#### **ABSTRACT**

This catalogue, which is intended as a resource for literacy practitioners, contains information about program-based literacy materials produced by Ontario's (Canada) four desktop publishing centers for literacy programs. A total of 148 instructional materials (including materials developed by literacy learners), tutor/practitioner tools, and reading materials for adult literacy learners are profiled. Among the tutor/practitioner tools described are curriculum guides, training manuals, workbooks, and other materials designed for use with learners. Many of the reading materials designed for adult students include life skills information. Each entry includes some or all of the following: title; author; brief description; reading level; date of publication; ordering information (distributor, address, price, phone/fax, ISBN number); sample page; and an icon identifying the material as learner written, a tuter/practitioner tool, or interesting reading. A main index listing all titles in alphabetical order and an author index are provided. (MN)

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#### About the Program Based Materials Catalogue

There are four desktop publishing centres for literacy programs in Ontario. These centres are located in Kingston, Kitchener, Sarnia and Thunder Bay. The centres produce a wide range of learning materials and other materials for Ontario literacy programs. In the spring of 1992, Harold Alden of the Literacy Branch met with the four regional desktop publishers. At the meeting we discussed ways that the four projects could work together.

We recognized that there was a wealth of learning material being produced not only by the four centres, but also by individual literacy programs. We also recognized that most literacy programs had neither the time nor the resources to market and distribute the materials that they produced. We agreed that it would be valuable to collect this material and produce and distribute a catalogue that would showcase the materials and give programs a marketing vehicle for the materials they were creating. The data collection was planned in cooperation with Alpha Ontario, the Literacy and Language Training Centre and George Brown College, CoSy Network in the summer of 1993. Surveys were mailed to all Ontario literacy providers.

Thanks to all literacy programs that participated in this project, we hope that this catalogue will prove to be a useful resource. We hope to update the catalogue regularly, and have provided collection forms for programs that are creating new materials. Please return the forms, along with a sample of the material created, to:





We had other flags before this one, but they all looked like the British flag. Our red and white flag with the Maple Leaf in the middle is our first distinctly Canadian flag. Red and white have been Canada's official colours since 1921. The Maple Leaf has been a symbol of Canada since the 1700's.

The Governor General and the Queen each have their own personal Canadian flags. Wherever they are in Canada, their flags fly over the buildings that they stay in. The Queen is the Canadian Head of State. The Governor General is her representative in Canada.

# 43 Reaching In

Violent crimes accounted for only 10% of the 2.4 million Criminal Code offences in 1989. Property crimes were 60% of the total. The prevalent stereotype of a "criminal" as someone who is violent does not apply to many in conflict with the law. Neither is it true that those in conflict with the law represent a small segment of our society. Many of us are involved, and this cannot be ignored.4

**Reintegration** Experts talk about the importance of a smooth transition to the community for those released from jail. Experience and common sense tell us that people who have trouble fitting into society increase their chances of ending up behind bars once again.

> Reintegration into society is often viewed as a one-way street. This street leads from the jail to the community. But the street can also lead the other way. The community needs to reach "in" to those behind bars before they find themselves out of jail and unsure where to turn.

Literacy training works behind bars for all the same reasons that it works on the street. Learners gain an improvement in self-esteem. They are able to function more effectively in ways defined by themselves to be important. Opportunities increase. Literacy gives people skills to participate in their world in new ways.

# A Need for Literacy **Behind Bars**

Just as in other places in our society, the human side of illiteracy shows itself in jail. The written word becomes paramount for a person transferred to an institution away from family and friends. Letters serve to keep intact ties that bind relationships together.5

# **Activity 1**

Invite a guest speaker to talk to the group about the issues, concerns and needs that are important to people in prison. Ask the speaker to relate this information to topics and materials which may be suitable for tutors to use in literacy sessions.

Possible guest speakers include:

- parole and probation officer
- an Elizabeth Fry Society representative
- a John Howard Society representative
- a Life Skills teacher from the institution.

Give participants the opportunity to prepare questions in advance. Divide participants into small groups. Ask them to devise a list of topics they would like the speaker to explore. Emphasize those topics and information that would prepare tutors to better meet the needs of their learners.

Bring the group back together. Make a master list of suggestions. If time permits, pass the information along to the speaker so that he or she can prepare accordingly.

# **Activity 2**

As an alternative, organize a panel presentation. Include in your panel a person who has been in jail, and can talk to the group from experience. Ask him or her to relate the practical skills needed for transition back into the community after release. What can tutors do in literacy sessions to help make this transition smoother? What topics and materials may be useful?




