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ABSTRACT

This handbook presents statistics about the public and private schools of Maryland. In 1994 there were 790,938 public school students and 156,582 nonpublic school students in the state, representing a 13.2% increase in public schools over 5 years and a 17% growth in the nonpublic schools. There were 1,262 public schools in 1994-95 and 1,024 nonpublic schools. Of the state's 87,704.1 total public school employees, 19,533.2 were in noninstructional positions and 60,153.7 were in instructional positions. The majority of Maryland's public school students were white (58.1%), with 34.7% African American, 0.3% American Indian/Alaskan native, 3.8% Asian/Pacific Islander, and 3.1% Hispanic. Most of the state's teachers (78.7%) were white, with 19.6% African American and 1.7% of other racial and ethnic groups. The statewide average dropout rate was 4.96%, but in Baltimore city, the dropout rate was 15.19%. Most (79.5%) of the state's 39,669 high school graduates planned to attend college. Information is also provided about achievement test results for the Scholastic Aptitude Test and the Comprehensive Tests of Basic Skills, as well as about teacher salaries, financial resources, special programs, and vocational and adult education. 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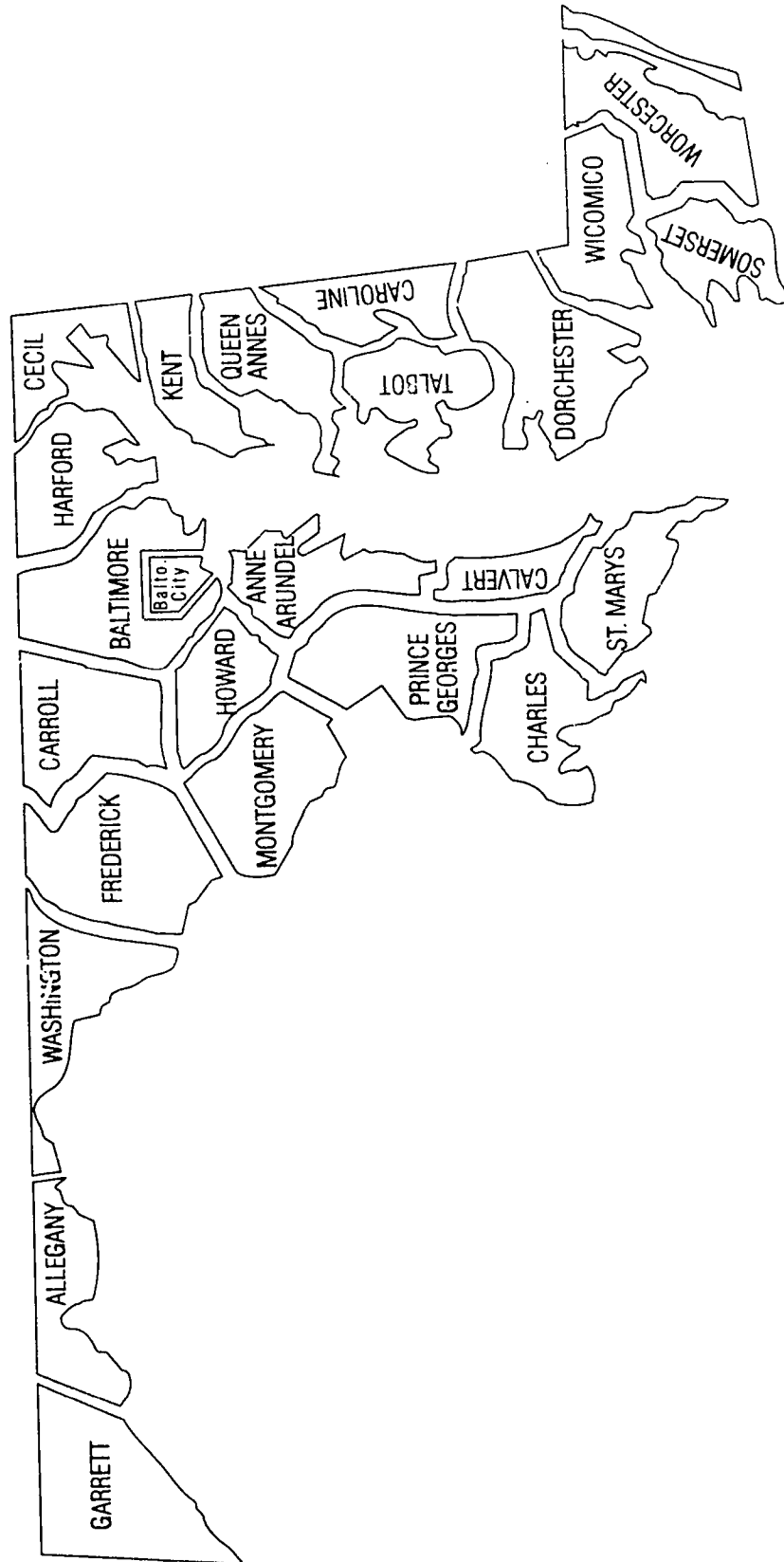

