ABSTRACT

From sexual name-calling and grabbing to sexual threats, Iowa high school students face situations in their schools that fit traditional definitions of sexual harassment. This report details a first-of-its-kind study of 503 Iowa high school students. Incidents that could be described as harassment are common in Iowa high schools: 19 percent of female students and 8 percent of male students reported ongoing harassment of some kind; 38 percent of females and 26 percent of males reported some repeated exposure to sexual harassment; and 26 percent of females and 28 percent of males reported "one or two exposures" to sexually harassing situations. This means that, collectively, 83 percent of females and 62 percent of males in this study have had at least one exposure to a sexually harassing incident. Projecting these percentages to the entire Iowa high school student population would indicate that 98,300 Iowa high school students have had at least one exposure to a sexually harassing situation as described in this study. Other key findings include the size of the high schools did not affect findings; harassing situations were equally common for younger and older students; and students looked to adults--teachers, counselors, and administrators, to help them deal with sexual harassment. SEXUAL HARASSMENT IN IOWA HIGH SCHOOL REPORT OF A STATEWIDE SURVEY

From sexual name-calling and grabbing to sexual threats, Iowa high school students face situations in their schools that fit traditional definitions of sexual harassment. This report details a first of its kind study of 503 Iowa high school students, conducted by SELZER BODDY, INC., a Des Moines based communication research and video production company, on behalf of Saydel Public Schools.

How was "sexual harassment" defined?

Students were read a list of situations and for each situation, they were asked whether this had happened to them many times, a few times or once or twice. Students who say they had at least one of the experiences *many times* are classified as having **many exposures**. Students who say they had at least one of the experiences *a few times* are classified as having **a few exposures**. Students who say they had at least one of the experiences *once or twice* are classified as having **one or two exposures**. These three classes of exposure are NOT cumulative.

It is also useful to look at *cumulative* categories of this exposure to sexual harassment. Students who say they had at least one experience *many times* plus those who say they had at least one experience *a few times* are classified as having **at least a few exposures**. Students who say they had at least one experience *many times* plus those who say they had at least one experience *a few times* plus those who say they had at least one experience *once or twice* are classified as having **at least one exposure**.

What are the key findings?

1. *Incidents that can be described as harassment are common in Iowa high schools.*
 - 19% of young women and 8% of young men report exposure to on-going harassment of some kind (these students are classified as having **many exposures**.)
 - 38% of young women and 26% of young men report some repeated exposure to sexual harassment (classified as having **a few exposures**).
 - 26% of young women and 28% of young men report **one or two exposures** to sexually harassing situations.

Collectively, this means **83% of young women** and **62% of young men** have had **at least one exposure** to a sexually harassing incident in their schools as described in this study. Projecting these results to the entire Iowa high school student population reveals **98,300 Iowa high school students have had at least one exposure to a sexually harassing situation** as described in this study.

2. *The size of the high school does not affect these findings. Harassing behaviors are about as common at small rural schools as they are at large urban schools.*

Schools were grouped into quartiles according to student population, with each group representing 25% of the state's high school student population. Students from the smallest schools, comprising Quartile IV, are about as likely to report harassing situations as students from Quartile I, comprising the largest schools. Young men from smaller schools are slightly more likely to report exposure to harassing situations (33% of males from the smallest schools experience **at least a few exposures**, compared to 19% from the largest schools). (See **Table 4**.)

3. *Harassing situations are as common for younger high school students as for older high school students.*

For the most part, students in ninth grade are as likely to report experiences as students in twelfth grade. Among young women, **at least one exposure** to harassing situations is reported by 80% of the 9th graders and 89% of the seniors. **Many exposures** are reported by 23% of 9th graders and 19% of seniors. Among young men, **at least one exposure** is reported by 48% of 9th graders and 68% of seniors, but **many exposures** are reported by 10% of 9th graders and 6% of seniors (see **Table 5**).

4. *Students look to adults--teachers, counselors, administrators--to help with these situations.*

When asked what they would advise a friend to do if confronted with a serious harassing situation, the most common answer students volunteer is to go to a counselor (34% offer this solution). In addition, students suggest talking to principals (17%); teachers (17%); the school board, superintendent or other administrators (11%). By comparison, 8% suggest their friend should talk to his/her parents.

How many students are affected by sexual harassment?

These findings suggest that nearly 13,000 high school women and more than 5,000 high school men experience **many exposures** that can be described as harassing (see **Table 1** for more details). **At least a few exposures** are reported by 38,600 high school women and 23,000 high school men. **At least one exposure** is reported by 56,300 high school women and 42,000 high school men.

Did you have any other way to test for exposure to sexual harassment?

Yes. In the course of the questionnaire, students were read a scenario that was designed to reflect **serious sexual harassment**. Eight percent of high school age women say they have had a similar situation. This projects to 5,400 young women and includes 27% of those women who report **many exposures** to harassing situations.

Only one male (less than 1%) says he has experienced a similar situation. (See **Table 3** for student comments on situations like this.)

Situation for women: Some students at Mary's high school have been calling her names that are sexually demeaning. They have spread false rumors saying she has done some things of a sexual nature. Some students have been teasing her about her body and grabbing her when she walks by. This has been happening every day for a month.

Situation for men: Some students at Benjamin's high school have been calling him names that are sexually demeaning. They have spread false rumors saying he has done some things of a sexual nature. Some students have been teasing him about his body and grabbing him when he walks by. This has been happening every day for a month.

Do high school students understand what "sexual harassment" means?

Preliminary focus groups with high school students revealed that many students do not have a well-formed idea of what constitutes sexual harassment. And, among those students who can articulate a working definition, there is little agreement. Since this phrase has become a loaded term, triggering emotional responses, we decided to avoid it. At no time during the information gathering phase of the survey or during the actual interview was the phrase "sexual harassment" used.

How does this study compare to the national study conducted a year ago?

This questionnaire differs from the national study of sexual harassment among high school students commissioned by the American Association of University Women in two important ways. First, this study focused exclusively on incidents that happen to **high school students at school**. The AAUW study asked high school students to reflect on their **whole school life**. Second, this study focused exclusively on student-to-student situations. The AAUW study included situations with teachers and other school employees. The report of this study, "Hostile Hallways," says "85% of girls and 76% of boys surveyed say they have experienced unwanted and unwelcome sexual behavior that interferes with their lives."

How was the study conducted?

Principals from all 400 Iowa high schools were invited to participate in this study. Those who agreed were sent permission forms and a student information form and instructed to collect study consent from a designated sample of physical education classes. Physical education was chosen because, by law, all students must be enrolled in a physical education course each semester. Parents were given the opportunity to opt out of this study if they wished their children not to participate. Students enrolled in the Des Moines Independent school district were drawn from the district's database, again with parents having the

opportunity to opt out of the study on behalf of their children. In all, 83 Iowa high schools participated in this study. The student information supplied by these schools was stratified by school size and the final telephone calls were made to assure that the students who participated in the survey represented a cross-section of Iowa high school students.

Who paid for the study?

This study was funded by several entities, the largest portion coming from the Carl Perkins fund from the Iowa Department of Education. In addition, the Principal Foundation and the U.S. Department of Labor's Women's Bureau made financial contributions. Many volunteers gave time and expertise to the project. Their names are included on the attached list of the project's advisory committee.
