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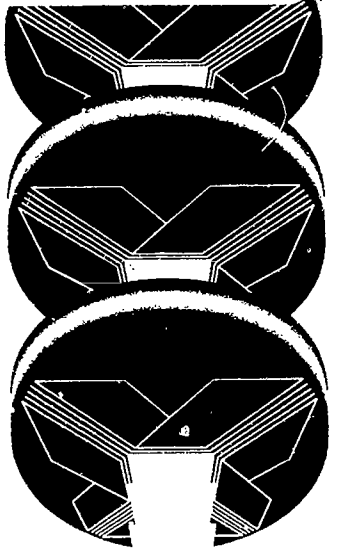
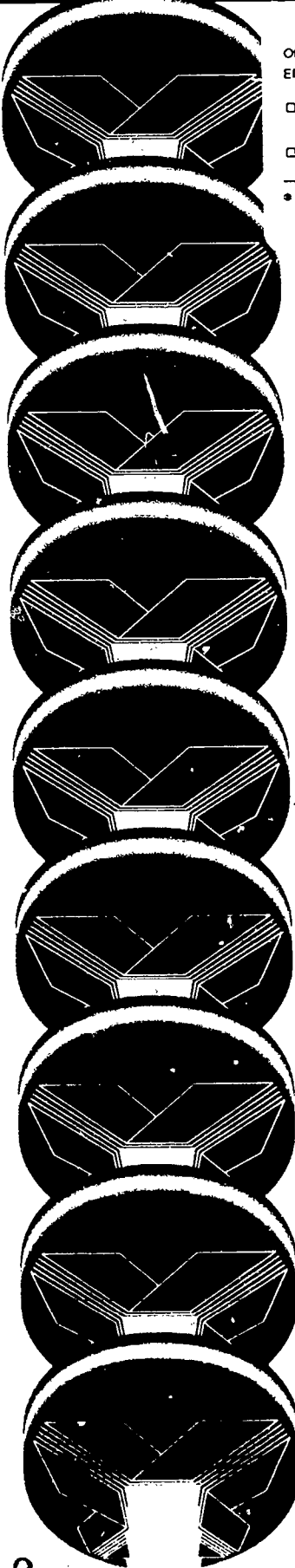
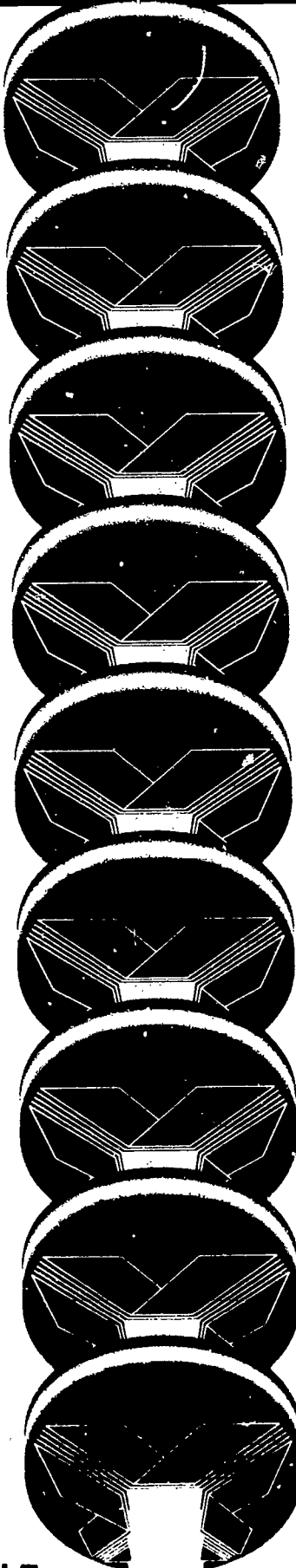
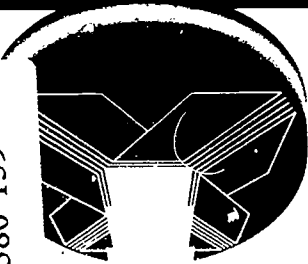
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ABSTRACT