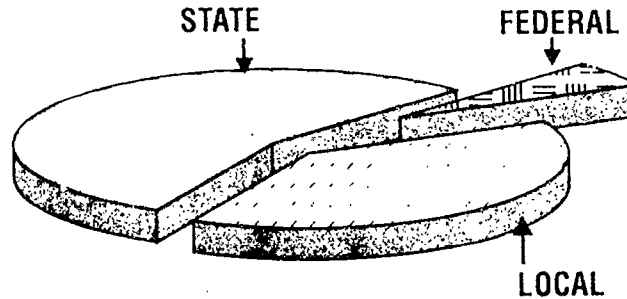

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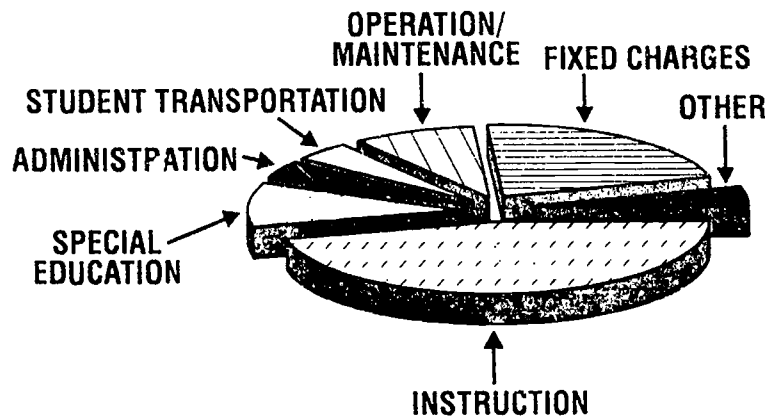
Financial Resources Maryland Public Schools 1993-94

