ABSTRACT

The District of Columbia Board of Education recognizes home schooling as an option for parents. This option allows a parent or guardian to provide instruction to his or her own children, but not for an instructor to teach non-related children in a home setting. This document, compiled by the District of Columbia Public Schools, provides guidelines for parents to conduct a home instructional program. The guidelines include a copy of the "Notice of Intent to Provide Home Instruction Form," along with guidelines for submission. The implications of providing false or misleading information in the process are also addressed, as are procedures for terminating home instruction. Documentation accompanying the guidelines includes the following: (1) "D.C. Law 8-247"; (2) "Final Rulemaking" document; (3) a 1995-96 District of Columbia Public Schools calendar; and (4) "Homeschool Resources," which includes lists of periodicals, organizations, books, and publishers. 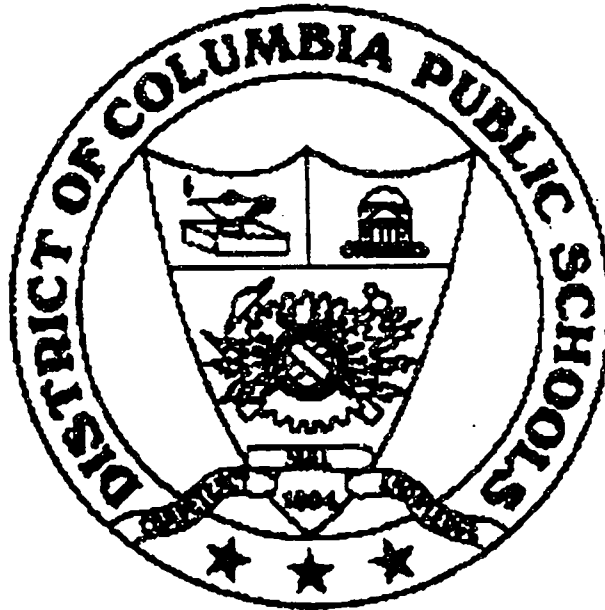

**GUIDELINES FOR PARENTS TO CONDUCT
A HOME INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM**

The option for parents to conduct a home instructional program is one which the District of Columbia Board of Education recognizes. In the capacity of the broad educational responsibilities invested in it, the Board is mandated to provide oversight on this and other educational matters in the District of Columbia. The process for a parent to conduct home instruction is designed to accommodate the parent as well as the Board.

Basically in order for a parent to conduct home instruction, he or she must complete and submit a notarized copy of a Notice of Intent to Provide Home Instruction Form before home instruction begins.

Information on the form includes the following:

1. name, date of birth, and grade level of each child that will be instructed.
2. indication of the option eligibility for which the parent qualifies to provide instruction, (ie. holds a baccalaureate degree, D.C. Board of Education Teaching Certificate or subscribes to correspondence course).
3. a statement by parent, as to why he or she is able to provide an adequate education for child(ren).
4. a program of study for each school year and

for each child instructed. This program must include a daily schedule, subjects that will be taught, skills that will be taught in each subject area; books and materials that will be used and an evaluation (testing) plan for each child.

5. other pertinent information requested on the form.

The Notice of Intent to Provide Home Instruction Form must be submitted each year prior to the beginning of the school year or at least ten days prior to beginning home instruction, to the State Office for Nonpublic Education Programs and Attendance Service. Upon successfully completing a site visit, the home instruction program may be approved.

If at any time, after the approval for home instruction is granted, it is discovered that any information provided during the approval process is false or misleading, the District of Columbia Board of Education maintains the right to withdraw the approval.

When a parent begins home instruction, he or she has the right to request and receive, from the last school attended, test scores and related academic information on each child who receives home instruction. This request and subsequent receipt of information must conform to the school rules and regulations. When a pupil has attended a school prior to beginning home instruction, the parent must complete the official form to withdraw the pupil from school.

