#### **ABSTRACT**

To gather data on trends in financial aid, the University and Community College System of Nevada (UCCSN) conducted a study of aid awarded to students in 1992-93 and compared findings to data from previous years. Study findings revealed the following: (1) financial aid awards to UCCSN students totaled \$51,301,498, an increase of 17.8% from 1991-92; (2) of the \$51 million awarded, \$29,517,514 (58%) was federal assistance, \$12,315,554 (24%) was state assistance, \$9,059,209 (18%) was from private sources, and \$409,221 (1%) was institutional assistance; (3) \$8,093,340 of the 1992-93 aid was in the form of student employment, including graduate assistant wages; (4) the 4 community colleges in the system expended \$6,110,429 in student financial assistance, of which federal assistance comprised \$5,101,303 (83%), state aid comprised \$647,599 (10%), private aid accounted for \$290,467 (5%), and institutional assistance totaled \$71,060 (1%); (5) the two universities in the UCCSN expended a total of \$45,191,069 in student financial assistance of which \$24,416,211 (54%) was federal aid, \$11,667,955 (26%) was state assistance, \$8,768,742 (19%) was from private sources, and \$338,161 (1%) was institutional assistance; (6) the percentage of federal aid in the form of grants dropped from 27% in  $1991\mbox{-}92$  to 25% in  $1992\mbox{-}93$ at universities, while at community colleges the percentage remained constant at 72%; (7) in 1992-93, 50% of the financial aid went to need-based funds; and (8) out of the 7,186 students who applied for aid, only 3,836 received it. 

#### UCCSN STUDENT FINANCIAL AID STUDY, 1992-1993

Financial aid awards to students attending University and Community College System of Nevada (UCCSN) institutions totaled \$51,301,498 in 1992-93, an increase of 17.8% from 1991-1992. As Table One and Figure One show, \$29,517,514 or 58% of the 1992-93 total was federal assistance. State assistance totaled \$12,315,554 or 24%. Institutional assistance totaled \$409,221 or 1%. Student financial assistance from private sources totaled \$9,059,209 or 18% of total aid.

The federal portion of total aid increased from 53% in 1991-92 to 58% in 1992-93. State aid decreased from 27% to 24%, while private assistance increased from 16% to 18% of total aid expended.

It should be noted that a considerable portion of state student aid (\$8,093,340) is in the form of student employment (including graduate assistant wages). Many national financial aid studies do not list employment, except the federal work study program, as student financial assistance. If student employment funds except the federal work study program are excluded from the Nevada data, the total for state aid is \$4,222,214, or 10% of total aid. In that same instance, federal aid is 68% and private assistance amounts to 21%.

As Table Two and Figure Three show, 39% (\$20,018,322) of the UCCSN total aid was in the form of loans. Grant assistance totaled \$13,738,622 or 27% of the total. Scholarships accounted for \$7,720,038 (15%) and student employment for \$9,824,516 (19%) of the total. Figure Three displays an increase in the percentage portion of aid awarded in the form of loans from 35% to 39% between 1991-92 and 1992-93. Grant aid increased







### Figure One Sources of Student Financial Aid In Millions










1991-1992 (Total \$43.3)



from 26% to 27% of the total. Scholarships (17% to 15%) and student employment (22% to 19%) decreased as portions of total aid awarded.

#### Student Financial Assistance— UCCSN Community Colleges

The four community colleges expended \$6,110,429 in student financial assistance in 1992-93, an increase of 16.3% from 1991-92. As **Table One** and **Figure Four** show, \$5,101,303 or 83% of the total was federal aid. State assistance totaled \$647,599 or 11% of the total. Institutional assistance totaled \$71,060 or 1% of total aid. Student financial assistance from private sources totaled \$290,467 or 5% of total aid.

The community college federal percentage portion remained at 83% of total aid in 1992-93. State aid increased from 8% to 10%, while private assistance decreased from 7% to 5% of total aid expended (Figure Four).

Nineteen percent (19%), or \$1,157,527, of the community college total was in the form of loans. Grant assistance totaled \$3,954,216 or 65% of the total. Scholarships accounted for \$317,501 (5%) and student employment for \$681,185 (11%) of the total. Percentage portions of aid in these categories remained approximately level between 1991-92 and 1992-93, as displayed in Figure Five. 
#### Student Financial Assistance – UCCSN Universities

UNLV and UNR expended \$45,191,069 in student financial assistance in 1992-93, an increase of 18% from 1991-92. As Table Two and Figure Six show, of the university total for 1992-93 \$24,416,211 or 54% was federal aid. State assistance totaled \$11,667,955 or 26% of the total. Institutional assistance totaled \$338,161 or 1% of total aid. Student financial

### Figure Five Student Financial Aid By Type Community Colleges (In Millions)




1992-1993 (Total \$6.11)



### Figure Six Sources of Student Financial Aid Universities (In Millions)








# Figure Seven Student Financial Aid By Type Universities (In Millions)

assistance from private sources totaled \$8,768,742 or 19% of total aid.

The university federal percentage portion increased from 49% to 54% of total aid between 1991-92 and 1992-93. State aid dropped from 30% to 26%, while private aid increased from 18% to 19% of total aid expended (Figure Six).

As Table Two and Figure Seven show, of the university total of \$45,191,069, 42% (\$18,860,795) was in the form of loans. Grant assistance totaled \$9,784,406 or 22% of the total. Scholarships accounted for \$7,402,537 (16%) and student employment for \$9,143,331 (20%) of the total aid. Figure Seven displays an increase in the percentage portion of aid awarded in the form of loans from 37% to 42% between 1991-92 and 1992-93. Percentage portions of grant aid increased slightly (from 21% to 22%), while scholarship assistance decreased slightly (from 18% to 16%). The percentage portion of employment assistance decreased from 24% to 20%. Data tables for each university may be found in the appendix.