Where the Money Comes From



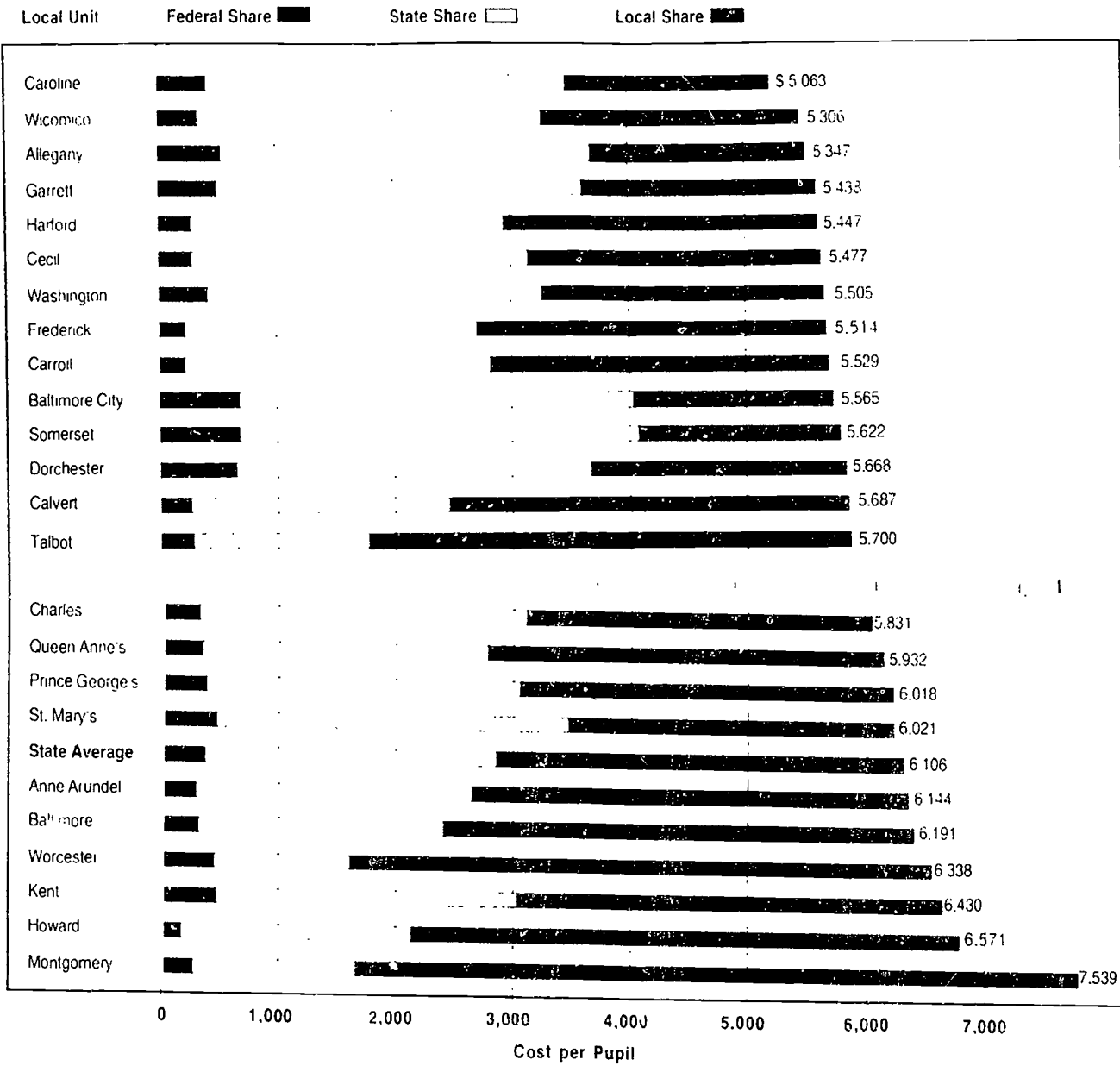

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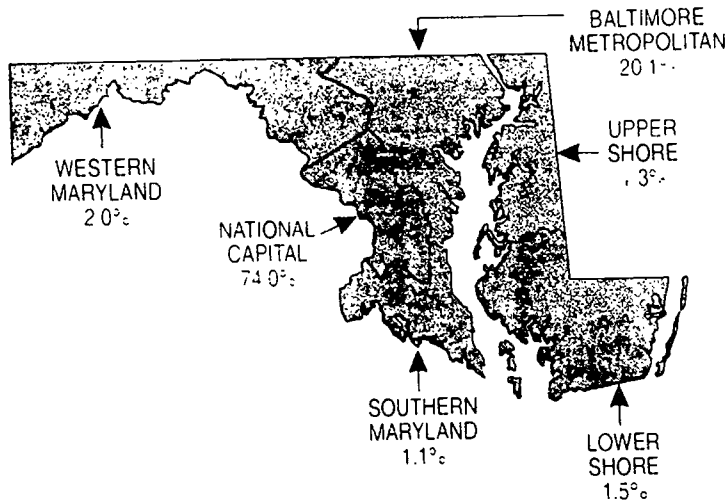