## Introduction

### Tips On Sharing Books With Your Baby

Books should be part of your baby's everyday world, among the other things in the toy box and easily in reach. If you treat books as special, something that has to be put out of reach and carefully looked at, then you are giving the message that books are mysterious and outside of everyday experiences. Try to think of books for your baby in the same way you think of food for them — nourishing their minds, something to play and have fun with, and helping them grow.

SIMPLE AND BRIGHT Babies enjoy books which have simple, uncluttered pictures, in bright primary colours. Dick Bruna books, for example, show an apple that's bright red, slightly indented where the green stem is attached, and the whole apple outlined in black on a white page. Baby can focus on it easily.

THE MEANING IN WORDS If you occasionally and casually run your fingers along the text as you say "A is for apple," your baby will learn to associate the black marks with your voice, and with meaning in the black marks.

LET ME HAVE IT You will find your baby wanting to grab the book. This doesn't mean that they are not interested, but exactly the opposite. They want to cram this delightful thing into their mouths to experience it fully. Give your baby a favourite toy to suck on while they are listening and watching.

MAKE READING A PERFORMANCE! Move in time to the rhythm, raise your voice, whisper, make animal noises, tickle or cuddle your baby at the right moments, and turn over the page in a grand way. In short, perform with style.

TOO MUCH TO SEE Photographs are too complicated for young babies. There is a lot of detail and the eye has a hard time focusing on the simpler message, like "look at the cow." There is a cow, but there are other things cluttering the picture: a barn, grass, flowers, a fence, the sky.

"JACK AND JILL" Nursery rhymes are loved by babies. They enjoy the repetition and the sing-song rhythm. Later, when your baby is older, nursery rhymes are easily remembered and your child will take great delight in repeating them.

### IN SO MANY WORDS... LITERACY IN CANADA

### DEFINITIONS OF LITERACY

Literacy isn't very easy to talk about. Although we've come to depend upon the printed word in our daily lives, as a species, we really haven't been "literate" for very long. Still, in that short time, literacy has made possible change and growth of extraordinary proportions. Yet, according to UNESCO—the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization — and other international organizations, as many as one billion adults are not literate. (World Conference, 1990) The truth is that we have not even arrived at one suitable definition of what it means to be literate.

However, as an organizer, you may be called upon to explain your work to others. You may need to promote your project to attract volunteers. You may need to make a "pitch" to get funding from governments, foundations, individuals, or companies. But most importantly, in order to make sure that your best efforts reach people most in need, you will need to understand the complexity of the literacy issue.

### This section will look at:

- the current statistical discussions of literacy
- the common myths and misconceptions surrounding literacy
- the current face of literacy practice and the pressing need for new ways to help people meet their literacy needs.

### Literacy by the Numbers

"Does literacy make people happy? Only highly literate people seem to ask [this] question. And only the well educated seem to say that it does not. They are like the rich who doubt that money makes one happy. Significantly, such doubts come only after they have accumulated enough money and do not have to worry... And so with the highly literate."

### — Jeanne Chall

According to the most recent research findings, as many as thirty-eight percent (just under 7 million) of Canadians between the ages of 16 and 69 encounter some difficulty with reading activities in everyday life. The survey findings that follow place literacy on a continuum, rather than saying that X number of people are or are not literate. Canadians' reading abilities were organized into the following levels of proficiency.

Level One: Seven percent (1.2 million) of Canadians polled found dealing with printed materials nearly impossible. According to the survey, people in this group often see themselves as people who don't read.

Level Two: Nine percent (1.6 million) were able to identify only certain familiar printed words in a simple text. Canadians in this group likely see themselves as people who have difficulty with reading.

Level Three: Twenty-two percent (4 million) used print materials productively, provided they were clearly laid out, simply written,

### Note:

In this section - and in the sections to follow - we have tried to be careful of the words and phrases we use to describe how well people read, write, and use numbers. We have avoided using words like "illiterates." We have done this because we believe that people should not be defined by how well they read, write, or use numbers. We also believe that people can improve their literacy if they are given the right opportunity. We have therefore chosen words and phrases like "non-reader," "people who can't read," "people who have trouble reading," and so on. While such phrases may be, perhaps, less offensive, there is still a danger that they will be interpreted as life-defining. When you see these phrases, please take them to mean: "People who have not YET learned to read, write or use numbers well enough to meet the literacy demands of everyday life."

