ABSTRACT

As part of a program of graduate follow-up studies, Macomb Community College (MCC), in Michigan, regularly conducts surveys of graduates or certificate earners 1, 3, and 5 years after their departure from the college. For the 3-year follow-up of the class of 1991-92, surveys were sent to all 2,997 alumni requesting information on characteristics, current employment/educational status, salaries, and perceptions of MCC. Study findings, based on responses from 1,172 former students (39.1%), included the following: (1) 43.9% of the respondents indicated that they had attended MCC to prepare for a job, 34.5% for transfer credit, and 15.5% to improve skills, while 57.3% indicated that they had achieved their educational objective; (2) 85% indicated that they were employed, with 43.3% employed in clerical/sales jobs, 18.8% in management/professional jobs, 10.1% in service jobs, and 7.8% in blue collar jobs; (3) 59.2% reported that their current positions were directly or closely related to their coursework; (4) 34.7% felt that their MCC education was very useful, 39.6% that it was somewhat useful, 9.6% not too useful, and 3.5% useless; (5) 34.1% were very satisfied with their jobs, 40.0% were satisfied, 9.4% were dissatisfied, and 2.8% were very dissatisfied; (6) for the 73% who provided salary data, the median hourly salary was \$12.65; (7) 35.4% indicated that they had transferred to a four-year college; and (8) 11% stated that they had earned a bachelor's degree. Includes comparisons to findings from studies conducted the previous 5 years. The survey instrument is appended. (KP)

ALUMNI SURVEY: GRADUATES OF 1991-1992 (GRAD 3) MACOMB COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Each year, the Department of Research & Evaluation at Macomb Community College conducts follow-up surveys of the College graduates and certificate-holders at their first, third and fifth anniversaries. The results of the follow-up survey for the classes of 1991-1992, the third year after their completion, are presented in this report.

METHODOLOGY

Alumni of '91-'92 received a survey questionnaire early in October 1993. A second mailing to non-respondents was conducted about three weeks later. Letters from the project director accompanied each survey in both mailings. Returned surveys were coded by R&E staff under the guidance of the project director. The questionnaires were then sent to a contracted data-entry firm for processing to magnetic tape. Printouts were generated from the tape, and the project director perused these printouts and data from previous surveys to compile this report.

The Grad 3 survey form was revised this year to make it more compatible with the Grad 1. For the first time, we did not seek demographic data (gender, ethnicity) from the respondents but derived it from the MCC student database.

The questionnaire is attached as Appendix A. All tables contain 5-year data and are <u>based on total number of respondents</u> unless otherwise indicated.

RESULTS

Response rate - For the fourth year in a row, response to the Grad 3 has declined. It is, in fact, lower than it has been in several years. We have no explanation for the declining response rate.

Gender and ethnicity - Consistently, more females than males have responded to the alumni surveys. The ethnic composition of the student body at Macomb, and also its graduates, reflects minimal





variation (less than 1%) from one year to the next. This is also true for alumni survey responses.

Tables 2 and 3 present five-year histories based on gender and ethnicity for the Grad 3 surveys.

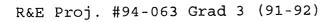

Objectives in attending MCC - Grad 3 respondents continue to indicate that their primary objective in attending MCC was jobrelated. After several years of decline among those who list a job-related objective (and corresponding increases in transfer objectives) the objective "prepare for a job" has increased 4 percentage points over last year while "transfer credit" as an objective declined 2.5 points. The number of respondents saying they had transferred was similar to those who listed a transfer objective. Transfers will be discussed more fully below. Table 4 sets forth the objective responses.

Completion of objective - This particular question was new to the Grad 3 this year. More than half of the respondents (57.3%) said that their objective had been fully completed. Another third (36.9%) said their objective had been partly completed, while 4% reported they had not yet begun to fulfill their objective.

Employment - Specific data regarding employment of Grad 3 respondents are presented in Table 5. A new category was added this year (self employed) to keep information parallel with Grad 1 and Grad 5. This year, more respondents reported employment of some kind, and correspondingly, the number of those reporting full-time student status has declined from previous years. Similar findings occurred in the Grad 5 survey.

Current job title - Information about job title enabled us to assess what occupational categories respondents were in. Four categories were established:

- Management/professional
- 2. Clerical/sales/other white collar
- 3. Service worker
- 4. Blue collar

Those reporting full-time student status were tallied separately, as were homemakers. In Table 7, homemakers were combined with unemployed--not to denigrate homemakers as a group, but because they are unemployed outside the home. Slight discrepancies occurred between the figures for employment status and those for job title which may be attributed to coding error or data entry error. For example, 80% of respondents listed a job title; 85% said they were employed. Less than 4% said they were unemployed in the job title question but more than 6% said they were unemployed in the job status question.

