ABSTRACT

This document explains the World Wide Web (WWW) and how to use it, with specific reference to sites that would be of interest to those in the fields of language teaching and linguistics. To use WWW, one needs a computer, a modem, and a search engine. Web sites contain text as well as graphics that can be downloaded and edited for educational or personal use. WWW sites are listed for computer software and development, linguistics, class resources, job opportunities, testing, U.S. history, student pen-pal opportunities, international organizations and publications, and specific languages and cultures. Each listing includes the WWW access line and a brief description of its intended use or topic. (NAV)

The World Wide Web is a massive computer database. It is a useful source of information, most of it free. It is very easy to use, even for people who have no experience with computers.

There are thousands of WWW sites (computer-based information stores) all over the world. They hold massive amounts of information, including information of academic, personal, general, and commercial interest. Sites are located at universities, libraries, companies, government agencies, etc.

You find WWW sites through direct addressing (typing in a site address), keyword searches, and "stepping stones" from one site to another (text links). Each site has connections to other sites. Certain words are highlighted and underlined in the text, and if you click on those words, you will be connected to another site. You can visit sites all over the world this way, and each site can lead you to more sites. You can find more and more information this way.

WWW sites include text, pictures, sound, computer programs, video, etc. If your computer has the capability, you can see pictures, hear sounds, and view videos.

From a web site, you can download or print text and pictures. You can then edit the text or use the pictures, if you wish.

In order to use the WWW, you need a computer connected to the Internet and a browsing program, like Mosaic or Netscape. Netscape is getting to be the most common program. It provides you with the screen and a set of menus in a setup similar to most Windows applications.

There are many search engines for WWW. You use a search engine by typing in one or more keywords. The search engine will give you a list of the WWW sites that have your keyword(s) in their name or description. This list includes some search engines (Section 14). Netscape also has a search engine.
