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ABSTRACT

This report presents demographic data on California's Latino population. Data sources include census reports from 1980 and 1990; the 1990 Annual Demographic File; the 1990 and 1988 Voter Supplements; and the 1988 Fertility, Birth Expectation, and Immigration Study. The report includes the following information: (1) general demographic statistics regarding Latinos in California and the United States, including the number and proportion of Latinos within the California population and cross-tabulations by age and gender, as well as cross-tabulations by both race and Latino ethnicity; (2) geographic distribution and living arrangements of California Latinos, including where Latinos live within the state on both a county and city level, whether they rent or own, and size and type of household; (3) educational attainment of California's Latino population (overall, for Latino subgroups, and in comparison with other racial and ethnic groups), including statistics for current school enrollment, language skills, and primary language spoken at home; (4) economic variables such as occupation, employment, income, and poverty rates, with details on unskilled workers and farm laborers; (5) comparisons between citizen and noncitizen Latinos and citizens of other racial groups on variables such as age, gender, education, occupation, housing tenure, and area of residence; (6) voter registration; and (7) comparisons among immigrant populations in Latino and non-Latino racial categories. 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About the data: The data used to create the tables in the Data Book are available in the form of two electronic files. The first file is stored on computer tape readable by IBM mainframe computers, and consists of the three datasets from the Current Population Surveys (1990 Annual Demographic File and the 1990 and 1988 November Voter Supplement File, as well as the 1988 Immigration Supplement File), together with the SPSS code used to read the data files and produce the tables. The second file is in the form of ASCII and dBase-III files that contain, on IBM-PC-compatible floppy disks, all the data from the 1990 and 1980 Census Summary Tape Files used in preparing this data book. The floppy disk also contains selected information for census tracts in Los Angeles County with greater than 50 percent Latino population, which were not published here for reasons of space. 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INTRODUCTION

If "demography is destiny," then California's destiny is becoming decidedly more Latino. Of the 21 million Latinos in the United States, 34 percent (over 7 million) reside in California. Latinos represent one of the fastest growing ethnic groups in California; in 1980, they were 18 percent of the state's population, by 1990 they were 26 percent. Despite this tremendous growth, accurate and available data on this population have been almost nonexistent. As the following statistical highlights indicate, the characteristics of the Latino population should be of great interest to government policymakers. For instance:

- Over 25 percent of Latinos in California are under the age of 15 and more than half are under age 25.
- 57 percent of Latino adults in California do not have a high school diploma and over 40 percent have only an elementary school education.
- 23 percent of California Latinos live below the poverty line, the highest level of any minority group.
- 24 percent of California Latinos speak English either "not well" or "not at all."

Latinos will clearly require more attention in areas such as education, health care, and job training in the decades to come. Furthermore, Latinos will generate many concerns specific to their linguistic and cultural needs. If public policy is to respond to the needs of the state's largest and most diverse minority population, accurate and easily understandable information about Latinos must be made available.

To remedy this information gap, UC DATA (University of California Data Archive and Technical Assistance) has produced this *California Latina/Latino Demographic Data Book*. The data used for this book comprise the most up-to-date demographic and social statistics on California's Latino population. Sources include the 1980 and the 1990 Decennial Censuses and several supplements from the Census Bureau's Current Population Surveys: the 1990 Annual Demographic File, the 1990 and 1988 Voter Supplements, and the 1988 Fertility, Birth Expectation, and Immigration Study. The Current Population Survey (CPS) is a monthly survey conducted by the Census Department with a sample size of over 120,000 respondents (for the Annual Demographic File, the sample size is 300,000).¹ This enormous size allows for analysis on an individual level for minority populations and specific geographic units, such as metropolitan areas. Each month the CPS is supplemented with questions on a specific topic such as sources of income, immigration, or electoral participation. We have employed the CPS not only because it allows for individual-level analysis unavailable in the Census, but covers topics, such as political participation, that are not included in the Census.

¹ The population universe in the Current Population Survey is the civilian noninstitutional population and members of the armed forces living off-post or with their families on post. It excludes all other members of the armed forces. About 12 percent of CPS respondents are Californians.

Our goal is to provide a comprehensive report on the most significant qualitative aspects of Latino life in a manner easily understandable to readers not accustomed to quantitative data. Each section is organized around a particular facet of the Latino community, and most tables have accompanying figures to illustrate the data more clearly. Wherever appropriate, data on California's other ethnic or racial populations are provided for comparison. Since individual Latinos represent different national and cultural backgrounds, the Latino population is broken down into ethnic subgroups wherever possible.

Data in sections 1 through 4 come either from the 1990 Census or the 1990 Annual Demographic File of the Current Population Survey. Although the data from the 1990 Census are more detailed, they suffer in two respects. First, Summary Tape File Three of the 1990 Census (the most detailed data available when this report was prepared), provides fixed-information tables on a county, city, or "place" (city or town) level. It does not allow for analysis of specific groups of individuals by any other characteristic. In order to provide information on Latinos with this data we have identified those "places" with high levels of Latinos and offered comparisons between them.

Second, the 1990 Census has limitations with respect to comparisons between Latinos and other racial groups. Although the Census questionnaire asked individuals to identify themselves by race (either white, black, American Indian, Asian/Pacific Islander, or other), it did not include a racial category for Latinos. Another question identified people of "Spanish/Hispanic" origin who were then asked to categorize themselves as:

Mexican, Mexican-American, Chicano, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Argentinean, Colombian, Costa Rican, Dominican, Ecuadoran, Guatemalan, Honduran, Nicaraguan, Peruvian, Salvadoran; from other Spanish-speaking countries of the Caribbean or Central or South America; or from Spain.

Responding to the question about race, 95 percent of the Latinos identified themselves as either "white" or "other" in roughly equal proportions. Consequently, for the 1990 Census data, comparisons between Latinos and other races are nonexclusive; in other words, racial categories such as "white," "black," and "other" contain Latinos unless otherwise noted. Readers should be aware that Tables 2-12, 2-13, 3-4, 4-5, and Figure 4-1 all contain comparisons of Latinos to other racial categories that also overlap Latinos.

The Current Population Survey questionnaire asks respondents to identify themselves according to a racial categorization identical to the Census categories, and, if appropriate, as either: 1) Mexican, Mexican-American, Chicano; 2) Puerto Rican; 3) Cuban; 4) Central or South American (Latin American); 5) other; and 6) all other (non-Latino). Unlike the Census data, the data from the CPS permit analysts to distinguish Latinos from other racial categorizations. In what follows we employ the term "Anglo" to distinguish non-Latino whites from Latinos who identified themselves as "white." In the CPS tables, all racial groups, when compared to Latinos, are nonoverlapping, i.e., include only non-Latinos.

Finally, throughout the book, the category of "other" encompasses individuals from all racial groups not explicitly listed.²

Report Organization

Section 1 presents general demographic statistics regarding Latinos in California and the United States. These data cover the number and proportion of Latinos within the California population and crosstabulations by age and gender, as well as crosstabulations by both race and Latino ethnicity.

Section 2 covers the geographic distribution and living arrangements of California Latinos. We show where Latinos live within the state on both a county and city level, whether they rent or own, and the size and type of their households. This section provides some of the most detailed information on the composition of Latinos within particular counties and on those places with high concentrations (over 50 percent) of Latinos.

Section 3 shows the educational attainment of California's Latino population in comparison to other racial and ethnic groups and within subgroups of the Latino population. The education tables were restricted for age (25 years or over) in order to reveal final educational attainment. In addition we have included supplementary tables with statistics for current school enrollment by the school-age population. Finally, the section includes data on language skills and the primary language spoken at home.

Section 4 addresses such economic variables as occupation, employment, income, and poverty rates. This section gives a detailed picture of the occupation of Latinos and the median income in places with high concentrations of Latinos. The section also provides detailed comparisons of Latinos in two occupational subgroups usually associated with Latino migrant communities: unskilled workers and farm laborers.

Since over 50 percent of the Latino population are noncitizens, we have set aside Section 5 for comparisons between Latino citizens and noncitizens. The dataset used for these tables is the 1990 November Voter Supplement to the Current Population Survey. Because of sampling variability, numbers for this and subsequent tables will not exactly match those of the Annual Demographic File. The data are weighted to best represent the proportional size of certain demographic groups, including Latinos. Section 5 offers comparisons between citizen and noncitizen Latinos and citizens of other racial groups on topics such as age, gender, education, occupation, housing tenure, and area of residence.

Section 6 pertains primarily to political participation, with rates of registration and voting for various racial and ethnic populations based on both all voting-age residents and citizens only. Data on the 1988 presidential election from the 1988 November Voter Supplement to the Current Population Survey were used for this section. The comparisons between voting-age and eligible populations demonstrate that Latinos appear to have

² Current Population Survey estimates of the California Latino population are adjusted using weights derived from independent postcensus estimates. For the 1990 Annual Demographic File, an oversample of the Latino population was conducted in order to compensate for the sampling problems and high variability that traditionally occur when sampling Latinos. These estimates of the Latino population were used to eliminate fluctuations in the CPS estimates of the size of the total Latino population resulting from sampling variability.

comparatively low rates of voter turnout largely because nearly half of all California Latinos are ineligible to vote. The section also provides crosstabulations of voting and race/ethnicity by age, marital status, gender, education, and income.

Section 7 focuses on nativity and immigration, using data derived primarily from the supplement to the 1988 Current Population Survey on Fertility, Birth Expectations, and Immigration. The section compares immigrant populations in Latino and non-Latino racial categories, paying particular attention to distinctions between arrival dates. It also compares Latino immigrants arriving before 1980 and after 1980 with native Latinos and other racial groups. This comparison provides graphic evidence of the effect of prolonged residence in the United States.

