



The role and mission of the South Dakota School for the Visually Handicapped is to provide statewide services to meet the educational needs of sensory impaired children from birth through age twenty-one in South Dakota by serving in a dual leadership and resource role in the statewide efforts to serve these students. This mission will be carried out through cooperative efforts with all appropriate state agencies, educational cooperatives, local education agencies and colleges and universities. It is recognized that the mission of the South Dakota School for the Visually Handicapped is a significant part of the continuum of services in the statewide delivery system for children in need of special education or special education and related services.



Minimum Course Requirements*

All baccalaureate or general studies students under twenty-one (21) years of age including students transferring with less than twenty-four (24) credit hours must meet the following minimum course requirements:

- 1. Four years of English courses with major emphasis upon grammar, composition, or literary analysis; one year of debate instruction may be included to meet this requirement.
- 2. Two years of mathematics, with a third year of either advanced mathematics OR laboratory science Algebra, geometry, trigonometry or other advanced mathematics including accelerated or honors mathematics (algebra) provided at the 8th grade level, not included are arithmetic, business mathematics, general mathematics or other similar courses.
- 3. Two years of Laboratory Science with a third year of either laboratory science **OR** advanced mathematics Courses in biology, chemistry, or physics in which at least one (1) regular laboratory period is scheduled each week. Accelerated or honors science (biology, physics or chemistry) provided in the 8th grade will be accepted. Qualifying "physical science courses (with lab)" will be decided on a case by case basis by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.
- 4. <u>Three years of Social Studies</u> History, economics, sociology, geography, government--including U.S. and South Dakota, American Problems, etc.
 - 5. One-half year of Computer Science
- 6. <u>One-half year of Fine Arts</u> Art or Music appreciation, analysis or performance.

Students who have completed the minimum course requirements, but who have not obtained a "C" (2.0 equivalent) average grade in the above courses must meet the requirements of **A** or **B** below.

- **A.** South Dakota and Minnesota resident students must meet the following requirements:
- 1. Admission to USD, SDSU, and SDSMT will be granted if a student falls within one of the following categories:
- a) Rank in the top half of student's high school graduating class; or
- b) An ACT composite score of 21 (22 Enhanced Λ CT) or above; or
- c) Selection in an exception group limited in size to 3% of the previous year's freshman class; minimum of 18 ACT (20 Enhanced ACT) composite score or upper two-thirds of the high school graduating class. Students in this group must have demonstrated talent such as artistic, musical, or athletic.
- Admission to BHSU, NSU, and DSU will be granted if a student falls within one of the following categories:
- a) Rank in the top two-thirds of the student's high school graduating class; or
- b) An ACT composite score of 18 (20 Enhanced ACT) or above; or
- c) Selection in an exception group limited in size to 3% of the previous year's freshman class; minimum of 15 ACT (18 Enhanced ACT) composite score or upper three-fourths of the

high school graduating class. Students in this group must have demonstrated talent such as artistic, musical or athletic.

Each campus will provide a progress report by June 30 of each year on students admitted in the exception group identified in 1c and 2c. This report will provide information on academic progress of all students admitted in the exception group by type of talent, major, sex, and year of admission.

<u>OR</u>

- **B.** NON-RESIDENT students must meet the following requirements:
- 1. Admission to USD, SDSU, and SDSMT will be granted if a student falls within one of the following categories:
- a) Rank in the top half of the student's high school graduating class, or
- b) An ACT composite score of 22 (23 Enhanced ACT) or above.
- 2. Admission to BHSU, DSU, and NSU will be granted if a student falls within one of the following categories:
- a) Rank in the top two-thirds of the student's high school graduating class, or
- b) An ACT composite score of 18 (20 Enhanced ACT) or above.

Mandatory Mathematics Placement Procedure

Since Fall 1989, each campus has had a mandatory mathematics placement procedure for incoming freshmen. The instruments and criteria used for mandatory placement are at the discretion of each institution.

Requirements for Provisional Admittance

Provisional admittance requirements apply to all baccalaureate or general studies students under twenty-one (21) years of age including students transferring with less than twenty-four (24) credit hours.

A student who meets the requirements of **A** or **B**, but fails to meet the minimum course requirements in English, Mathematics, Laboratory Science, Social Science, Fine Arts or Computer Science, may be admitted provisionally and may meet the requirements by satisfactorily completing appropriate college courses of an equivalent type in that area for credit. (Basis: one year high school course = 3 credit hours.) These credits will be earned above and beyond any degree program requirements unless the credits are earned during the student's first scmester in college with a grade of "C" or better. These requirements must be satisfied before graduation and within two (2) years of admittance or transfer to a baccalaureate program.

Non-Traditional, Junior/Senior Transfer Students

Non-traditional students (21 years of age or older) and students transferring with more than twenty-four (24) credit hours into a baccalaureate or general studies program shall be admitted at the discretion of the institution. Non-traditional students in baccalaureate programs are encouraged to fulfill the minimum course requirements.

One-Year Certificate and Two-Year Associate Degree Programs

Students shall be admitted to Certificate and Associate Degree Programs at the discretion of the institution.





Financial Aid by Program Fiscal Year 1994







Average Award per Student Fiscal Year 1994

















NOTE: FY88 expenditures exceeded the budget by approximately \$50,000. These expenditures were deferred until FY89. The shortfall in FY89 then grew to \$290,000. This shortfall was again deferred into the following year. Despite additional appropriations, the FY90 shortfall grew to a sizeable \$375,465. The \$375,465 was deferred into FY91. The accumulated FY91 shortfall of \$636,511 was deferred into FY92, and the shortfall grew to \$888,936. Despite the additional appropriation in FY93, the deficit by the end of the year was \$820,632. The institutions will absorb the cumulative shortfall and will continue to absorb the shortfall in the year taken.



FY94 State Support per Student



Resident Tuition and Fees--Regional Comparison



Full-Time Faculty Salaries


Regional Comparison--FY93 (9 Month Average)

(per 1,000 population)



Student FTEs Per High School Graduate



(per 1,000 population)



Public Higher Education Enrollment


Increase FY78 to FY94
