ABSTRACT

In fiscal year (FY) 1991, the U.S. Department of Education made 36 awards totaling \$5,854,924 under the Strengthening Research Library Resources Program (Higher Education Act Title II-C) to 26 major research libraries throughout the country. The funding supports research library projects designed to make certain rare and unique materials more accessible. This is accomplished through three major kinds of activities: bibliographic control, preservation, and collection development. This document contains abstracts of the projects funded in FY 1991 listed alphabetically by institution. The information provided in the abstracts includes: institution; project director(s); program focus; grant period; FY 1991 funding; grant number; and title and description of the project. An analysis of the FY 1991 applications and grantees is also presented. Tables and figures of project statistics are appended. (JLB)

Foreword

In the Education Amendments of 1976, Congress authorized the Higher Education Act, Title II-C (HEA Title II-C), Strengthening Research Library Resources Program, with these words:

“The expansion in the scope of educational research programs and the rapid increase in the worldwide production of recorded knowledge have placed unprecedented demands upon major research libraries, requiring programs and services that strain the capabilities of cooperative action and are beyond the financial competence of individual or collective library budgets.”

From the first year of funding in 1978 through the 12 years that followed, significant contributions have been made to the research community by the projects funded through this program. Millions of records describing rare and unique research materials have been entered into international, national, regional, and local networks. Subject areas whose coverage has been scattered and uncoordinated have come into focus. Diversity continues to be one of the keywords as we look at the 1991 projects ranging from such unrelated interests as Russian and Polish studies, mathematics education, and Middle East studies.

This booklet describes briefly the projects funded in fiscal year 1991. While the strain on the financial capabilities of library budgets has reached the crisis stage, the evidences of cooperation are clearer than ever. HEA Title II-C money continues to encourage and assist in this effort.

Introduction

In fiscal year 1991, the U.S. Department of Education made 36 awards totaling \$5,854,924 under the Strengthening Research Library Resources Program (HEA Title II-C) to 26 major research libraries throughout the country.

The funding supports research library projects designed to make certain rare and unique materials more accessible. This is accomplished through three major kinds of activities: bibliographic control, preservation, and collection development. All of the grantees engage in one or more of these activities as indicated at the head of each project abstract.

Bibliographic control was by far the predominant activity among fiscal year recipients. Seventy-six percent of FY 91 funds (\$4.44 million) were awarded to support institutions in their efforts to make known the contents and locations of holdings through the production of machine-readable catalog records, which are then contributed to national databases. Fifteen percent of FY 91 funds (\$851,780) supported the preservation of fragile and deteriorating materials through such routine techniques as microfilming, cleaning, rebinding, and rehousing. Nine percent (\$555,225) of FY 91 funds were awarded for the collection of rare and unique research materials to fill in gaps and strengthen existing collections. For an analysis of the FY 91 grant awards by major activity, as well as a summary of funded activities in previous years, please see the appendices.

In several of the project abstracts, you will note that the grant recipient worked collaboratively with other institutions. Taking into account these joint projects, FY 91 grants directly benefited an additional 6 institutions beyond the 26 primary grantees. In addition, benefits were extended to the more than 10,000 members of the two national bibliographic utilities—OCLC (Online Computer Library Center) and RLIN (Research Libraries Information Network)—and the thousands of members of the local and regional networks in which grantees participate.

This booklet contains abstracts for each project funded in FY 91, as well as summary tables on program activities from the first year of funding in FY 78 through FY 91.

Preservation Microfilming of the Dwight W. Morrow Papers

The Amherst College Archives will conduct a project to microfilm the Dwight W. Morrow Papers to preserve these primary source materials and to expand access to them by scholars from local, regional, national and international research communities. Statesman, financier, and lawyer, Dwight W. Morrow (1873-1931) left a substantial body of personal papers including correspondence, speeches, reports, scrapbooks, memoranda, meeting minutes, publications, news clippings files, family financial records, photographs, and some artifacts. The papers cover Morrow's work as a partner at J.P. Morgan & Company (1914-27) and as ambassador to Mexico (1927-30).