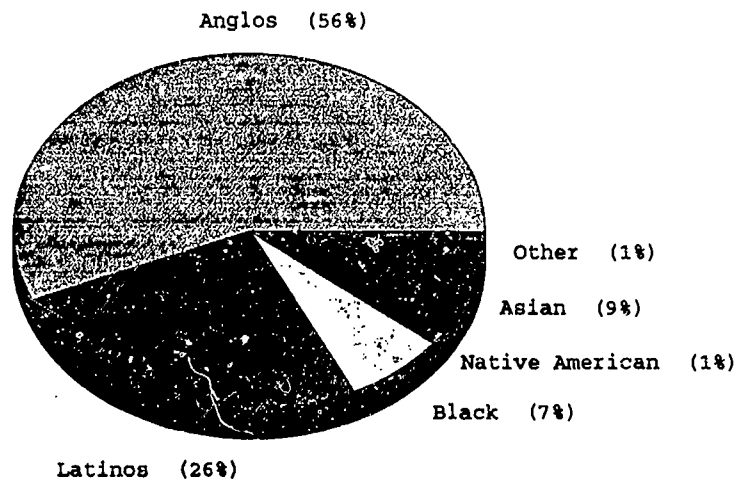

California Population by Race/Ethnicity, 1990



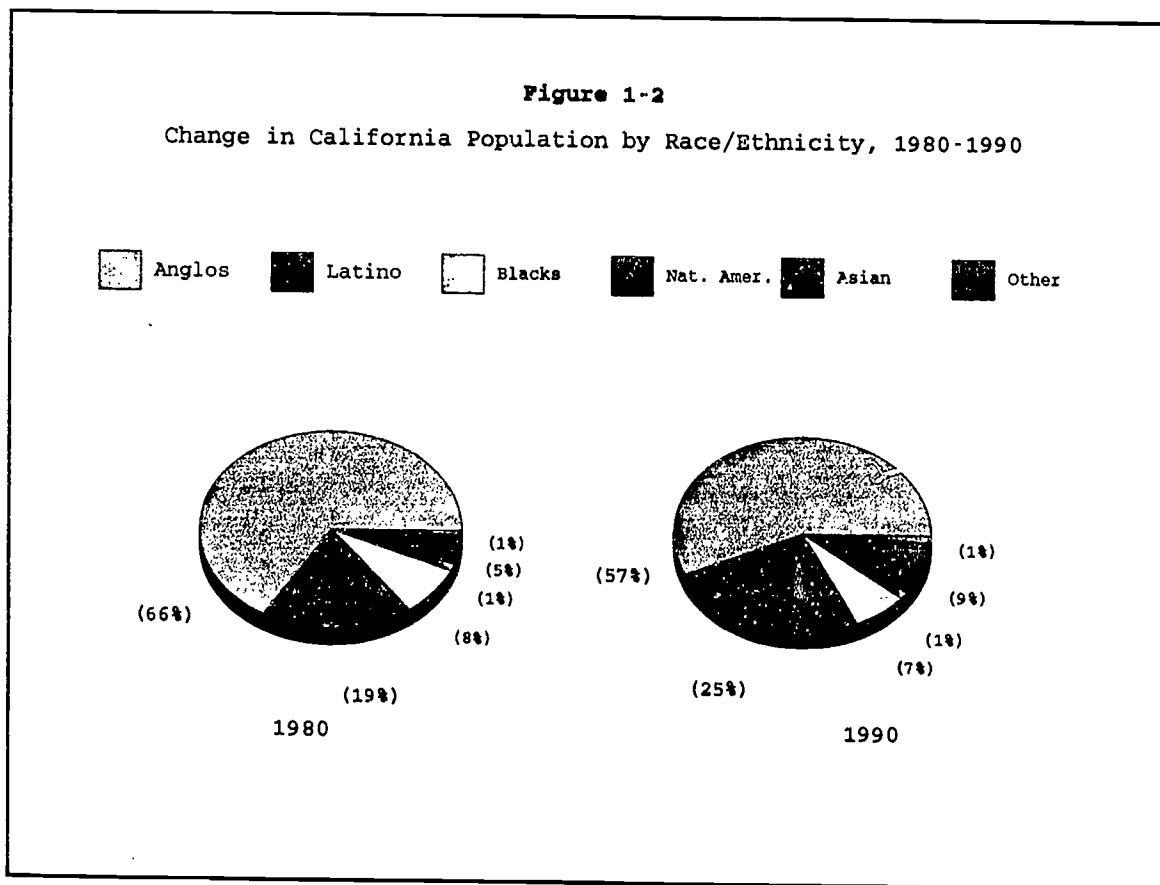

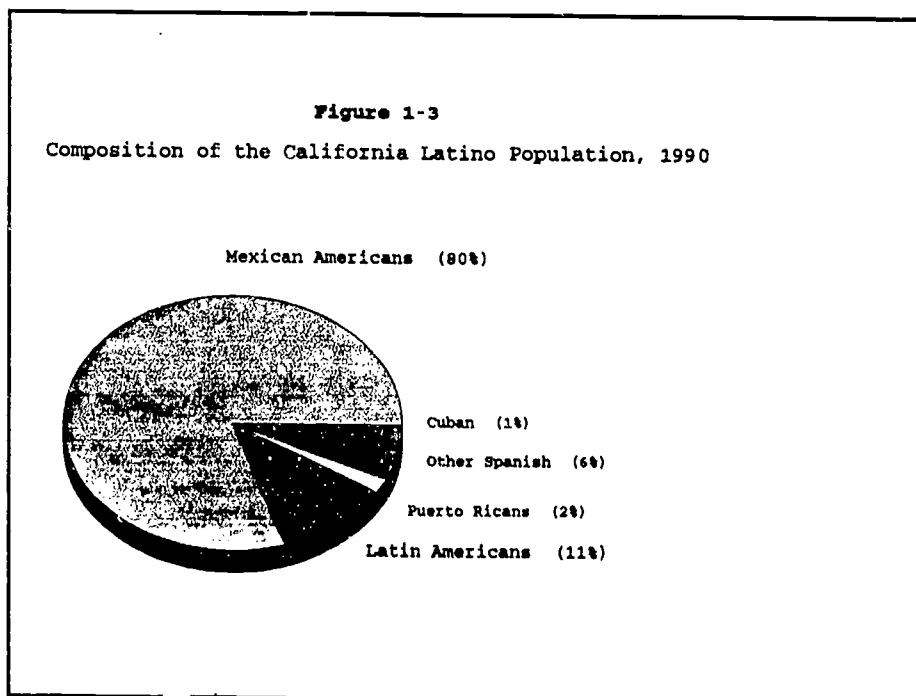

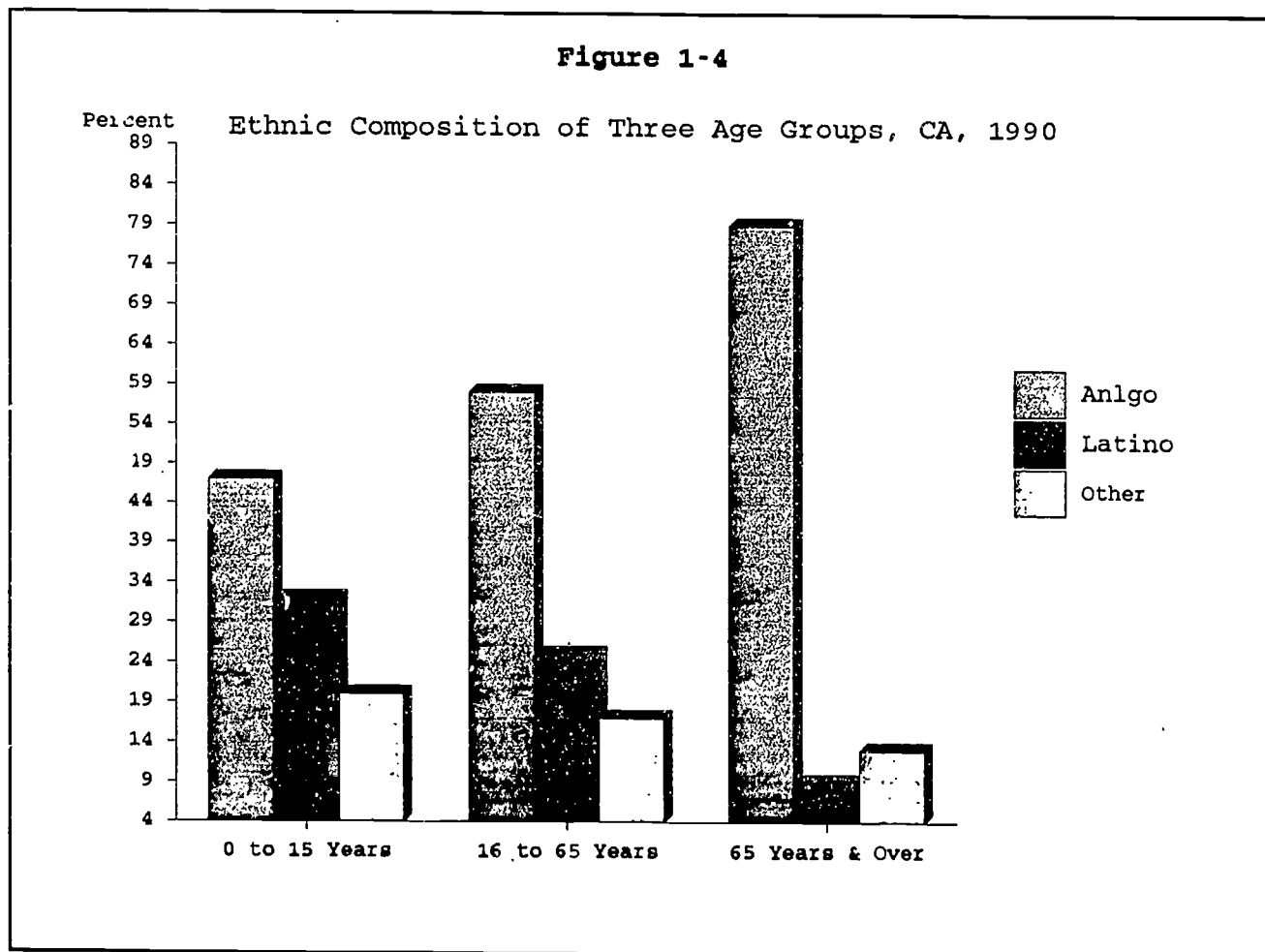

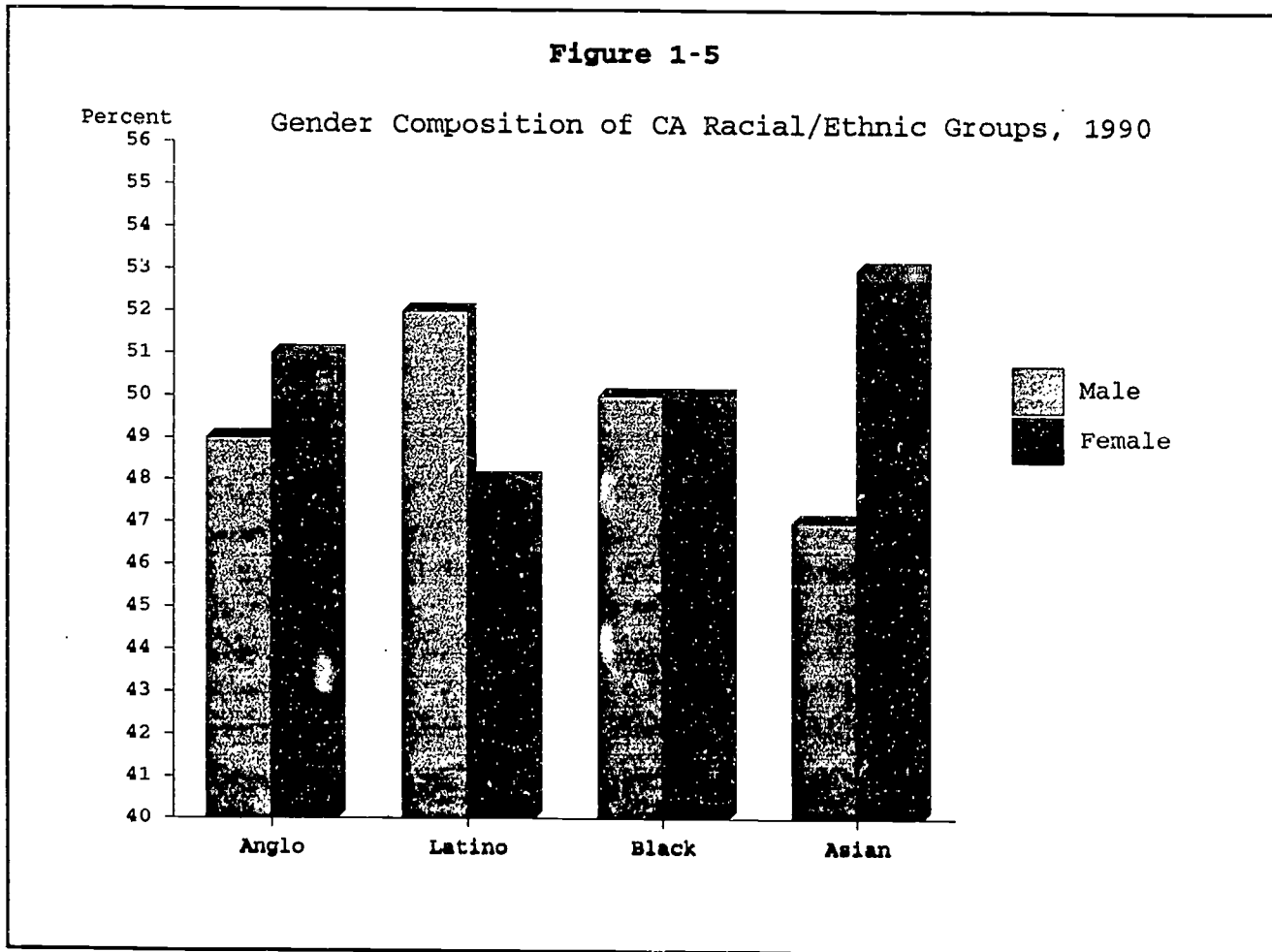