This annual publication describes the collections, staffing, expenditures, and interlibrary loan activity of 108 university and 11 nonuniversity library members of the Association of Research Libraries (ARL) during the 1993-94 fiscal year. Sections I, II, III, and IV contain: a 27-item selected bibliography; summary data tables on collections, expenditures, interlibrary loans, and personnel; an analysis of selected variables; and Ph.D., faculty, and enrollment statistics, respectively. Section V provides rank order tables of university libraries for the following statistical information: volumes in library; volumes added (gross); current serials (totals); microform holdings; government documents; materials expenditures; salaries and wages expenditures; other operating expenditures; total library expenditures; monographs purchased (volumes); expenditures for monographs; serials purchased (subscriptions); expenditures for serials; total items loaned; total items borrowed; professional staff (full-time equivalent--FTE); support staff (FTE); and total staff (FTE). A copy of the ARL statistics questionnaire is provided in sections VI and VII contain the questionnaire and footnotes to statistics. An appendix lists ARL member libraries. (MAS)

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Introduction

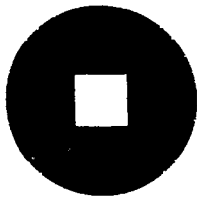
The 1993-94 *ARL Statistics* is an annual publication that describes the collections, staffing, expenditures, and interlibrary loan activities of 108 university and 11 nonuniversity library members of the Association of Research Libraries during the 1993-94 fiscal year. The ARL membership consists of the largest research libraries in North America, representing 15 Canadian and 104 U.S. research institutions.

The academic libraries represent 90% of the membership, comprised of 13 Canadian and 95 U.S. libraries. The ARL data series on these institutions is probably the most comprehensive time series that describes trends for academic libraries dating back to 1907/08. Statistics have been collected and issued annually for the members of the Association of Research Libraries since 1961-62. Before that, annual statistics for university libraries have been collected by James Gerould, first at Minnesota and later at Princeton. These data cover the years 1907-08 through 1961-62 and are now called the Gerould statistics. The whole data series from 1908 to the present represents the oldest continuing library statistical series in North America. At present 1993 and 1994 data are available over the Internet. The first electronic publication of the ARL Statistics on the World Wide Web (WWW) was prepared by Paul Bergen, John Price-Wilkin, and Kendon Stubbs at the University of Virginia's Social Science Data Center in the Alderman Library. The electronic publication has an interactive data analysis component (see title page verso for location information).

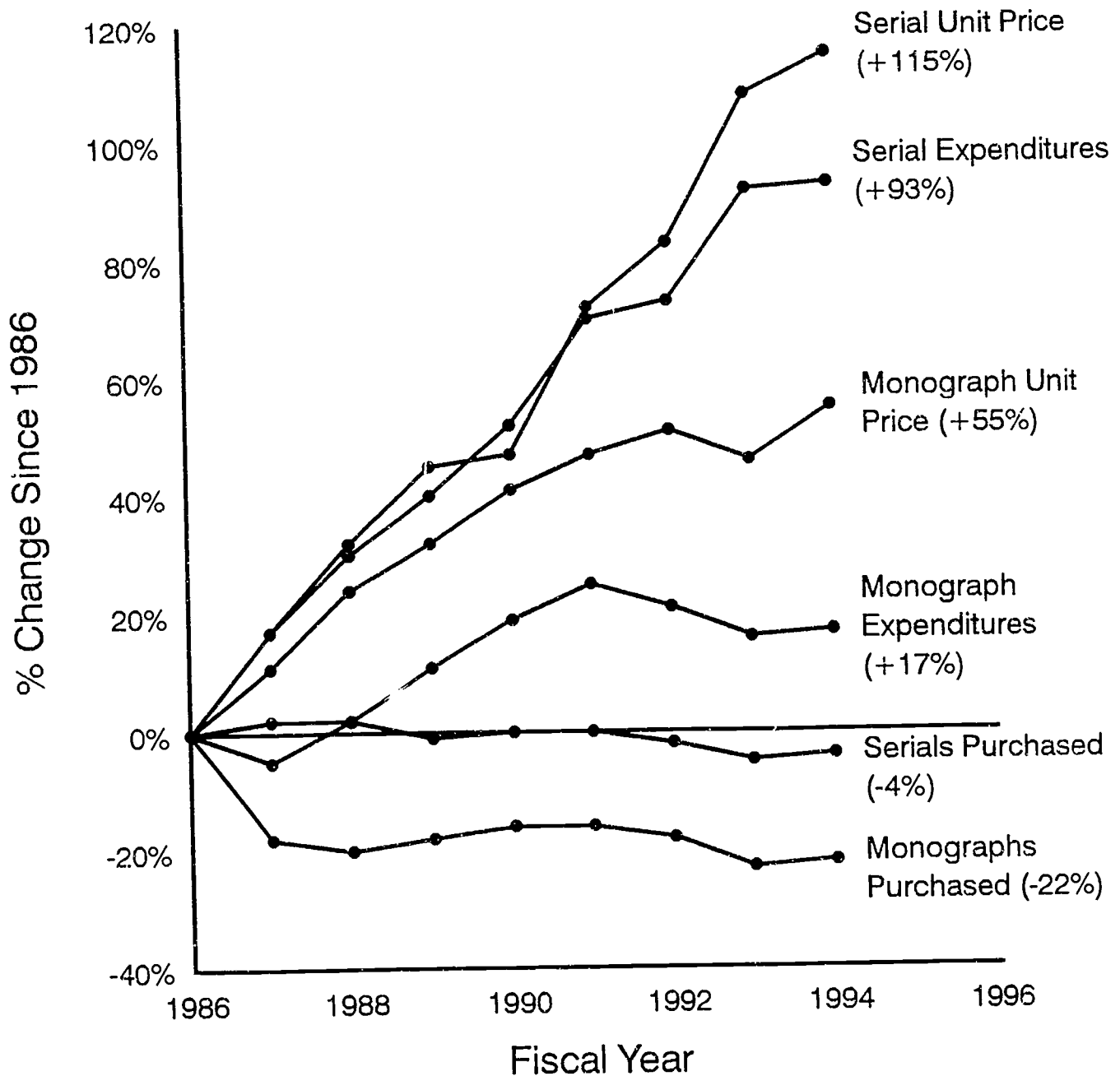
Despite the fact that ARL membership represents a small number of academic libraries, these institutions account for a large part of the academic library market in terms of the size of assets, budgets, and users they represent. For that reason, ARL data, although limited to describing ARL member institutions, are useful indicators in describing academic library trends for U.S. and Canadian institutions.