Although the papers are consulted regularly, their deteriorated condition poses a threat for future use. Preservation microfilming, according to current preservation guidelines and ANSI/AIIM standards, will ensure access for the research needs of national and international scholars. Materials will be prepared inhouse for filming by the Northeast Document Conservation Center. Once filming is complete, records will be entered on OCLC and reported to other appropriate databases.

Microfilming, Acquisition, and Bibliographic Access: The Chaim Weizmann Archives, Rehovot, Israel

This project will strengthen the Brandeis University Libraries' collection in Modern Jewish History, Modern History, and History and Politics of the Middle East by acquiring microfilm copies of the Chaim Weizmann Archives in Rehovot, Israel. Brandeis will microfilm approximately 62,000 of the most important unpublished documents and the catalog for the Archives, and will produce two contact negatives and two use copies. They will also create an electronic index from the existing catalog of the collection using the RLIN AMC format, and evaluate the Weizmann Archives catalog to determine the best way of upgrading the record to American standards so the detailed information can be loaded into RLIN and OCLC.

Extending Access to the C.V. Starr East Asian Library

This project will provide widely accessible machine readable records for 1,200 Chinese and 600 Japanese rare and little-held titles in the C.V. Starr East Asian Library. It will also help to secure the future availability of these items through repairing worn stitched bindings (525 volumes) and providing preservation cases (464). The C. V. Starr East Asian Library is one of the top five East Asian libraries in North America, and its collection is among the best in the world. Its holdings are used extensively by a worldwide community of scholars. While many of the library's book holdings are accessible through bibliographic records in the Research Libraries Information Network (RLIN) and Columbia's online catalog (CLIO), the two collections that are the focus of this project are of great value to East Asian scholarship and will become widely accessible.

Extending Access to the Avery Architectural and Fine Arts Library

Continued from a FY 90 grant, this project will improve and extend access to rare architectural books by providing machine-readable bibliographic records for 5,825 rarely held titles in the Avery Architectural and Fine Arts Library. To assure continuing availability of these collections to scholars, the project also provides for appropriate preservation treatment for 655 of these items which are in fragile condition.

The Avery Library, founded in 1890, is the premier architectural library in North America and among the top three architectural libraries in the world. Its holdings are used extensively by a large community of scholars both nationally and internationally. While most of the library's holdings are accessible through bibliographic records in RLIN and Columbia's online catalog (CLIO), the two important collections targeted in this project have remained uncataloged and largely inaccessible. Among the rare materials that will become more widely known are *My Father Who Is on Earth* by John Lloyd Wright, containing original marginal annotations by both the author and his son, Frank Lloyd Wright, and Davis Henry Arnot's *Gothic Architecture Applied to Modern Residences, 1848*.

Improved Access to Research Materials in Mathematics Education

Milbank Memorial Library of Teachers College, Columbia University will strengthen its nationally significant collections in the field of mathematics education through an integrated project including collection development, bibliographic control to facilitate scholarly access, and first-phase preservation.

Building upon the library's existing collections, which include theoretical works, pedagogical materials, and elementary and secondary school textbooks published in the United States and abroad, the collection development phase of the project will consist primarily of the selection, acquisition, and cataloging of approximately 500 works on the theory, methods, and institutional practices of mathematics education published since 1970 in eastern and western Europe and Asia. In addition, the project will catalog approximately 750 uncataloged titles from the David Eugene Smith Collection, consisting primarily of 19th century and early 20th century textbooks and pedagogical works. Appropriate first-phase preservation care will be given to the older materials and such other materials as required.

The project will make a substantial addition to the nationally available resources for scholarship in mathematics education by adding both distinctive older materials and significant international materials to the library's holdings and to the RLIN database. Increased scholarly access to such materials can be expected to contribute to the nation's ongoing effort to promote improvement in mathematics education and to extend effective education in this area to all youth, women, and members of ethnic minorities.