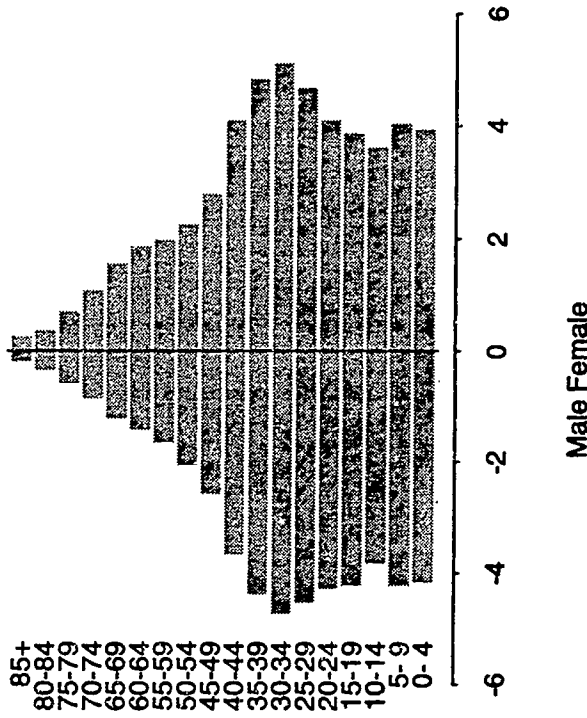

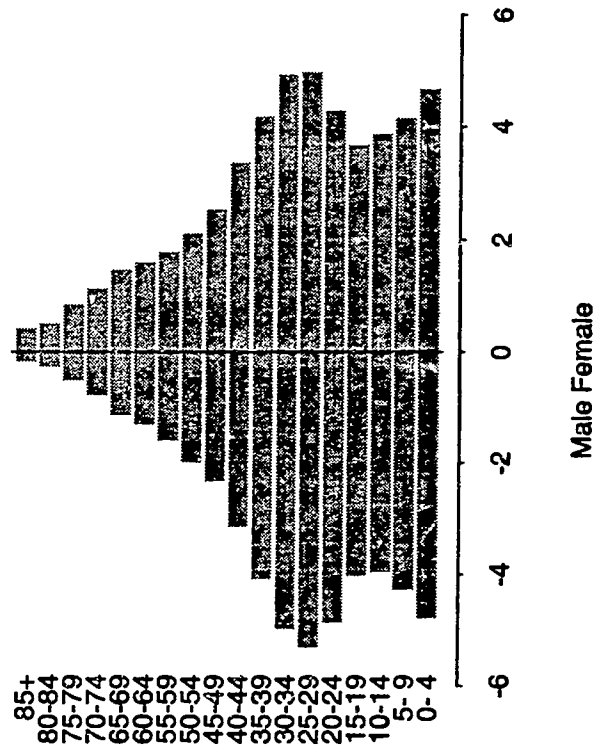

California Population by Race/Ethnicity, Sex and Age, 1990

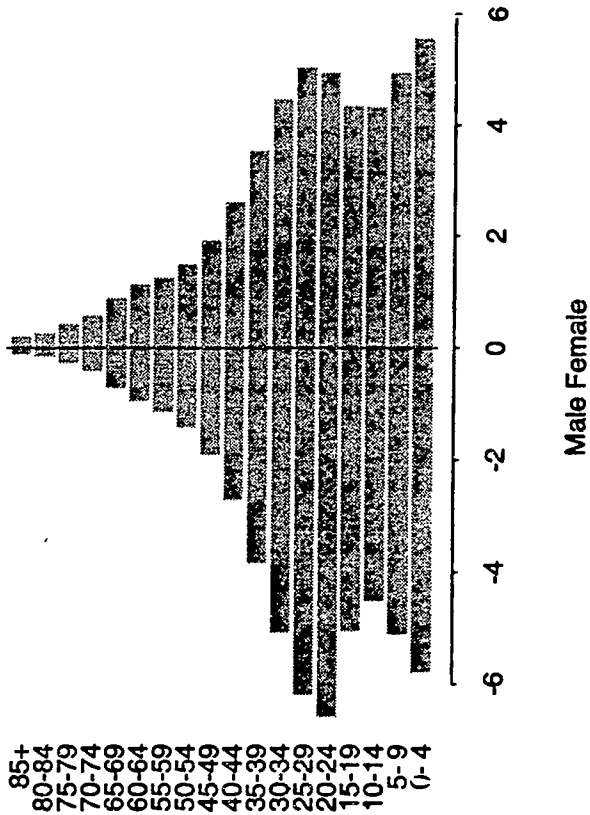
Asian and Pacific Islander by Sex and Age