The graphs and tables presented in the introduction show the percentage changes in selected variables for academic libraries since 1986. The first graph describes the costs of serial and monograph acquisitions in ARL libraries; the second one, entitled "Supply and Demand," compares growth in numbers of users with changes in on-site resources and resource-sharing activities; and the third one, "Resources per Student," shows whether certain resources are increasing or decreasing on a per student basis. The discussion also includes a description of changes in personnel resources and expenditures for personnel. The graphs are based on time series that start in 1986, and they depict only those libraries that have had no missing data in the respective variables since 1986. Although these graphs are based on less than the full population of 108 academic libraries, additional analysis has been carried out to ensure that the time series trends represent population trends.

Major trends that are apparent from these graphs are large increases in monograph and serial costs, declining acquisitions of serials and monographs, and increased levels of activity for interlibrary loan operations. Although it is tempting to draw generalizations from these major trends, it would be a mistake to oversimplify. The environment of academic libraries is complicated. To some extent, these trends are tied to the transformational nature of new technologies and networking capabilities. Although most monographs and serial titles are still

produced in a paper format, traditional formats are being challenged by electronic means of producing and disseminating scholarly information. Electronic communication and the establishment of networks, consortia, and interinstitutional agreements are similarly making more effective the dissemination of information not only for digitized materials but for printed books and/or photocopies as well. Other possible explanations for the trends above could also be the strong emphasis on scientific and technical research, expectations for timely information, twigging effect of specialization in new fields of knowledge, etc. No matter what the underlying causal relations, research libraries are exchanging some of the traditional archival imperative for the demands of the 'information here and now' imperative.

