remaining non-responding graduates that could be reached. The final response rate was 54.9%, a rate high enough to give a good indication of the characteristics and opinions of this class, although not as high as we would have liked.

Out of the 883 students who graduated with the Class of 1992 (833 with degrees and 50 with certificates), a total of 485 returned a completed, usable survey. These 485 questionnaires represent our sample size.



# Demographic Profile: Class of 1992

Gender: Slightly over half (55.38%) of the graduating class of 1992 is female, as shown in Table I. This is a slight decrease over the previous year (less than one percentage point). Since many students transfer to a four-year college without graduating (we estimate as high as 40%), it is possible that the lower graduation rate for men is attributable to a higher transfer rate by them. Studies are underway to determine this.

Age: Almost two-fifths of the graduates (35.3%) were under 22 years of age at the time of graduation, but 36.7% were between 22 and 29 years. Another fifth (24.9%) were between 30 and 49 years of age. Only 3.1% were over fifty.

Compared to the graduating class of the previous year, there was a slight decrease in the percentage of students in the age bracket under 22, going from 39.1% in 1991 to 34.5% in 1992. The lower percentage, however, is similar to the percentage for the graduating class of 1989, as shown in Table I, and should not be viewed as a downward trend at this point.

Ethnic Background: Over three-fourths of the graduates (77.9%) are white as shown in Table II. Another eighth (8.7%) are Black; seven percent (7.4), Hispanic; and four percent (4.2%) Asian Pacific. The percentage who were Native American or foreign students is negligible.

Compared to the previous year, the percentage of Blacks is down by 3.1%, from 11.8% to 8.7%; the percentage of Hispanics is up slightly from 6.0% to 7.4%; while the percentage of Asian Pacific students is up slightly from 3.6% to 4.2%. These changes, of course, are too small to reflect a trend.

Over half (52.1%) graduated with an AAS degree as shown in Table III. Another fifth (21.3%) received an AS degree, and slightly more than a fifth (20.9%) graduated with an AA degree. The smallest percentage (5.7%) graduated with a Certificate.

Almost half (49.9%) graduated with a GPA (grade point average) between 2.00 and 2.99, but almost the same percentage (49.8%) had a GPA over 3.0, as shown in Table III.

# Comparison of All Graduates to Respondents

A comparison of the respondents answering the survey to the actual 1992 graduation class shows that the percentages of each are similar with regard to ethnic background and gender, a good indication that the results of the sample reflect the entire class. Table IV below shows that, for the most part, the gender and ethnic backgrounds of the respondents reflect rather closely to those of the entire graduating class.

For example, two-fifths of the respondents (39.0%) are males, while in actuality males comprised 44.6% of the graduating class, a difference of approximately five percentage points.

With regard to ethnic background, 80.8% of the respondents were white, while in actuality its white students comprised 77.9% of the graduating class, a difference of about three percentage points.



#### EMPLOYMENT STATUS

Almost seventy percent (67.8%) of the 1992 graduates who responded reported being employed compared to last year's figure of 71.4%. More than three-fifths of those respondents (68.1%) reported being employed full-time as shown in Table V.

<u>Salary:</u> The <u>mean salary</u> for 1992 graduates employed full-time in a new job was \$25,037 down almost \$2,500 from the previous year. The <u>median salary</u> for the 1992 graduates was \$21,000, down \$5,000 from the previous year.

A majority of these graduates were either "very satisfied" (12.0%) or "somewhat satisfied" (49.7%) with their salary as shown in Table VI. Almost twenty percent (17.8%), however, were "very dissatisfied." Another 20.5% were "somewhat dissatisfied."

Location Of Employment: The contribution that WCC makes to educating the labor force of the county is substantiated by the high percentage of graduates who reported working in Westchester County. Of the respondents who reported being employed (329), 77.5% or 255 graduates reported working in the county. Another 15.2% or 50 graduates reported working in New York State but outside Westchester County, bringing the total of those working in the state of New York to 92.7%. Only 5.8% reported working outside the state. The remaining 1.5% failed to indicate where they were working.

<u>Job Satisfaction:</u> The level of job satisfaction has dropped since last years high of 85.0%, as shown in Table VI. Almost four-fifths (79.6%) reported being either "very satisfied" (29.0%) or "somewhat satisfied" (50.6%) with their job duties. More than one tenth (14.0%) of the respondents, however, reported being "somewhat dissatisfied" or "very dissatisfied" (6.4%).