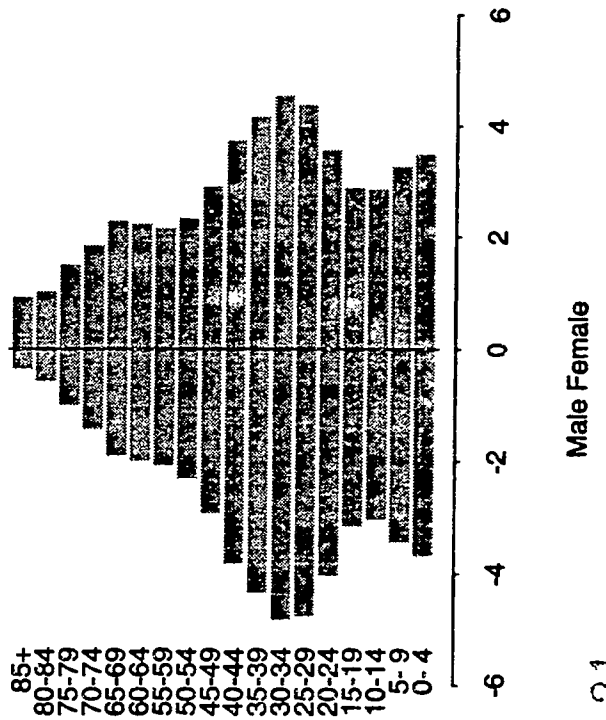
Black Population by Sex and Age

White Population by Sex and Age



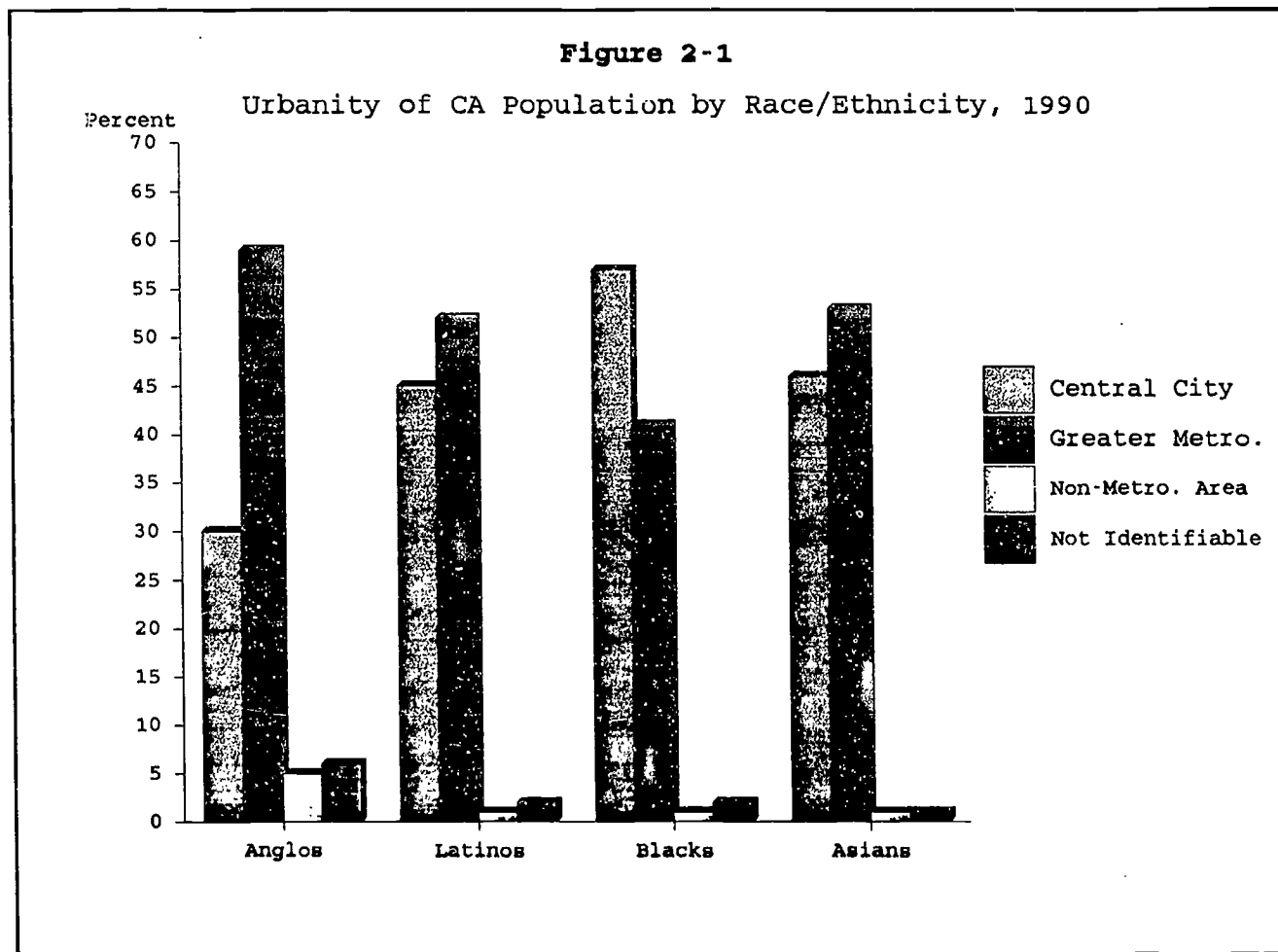

Percent of California Population of Latino Origin by County, 1990

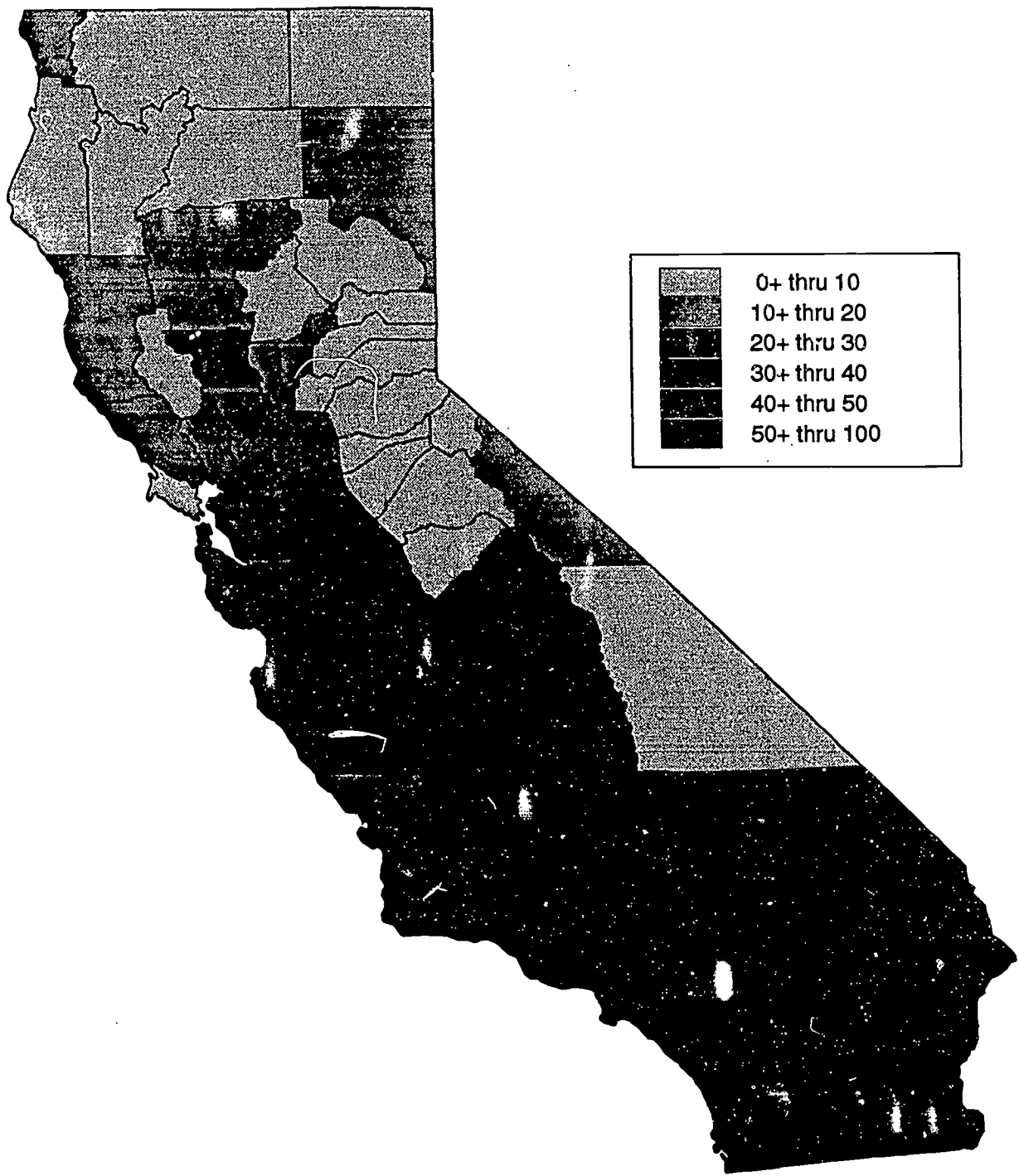

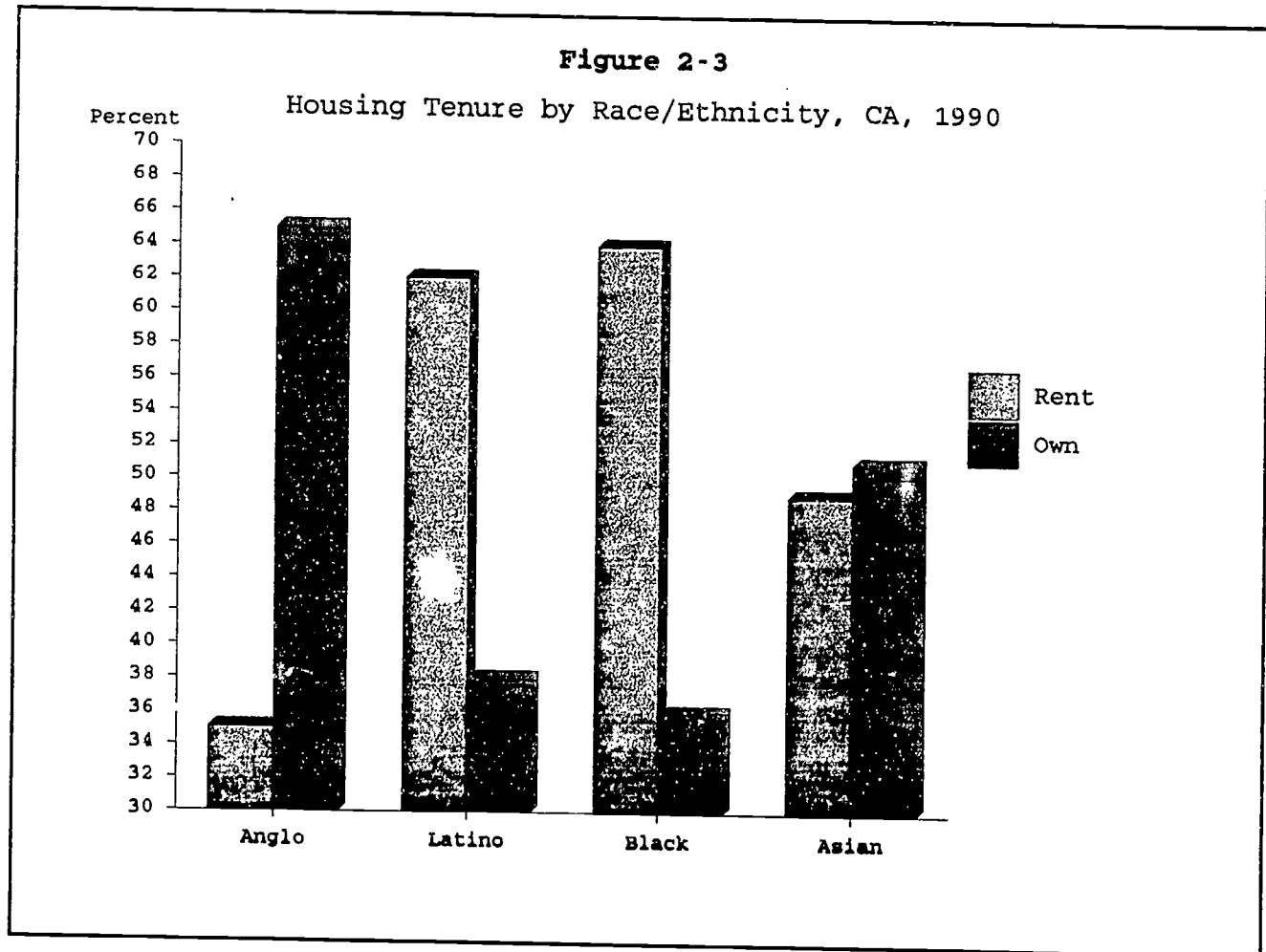

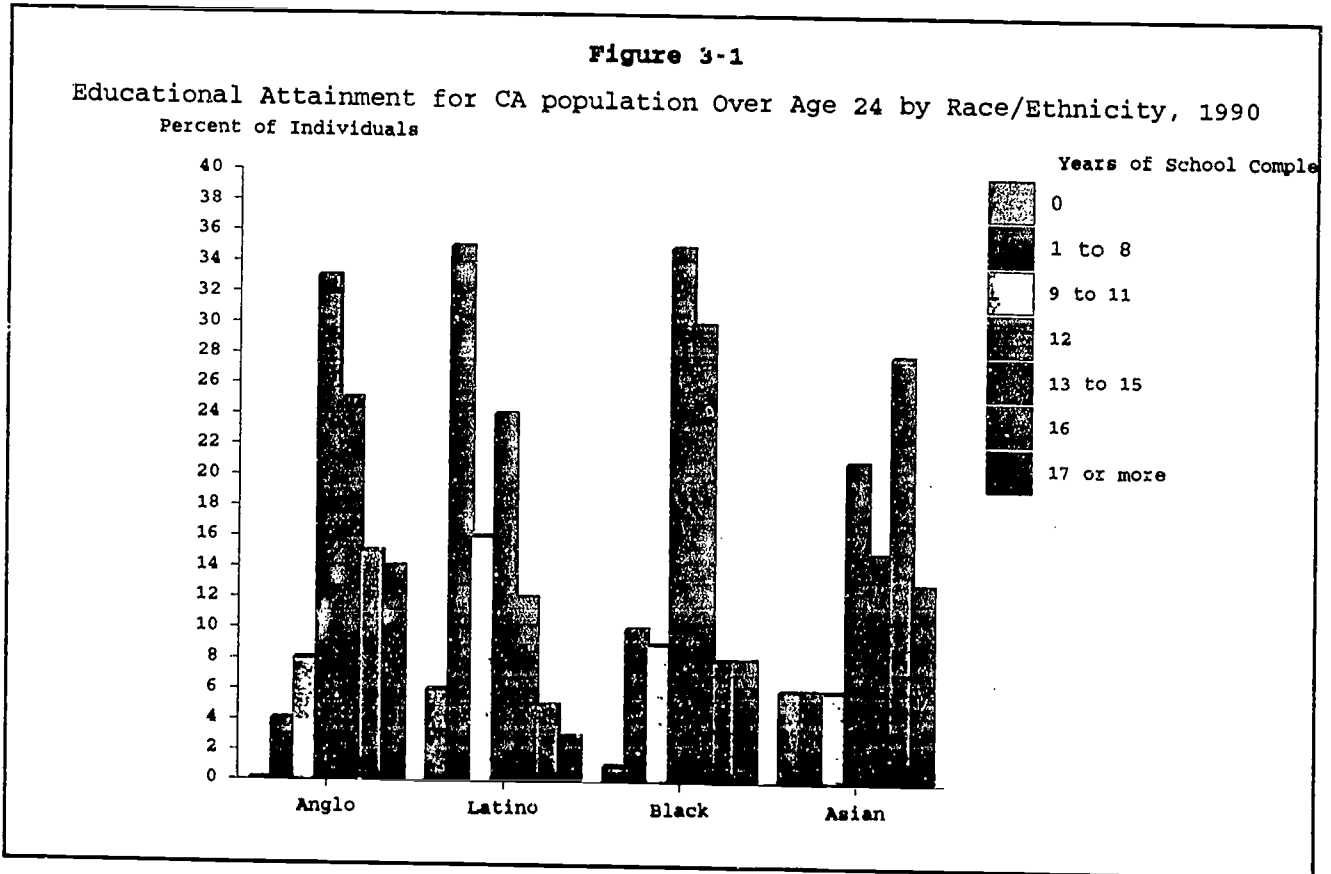

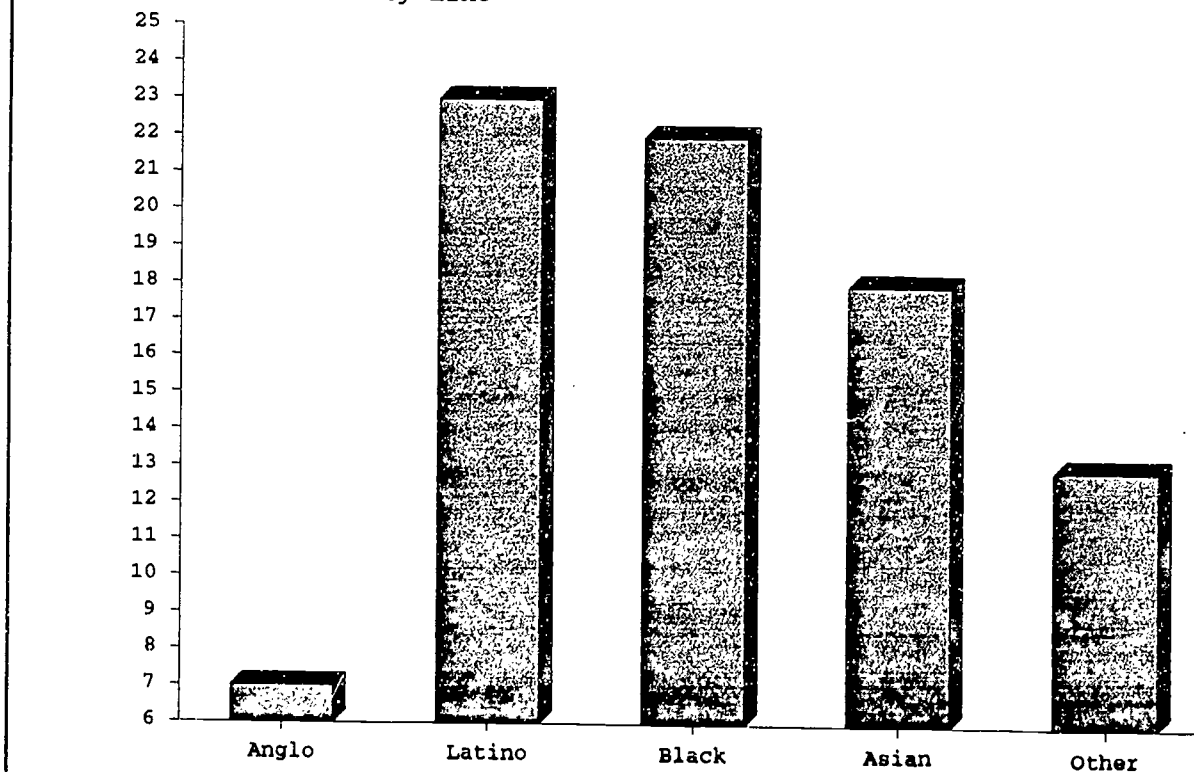

Percent Below Poverty Line

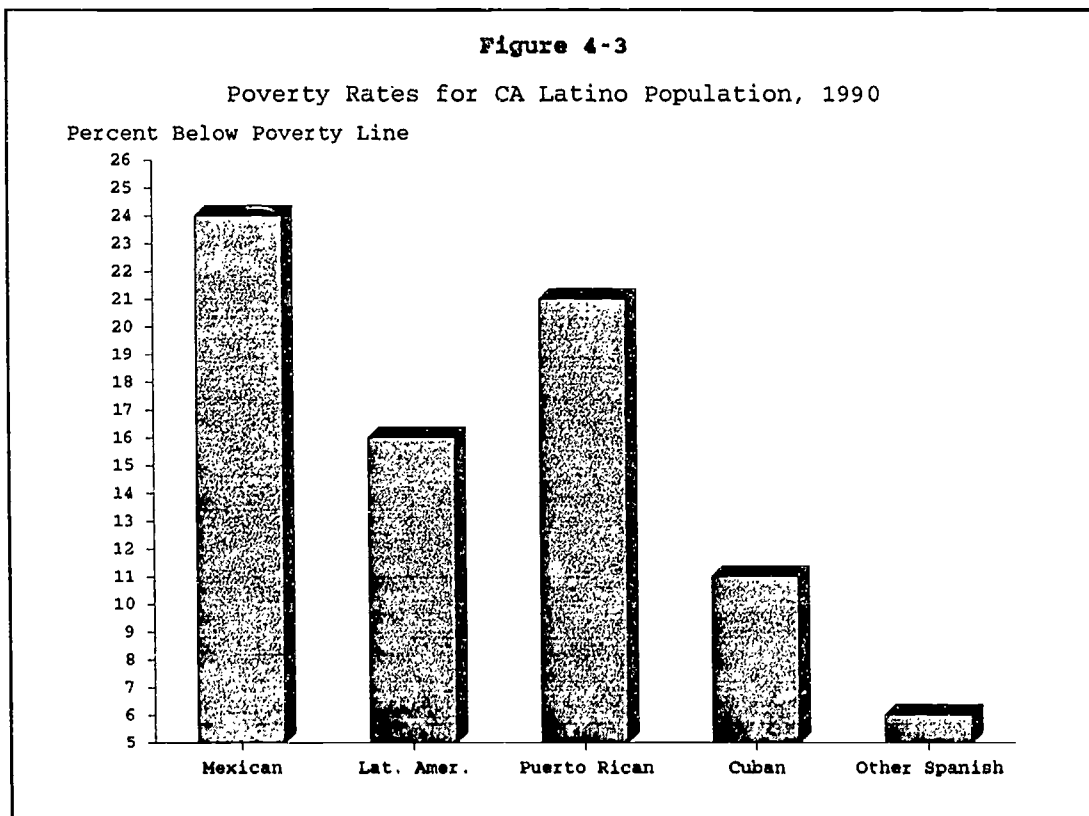

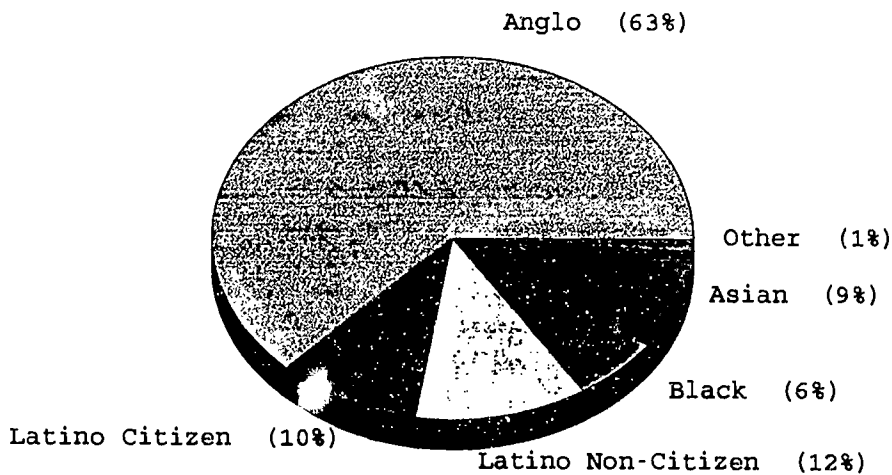

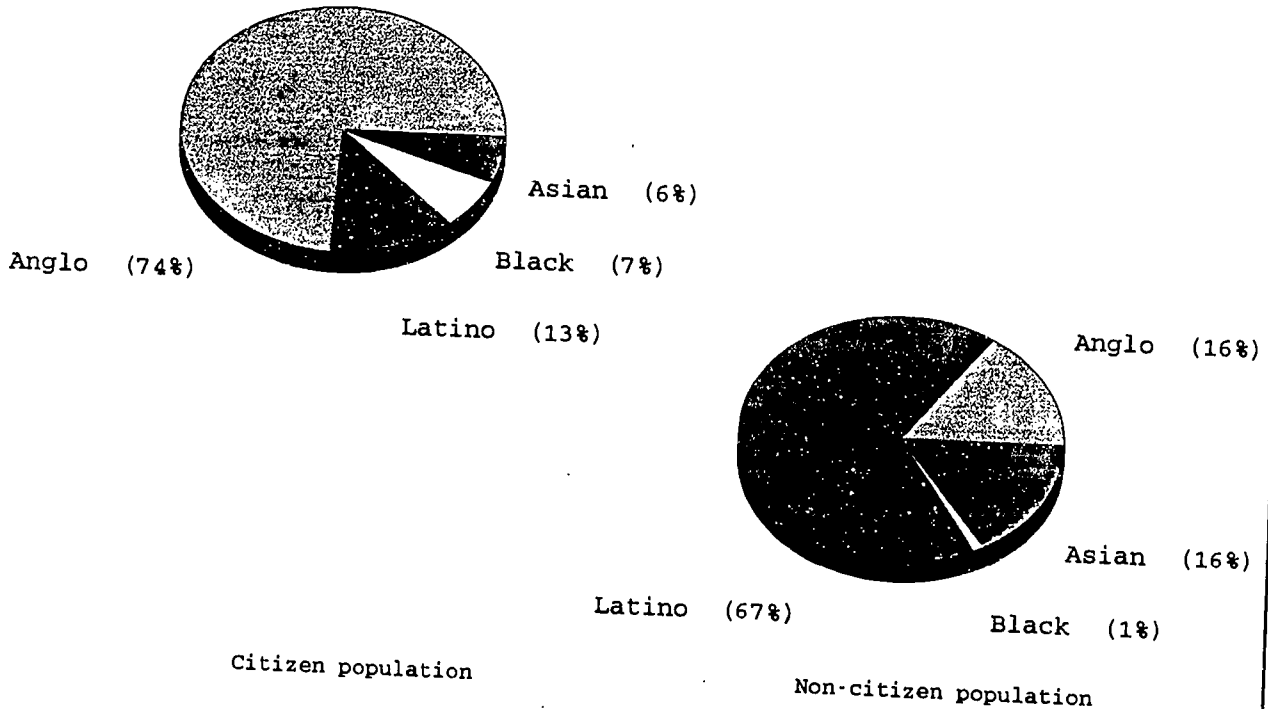

Comparison of CA Citizen and Non-Citizen Population Over Age 17, 1990



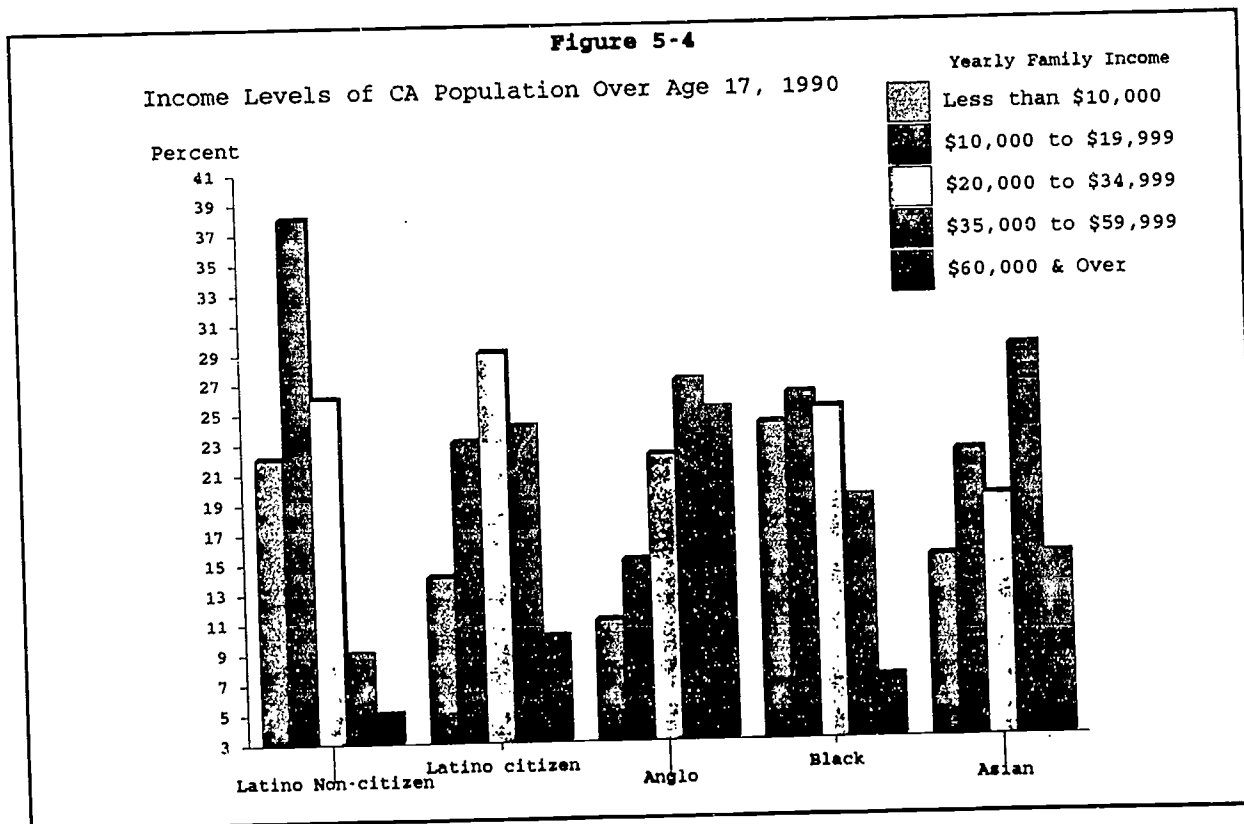

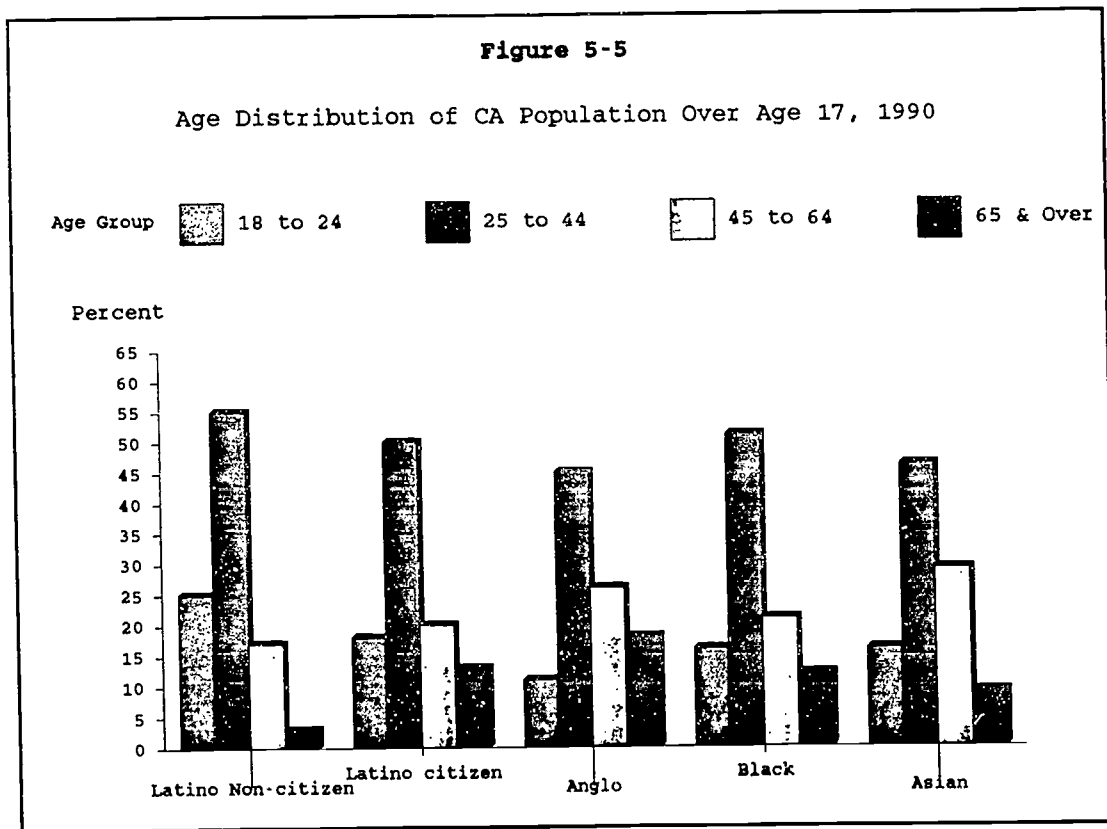

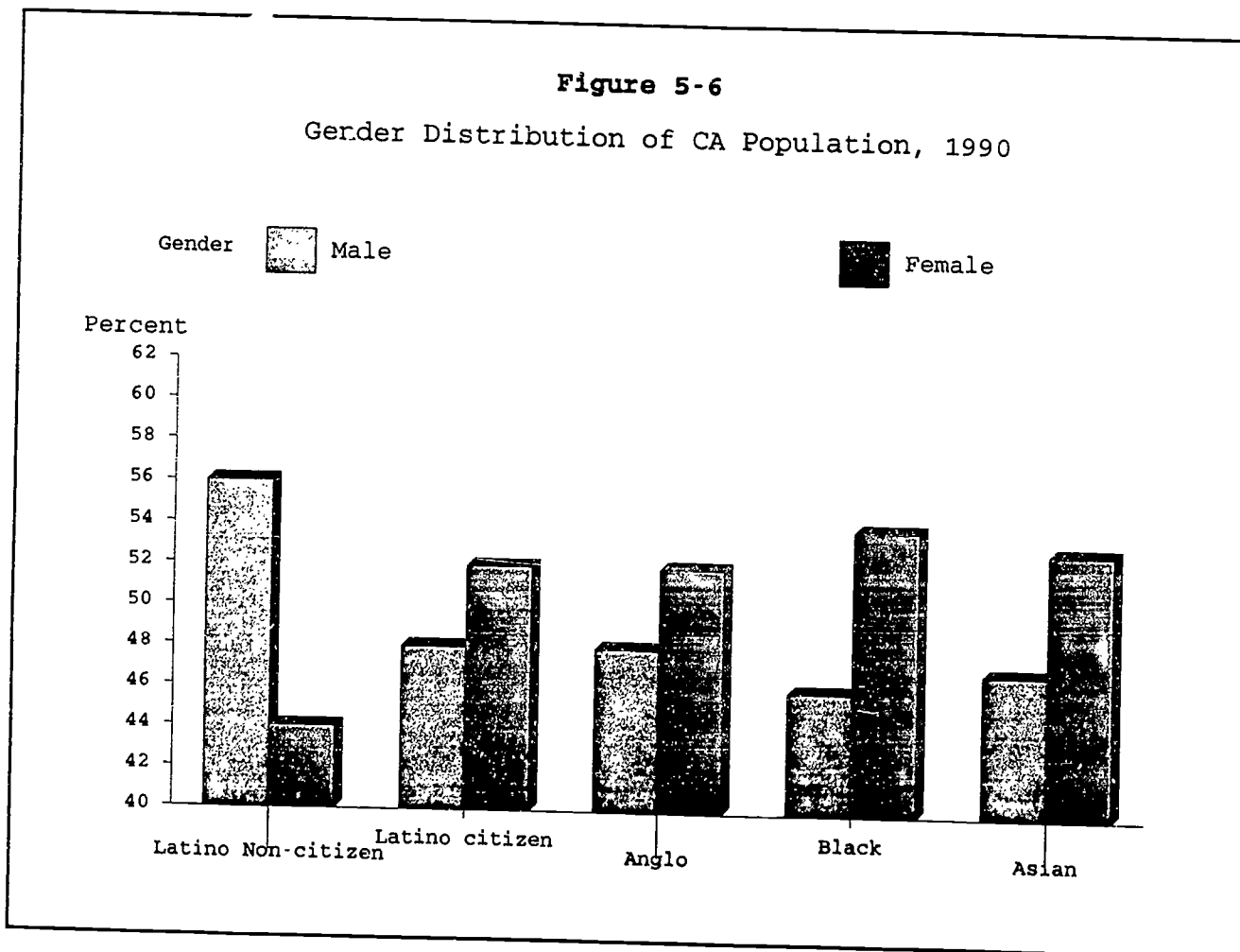

Gender Distribution of CA Population, 1990



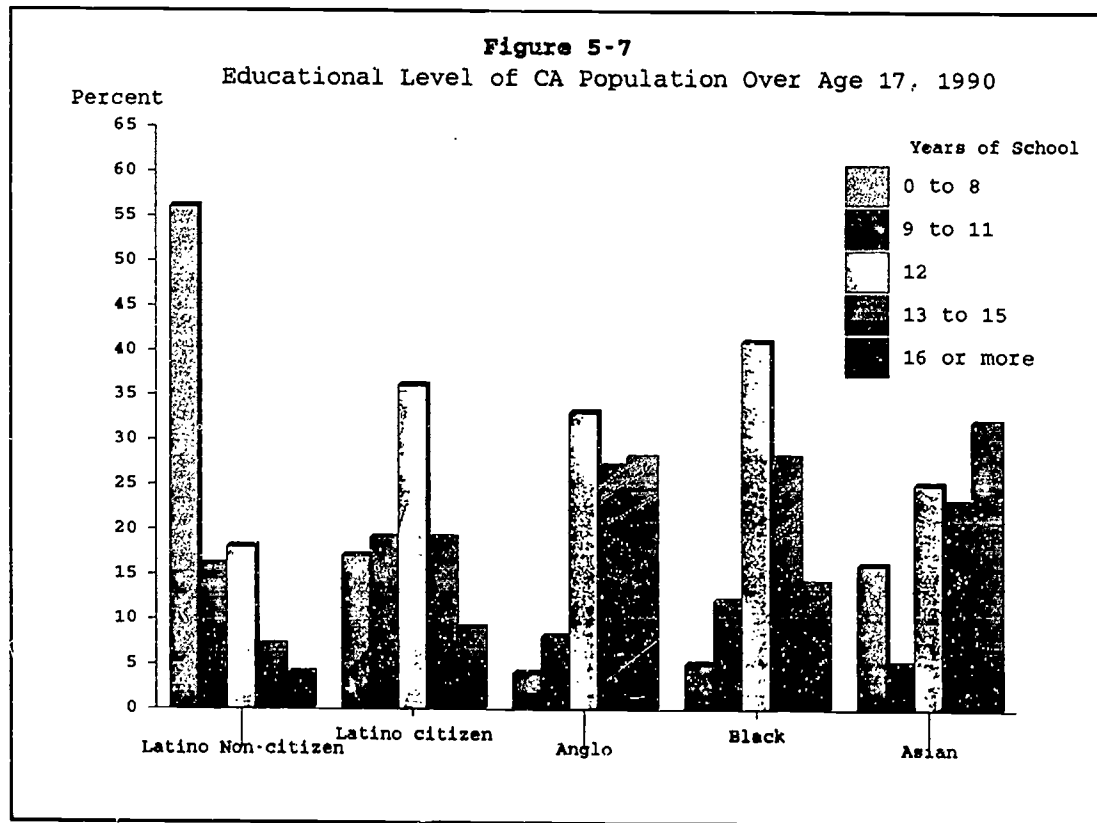

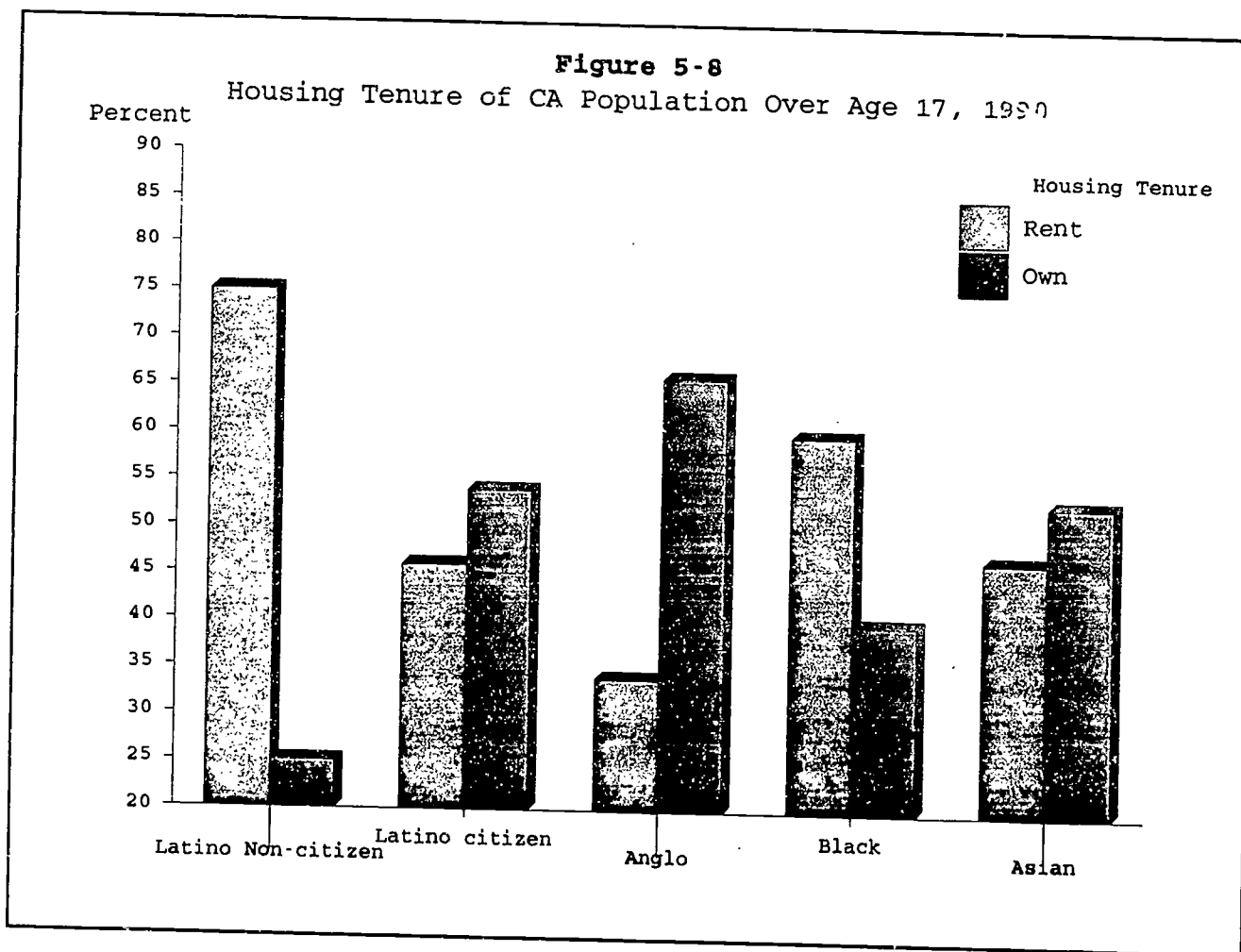

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THE CALIFORNIA POLICY SEMINAR
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California Latina/Latino Demographic Data Book

If "demography is destiny," then California's destiny is becoming decidedly more Latino. Of the 21 million Latinos in the United States, 34 percent (over 7 million) reside in California. Latinos represent one of the fastest growing ethnic groups in California; in 1980, they were 18 percent of the state's population, by 1990 they were 26 percent. Despite this tremendous growth, accurate and available data on this population have been almost nonexistent. As the following statistical highlights indicate, the characteristics of the Latino population should be of great interest to government policy-makers. For instance:

- Over 25 percent of Latinos in California are under the age of 15 and more than half are under age 25.
- 57 percent of Latino adults in California do not have a high school diploma and over 40 percent have only an elementary school education.
- 23 percent of California Latinos live below the poverty line, the highest level of any minority group.
- 24 percent of California Latinos speak English either "not well" or "not at all."

Latinos will clearly require more attention in areas such as education, health care, and job training in the decades to come. Furthermore, Latinos will generate many concerns specific to their linguistic and cultural needs. If public policy is to respond to the needs of the state's largest and most diverse minority population, accurate and easily understandable information about Latinos must be made available.