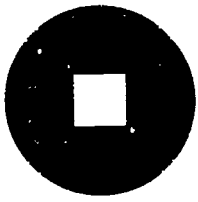

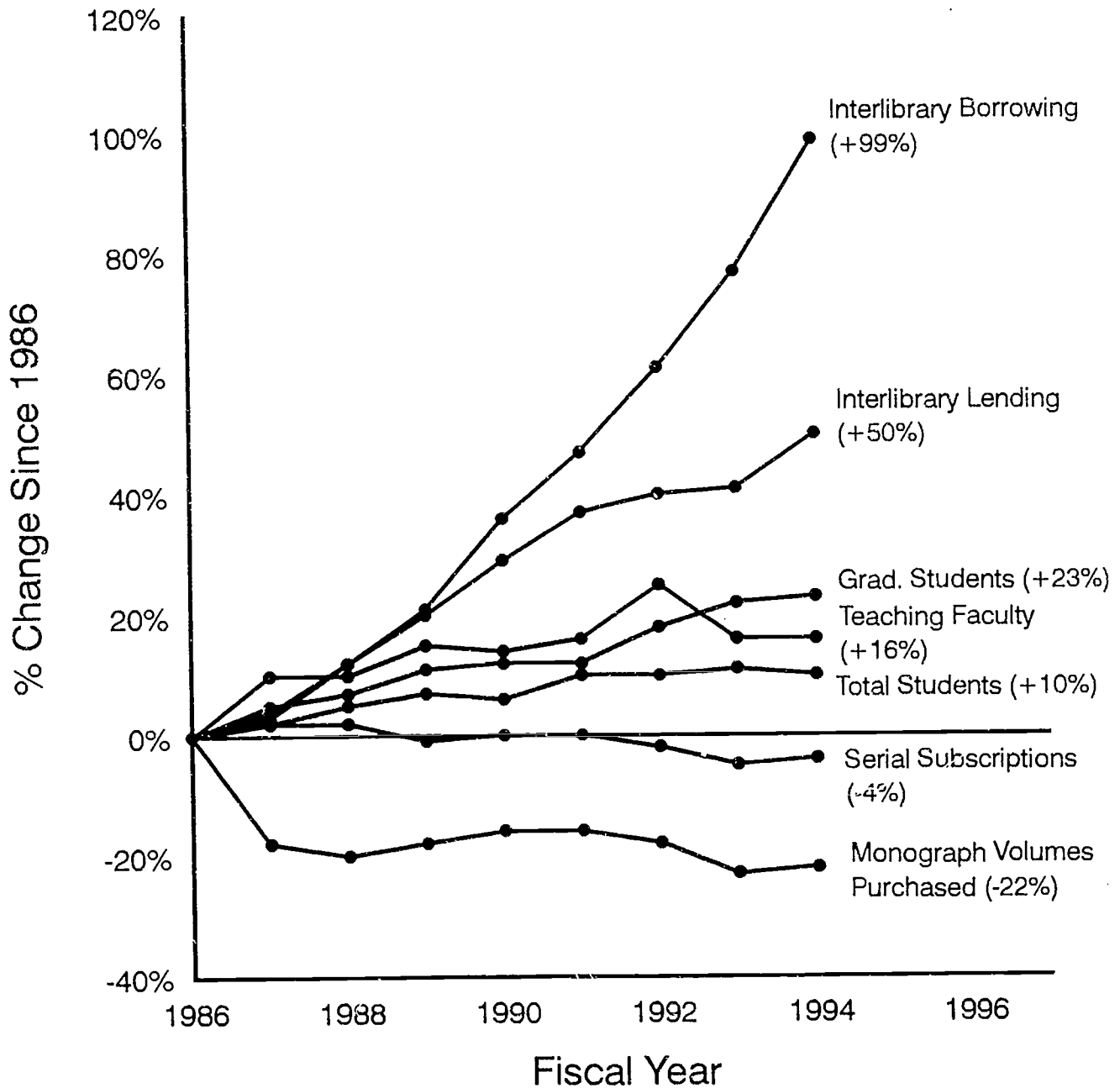
In more specific terms, ARL data show that since 1986 ARL libraries spent 93% more on serials while buying 4% fewer serials and 17% more on monographs while buying 22% fewer monographs. ARL libraries bought 1% more serials and monographs last year than the previous year. This could be a sign that the downward trend of declining serial and monographic acquisitions of the previous two years may be slowing down. On the other hand, it could be the effect of libraries deciding to cut back on those serials subscriptions that had highest inflation rates.

The inflationary unit prices for both serials and monographs continue to increase. The 6.5% percent increase in the monograph unit price during 1993-94 is the largest since 1990. The annual average increase is 5.7% for monographs since 1986 and has been a problem in the context of pressures to pay rapidly rising serial costs. The recognized "serials crisis" shows itself in higher serial prices that have an annual average percent increase of a bit more than 10% during the last eight years.¹

¹ The *ARL Statistics 1985-86*, based on only the data for that one year, show a median price of \$29.50 for monographs (p. 28) and the *ARL Statistics 1993-94*, based on data submitted only for that one year, show a median price of \$44.06 (p. 38). However the annually published figures are not appropriate indicators for a time series analysis because the two figures are derived from a different set of libraries.