More than two-thirds (67.6%) were either "very satisfied" (28.0%) or "somewhat satisfied" (39.6%) with their opportunity to advance, but almost one-third (32.4%) expressed some dissatisfaction, as shown in Table VI.

WCC's Impact on Employment: Well over two-fifths (43.1%) of those employed felt that finishing their degree was important to getting their current job. Similarly, around two-fifths (41.6%) of the respondents felt that their "specific program of study" was important to getting their current job.

Less than two-fifths (37.8%) indicated that their current occupation was "highly related" to their program of study at WCC and another 27.8% indicated it was "slightly related". Over a third (34.4%), however, stated their current job was "not related" to their program of study at WCC.

Just under three-fourths (72.1%) of the respondents felt that their WCC education prepared them for their current job either to a "great degree" (37.3%) or "to a slight degree" (34.8%). Almost one-fourth (27.9%), however, responded that it had not helped them at all.

# 1992 Respondents Compared to Previous Classes

When the respondents of the graduating class of 1992 are compared to the four previous graduating classes with regard to their employment status, the most noticeable difference is the decline in the percentage of the graduates employed full-time.

As shown in Table VIII, while the percentage of those working full-time fluctuated around seventy-five percent from 1986 to 1989, this has not been the case in the last three years. The Class of 1990 dropped almost ten percentage points going from 76.3% in 1989 to 67.6% in 1990 to 57.7% in 1991. The percentage for the Class of 1992 who reported working full-time increased approximately ten percentage points to 68.1%, still remaining below seventy-five percent.



Conversely, the percentage employed part-time, decreased from 42.3% in 1991 to 31.9% in 1992. Understandably, the percentage of those still seeking employment has been increasing from a low of 1.9% in 1987 to a high in 1990 of 7.7%. Among the 1992 graduates, however, the percentage who reported still seeking employment increased slightly from the 1991 figure of 5.8% to 6.4%, not showing any trend at this time of a turnaround in the economy.

The mean salary reported by respondents has decreated going from a mean of \$27,440 in 1991 to \$25,037 in 1992, down almost \$2,500 as shown in Table IX, below. The median salary dropped from \$26,000 for 1991 graduates to \$21,000 for 1992 graduates.

With regard to the percentage of respondents working in Westchester, however, a slight increase occurred over last year. The percentage working inside Westchester increased from 75.5% for 1991 graduates to 77.5% for the 1992 graduates.

Another 15.2% of the 1992 graduates were employed outside of Westchester, but within New York State, a slight increase over the Class of 1991. This means that 92.7% of the 1992 graduates who are working are employed in New York, which is little higher than the percentage (90.5) for the 1991 Class. Only a small percent (5.8%) are employed outside the state, almost the same percentage as last year.

## EDUCATION

Graduates Attending College: Over three-fifths of the respondents (63.5% or 308 people) reported that they were attending a college, university, or training center as shown in Table X. Moreover, about seventy-three percent of these students (73.1%) reported attending full-time.

Three-fifths of these graduates reported being female (59.1%), four-fifths were white (82.1%), 6.5% were Black, and almost seven percent were Hispanic (6.8%) as shown in Table XI.

A number of characteristics should be noted about those who attend full-time. First, a fairly even percentage of men (75.4%) and women (71.4) are attending school full-time. In addition, an unusually high percentage of those under 22 years of age (92.3%) are attending school full-time.



WCC's Contribution to Achieving Transfer: From the responses, the graduates consider WCC to have been very effective in assisting them to transfer. Of the students who had as a goal the desire to transfer, more than two-thirds (69.5%) indicated that WCC was "very effective" in helping them to achieve their goal of transferring to a four-year institution. Another 24.8% felt WCC was "somewhat effective." Slightly over five percent (5.7%) felt it was "not effective."

Moreover, when graduates were asked to what extent they felt WCC prepared them for further study, almost three-fourths (73.4%) replied, "well prepared." Another 25.5% responded, "somewhat prepared", and only 1.1% responded, "not at all."

A large percentage of these transfers are in a field of study either highly related (59.2%) or slightly related (28.9%) to their program of study at WCC. Slightly over one-tenth (11.9%), however, reported being in a field of study "not related or applicable" to their program of study at WCC.

Four-Year College's Contribution to Affecting Transfer: Almost half (49.3%) of the students who transferred felt that the recruitment process used by the institution they were now attending was "not important" as shown in Table XII. Only 16.9% felt it was very important, and another 23.2% somewhat important.