Relationship of work and education - Nearly six out of 10 respondents to the Grad 3 indicated that their job was directly or closely related to their education at Macomb Community College. Five-year data are presented in Table 7.

Those who said their jobs were not related to their coursework at MCC gave the following reasons. (Multiple answers were allowed.)

Usefulness of MCC training - This question was changed from a 5-point to a 4-point scale this year. In addition, all respondents were asked to respond; in prior years, only those reporting employment were directed to answer this question. A 56% increase in response was noted because of the change in methodology.

Respondents say that their education is more than somewhat useful with a mean of 3.21. However, more respondents rated their education "somewhat useful" than rated it "very useful."



These answers were combined for 87-88, 88 89, and 89-90.

Furthermore, the number indicating "dissatisfied" or "extremely dissatisfied" has more than doubled from last year. Removing a "neutral" category has made this a forced choice question, and undoubtedly contributed to the difference in mean score.

Job satisfaction - More respondents report greater satisfaction with their jobs than previously. Like the usefulness scale discussed above, the job satisfaction scale was changed this year from 5-point to 4-point by removing the neutral category which forced choices. In addition, all respondents were allowed to reply to this question.

Salary - We suspect the differences in salary data are due to a change in data collection. Previously, respondents were asked to check salary ranges (as shown in Table 10) and only a portion of the respondents were directed to the salary question. On this survey, respondents were asked to provide their exact salary which was then converted to the lowest common denominator--an hourly rate, resulting in more precise data. For comparison, because previous data were reported in ranges, the data were then adjusted to ranges, using a basis of 40 hours.

First, 73% of the respondents provided salary data. This figure is almost 16 points higher than last year, and higher than the

portion reporting data in the last six years. Historically, on all alumni surveys, about 2/3 of respondents volunteer salary data. Secondly, the median hourly salary is \$12.65 (slightly more than \$2,000 per month or between \$24,000 and \$30,000 annually). The mode is \$14.40 an hour with an hourly range of \$2.13-\$99.92 (self-reported). Percentages shown in Table 10 are based on percentage of respondents to this question.

Education - Two-thirds of respondents to the Grad 3 indicate their education at MCC was directly beneficial to their career plans. Another 30% said it was indirectly helpful. Only 3% said their education at MCC was not beneficial to their career plans. Historical data are presented in Table 11. Nearly 99% of respondents reported on this question.

Transfers - The number of respondents who said they transferred to a four-year college or university (N=415, 35.4%) is down 10 points from last year's Grad 3 Survey (45%) although 41.8% of respondents actually named a transfer institution. The top transfer institutions remain Wayne State with 156 reported transfers; Walsh College - 77; Oakland University - 55; Central Michigan University - 39; University of Detroit Mercy - 27; and Lawrence Technological University - 20. The rank order is slightly different for five-year totals. Complete information about transfers (sites, numbers, cumulative data) are presented in descending order by 5-year totals in Table 12 (next page). Concordia College, near Ann Arbor, was removed from this year's list since there have been no reported transfers in the last five years.

Transfer majors - Beginning with this year's Grad 5 survey (the first in a new fiscal year), transfer majors were coded using the list of college majors and occupational choices developed by American College Testing (ACT). Use of this list will provide more consistency between surveys and, therefore, more precise data.

Slightly more than 20% of those reporting transfer are taking classes at MCC's University Center.

Preparation for transfer - On a 5 point scale (5=Excellent, 1=Inadequate) respondents gave MCC coursework a mean rating of 3.78 for preparing them to continue their education. The question of preparation for continued education is new to this year's survey.

Highest degree earned - Eleven percent of respondents indicated they have already earned a bachelor's degree with a few more reporting having earned a master's degree. More than 3/4 said their highest degree was an associate degree, representing an increase of nearly 30 points from last year.

Highest degree planned - However, 75% of all respondents stated that they planned to earn a higher degree: 46% (N=544) - bachelor degree; 22% (N=260) - master's degree; and 9% (N=101) - doctoral degree or professional degree. The number of those planning to earn a bachelor's degree is up considerably from last year as is the number of those planning to earn a master's degree.

Of those who gave an anticipated date by which they planned to earn their highest degree, 72% plan to do so before the year 2000. Several more reported dates this year (apparently having already completed the degree).

Overall feeling about Macomb - Grad 3 respondents reported an overall feeling slightly more than "satisfied" with their experiences at MCC with a mean of 3.36 out of a possible 4 points (very satisfied). This question was new to Grad 3 and Grad 5 alumni surveys this year in order to offer comparisons to the Grad 1 survey.