Although libraries are buying fewer serials and monographs than they bought nine years ago, they are called upon to serve an increasing body of users, 10% more students and 16% more faculty. The median number of students increased from 16,684 to 18,287, with the number of graduate students rising more rapidly, and the median number of faculty increased by 180 more faculty since 1986. In 1986 the median ARL library subscribed to 16,198 serials and bought about 33,200 monographs for 16,684 students and 1,125 faculty; but in 1994 the median ARL library bought only 15,583 serials and 25,803 monographs for a larger number of both students and faculty.

At the same time, faculty and students are borrowing almost twice as many items in 1994 than they did in 1986. ARL libraries are also lending 50% more items than they did eight years ago. Borrowing increases at a faster rate than lending.

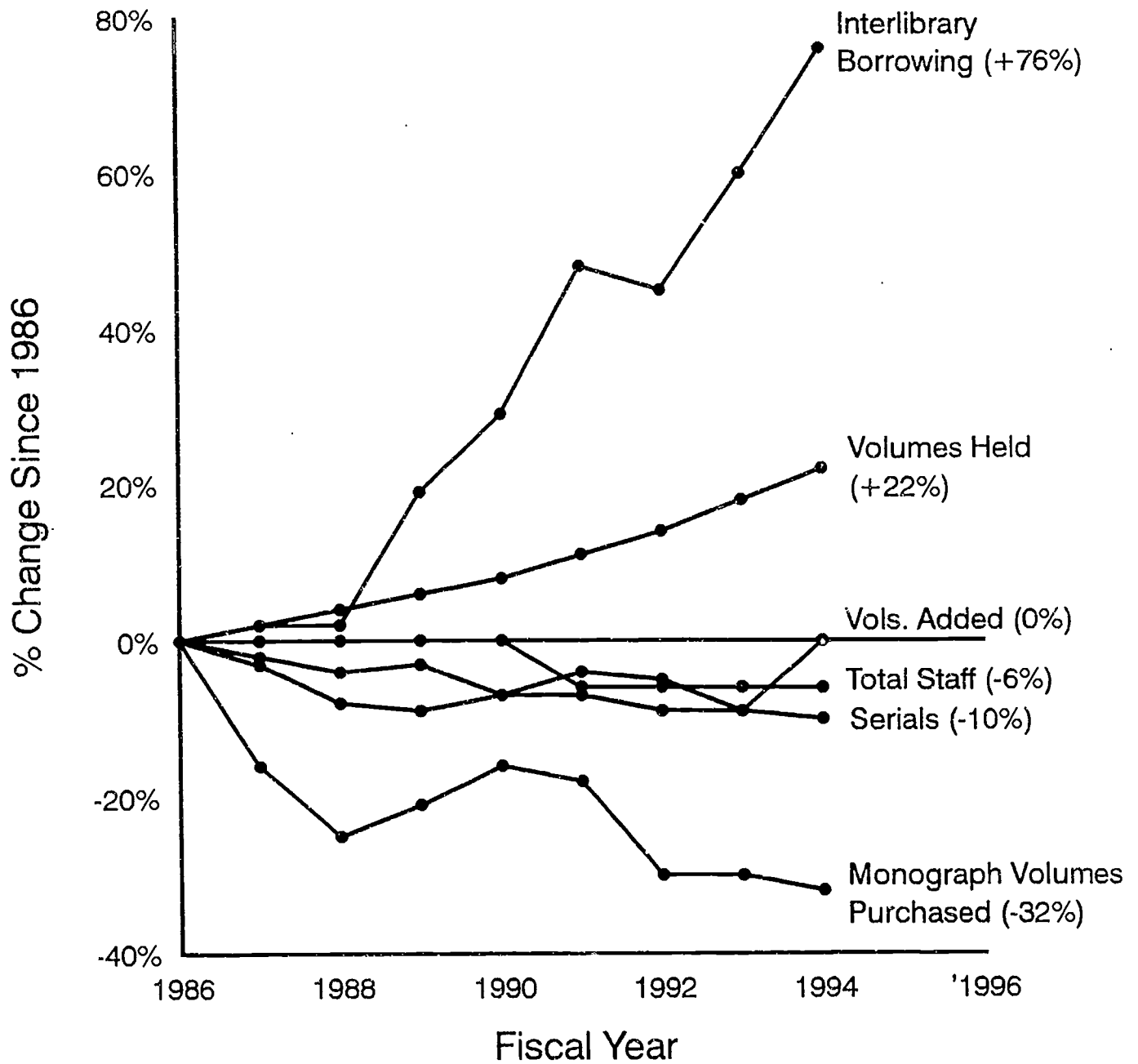
Per student borrowing activity increased 10% percent during the last year alone, compared to the 7.3% annual increase since 1986. By 1996 or 1997, libraries will be borrowing twice as many items on a per student basis as they did ten years ago. This overall trend should not be interpreted as a rigid doubling period as it falsifies the varying experiences of individual libraries.