To remedy this information gap, UC DATA (University of California Data Archive and Technical Assistance) has produced this *California Latina/Latino Demographic Data Book*. The data used for this book comprise the most up-

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to-date demographic and social statistics on California's Latino population. Sources include the 1980 and the 1990 Decennial Censuses and several supplements from the Census Bureau's Current Population Surveys: the 1990 Annual Demographic File, the 1990 and 1988 Voter Supplements, and the 1988 Fertility, Birth Expectation, and Immigration Study. The Current Population Survey (CPS) is a monthly survey conducted by the Census Department with a sample size of over 120,000 respondents (for the Annual Demographic File, the sample size is 300,000). This enormous size allows for analysis on an individual level for minority populations and specific geographic units, such as metropolitan areas. Each month the CPS is supplemented with questions on a specific topic such as sources of income, immigration, or electoral participation. We have employed the CPS not only because it allows for individual-level analysis unavailable in the Census, but covers topics, such as political participation, that are not included in the Census.

Our goal is to provide a comprehensive report on the most significant qualitative aspects of Latino life in a manner easily understandable to readers not accustomed to quantitative data. Each section is organized around a particular facet of the Latino community, and most tables have accompanying figures to illustrate the data more clearly. Wherever appropriate, data on California's other ethnic or racial populations are provided for comparison. Since individual Latinos represent different national and cultural backgrounds, the Latino population is broken down into ethnic subgroups wherever possible.

Data in sections 1 through 4 come either from the 1990 Census or the 1990 Annual Demographic File of the Current Population Survey. Although the data from the 1990 Census are more detailed, they suffer in two respects. First, Summary Tape File Three of the 1990 Census (the most detailed data available when this report was prepared), provides