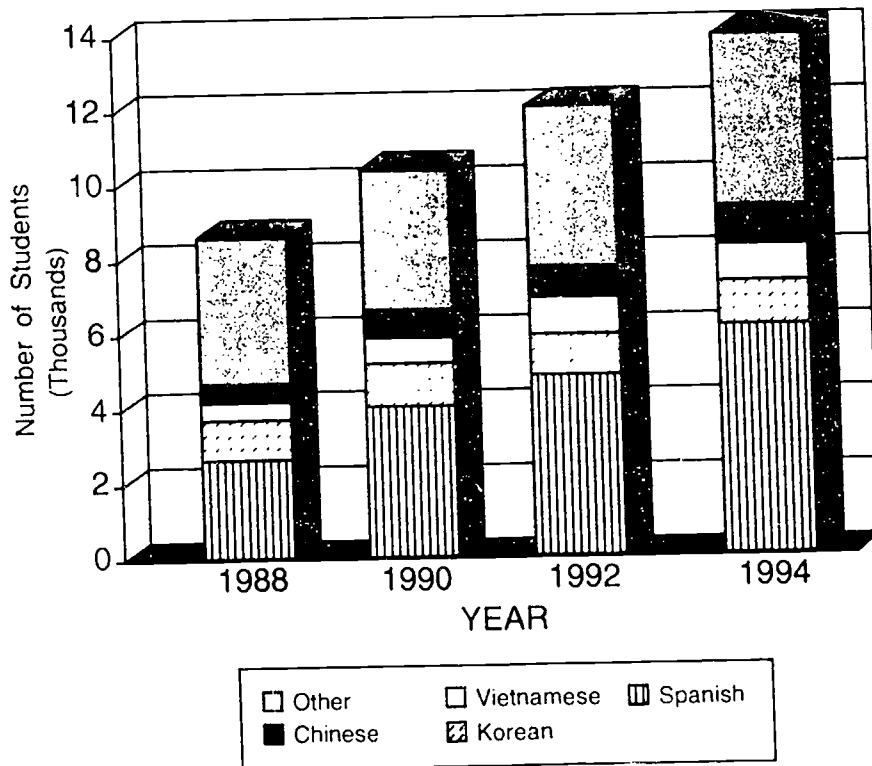

Did You Know . . .

- Maryland is one of the first states to require random drug testing for school bus drivers.
- A Maryland school bus has a comprehensive safety inspection at least three times a year.
- Public school bus drivers in Maryland average more than 17,119 miles per year transporting students to and from school.
- More than 50% of Maryland school bus drivers have ten years or more of school bus driving experience. 94% are between the ages of 30 and 50, and 64% are women.
- Last year, children in 5,383 family day care homes in Maryland received nutritious meals through the Child and Adult Care Food Program.
- An average of 318,618 school lunches and 53,180 school breakfasts were served daily to Maryland students last year.
- More than 221,000 Maryland residents have been awarded high school diplomas through GED testing since 1941.
- Fifty-five percent of Maryland's 1993 GED examinees were under 25 years of age. Of this population, 60% passed the GED test and earned a high school diploma.
- In the most recent study, only 66% of graduating high school seniors nationally were able to meet Maryland minimum score requirements on the GED tests. Maryland is one of 16 states which require higher minimum passing scores on the GED tests than the other 34 states.
- One out of every 20 GED recipients pursues a college education.
- Annually, GED diplomas account for about one out of every seven US high school diplomas. In Maryland, the figures are one in every eight.
- Maryland public school systems spent \$105 million from July 1993 through June 1994 to provide heating, cooling, and power to almost 1,400 buildings. Total costs increased 6%. The average cost was \$136 per student and \$.91 per square foot.

Did You Know . . .

- Public school enrollment reached an all-time high of 922,091 students in 1972, dropped 37% to 671,560 in 1985, and has been rising steadily since. Over the past nine years, enrollment has increased by 18% with the largest increase occurring over the previous five years (13%).
- Sailor, a project supported by the library community of Maryland and MSDE, provides electronic access via Internet to state, national, and international resources through a local telephone connection.
- Maryland Least Restrictive Environment/Neighborhood Inclusion Project is a five-year statewide initiative funded by MSDE to improve services for students with disabilities by providing a wide-range of services in inclusive settings within neighborhood schools.
- Yearly attendance rates have been rising steadily since 1990, from 94.2% to 95.2%.
- The Mission Youth Program, jointly funded by State and corporate contributions, served 8,000 economically disadvantaged children in 68 community-based summer centers and focused on prevention of drug and alcohol abuse and violence prevention.
- Maryland's Tomorrow is a multi-year, year-round dropout prevention initiative of school systems and the local employment training system funded by federal and state aid. Program evaluation reveals that program participants outperformed comparison students on the Maryland Functional tests by the third cohort, achieved higher GPAs in 9th and 10th grade in a majority of schools, and were less inclined to drop out of school.
- There were 2,955 new teachers hired for the 1993-94 school year. Of these, 1,843 had no prior teaching experience, 525 had prior Maryland teaching experience, and 587 had prior teaching experience outside Maryland. Twenty-one percent of the new hires were ethnic minorities.
- The areas of the greatest projected shortage of qualified teachers for the 1994-95 year are technology education; computer science; spanish; chemistry; general science; physical science; and special education for infant - grade 3, grades 6-12, and severely handicapped. Shortages are also expected for occupational therapists, physical therapists, and speech pathologists.