A copy of that form must be presented to the director of the State Office for Non Public Educational Programs prior to final approval for home instruction.

When home instruction is terminated, the parent must 1) complete an official enrollment registration form at the school where the pupil enters, if that pupil is between the ages of 5 and 18 years old, and 2) inform the State Office for Nonpublic Educational Programs and Attendance Services, that home instruction has ended.

Appropriate support and technical assistance will be made available to parents who request it for the duration of a home instructional program. Home instruction is an option for a parent or guardian to provide instruction to his or her child(ren). It is not designed for an instructor to teach children who are not his or hers in a home or other establishment. In cases where this exists, the educational program is considered a school and must therefore, conform to the rules and regulations relative to conducting a non-public school or educational program in the District of Columbia.

There is no difference in basic requirements for new and current home instructional programs. The parent must submit the appropriate application, annually, for new, as well as, existing home

instructional programs.

Failure to comply with any part of the guidelines for parents to conduct a home instructional program will result in approval being withheld.

- Submit the Intent to Conduct a Home Instructional Program Form. (Form must be completely filled out and notarized). September 22, 1995 or *ten days prior to beginning home instruction

- Arrange for Site Visit by personnel representing the State Office for Nonpublic Education and Attendance Service. September 30, 1995 or ten days prior to beginning home instruction

- Send in year's evaluations or tests which provide evidence of achievement for each pupil who participated in home instruction during the 1995-1996 school year. June 30, 1996

This information will be helpful to you in registering the intent to provide home instruction for your school age child or children, during the 1995-1996 school year.

Please read the enclosures carefully; provide all information required in the Notice of Intent to provide Home Instruction Form and have the form notarized. Submit same to the State Office for Nonpublic Education and Attendance Service and call the office to arrange for a site visit.

After reviewing your submittal and determining that the instructional program is in compliance, a site visit will be made. If all requirements are met a letter of approval will be issued by the District of Columbia Public Schools. The approval will be in effect for one school year. Parents are required to submit the Intent to Provide Instruction Form, annually.

Instructional Programs that do not meet the requirements will not be approved. When an instructional program does not meet the requirements, this will be communicated to the parent, along with the reasons. Assistance from the State Office for Nonpublic Education and Attendance Service will be offered to parents to help them meet the requirements.

We wish you much success in your effort to provide a quality education for your child.

*A minimum of 15 hours of instruction a week (3 hours a day, 5 days a week) is required unless a more limited program is recommended by a physician, in which case a physician's certificate must accompany this application.

** The title, author, publishing company, city of publishing company and date of publication must be included.

Any parent who elects to provide home instruction in lieu of school attendance shall annually notify the Office for Nonpublic Education and Census of the intention to provide home instruction. The parent must also provide a description of the curriculum to be followed for the coming year and show evidence of having met one of the criteria for providing home instruction.

Any parent who moves into the District of Columbia after the school year has begun shall notify the Office for Nonpublic Education and Census of the intention to provide home instruction as soon as practicable, and shall comply with the requirements within thirty days of such notice.

Failure to complete any part of this Notice of Intent can result in the withholding of permission for home instruction.

AN ACT

D.C. LAW 8-247

IN THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

DEC. 27, 1990

To amend An Act To provide for compulsory school attendance, for the taking of a school census in the District of Columbia, and for other purposes, to require parents, guardians, and others who have custody or control of minors who are already or will become 5 years of age on or by December 31st of the current school year to place these minors in regular attendance in public, independent, private, or parochial schools, or in private instruction; and to establish penalties for failure to assure the regular instruction of these minors.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this act may be cited as the "District of Columbia Compulsory School Attendance Amendment Act of 1990".

Sec. 2. An Act To provide for compulsory school attendance, for the taking of a school census in the District of Columbia, and for other purposes, approved February 4, 1925 (43 Stat. 806; D.C. Code, sec. 31-401 et seq.), is amended as follows:

(a) Articles I and II (D.C. Code, secs. 31-401 through 31-410) are amended to read as follows:

"ARTICLE I - DEFINITIONS"

"Sec. 1. Definitions.