Preservation of a Heritage Collection: Identifying and Preserving the Core Literature of Entomology

This project will identify and preserve a heritage collection for the discipline of entomology. Using both qualitative and quantitative methods of evaluation, preservation priorities will be established for the literature of the discipline. Evaluation will include ranking of titles by scholars according to historical significance of the material. Those titles included in the heritage collection which are brittle will be reformatted by means of either preservation microform or preservation photocopy, depending on the characteristics of the materials. This project is focusing on the identification, evaluation, and reformatting of 1,242 volumes of core North American serials.

Bibliographic records will be upgraded and will reflect preservation in the RLIN database. Results will be widely publicized in the scholarly and professional community. Through these efforts the most significant literature in the discipline of entomology will be preserved and made more accessible.

Retrospective Conversion of Music Catalogs of the Associated Music Libraries Group

The Associated Music Libraries Group, comprising the Eastman School of Music of the University of Rochester, Harvard University, Indiana University, Stanford University, the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, the University of Michigan, the University of California at Los Angeles, Yale University, and Cornell University propose the retrospective conversion of 29,407 manual bibliographic records for printed music and 13,240 records for sound recordings for entry into OCLC and RLIN. Approximately 10,000 authority records will also be produced and contributed to LCNAF through the NACO/LSP Center located at Indiana University. The standards used will be drawn from the "National Retrospective Conversion Plan for Music." The project will benefit both scholars seeking music resources, and other music libraries preparing for their own retrospective conversion projects by increasing significantly the number of available bibliographic records for music materials in the national online databases.

Cataloging and Preserving the Harold Jantz Collection of German-Americana

Continued from a FY 90 grant, the Milton S. Eisenhower Library of the Johns Hopkins University and the Perkins Library of Duke University will conduct a cooperative project for the purpose of providing national access to the Harold Jantz Collection. The collection is an essential resource for the study of 16th, 17th, and early 18th century German literature, as well as being a storehouse of other types of early German-Americana.

The objectives of this project will be for Johns Hopkins University to provide full cataloging records for 1,800 of the microfilmed titles and for Duke University to provide full cataloging records for the 3,000 titles comprising the German-Americana portion of the collection. Records will be contributed to OCLC and RLIN. Additionally, the portion of the collection that has not been preserved by microfilming will be conserved and filmed.

Included in this project are the works of most well-known German Baroque poets, but also the lesser-known works of famous authors and the important works of lesser-known writers of the German Baroque era. Further, the collection contains the foremost assemblage of German-Americana in this country. The Jantz Collection is of national and international importance to researchers and scholars throughout the humanities and social sciences, as well as in the fields of art, political science, history, and music.

Documenting the Contemporary American South

The libraries at Duke University, North Carolina State University, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill hold the most extensive collections of Southern Americana in the world, particularly for the pre-World War II South. Through a joint review of their collections, librarians from the three institutions will document the contemporary South with the same breadth and depth found in the historical collections by coordinating their collecting efforts for Southern Americana. The major objective of the project is to build research collections that will enable scholars to undertake, from a single geographic location, multistate and comparative studies of the post-World War II South. The three libraries will develop-integrated collections in the subjects of regional development, race and race relations, regional culture, and the regional environment, filling in the retrospective lacunae in these subjects and expanding into new formats.

Retrospective Conversion of Pre-1971 Catalog Records of the Andover-Harvard Theological Library

The Harvard University Library will improve national bibliographic access to the Andover-Harvard Theological Library of the Harvard Divinity School by converting to machine-readable form the approximately 175,000 manual card catalog records of monograph titles and to enhance, where necessary, the converted records to the contemporary standard. The Andover-Harvard Theological Library has comprehensive collections in the Biblical field, i.e., texts, theology, commentaries and criticism, hermeneutics, and archaeology. The library also has great strength in the liberal tradition, e.g., the Unitarian, Universalist, and Congregational lines, the predecessors of these modern denominations, and the non-conforming bodies, e.g., the Mennonites, Quakers, Anabaptists, Moravians, and Arminians.