fixed-information tables on a county, city, or "place" (city or town) level. It does not allow for analysis of specific groups of individuals by any other characteristic. In order to provide information on Latinos with this data we have identified those "places" with high levels of Latinos and offered comparisons between them.

Second, the 1990 Census has limitations with respect to comparisons between Latinos and other racial groups. Although the Census questionnaire asked individuals to identify themselves by race (either white, black, American Indian, Asian/Pacific Islander, or other), it did not include a racial category for Latinos. Another question identified people of "Spanish/Hispanic" origin who were then asked to categorize themselves as:

Mexican, Mexican-American, Chicano, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Argentinean, Colombian, Costa Rican, Dominican, Ecuadoran, Guatemalan, Honduran, Nicaraguan, Peruvian, Salvadoran; from other Spanish-speaking countries of the Caribbean or Central or South America; or from Spain.

Responding to the question about race, 95 percent of the Latinos identified themselves as either "white" or "other" in roughly equal proportions. Consequently, for the 1990 Census data, comparisons between Latinos and other races are nonexclusive; in other words, racial categories such as "white," "black," and "other" contain Latinos unless otherwise noted. Readers should be aware that Tables 2-12, 2-13, 3-4, 4-5, and Figure 4-1 all contain comparisons of Latinos to other racial categories that also overlap Latinos.

The Current Population Survey questionnaire asks respondents to identify themselves according to a racial categorization identical to the Census categories, and, if appropriate, as either: 1) Mexican, Mexican-American, Chicano; 2) Puerto Rican; 3) Cuban; 4) Central or South American (Latin



American); 5) other; and 6) all other (non-Latino). Unlike the Census data, the data from the CPS permit analysts to distinguish Latinos from other racial categorizations. In what follows we employ the term "Anglo" to distinguish non-Latino whites from Latinos who identified themselves as "white." In the CPS tables, all racial groups, when compared to Latinos, are nonoverlapping, i.e., include only non-Latinos.