"For the purposes of this act, the term:

"(1) "Board" means the District of Columbia Board of Education.

"(2) "District" means the District of Columbia.

"(3) "Minor" means a person who has not reached 18 years of age, pursuant to section 2 of the District of Columbia Age of Majority Act, effective July 22, 1976 (D.C. Law 1-75, D.C. Code, sec. 30-401).

"(4) "School year" means the period, established by the Board, from the opening of regular school programs,

typically in September, until the closing of regular school programs, typically in June.

"ARTICLE II - COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

"Sec. 1. Establishment of school attendance requirements.

31-402

"(a) Every parent, guardian, or other person, who resides permanently or temporarily in the District during any school year and who has custody or control of a minor who has reached the age of 5 years or will become 5 years of age on or before December 31st of the current school year shall place the minor in regular attendance in a public, independent, private, or parochial school, or in private instruction during the period of each year when the public schools of the District are in session. This obligation of the parent, guardian, or other person having custody extends until the minor reaches the age of 18 years. For the purpose of this section placement in summer school is not required.

"(b) Any minor who has satisfactorily completed the senior high school course of study prescribed by the Board, and has been granted a diploma that certifies his or her graduation from high school, or who holds a diploma or certificate of graduation from another course of study determined by the Board to be at least equivalent to that required by the Board for graduation from the public senior high schools, shall be excused from further attendance at school.

"(c) Any minor who has reached the age of 17 years may be allowed flexible school hours by the Superintendent of Schools provided he or she is actually, lawfully, gainfully, and regularly employed, but in no case shall he or she be excused entirely from regular attendance or excused to the extent that his or her timely graduation would be jeopardized or prevented.

"(d) The Board shall, pursuant to title 1 of the District of Columbia Administrative Procedure Act, approved October 21, 1968 (82 Stat. 1203; D.C. Code, sec. 1-1501 et seq.) ("APA"), issue rules to establish requirements to govern acceptable credit for studies completed at independent or private schools and private instruction, to govern the validity of applications for permission to be absent from school, to govern the selection and appointment of appropriate staff members to carry out the provisions of this act under the direction of the Superintendent of Schools, pursuant to the District of Columbia Merit Personnel Act, effective March 3, 1979 (D.C. Law 2-139; D.C. Code, sec. 1-601.1 et seq.), and in respect to other matters within the scope of authority of the Board that relates to this act.

"Sec. 2. Enforcement; penalties.

31-403

"(a) An accurate daily record of the attendance of all minors covered by sections 1 and 2 of this article shall be kept by the teachers of each public, independent, private, or parochial school and by every teacher who gives instruction privately. These records shall be open for inspection at all times by the Board, the Superintendent of Schools, school attendance officers, or other persons authorized to enforce this act.

"(b) It shall be the duty of each principal, head teacher, or school administrative officer as designated in each public, independent, private, or parochial school, and of each teacher who gives private instruction to report to the Board the school attendance of any minor covered by section 1(a) who is enrolled in a school or who is enrolled for private instruction and who is absent from school or instruction for more than 2 full-day sessions or 4 half-day sessions in any school month, along with a statement of the reasons for the absences.

"(c) The absence of a minor covered by section 1(a) without valid excuse shall be unlawful.

"(d) The parent, guardian, or other person who has custody or control of a minor covered by section 1(a) who is absent from school without a valid excuse shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

"(e) Any person convicted of failure to keep a minor in regular attendance in a public, independent, private, or parochial school, or failure to provide regular private instruction acceptable to the Board may be fined not less than \$100 or imprisoned for not more than 5 days, or both for each offense.

"(f) Each unlawful absence of a minor for 2 full-day sessions or for 4 half-day sessions during a school month shall constitute a separate offense.