Acquisitions levels for both serials and monographs per student continue to slide. Libraries acquire 32% fewer monographs and 10% fewer serials per student than they did in 1986. That is actually 820 serial titles and 1,520 monographs per 1,000 students in 1994, when there were 910 serial titles and 2,220 monographs purchased per 1,000 students in 1986. They also have fewer staff per student in 1994 as compared to 1986.

The median number of volumes added in a library per student has been below 1986 levels ever since. Last year, the median number of volumes added increased to 4.17 per student and approached 1986 levels.

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Staffing levels per student actually decreased in 1991 but since then they have remained constant. In 1994, there was a median number of 15 professional librarians per 1,000 students.

Although the per student staff levels have decreased, it is not because libraries have fewer staff but because staffing levels have not increased at the same rate as enrollment levels. The actual numbers of professional librarians and student assistants working in ARL libraries has increased 10% since 1986, but the median number of support staff per library has slightly decreased (1%). So, on a per student basis there is more professional although not as much support staff as in 1986.

Also, expenditures per professional staff member increased 9% since 1986 after adjusting for inflation. The findings on the increases in the expenditures per professional librarian are in harmony with the fact that professional librarians' salaries are increasing faster than inflation as reported in the *ARL Salary Survey 1994*.² Additional data from the salary survey show that the beginning salary for professional librarians has risen faster than the median salary. It could be that the newly hired professionals have technical expertise that is in high demand.

Interestingly enough, total expenditures for salaries for professional staff are slightly higher than the total expenditures for salaries for support staff in 1994 while the opposite was true in 1986. It may be that there is increased emphasis on providing more professional services. Another possibility is that increased levels of professional service are available to assist libraries in coping with increased networking capabilities and services.

At the same time, although libraries are spending less money on student assistants, they hire 10% more of them in 1994 as compared to 1986. It is possible that as libraries hire more professionals to provide additional network services, they also hire more students for daily operations using funds from support staff positions.

In sum, fewer purchases of serials and monographs coupled with increases in expenditures for serials and monographs are indicators of the declining purchasing power of academic libraries. Higher levels of both interlibrary loan and borrowing activities could serve as indicators of increased access to remote resources. As a result, it seems that there are fewer local resources per student but increased access to remote resources. Constrained local resources with increased need for professional and timely library service are some of the signs of the times.

Library roles are being redefined, as the academic community gradually changes. The ARL Statistics and Measurement Committee continues to look for new ways to describe and measure the performance of research libraries and their contribution to teaching, research, learning and community service in times of rapid change. The goal for academic libraries is to define output and outcome measures that reflect their relevance to the success of a university.

ARL efforts towards the development of new measures have appeared in various supplementary surveys that serve as a testbed for new variables. In the past, for example, the six variables (that is, manuscripts and archives, cartographic materials, graphic materials, audio materials, video materials, and computer files) on library collections were included in the supplementary survey and were added to the *ARL Statistics* for the first time a year ago. The new categories mirror the collection categories in the current U.S. IPEDS library reports, as well as in the not-yet-published revision of the NISO standard on library statistics (Z39.7). In turn, these collection categories are derived from the major divisions of the *Anglo-American Cataloging Rules*.

Also reported here for the fourth year is a data category for separately shelved government documents which was also part of the supplementary surveys prior to its inclusion in the *ARL Statistics*. Included in this category are publications of federal, state, and provincial governments and international organizations that are not represented in the libraries' online or other regular catalogs. Documents that are classified and individually represented in the catalogs, whether or not they are housed separately, and regardless of the type of classification, are included in the

categories of Volumes in Library, Volumes Added, and Current Serials (Not Purchased and Total). For some libraries, the shift of government documents into the categories of Volumes Held and Added, and to Serials, has produced discontinuities during the last four years in the historical series of data. The footnotes to this volume and the instructions for the ARL statistics questionnaire may provide further clarification about how libraries are integrating documents into their statistics.