I was born in Cornwall, Ontario, on a cold Depression-era morning – 15 January 1935. Six months later my mother tried to kill herself. ### General Research Process

### 1. Context, Scope and Methodology

Literacy Northwest encompasses a very large geographic territory. Members of this network range in location from the Manitoba border to Schreiber (east of Thunder Bay) and from the Canada - U.S. border (Fort Frances - Rainy Lake area) to Red Lake and Sioux Lookout. These are just the current communities forming a rough boundary. In terms of Provincial Districts, Literacy Northwest covers most of the Kenora, Rainy River and Thunder Bay Districts.

Establishing a project in such a region required close examination of the methods available. With such a large area to cover, the chosen methodology was the mail out survey.

The reputational sample method was used<sup>2</sup>, which is unobtrusive and non-reactive. "Reputational sample" refers to a selection procedure. In reputational samples, the choice of respondents depends upon someone's judgment of who are "typical" representatives. People are selected because of their reputations, they are publicly visible, or they hold a position in an organization. The information collected came from a broad range of services, resulting in a wider perspective on the gaps and

## LET'S LOOK AT SOME GROUPS

### **IDEA**

Every group is different, and yet all groups have some things in common:

Here are descriptions of two literacy groups.

#### **▼ EXAMPLES OF SMALL GROUPS**

The first group is 6 learners who meet twice per week for two hours with a facilitator. They are all women. They knew each other before coming to the program. All are in the same community support program. They each have difficulty learning in formal learning tasks. The community support program hopes that these women will gain social skills and communication skills, as well as improve their reading and writing. The members enjoy coming to the group. They love to talk about their interests, especially movie magazines, and TV soap operas. They have developed their ways of being together. They are not very enthusiastic about any task that uses paper and pencil.

The second group is a group of 14 literacy learners and tutors. It came together out of a drop-in centre at the literacy program's office. This group formed in response to a request from outside for a drama production. It became a students' and tutors' drama club. They produced a radio play for a public performance. They had three months to produce the play. They met for 2 hours, once per week. All were very keen. They studied, rewrote and produced the play. All of the group dynamics revolved around the play. The group took responsibility for attendance.

### Editing: For the Writer and the Reader

Vince Greason is a literacy worker at the Metro Labour Education Centre, a project of the Labour Council of Metro Toronto and York Region. He has participated in several learner-written publishing projects since 1988. In this paper Vince uses the words worker and learner interchangeably.

For anyone who has been involved in a support role in the process of publishing learner-written materials, a number of editing questions have probably come up. Who chooses what material is published? Who edits? Why edit? How is it done? This essay tries to look at some of these issues as they relate to the publishing process.

Usually we think of editing as something done to assist the reader: editing makes a piece of writing more readable. In this article I develop an approach to editing that is designed to assist the writer as much as the reader. This approach to editing is consistent with a learner-centred approach to education.

### Publishing: an end or a means?

Using the books documented in <u>As Our History Unfolds</u>, we can look at the publishing process in one of two ways. We can see publishing as an end in and of itself. From this point of view, the goal is to publish a book. All activity prior to this goal works at making a piece of writing or a book *publishable*. Editing happens outside of the writing experience; sometimes editors are completely external to the learning dynamic. Learners are not directly involved, nor are they even necessarily consulted as to editing decisions.

Or, we can look at publishing in a way where the *process* is just as important as the *content*. Here the goal still remains the same --to actually publish a book; but the events leading up to the moment of publication are seen as just as meaningful. Editing is a learning experience for both tutor and learner. Therefore, the publishing project enables all people involved to gain and feel comfortable with their new language skills.

#### DEFINITION

A community-based literacy project is one in which members of a community siere responsibility for providing basic education to local adults. In an urban setting, the project might serve a relatively small, densely populated area with high numbers of adults who are functionally illiterate.

The setting for the project reflects its close connection with other community services. It might be located in space provided by a settlement house, a local library, a church, an information post, or a community centre. The best physical location for the project is an open, accessible space with a welcoming, informal atmosphere and easy access to other community services.

Direction for the project comes through a volunteer board of directors, drawn from the local area. The provision of tutoring is also primarily through volunteers, trained by an experienced staff to work in both one-to-one and group settings, depending on the requirements of the learner.

Learner participation in the project is also voluntary: adult learners may have heard about the program through a social service agency, but they are expected to make personal, initial contact with the project's staff, and tend to be highly motivated to learn.