"(g) For the 1st offense, upon payment of costs, the sentence may be suspended and the defendant may be placed on probation.

"(h) For any person convicted under this section, the courts shall consider requiring the offender to perform community service as an alternative to fine or imprisonment or both.

"Sec. 3. Census of minors.

"The Board, or its designee, shall conduct, annually or as frequently as may be found necessary or desirable, a complete census of all minors 3 years of age or more who permanently or temporarily reside in the District. The census record shall be amended from day to day as changes of residence occur among minors within the age group and as other persons come within or leave the age group, and as other persons within the age group become residents of or leave the District. The census record of minors shall give

the full name, address, sex, and date of birth of each minor, the school attended by him or her and, if the minor is not at school, the name and address of his or her employer, if any, and the name, address, telephone numbers, if any, and occupation of each parent or guardian.

"Sec. 4. Report of enrollments and withdrawals.

"The principal or head teacher of each public, independent, private, or parochial school, and each teacher who gives private instruction, shall, in accordance with the rules adopted by the Board pursuant to title I of the APA, report to the Board the name, address, sex, and date of birth of each minor who resides permanently or temporarily in the District who transfers between schools or who enrolls in or withdraws from his or her school.

"Sec. 5. Penalty for failure to provide correct information.

"Any parent, guardian, custodian, principal, or teacher of a minor who has reached the age of 3 years who willfully neglects or refuses to provide the information required by sections 1 through 5, or who knowingly makes any false statement, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."





This act shall take effect after a 30-day period of Congressional review following approval by the Mayor (or in the event of veto by the Mayor, action by the Council of the District of Columbia to override the veto) as provided in section 602(c)(1) of the District of Columbia Self-Government and Governmental Reorganization Act, approved December 24, 1973 (87 Stat. 813; D.C. Code, sec. 1-233(c)(1)), and publication in either the District of Columbia Register, the District of Columbia

Statutes-at-Large, or the District of Columbia Municipal
Regulations.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA BOARD OF EDUCATION**FINAL RULEMAKING**

The Board of Education, pursuant to the authority set forth in sections 1-1501 *et seq.* and 31-101 *et seq.* of the D.C. Code, hereby gives notice of final rulemaking action taken by the Board at its Stated meeting held on March 18, 1992. The purpose of this rulemaking action is to amend Chapter 21, of Title 5, of the D.C. Municipal Regulations so as to set out the criteria pursuant to which instruction, credits and diplomas provided by educational institutions, not affiliated with the D.C. Public Schools, will be deemed "acceptable to the D.C. Board of Education"; to specify certain census information which such institutions and private instructors must provide to the D.C. Board of Education; and to authorize the Superintendent to select and appoint appropriate staff to implement the D.C. compulsory school attendance law. Promulgation of this rulemaking is required due to the recent enactment of D.C. Law 8-247, the "District of Columbia Compulsory School Attendance Amendment Act of 1990".

The notice of emergency and proposed rulemaking was published on January 3, 1992, at 39 DCR 36. No comments were received on the proposed rulemaking.

Delete the current 2100.2 through 2100.5, and in their place insert the following new subsections:

- 2100.2 Where the compulsory attendance law of the District of Columbia requires educational institutions, not affiliated with the D.C. Public Schools, to provide educational services acceptable to the D.C. Board of Education, the Superintendent of Schools shall require such institutions to present evidence satisfactory to the Superintendent that the following aspects of their instruction are acceptable to the Board:
- (a) Amount of instruction: the number of hours per day, days per week, and weeks per year, although the instruction need not be given at the same time during the day, week, or year as the equivalent D.C. Public School program;
 - (b) Character of instruction: acceptable subject matter and time devoted to the subjects;
 - (c) Qualifications of staff: training and educational requirements for teaching and supervisory staff must be acceptable to the Board, although a District of Columbia teaching certificate is not required; and

- (d) Other conditions: general consideration shall be given to factors such as class size, facilities, counseling services, and attendance record-keeping.