Finally, throughout the book, the category of "other" encompasses individuals from all racial groups not explicitly listed.

Report Organization

Section 1 presents general demographic statistics regarding Latinos in California and the United States. These data cover the number and proportion of Latinos within the California population and crosstabulations by age and gender, as well as crosstabulations by both race and Latino ethnicity.

Section 2 covers the geographic distribution and living arrangements of California Latinos. We show where Latinos live within the state on both a county and city level, whether they rent or own, and the size and type of their households. This section provides some of the most detailed information on the composition of Latinos within particular counties and on those places with high concentrations (over 50 percent) of Latinos.

Section 3 shows the educational attainment of California's Latino population in comparison to other racial and ethnic groups and within subgroups of the Latino population. The education tables were restricted for age (25 years or over) in order to reveal final educational attainment. In addition we have included supplementary tables with statistics for current school enrollment by the school-age population. Finally, the section includes data on language skills and the primary language spoken at home.

Section 4 addresses such economic variables as occupation, employment, income, and poverty rates.

This section gives a detailed picture of the occupation of Latinos and the median income in places with high concentrations of Latinos. The section also provides detailed comparisons of Latinos in two occupational subgroups usually associated with Latino migrant communities: unskilled workers and farm laborers.

Since over 50 percent of the Latino population are noncitizens, we have set aside Section 5 for comparisons between Latino citizens and noncitizens. The dataset used for these tables is the 1990 November Voter Supplement to the Current Population Survey. Because of sampling variability, numbers for this and subsequent tables will not exactly match those of the Annual Demographic File. The data are weighted to best represent the proportional size of certain demographic groups, including Latinos. Section 5 offers comparisons between citizen and noncitizen Latinos and citizens of other racial groups on topics such as age, gender, education, occupation, housing tenure, and area of residence.