The project will add an estimated 57,750 unique records to RLIN and OCLC. Moreover, the addition of the original records to the national database will occur after these non-matched records have become full MARC records, with standard subject tracings and authorized name headings.

Recording the Huntington Library's Eighteenth-Century Books in the 18th-Century Short Title Catalogue (ESTC) Database

The Huntington is undertaking a cataloging project to make all of its 18th-century books printed in English available to scholars through the Eighteenth-Century Short Title Catalogue database (ESTC), a computerized bibliographical resource. The Huntington's collection of 18th-century books printed in English includes 32,200 titles to be included in the ESTC. Approximately 16,000 titles need individual attention in order to be properly entered in the database. Of these, over 2,700 represent entirely new records for the ESTC.

Improving Access to the Afro-Americana Collection, 1553-1906

The Library Company, established in 1731 by Benjamin Franklin, is the nation's oldest library and a founding member of the Independent Research Library Association (IRLA). Its collection documents every aspect of history and background of American culture from the colonial period to about 1800. In this project, the library will begin to catalog into RLIN the 10,000 imprints in its Afro-Americana Collection spanning 400 years, from the 16th century to the early years of the 20th century. The imprints comprise material on the early exploration of Africa, the Atlantic slave trade, American and Caribbean slavery, the antislavery movement in the United States, the proslavery arguments, the politics of slavery in antebellum America, colonization, Reconstruction, and the culture of free blacks up to about 1900. Cataloging of these materials into the RLIN and OCLC databases will make them fully accessible for the first time locally and equally accessible online in hundreds of libraries throughout the country. Approximately half of the records will be original cataloging of imprints new to the RLIN database. In addition, the collection will be strengthened through selective acquisition of pre-1900 imprints not yet in the collection and through the acquisition of Afro-Americana monographs. At the conclusion of the project, records will be tapeloaded into OCLC.

Resource Identification and Preservation of the A.W. Kuchler Vegetation Map Collection

The A.W. Kuchler Vegetation Map Collection is the largest private collection of its type in the world. Composed of over 2,000 maps and 500 books, the collection covers every country of the world, depicting the various types of natural vegetation. This project will catalog and preserve the map collection and will significantly enhance bibliographic control and access to this internationally known and unique research resource. Cataloging and preservation of the 2,000 maps and 500 books and booklets will provide unified online access to the collection, which will be retrievable nationwide immediately upon entry into OCLC as well as locally in the online catalog of the library. The preservation and conservation part of the project will apply the standards established by the American Institute for the Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works to ensure the accessibility of the collection for future use. This will include deacidification of the highly acidic paper on which most of the maps and books are printed.

By making the contents of this collection accessible through international databases and by preserving and conserving the original maps, the library will be supporting valuable and necessary research in many fields.

Access, Preservation, Conservation, and Collection Enhancement of Slavic and East European Manuscripts and Books

The project has as its focus the book and manuscript collections of the New York Public Library, produced in, and concerning Old Rus', Muscovy, the Russian Empire, and almost a dozen nations of Eastern Europe up to the year 1860.

The project's objectives are (A) to identify old and rare Russian and East European vernacular materials (including items in non-Slavic Eastern European languages, such as Hungarian, Albanian, and Romanian); old Slavica (i.e., pre-1860 works about the Slavic lands in non-Slavic Western European languages); and Church Slavic materials (i.e., books and manuscripts from the many Slavic countries employing the "universal" liturgical language of Church Slavic) in the holdings of NYPL; (B) to catalog for the first time, and extensively enhance cataloging and authority control in RLIN and OCLC for all books and manuscripts—approximately 2,700 titles—not presently cataloged online, including important works of relevant secondary reference literature in the library's backlog which will form the basis for a national union catalog of pre-1800 Slavic and East European imprints in the United States; (C) conserve by providing basic collection care (i.e., cleaning and minor repair, as necessary) of approximately 300 pre-1800 books and manuscripts, creating "phased" or "drop-spine" boxes, and rehousing in a special, non-offgassing storage cabinet; (D) to preserve approximately 540 important or unique items by microfilming; and (E) selectively to enhance the collection by acquiring reference works in such relevant areas as descriptive and analytical bibliography, palaeography, watermarks, bindings, and other aspects of Russian and East European book culture via microfilm or hardcopy from Soviet and East European repositories.