2100.3 Any educational institution, not affiliated with the D.C. Public Schools, which submits a copy of one of the following documents will be deemed to have presented evidence satisfactory to the Superintendent that its instruction is acceptable to the D.C. Board of Education, as required under §2100.2 above:

- (a) During School Years 1991-1992 and 1992-1993, a current license from the Mayor, issued by the D.C. Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs, authorizing the institution's operation as a child development facility;
- (b) Proof that the institution is currently accredited by, or undergoing the accreditation process from, one of the following organizations: the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools; the Association of Independent Maryland Schools; the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools; the Virginia Association of Independent Schools; American Montessori Internationale; the American Montessori Society; the National Academy of Early Childhood Programs; or any other accrediting body approved by the Board.

2100.4 Credits awarded by, and diplomas or certificates of graduation issued by, educational institutions, not affiliated with the D.C. Public Schools, through instruction which has been deemed acceptable to the D.C. Board of Education, pursuant to §§ 2100.2 and 2100.3 above, will also be deemed acceptable to the Board for purposes of the compulsory school attendance law of the District of Columbia.

2100.5 In no event shall the parochial nature of an educational institution, not affiliated with the D.C. Public Schools, or the sectarian nature of instruction offered at such an institution be a factor in determining whether the institution complies with the requirements of this section.

Add new subsections 2100.6 through 2100.10 as follows:

2100.6 The approval of an educational institution, not affiliated with the D.C. Public Schools, for attendance purposes shall be contingent upon the maintenance and submission of attendance records to the D.C. Board of Education by the institution, as required by the laws of the District of Columbia and Board Rules and policies.

- 2100.7 All attendance records maintained by educational institutions, not affiliated with the D.C. Public Schools, which serve school-aged children residing permanently or temporarily in the District of Columbia, shall be open to inspection by D.C. Public School personnel at all times.
- 2100.8 The individual in charge of each educational facility, not affiliated with the D.C. Public Schools, and each teacher who gives private instruction outside of a school setting, to school-aged children who reside permanently or temporarily in the District of Columbia shall report to the D.C. Board of Education, on forms provided by the Board, the name, address, sex, and date of birth of each such child who:
- (a) transfers between such facilities, from such a facility to non-school private instruction, or from one non-school private instructional situation to another; or
 - (b) enrolls in, or withdraws from, such a facility or private instruction.
- 2100.9 The Superintendent of the D.C. Public Schools is authorized to select and appoint appropriate staff members to carry out the provisions of the compulsory school attendance law of the District of Columbia.
- 2100.10 For purposes of this section, "school-aged child" is defined as any child who is five years old or older on December 31 of any school year but who has not yet reached his or her eighteenth birthday.

NOTICE OF FINAL RULEMAKING

The Board of Education, pursuant to the authority set forth in §31-101 et seq. of the D. C. Code, hereby gives notice of final rulemaking action taken by the Board of Education at its meeting held on September 16, 1992 to amend section 2203.1 of its Rules. This amendment is necessary due to the Board's desire to implement new graduation requirements which will be applicable beginning with those students entering ninth (9th) grade in September, 1992. The one (1) Carnegie unit presently required for volunteer community service is deleted through this rulemaking, although the community service is still a requirement.

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published on July 24, 1992 at 39 DCR 5568. No comments were received on the proposed rulemaking.

Amend Section 2203.1 as follows:

2203.1 The following course work shall be required in order to be certified as eligible to receive the high school diploma:

- (a) A total of twenty-three and one-half (23 1/2) Carnegie Units shall have been satisfactorily completed;
- (b) The following Carnegie Units in the corresponding subjects shall be required:

2203.1(d) 100 hours of community service shall be required for graduation.

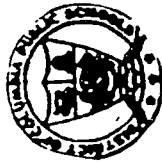