Section 6 pertains primarily to political participation, with rates of registration and voting for various racial and ethnic populations based on both all voting-age residents and citizens only. Data on the 1988 presidential election from the 1988 November Voter Supplement to the Current Population Survey were used for this section. The comparisons between voting-age and eligible populations demonstrate that Latinos appear to have comparatively low rates of voter turnout largely because nearly half of all California Latinos are ineligible to vote. The section also provides crosstabulations of voting and race/ethnicity by age, marital status, gender, education, and income.

Section 7 focuses on nativity and immigration, using data derived primarily from the supplement to the 1988 Current Population Survey on Fertility, Birth Expectations, and Immigration. The section compares immigrant populations in Latino and non-Latino racial categories, paying particular attention



to distinctions between arrival dates. It also compares Latino immigrants arriving before 1980 and after 1980 with native Latinos and other racial groups. This comparison provides graphic evidence of the effect of prolonged residence in the United States.

Data Availability

Persons interested in further analysis may obtain two electronic files of the original data used in the tables. The first file is stored on computer tape readable by IBM mainframe computers, and consists of the three datasets from the Current Population Surveys (1990 Annual Demographic File and the 1990 and 1988 November Voter Supplement File, as well as the 1988 Immigration Supplement File), together with the SPSS code used to read the data files and produce the tables. The second file is in the form of ASCII and dBase-III files that contain, on IBM-PC-compatible floppy disks, all the data from the 1990 and 1980 Census Summary Tape Files used in preparing this data book. The floppy disk also contains selected information for census tracts in Los Angeles County with greater than 50 percent Latino population, which were not published here for reasons of space.