Those using the *ARL Statistics* to compare individual libraries should consult the "Footnotes" and the symbols in the "ARL Library Data Tables." Although definitions used in the *Statistics* aim at consistency, differing reporting practices do exist among member libraries. To aid comparability in the *ARL Statistics*, expenditures of Canadian libraries are expressed in U.S. dollars, at the rate of 1.3381 Canadian dollars to one U.S. dollar. This exchange rate is the average monthly noon exchange rate published in the *Bank of Canada Review* for the period July, 1993 - June, 1994. Expenditures reported in Canadian dollars are given in the "Footnotes" to the *ARL Statistics*.

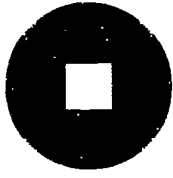

1. Please enter your data on the ARL Statistics diskette, if possible. The printed copy of the questionnaire is a worksheet provided for your convenience. Be sure to read the "ARL Statistics Diskette Documentation" as well as these Instructions before beginning to input data.
2. Definitions of the statistical categories used in this questionnaire can be found in *American National Standard for Library and Information Sciences and Related Publishing Practices - Library Statistics. Z39.7-1983*. (New York, American National Standards Institute, 1983.)
3. The questionnaire assumes a fiscal year ending June 30, 1994. If your fiscal year is different, please provide a footnote in the "Footnotes" section of the questionnaire.
4. **Please do not use decimals.** All figures should be rounded to the nearest whole number.
5. **Please do not leave any lines blank.** If an exact figure is unavailable, use -1, i.e. "U/A". If a question is not applicable to your library, use -2, i.e. "N/A". If the appropriate answer is zero or none, use 0.
6. In a university that includes both main and branch campuses, an effort should be made to report figures for the main campus only. (The U.S. National Center for Education Statistics, Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) defines a **branch campus** as one "located in a community different from that of its parent institution ... beyond a reasonable commuting distance from the main campus ... The educational activities at the location must be organized on a relatively permanent basis ... and include course offerings for one or more complete college-level programs of at least one full year.") If figures for libraries located on branch campuses are reported, please explain in the "Footnotes" section of the questionnaire.
7. A **branch library** is defined as an auxiliary library service outlet with quarters separate from the central library of a system, which has a basic collection of books and other materials, a regular staffing level, and an established schedule. A branch library is administered either by the central library or (as in the case of some law and medical libraries) through the administrative structure of other units within the university. Departmental study/reading rooms are not included.
8. **Questions 1a-f. Collections.** Use the ANSI Z39.7-1983 definition for volume as follows:

a physical unit of any printed, typewritten, handwritten, mimeographed, or processed work, contained in one binding or portfolio, hardbound or paperbound, that has been cataloged, classified, and made ready for use.

Include duplicates and bound volumes of periodicals. For purposes of this questionnaire, unclassified bound serials arranged in alphabetical order are considered classified. Exclude microforms, maps, nonprint materials, and uncataloged items. If any of these items cannot be excluded, please provide an explanatory footnote in the "Footnotes" section of the questionnaire.

Include government document volumes that are accessible through the library's catalogs regardless of whether they are separately shelved. "Classified" includes documents arranged by Superintendent of Documents, CODOC, or similar numbers. "Cataloged" includes documents for which records are provided by the library or downloaded from other sources into the library's card or online catalogs. Documents should, to the extent possible, be counted as they would if they were in bound volumes (e.g., 12 issues of an annual serial would be one or two volumes). Title and piece counts should not be considered the same as volume counts. If a volume count has not been kept, it may be estimated through sampling a representative group of title records and determining the corresponding number of volumes, then extrapolating to the rest of the collection. As an alternative, an estimate may be made using the following formulae:

52 documents pieces per foot
10 "traditional" volumes per foot
5.2 documents pieces per volume