What the respondents did feel was "very important" were three other factors as shown in Table XII: (1) The availability of the program they wished to study; (2) The ease of access both in terms of location and cost of attending; and (3) The reputation of the college to which they were transferring. In each of the three cases almost two-thirds or better of the respondents indicated these factors were "very important" and in each case an additional 20% or more indicated these factors were "slightly important."



Of lesser importance was the "ease of transfer" to the college, of which 55.4% identified it as being "very important." Factors deemed "very important" by only a small percentage of the respondents were: (1) Advice from others (18.7%); (2) the recruitment process by the college (16.9%); and (3) the social environment (14.8%).

Future Educational Goals: A large percentage of the respondents continuing their education expect to earn a Baccalaureate degree (84.4%) at the completion of their studies. Only a very small percentage (3.0%) are continuing their education with no plans to earn a degree.

Of those respondents currently not attending college, almost three-fourths (74.1%) indicated that they plan to continue their education in the future. Slightly more than one-fourth (25.9%) indicated they had, "No plans at this time."

# A Comparison to Previous Classes:

A comparison of the 1992 graduates to the three previous classes shows that well over half of the respondents in each class reported continuing their education after graduating. As shown in Table XIII, 63.5% of the 1992 graduates reported transferring as did 63.6% of the 1991 class, 63.5% of the 1990 class and 56.7 in 1989. Moreover, the percentage of those attending full-time in each class has remained rather high. For the last four graduating classes it has been at least 65% or more.

The degree aspirations of the respondents, as shown in Table XIII, are geared mainly toward receiving a Bachelor's degree. Around four-fifths of the respondents in the last four graduating classes who continued their education indicated they expected, "to earn a degree at the completion of their current studies."



# EVALUATION OF WCC By Respondents

For the last five years, the graduates responding to the annual graduate surveys have consistently given high marks to WCC in their overall evaluation of the college, the faculty and courses they took in their major, as shown in Table XIV below.

At least 95% of the respondents, for example, gave a "very satisfied" or "satisfied" rating in evaluating their "Overall WCC Experience," and the "Overall Quality of Instruction They Received."

Table XV further breaks out the evaluations for the Class of 1992 into the more specific responses of "very satisfied," "somewhat satisfied," "somewhat dissatisfied," and "very dissatisfied." As in the previous year, almost three-fourths of the respondents gave a "very satisfied" response to their "Overall WCC Experience." Over two-thirds (66.5%) gave a "very satisfied" response to the quality of courses in their major. Such a high percentage of "very satisfied" responses is unusual for this type of survey and speaks well for the quality of education that the graduates feel they received.

One aspect of their college experience that the respondents did express substantial dissatisfaction with concerned the "Availability of Courses of Interest to You." Fifteen percent (15.4%) indicated they were either "somewhat dissatisfied" or "very dissatisfied." This is unusually high and an increase over the previous years.

Respondents who had transferred to a four-year college also were asked to evaluate the extent to which WCC had prepared them for further study. Table XVI shows that at least two-thirds of the respondents over the last four years consistently felt they were "well prepared." Less than 3% in the last four years replied, "not at all."

In addition to evaluating the College academically, the graduates were asked to evaluate student services. Table XVII is a breakdown of the results in descending order of the percentage who were "very satisfied." Students who had not used the service were excluded in calculating the percentages.

The results of the students services evaluations show that the graduates were particularly positive about the Library. It received the highest percentage of "very satisfied" responses (63.9%) and the highest percentage of combined "satisfied" or "very satisfied" responses (96.3%). In addition, the most highly used service is registration (used by 96.9% of the respondents).

Computer Services (51.9%), Faculty Advising (46.1%), and Reading and Math Skills Improvement also received a high percentage of "very satisfied" responses.

Services which received the largest percentage of "dissatisfied" or "very dissatisfied" responses were Registration facilities (36.6%) and Counseling Services (27.6%) and Access to Advisors (27.4%).

In terms of usage, the services most frequently used, in addition to Registration were the Library (94.8%), Admissions (92.7%) and Faculty Advising (92.6%). The least used services were Health Services (31.3%), Financial Aid (42.9%) and Tutorial Services (46.2%).



#### EFFECTIVENESS OF WCC IN HELPING TO ACHIEVE GOALS

Current literature in higher education stresses the importance of ascertaining the goals students have in attending college in order to provide a more accurate evaluation of a college's success in meeting student objectives.

To this end WCC graduates were asked what best describes their most important reason for earning a college degree. Table XVIII shows that the largest percentage of graduates (41.4%) selected "To Prepare Me to Transfer to a 4-year School." For another two-fifths (37.1%), the prime reason was to "Increase Their Chances to Get a Specific Job or a Better Job." Only 16.5% had as their most important reason "To Reach Other Goals, Such As 'elf-fulfillment."