#### Trends in Federal Student Aid


The trend to increased dependence on loans rather than grants continues to receive much attention in the higher education community. While the Clinton Administration pushes innovative direct lending and National Service programs into the spotlight, the very real backdrop continues to be that loans, rather than grants, account for the most federal financial aid. If this trend continues, the 1993-94 report will likely show a dip in Pell Grants from 1992-93 (and a corresponding increase in loans). This is likely the result of many independent students who work being ineligible for Pell Grants under the new federal criteria implemented in academic year 1993-94. Campus surveys suggest that these very students are the majority on Nevada college and university campuses.

#### Figure Nine Breakdown of Federal Funds Universities (In Millions)



Figures Eight and Nine feature breakdowns in federal funding for 1991-92 and 1992-93 for UCCSN community colleges and universities. For UCCSN community colleges during 1991-92, 72% of federal funds or \$3,143,962 were in the form of grants, 22% or \$944,702 in loans, and 6% or \$274,840 for the College Work Study program. In 1992-93, the percentage portion of grants remained constant at 72% or \$3,654,453, the percentage portion of loans remained constant at 22% or \$1,125,893, and the percentage portion of funds for College Work Study remained constant at 6% or \$314,109.

For the UCCSN Universities during 1991-92, 27% of federal funds or \$5.04 million were in the form of grants, 70% or \$12.9 million in loans, and 3% or \$600,000 for the College Work Study program. In 1992-93, the percentage portion of grants dropped to 25% or \$6.2 million, the percentage portion of loans rose to 72% or \$17.6 million, and the percentage portion of federal funds for the College Work Study program dropped to 2% or \$600,000.

#### State Grant Programs


Table Three displays information on Nevada's ranking for state grant aid funding when compared to the fifty states and the District of Columbia for 1991-92 and 1992-93. When both non-need-based and need-based grant programs are compared across the states, Nevada ranked 39th in 1991-92 and 38th in 1992-93. If data are considered per headcount enrolled student, Nevada ranked 38th in 1991-92 and 38th in 1992-93. When data are considered per FTE student, Nevada ranked 33rd in 1991-92 and 35th in 1992-93.

For need-based state grant programs, Nevada ranks 50th in both 1991-92 and 1992-93. When these data are presented per headcount enrolled student, Nevada ranked 51st in



### Figure Ten Need-Based vs. Non-Need-Based Aid



both 1991-92 and 1992-93; and Nevada ranked 51st in both 1991-92 and 1992-93 per FTE student.

#### Need-Based vs. Non-Need-Based Student Aid

Figures Ten and Eleven and Table Four display figures for need-based and non-need-based student aid. In 1992-93, about 50% (\$25.9 million) went to need-based aid and about 50% (\$25.4 million) went to non-need-based aid. Fifty-five percent (55%) of the need-based portion (\$14.2 million) was in the form of loans, 40% or \$10.3 million in grants, 4% or \$1.1 million in Work Study, and 1% or \$250,000 in scholarships. Over ninety-six percent (96.3%) of need-based aid was from federal funds, 3.4% was from state assistance, and 0.4% was from institutional and private aid.

#### Unmet Student Need

Many students who apply for student financial assistance in the UCCSN do not receive it. In 1992-93, 7,186 students applied for aid at community colleges in the UCCSN. Only 3,836 of these students, about 50%, received aid. The universities estimate that 14,789 students applied for need-based aid and scholarships (does not include non-federal student employment or graduate assistant wages). Only 7,147 of these applicants, about 50%,

received assistance.

#### New State Funding for Access in 1993-95 Biennium

This study reports data for 1992-93 and compares it to data in previous years. Not included in this study are new state funding amounts being expended in 1993-94 and to be expended in 1994-95 for improving access to higher education in Nevada. These monies result from a change in tuition policy by the Board of Regents which allocates one-half of all student tuition and fee increases dedicated to the state budget to student financial assistance for improving access. In 1993-94, it was estimated by UCCSN budget personnel that these monies systemwide would total \$1.76 million. In 1994-95, the amount of access monies could reach \$3 million. This initiative promises to dramatically alter and expand the efforts of the UCCSN and the State in funding student aid. Indeed, if current projections hold, the 1994-95 report could show Nevada rising in the rankings to 36th for all state grant programs and 38th for need-based programs.

#### Summary and Conclusions

In conclusion, the following trends exist in student financial aid:

- ► Total UCCSN student aid increased by nearly 18% from 1991-92 to 1992-93.
- The percentage portion of federal aid in the UCCSN increased while the percentage portion of state aid decreased from 1991-92 to 1992-93.
- The percentage portion of aid in the form of loans increased while the percentage portion of aid in the form of grants remained constant.
- Nevada's community colleges have a greater percentage portion of grants and a lower percentage portion of loans when compared to Nevada's universities.



- Nevada's community colleges have relatively fewer funds available from private sources when compared to the universities.
- There continues to be a shift in federal funding of financial aid from grants to loans. This trend will likely escalate dramatically in 1993-94 when the number of Pell Grant awards will decrease.
- Nevada again ranks !ast-- 51st-- for 1992-93 among the states and the District of Columbia for state grant funding in need-based programs. The Nevada Access monies, initiated in 1993-94, should dramatically increase state assistance to Nevadans and may improve Nevada's ranking to 38th by 1994-95.
- About half of UCCSN student aid is need-based. Nearly all of this need-based aid is federally funded. More than half is in the form of loans.