Improved Access to the Audiovisual Materials in the New York Public Library Rare Books and Manuscript Division

The New York Public Library will preserve and make available the audiovisual materials in the archival and manuscript collections of the Rare Books and Manuscripts Division. The library's holdings of noncommercial audiotapes, videotapes, phonodiscs, and motion pictures include film footage of a 1932 disarmament rally, untranscribed oral history interviews with veterans of the Spanish Civil War, recollections of elderly gays and lesbians, films detailing air and noise pollution, and panel discussions with Jorge Luis Borges, Henry Steele Commager, Allen Ginsberg, John Kenneth Galbraith, and many others. Most are single copies in vulnerable physical condition. Preservation and service copies will be made of over 1,300 audiotapes, 300 motion pictures and 102 videotapes. The copying of moving image materials will be contracted to outside laboratories. A sound preservation laboratory will be established in the library's annex to copy the recordings already held, and to enable the copying of recordings as they are received with future acquisitions as well as the periodic recopying of preservation masters. Cataloging of Southeast Asia Microfiche: A Major Microforms Project

This project, continued from a FY 90 grant, will provide bibliographic control and national and international access to major research resources from Indonesia that are available to scholars only in microfiche collections. Since 1960, the Library of Congress has been acquiring materials via the National Program for Acquisitions and Cataloging (NPAC) headquartered in Jakarta, Indonesia, and copying the items onto microfiche. More than 95 percent of the materials represented in the fiche are Indonesian imprints or deal with Indonesia, and the paper copies are unavailable in this country.

The ability to access the subject content of this information has been hindered as only author and title cataloging are currently available. Enhancing Scholarly Research Through Improved Bibliographic Access to Russian/Soviet and East European Library Research Resources

The libraries of the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution, and Peace, the University of California at Berkeley, and Stanford University, together will create machine-readable bibliographic records for Russian, Soviet, and East European library materials now represented in each institution's local card catalog. Preservation of the Russian Embassy Collections

This project addresses the preservation of the Hoover Institution's collection of archival materials of the Russian Embassy in the United States (1897-1933) and the Russian Embassy in France (1916-24). The materials in the collections, many of which have reached an advanced state of deterioration, will be preserved by microfilming onto archival-quality microfilm. Federation of Southern Cooperatives and Emergency Land Fund Papers

Basic conservation procedures, arrangement, and preparation of a register containing historical and biographical notes, scope notes, and container lists, will be provided for Tulane's collection of the Federation of Southern Cooperatives (FSC) and the Emergency Land Fund papers. Access will be provided via the entry of bibliographic records into OCLC and TULANET, the university's local online catalog. The Cataloging and Conservation of Rubbings of Chinese Inscriptions

The East Asiatic Library at Berkeley holds the largest collection of Chinese rubbings of any American university. Inscriptions were made in vast numbers, especially in stone, to record or commemorate events and to establish and preserve officially approved texts of philosophical and religious canons. These inked impressions of inscriptions, or rubbings, from nearly 2,600 years of Chinese history are particularly valuable research materials as they provide considerable data for studying Chinese civilization. This project will compile a detailed catalog record that will include for each of the 2,700 rubbings, title, subject, author, calligrapher, provenance, date, and other key facts that can be determined. The cataloging of these items will broaden the ability to search the many subject areas covered by the inscriptions and will make the whereabouts of this material known. Researchers in numerous areas of study will find this new subject access for the inscriptions invaluable. The North American editorial center for the Eighteenth Century Short-Title Catalogue (ESTC/NA), whose permanent headquarters is at Riverside, will continue to create full bibliographic records for reels 1-48 of the set, *Early English Books: Series I, 1475-1640*, published by University Microfilms International (UMI). Pilot Project to Create A Digitized Database for the Trust Territory Photo Collection