9. **Question 1b. Volumes Added.** Include only volumes cataloged, classified, and made ready for use. Include government documents if they have been included in the count of volumes on line 1a.
10. **Question 1f. Monographic Volumes Purchased** Report number of volumes purchased. Include all volumes for which an expenditure was made during 1993-94, including volumes paid for in advance but not received during the fiscal year. Include monographs in series and continuations. If only number of titles purchased can be reported, please report the data and provide an explanatory footnote in the "Footnotes" section of the questionnaire. **Note:** This question is concerned with volumes purchased rather than volumes received or cataloged. Question 5a requests the expenditure for the volumes counted here.
11. **Questions 2a-c. Serials.** Report the total number of subscriptions, not titles. Include duplicate subscriptions and, to the extent possible, all government document serials even if housed in a separate documents collection. Verify the inclusion or exclusion of document serials in the "Footnotes" section of the questionnaire. Exclude monographic and publishers' series. A **serial** is
- a publication issued in successive parts, usually at regular intervals, and as a rule, intended to be continued indefinitely. Serials include periodicals, newspapers, annuals (reports, yearbooks, etc.), memoirs, proceedings, and transactions of societies.*
12. **Question 2b. Serials: Not Purchased.** If separate counts of nonpurchased and purchased serials are not available, report only the total number of current serials received on line 2c, and report -1, i.e. "U/A", for lines 2a and 2b.
13. **Question 3a. Government documents.** Report the total number of physical units (pieces) of government documents in paper format that have not already been counted in any of the above categories. Include local, state, national, and international documents; include documents purchased from a commercial source if shelved with separate documents collections and not counted above. Include serials and monographs. To estimate pieces from a measurement of linear feet, use the formula $1 \text{ foot} = 52 \text{ pieces}$ and indicate in a footnote that the count is based on this estimate. Exclude microforms and nonprint formats such as maps or CD-ROMs.
14. **Question 3b. Microforms.** Report the total number of physical units: reels of microfilm, microcards, and microprint and microfiche sheets. Include all government documents in microform; provide a footnote in the "Footnotes" section of the questionnaire if documents are excluded.
15. **Question 3c. Computer files.** Include the number of pieces of computer-readable disks, tapes, CD-ROMs, and similar machine-readable files comprising data or programs that are locally held as part of the library's collections available to library clients. Examples are U.S. Census data tapes, sample research software, locally-mounted databases, and reference tools on CD-ROM, tape or disk. Exclude bibliographic records used to manage the collection (i.e. the library's own catalog in machine-readable form), library system software, and micro-computer software used only by the library staff.
16. **Questions 3d. Manuscripts and archives.** Include both manuscripts and archives measured in linear feet.
17. **Question 3e. Cartographic materials.** Include the numbers of pieces of two- and three-dimensional maps and globes. Include satellite and aerial photographs and images.
18. **Question 3f. Graphic materials.** Include the number of pieces of prints, pictures, photographs, postcards, slides, transparencies, film strips, and the like.

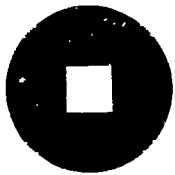
19. **Question 3g. Audio materials.** Include the number of pieces of audio cassettes, phonodiscs, audio compact discs, reel-to-reel tapes, and other sound recordings.
20. **Question 3h. Film and video materials.** Include the number of pieces of motion pictures, video cassettes, video laser discs, and similar visual materials.
21. **Questions 4a-d. Personnel.** Report the number of staff in filled positions, or positions that are only temporarily vacant. Include cost recovery positions and staff hired for special projects and grants, but provide an explanatory footnote indicating the number of such staff. If such staff cannot be included, provide a footnote in the "Footnotes" section of the questionnaire. To compute full-time equivalents of part-time employees and student assistants, take the total number of hours worked by part-time employees in each category and divide it by the number of hours considered by the reporting library to be a full-time work week. **Round figures to the nearest whole numbers.**
22. **Question 4a. Professional Staff.** Since the criteria for determining professional status vary among libraries, there is no attempt to define the term "professional." Each library should report those staff members it considers professional, including, when appropriate, staff who are not librarians in the strict sense of the term, for example computer experts, systems analysts, or budget officers.
23. **Question 4c. Student Assistants.** Report the total FTE (see instruction 21) of student assistants employed on an hourly basis whose wages are paid from funds under library control or from a budget other than the library's, including federal work-study programs. Exclude maintenance and custodial staff.
24. **Questions 5-9. Expenditures.** Report all expenditures of funds that come to the library from the regular institutional budget, and from sources such as research grants, special projects, gifts and endowments, and fees for service. Other library materials.** include all materials except monographs and current serials, e.g. microforms, backfiles of serials, charts and maps, audiovisual materials, manuscripts, electronic media, etc. If expenditures for these materials are included in lines 5a and/or 5b and cannot be disaggregated, please report -1, i.e. "U/A", and provide a footnote in the "Footnotes" section of the questionnaire. Do not include encumbrances.
28. **Question 5d.