The involvement of adult learners and volunteers extends beyond the tutoring sessions. Both learners and tutors are encouraged to be active in all aspects of the project, whether it be helping with

### Guidelines For Assessing Adult Literacy Materials

The following guidelines for assessing the usefulness of adult literacy materials were developed by the Toronto Curriculum Working Group, which is made up of literacy workers who are members of the Metro Toronto Movement for Literacy. We wrote these guidelines to articulate the need we felt, as literacy practitioners, to provide adult learners with materials which reflect their needs, goals and interests. We hope these guidelines will be useful in the following ways: to help those who work with adults cultivate a critical awareness when choosing teaching materials or developing resource materials; to help literacy practitioners who are developing their own learning materials; and to assist commercial publishers in understanding the needs of adult learners. Our guidelines will continue to change as our understanding of literacy grows.

#### A. Content

- 1. The material must be relevant and interesting to adults living in Canada.
- 2. The material should respect the dignity of the adult learner.
- 3. Materials developed in any language should be relevant to the culture and needs of the learner.
- 4. Learners, tutors, and programme workers should consider the author's educational philosophy as well as any social assumptions made about the learners and society (e.g. race, sex and class bias).
- 5. The content should be ordered logically and make sense.
- 6. A description of how and where the material was developed is useful, especially if literacy program participants took part in its development.

#### B. Format

- 1. Visuals and layout should be appealing and attractive to an adult.
- 2. Graphics should be rendered clearly and provide clues to the text.

## Finding A Host

Choosing a suitable person to host your show is probably the biggest decision of the process. This important person must be very knowledgeable about literacy and the topics you have chosen to focus on. The host will introduce the show and guests, act as a facilitator for the discussions, watch the timing of each speaker and be prepared to close off the show. During production, the TV station producer is in contact with the host through an ear microphone. This can be disconcerting at first, but our host managed very well and she had never been in a studio before! She was very successful and shares her experience with you in Appendix D.

## Choosing Your Guests

For a half hour show you will want a maximum of four

people (with three being the general preference). You may want to choose an expert in the field, a tutor/teacher and a learner. Learners participated in four of our six shows.

Letters to each of your guests, asking them to participate, should be mailed at least six weeks prior to the day of the shoot. Directions to the studio and transportation for your out-of-town guests should be arranged by your project coordinator. For two of our shows we had three out-of-town guests. Keep your guests well informed of the progress of your project. If possible meet with guests and the host before the scheduled shoot date. Everyone should be at the

studio at least an hour before recording or going live. This will allow the guests to see the studio, cameras, set, lighting

#### A. COIN RECOGNITION (POINT)

The student can point to a (penny) in a pile of coins.

Materials: Coins to be taught, coin value cards

#### INSTRUCTION

Place all coins in mixed-up order in front of the student. Say:

"POINT TO THE (PENNY)."

#### FEEDBACK

If the student makes a mistake, point to the (penny) and ask him to point to it too. Say:





# C. Basic Skills Needs as Perceived by Employers

In general, employers are not open to discussion of employee basic skills. Employers in food service - the land of low wages, fierce competition and half-hour lunch breaks - are even less inclined.

There are several reasons for this reluctance, among them confidentiality for reasons of competition. But one common reason is that employers cannot see how low basic skills affect employees' performance of duties.

"There are a lot of people at front line level who have low basic skills, but they never have to use them," according to a Human Resources Director for a Food Service Management Company. Responses like this are one reason why food service is such a difficult industry in which to introduce workplace literacy initiatives.

Employers were surveyed for this manual through one-to-one interviews and mail-in questionnaires. These two methods are treated separately below. You'll find the questions asked in the interviews listed in Appendix B and the employer questionnaire in Appendix C.

#### 1. One-to-One Interviews

In this section we look at employers' attitudes, problems and solutions on employee basic skills, as often as possible in the employers' own words.

The one-to-one interviews held for this manual unearthed much more than statements about staff being unable to read or do math. Employers spoke about their efforts to work around employees with low basic skills, and of their frustration at having to explain and re-explain duties involving skills "that should have been learned at age 15."

These candid descriptions of problems faced in day-to-day operation are the real "scoop" provided by the interviews. They offer an insider's view into the realities of today's food service workplace, and provide a clear picture of how workplace literacy fits into the food service environment.

## What does Learner Centred Mean?

In a learner centred approach to literacy, the learner leads the way and is at the centre of the learning. The tutor is the guide. The learner centred approach uses materials that directly reflect the learner's life. The concepts taught pertain directly to the learner's need. The learner centred approach encourages the learner to take control of the learning process. The reason for this approach is two fold:

- People learn best when what is being taught, is of practical use and reflects their own personal needs and interests.
- The learner is encouraged to take control of their learning, giving them the opportunity to transfer their newly acquired learning and literacy skills to other areas of their life.