Cataloging the O'Hegarty Irish Library Materials

Providing Access to Resources on Southern Americana

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC-CH) will preserve and make nationally accessible its manuscript, sound recording, and pamphlet collections, documenting the American South from the 18th century to the post-World War II era. Conservation and Preservation of Confederate Imprints

The Virginia Historical Society holds a unique Confederate imprints collection that includes books, pamphlets, broadsides, maps, sheet music, pictorial prints, newspapers, and magazines published in Confederate-held territory. These materials date from the time of each state's secession to the surrender of troops by a military commander or governmental official.

The imprints will be conserved and preserved by rehousing and encapsulation as well as by more extensive treatments such as washing, deacidification, and extensive mending.

This project will conserve and preserve the imprints so that researchers will be able to view and utilize the historic artifact itself.

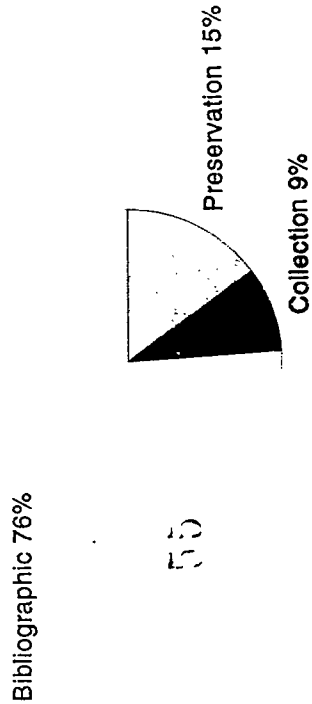

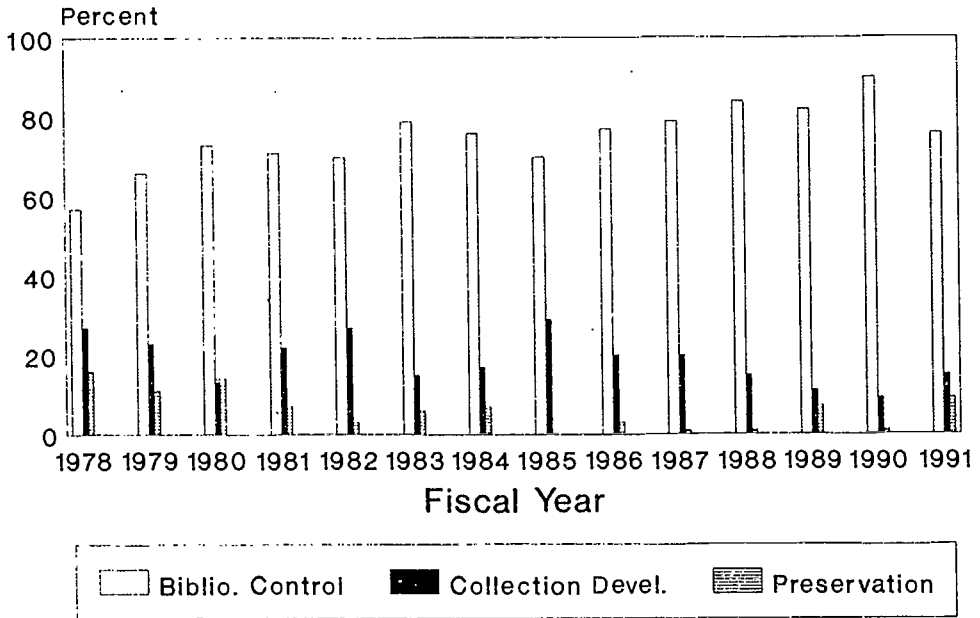

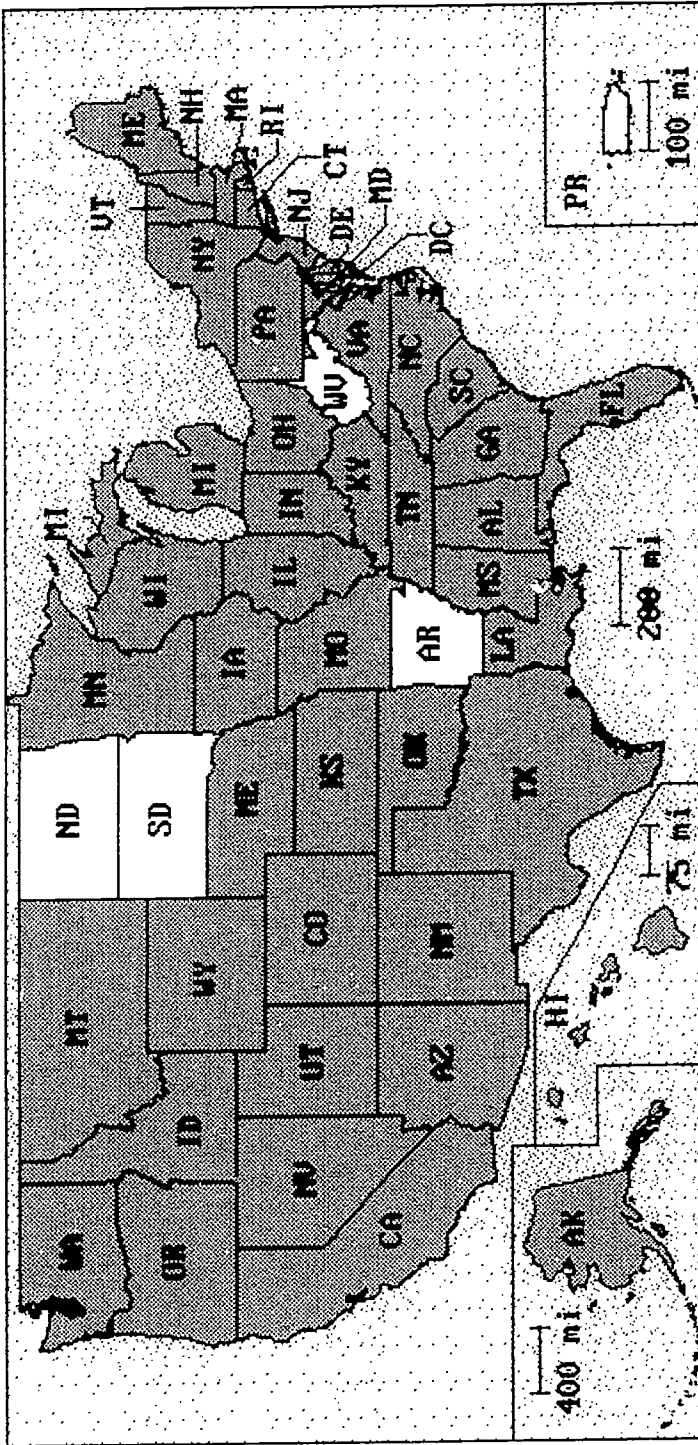
Chart illustrates shifts in program focus during the fourteen years of the program, 1978-91. Funds expended on bibliographic control have climbed from 57 percent in the first year to a high of 90 percent in 1990. A substantial decrease occurred in 1991. Collection development, never a major expenditure, reached its peak of 16 percent in the first year, dropping gradually to a negligible percent, resting at 1 percent in both 1987 and 1988, but showing a marked increase over the past four years in 1989. Preservation, which has hovered in the 20 percent area for most of the fourteen years, dropped to 9 percent in 1990 but nearly doubled in 1991. These emphases are placed on the program by the library community. Department of Education has set no funding priorities.