What is particularly interesting about these percentages is their similarity to last year's (Class of 1991) as shown in Table XVIII. Several more years of surveys are needed to substantiate that this phenomenon is not a coincidence, but it may prove to be that on the average two-fifths of our graduates have as a prime goal that of transferring to a four-year institution and another two-fifths to improve their job opportunities.

An additional battery of questions the graduates were asked to evaluate how effectively WCC had helped them to reach specific goals in five areas:
(1) transferring to a four-year college, (2) getting a job, (3) developing learning skills, (4) improving personal skills and self-esteem and, (5) increasing appreciation of the arts and humanities. The following is a synopsis of the results in each area.

Transfer Goals: Table XIX shows that an exceptionally high percentage of the graduates (94.3%) felt WCC had been either "very effective" (69.5%) or "somewhat effective" (24.8%) in helping them to achieve their goal of transferring to a four-year institution. Since over three-fourths of all the respondents (76.5%) identified this as a goal, this information is particularly important in evaluating WCC's success in meeting students' goals for assessment purposes.



The graduates also were asked how effective WCC had been in helping them to achieve their goal of meeting professional or graduate school requirements. Less than two-thirds (62.5%) of all the respondents identified this as a goal, and of those that did, over half (54.4%) felt WCC had been "very effective" or "somewhat effective" (36.0%).

Employment Goals: Table XX consists of six questions exploring the effectiveness of WCC in accomplishing the graduates' job related goals. Taken collectively, approximately eighty-five percent of the respondents consistently indicated that WCC had been either "very effective" or "somewhat effective" in helping them to attain their job related goals. This was similar to the responses by the graduates in the previous year (Class of 1991).

In terms of "very effective" responses the highest "marks" were given to "Attaining a Required Degree for a Job" (54.8%), and "Developing An Idea of Career Goals" (51.3%). The lowest was given to "Improving Professional Status" (43.1%).

Academic Goals: It should come as no surprise that a large percentage of the graduates consider improving their academic skills and knowledge an important goal in attending the College. Table XXI shows that on each of the six questions exploring WCC's success in helping graduates to achieve academic skills, at least 85% or better indicated that WCC had been "very effective" or "somewhat effective" in doing so. This was also the case with the previous year's graduating class (Class of 1991).

With regard to the specific question of how effective WCC was in achieving their goal of "Increased Knowledge and Understanding," 71.5% responded "very effective." Combined with another 27.9% who felt WCC had been "somewhat effective," 99.4% of the graduates responded positively, an usually high percentage for this survey.

With regard to more specific skills, over two-fifths (42.2%) responded that the college had been "very effective" in developing oral expression skills. A lower percent, almost another two-fifths (39.1%), felt WCC had been "very effective" in developing writing skills, and 36.6% felt that WCC had been "very effective" in improving reading skills.



Social and Cultural Goals: A considerably smaller percentage of students considered social and cultural goals as part of their reason for attending WCC. Slightly over seventy percent (70.1%) considered increasing their appreciation of art, architecture and other visual arts as a goal, as shown in Table XXII. This, incidentally is a decrease over last year's class (Class of 1991) where 75.3% considered this a main goal.

Around three-fifths considered increasing their appreciation of the theater (61.4%) or their appreciation of musical performances (57.1%) as a goal for attending.

Almost seventy percent (69.5%) considered involvement in social activities a goal, while over half of the respondents (55.3%) considered involvement in political activities a goal.

Of the students who included cultural and social enrichment (listed in Table XXII above) as part of their goals for attending WCC, barely a fourth in any category felt WCC had been "very effective" in helping to achieve these goals. The exception was in the field of Art and Architecture where thirty percent (30.0%) felt WCC had been "very effective."



<u>Personal Goals:</u> Frequently colleges fail to assess their success in terms of helping students to achieve personal growth. Table XXIII below shows that for eight of the nine questions concerning personal growth, over four-fifths of the respondents considered it a goal in attending WCC. The one exception was to "Participate Effectively In My Community", where only 72.4% considered it a goal.

"Developing an Interest in New Ideas" (56.8%), "Improving Your Self-confidence" (50.6%), and "Developing a Sense of Personal Responsibility" (55.7%) were the three personal growth questions to which the respondents gave the highest percentage of "very effective" responses in terms of WCC's contribution. "Participating Effectively in My Community" (27.6%) received the lowest percentage of "very effective" responses.
